Obstacle course rough for Demo governors

SANTA FE — Here's the obstacle course for Democrats running for governor:

First hurdle and the biggest one — The fall fight for Sen. Clint Anderson's approval.
Second Run — Race for the state convention next winter.
Third Run — Race for the primary election in May.
Fourth Run — Main event in November next year.

CLINT SCRATCHES JOHN KELLY

Anderson this week ruled John Kelly off the course and he never has admitted that John Burroughs of Portales was running.
Left in the starting gate were Bobby Mayfield of Dona Ana, Roy Walker of Clovis, Leo Murphy of Santa Fe.

Still running for our Clint's approval are Gene Lusk of Carlsbad and Bruce King of Santa Fe with Lusk way out in front and looking like a winner unless Sen. Joe Montoya blocks him out.

Montoya is understandably apprehensive about Lusk being governor and completing two terms at the same time that Montoya comes up for election in 1970, after Lusk tried to beat him for Congress in 1960.

STATE SENATORS FEEL JILTED

Anderson's control of the party is grating on the nerves of some Democratic state senators who think that he double crossed them in going against the Dirksen Amendment that could have preserved the state senate as it is and then heaped on another indignity by opposing their weighted vote plan, their last hope for staying in the legislature.

And that after they had been such good Jews in giving Anderson everything he wanted from the legislature including the repeal of the direct primary and the installation of the pre-primary convention system.

Some state senators are so bitter that they would like to call an extraordinary session of the legislature to repeal the pre-primary convention law in retaliation against Anderson.

PLOT REVENGE ON ANDERSON

The slap at Anderson is the thought behind the secret poll of legislators that is now being conducted on whether they would vote for repeal of the convention law.

They could call themselves into session by a petition of three-fifths of the members of each chamber, an authority that was granted the legislature in a constitutional amendment in 1948 which has never been used.

The complexities of such a legislative session, which would be unlimited in the subjects it could consider, make it's calling and organization extremely difficult.

SOME MEMBERS NOT ANSWERING

Some legislators while sympathetic with the movement to repeal the convention law are not cooperating in the secret poll in fear that it is not entirely secret.

The poll is being conducted by the Legislative Council Service at the request of an unidentified legislator and members are not required to sign their names in answering if they are for or against repealing the convention law in the regular session of the legislature that meets next January.

The January session is limited in what it may consider and could take up the convention

matter only at the request of Gov. Jack Campbell, and he's not inclined to make such a request.

ORTIZ ASKS OPINION ON STATE CARS

State Sen. Joe Ortiz y Pino of Santa Fe has asked Atty. Gen. Boston Witt if it is legal for Revenue Commissioner Max Gonzales and Deputy Commissioner Jerry Brown to operate state cars that are not marked as state-owned and that do not bear official license plates.

The state seems to require the marking and the plates and the governor has directed that all state cars be marked but Gonzales and Brown said that they did not want their 1965 Fords recognized as official vehicles when they are on investigative trips in the field.

PENSIONS, PAY AND BUSINESS

The Santa Fe senator is also working on a bill to ban legislators from doing business with the state.

He notes that the law-makers have voted themselves pensions that will run around \$2,000 a year for a dozen or so old-timers, and that they are asking for \$2,400 a year in addition to their \$20 a day pay while in session and should be willing to give up doing business with the state.

An old law forbids legislators taking state jobs but does not restrict their business activity in the statehouse. Only a few members are involved, Sen. Jim Patton of Las Cruces in the office furniture business, Sen. Bill Wheatley of Clayton, automobiles, Rep. Larry Goodell of Roswell, insurance.

Principal Jack Mayfield at Capitan said Tuesday their high school enrollment was 121 after a week of school.

Capitan school will be out September 6, Labor Day, and again on September 10, the Lincoln County Fair.

The Capitan Tigers go to Cloudercroft Saturday to open their football season.

On September 10 Estancia (last to Vaughn 13-7 Aug. 23) comes to Capitan. On September 11 the Tiger Bees will play Ruidoso, game starting at 7:30, on the Capitan field.

The Carlos Powell Engineering Co. of Santa Fe has completed a study that shows bringing natural gas into Capitan from El Paso Natural Gas Co. lines 28 miles to the northeast, from Capitan the distribution line would go to the Angus-Alto area (exact point undetermined) and a Carrizozo tie-in would be made at about the top of Three-mile Hill southwest of Capitan.

It is expected that a Ruidoso tie-in would be made in the Angus-Alto area.

To accomplish this construction and service work it is proposed that a Capitan - Carrizozo Gas Users Association be formed. There will be a meeting tonight for preliminary planning and another meeting on September 13 when organization should be complete.

The Association can issue revenue bonds, which in effect permits the gas company to pay for itself. Bond total is figured around \$750,000, money coming from a Federal Agency, interest about 4.5%.

Bert Cheney of Capitan is chairman of the committee appointed by Mayors Gerald Dean and Vernon Petty to perfect the organization. Jete Voss of Carrizozo is vice chairman. Ray Provine, secretary; Valton Hall, Fred English and Albert Roberts, members.

Use of natural gas is expected to be about one-third cheaper than LP gas.

The Town of Ruidoso voted to give a gas franchise to a private individual last year and can not join the gas association, however the Town of Ruidoso can buy gas from the association and is expected to do so.

The exact area that would be served by the gas users association is a matter to be determined by the Federal Utility Commission.

A. A. Hatchell has fatal heart attack

Sunday at 11 A. M. Mr. A. A. Hatchell of Albuquerque had a fatal heart attack while he and two other Albuquerque men, Russell Stephenson and George Murphy, were building a fence in the Mobley subdivision south of Capitan. Mr. Hatchell had just unrolled the wire when he complained of being short of breath and fell to the ground. He was taken to the Ruidoso hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. A coroner's jury was empaneled and their verdict was dead of probable heart attack.

A traffic accident at the corner of Aspen St and Highway 380 about 9:15 Monday evening involved Pauline Pacheco, of Alamogordo who hit a 59 Thunderbird driven by Nazario Zamora, then left the scene of the accident. Her car, a 54 Pontiac Station Wagon, belonging to Leon Aragon of Roswell was later located in the alley behind Vidaurri's store. She was charged with DWI, leaving the scene of an accident and driving without a driver's license. She was being held in jail until her appearance in JP court. The owner of the car was later arrested and charged with drunkenness.

Exclusive club open at Corona

Corona Cardinal coaches Jess Guthrie and Warren Spalding are getting their team ready for the opening game at Mountair this Friday and nothing to do but go in this game blind. Mountair has a new coach, six seniors on their eligibility list and that is about all the Corona coaches know about their opponent.

A new club for membership at Corona, just a little on the exclusive side. Any Corona football player who makes 50 individual tackles is eligible, or two assists will count as one tackle. There will be individual honors for each boy who makes the club.

Coach Guthrie said his team would do what the defense will let us do, if we can't run we'll pass. They will be running from a Wing T with Richard Herjol, a junior, the quarterback.

The probable starting lineup ought to weigh in averaging 145 pounds, the squad ranges 100 to 218 pounder. They are showing lots of hustle and attitude is fine, said Guthrie. Coach Melvin Romero at Capitan is well off for experience if not for size at the start of the 1965 football season. The Tigers probable starting lineup will include eight seniors and three juniors.

At QB will be Billy LaMay who likes to run and throws well, filled the QB spot last year. At FB will be William Herrera 170 who made all-state last year and is the Tiger's best ground gainer. Tailback Benny Rummels 150 was out with injuries the first part of last season but looked good the last few games. Flankerback Isidro Parake 140 played and last year, has good speed, the team's best blocker, and also a good receiver.

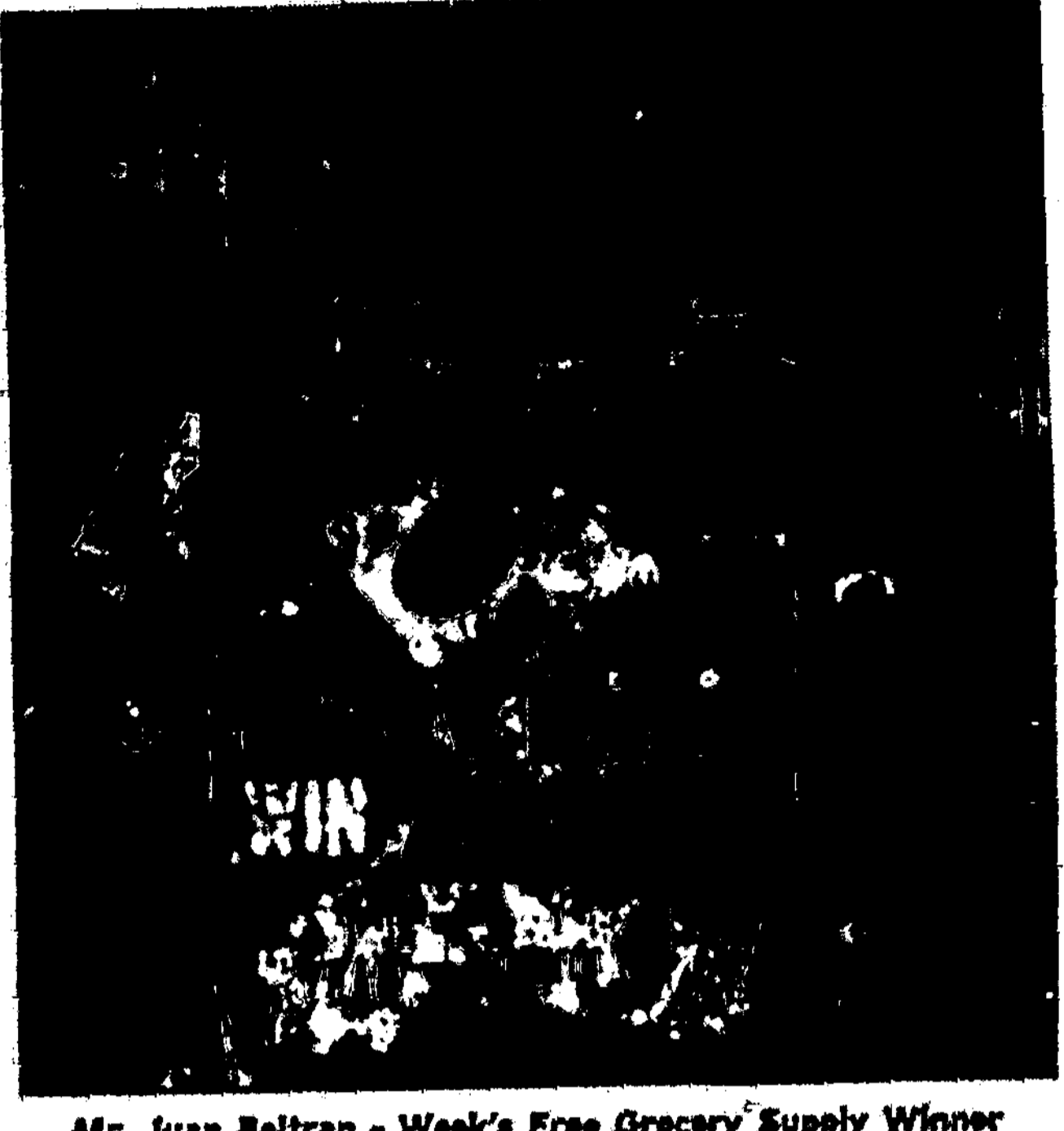

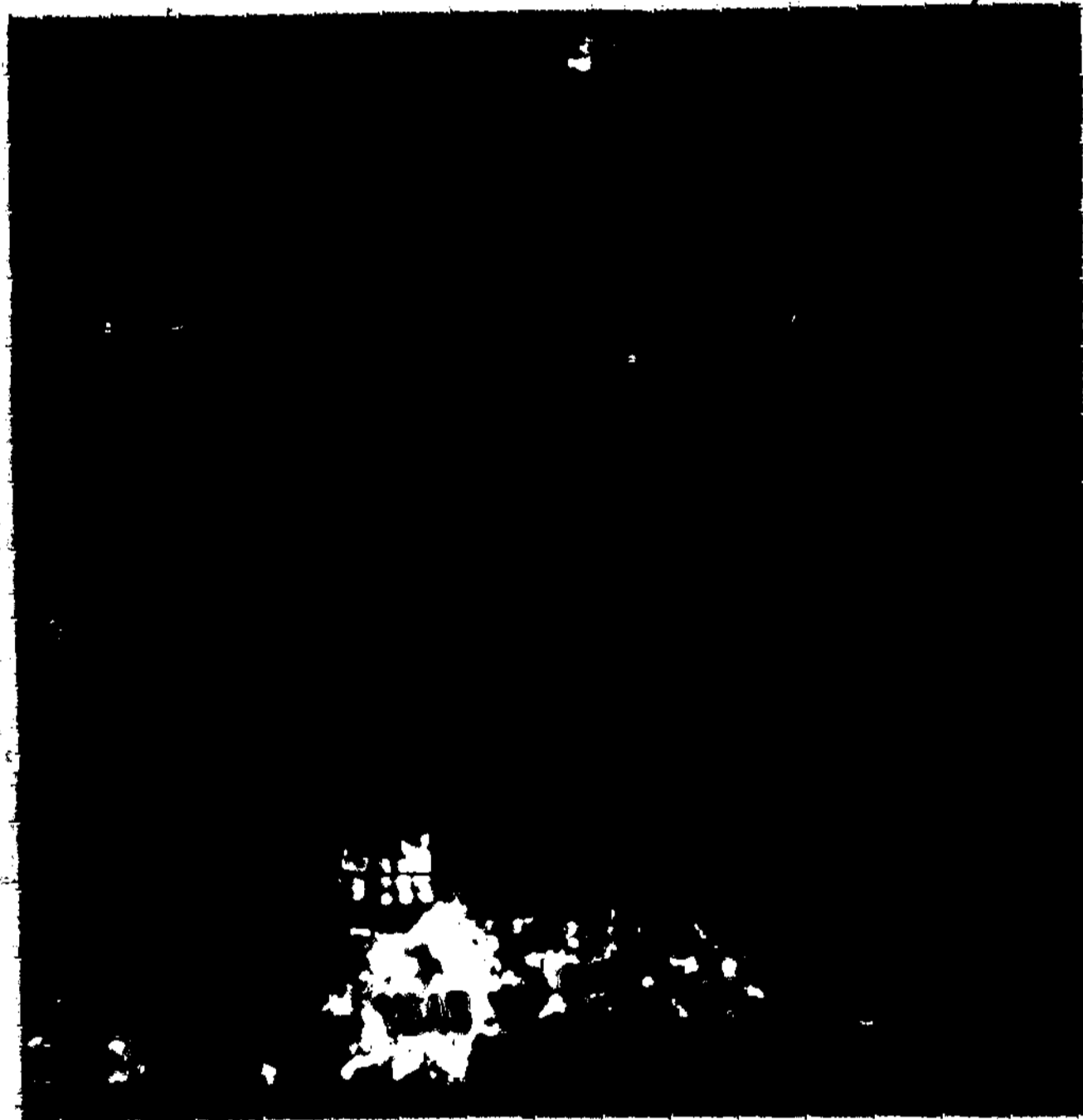

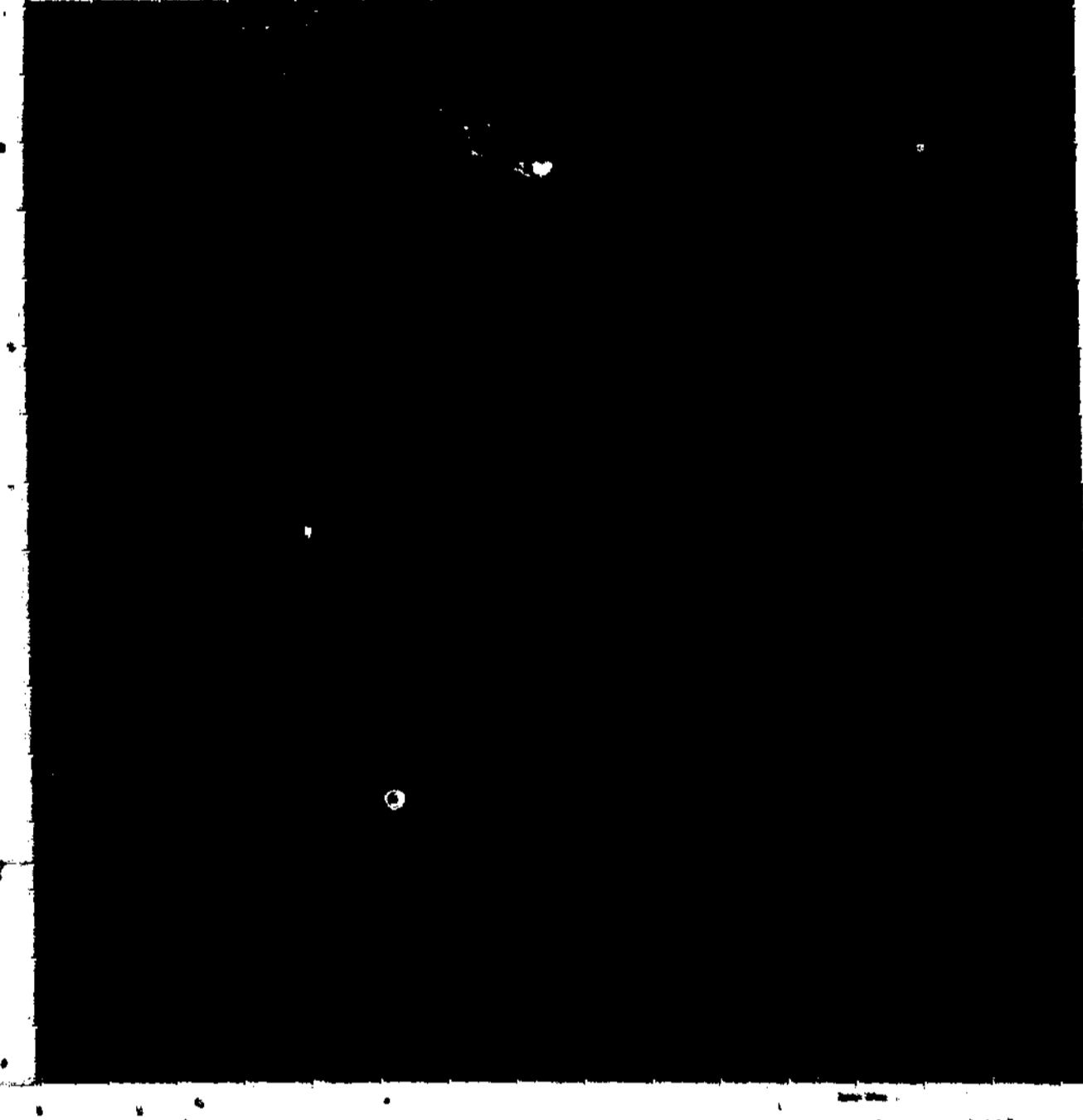

"A page for independent thought"

Proud of our gals

The Woman's Club has done it again, something the men talked about for years and never quite accomplished — through their ramrodding, the Town of Carrizozo can now boast of an industrial development charter.

One step at a time is the way they work, and never quit. What if we don't completely agree with all their actions, these gals are taking the place of the youngsters with vim and vigor who leave the area following graduation each year. We're mighty proud of them.

An industrial lesson

The local newspaper being the only manufacturing industry in the community (so classified by the Federal Government) actively engaged in turning raw products (paper, ink) into finished pieces of reading and advertising material, the publisher feels he can speak on the subject of industry with some authority.

Our credentials go beyond just running our own industry. We spent a couple of years working in a large manufacturing plant and have been around manufacturing industries for years, and no further back than Tuesday of this week were interviewing a man with problems — in industry.

The lesson is this — Carrizozo now has an industrial charter, we all have hopes that some good will come from this charter. Both caution and patience are needed for fulfillment of this charter.

The man we talked to Tuesday had problems of getting skilled help to do his work. We have the same problems in our shop, to the point that we train our own. Delivery of the local fair book was late because we were in the process of training new help.

The other guy maybe can be late, too, delivering his merchandise but his customers may not be so patient. We also have problems of faulty work, which causes us to "make good" on occasions at our expense. The other guy has these same prob-

lems but his merchandise is being shipped all over the country, and the world. His product has got to be right when it comes out of the plant.

In short — there are certain types of industry that will not fit our area. We do not have skilled machinists in this area, and it would not even be true to say that we have much help available. Nick Vega is building a new house and no help is available to do that sort of work . . . where is industrial manpower coming from.

We are only looking on the dark side here, the many good things about our area are in another editorial or another chapter. We hope our industrial people do not get discouraged and stay with their project long enough to see some results, but during this period of looking and waiting they need to size up the local manpower situation and be sure the industry they invite fits the local situation.

Man or woman power can be trained, or could be brought in if new housing were constructed. Both of these items are problems that have to be faced.

It is not straining the truth to say that industry is available right here and now if we had, or could get, the skilled labor. So ends the lesson. We want industry, because we want more jobs in our community — we also believe it can be done, but not as easy as signing the charter.

The quality of life

Personal relations in Lincoln County are pretty much an eye-ball to eye-ball or face-to-face sort of affair which develops a quality of life that is foreign to a majority of people in this country.

When strangers ask, "What do you see in this dry, desert country," or "Why do you like Lincoln County" we can easily answer that we prefer the climate here, this altitude suits us best, our nights are cool, our mountains beautiful, the people friendly, and lots of open space around. All of these things are true and yet they don't quite get to the root value of living in this area.

This value stems from the fact that we exist on a person-to-person basis. Our county is big, but with few enough people and small towns that people are called Pete, John, Mabel or Liz and we know our neighbors horses and dogs by their given names.

A man named Chesterton is given credit for the thought that a man can make only one great discovery, namely, that there are other persons in the world besides himself.

Arnold Boyce once spoke of being in the navy, on a ship with 3499 other sailors, said he wouldn't know the fellows fifty feet down the hall. Living in

one large town, only one in our experience, we didn't even know the people on the corners of the block we were in. You don't discover much about people under such conditions.

Some people cover up the fact that they do not really care about people, they gush and palaver without ever getting to the core of personal relationship. Other people are so full of their own ideas they do not have room in their existence for other people and so miss the human side of living. We have a few such types here, but not many.

There was a time in our life when, as a part of newspaper policy, we opposed our local community supporting any national fund or charity drive because all they did was raise money nothing was done for the quality of life.

Riots in our own country, wars and strife in many foreign countries, testify to the fact that we are living in an impersonal world, a kind of living where thoughts of other people are not well understood or given much consideration.

For a few decades Lincoln County people will be favored with the wonderful existence they now enjoy . . . policies of state and population growth will continue to cut in

But today is a wonderful day. Guess we'll go down the street and see what Arrell, Don and Welcolm are thinking about.

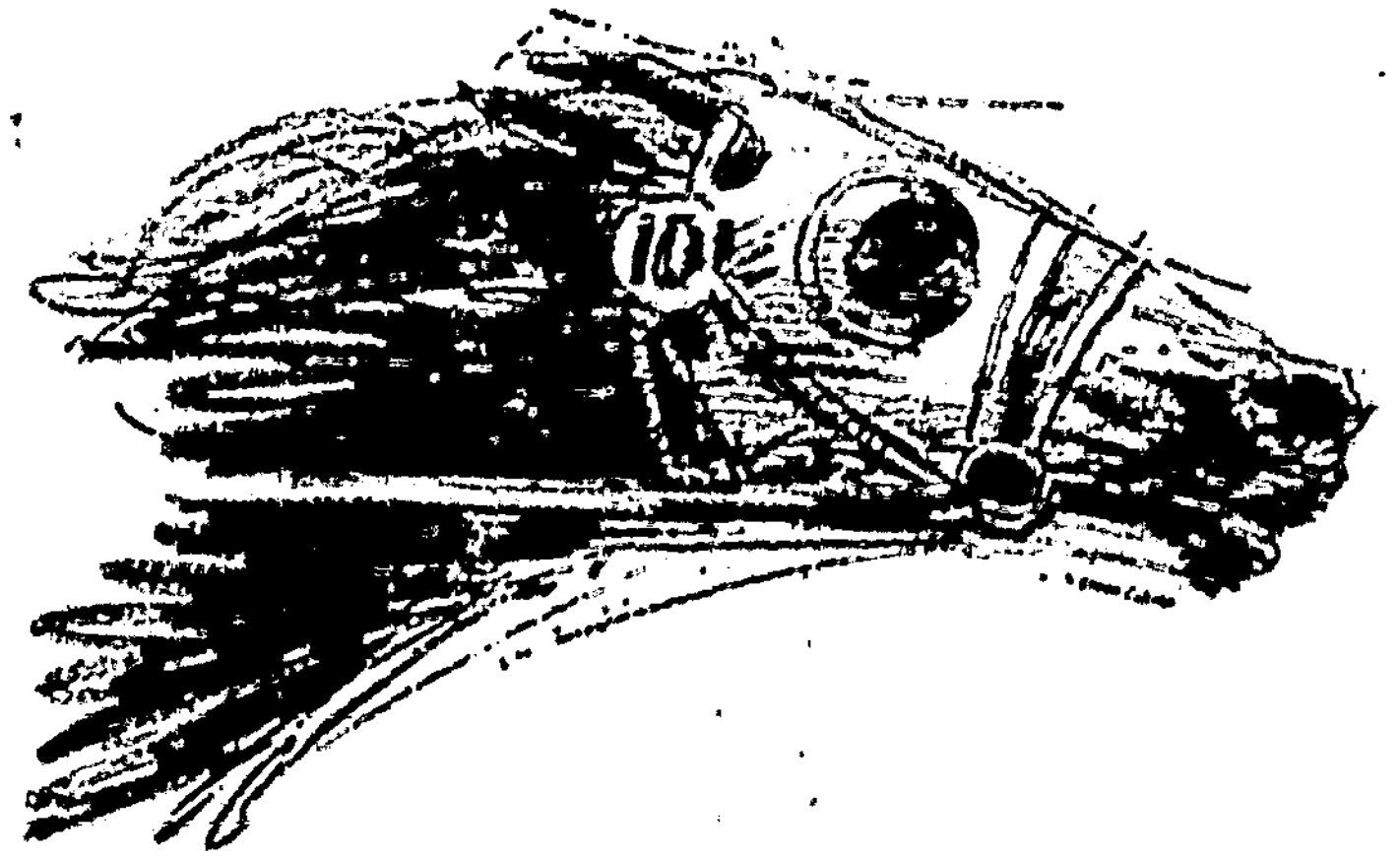

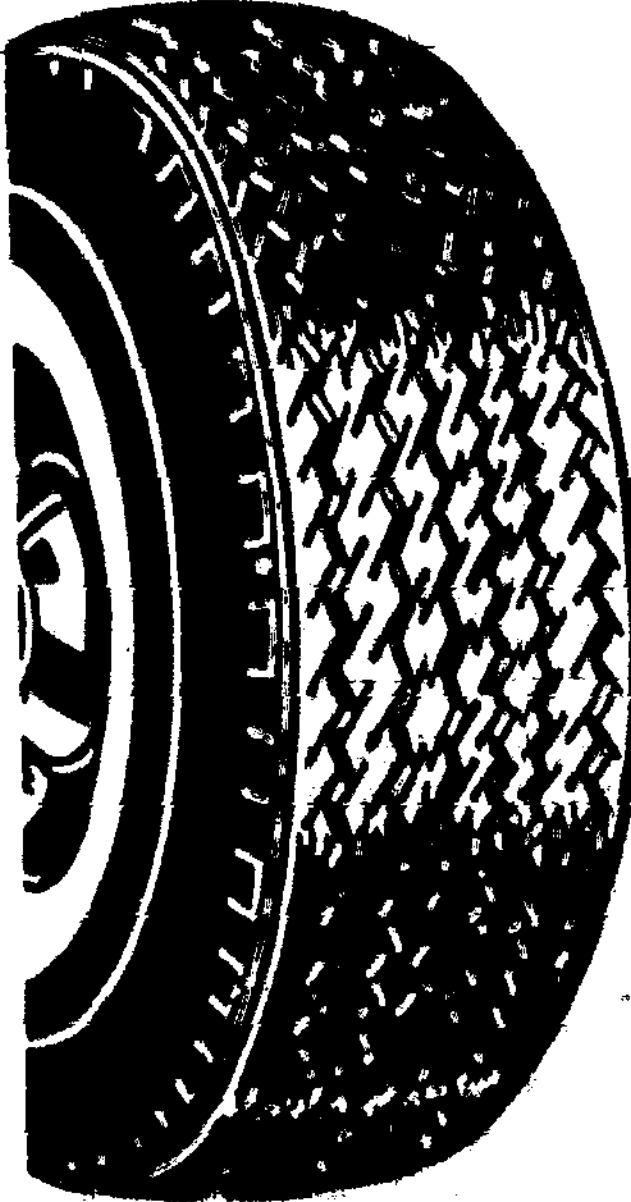

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LEGAL NOTICE

Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the Special Session, September 28, 1965, the State of New Mexico.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each day's attendance during each session, and ten cents (\$0.10) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article IV of this Constitution, and in addition, two hundred dollars (\$200) a month for each month he is a member of the legislature."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE SALE OF INTEREST BEARING NOTES OR SECURITIES FOR LESS THAN THEIR ACQUISITION COST, AND TO REINVEST THE PROCEEDS IN HIGHER-YIELDING SECURITIES IN ORDER TO REALIZE INCREASED INCOME TO THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING THE STATE INVESTMENT COUNCIL TO INVEST NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PERCENT OF THE PERMANENT FUNDS IN CORPORATE SECURITIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing notes of securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state.

"The state investment officer, in order to realize increased income, may, with the approval of the state investment council, sell interest bearing notes of securities at less than their original acquisition cost, providing the proceeds are immediately reinvested in sufficiently higher yielding interest bearing notes or securities, to provide for a portion of the increased interest income to be amortized over the life of the new investment which will restore to the corpus of the fund the amount of the capital loss realized on the sale of the original investment.

"In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall exercise the judgement and care under the circumstances then prevailing which businessmen of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, not more than fifty per cent of the permanent school fund or other permanent fund, shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds nor shall more than ten per cent of the voting stock of a corporation be held; and provided further, stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of business incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten consecutive years or longer immediately upon a national stock exchange."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO BORROW MONEY FOR REMODELING AND MAKING ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS OR IMPROVING SCHOOL GROUNDS, OR ANY COMBINATION OF THESE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No school district shall borrow money except for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, and in such cases only when the proposition to create the debt has been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors of the district as are owners of real estate within the school district and a majority of those voting on the question have voted in favor of creating such debt. No school district shall ever become indebted in an amount exceeding six percent on the assessed valuation of the taxable property within the school district as shown by the preceding general assessment.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION TO ARTICLE 4 TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE BY LAW FOR THE WEIGHTING OF LEGISLATIVE VOTES FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECURING TO THE PEOPLE OF NEW MEXICO EQUAL PROTECTION OF THE LAWS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4 of the constitution of New Mexico by the addition of a new section to read:

"Notwithstanding any provisions of this constitution to the contrary, the legislature may provide by law for the weighting of the votes of the members of the state senate on matters coming before that body, in such manner that equal protection of the laws is secured to the people of this state."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6, SECTIONS 1 AND 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO AND ADDING NEW SECTIONS THERETO; CREATING A COURT OF APPEALS AND DEFINING JURISDICTION OF APPELLATE COURTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in the senate when sitting as a court of impeachment, a supreme court, a court of appeals, district courts, probate courts, justices of the peace and such courts inferior to the district courts as may be established by law from time to time in any county or municipality of the state, including juvenile courts."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Appeals from a judgement of the district court imposing a sentence of death or life imprisonment shall be taken directly to the supreme court. In all other cases criminal and civil, the supreme court shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law; provided that an aggrieved party shall have an absolute right to one appeal."

Section 3. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall consist of not less than three judges whose qualifications shall be the same as those of justices of the supreme court and whose compensation and election for terms of eight years shall be as provided by law, except that an initial term may be prescribed by law for less than eight years to provide maximum continuity.

A vacancy in the office of judge of the court of appeals shall be filled by appointment of the governor for a period provided by law. Three judges of the court of appeals shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and a majority of those participating must concur in any judgment of the court.

When necessary, the chief justice of the supreme court may designate any justice of the supreme court, or any district judge of the state, to act as a judge of the court of appeals, and he may designate any judge of the court of appeals to hold court in any district, or to act as a justice of the supreme court."

Section 4. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall have no original jurisdiction. It may be authorized by law to review directly decisions of administrative agencies of the state, and it may be authorized by rules of the supreme court to issue all writs necessary or appropriate in aid of its appellate jurisdiction. In all other cases, it shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law."

Section 5. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4 OF THE CONSTITUTION BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION 42 PROVIDING FOR AN AUDITOR TO BE APPOINTED AS PRESCRIBED BY LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 42 to read:

Section 42. A legislative auditor shall be appointed as prescribed by law. The legislative auditor's duties shall be prescribed by law.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING THE REPEAL OF ARTICLE 19, SECTION 5 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO WHICH PROVIDES THAT ARTICLE 19, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO CANNOT BE ALTERED EXCEPT BY A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to repeal Article 19, Section 5 of the constitution of New Mexico.

Section 2. The repeal proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 8

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 16 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL DE NOVO IN DISTRICT COURTS UPON APPEALS FROM DECISIONS, ACTS OR REFUSALS TO ACT OF ANY STATE EXECUTIVE ON MATTERS RELATING TO WATER RIGHTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 16 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new section to read:

In any appeal to any district court from the decision, act, of any state executive in matters relating to water rights, the proceeding upon appeal shall be de novo."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.
