

Lots of work being done at Fort Stanton for control of tuberculosis in the state

The task of total control of tuberculosis in New Mexico is going ahead at Ft. Stanton TB Hospital where the number of patients under treatment in April was 207, in a hospital rated at 212 beds, this is getting close to full capacity. The medical staff at the hospital does not think that the increase will continue because quite a number of patients will be discharged to offset the new arrivals.

During this period of high occupancy, and equally high out-patient treatment, 660 in April which is the highest number since the program started, the number of employees on the payroll has gone down, 14 less being employed now than last year. A good part of this cut-back in personnel has been in the administrative offices and in other departments where employees now serve a dual function, performing more than one job.

The TB Hospital board of directors, meeting in Portales a month ago, and in Fort Stanton last week, heard reports of the increased activity of the Mobile X-ray Unit, the increased number of clinics being held around the state, that laboratory tests performed increased from 5,000 to 14,000 in recent periods, that the number of X-rays being used in the fight to control tuberculosis has gone way up — all of this has made the hospital staff and board of directors take a close look at other budget activities.

When the Ft. Stanton Hospital took over operation of the Mobile X-ray Unit from the Health Department it was thought that an added expense of some \$25,000 would be incurred instead this cost will run up to \$70,000. No additional funds are being requested, nor will they be, but some cuts have been made in other ways to allow the medical staff to pro-

ceed at full speed.

Dr. Crawford Jernigan said that this year is a period to organize clinics, and in time to come, the routings of the Mobile X-ray Unit and doctors tending clinics will be considerably shortened at a saving to the state. Right now the medical staff is obligated to go anywhere they are requested for a clinic, and they do so, with the expectation that clinic trips will be coordinated in coming months.

Another problem of tuberculosis control is some means of providing for families where the bread-winner of the family is in the hospital, and needs to stay there. Past experience has shown that when the husband is hospitalized, with tuberculosis, and his family at home is in need, the husband goes home, which increases the possibility of the spread of TB. A recent case in northern New Mexico was the instance where

two young children were found to have TB, and the source was a great aunt. Now all three are in the hospital.

Much more testing in schools is planned and necessary because early diagnosis helps control the disease and, testing in schools frequently leads to the sources of the disease.

There has been some criticism of hospital methods where patients spent five to twenty years at the hospital. There are a few such cases but the biggest turnover by far is in patients at the hospital a year, more or less. The board and doctors agreed that a better system of accounting for tenure in the hospital should be put into effect and this will be done immediately, showing how many patients stay six months, one year, two years, etc.

The program of improving services within the hospital staff continues week after week

with special sessions for the medical personnel to learn what is going on world-wide TB control, first aid films shown, film on diabetes, session on fire resuscitation training of medical aids, and orientation of new employees.

State Budget Director Ben Mason and George Bryan, superintendent of the hospital, are on a 10-day tour of tuberculosis and crippled children's hospitals this week in other states to confer with officials on operations and procedures at the institutions.

The legal papers necessary for the transfer of 57.81 acres of land, from Ft. Stanton to the Springer Boys Home for use by the Sierra Blanca Boys Camp were presented to the board at their meeting last Saturday and approved. The hospital is waiving its right to this land and the Springer Institution will pay only the amount due the Federal Government.

Ft. Stanton TB Hospital has a 20-year lease, on the ground and buildings it occupies, this lease is 9/20's complete.

A new fire house is complete and in operation. During the day an alarm system alerts the volunteer department. From 5:00 p.m. until 8:00 a.m. a fireman is on duty at the fire house. Three recent small fires have been controlled. A fire district has been set up at the Fort which runs from Capitan to Tinnie, the Fort Stanton department is responsible for this area. The hospital fire department has received \$3,500 from the fire-marshal's office. The fire district is an entirely separate operation from the hospital.

In the process of tightening up of personnel at the hospital the job of laundry supervisor was eliminated, as a result of this termination the six employees in the laundry quit their jobs. They were not replaced,

but other employees brought in to do the laundry work, some part time and some full time. A hearing was held Saturday afternoon for Mr. Rufino Padilla former laundry supervisor to present his case. He was represented by Albert Rivera, an attorney from Alamogordo, with a court reporter present.

The board of directors felt that Mr. Padilla had every right to the hearing, but had no comments, and there was no discussion during the hearing.

Attending the meeting were: Dr. Eugene Mann, chairman, from Portales, Lean Mae Pfister of Tatum, Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque, Eleanor Jones of Capitan, and Paul Payton of Carrizozo. REV. MILFORD MISENER IS BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER

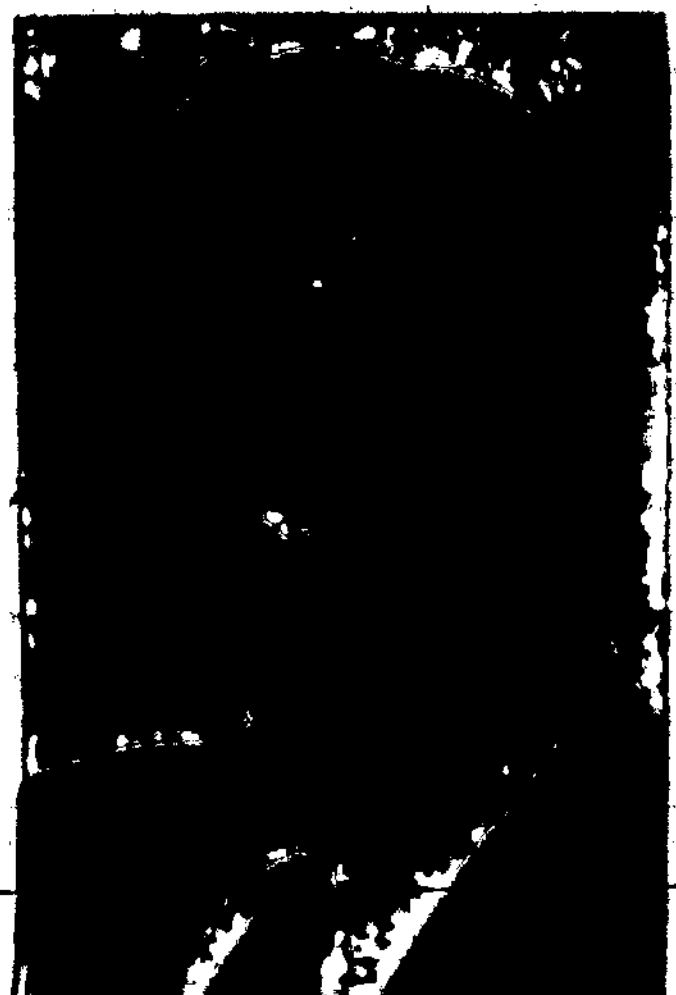
Baccalaureate for the 1965 Carrizozo High School graduates will be held May 23 in the Junior High Cafeteria at 8:00 p.m.

Soil Stewardship is a matter of concern for city as well as rural folks, an official of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District said today.

Observance of Soil Stewardship Week, sponsored by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, is scheduled for the week beginning May 23, Bert Pfingsten, chairman of the Upper Hondo SWCD said.

Theme for the observance is "Challenges of Growth," Mr. Pfingsten said.

Special services in churches of various faiths will open this week and other observances will take place on the following Sunday, May 30, Pfingsten said. The SWCD chairman said that this year more than ever,

responsibility of town and city dwellers for conserving the soils is being emphasized in the observance.

City folks have a great stake, he said, in what happens to the land which feeds, clothes, shelters and gives us day to day comforts and pleasures. Woolgrowers for predator control

They recommend that 15 cents per animal be assessed and that it be for five years, if 51 per cent of the sheep and goats or cattle or both are represented on the petition, the assessment will be made by the county on these animals.

The Predator Control Board recommend to administer these funds are: A. W. Gnatkowski, John A. Cooper, Charles A. Jones, Tony Treat and Billy Stephenson.

There are copies of the law in the county extension office for those who are interested.

A problem likely to get worse - an editorial

Before it gets better, the problem of how much water Alamogordo should take out of Lincoln County is liable to get worse, if Alamogordo continues to grow, as they fully intend to do we feel sure, they will need more and more water.

Right now people in the Hondo Valley are screaming about the water they should receive, but aren't, from Bonito Dam, a lake totally managed by the City of Alamogordo. Bert Pfingsten, chairman for the Upper Hondo Water and Conservation District, has requested the Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District to check Alamogordo's water meter at the lake — the meter house is kept locked. Pfingsten says, "We believe they're taking ten when only entitled to five second feet of water". This situation is nothing new, it's been that way for years.

Both Carrizozo and Capitan, in fact all of Lincoln County, has a vital interest in use of Bonito water and complaints are being registered daily because Nogal Lake is going dry — its only source of supply being Bonito Lake and Alamogordo will not turn any water into Nogal during this season of runoff.

Hondo Valley people want their water for irrigation of crop land. People concerned about Nogal have recreation

in mind.

Talking with J. W. Harrison, Alamogordo city manager, this week we got the message that Alamogordo needs all the water it can get through the pipeline from Bonito for human consumption which is being a mite tight in reasoning process. The same pipes that provide water for human consumption also provide water for a lot of other purposes not so critical when the rights of people in Lincoln County are considered.

If the runoff had started earlier in the year at Bonito there might have been some water for Nogal Lake — but, during the fall and winter months Alamogordo was selling water from Nogal Lake to the contractor doing the Forest Service road job on 380 in the Indian Divide area. It seems only logical that the City of Alamogordo should, in good faith, restore this water to the lake, now that Bonito Lake is full and running over.

Of course there is another solution, far fetched for sure, but Lincoln County should gather its forces and buy Otero County out on this water right, lock, stock and barrel. In the meantime, it seems that all we can do is gripe about our neighbors who out-smarted us when they made the Bonito Lake deal, and now want their full entitlement.

More seating for Smokey Stampede

The biggest rodeo event in Lincoln County occurs each 4th of July in Capitan, known as the Smokey Bear Stampede. Over \$3,000 in prize money was given out in the 1964 Stampede and a crowd estimated at 4,000 attended the event.

This year there will be rodeo performances on both afternoon and night Saturday, July 3, and again on Sunday afternoon on July 4. The big rodeo stunts, with the Aggie members of Las Cruces furnishing music, will be Friday and Saturday nights.

The Smokey Bear Stampede committee has arranged for

church to be held early in the several churches in Capitan. This will permit the activities, normally held on July 4 to take place. The rodeo parade will start at 11:00 a.m. Sunday, followed by the free barbecue which attracts a big crowd to the Stampede.

A Queen of Lincoln County Fair is annually selected at the Stampede, then this queen reigns at the county fair and goes on to Albuquerque to represent Lincoln County at the state fair. Queen candidates can start getting ready now for the big event in July.

The program of rodeo events includes: bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, ladies barrel race and ladies pole bending — with \$25 to \$75 added money in each event. Stock will be furnished by Ratjen Bros. of Happy, Texas, one of the best rodeo producers in the entire southwest.

A lot of extra space has been added this year for spectators, including 120 feet of bleachers, 84 feet on the north and 36 feet on the south of existing bleachers. This almost doubles the seating capacity.

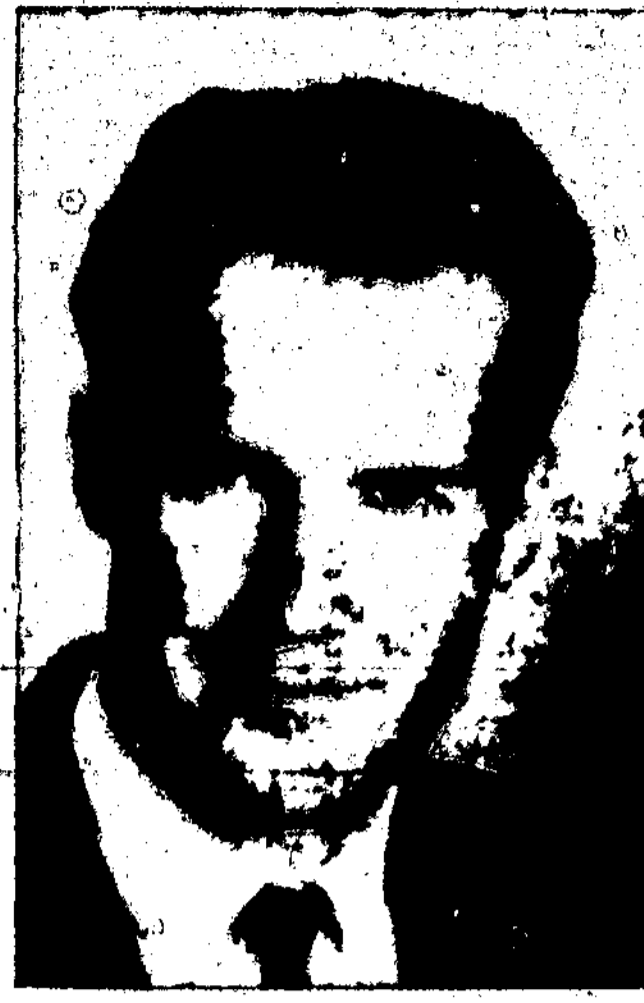
Tommy Guevara

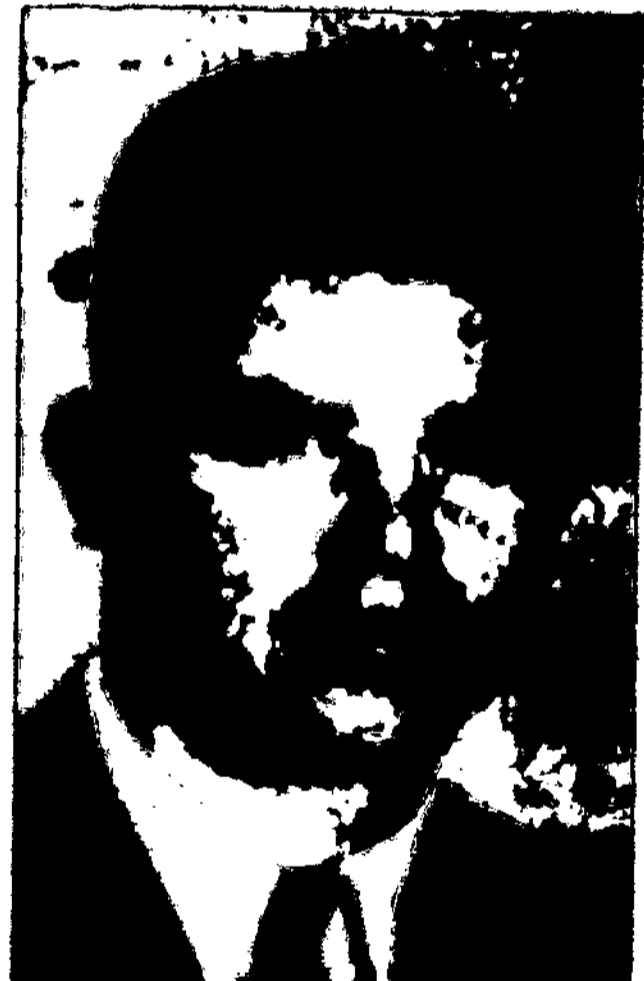

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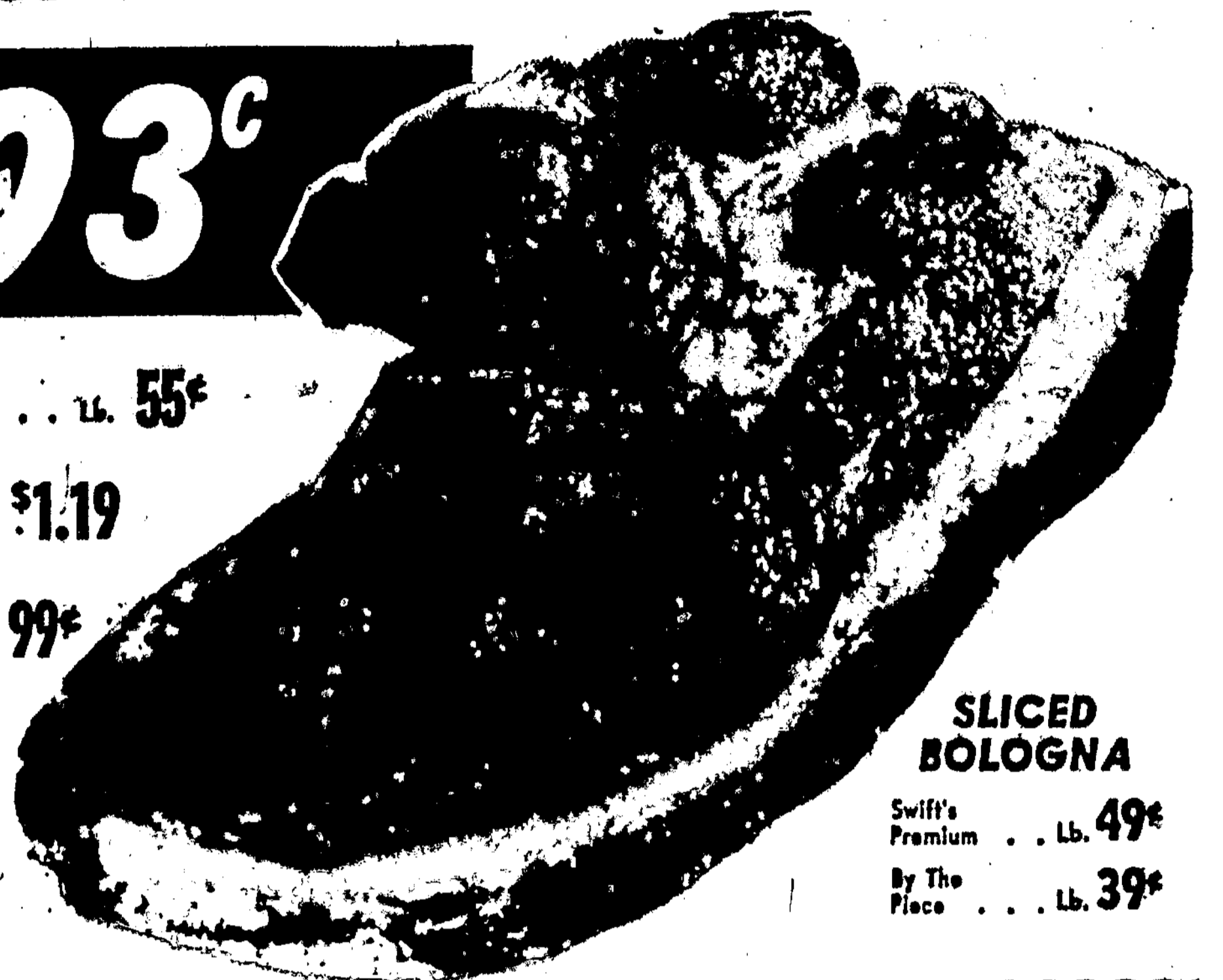
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Much activity at new sub-division

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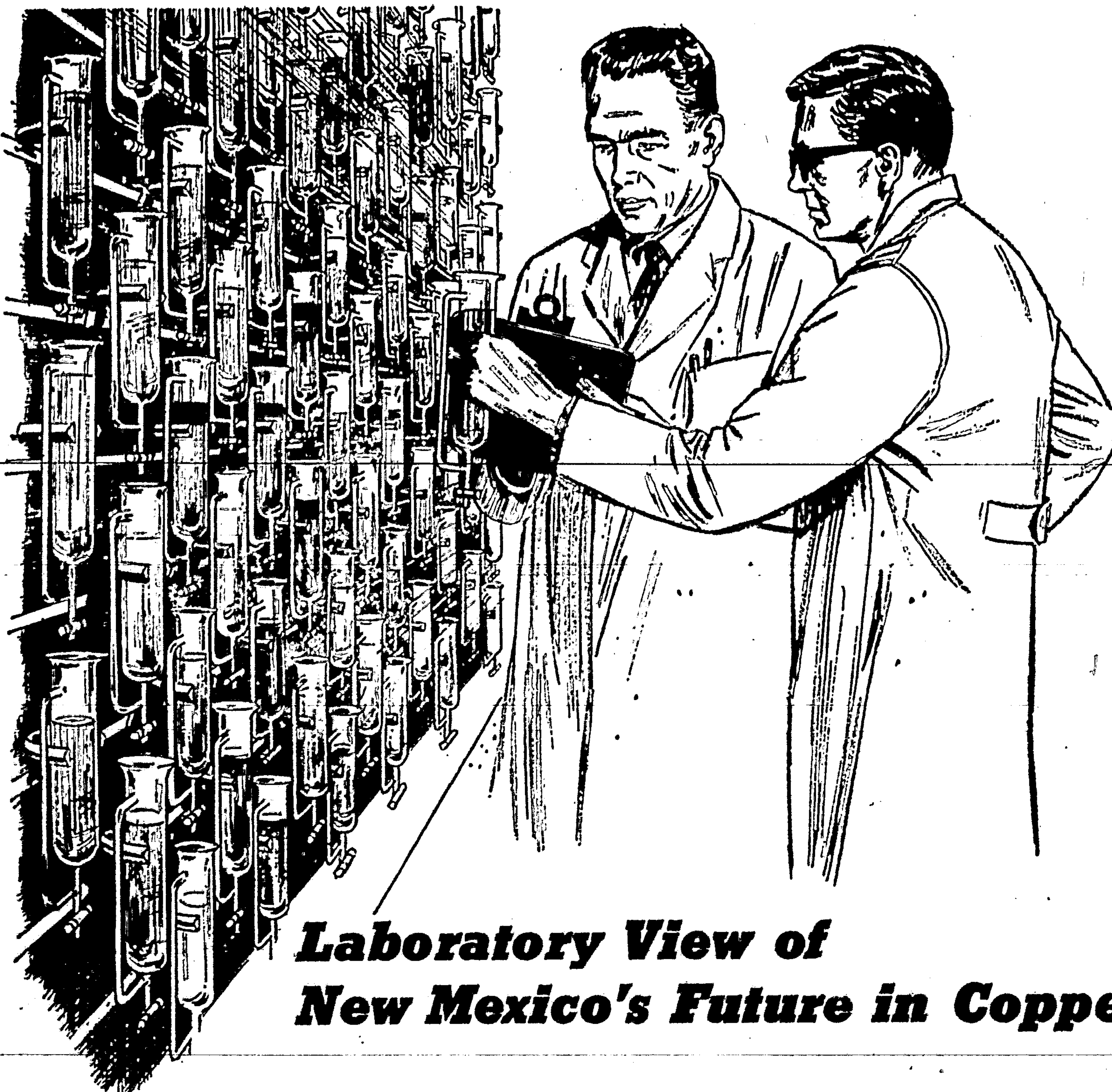
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Laboratory View of New Mexico's Future in Copper

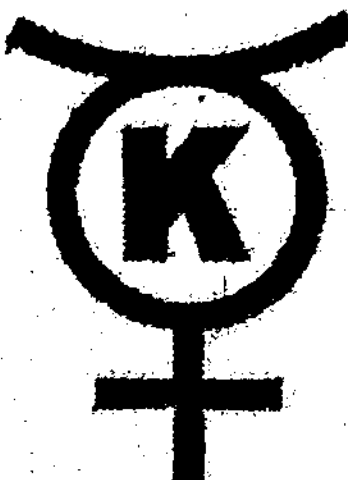
The picture of copper's contribution to the future economy of New Mexico was first seen in the laboratories of Kennecott's Research Center. Exhaustive study and experimentation at the Center developed new methods and equipment for leaching copper from mine waste dumps at the Chino Mines Division.

What started as a scientific investigation is now becoming a mining practice reality at Santa Rita's Precipitating Plant. An enlarged water system is being installed to recover the copper leached from the dumps

by water that seeps through the waste rock.

When the project is completed, it will be a keystone in Kennecott's \$6 million expansion program to increase copper production in New Mexico. The new facilities will step up the production of precipitate copper by 45%.

The expansion program, aided by the Research Center, will provide added assurance of a longer life for the economic benefits that spread throughout New Mexico from Kennecott's operations.
