Ranchers remain unconvinced in jet-weather conference

The accent on news has a way of changing over night. What was hot news last Wednesday when it was hot and dry, dry, dry, is not quite so important now because rain has been falling all around (Read our area correspondence columns for weather accounts).

The United States Air Force at the Air Force Missile Development Center at Holloman was contacted three weeks ago when many ranchers of the area, generally along U. S. 54 Highway complained that jet planes were modifying local weather, causing local rain cloud-to dissipate. The USAF agreed to set up a meeting, date July 29, in Carrizozo.

The local sponsors were Rotarians and the Chamber of Commerce. Coming from Holloman were Lieut. Col. Norman E. Blomgren, Chief, Operations Division; Lt. Col. Jim Weldon; Col. Henry C. Godman, ret.; Capt. David Donley, staff meteorologist; and L. H. Cornett, Jr., director of information at Holloman.

The subject for discussion was, specifically, the effects jet flying have on precipitation.

By noon lunch time Thursday it was easy to see that the

meeting place would not hold all of the crowd, more tables were brought in, and several ate in the main dining room of the Four Winds. Rotarian President Vernon Petty introduced Col. Blomgren who outlined the number and kinds of planes flying off Holloman AFB.

The F100 Super Sabre, F101 used to test part for newer aircraft, F102 used for chasing missiles, F80 drone controlled from another plane, B57 high flying bomber, F4C supersonic plane 84 at Holloman ready for world-wide combat, C130 troop carrier, C131B used for aeromedical, C123 support plane.

Col. Blomgren stated that no cloud seeding was or had been done by planes flying off Holloman. He turned the meeting over to Capt. Donley, air-weather officer. Capt. Donley said something over an hour giving weather statistics of the area. He said, "We do recognize the problem". Also referred to top weather men of the Air Force as stating that jet flying had no effect on rainfall. Capt. Donley's best point in favor of this statement was that the energy of a jet was just a minute fraction of the energy developed by a thunderstorm or rain cloud, that jets might have some effect on cloud fragments but would not stop rainfall where there was sufficient energy in the clouds to produce rain.

The matter of Nucler in the air is important. New Mexico over-seeding for rainfall "purposely". The jets do add more, which could possibly amount to has plenty of this from natural poses, the area.

About two hours of meeting

time had elapsed by the time a question and answer session came around. The ranchers were ready with the questions. Mainly to the point that they had witnessed many times, and had made record of time and date, jet planes flying in and around rain clouds, the clouds dissipating shortly after.

Phil Harvey of El Paso, with ranching interest in this area said that an archeologist had told him this drought cycle was more severe and of longer duration than the ones that had driven Indians from the pueblos of this area.

Mark Sloan had made record of instances when jets seemed to him to modify weather by stopping possible rainfall. Mrs. Lee also had made record of such instances.

Willis Lovelace said that we got our rain on the days you boys stay home, like Sunday and the 4th of July. Dimmitt Bond said that we see the clouds start to build up, in the early summer, the jets come and they go away.

Col. Blomgren made it plain that low level jet training missions were a part of the job of being prepared. Carrizozo particularly is the approach area for many training missions.

The situation was discussed at much greater length than detailed here, neither side being convinced that they were wrong in their assumptions. Payton made the suggestion that some follow-up work be done, which might tend to prove whether jet flying in this area does tend to modify weather.

The meeting broke up around 4:00 p. m.

State pay is unequal, hiway dept. is fairest

SANTA FE — Soaring and disorganized salary increases have developed extreme inequities in the pay of statehouse officials.

Welfare Director Leo Murphy directs a staff of 1,067 people and administers a budget of \$38,351,000, and is paid \$12,500 a year.

Across the street Finance Director Caesar Sebastian makes \$17,500 and his assistants Louis Fernandez, Harry Wugalter and Ben Mason \$14,400 each.

WITT SHARES BOTTOM WITH LEO MURPHY

Atty. Gen. Boston Witt who shares with Murphy the relatively lowest pay in the statehouse, is head of the state legal department and directs the work of a professional staff of 44 assistant and special assistant attorneys general for pay of \$12,000 a year.

Over in the main building Bill Connell directs the Board of Educational Finance staff of five and draws \$20,500. His assistant, Bob Pringle gets \$13,000.

HIGH SALARY RATES IN MANY PLACES

Murphy's and Witt's salaries are set by law but there were no strings on the pay of many other officials working under Gov. Jack Campbell.

Carroll Lee switched from the oil gas accounting post in May to become director of automatic data processing going from \$14,400 to \$17,500.

John Flynn of the planning office was raised in July from \$11,040 to \$13,200.

John Hays of the public employees retirement board went from \$11,400 to \$12,600.

J. Bayes Williams of the employment security commission advanced from \$14,500 to \$15,500.

Bob Hoffman of the department of development was raised from \$12,000 to \$13,000.

The state personnel director, Harold Bibb, was advanced from \$11,400 to \$12,000.

Ladd Gordon, game department director, is up from \$12,600 to \$13,200.

STEVE REYNOLDS DRAWING \$18,000

When Max Gonzales with no

public administration experience came in at the first of the year as revenue commissioner he was set up at \$15,000 a year which was \$1,800 more than paid his experienced and successful predecessor, Charlip Brunacind.

State Engineer Steve Reynolds was advanced July 1 from \$14,500 to \$18,000.

During the past year Pete Porter, the oil conservation commission director, went from \$13,200 to \$14,400.

Investment Officer Bob Mead in little more than a year went from \$15,000 to \$18,500.

SIX COMMISSIONERS GIVEN INCREASES

July raises prescribed by the legislature advanced Public Service Commissioners Joe Bursey, Lee Chambard and Phil Lucero from \$10,200 to \$12,500.

Corporation Commissioners Murray Morgan, Columbus Ferguson and Floyd Cross from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

Insurance Superintendent Ralph Apodaca went from \$11,040 to \$12,000.

State Police Chief John Bradford who is provided with living quarters for his family went from \$12,180 to \$13,200.

HIGHWAY SYSTEM IS SUPERIOR

The state highway department is violating the law in ignoring the personnel rules but it has a much fairer and more orderly personnel operation than that conducted at the capitol.

Highway department salary rates are reviewed every few years for adjustment with what other states are paying and with the rates in private industry. Employees are placed in classifications in which they may advance with periodic step increases and without the extreme highs and lows that are found in the statehouse.

The department operated in July with a payroll of 2,884, which was 134 higher than June and 239 higher than July a year ago.

Bad accident at Nazarene camp

An accident at the Nazarene Church camp Monday took the life of Dr. Robert C. Gunstream of Albuquerque. The accident occurred about 11:45 a. m. when with several other ministers of the camp he was attempting to jack up a house that had fallen down the hillside due to the heavy rains in the area.

Dr. Gunstream was pinned under the building when it slipped. He was dead on arrival at the Ruidoso Hospital.

Dr. Gunstream, together with several others, including Rev. Whitney of Capitan, Rev. Harold Ray of El Paso, Jess Rains, camp caretaker, Rev. John Powers, Capitan and John Adams, were leveling the building back up. Several were under the house when it started to fall. All got to safety but Dr. Gunstream.

At the time of his death, Dr. Gunstream was district superintendent of the Nazarene Church. Funeral services will be Thursday at 10 a. m. in the Memorial Tabernacle named after him. Burial will be in Albuquerque.

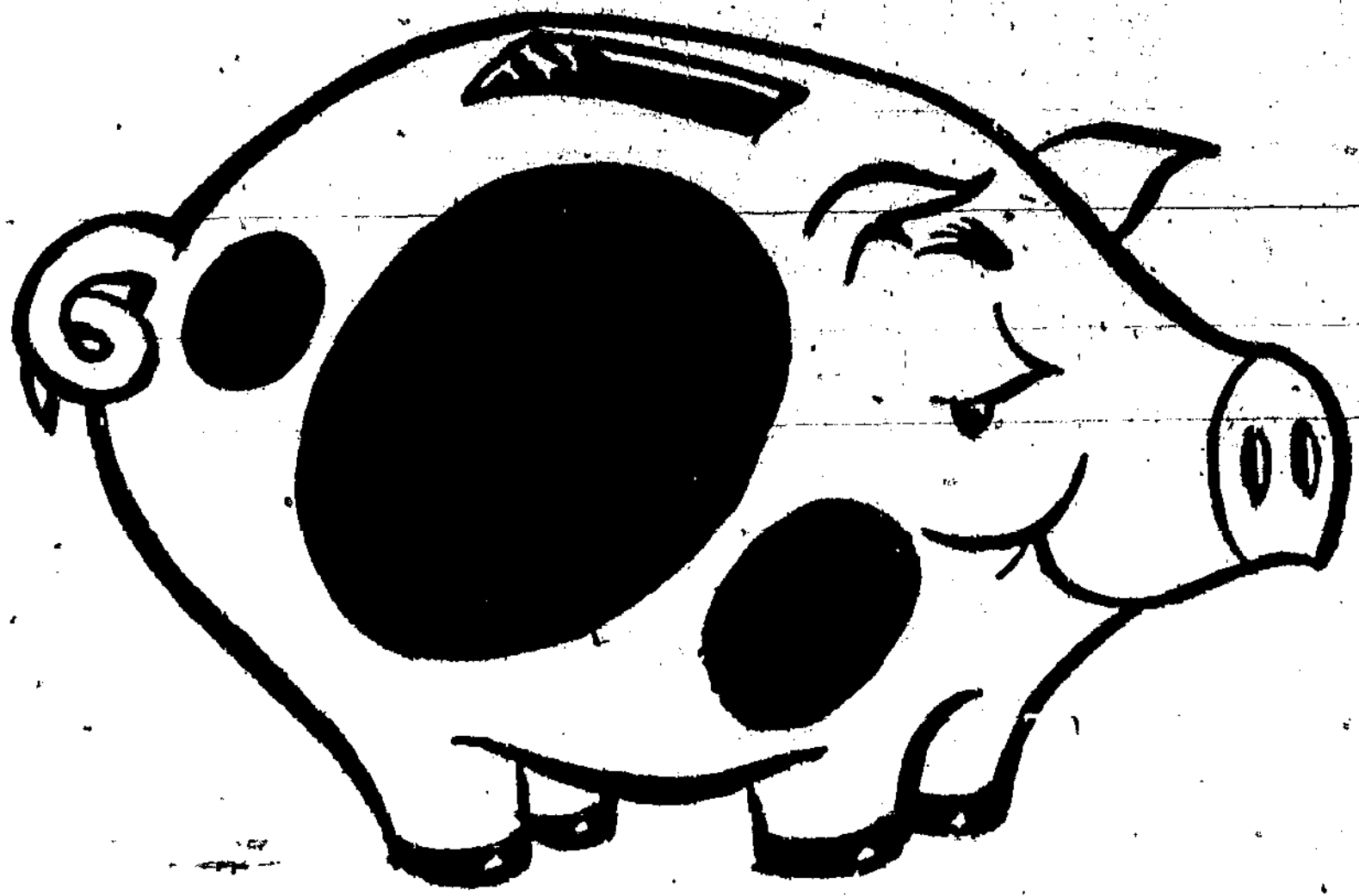

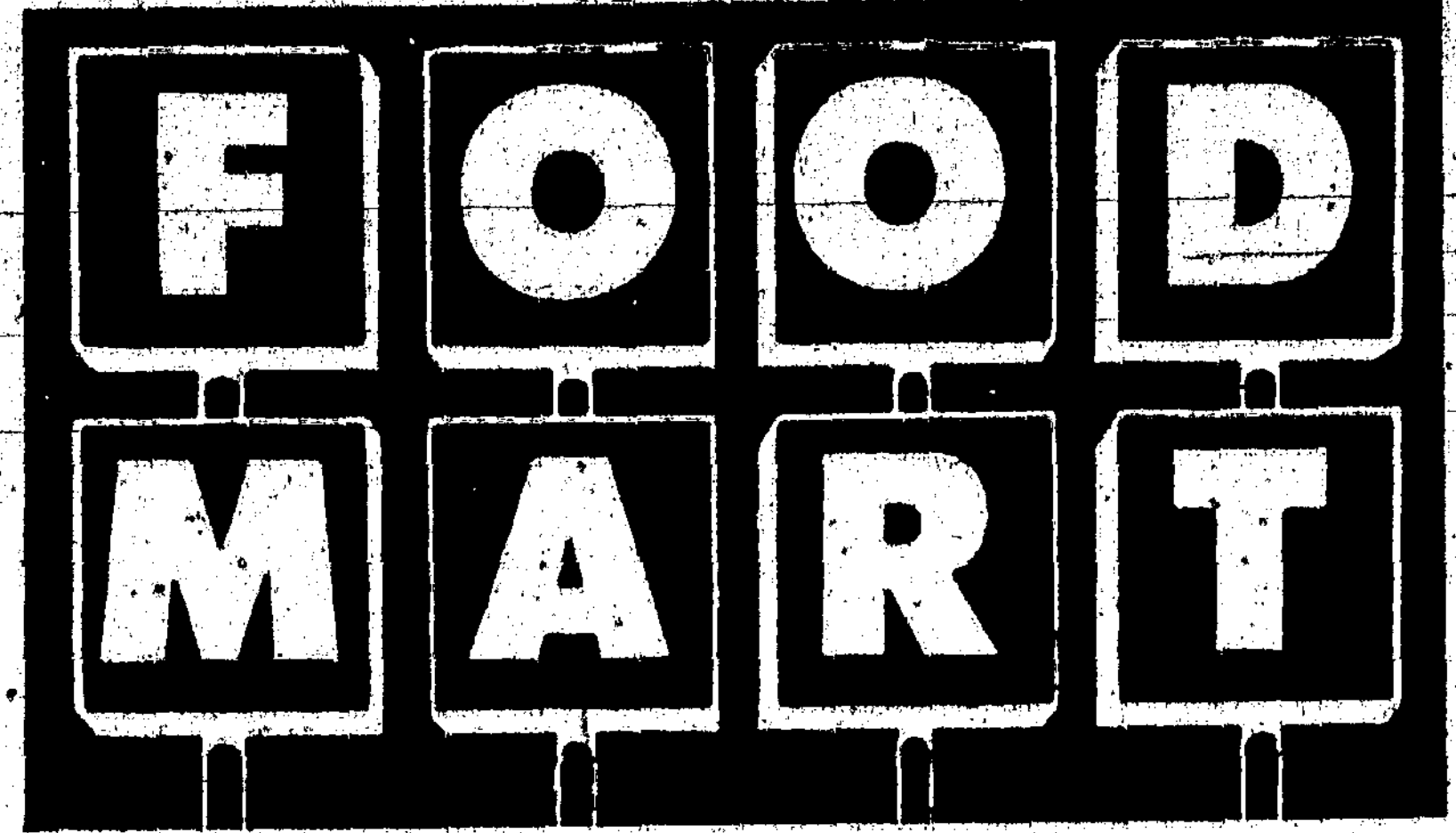

Recreation loans help land produce

Producing additional dollars on low-income or idle Chaves and Lincoln county farm land is being encouraged by a Farmers Home Administration supervised credit program to develop farm-based recreation enterprises. Mr. Richard T. Floyd, the agency's county supervisor with offices at Roswell, this week listed the many types of recreation enterprises financed by FHA loans in rural areas.

Chavez and Lincoln county farmers may apply for loans to finance construction of vacation cabins or other facilities such as ponds and lakes for boating and fishing, docks, vacation farms, riding stables, nature trails, picnic grounds, youth camps, travel-trailer parks, and shooting preserves.

"Farmers Home Administration is using its operating and farm ownership loan programs for financing recreation loans," Mr. Floyd explained. "Farmers can obtain a maximum of \$35,000 for operating expenses, including the operation costs of farm-based recreation enterprises and \$60,000 for a real estate program including the development of land and buildings for recreation purposes."

Individual Farmers Home Administration loans to farmers for recreation purposes not only help in boosting the borrowers net income, but raise the number conveniently located recreation facilities for city folks along with putting land not being needed for crops into income producing uses.

These loans carry a 5 percent interest rate on the unpaid principal. The repayment period on loans secured by real estate may not exceed 40 years, while that secured by chattels has a seven year limitation. Such credit is only extended to those who can't obtain it through normal lending channels.

Farmers Home Administration also makes loans to individual farmers and community groups for financing recreation facilities such as golf courses, swimming pools, tennis courts,

lakes and ponds. Complete information on loans to individual farmers and community groups for recreation purposes along with details about other Farmers Home Administration credit programs may be obtained from Mr. Floyd at his office. The office servicing both Chaves and Lincoln counties is located at 110 East 4th Street, Roswell, New Mexico, and the office days are Monday and Friday of each week.

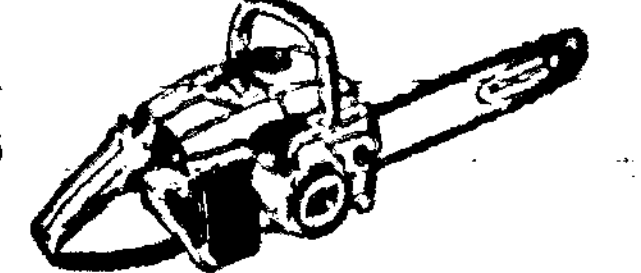
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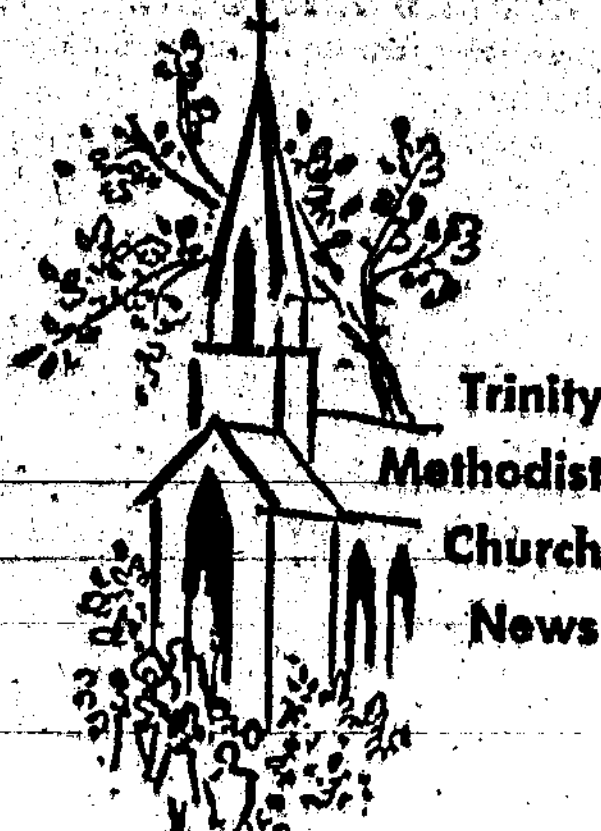

Food for August thinking!

Now that summer rains have doused much of Lincoln County, relieving pressure on the mind and pocketbook for the time being — maybe we can devote some thinking time to longer-range problems.

Do we want to live in a two-bit community or one "where the action is"?

We read that last quote in an advertisement of the Southern Railway System which invites industrial development along its lines in the South.

Most basic, and hardest point of all to get across to people, that our community will grow only as business (be it industrial or local store trade) in the area grows.

Dear Mr. Payton:
I read with interest this morning the news of which involved the jet-stream interference with moisture bearing clouds in the Lincoln County area.

You and the Ranchers in that area are right in assuming that jet planes are the cause of the dissipating of the moisture bearing clouds.

Why not consider proving the situation to those Meteorologists of whom are in doubt? It would be very, easy to prove your point that the interference is at least 90% the cause of which will naturally mean less rain that you probably direly need.

To prove this, construct a

plottin chamber of approximately 30 ft. in length, 10 ft. in width and 10 ft. in height which will of course give you 3000 cubic feet of space. Fill the chamber with supersaturated air and maintain the temperature to that on the outside of the chamber for approximately one hour. The next procedure would be to inject in approximate quantities the monoxide and other matter that is normally ejected and released by the jet planes. The result will very definitely be negative as far as causing the vapor that is suspended within the chamber to fall as precipitation.

Now comes the eye-opener: repeat the same procedure as mentioned above by squeezing all the monoxide and other gases out of the chamber and filling the chamber again with supersaturated air at the same temperature and let it set for approximately one hour, as above, then inject any number of gases that nature normally provides and watch the vapor density increase and fall as precipitation. An example of this gas ionized is the gas produced by nature in that the energy normally accompanying the sunlight will and always does release the negative ions that are stored in the soil and vegetation. This is called Condensation Nuclei and without it clouds will become as much as 400% supersaturated before condensation will occur. (Page 403 in the Van Nostrand Scientific Encyclopedia).

There has always been a certain amount of resentment of accepting New Scientific Fact and data pertaining to Cloud-Seeding because of lack of proof. I hope you will consider performing this proof to the so called Meteorologists of who are definitely lacking in initiative.

I feel that you would gain a milestone in proving this topic in this manner or any other similar manner to the Meteorologists and also doing your own area a big favor in it's bid for an improved economy.

My interest in this situation is one of admiration to you in which through the Associated Press your name has been used as it was. You are so right, there is a reason for everything as we all see it in everyday

living.
