Carrizozo to host 5th Legion District

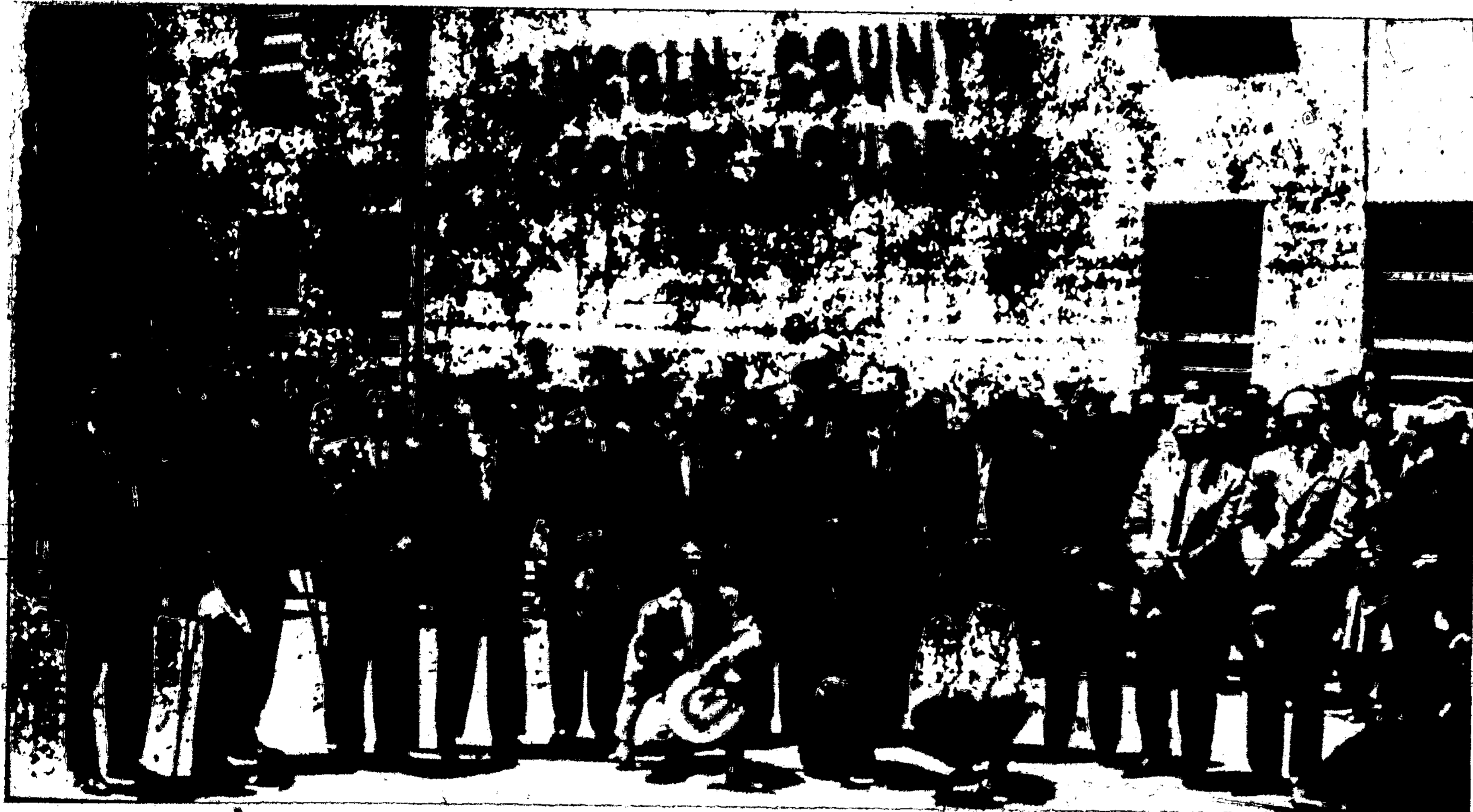

3,500 people enjoy barbeque at courthouse dedication

C. C. Watkins, better known as "Wattie" and crew of hungry (and thirsty) Lion barbeque experts moved into the Lincoln county seat town early last Friday to start preparations for feeding nearly 4,000 people the next day at the dedication of the new courthouse. At least 3,500 of the expected crowd showed up to enjoy a big day in Lincoln County, the figure proved by the number of plates used in serving the barbeque.

Along about 3:00 a.m. Saturday there was the prettiest sight a hungry person ever saw in back of the courthouse where the barbeque pit had been dug. The grill was lined with meat that looked brown and tender — it was, and later that day the cooks received many fine compliments. Potato salad brought by women of the county was equally delicious.

People started arriving in town Saturday, May 8, about the time the sun started coming up for one reason or another. What had been a week of windy weather turned into

a fine day of May weather, clear and brisk, in fact just right. The large crowd was gathering all during the morning with late arrivals by the carload showing up around noon, just in time for the ceremonies.

Bands from Corona, Ruidoso and Carrizozo gathered at the local school and marched down the street looking colorful under the streamers put up by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce. They stood in parade formation on the courthouse grounds and played music for the crowd for an hour or more. The Corona Band is directed by Miss Sheryl Perkins, Ruidoso band director is LeRoy Gooch, the host director is Arnold Royce.

The Benjamin I. Berry Post No. 11 American Legion was in charge of the flag raising, assisted by Boy Scouts from all troops in the county. Carl Palmer, local commander, was in charge of the flag raising ceremony.

When it came time for the program to start, Max Oliver, chairman of the Lincoln County board of commissioners, first introduced Bert Pringstan of Hondo who gave the invocation. Then he introduced his fellow commissioners, Bob Shafer and Joe McKnight. Then Oliver turned the microphone to Judge Zimmerman who was master of ceremonies for the dedica-

recognized as the persons with the longest term of residence in Lincoln County. Each man has lived here for 79 years. Mister D. E. Ersoy and family from the state of Idaho were recognized as having traveled the greatest distance

to the dedication. The Leandro Vega Sr. family was determined to be the largest family present, with 22 members when they could all be rounded up at the same time.

Former Gov. Tom Bolack addressed the dedication crowd and in his talk spoke of the wonderful heritage of Lincoln County and the future that could only be bright in this section of New Mexico.

The formal dedication was turned to Sen. Joe Skeen of Picacho. Skeen said, "On this day of dedication it is proper that we should reflect on those principles of government that at times we seem to take for granted and reaffirm our belief and staunch faith in their continuation. This new courthouse is a worthy symbol of the continued belief and renewed faith of the people of Lincoln County in our American system of free local government and evidence of our acceptance of responsibility to maintain freedom. The best government is local government. We dedicate this courthouse in certain determination that it will serve as an adequate and efficient, and pleasant working center for the servants of the people of Lincoln County and will never serve as a Kremlin for our masters."

ie Norman Erwin of the home, and Levene Snodgrass of Las Cruces.

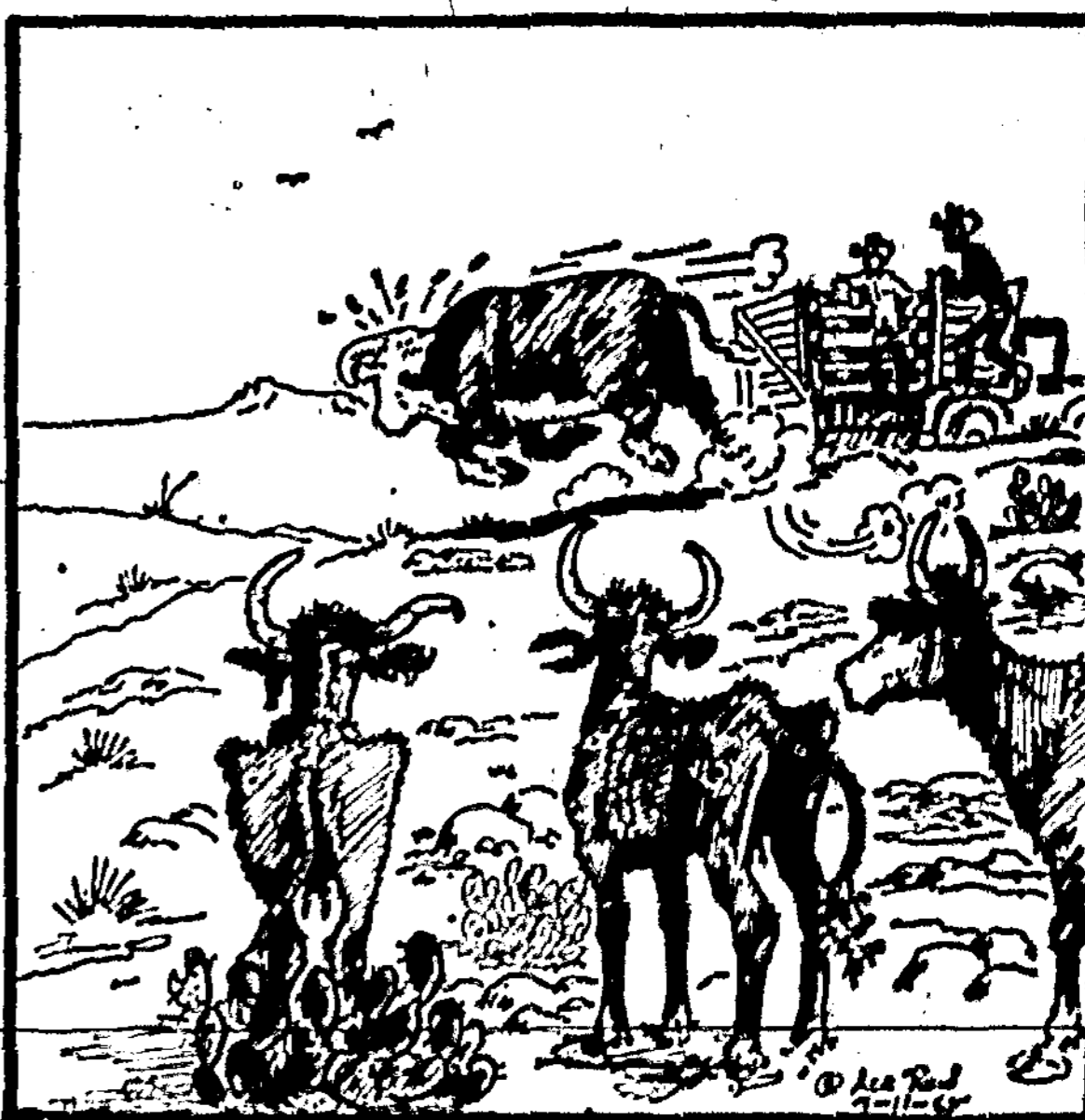

A job well done

Courthouse dedication day, Saturday, May 8, 1965, in Lincoln County was fine in every possible way.

Minnie Lee Neill was recalling that this is the only free barbecue she can recall in Carrizozo.

The list of firsts is long. The first time so many commissioners ever assembled on courthouse grounds, the first time the Hondo Fiesta and Ruidoso square dancers danced here, a helicopter taking people for rides was a first, some 3500 people gathered for a celebration a first, Zozo band on the street in new uniforms, decorated streets by the Zozo Chamber of Commerce a first, music by the Rebel Rousers and court dance a first — for sure, there are more firsts.

Work done by county Lions Clubs, Rotarians, Womans Clubs, county employees, Mounted Patrol, visiting bands, visiting news people, visiting dignitaries — all was appreciated.

So was the weather, which was crisp with moderate winds. Hospitality of the southwest is well-known over the nation and such was never more obvious than on the day of dedication last Saturday.

On advertising we think along these lines: If the home town ad salesman can't outsell some stranger he'd better go in the jockey business or plumbing or something.

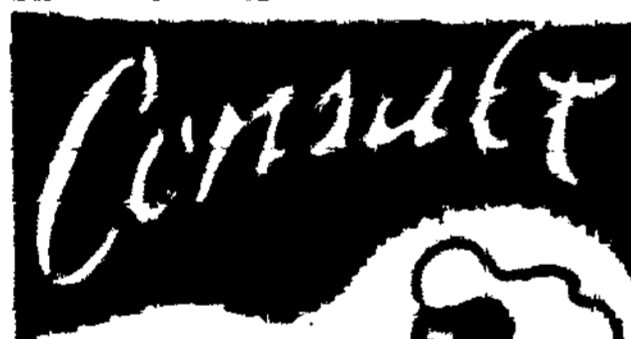
The News is no exception. We just figure to help local people with their merchandising as much as possible and that is the best we can do — it's their money.

We took a total of 53 pictures Saturday. It will take us about three weeks to get them all in print, but we think our readers will enjoy seeing these views of Lincoln County's big day even though they had to wait.

Carrizozo used to have a captive clientele for merchandise and news — those days are gone forever. Now-a-days, if you want to do business, you've got to peddle something the other fellow does not have (service, quality, friendliness, price, etc.). We try to do that each week.

We're all for progress but we wish we didn't have to listen to it. What with jet planes, diesel trucks, hot rods, motorcycles, power mowers, hi-fi nuts, and that brassy music the kids carry around in their shirt pockets, progress will eventually deafen us all.

Society to hear of Lincoln caves

The Chavez County Historical Society will meet on Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the Reddy Room at the Southwestern Public Service Co. to hear Charles Carrera discuss the work of the Pecos Valley Grotto in exploring the caves of southeastern New Mexico.

He will also show the slides and motion pictures taken at the Feather Cave site when the group found the long-concealed entrance in the spring of 1964. This program was presented to the Society last December and is being repeated due to popular demand.

The caves in the vicinity of Fort Stanton were explored by the soldiers who were stationed there as early as 1870. At that time one of the larger caves was well known to the Indians who used it as an escape route from pursuing soldiers.

The second entrance to this particular cave has never been found, but the members of the local speleological club hope to find it some day. Their work in finding the entrance to the Feather Cave room received state-wide recognition from the University of New Mexico Anthropology Department when Dr. Florence Hawley Ellis declared this site to be one of the best finds of prehistoric southwestern ceremonial cave material.

Over 100 arrows, 40 bows, and 30 prayer sticks were found, and these, with numerous paintings on the cave walls were photographed in place by the discovering party. Since time careless and undirected search by "pot hunters" has destroyed much of this important archaeological find so these pictures have become the only record extant of the conditions under which these artifacts were found.

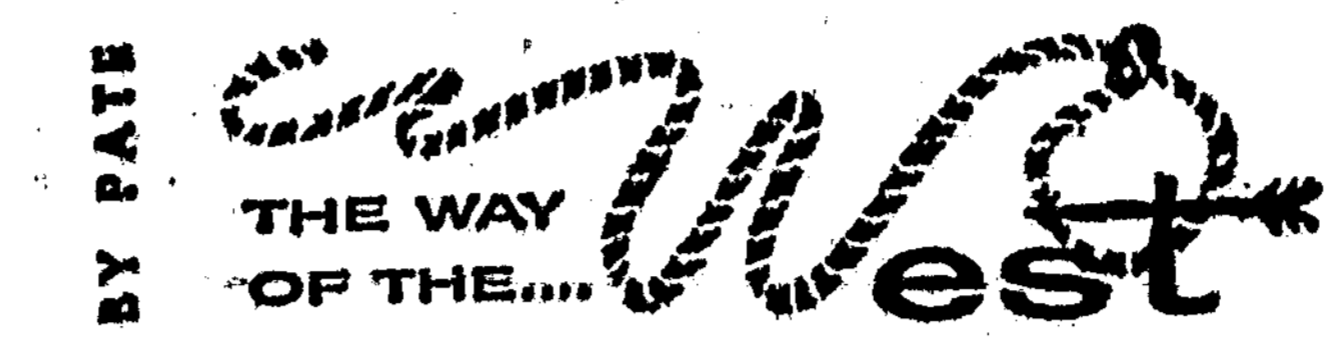
May is speaker at annual meeting

People from all over Lincoln County, Alamogordo, Roswell, El Paso and one family from Idaho were present.

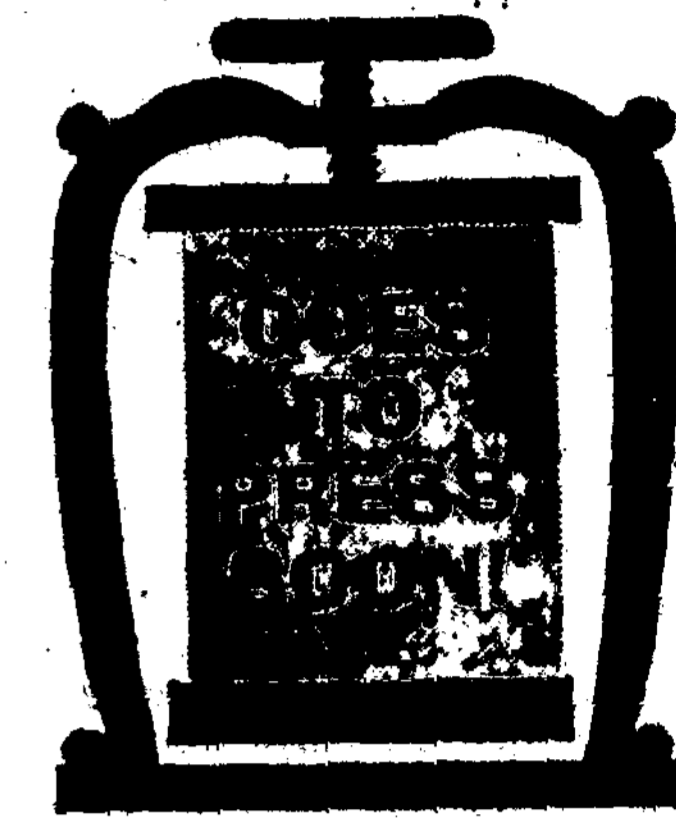

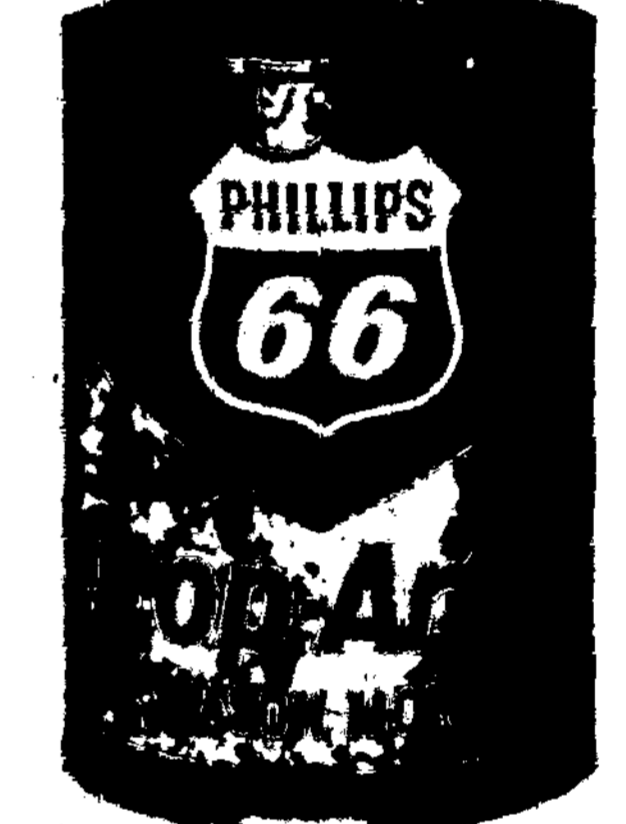
