Band enjoys trip to TorC Fiesta parade

The Carrizozo Grizzly Marching Band, directed by Arnold Boyce, boarded the new activity bus at 6:00 a.m. Saturday morning and began their trek to Truth or Consequences to take part in the parade and Fiesta that would begin at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The bright white and red new bus was so enticing that it was with great difficulty that any handman could be chosen to ride in one of the three station wagons making the trip carrying equipment, everyone wanted to ride on the new bus, but all 56 bandmen could not get on a 45-passenger bus so a few old volunteer (army style) to ride with Mr. Boyce or Mrs. Boyce or Mrs. Knoblock. Mr. and Mrs. Pherigo received the overflow of passengers and horn cases and pulled their car into the line and we were ready to go.

Several other band parents pulled into the lineup to complete the convoy. We had requested a police escort which arrived in the form of Powder Knoblock, in his new shiny, white, souped up State Police cruiser, and with a blast of the air horns, Mr. Ellison wheeled the big bus out into the street and we were off. What a beautiful sight for Carrizozo. The parents waving good-bye to their youngsters, and the kids waving back, all in a festive mood and under a beautiful sunny New Mexico sky. For many this was their first band trip and they were out to have a "ball".

Up and over the mountain we rolled, across the Rio Grande and down route 83, singing and joking, starting that BALL a-rolling. At each county line we would pick up a new police escort who would escort us to the next line, all the way there we could depend on seeing that bubble gum machine on top of the last car in the line, and what a comfort that was, just in case.

At 9:30 we arrived at Tingloy Hospital and lined up on the lawn with the many other bands, some like Tatum had come 300 miles, and Grants' big band arrived the night before and would stay another night, for it would be too far to go this same day.

Each band took turns showing off their best tunes and drills under the guise of rehearsing, as they waited on this big lawn, for their turn to enter the parade that was passing in front of them. Our group was so very proud of their new dazzling red and metallic white uniforms, even white gloves, and up front a great big new red and white banner with white fringe that said, "CARRIZOZO MARCHING BAND". What a snappy outfit.

There is so much to see that many do not notice one of the parade units, a Ford convertible, that suddenly belches smoke and fire from its hood and burns 50 feet from our position. In the tradition of the theater, "THE SHOW MUST GO ON" the young lady that had been riding in the car runs up to the next car and joins the young girl there, and begins waving to the crowd as if nothing had happened.

Along comes a unit of Indian dancers, all dressed in tribal dress, dancing and beating on their tom toms, and we are next. Our drum major, Patty Flynn, struts off with whistle blowing and baton twirling, and away we go, past the children seated at the front of the hos-

pital, all eyes, and excited waiting to see what will be next.

Our Grizzly Band rolls off and plays "The Bull Fight Song 'El Torero'" what a song for this occasion, all down the parade route the spectators applaud the approach of The Grizzly's and this encouragement is all they needed, they really play their heart out. From the bull fight song to a precision drill done to the music of "Stars and Stripes" and finally Honor Band, a beautiful stirring march. Again and again they play, and you could hear the people from Zozo who were there in numbers say: "That's our band!"

The parade ends at noon. The chaperones gather people and take off for their appointed fun spots. One group to the movies, another to the Rodeo, one to the carnival and so on.

At 4:00 o'clock everyone returns to the bus and we board for a sight-seeing trip to Elephant Butte Lake, spending an hour watching the boats, and seeing all the sights. By this time I am completely baked like a hotted lobster, what a sun burn. As I lead the "Older Folks" up a long, long flight of steps from the lake to the upper ramparts level, the kids are calling out, "left, right, left, right", to encourage the elders to complete the climb, and of course ribbing me for all the drill I have been calling out to them this past week. Of course it was all in fun and everyone got a big laugh at Mr. Boyce's expense. (Truly, I did not know if I would make it or not.)

Mr. Ellison gathered his brood and we were off to supper. We pulled into a large truck stop and tried to get waited on. Luckily Jeffrey Mackey in some way became a waitress or we would still be there, and she promoted and served our group.

Next to the evening show at 7:30 p.m. We had our tickets and we all entered the High School Gym where Ralph Edwards M. Ced the evening entertainment, Peggie Knoblock was picked to pull the lucky number for the door prize. Up on the stage she went, and gave a fine example of a young lady from Zozo, for which she received a bottle of perfume.

The show was enjoyed by all, especially the performance of Gonzales-Gonzales and his musical "FANS AND BOTTLES".

At 10:00 the band saddled up for the trip home. After a short stop, we were humming along to Zozo arriving at the band room at 1:30 a.m., where parents were patiently waiting to take home their pride and joys with all their "booty", Teddy bears, Cupie dolls, Fiesta Hats, etc.

So ended another band trip that was a credit to all who took part and to Zozo itself. Music is fun.

Plans completed for courthouse dedication

Lincoln County was created by an act of the Territorial Legislature in 1869 and at that time contained over 27,000 square miles and was the largest county in the United States. Its area was greater than that of Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Vermont combined.

Soon after its organization the county seat was established at Lincoln, then known as Bonito Plaza. There the seat of government remained through the struggle for power in Territorial Lincoln County, climaxed in 1878 by five months of violence and bloodshed, known as the Lincoln County War.

In 1909 the county seat was changed to Carrizozo where a new courthouse had just been completed and where all courts have since been held. This old

courthouse is still standing but not for long.

A new Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo is nearing completion and will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies on Saturday, May 8. Demolition of the old courthouse will start shortly after the dedication date.

With a great deal of help from people all over the county and much detailed planning by County Commissioners Max Oliver (chairman), Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer, an all-day program has been set up for an estimated crowd of 5,000 people.

Conducted tours of the new courthouse facilities will start at 10:00 a.m. with Lincoln County 4-H Club members as guides under the supervision of County Agent Ralph Dunlap. During the morning former county commissioners Charles A. Jones, Kenneth Nosker, and Roman Nunez — the men who saw the new courthouse through its initial stages — will hold office in the commissioner's room in the new building. Judge W. T. Scoggin will host visitors in the new court room at the same time.

At 11:00 a.m. four Lincoln County bands from Captain, Carrizozo, Corona and Ruidoso will present concerts in the courthouse patio. Band directors are Bartley McDonough, host director Arnold Boyce, Miss Sherrill Perkins and Leroy Gooch.

The bands will play as a group for the flag raising ceremony at 12:00 noon.

The flag raising will be conducted by Ruidoso American Legion Post 79 with Lincoln County Boy Scouts as color guards.

Immediately following the flag raising, Max Oliver, chairman of the board of county commissioners, will introduce other members of the commission, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer, and Judge George Zimmerman who will act as master of ceremonies for the dedication program.

Invocation will be given by A. T. Bert Pfingsten, All Living ex-county commissioners will be recognized. Former governor Tom Bollack will make a short talk. State Senator Joe Skeen will perform the dedication ceremony.

A luscious beef barbecue will

be prepared, starting Friday night, by the Lions Clubs of Captain, Ruidoso and Carrizozo. This feast will be free for all who attend, serving will start following the dedication ceremony. The menu will consist of beef, potato salad, beans, bread and coffee.

At 2:30 p.m. the Hondo Fiesta Dancers, under the direction of Mrs. Fermin Montes, will present entertainment in front of the new courthouse. At 3:00 p.m. the Ruidoso Square Dancers will take over to entertain the crowd.

At 4:00 tours of the courthouse will start again for late arrivals who want to see the new Lincoln County facilities.

Visiting dignitaries will be greeted by Central Committee chairman of both political parties. Transportation service to and from airports in Carrizozo and Ruidoso has been arranged for the dedication affair. Lincoln County Mounted Patrol will supervise traffic and parking during the day. Carrizozo Women's Club will serve refreshments on the courthouse grounds. Carrizozo and Ruidoso Rotary Clubs will assist with serving the lunch at noon.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has been the local organization doing much of the planning and working with the county commissioners in setting up the program. Commissioners Max Oliver told C of C President Fred English that he had never seen so much enthusiasm or such fine cooperation county-wide as on this occasion.

Commissioners meet to discuss completion

The County Commissioners met with architects and contractors Tuesday to discuss the completion of the courthouse and the Annex.

The Annex is almost completed and should be ready for occupancy very shortly.

Most of the furniture for the new courthouse has arrived and is being installed.

May 8 is the day for the courthouse dedication and it looks like everything will be ready by then.

FARM NEWS

You may be quite an athlete but you can't move fast enough to get off a tractor seat if the tractor starts to flip backwards. Time and motion studies show that a rearing tractor gives you just two-fifths of a second to get out of the way.

The recommended practice to hitch below the axle tractor line is not in itself assurance against tipping backward. Rearing the engine with the drive wheels mired deep is almost certain to cause trouble.

When the drive wheels are mired as much as 10 to 12 inches, it is much safer to back out. The forward climbing motion exerts a terrific lifting action on the front of the tractor. Don't take a chance; back out.

Peach blooms will be light in Lincoln County this year. The -10° F. low weather in early March killed a large number of blossoms. The peach crop at present indicates a light crop but the frost damage to the present blooms will be the final deciding factor.
