Manufacturing plant setting up in Capitan

Work is going ahead at a fast pace on construction of buildings, moving equipment, running water and power lines to the site where a small manufacturing industry expects to be in business in a matter of 60 days at Capitan.

The industry is known as Wagner Manufacturing Co., which makes irrigation equipment, motor scooters and other products. Art Bentley is the company engineer on the job at Capitan. The company has been headquartered at Brownfield, Texas, but because of dust and the Texas climate it is relocating in Lincoln County.

Mayor Gerald Dean said that the village of Capitan was running water lines to El Capitan sub-division where the new plant will be located, village crews working as hard as they can. Jim Snow has the contract for the new building. Otero County Electric is in the process of running power lines into the sub-division.

Valton Hall and Johnny Mobley, developers of the sub-division have been very helpful in getting the industry to locate at Capitan. Several houses are being constructed, with more to follow in the sub-division.

Ellison moves into superintendent's position June 1, Clegg terminates 30th

The Carrizozo Board of Education met in special session Monday night April 12 for the purpose of employment of personnel for the coming school year. Glen Ellison is to assume the title and position of Superintendent of Schools June 1, 1965. This is to make easier the final preparation and presentation of the school budget June 9, the employment of teachers, and other matters. Mr. Clegg will clear the 64-65 school year with the state office and with the auditor during June and will terminate his services to the school June 30.

Grade school teachers re-elected are Mrs. Baker, Mrs. Sherill, Mrs. Pherigo, Mrs. Parrish, and Mrs. Laabe. Miss Wright, third grade teacher, expressed plans not to return and her resignation was accepted.

In the High School Troy Sadler, Joyce Simpson, Ed Lawson, Manuel Camin, Lole Doolay, Arnold Boyce, Katherine Lawson,

Florence Empeon & Lucia Vega were re-elected. Richard Brown, Thomas Stotts, and Vada Malcolm expressed plans not to return and their resignation was accepted.

John McCollum is to hold the position of School Principal for the coming year. Derrel Fearcy, presently at Corona was hired to assist Coach Bernie Laabe in football, coach Junior High basketball, will sponsor the Ski Club, and handle track. He is to teach in the Junior High handling science, social studies, and physical education.

Dusae Evans, presently at Roswell was hired to be Head Basketball Coach and to assist in track. He will teach English and physical education.

The board also reviewed the applications of other teachers including counseling, science, and English. It is hoped that the school can be cleared by state and north central standards by the end of this year.

Moving day in courthouse annex

Lincoln County commissioners meeting Tuesday with contractors gave approval to the remodeling job on the courthouse annex, except for a few minor details, and county officials who will occupy this section of the courthouse started moving in that day.

Dedication for the new \$550,000 Lincoln County courthouse will take place May 8 when a crowd estimated at around 5,000 people will come to the county seat in Carrizozo for the ceremony.

School bands will be here from Ruidoso, and Corona with the Carrizozo band as host. The Hondo Fleets dancers and Ruidoso square dancers will perform. There will be a free barbeque, speeches, tour of the new facilities, recognition of former county commissioners, flag raising ceremony — and the dedication ceremony, conducted by Sen. Joe Skeen.

Max Oliver, chairman of the board of commissioners, said it

has been a good question just how a courthouse should be dedicated. He was making small talk on a Ruidoso radio program and asked for advice. Letters began coming in immediately so he now has his choice of more than one way to see the job done.

Most all county organizations will take part in the ceremonies in one manner or another. Donations of food and money are coming in, looks like everything is set for "The big day in Lincoln County".

Fruitgrowers should plan now to have Worm Free apples. Starting with the Calyx spray the fruitgrower must carry out a complete spray program. Put the Calyx spray on at 85 percent petal fall and use lead arsenate spray and if you have thrip and mite problems add trithion, Diazinon, Guthion or Phosphamidon. For mites alone, use Telion, or Morocide.

Put the first cover spray on

10 days after the Calyx spray. Use Trithion, Diazinon or any of several other listed in the 1965 Apple Spray Schedule. If you want to thin your Golden Delicious or Jonathon trees use Sevin in first and second cover sprays.

Use Karathane for powdery mildew.

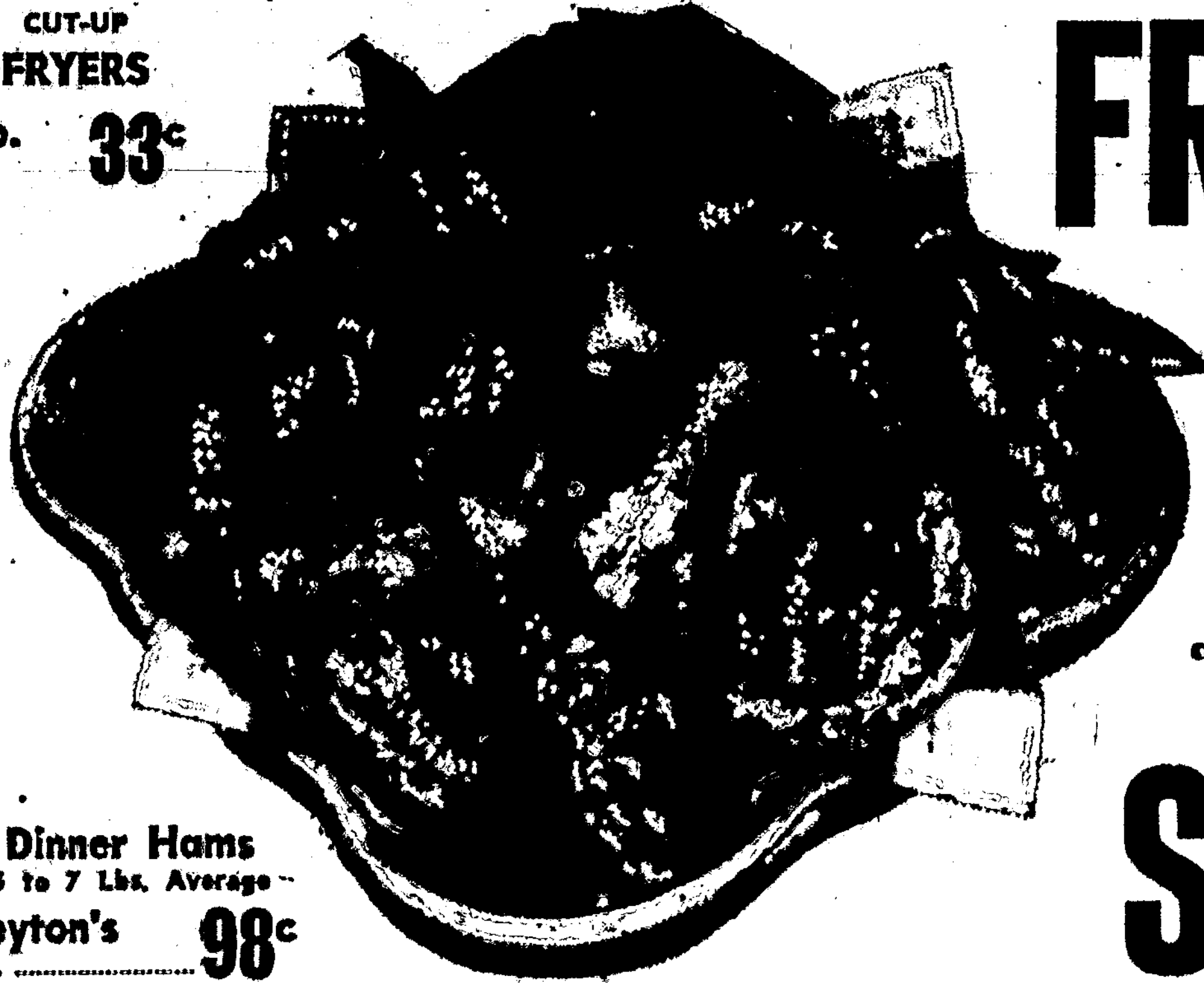

Rev. Wm. Brown to regional conference

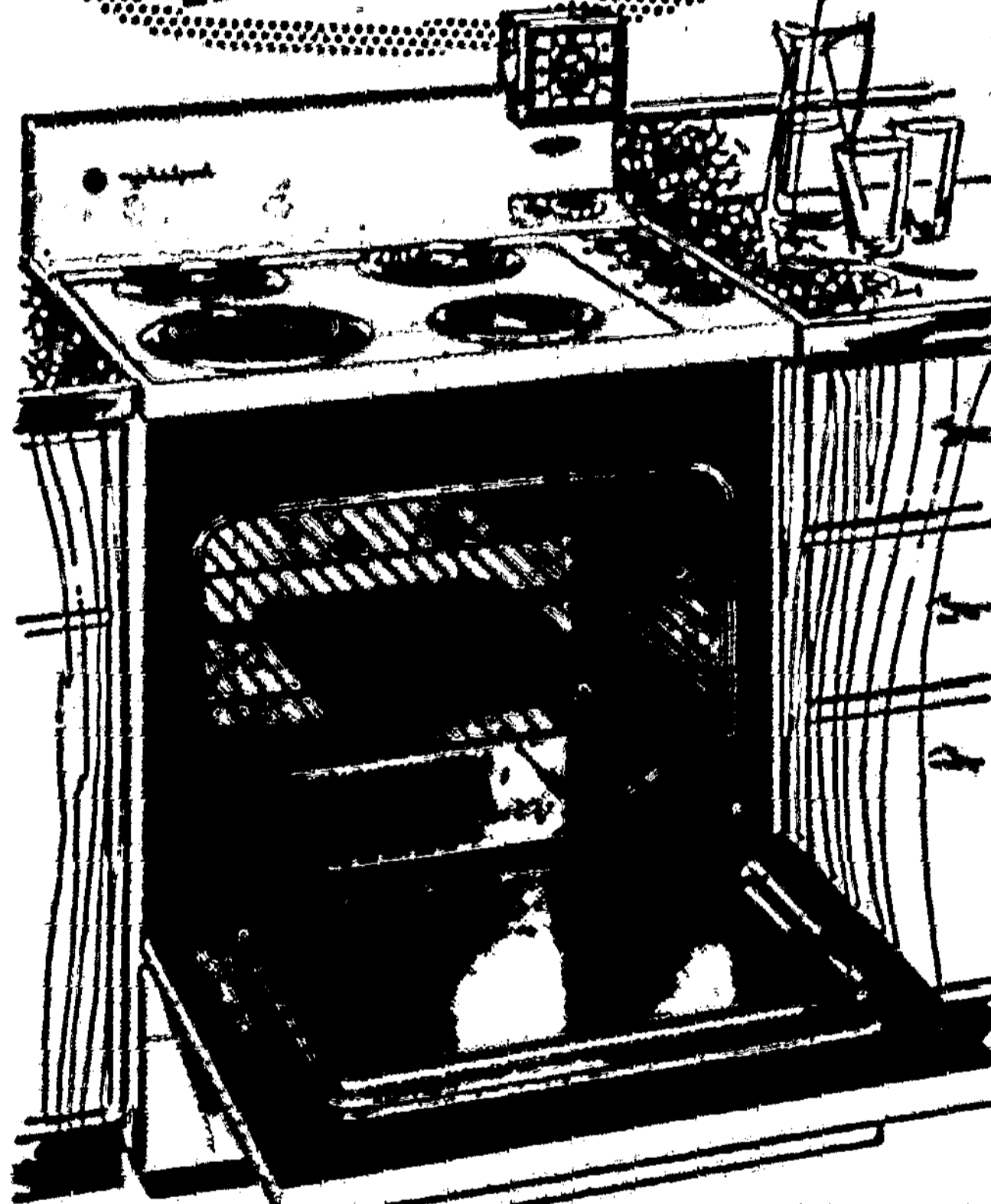

More than 400 delegates are to take part in business meetings and a series of seminars being inaugurated at this convention.

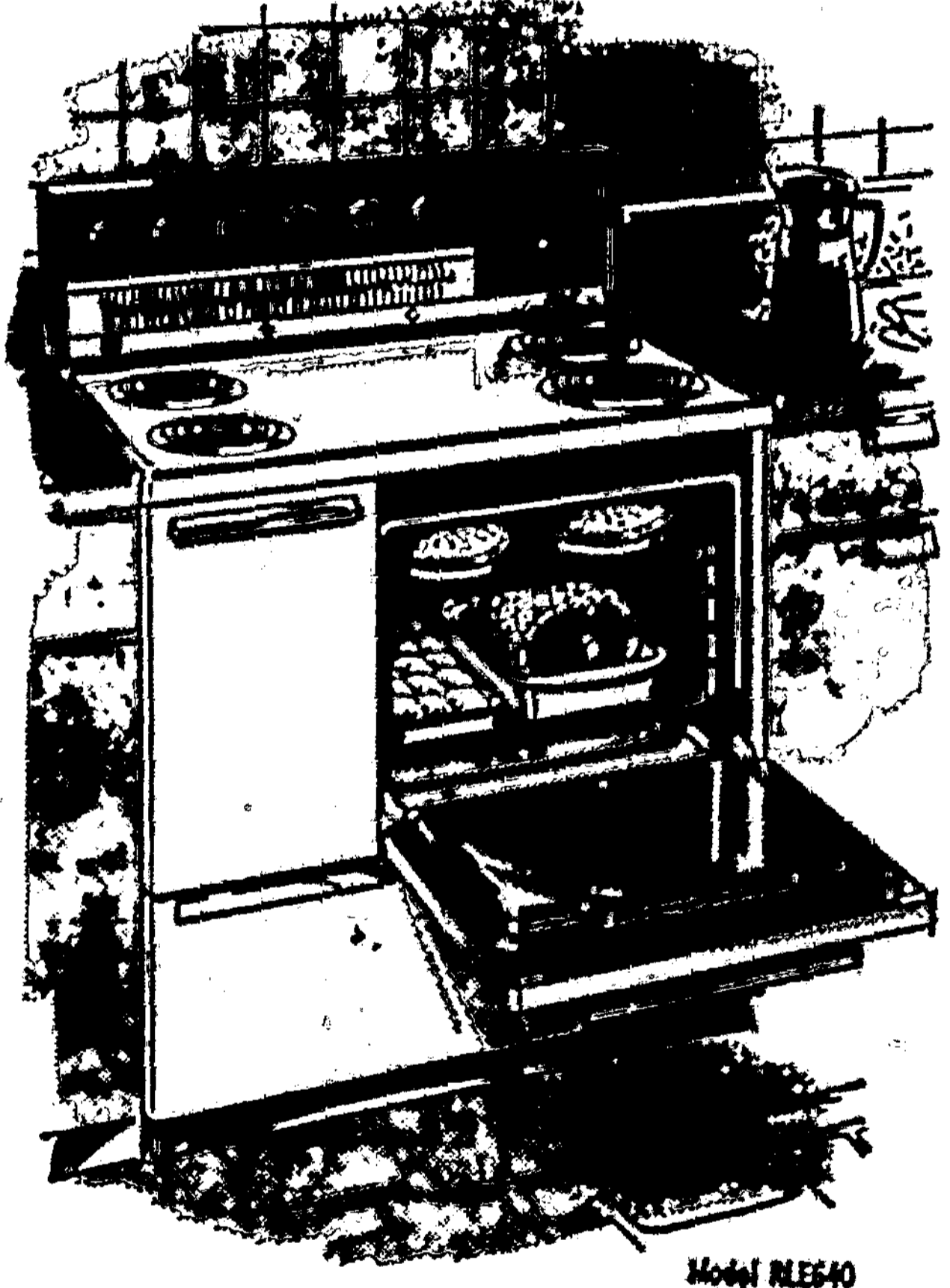

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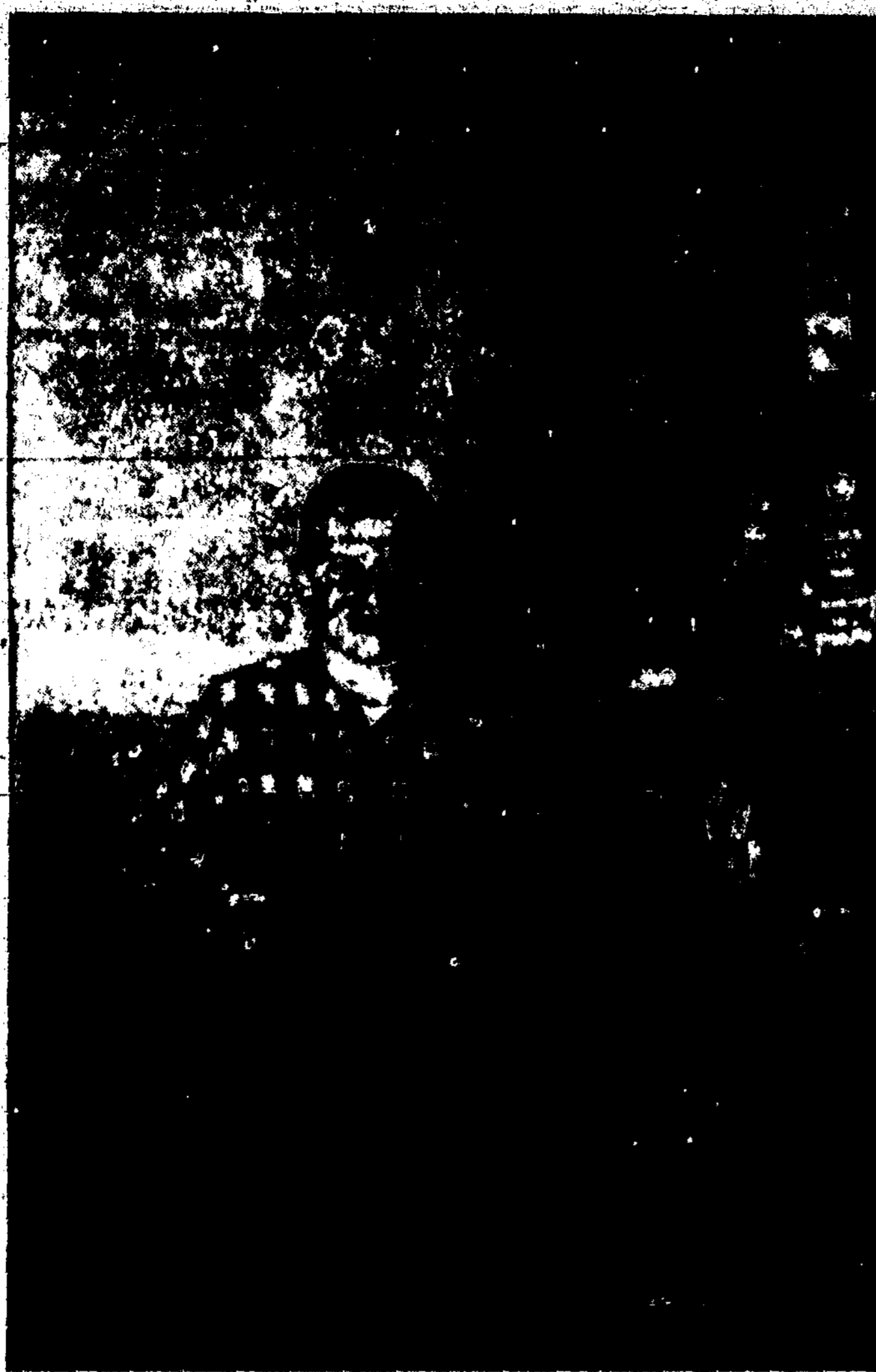

We're mighty happy our pups made it so well through a lot weekend and thanks to people for their help.

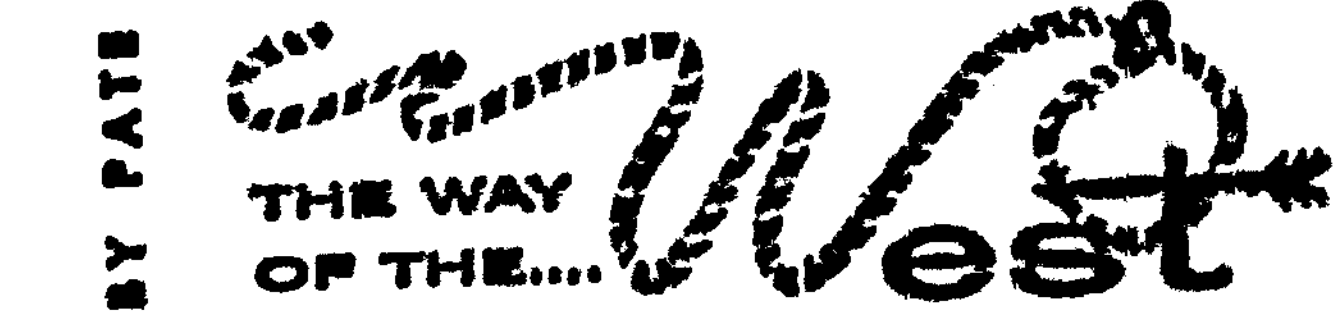
Congratulations Capitan

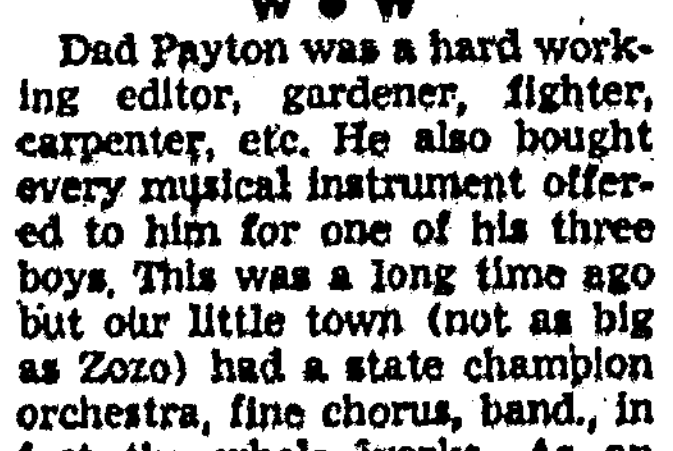

LINCOLN COUNTY Then and Now!

Behind the dedication of the new Lincoln County Courthouse lie extremities so long past and so far-reaching that it would be impossible to include in the dedication ceremonies the whole of Southeastern New Mexico — which of course was once Old Lincoln County.

It would be surprising to many who still claim Lincoln County as their own to find out how many people and places of adjoining counties still hold valid claims to the history, romance, and adventure of Old Lincoln County.

Most any New Mexican with a claim to a 3rd, 4th, or 5th generation past in Southeastern New Mexico has the right to a claim of Old Lincoln County origin. Most of them place that claim among the top treasures of the adventurous heritage, and with good cause.

Many prominent locations throughout Southeastern New Mexico, though prospering today under a county of another name, still maintain the historical evaluation of having once been a part of Old Lincoln County.

Underneath the arrogant pride of cities like Roswell, Alamogordo, Tularosa, Artesia, Carlsbad, and even Lovington, Hobbs, and Monument, the romance of having once been a part of Old Lincoln County is never forgotten in promotional aspects.

A battle that has been simmering for six years at the state and local levels is expected to be joined in Congress again when President Johnson presents his billboard control bill — we'll cheer for LBJ at every post. We're not again billboards, except in places where the beauty of the countryside is a lot more important. Make it a point to drive out of Carrizozo a mile or so, then turn around and drive back to town slowly. Make a mental note of whether or not you like what you see.

We have the strong opinion that when ZoZo Woman's Club sends its members off on club business — the club ought to provide corks for those poor people left at home.

Rio Arriba County Demo organization may fall in hands of bone-deep enemy

SANTA FE — Sheriff Emilio Naranjo of Rio Arriba is paying a painful price for his promotion to U. S. Marshall for New Mexico.

Naranjo will give up not only his sheriff's star but also the toga of Democratic county chairman with strong prospects of the county Demo organization falling into the hands of his bone deep enemy, State Sen. Matias Chacon.

None was happier than Mat about the good fortune that fell to his foe, Emilio, who must move to Albuquerque and forsake politics while he's working for Uncle Sam.

ARRIBA SPLIT WIDE AND DEEP

The Democratic rivalry in Rio Arriba is bitter and widespread even beyond that in San Miguel where two are claiming the county chairmanship and the party is split into two camps headed by Chairman Apples Duran and District Attorney Tiny Martinez, or in Valencia where Democrats identify themselves with either Chairman Filo Sedillo or State Sen. Tibo Chavez.

Naranjo held an upper hand on Chacon during most of their long rivalry and was prepared to sink him for good last year but Chacon slithered out of the trap.

Chacon took on Naranjo's chief lieutenant, State Sen. Albert Amador, in the party primary last year and held him by 30 votes, but that was only in the primary.

REPUBLICAN COOPERATES

It looked like Chacon would be defeated in the general election with both the Republicans and the Naranjo Democrats voting against him but that threat faded when Ray Martinez, the Republican candidate, resigned from the ticket and the place was never filled by the party committee. It permitted Chacon to run without opposition in the general election.

Republicans hoped that the Chacon Democrats would respond with support of the re-

maining Republican candidate but it never came off.

The Rio Arriba Democrats, like those in the divided San Miguel and Valencia, were all together at the showdown in November.

And a post script on Rio Arriba: Sen. Albert Amador was only half a loser. After the election Naranjo induced State Rep.-Elect Joe Branch to resign for the well-salaried county manager's job and Amador was appointed to his place.

NEW OFFICIAL FROM (UGH) T or C

(Ugh) Truth or Consequences has its first state official, Floyd Cross, the recently appointed corporation commissioner.

Cross has lived in Albuquerque for a long time but has continued his legal vying residence in Sierra county which he represented in the legislature in 1940-50.

He's the first to make it to a state office from the Sierra county seat since the name was changed a dozen years ago. It used to be Hot Springs and is still designated as such by a few hard heads who have been mad ever since the change.

Cross will get less as corporation commissioner, \$833 a month now and \$1,000 after July 1 than he was making on his \$1,042 park service director job.

Jim Dillard of Santa Fe and formerly of Las Cruces, is the assistant park director and a leading prospect for the top place.

PETE SHUBERT BACK IN PARTY

Former State Sen. Pete Shubert who was talking like he was going to quit the Democratic party after the pre-primary convention wouldn't let him run for land commissioner last year, has become the Demo chairman of Harding county. He and several others tried to

get on the primary ticket but were squeezed out by Sheep Hays who got the nomination without a primary election contest.

EASLEY'S FRIENDS WON'T SURRENDER

Backers of Lt. Gov. Mack Easley for governor won't give up. They failed in an effort for a constitutional amendment that would have permitted the two-time loot gov to run for governor next year and now think they might do it by court action. It would call for Easley to resign as lieutenant governor before the end of his second term and thus avoid the ban on two-termers running again — they hope.

HARRASSED CHIEF TAKES LONG TRIP

State Liquor Chief Howard Babcock flew off to Honolulu this week on a trip that he swears was not undertaken to escape Albuquerque reporters and the daily pictures of the shanty bars he licensed in Bernillo county last year. He said the trip had something to do with a meeting of state liquor directors.

BELENERS SWAP STATE JOBS

Liquor Inspector Bolesio Romero has swapped jobs with Gas Tax Inspector Clarence Amillo. Both are Belen Democrats.

The liquor division also took on Ed Floerhelm, Jr., of Belen and Marcus Sanchez of Albuquerque as sales tax auditors to work on liquor merchants only.

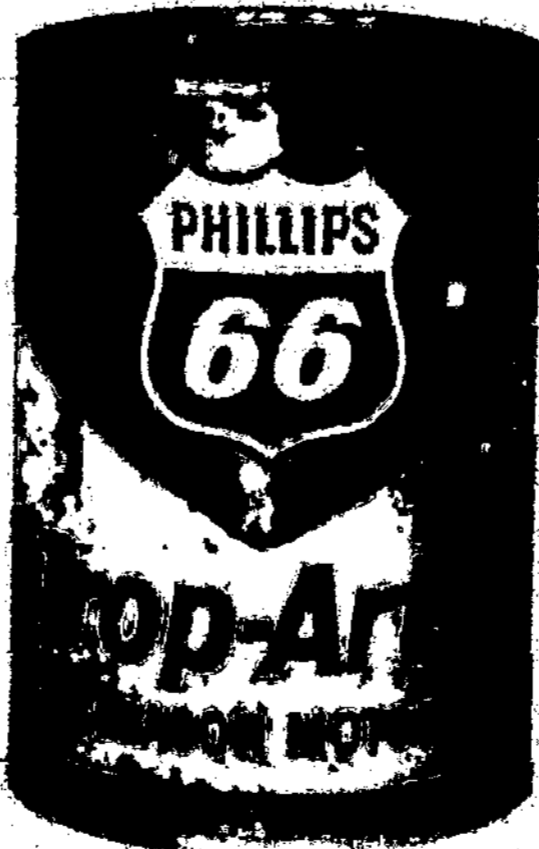

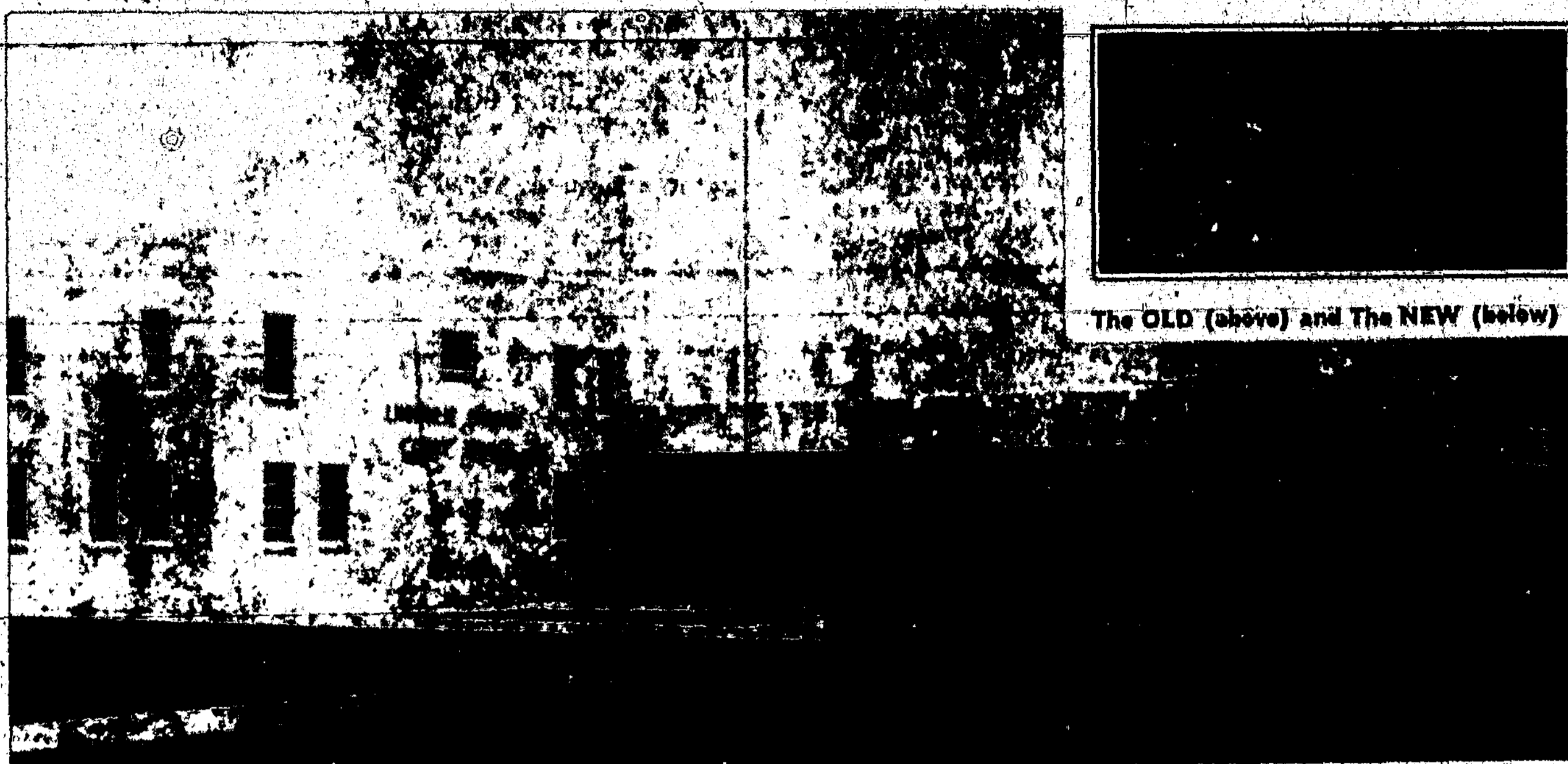

Corona school board members are: Frank Sultemeier, John D. Holleman, Willis Brunson, Ernest Vandell and Roger Gordon.

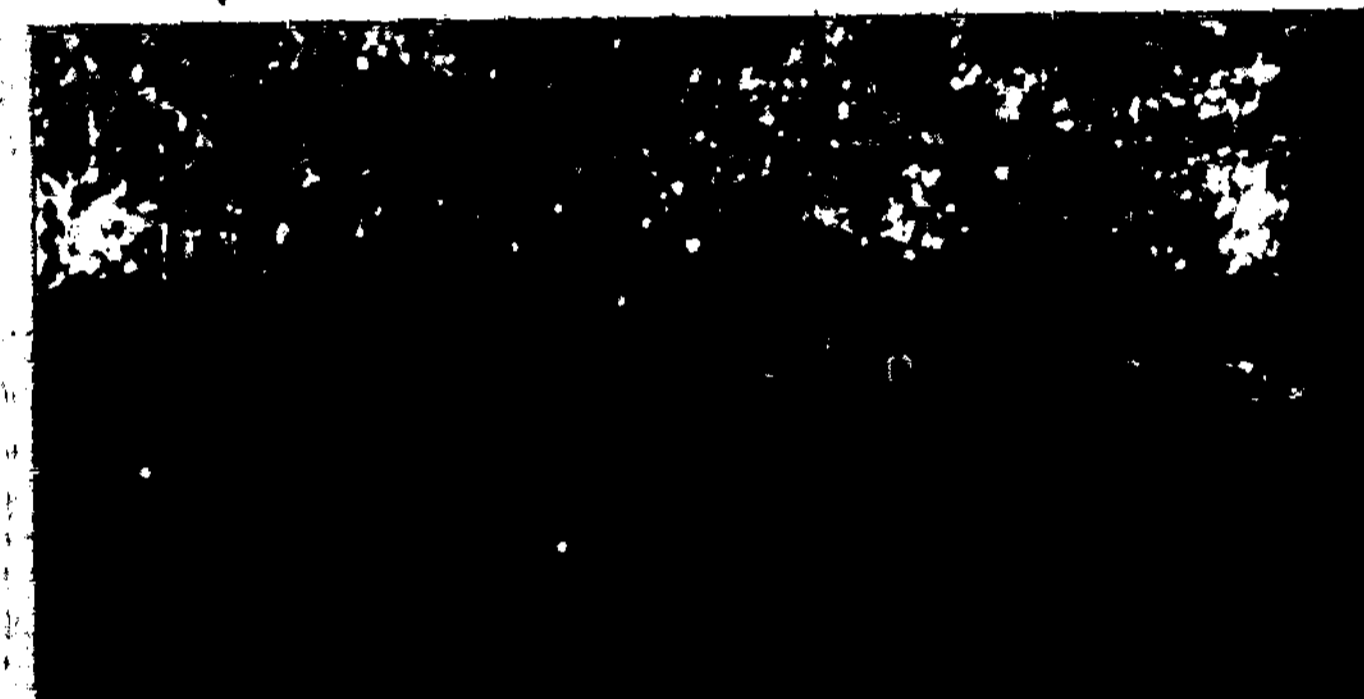

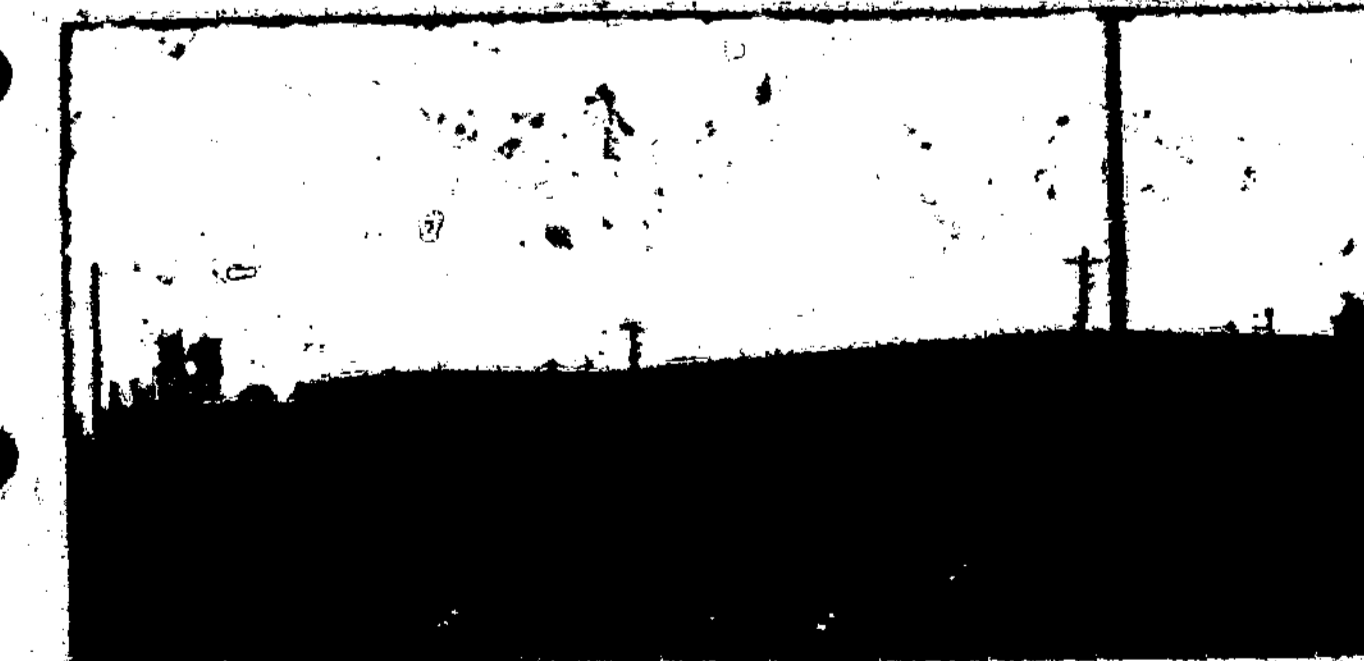

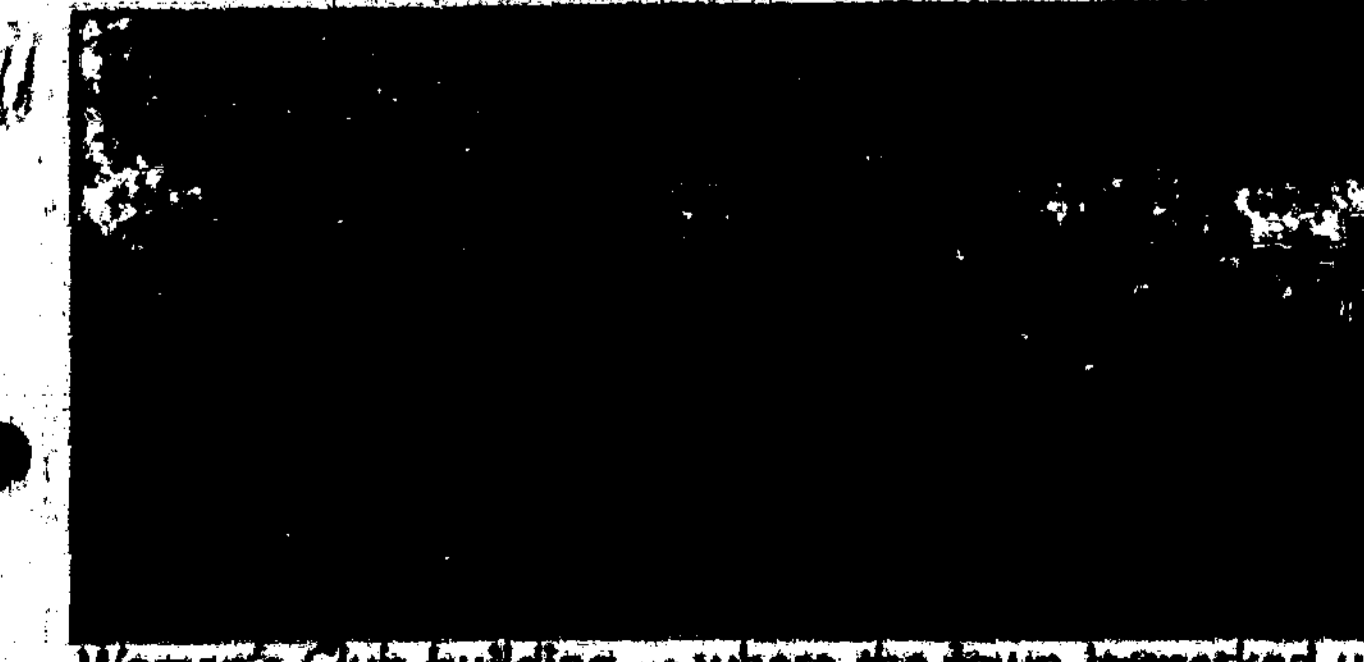

Carrizozo, the county seat of historic Lincoln County, is ready for what could well be the largest crowd ever to assemble here — the reason being dedication of a new courthouse which should take place right at 12:00 noon on May 8, 1965.

Prior to the actual dedication there will be a lot of entertainment, introductions, speeches, and formalities of the occasion. Following the dedication will be a free barbeque with more than 2,000 pounds of meat prepared to feed an estimated crowd of 5,000 people. During the day there will be conducted tours of the new courthouse facilities.

Two new features have been added to previous programs. Queen of the Court representatives will be here from the several high schools of Lincoln County. One of them will be crowned with once-in-a-lifetime honors about 11:30 a.m. Saturday. The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has arranged for a free street dance, next to the new courthouse, which will start about 8:00 p.m. and last 'til when! Music will be furnished by the Rebel Rousers of Hondo, composed of Preston and Harold Radcliffe, guitar, and Donald McKnight, drums. These boys play a fine brand of music and the evening should be fun.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is furnishing street decorations the like of which have not been seen before in the county seat town. They have also given \$100.00 to the barbeque fund.

The Lincoln County News is sending out nearly 4,000 copies of this issue of the News, the largest circulation ever attained by this newspaper. The edition includes 16 pages of news about Lincoln County, the county seat town, and advertisements from practically all business places in Carrizozo who will be hosts during the day in one way or another.

The old courthouse, construction started in 1905, is a ghost house now where memories of exciting days in early Lincoln County can float around for a few more weeks, before demolition crews move in to tear it down.

Offices in what is known as the courthouse annex, now an integral part of the new courthouse complex, are occupied. New furniture has been arriving almost daily and county officials report they are well pleased with their new quarters — which visitors can see May 8.

The News editor was informed by a visiting probation officer that the new jail was as fine, and as secure, as he had seen anywhere in his travels over the nation. Other features of the new courthouse are equally outstanding. The offices are large and roomy with spare space for future growth. The patio area will be landscaped, parking area paved, and other refinements made after the old building is torn down.

All former county commis-

sioners will be recognized with special thanks to Charles A. Jones, Roman Nunez and Kenneth Nozker who were on the board when the new courthouse was started. On January 1, 1965 another crew of county commissioners — Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer — took over and saw the new courthouse to completion as it stands today.

Lincoln County 4-H members will be conducting people through the courthouse all during the day. Bands from Carrizozo, Corona, and Ruidoso will meet at the Zozo school band room and then march to the courthouse grounds where they will stand in formation and provide music for the crowd during the program. At 12:00 noon the three bands will play the Star Spangled Banner as a unit, directed by the host band master, Arnold Boyce.

Judge George Zimmerman of Alamogordo will act as master of ceremonies. The address of the day will be given by former governor Tom Bollack. The dedication ceremony will be performed by Sen. Joe Skeen of Pecos.

At approximately 1:00 p.m. the free barbeque, prepared by Lions Clubs of Lincoln County, and served by Rotarians of the county, will get underway. The Hondo Fiesta Dancers will perform in the afternoon, followed by the Ruidoso Square Dancers.

Flowers for the occasion are being arranged by Beta Sigma Phi sorority of Carrizozo. The Carrizozo Womens Club will be serving refreshments on the grounds, Lincoln County Mounted Patrol will supervise traffic.

All in all, and in every way this should be "The Big Day in Lincoln County".

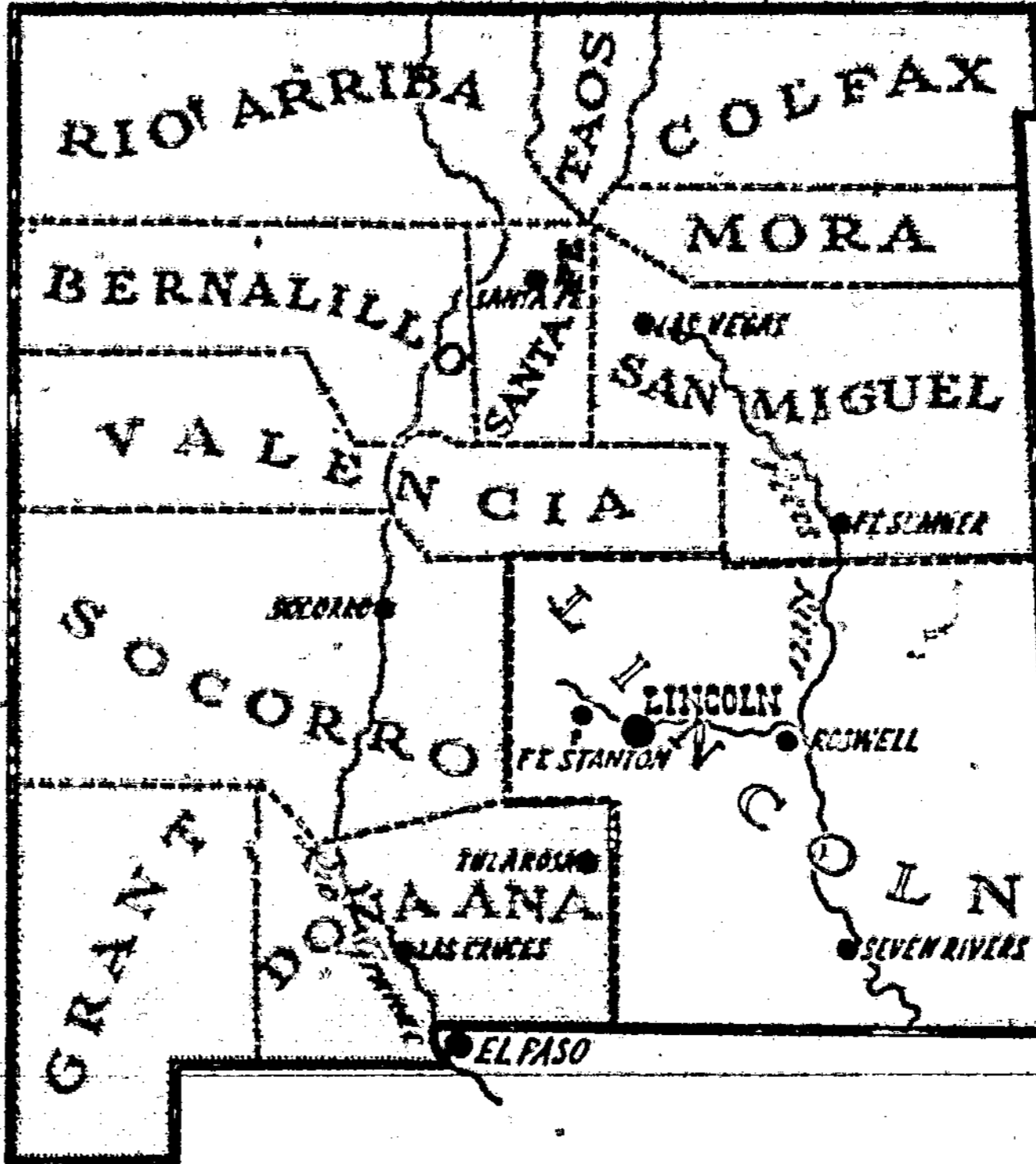

Developing nations adopt U.S. rural electrification plan

When President Johnson described Rural Electrification and the electrification of the countryside as "impressive" in his foreign policy address recently, he referred to a technique of economic development which was pioneered in this country and is being adopted today in a growing number of countries around the world.

The Rural Electrification Administration, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has helped finance more than 1,000 local rural electric systems across the Nation in the past 30 years. These systems are presently serving more than 20 million rural Americans.

It has been men with ideals and foresight like those of Mr. Runyan that have made your cooperative grow to be able to provide you with the best electric service possible.

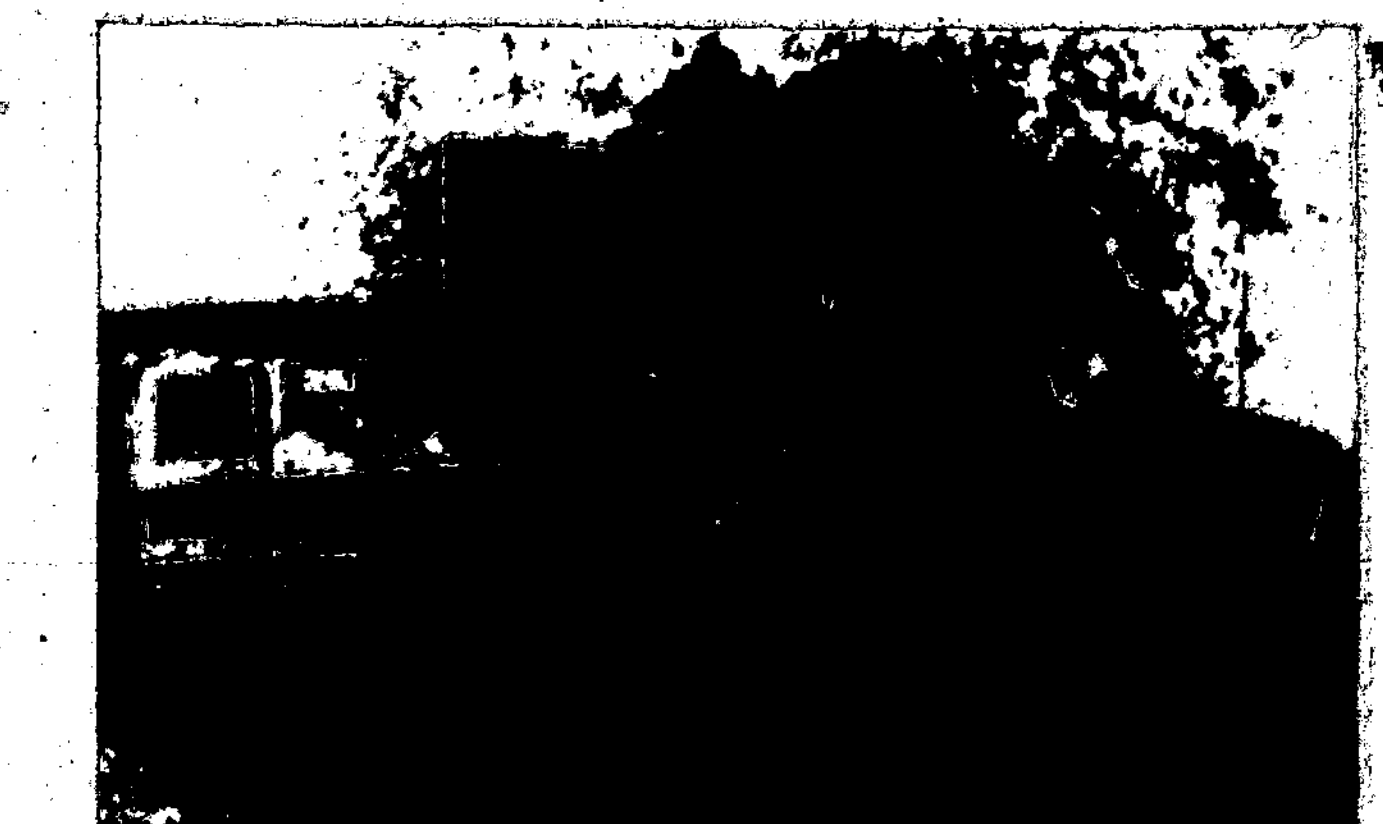
Wayne Withers, Youngest Member
The experience of Wayne C. Withers of Carrizozo with Otero County Electric Cooperative goes back to the time he was serving as mayor of the Town of Carrizozo. The town was using more and more power and the local plant could not supply the full need, so an arrangement was worked out with the Co-op to buy power and use the town power plant on a standby basis. This was in 1956. Mr. Withers served two terms as mayor, 1954-58.

In 1961-62 the town electric power system was sold to the Cooperative which had the town system completely reworked, and new meters and meter loops installed bringing the system up to top shape.

Mr. Withers was appointed to the Cooperative Board of Directors in June of 1964, making him the youngest member of the board in terms of service. He was born in Texas, his parents later moving to Jal, N. M., and to Carrizozo in 1931. Carrizozo was getting its electric power from the plant at White Oaks at that time.

Mr. Withers has frequently said that during the time he was mayor and the power plant was having its troubles, he could count on the Cooperative for help, finding parts, and keeping the plant going. Joe Wigley (deceased) was especially helpful to the town. Mr. Wigley operated the power plant at Capitan prior to the Cooperative purchasing this facility, and Wigley joined the Co-op as line superintendent.

According to Withers the Town of Carrizozo had more connects back in Red Canyon days, but is using more power now and electric power usage continues to increase. When the town had its own power plant it required a one-man crew, now the Cooperative has three employees living here.

Those who are bringing potato salad for the barbecue at the Courthouse Dedication Saturday will find refrigerators to keep the potato salad cool in the County Agent's office in the courthouse annex, if others are needed they will be available elsewhere. Local merchants are furnishing the refrigerators for this event.

The apple crop prospects are excellent in the Lincoln County area. The weather at pollination was good with little wind and temperatures in the 70's. The Golden Delicious that had a heavy crop last year had a light bloom this year. In the Pfingsten orchard near Hondo, the early Red Delicious blooms were dropping off. This indicates that they did not get pollinated.

Lucio Zamora is using pollen inserts on his bees and hand pollinating some trees so that he will be more assured of a crop. Bill Shrecengost is putting bouquets of Golden Delicious in his Red Delicious trees to help the pollination.

Predatory animal control will be discussed at the Lincoln County Woolgrowers meeting on May 15, in the county commissioners room in the court house at Carrizozo, starting to 10:00 a.m.

At the last legislature an act to set up predatory animal control was passed. This act provides for the owners of livestock to set up their own predatory animal control program on a county basis. Only that portion of the act referring to sheep and goats is being considered at this meeting. Copies of the act will be available at the meeting.

Lincoln County 4-H wool judging teams will compete in the State contest at Roswell May 8.

The contest will begin at 8:30 a.m. at the Roswell Wool and Mohair warehouse. The presentation of awards will be at 1:30 p.m.

Contestants will be graded on the placings and reasons. They will judge wool classes for staple length, uniformity of fineness and length, strength, and color.

Nations Adopt

(Continued from page seven) and a highly controversial one when first proposed 30 years ago," according to the Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

"But the idea proved a sound one, and today other nations - mostly developing ones - are following the Rural Electrification pattern in their own efforts to bring electricity to their rural citizens."

The Secretary said that in recent years government officials, engineers and technicians from 31 countries have visited rural electric co-ops and the Rural Electrification Administration headquarters in Washington, D. C., to learn firsthand how the Rural Electrification program works. Rural Electrification technicians also have been sent by the U. S. Government to provide technical help in Brazil, Ethiopia, and Tunisia, and others will go to Uruguay and Peru next month.

In addition to these government activities, managers and other employees of Rural Electrification financed electric systems - as well as representatives of Rural Electrification borrower associations - are serving in many other countries, including most of Latin America. And this week a team of experts in the rural electrification field, including several managers of Rural Electrification borrower systems, is leaving the United States to begin a crash program to bring electricity to more areas of South

Vietnam.

As a result of these efforts, the techniques of the United States Rural Electrification are being widely applied throughout the world today. And in direct application of the American pattern, new rural electric cooperatives already have been established in Ecuador and Nicaragua under the program of the U. S. Agency for International Development (AID) with the help of technical assistance by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. Plans for or-

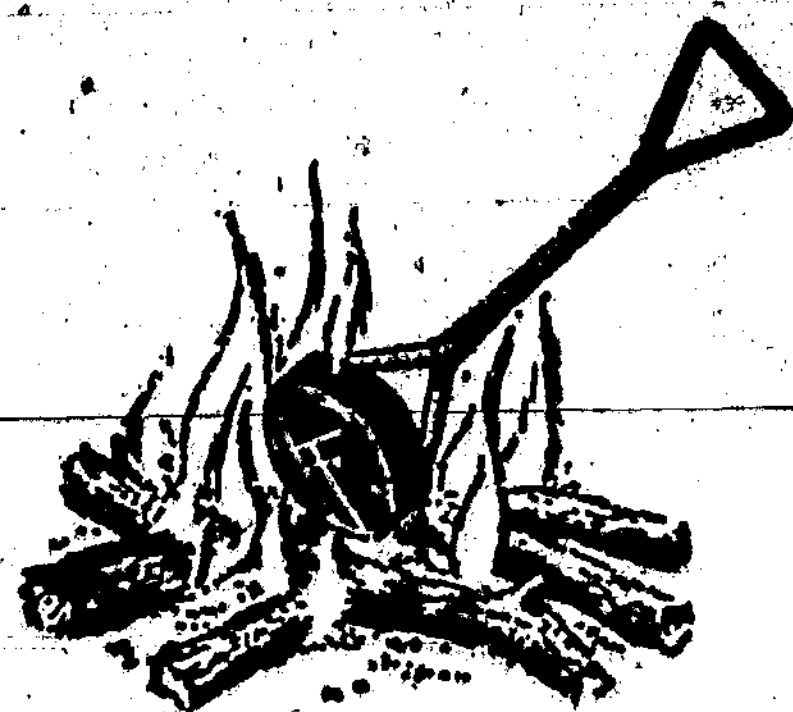

ganizing cooperatives already are being formulated in more than a dozen other countries.

In the United States the Rural Electrification pattern, while promoting increased farm efficiency and the quality of farm products, has produced better living conditions and encouraged health and sanitation in rural areas. It has stimulated education and self-respect for people who live in rural areas. "In a very real sense," Secretary Freeman said, "the Rural Electrification pattern is an avenue to a better life that free men everywhere can employ."

The Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. is expecting a representative from the Government Power Ministry of Ecuador, South America, in the near future. This representative will be shown the entire Cooperative service area and how we operate our Cooperative.

OLD LINCOLN COUNTY — By Monk Loffen

Dedication is most important event

The dedication of any courthouse is about the most important thing that can happen to the county as a whole.

The dedication of the new county courthouse at Carrizozo, New Mexico on May 8, will not be just the dedication of any county courthouse.

The new courthouse will be the County Seat of Lincoln County!

In such a historic county as that having a war fought within its boundaries — named for the county of its hostilities, and involving people whose descendants make up a large portion of Southwestern New Mexico — the dedication ceremonies must necessarily take in both Old Lincoln County, and the county as it is today.

There will no doubt be people from throughout the entire state of New Mexico who will take a personal interest in the dedication, many of whom will wish to attend the dedication ceremonies.

Many of them will never have lived in Lincoln County and perhaps some of them will be making their first pilgrimage to the land of their adventurous forefathers.

The history of Old Lincoln County, by far, exceeds the present and the future aspects of both notoriety and renown, even though Lincoln County remains among the most noted and important counties of the state of New Mexico.

Lincoln is still a big county — biggest resources still cattle ranching, even though the sheep industry is now running cattle ranching a close second.

Much of the county is still sparsely populated, with its chief cities and towns, Carrizozo, Ruidoso, Capitan, and Old Lincolntown.

The county is bordered on the southwest by Mal Pais, historically notorious as "The Bad Lands" of the New Mexico Territory. The northern and eastern part of the county is still grazing country. The southern portion is noted for killing horse racing, and tourists.

Besides many of the attractions of the Lincoln National Forest, among other things, Lincoln County boasts a crater, many ghost towns, one of the highest mountains in New Mexico, and of course all the historic attractions of Old Lincolntown.

With such a devolution of resources, it is not surprising that the tourist and horse-racing business have more or less come to dominate the importance of cattle, over which the Lincoln County Cattle War was waged in the late 1870's.

Nonetheless, ranching is and always has been the preeminent occupation of the people of Lincoln County, even though mining has also played a big part in the county's history.

Both ghost towns of White Oaks and Jicarilla have exciting historic pasts — both are still located in Lincoln County.

Like both these Lincoln County ghost towns, even though Old Seven Rivers is usually associated with Eddy County, its only existence today is in its past.

The past in Old Seven Rivers is just about as much Lincoln County as are White Oaks and Old Placer Mines. The little Pecos Valley town, in its losing battle for the county seat of the newly formed county of Eddy just died a natural death — its romance, adventure, and legends, remaining almost entirely with Old Lincoln County.

So the part of Old Seven Rivers, as we speak of it today, was primarily Lincoln County, even though the Old Seven Rivers cemetery is still visible on the banks of the Pecos, about mid-way between Artesia and Carlsbad.

Today there is nothing left of the Old Seven Rivers — nothing but graves, most of which are filled with Old Lincoln County citizens, who lived and died before Eddy County was born.

Surely, there should be a place in the dedication ceremonies of the new Lincoln County courthouse for old towns like Seven Rivers, many of which thrived on the violence and excitement of Old Lincoln County, but died with the disappointment and boredom of new counties being formed out of the once free, adventurous, and dangerous old historic county of Lincoln.

"Cheer leader advisor" at Dulce receives \$150 a year for advice

SANTA FE — Many public school teachers get extra pay above their contracts for extra duties.

Among the extra pay cases encountered in this spring's round of budget making by State School Finance Chief Harry Wugalter was \$150 for a teacher at Dulce who served as "cheer leader advisor."

SUPER DRAWING MORE THAN BUDGET

Superintendent Rudy Gutierrez of the Jemez Mountain school district in Rio Arriba county who shows in the current school budget to be making \$8,500, made a real hard pitch to get his salary up to \$12,500 and was disappointed when the budget makers would approve only \$10,500.

The superintendent's concern was understood when an examination of records showed that his board had increased his pay in November to \$12,000 a year retroactive to Sept. 1 when he started work. There isn't money in the budget to pay him through June unless extraordinary transfers are approved.

The Jemez Mountain district is a forest of gas wells with plenty of school money but it is supposed to be spent only as budgeted.

COMMITTEE HIRES FORMER CHAIRMAN

The legislature's Judicial system Study Committee has hired its ex-chairman, former Sen. Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe, as a consultant with a \$1500 fee for his first chore in reporting on district court financing.

Sen. Don Hathaway of Socorro is the new chairman.

NARANJOS PREVAIL IN CHAIRMANSHIP

Rio Arriba Sheriff and Demo Chairman Emilio Naranjo who will soon be moving in as U. S. marshal at Albuquerque checked out of politics by getting his son, Benny, elected county chairman in a meeting that anti-Naranjo Democrats denounced as a secret one that was held without their knowledge.

Benny was on the state welfare department payroll when elected and has sent in his resignation.

State Sen. Mat Chacon leader of the anti-Naranjo Democrats, sponsored a law in the recent legislature to prohibit secret political meetings by requiring advance publication of notices of party meetings, but the law won't go into effect until June 18.

SUNSET JOE WITH WALKER

Sunset Joe Martinez of Albuquerque, a colorful figure in northside Democratic politics has been employed by U. S. Rep. Johnny Walker to look after his interests in the Santa Fe and Albuquerque areas.

Martinez formerly operated the Sunset Inn in Albuquerque and worked for several years at El Nido bar in Santa Fe.

GOVERNOR CAMPBELL HABLAR ESPANOL

Gov. Jack Campbell surprised his travel companions in the Amigo group that is touring in Mexico by making brief speeches in Spanish.

Mostly, the governor reads his Spanish speeches and is tutored in pronunciation by his wife, Ruthanne, who has studied the language, and by his pal, Sabu Gallegos, who is with him on the Amigo tour as an interpreter.

Gallegos, a former legislator and now in the insurance business, holds the state employees group policy.

LESS PENSION PAY FOR 1960 LOSERS

Former legislators Willie Grijalva of Gallup and Horacio De Vargas of Rio Arriba who were defeated in the 1960 election lost a considerable piece of pension by not being permitted to serve one more term.

Grijalva had 16 years in the house when he lost out in 1960 and can get only \$640 a year under the formula for members who served before 1961. Had he gotten another two-year term he would have qualified for the post-1961 rate of \$2,250 a year.

SHEEP, HAYS DROPS SEVEN FIELD MEN

Land Commissioner Sheep Hays is letting seven of his field men out May 15.

They constitute nearly half of the field staff which has been the core of the land office political force.

DeVargas had 12 years before 1961 which gets him \$480 a year when he is 60, and would have been good for \$1,750 with just another two years.

None of those let out were in the area that would probably be Walker's district if Congress passes the districting act.

Terminated were Harley Cooley, Hobbs, \$345; J. E. Wiloughby, Curry, \$460; J. N. Scott, Estancia, \$420; R. C. Eaton, Socorro, \$345; Roy Grob, Raton, \$360; Cliff Stevenson, Elida, \$450; Lake Frazier, Jr., Roswell, \$360.

Hays said he was letting the men go because the moratorium on big land sales had left them with nothing to do. Their leaving, however, makes vacancies in the staff that could be filled later with people who might be politically helpful to the land commissioner or his buddy, U. S. Rep. Johnny Walker, who might be required to run in a small northside congressional district next year.

On Friday evening, April 23, the Capitan Band held its annual Spring Concert before a nice, enthusiastic crowd in the high school auditorium.

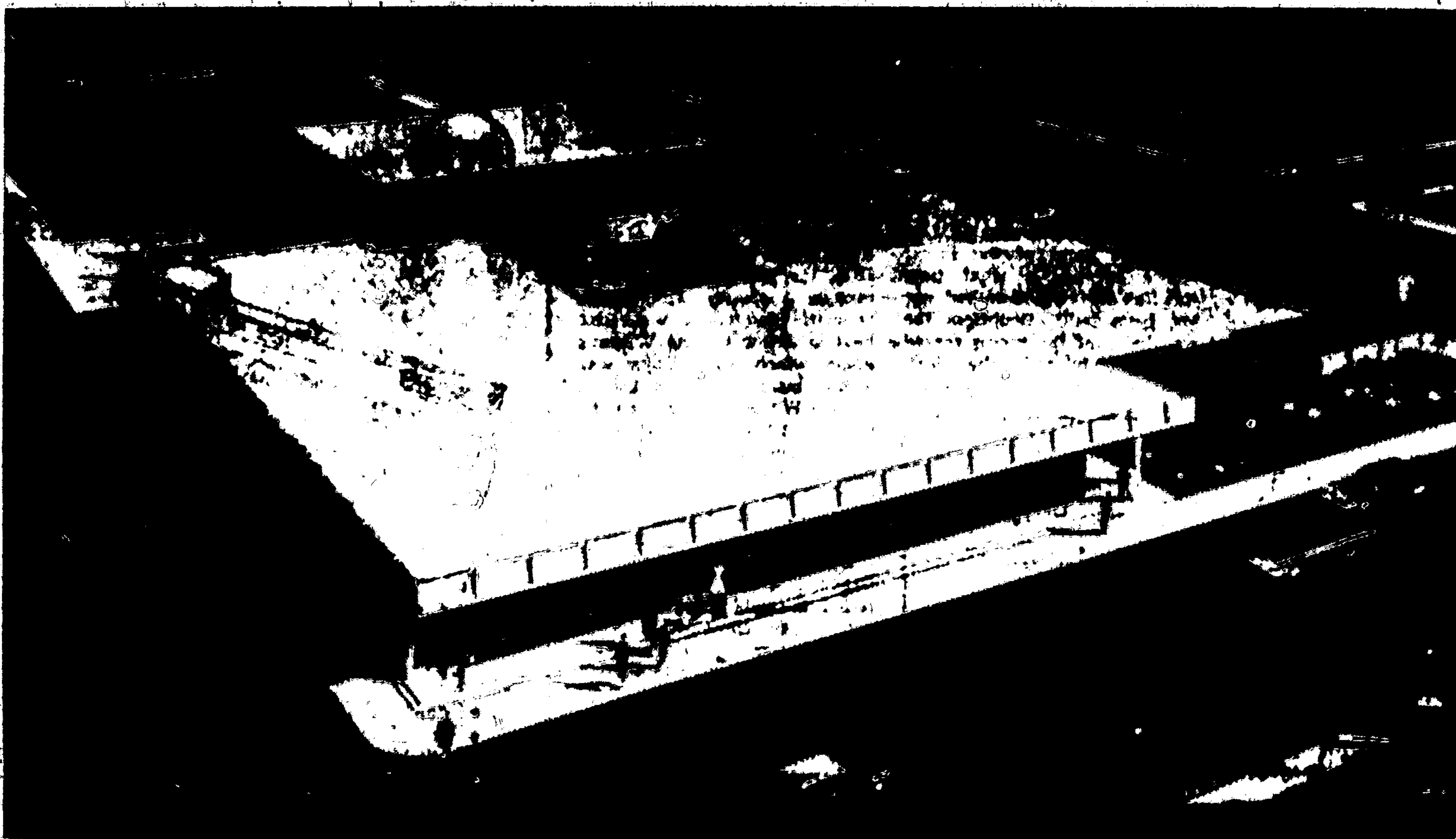

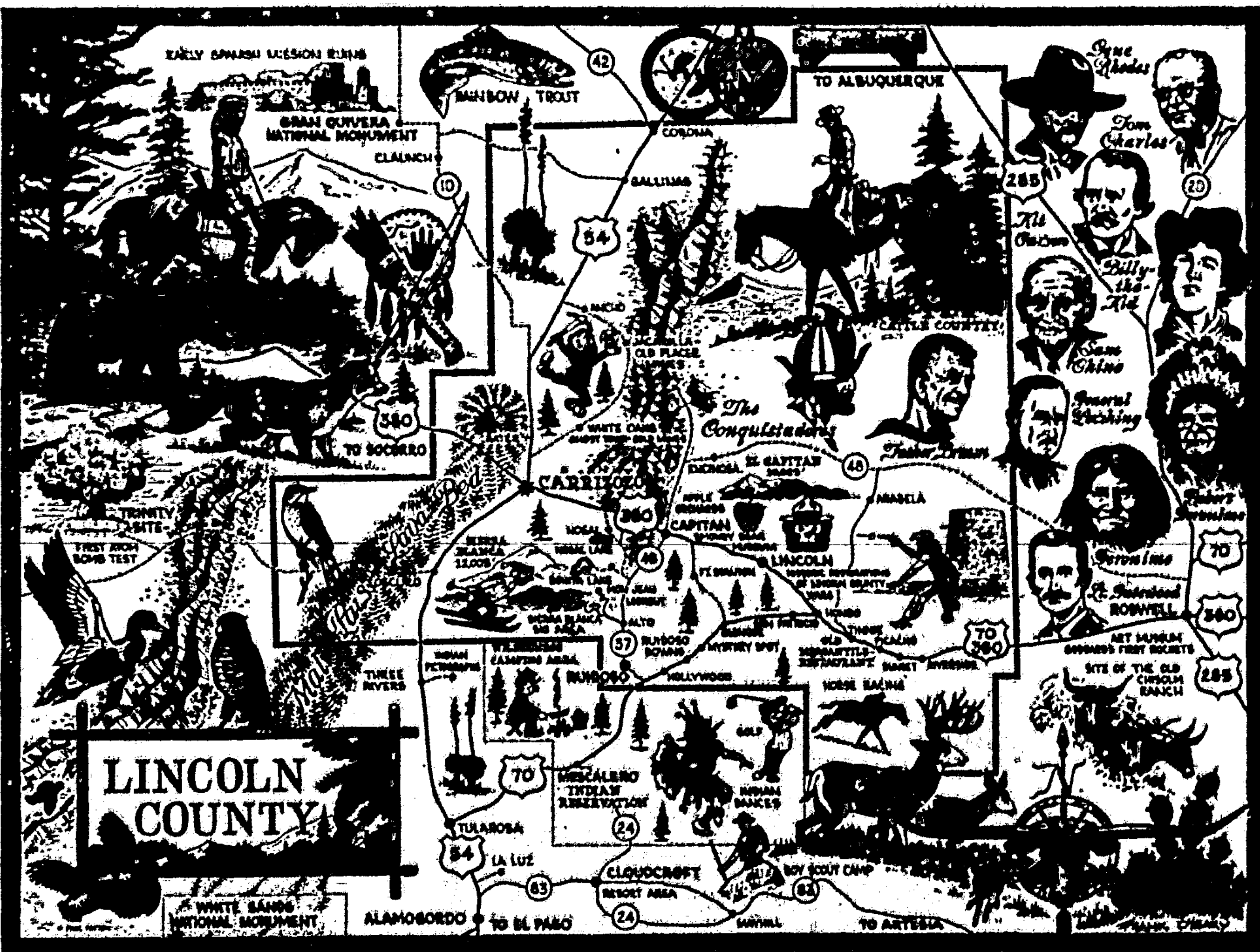

Priest house could have been first

Due to the fact that Lincoln County will proudly dedicate her new courthouse on the 8th of May, it is perhaps natural that our thoughts turn backward to the courthouses which came before and which helped to build our county. While everyone is familiar with the older one in Carrizozo, and with the historical landmark in Lincoln, it occurred to the editor to wonder where court was first held in Lincoln. The Priest House, or convento, was probably the first official court-

house. Mrs. Bill Wilson initiated the search for information about the first courthouse when she recalled that her mother, Mrs. Carrie Dow, had once mentioned hearing that there had been three additional rooms built in back of the Priest House and extending toward the hill in which court had been held. Church was held in the west room of the Priest House because, at that time the San Jose Mission had not yet been built. Doubtless the remainder of the rooms served as living quarters for the priest. Mrs. Dow said it was general

knowledge that before that the current Justice of the Peace of any time held court in his home as the logical place to hold it. She had heard that squire Wilson held court in his home which was a 'picket' house or jacal.

Another of the old timers of the area who has just celebrated her 90th birthday is Mrs. Sista Lujan who was born in 1863, the year Lincoln County became a county. Mrs. Lujan believes that court was first held in Senor Greene Wilson's home which she thinks was located behind the Priest House. Greene Wilson later deeded the land on which the convento and church now stand to the Catholic Church. Mrs. Lujan also recalled that Francisco Gomez served as a judge after Greene Wilson and in the same house.

A visit with Mrs. Ladislado Garcia and Mrs. Rufina Maez failed to yield anything more since they came to Lincoln long afterwards and don't remember anything pertaining to this.

The logical assumption seems to be that before court was officially held in the Priest House it was held in the homes of the Justices of the Peace. Since keeping the peace was far from an easy task at that time, wherever they held court they had their work cut out for them!

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

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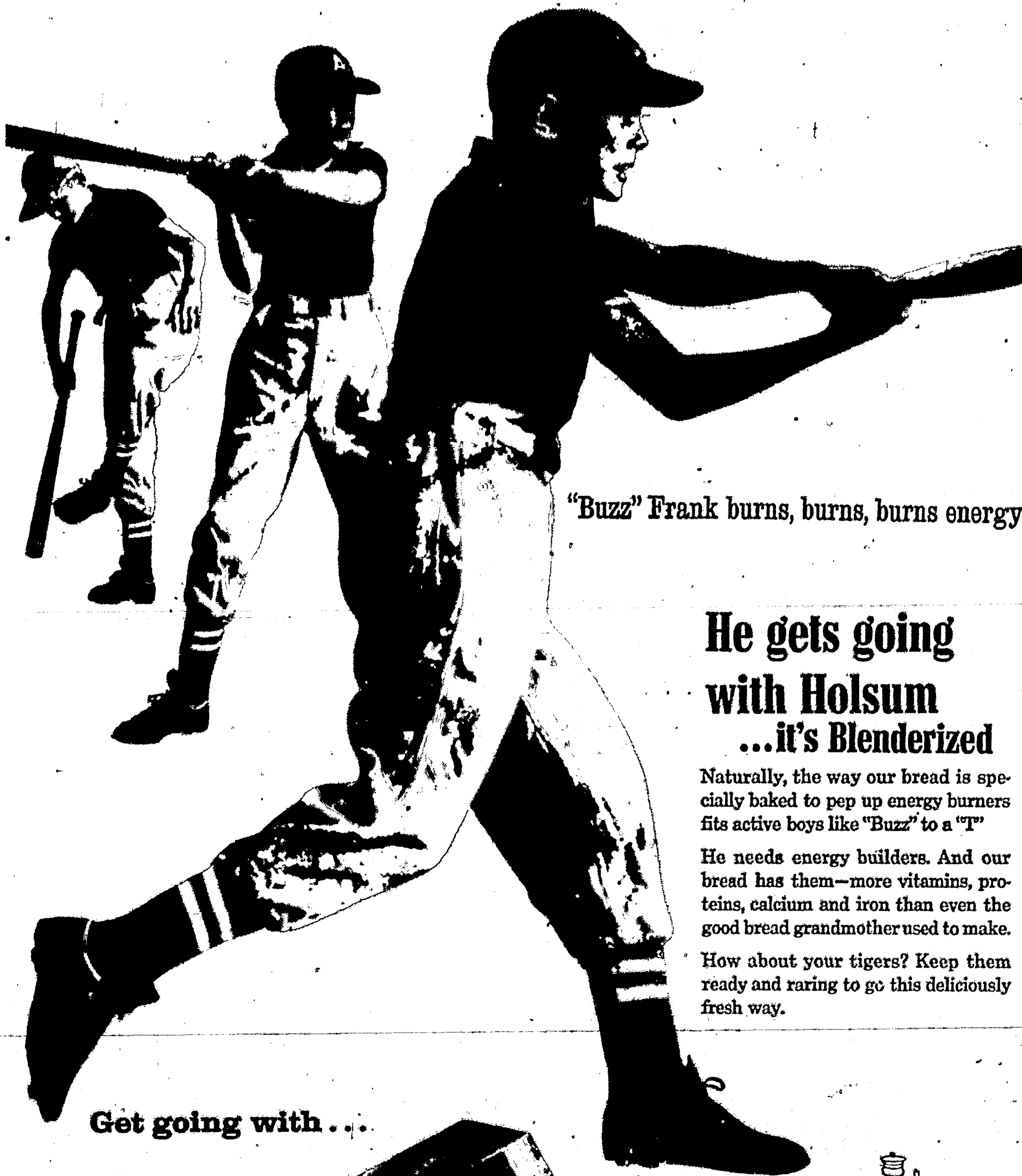

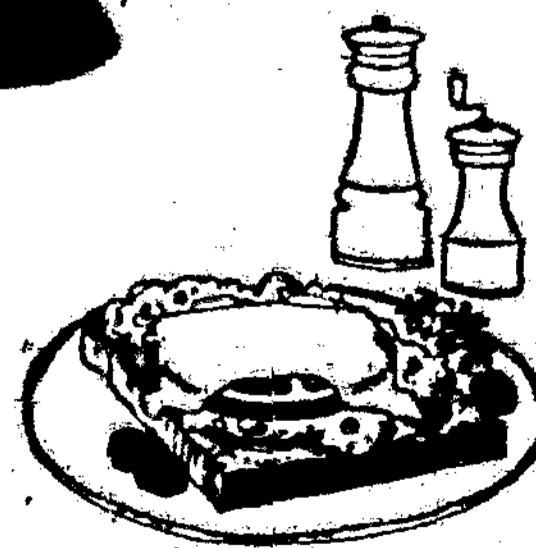

County well represented on committee on aging

A group of approximately 60 citizens of Lincoln County met in the new library of the Carrizozo High School, as a "Listening Committee" to discuss community needs for facilities for services to the older residents of the county.

Present were citizens from Ruidoso, Hondo, Ancho, San Patricio, Carrizozo, Nogal, Tihmie, and Capitan representing County Commissioners, the churches, County Extension, schools, women's clubs, Rotary, American Legion, United Church Women, retired persons, business and professional people, public welfare, ranching, hospitals, Future Home-makers, grandparents, families, and youth.

The meeting had been arranged by Mrs. Maxine Roberts and Mrs. Irene Lindsay, County Welfare Director by contacting people well in advance by letter, telephone, and personally, explaining that their views on needs and existing resources for services for the elderly would be presented and discussed.

As planned in advance, Melford Misener, Baptist Church Pastor, served as chairman and moderator and Mrs. Roberts as discussion leader. Mr. Misener called the meeting to order about 7:45 p.m. and turned it over to Mrs. Roberts to explain purposes and possible functions. After several people were asked to present their views, Mrs. K. Rose Wood, State Program on Aging, DPW, Santa Fe, as guest consultant, was asked to tell about the program on aging developed at state level and around the state as a result of American Association of University Women, and Department of Public Welfare Project on Aging since January 19-64.

Before Mrs. Wood spoke the following citizens opened discussion:

1) The Rev. Father Lebreche, Ruidoso, St. Eleanors Catholic Church, pointed out the need for basic adult education, and for programming leisure time of the elderly for more constructive and satisfying lives in their home and community.

2) Mr. George White, Superintendent of Ruidoso Schools also emphasized the need for adult education, but explained the current classes for older adults conducted in Ruidoso.

3) Mr. Fermin Montes of Hondo Schools also emphasized available facilities in Vocational Education. Both school men referred to the Economic Opportunity program under Titles II, (community action) and V (work and training) and stated that school facilities, equipment, and staff would eventually be more deeply involved in services to adults of all ages.

4) Mr. Ralph Dunlap, County Agent, described services available in Farm and Home Administration programs, and offered these as potentially great value to Lincoln County in housing, construction of nursing homes, and other community facilities for older people.

5) Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Chairman of the Carrizozo Mun. Hos. Board, expressed the belief that some kind of geriatrics facility might be desirable, as local hospitals in Carrizozo and Ruidoso did accept older patients as long-time residents, but that neither hospital was properly equipped to continue this service. Local sick older patients went to Meadows Home for the Chronically Ill and Aged at Las Vegas both as "Welfare" patients and private patients, or to nearby nursing homes of Otero, Chaves, or other counties. Consensus seemed to be that a Lincoln County Facility was indicated, but it was agreed that much planning and more facts were essential.

Mr. Palmer, a veteran, and active in the American Legion, reminded the group that Veterans' Hospitals were being threatened with closure, and he urged that the committee study this problem to get all the facts, consider the costs and value of new facilities before deciding that they were needed and should be constructed.

Mrs. Wood presented a picture of "The Older American" as revealed in the 1964 Report of The President's Council on Aging, stating that there are over 18 million Americans age 65 and over in the nation, and nearly 57,000, or 6% in New Mexico with over 10,000 receiving Old Age Assistance in the state, and about 800, or less than 1% in Lincoln County, with less than 100 of these receiving Old Age Assistance.

Both Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Roberts stressed the fact that a County and/or Community Program on Aging was not a "Welfare Program" for public assistance clients, but a community program for all of the senior citizens in Lincoln County.

Mrs. Wood stated that Citizens Committees were forming

in 24 of the 32 counties of New Mexico and that 13 of these had organized official County Committees on Aging concerning themselves actively with study of housing, recreation, nursing and medical care, leisure time activities, Senior Centers, church services to the aged, volunteer services including planned opportunities for Senior Citizens to receive and to contribute voluntary services to the community.

Mrs. Roberts reported on a well developed plan for a Senior Center in Carrizozo created by Mrs. Wrye, who was also willing to serve as a teacher and temporary manager of a facility she called "Happy House" in which older women and men could find fellowship and companionship while learning various arts and crafts for their personal enrichment and also for services to others.

A well worked out plan with basic essential needs for an approximate cost of \$6,000 could be put into action if a central location and space could be provided. The Carrizozo Fire Hall was mentioned as a possible beginning location. It was agreed that Mrs. Wrye's plan would be further explored as it was also agreed that each community in the county should start where it is and meet local needs first, rather than try to develop one County Cen-

ter to serve so many people living so far apart as they do in Lincoln County.

Participation in discussion was good and it was obvious that Mrs. Roberts and the staff had done an excellent job of sounding out key citizens, gaining their confidence and preparing them to be receptive to the concept of special programs for the aged.

After further discussion involving the need for a broader County Planning Organization to insure needed programs for children and youth, young families, young adults, as well as the elderly, or a broader "Community Planning" for general welfare and community development in all phases of community life to expand and strengthen the economy and level of education and competence for the people of the county.

Mr. Misener wisely closed discussion and asked for volunteers to serve on a County-wide "Steering Committee" to map out a plan of action and set up a few priorities which could be carried out within a given length of time and in specific places in the county.

Mr. Misener and Mrs. Roberts suggested the value of representation from each town and village to serve as a coordinating body to insure total county involvement, but also

suggested the value of local committees to consider local situations and determine priority needs and demands at each local level.

Fifteen people volunteered and an excellent county representation was obtained. Rev. Misener was elected by the group to serve as chairman to serve until a more formal organization developed.

The meeting adjourned about 9:30 p.m. to the Home Economics Department where the FHA grill sponsored by Mrs. Lawson and Mrs. Rael served cookies, punch and coffee.

Mr. Misener and eight or nine of the steering committee held a brief meeting to plan for next steps. Mrs. Betty Jackson of Ancho agreed to serve as secretary. Mrs. Roberts as vice-chairman and the next meeting was scheduled for May 18, 1965, at 7:30 p.m. at the Ruidoso School, where preliminary reports will be made and a tentative agenda for the Lincoln County Committee on Aging will be adopted.

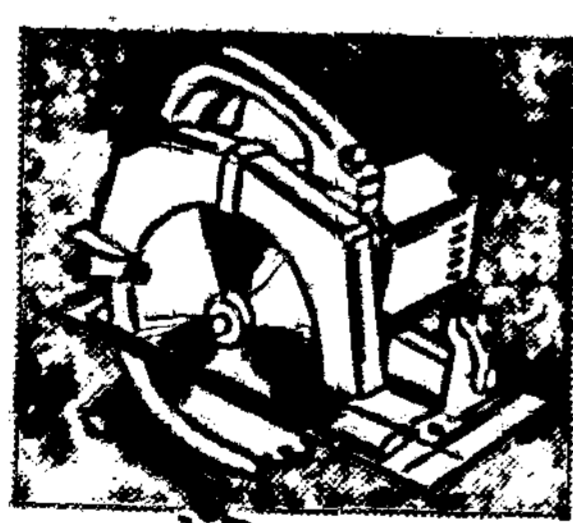

Prelude to courthouse dedication!

How do you dedicate a new courthouse? It could be simply done, but not without invoking many memories. Lincoln County is profiting today from the efforts of people on this land during the past hundred years and one of the visible symbols is here before us — a symbol that Lincoln County people are law abiding, progressive, proud, and know how to enjoy fun and fellowship when the opportunity is at hand, such as this wonderful occasion.

That our forefathers had their fights and struggles which made exciting reading for all America and many foreign countries is common knowledge. From the day Capt. Saturnino Baca introduced a bill as a member of the Territorial Legislature from Socorro County in 1869 which created the new County — called Lincoln in honor of the martyred president — this vast area has witnessed struggles against the pranks of nature and the whims of mankind. By turns, equally devastating.

The Red Man was here long before white people saw the mountains and valleys of Lincoln County and they did not give up their hunting grounds with easy grace. Forts were a necessity and Indian raids a common occurrence. The first real settlement in the county by Americans was made near Old Lincoln Town in 1855-56. Some Spanish-Americans came from the Rio Grande Valley and the Manzano mountains and settled on the Bonito shortly thereafter.

Names such as Miranda, Salazar, Chavez, Gonzales, Trujillo, Baldonado, Gomez were common in the area in those early days, many of their descendants are present for the dedication of this courthouse. Lincoln County should be proud of its heritage. Winning the west probably did not seem unbearable to pioneer people but such a life was not like living in settled parts of eastern United States. Our pioneers needed something special, in character, endurance, and willingness to work, to survive in this area.

A courthouse dedication is most certain to bring back memories of certain incidents that occurred in the county's first official courthouse. It's probable that legal (and some illegal) proceedings took place in various homes in Old Lincoln Town prior to establishment of the first courthouse in Lincoln. Judge Bristol had sentenced the Kid to be hanged on the 13th of May 1831, at Lincoln.

"I don't have to be quiet"

When a student tells that to a teacher, in fact the entire school system, what would you do, what do you expect teachers in your home community to do?

That question was studied seriously in court in Carrizozo last week where the boy who made such a statement was on trial.

A first point to consider is this — if no discipline exists in the school, chances are most favorable that no learning takes place, and all school tax money wasted.

A second point — if school officials do not have the option of taking necessary steps, up to and including use of a paddle, they are off to a weak start and will likely lose the race.

A third point — if parents fight the school administration instead of backing up the teaching staff with their problems, again the route to learning is double tough and dropouts more frequent.

A fourth point — if parents are satisfied with mediocre teaching, or anything but the best for their money, they are sending their youngsters out in the world half prepared.

A fifth (and last) point — if a community does not accept teachers into full fellowship, in fact urge them and welcome them, in such instances teachers cannot possibly do a full job of teaching because they do not fully understand the problems and the background of their youngsters. Jack Mayfield, principal at Captain Schools, touched on

He was brought from Mesilla to Lincoln by Deputy Marshal Robert W. Ollinger and Deputy Sheriff David Woods of Dona Ana County and turned over to Sheriff Pat Garrett at Ft. Stanton on April 21, 1831. The county had just purchased the large two-story building, formerly the mercantile house of Murphy & Dolan, for use as a public building, no jail had been constructed. Hence the Kid was kept directly under guard in one of the second-story rooms. The Kid did not count Ollinger as a friend.

Controversy rages to this day about the events that transpired on April 28, 1831. Ollinger took other prisoners across the street to supper, leaving Bell in charge of the Kid in the guard-room. One account is that at the Kid's request, Bell accompanied him downstairs and into the back corral to the jail latrine. As they returned, the Kid was ahead, bounded up the stairs, turned, pushed open the armory door, seized a six-shooter and shot Bell on the staircase landing. Then the Kid got a double-barrel shotgun, went to the east window and shot Ollinger as he crossed the street, giving him both barrels.

In short that is "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid", subject matter of the pageant at Old Lincoln Town each year, material for many movies and television shows, conversation for historians about where the six-shooter actually came from, and a baptism for Lincoln County's first courthouse.

The second Lincoln County Courthouse is standing gaunt and ready for the wrecking crews here today. It has served a long and useful purpose. Of a certainty we expect this new courthouse to do as well, so well in fact that a great many of us here today will not see another courthouse constructed in this county.

You can count many blessings as we dedicate today. The blessing of being in open country, in a vast untapped land where a person can find peace and quiet if he chooses such, where he can find excitement, where he can work . . . and prosper if he has his wits about him. We can say that Lincoln County people are as free as people can be anywhere, free to live and die, free to laugh and love, free to learn and get ahead, free to sit in the sunshine or in the blue shadows as the sun sets behind the mountains.

God willing, we perform this act of dedication in the name of and for all people both living and dead, that future generations may profit from our experience, that their memories may be refreshing, that this Lincoln County courthouse may perform its part in service to a free people in the greatest land of them all — America.

these and other points in a talk here last week. We talked with Kurt Winters of Keene, New Hampshire, who has spent most of his lifetime doing probation work (his daughter married a flyer at Holloman and Mr. Keene was visiting Judge Zimmerman) and the main message from this gentleman was that new government programs were but a drop in the bucket, much too involved in politics, and that the solution, if there be one . . . was in cooperation of all people in a community for the good of their children — and the community.

Mr. Mayfield said much the same thing. Judge Zimmerman lays much of the blame for delinquent children right on the parents.

What would we do if a student said, "I don't have to be quiet". We'd probably use a paddle or whatever was handy, and if that didn't get the job done the youngster would be sent home so teaching could continue for the benefit of the rest of the school.

Now the boy is home, he grows up, marries, fathers a dozen kids, every one willing and ready to tell teacher, "I don't have to learn". Multiply that by a million school dropouts and you have some idea of the problem of education in this free wheeling society.

Government help in such business is of no value whatsoever.

Jack Mayfield told of teaching in a town with three churches, all of them at each others throat, no smoking, no going to public dances without first asking the school board. It was a place where you sure went to church three times a month — once to each church.

School teaching has changed, but not entirely from the days Jack spoke of. We still expect our teachers to be something other than a human being (we do think they should try to set an example, but no more than any other person in town). If you point your finger — let it be in friendship, were Mayfield's concluding words to Zozo Rotarians.

Judge George Zimmerman does other things besides presiding in court — probably for the cigar smoking time. On May 24 he will be the speaker at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet in Lordsburg.

The following has six months of school: Lincoln, Richardson District, Arabela, Tinnie, five months at Alto, Hondo, Little Creek, Upper Ruidoso, Nogal, San Patricio, Nogal Mesa and Gallinas Mt.

Want to know where early day residents of Zozo came from? Such places as Mobile, Ala.; Springfield, Ohio; Paden's Valley, West Va.; Lampasas County, Texas; Rorkford, Ill.; Huntville, Ark.; Scobas, Miss.; Washington, Iowa; Brown Co., Kansas; Jacksonville, N. Y.; Fenton, Mich.; Evansville, Ind.; Conejos, Colo. — and a few born in Lincoln County.

One more historical question — who knows the whereabouts of The Stag Saloon in Carrizozo. Seems that's a fine place to get wine, pure whiskies and beer, also choice cigars.

Time to enjoy a snow report. All the snow course in the state have much above average snow pack. Snow content on headwaters of Rio Grande approx. 150% of 1948-49 average. Good, good, good.

As we go into courthouse dedication week the News editor believes it safe to say (probably say it, safe or not) that all's well in Lincoln County. The low country of the county is not exactly wet but the mountain areas are showing a green barometer which is a welcome Spring sign and eases the fire tension considerably. Up in Ruidoso Friday we could see signs all over the place of an ear getting ready for a busy summer season. Those folks have got to make it in a short spell, the weather is much hotter along the Mexican border and we don't think a race track in that area can compete with the tall pines of the Ruidoso country.

Capitan couldn't have better than right now. Seems like all the state road equipment is working in Lincoln County and much of it in the Capitan area. El Capitan sub-division is doing fine and flying to add a manufacturing industry to its ac-

thivities which ought to keep Capitan humming both before and after the several big shows that take place in Capitan this summer.

A committee has been described as a group of executors who, singly think they can do anything, but who, together, decide nothing can be done.

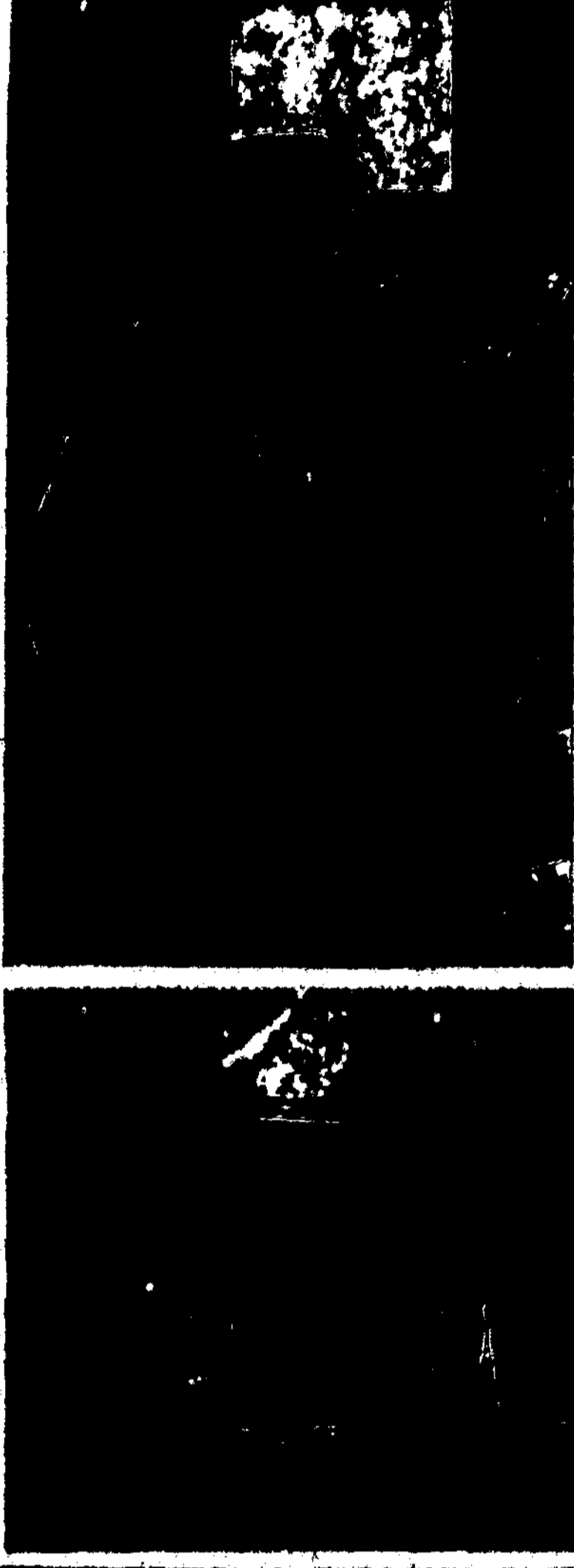

A fish story from way back

Introduction of fishes to New Mexico began as far back as 1883, when 180 carp were delivered to an individual in Deming. Since the carp is not classed as a game fish, it wasn't till 1892 that the first importation of fish took place in the Territory, according to Roy Barker, fisheries chief with the Department of Game and Fish.

Only three species of game fish are native to New Mexico: channel catfish, Rio Grande cutthroat trout, and Gila trout. Now our waters contain six species of trout and salmon; three species of catfish; one pike; eight species of sunfish, including largemouth and smallmouth bass; two perch; and one bass, the white bass.

The first game fish that were planted in New Mexico were provided by a federal agency, the Bureau of Fisheries, now the Fish and Wildlife Service. This was New Mexico's source of all imported game fish until 1925 when the Pecos Hatchery was established.

(a fish and wildlife installation). Fish reared from these eggs will be kept as brood stock, which are expected to provide spawn for future distribution here in New Mexico.

Lovington lies in wide-open country in the center of the last cattle frontier, and there are ranches hereabouts still owning thousands of acres of land. The flavor of the Old West pervades this part of the Land

of Enchantment that borders Texas, writes Mrs. Woods.

Animals can be champions down here, too, Lovington was the home of Old Baldy, a chestnut sorrel roping horse that won over \$300,000 for his riders. He worked at his profession for thirteen years in all the important rodeos of the world, and won his last owner, Troy Fort, enough money to buy several ranches.

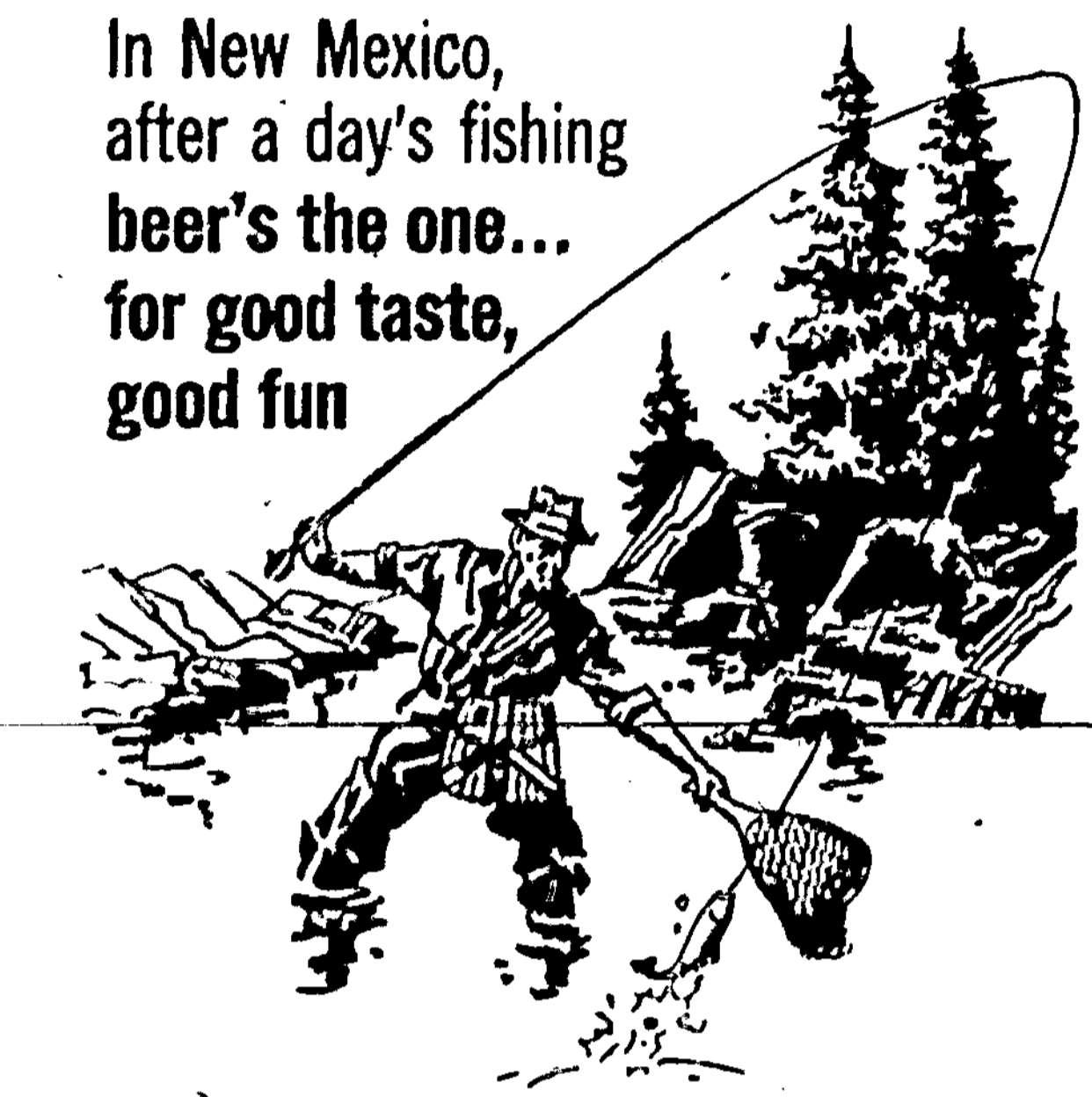

Survey covers entire state

From one end of New Mexico to the other trained Soil Conservation Service technicians are probing the soil with tubes, augers and hand-dug pits. They are collecting and recording usable information about the soil. This information will aid us as land owners and citizens to make the best possible use of our soil.

The soil information that is now being collected will eventually be published in a Soil Survey Report. These are generally, but not necessarily, published on a county-wide basis. The report text may cover such things as soils, vegetation, range management, geology, climate, agricultural history, crop yields data and research results. Another section of the report will show the distribution of soils within the survey area on an aerial photograph base map. Copies of these published reports are available to Soil Conservation District cooperators and other individual users of soil maps and reports.

Although agricultural people will always be the biggest users of soils information, many other people are now becoming interested in what a soils map can tell them. Some of these interested people are: land appraisers, realtors, contractors, engineers, foresters, nurserymen, cannery, pipeline manufacturers and insurance companies. Many large cities are now using soil maps as a direct aid to city planning. Many others, Albuquerque among them, are now in the process of having soil maps made. When they are completed they will be used in many aspects of future city planning.
