## Jerry Brasher has nose in state feed trough

Santa Fe — Jerry Brasher, the Democratic chairman of Bernalillo county, has joined Gov. Campbell's stable of county chairmen on the state payroll.

Brasher, a former Albuquerque legislator, has been employed as the governor's executive secretary at \$950 a month.

He works with Chairman Ernle Garcia of Gallup who was raised from \$660 to \$690 a month in his bureau of Revenue job July 1, and Chairman Tomatoes Ortiz of Santa Fe who went from \$850 to \$860 July 1 in his bureau job.

Also — San Miguel Chairman Apples Duran of the state Motor Vehicle Department, \$750 a month, Curry County Chairman Austin Brooks of the bureau at \$660 a month, Ruben Miera, chairman of Sandoval county, director of the ports of entry, at \$950 a month.

### RIO ARRIBA JEFF DENIED STATE JOB

Benny Naranjo, the new Demo chairman of Rio Arriba who was appointed to succeed his dad, Sheriff Emilio Naranjo, has been trying to get on the state payroll but with no luck.

The younger Naranjo was appointed chairman early this year, and gave up a job with the state welfare department, to clear the way for his father to become U. S. marshal for New Mexico.

The marshal appointment has been stalled for more than two months but is expected to come through in July.

### ALBERTA MILLER CORRECTS BONERS

State Secretary Alberta Miller has given \$1,441 to print 2,000 more of her 1965 New Mexico Blue Book which will correct errors that appeared in the first printing of 3,000 such as listing Rep. Rex Kipp, the Demo chairman of Hidalgo county, as a Republican.

The new book will also show a state house of representatives of 70 members rather than 77, and will say that the legislature meets annually instead of every two years as in the first book.

Mrs. Miller is embarrassed about the errors that appeared in the first printing but even with the boo-boo it was the best Blue Book published by the state in more than 20 years.

### ALL THE JUDGES UP FOR ELECTION

All 21 of the district judges, \$17,500 a year, are coming up for election next year with only one of them qualified for retirement District Judge Clyde McCulloch of San Juan, on age and time in service, but some could go in pensions for disability.

At the supreme court level only Justice David Carmody, 56, is up for consideration by the voters. The justices are presently on at \$20,000 a year, an act of the 1965 legislature.

### FIVE JUDGES IN ALBUQUERQUE

Albuquerque, and Sandoval and Valencia counties have five district judges up for re-election, Demos Paul Tackett, D. A. Macpherson, Edwin L. Swepe, Robert W. Reidy, and John B. McManus and Republican Paul Larrázola.

Santa Fe, Los Alamos and Rio Arriba counties have two Democrats, Sam Montoya, and James Scarborough.

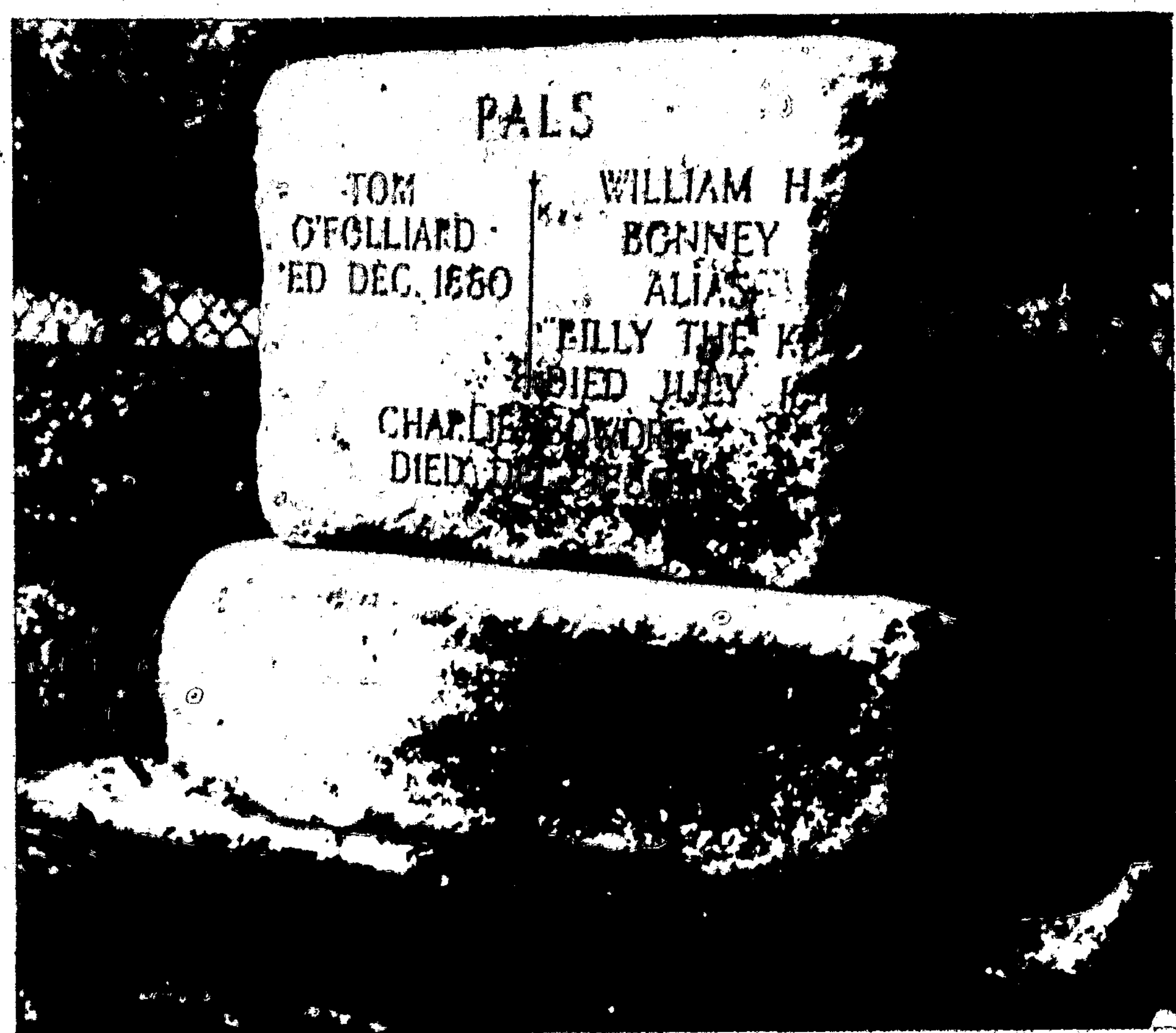

## Zozo ready to start new airport

Mayor Vernon Petty received a letter, dated July 9, from W. O. Karpenko, district airport engineer, which stated "This is your authorization to proceed with construction of the Carrizozo municipal airport project."

A preconstruction conference will be held July 20 at 2:00 p. m. in the town hall. Attendance at this meeting is expected to include county commissioners, engineering firm, and town council.

The grant agreement requires the passage of a zoning ordinance to protect the approaches prior to final payment, a matter the town council will take care of.

## Valley of Fire park a certainty

Rep. W. G. Shrecongost of Lincoln was in Santa Fe last Friday and received the information that the State Board of Finance has approved \$25,000, as requested in the budget, for the Valley of Fire State Park located just off Highway 380 west of Carrizozo.

Picnic tables are being constructed in Santa Fe now. Because state park personnel is limited and extra busy with tourist business this time of year construction will start about Sept. 15 when the big run of tourist business is over.

Shrecongost will return to Santa Fe this Friday for a meeting of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Resources and Development.

Worth outlined the steps necessary for securing a housing program for elderly and/or low income families in any town in Lincoln Co. at a meeting Monday night in Carrizozo. Mr. Hawkins will be in Lincoln County a week, and plans to visit all areas and the towns of the county.

## Rev. James A. Wells family receives fine tribute for work in community

This is a tribute to a family that now resides in your town, the family is that of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Wells, Rev and Mrs. Wells came from a small community between the two small towns of Clauch and Gran Quivira, Rev. and Mrs. Wells are the parents of eight children all of whom are married, they also have twenty-four grandchildren. They have a host of friends and neighbors that are too great to mention in this article.

Before Brother Wells retired he owned a small homestead in New Mexico near the Atkinson Ranch, he later converted his homestead, after he had farmed it for many years, into a small ranch. Brother Wells also drove a bus in the surrounding areas around Clauch.

Around 1928 or 1929 Brother Wells became an ordained Minister, after answering the call of God. Being that cars and trucks were few during this time and that Brother and Sister Wells owned the only one used to transport people to and from church. There were always as many as could be loaded into the truck, since riding to church was much more inviting than walking. Brother Wells traveled around six miles each way, doing this four to six times a week, often finding that he had to make two trips to pick up the people desiring to go to church.

During all these years he has remained faithful in standing by everyone in the time of sickness. In the times of death Brother Wells was always there to comfort the grieving, and was often called upon to preach the funerals, he also performed weddings and baptised those desiring baptism. It seems as though that Brother and Sister Wells are always there to help when the need arises.

Brother Wells was always ready to give his all for needy cause that would arise in the community, and in his church work. With Sister Wells by his side as a help mate, he always provided well for his family.

He pastored Gran Quivira church for twelve years. He then founded a church in

Clauch that grew or decreased with the growth or decrease of the community. Brother Wells then moved to Carrizozo and built the Assembly of God church there. He did this after he had given up farming, ranching and driving the school bus. Then he became the full-time pastor of the Carrizozo church.

We really envy you folks in Carrizozo since we know what you have gained. You undoubtedly recognized that whenever a need arises that Brother and Sister Wells are always there to help.

It seems that he loves the one deepest in the gutter or the one that thinks he is so high. It seems that God recognized what a great man he had called to his ministry in the many ways that Brother Wells has been a blessing to everyone. It seems that God still has plenty of work for him since he has been healed from two near escapes of death. If there ever was a man that walked in the foot steps of Jesus, it is Brother James Wells.

It seems that a small tribute to a great man like him is just not enough to express our love for him. There is no money that could pay for the prayers that he has prayed and that he still prays daily.

We hope that we have helped express our appreciation of Brother and Sister Wells in a very small way.

## Vote 'for' court of appeals recommended

## Holder charges Albuquerque Journal with distortion of highway facts

The Albuquerque Journal has been highly critical of State Highway Commission Chairman John Sudderth, and time after time has implied that he is favoring his own district, and not spending enough money on the streets of Albuquerque. They have called him Gov. Jack Campbell's "boy," probably due to the fact the state legislature, during its last session, created a \$15,000-a-year job for the chairman of the state highway commission, and that job already was held by Sudderth.

There are five districts established by law for state highway purposes, each district having a commissioner named by the governor, and these men are the State Highway Commission. From these five, the chairman is chosen, and Sudderth has been the chairman for some time. He represents District 2, which the Journal recently noted is the state's largest from a geographical standpoint, containing Lincoln, De Baca, Curry, Chavez, Roosevelt, Otero, Eddy and Lea counties, having a population of 272,600, and 3,241 miles of highways, or 26.8 per cent of all the highways in the state.

The Journal made a complete rundown of population and of highway miles of all the districts, but we will point out only one more — the one in which Albuquerque is located. It is District 3, with Bernalillo, San Juan, McKinley, Sandoval and Valencia counties, having a population of 453,000, and 2,097 miles, or 17.4 per cent of the state's highways.

The Journal continually has reminded the Highway Commission that Albuquerque is the home of approximately 25 per cent of the state's population, consequently pays about 25 per cent of the state's taxes, and therefore is entitled to 25 per cent of the expenditures of the department. We can't argue too much with that philosophy.

Only recently, Journal Executive Editor Bob Brown wrote an article in which he outlined the districts, as we have said, and pointed out the construction schedule for the next three years which was adopted by the Highway Commission.

Brown's article then went on to note that the first year of the three-year construction schedule had District 2 receiving projects totalling \$4,171,000, or nearly half of the total of \$10,261,000 for primary roads. District 3, he said, is to receive \$2,692,000 during that same year.

In the second year of the three-year plan, there is a total of \$10,217,000 for primary highways, the Journal editor noted, and District 2 was allocated \$3,235,000, or nearly one-third of the total. District 3, during the second year, is scheduled to receive \$2,978,000 in projects.

In the third year of the priority list, District 3 (Albuquerque's District) is scheduled for \$3,475,000 in construction projects, with District 2 getting \$3,050,000 of the total of \$10,055,000 for primary road work.

Secondary road spending shows a different slant, the Journal said, with District 2 getting only two projects during the three-year period — one each for the first two years, and no secondary money scheduled to come into District 2 during the third year.

The Journal ended its article by saying Sudderth has said that the priority list is subject to change, but said it gives citizens of the state an idea of what to expect — in other words, Sudderth's district will receive a larger proportionate share of the constructions than its population, or highway mileage entitles it to receive.

To this inference, we take exception.

There are four principal sources of revenue to be allocated in any highway planning — Primary, Secondary, Urban and Interstate. Primary and Secondary funds are to be used on highways designated as primary and secondary, which are scattered all over the state. This fund is supposed to be 50 per cent federal funds, and 50 per cent state matching funds, but because of the vast amount of public domain lands in New Mexico, the federal government participates on a larger scale and it is more like 64 per cent federal and 36 per cent state funds.

The Urban money amounts to only about \$1,000,000 per year, must be spent inside city limits, includes both state and federal funds, but since it is limited as mentioned, is of little consequence in a state-wide highway program.

Interstate highway funds are for the purpose of constructing four-lane Interstate highways,

and we have three in the state — I-10, I-25, and I-40. For the calendar year 1965, a total of \$37,548,000 has been scheduled for construction in New Mexico. In 1966, the total is \$39,168,000; for 1967, \$39,599,000; for 1968, \$39,014,000; and for 1969 the total is \$39,825,000.

Interstate funds are supposed to be 90 per cent federal money and 10 per cent state matching funds. Again, due to the vast amount of public domain lands in New Mexico, federal participation is greater and a more accurate estimate is that Interstate funds are about 93.5 per cent federal and 6.5 per cent state funds.

We don't know just how the Journal could have overlooked this item in writing its article. We would guess it was simply an oversight. In each of the years mentioned, there is approximately four times as much money for Interstate highways scheduled than the total of the Primary funds.

And, also of importance is the fact that not one mile of Interstate highways are in District 2.

We can go along with the Journal's philosophy that money should be distributed on a percentage basis. They cried long and loud for a highway commissioner from Albuquerque, and now they have one. We hope he takes a broader look at the Highway Department spending than the Journal did, and that he gives some consideration to Interstate funds.

Now, let's take a percentage look, including the Interstate funds.

Since the State Highway Department's funds are set up on a fiscal year that begins July 1 and ends the following June 30, and the Interstate funds are on a calendar year basis, we cannot come up with perfectly accurate figures; but let's take a look at the projected spending of the Highway Department for the fiscal year which began only a few days ago, July 1, and those of the Interstate funds which are for the year 1965:

Interstate	\$37,548,000
Primary	\$10,261,000
Secondary	7,438,000
Total	\$55,247,000

From this total, District 2 has projects totalling \$5,021,000 or 9.05 per cent of the total to be spent on highways in the state. The Journal made it appear that Sudderth was seeing that nearly 50 per cent of the spending was being done in his district.

Let's look at the second of the three-year proposals:

Interstate	\$39,168,000
Primary	\$10,179,000
Secondary	\$7,715,000
Total	\$57,062,000

Of this huge sum of money, District 2 is scheduled to receive projects totalling \$4,065,000, or 7.17 per cent of the total. The Journal article would lead you to believe that Sudderth was spending about one-third of the funds in his district.

Let's look at the third year of the projection:

Of this, District 2 is scheduled to receive construction projects amounting to \$3,050,000 or 5.42 per cent of the total.

We don't like to see Commissioner Sudderth handled so roughly by the state's largest newspaper. We feel the full story should be told.

We would imagine that Albuquerque's commissioner will be fighting now for more money to be spent in his district, and if he doesn't he won't be worth his salt on the commission. Yet, the citizens of District 2 should know that Commissioner Sudderth is not hogging the money into his district in a disproportionate share.

In fact, we could ask the mule suggested by the Journal: Why is it that District 2, with approximately 25 per cent of the state's area, approximately 25 per cent of the population, and 26.8 per cent of the state's highway mileage, is getting only 9.5 per cent of the funds the first year of a three-year program; 7.17 per cent the following year, and only 5.42 per cent the third year?

## Recreation charges in 125 camping areas

Federal recreation agency officials today listed areas in New Mexico where entrance charges will be required this year.

The list of 125 areas includes all National Forest recreation areas for camping and picnicking; National Parks, Monuments, and Historic Sites; and Wildlife Refuges where entrance charges will be made.

Special fees may be charged for use of cabins, boats, well-developed camp, picnic, trailer facilities, and other services.

Many Federal areas in the State remain available for public use without charge. Under the new Land and Water Conservation Fund Act, charges are made only where there is investment in recreation facilities and where collection of fees is feasible.

Proceeds from the charges are channeled into the Land and Water Conservation Fund to provide additional State and Federal outdoor recreation opportu-

nities. The bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the Department of the Interior administers the Fund.

The entrance and special service fees apply to many Federal areas for the first time. However, a number of National Parks and other areas have been charging entrance fees for some years.

A new \$7 Federal Recreation/Conservation Sticker available this year will admit the holder and occupants of his car to all Federal recreation areas which require automobile entrance fees. The sticker will remain valid until March 31, 1966.

Persons not wishing to purchase the \$7 Sticker may pay one-day entrance fees. An individual area seasonal ticket is also available. This is valid only at a specific National Forest for which it is purchased until the end of the year. It is attractive to individuals who normally use only particular Federal area.

Planned conservation work consists of a livestock water well to provide a dependable source of water for cattle and sheep, steel storage tanks to provide for livestock water storage and plastic stock-water pipeline to transport stockwater from the well or storage to distant points in a pasture thus facilitating better grazing distribution of livestock. Cholla cactus and mesquite control are also part of the long range conservation plan. These structural and vegetative practices along with good grassland management will complete the conservation needs on the Cooper ranch.

Any landowner in Lincoln County desiring further information regarding the Great Plains Program is invited to visit the Soil Conservation Office in Capitan.

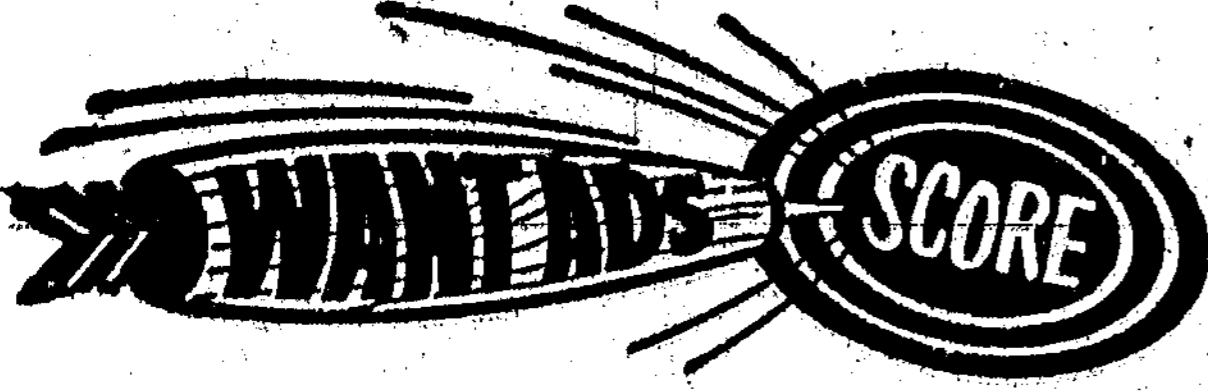

**Financial help is available to repair all community dams and ditches**

 Financial help is available to replace all community dams and ditches that were destroyed by the flood June 17, George Hastings from the Office of Emergency Planning outlined the aid available for repairing public facilities in which community ditches are included. A community ditch is any ditch used by two or more families. He outlined the six kinds of work eligible for emergency repairs of public facilities. They are: debris clearance from public right of ways, public health matters, which include water treatment and insect control, emergency repairs to streets and roads, community irrigation systems, public buildings and municipally owned electric and gas distribution systems.

The community irrigation systems were discussed by Peter I. Hayes, State Coordinator for Emergency Programs. He took a list of each community ditch in the area as reported by the people attending the meeting. In the near future a federal state team will appraise the damage done by the June 17th flood to each ditch system. An estimate of the cost of labor, material and equipment will be made at the time of the appraisal. This estimate will be used to allocate the money to repair each ditch system as it was before the flood. An initial allocation of \$800,000 has been made to New Mexico for emergency flood repairs.

A meeting of all community ditch right owners will be held Thursday, July 15, at 7:30 p.m. at the Hondo high school. At this time each ditch association will meet and select a ditch boss or majordomo as well as pass a resolution asking that the Soil Conservation Service be made the contractor for the flood repair work. These two things must be done before you are eligible for federal aid.

Also at the meeting, Mr. Herman McKibben, ASCS office manager, will explain other helps available under the Agriculture Conservation Program. A discussion of a Watershed Protection District will be included in the meeting. All ditch right owners are urged to attend this meeting.
