## Labor Day accidents minor over county

State Policeman Frank Knoblock told the News (Wednesday) that traffic accidents in the Carrizozo area were minor and considering the amount of traffic over the weekend it was a very good record.

A Ford driven by Juanell Davis going east on 5th Street collided with a '63 Olds driven by Ann Millegan who was going south on F Avenue. No extensive damage was done to either car and no citation was issued, as this was an unmarked intersection.

The only other accident was Monday night miles east of Zozo on the Nogal turnoff. A Ford driven by Wilbert Claxton of Albuquerque was run into from the rear by Bill Melton of Las Vegas driving a T-bird. About \$300 damage to each car. A citation for following too closely was issued to Melton.

Ruidoso reported six relatively minor traffic accidents over the weekend.

## Progress being made at boys camp

### Bill Hall ruins glasses, reputation, ribs, disposition in pratfall in Zozo

Supt. Bill Hall of Corona had a disastrous experience coming out of the Lincoln County News office last Wednesday. If any town officials had been handy at the time they would have received the complete book on condition of town streets.

Word from innocent bystanders is that Hall said nothing, just laid there in the street and thought.

Supt. Hall was in the office on a short errand and he stepped off the curb he stuck his foot in a chuck hole which upset his equilibrium, he fell

hitting the side of his head on the pavement.

According to first hand testimony taken from Supt. Hall he ruined several ribs to the point he can't eat, skinned his hand to the point he can't write, tore his Sunday pants so bad he can't go to church, wrecked his glasses so he can't keep school, and had such a headache he couldn't get his hat on for a week.

Speaking for the News, the Town of Carrizozo, and other institutions affected by this disaster — it couldn't have happened to a nicer guy.

A number of people were invited guests at Sierra Blanca Forestry Camp recently and all of these guests seemed impressed with the good work performed by Jack Schuster, director of the camp, and his staff.

One of the reasons for the special occasion was a gift of \$1,500 from Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer, which money will be used in the crafts and arts department. This camp is state supported and Mr. Schuster said under such conditions they do not solicit money but that the gift was certainly welcome. It will provide materials that would not otherwise be available.

This camp started largely on the suggestion of Howard Lench, executive secretary of the N. M. Council on Crime and Delinquency. Boys at Springer Boys School who have no serious discipline problems, the top of the crop you might say,

are transferred to Sierra Blanca Camp.

Things were rough at the start when there was only one building, the boys were eating and sleeping at Ft. Stanton TB Hospital, and work was being done to remodel and make liveable the buildings brought in from Moriarty and set down at the Boys Camp.

The boys were doing much of the work, a much slower process that does a lot for the boys according to Mr. Schuster. He says that they see more change in boys who do something for themselves. It's this sort of situation. Let some boy get a clean wall dirty, he gets harsh talk from the boy who did the paint job. Same is true of all the work done at the camp.

Only one discipline problem has developed in the months the camp has been in operation, and this time several boys were sent back to Springer. Sierra Blanca Forestry Camp is not operated on a prison basis at all, if the boys don't want to work and learn they have no place in this camp.

Their total budget last year was \$140,000, much of which went for construction. This year the budget will be about the same but not so much of the money will have to be spent on construction. Only one building at the camp has not been worked over, though some others are incomplete.

Another problem of the camp is water. From the start they have been getting water from Ft. Stanton but come day a storage tank should be installed along with filtration equipment so the Boys Camp will not be dependent on Ft. Stanton for its water.

Boys at the camp have a full schedule planned for them. Forestry work, under the supervision of the Forest Service, occupies much of their time. Right now boys are helping build a reservoir on top of Capitan Mountain. They also build coil erosion dams. Starting time is 7:00 a.m. in the morning until 4:00 p.m. five days a week. School classes are held in the evening and on Saturday. Teachers from Capitan supplement the camp staff with the Saturday classes. This schedule does not leave much time for recreation or work passes.

In recent months the staff has been filled out. Schuster is director. Counselors are: Ronnie Moore of Roswell, Lucio Zamora of Hondo, Duane Book-out of Las Cruces, Joe Males of Roswell, Virgil Loomis of Capitan and Hopy Gutierrez of Carrizozo.

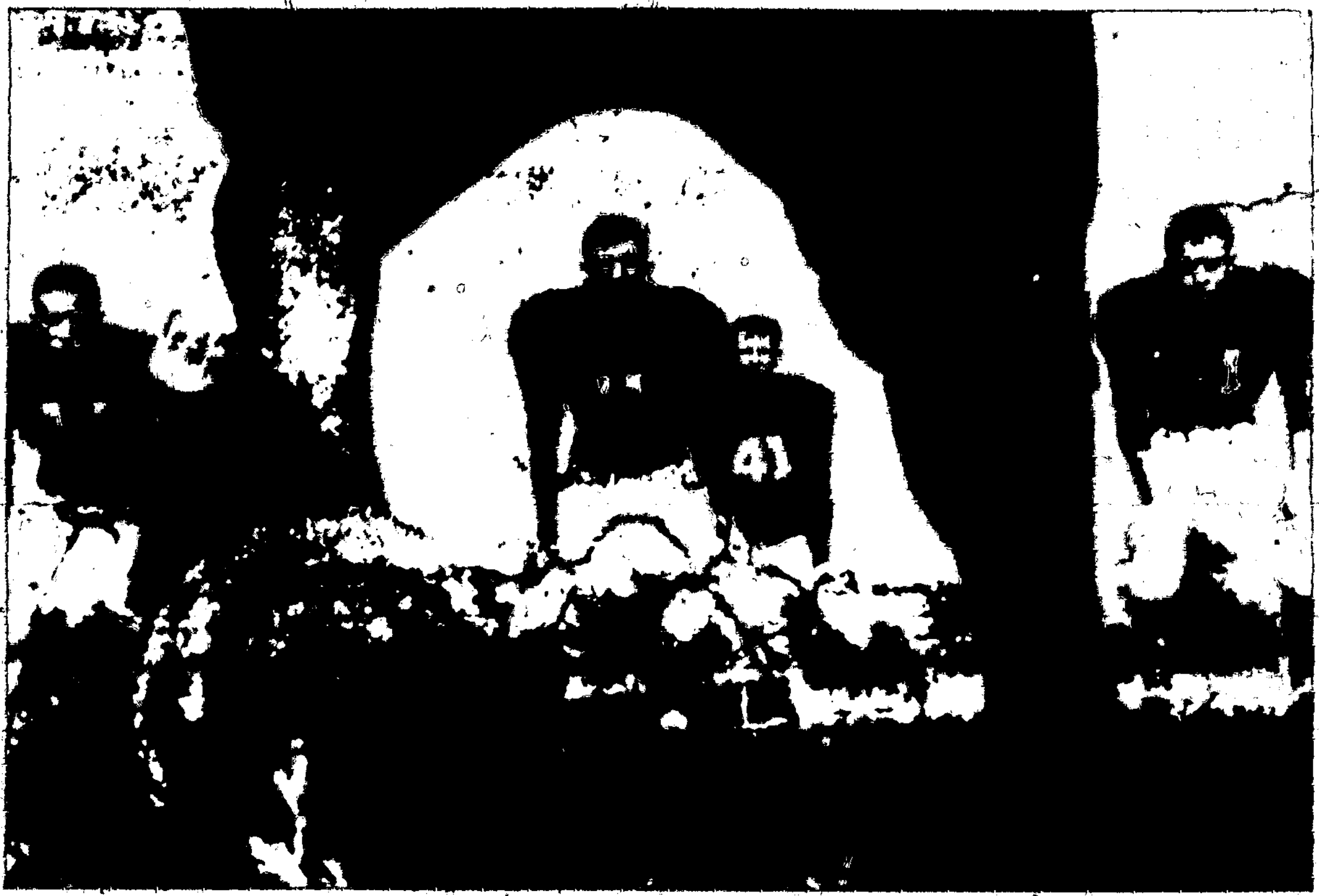

David Davis is camp cook. Their kitchen is well equipped, large roomy dining room and is kept real clean. The meal served to the invited guests was a Sunday dinner, somewhat better than normal, but not much. It was a real tribute for Mr. Davis the cook.

Gilbert Chavez of Capitan is camp clerk. Bill Steinke is maintenance and construction supervisor, Pete Dixon works as a counselor in the summer. It may seem that the staff is (Continued on page four)

Southern Pacific announced plans today to discontinue a pair of mail trains.

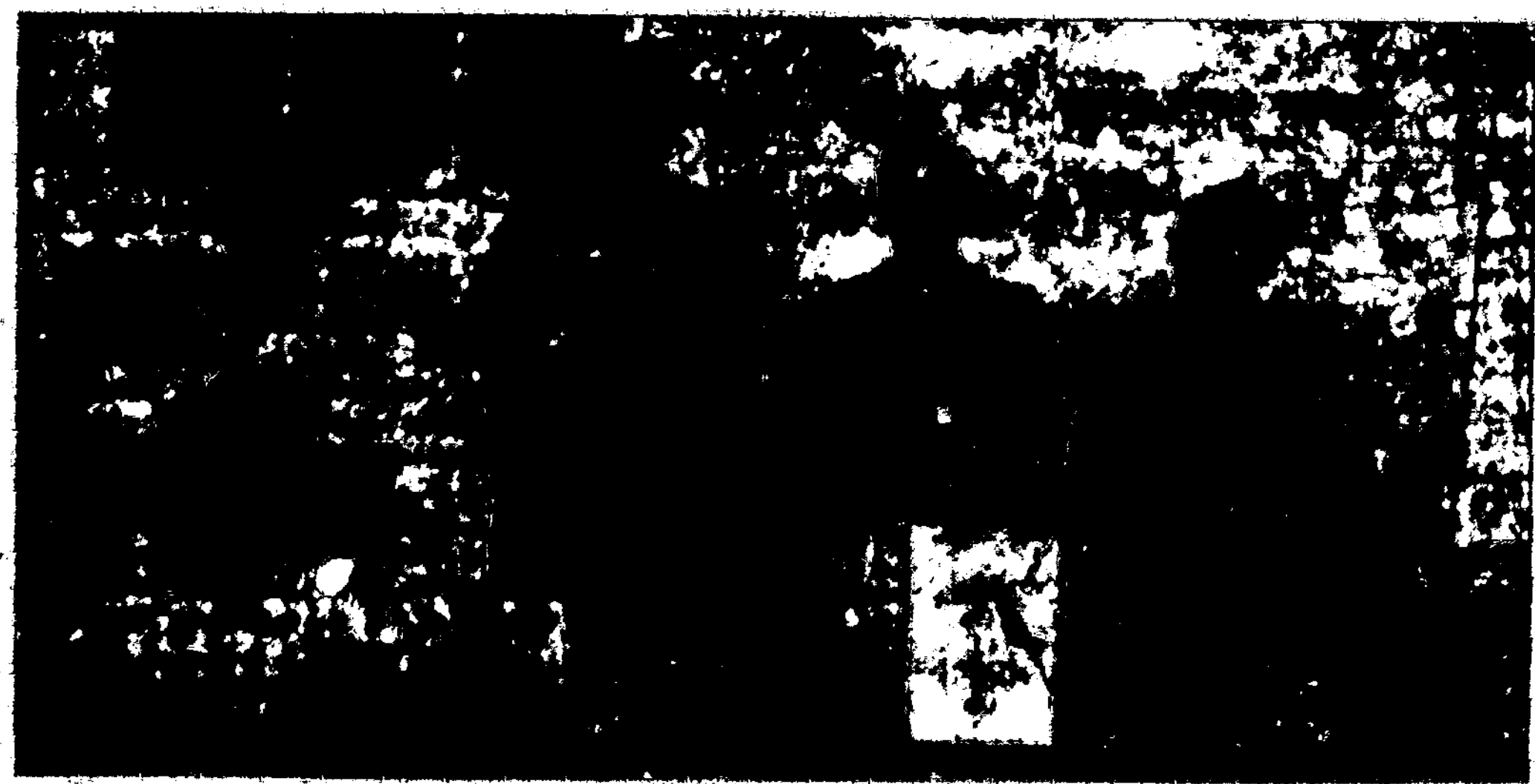

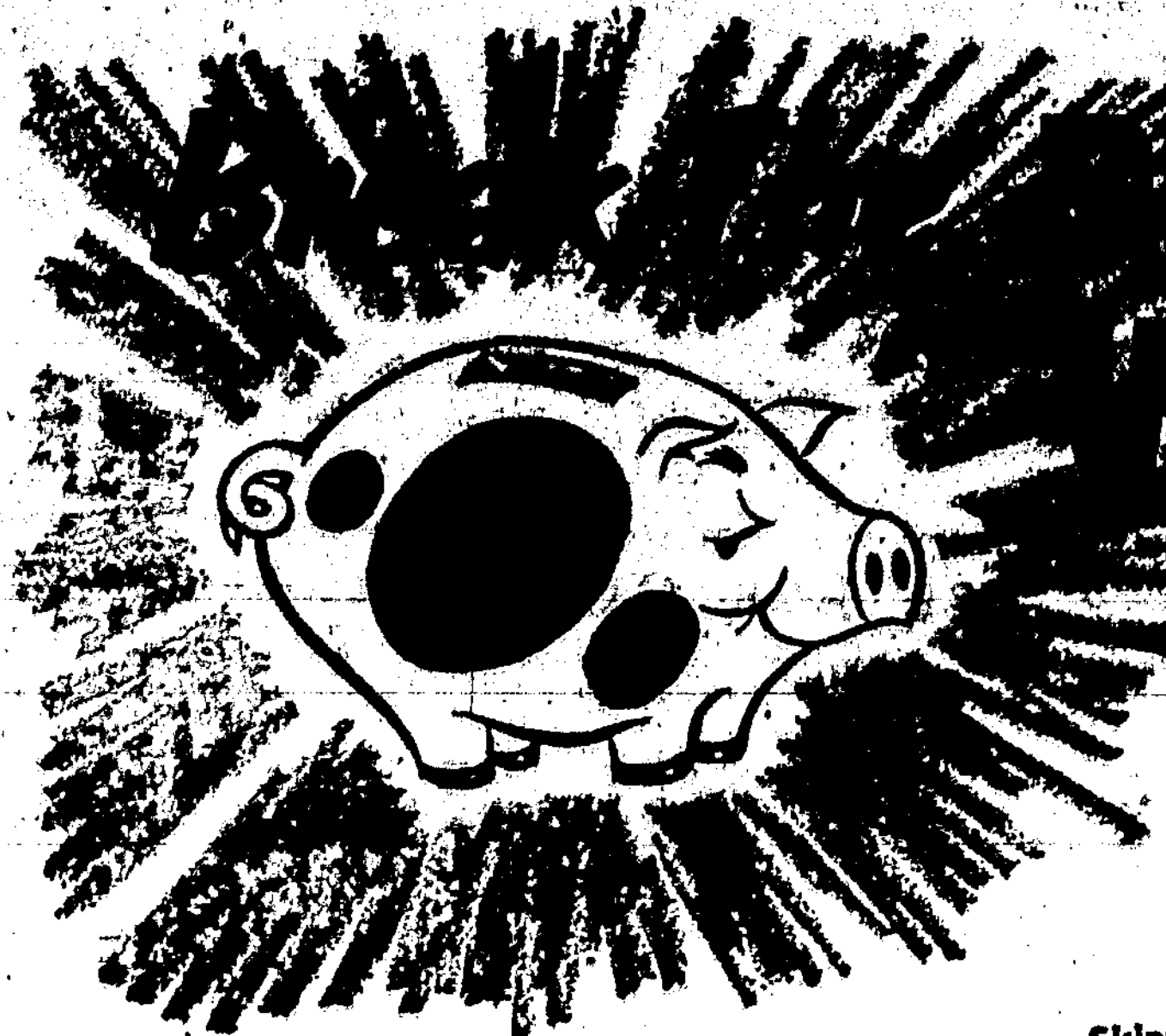

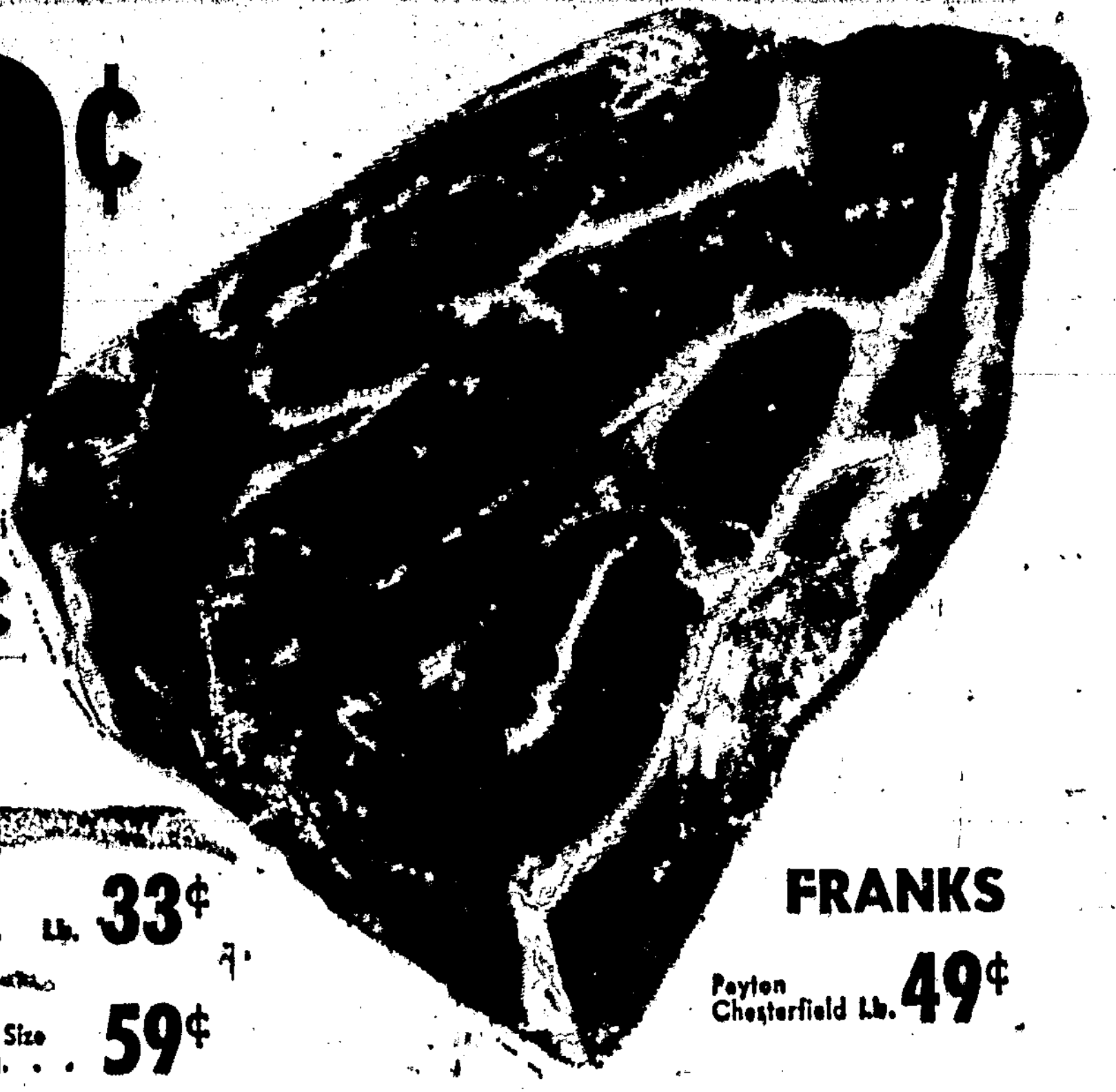

### WOULD ALSO CHANGE CONTRACTOR'S LAW

Backers of the extraordinary session are also citing the need for changing the contractor's bonding law of 1965 which is working a serious hardship on small operators, as a reason for the meeting.

There appears to be about a fifty-fifty chance of the petition effort succeeding. This is the first time it has even been tried since the method was authorized by a constitutional amendment in 1948.

Many state senators are sore at Anderson for opposing the Dirksen Amendment which they hoped would preserve the state senate as it is presently constituted. And on top of that Clint also came out in opposition to the senate's weighted vote plan which would retain the present members with each voting with weight according to the number of people in his county.

### NOT MUCH CHANCE FOR AMENDMENT

The system is the subject of one of the constitutional amendments up for ratification in the September 28 special election and also the subject of a lawsuit in federal court.

It's principal feature aside from retaining all the present members would be in giving some voice to small counties that would have no representation in conventional reapportionment on a population basis.

Prospects for approval of the amendment are not very good with Anderson and Gov. Jack Campbell against it, and also both the Republican and Democratic party organizations in Albuquerque.

### A DYING KICK AT DORMENTORS

Some members have despair of saving the senate and with nothing to lose think they might get in a dying kick at the party leaders who let them down.

If the petition effort succeeds it will be the first meeting of the legislature ever called to act in retribution.

A long time ago Gov. Clyde Tingle called one in an effort to block John Miles out of the governor's office but that was somewhat different from the present effort.

### RULING REQUESTER ON UNMARKED CARS

State Sen. Jose Ortiz y Pino has asked Titty. Gen. Witt to rule on the legality of the use of state cars that are not marked with the state insignia and do not bear official license plates.

The Santa Fe senator's request for a ruling came after it was disclosed that Revenue Commissioner Max Gonzales and Deputy Commissioner Jerry Brown were driving 1965 state Fords that were not identified as publicly owned vehicles.

Former Gov. John Burroughs' early announcement as a candidate for the 1966 Demo nomination for governor surprised capitol politicians.

They all knew he was running but didn't think he would admit it so soon. It is much more expensive to be an admitted candidate than one who is merely probing his prospects for office.

The core of the Burroughs support is a large number of small northside politicians who generally need financial help if they are to be very active.

An announced candidate is also fair game for every precinct and county organization with a money raising enterprise and they have plenty of them.

### MONTOYA ROLE IS IMPORTANT

A serious aspect of the Burroughs announcement is the possibility that he has the backing of Sen. Joe Montoya for the nomination.

Montoya does not like Gene Lusk of Carlsbad, the candidate Sen. Clint Anderson seems to favor, but he has been on good terms for years with Burroughs. It is hard to believe that Anderson and Montoya would split on the governor question

## Republicans meeting in Albuquerque make several changes in state rules

Mr. and Mrs. A. B. "Bert" Pflingsten and Myrtle of Hondo attended the Republican State Central Committee meeting Saturday in Albuquerque. Mr. Pflingsten is a member of the Lincoln County Central Committee and was a delegate to the session.

The Committee voted to select its state chairman in off-election years to allow for more campaign time, a move which also will erase a gubernatorial nominee's influence in the selection.

Of more than 200 delegates attending the session at the Hilton Hotel here, only two voted to keep the current rule of having the top party officer elected after the primary election.

Also arguing against the change was Bob Botts, vice chairman of the rules revision committee which mapped the proposed changes, and who handled most of the presentation Saturday. Botts pointed out there have been cases in the past when the Republican nominee for governor and the chairman have not seen eye to eye, creating an "impossible situation."

But there were overwhelming arguments from the floor, from both young and veteran party organizers, that the chairman needs more time than has been available to prepare for general elections.

After another lengthy debate, the central committee also set the date of the county central committee elections throughout the state as the last

Saturday of April of odd-numbered (off-election) years. The state central committee elections would be held no later than 30 days later. It is at this election that the state chairman, vice chairman, vice chairwoman, secretary and treasurer for the party is elected.

During the last few years, the county party elections have been in off-election years, thus the only change was setting of a common date.

Another controversial rule adopted was one providing that there be no secret balloting by the central committee.

Mechem, who sat as an ex-officio member of the central committee as he is national committeeman, made his only comments on when to set the county election meetings. After several had said "the sooner the better" on the off-election years, Mechem said a new governor needs several months to receive patronage recommendations from incumbent county chairmen.

The former U.S. senator and four time governor has been looked to by party members as again being the GOP standard bearer in 1966, but Mechem has strongly denied he has any such intentions.

In routine fashion, the central committee approved Tucker's recent appointments to the state GOP executive committee. These are Willie Ortiz of Santa Fe, vice chairman; Naomi Black of Truth or Consequences, vice chairman; Mrs. Loeda Richards of Albuquerque, secretary, and James Stockton of Roswell, treasurer.

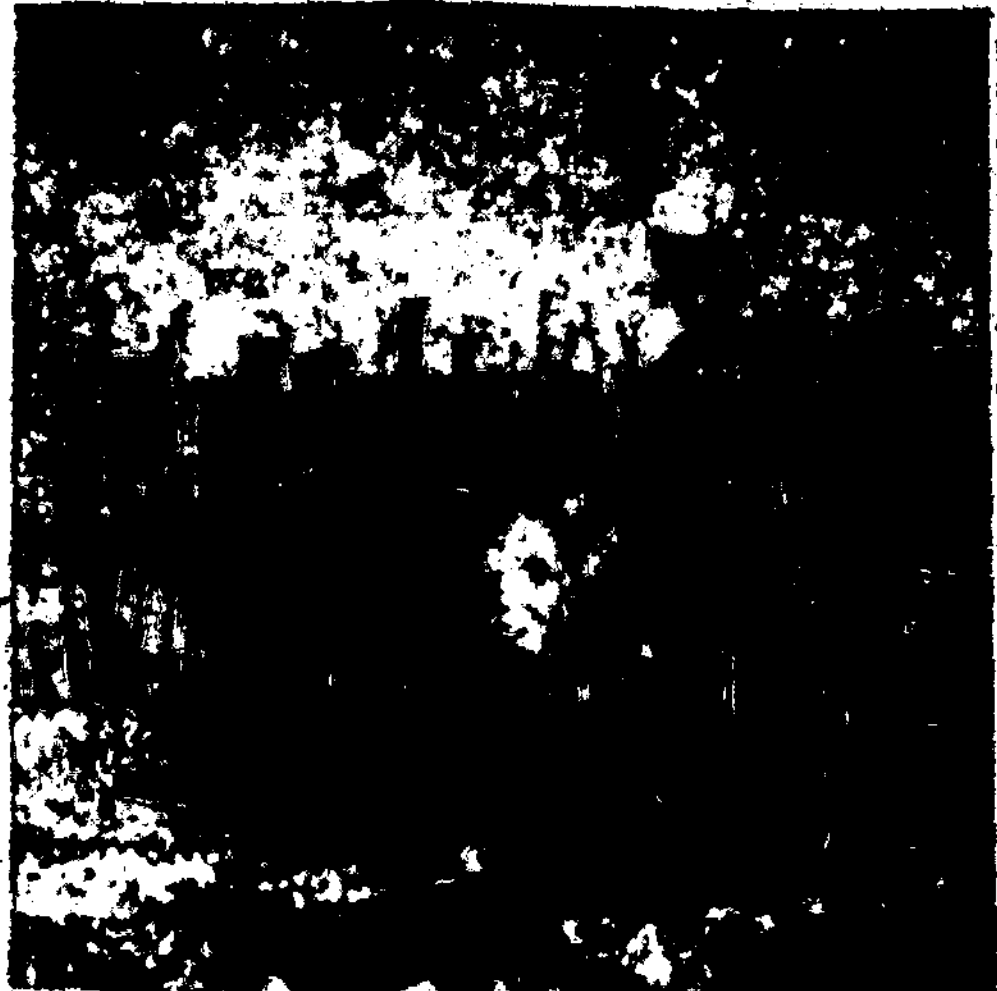

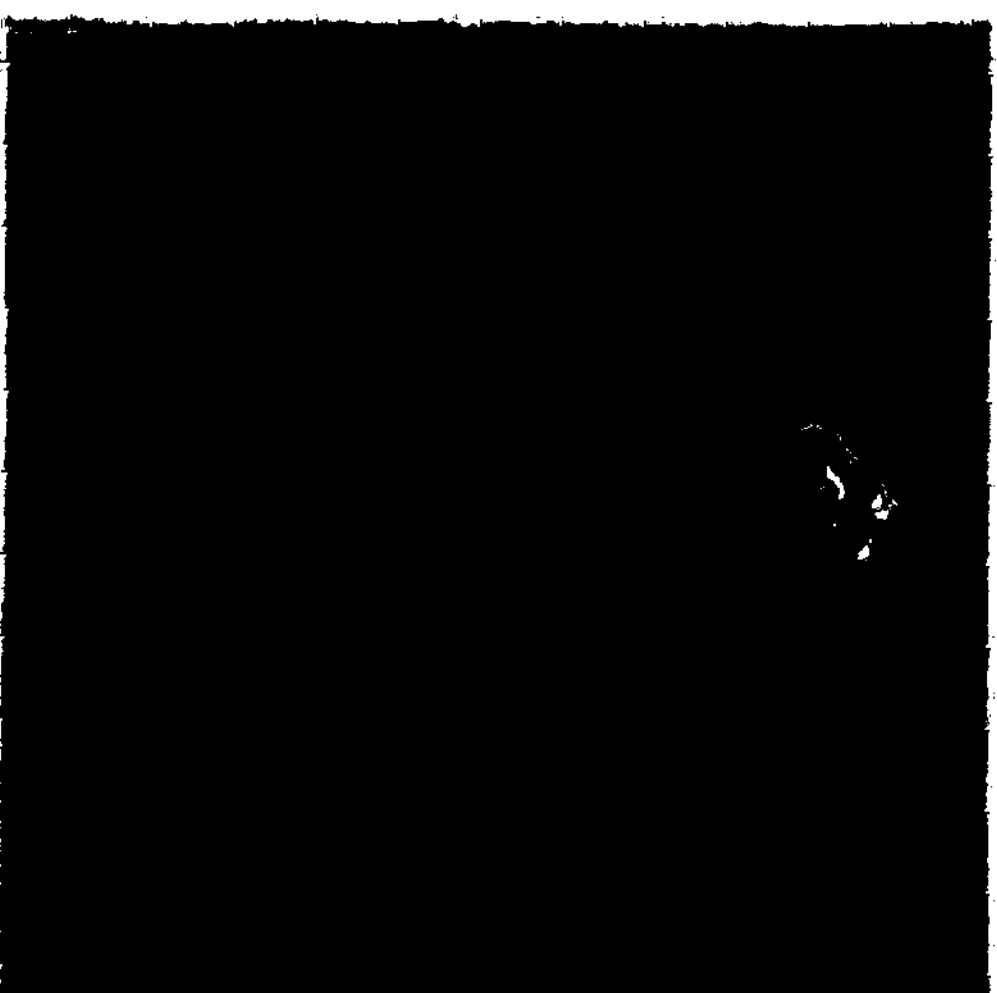

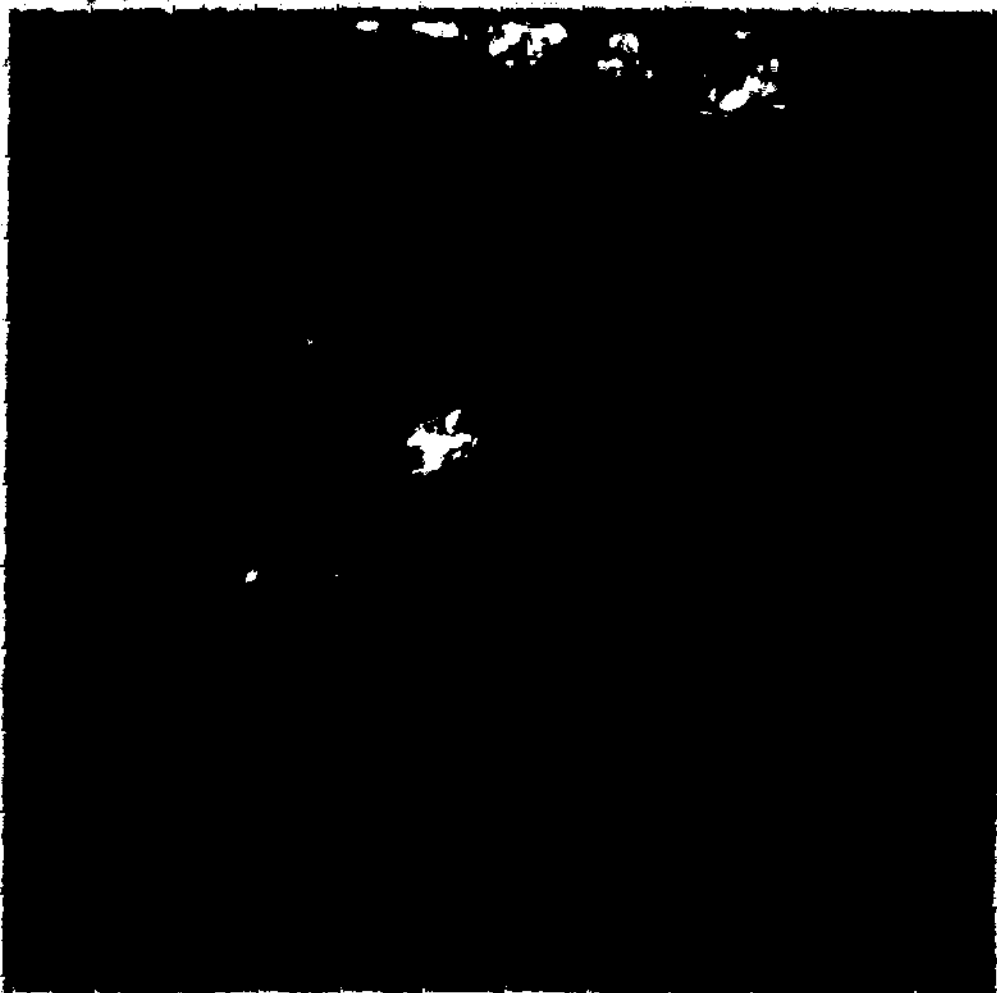

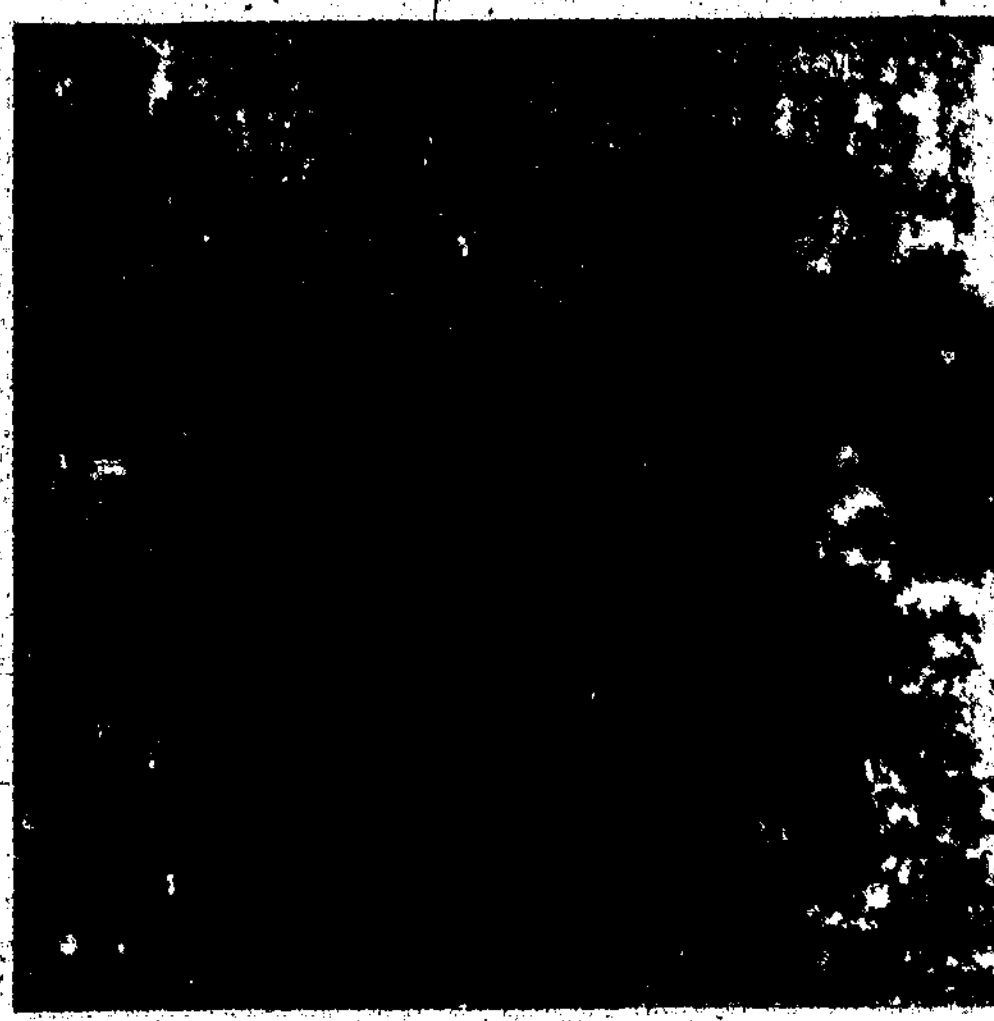

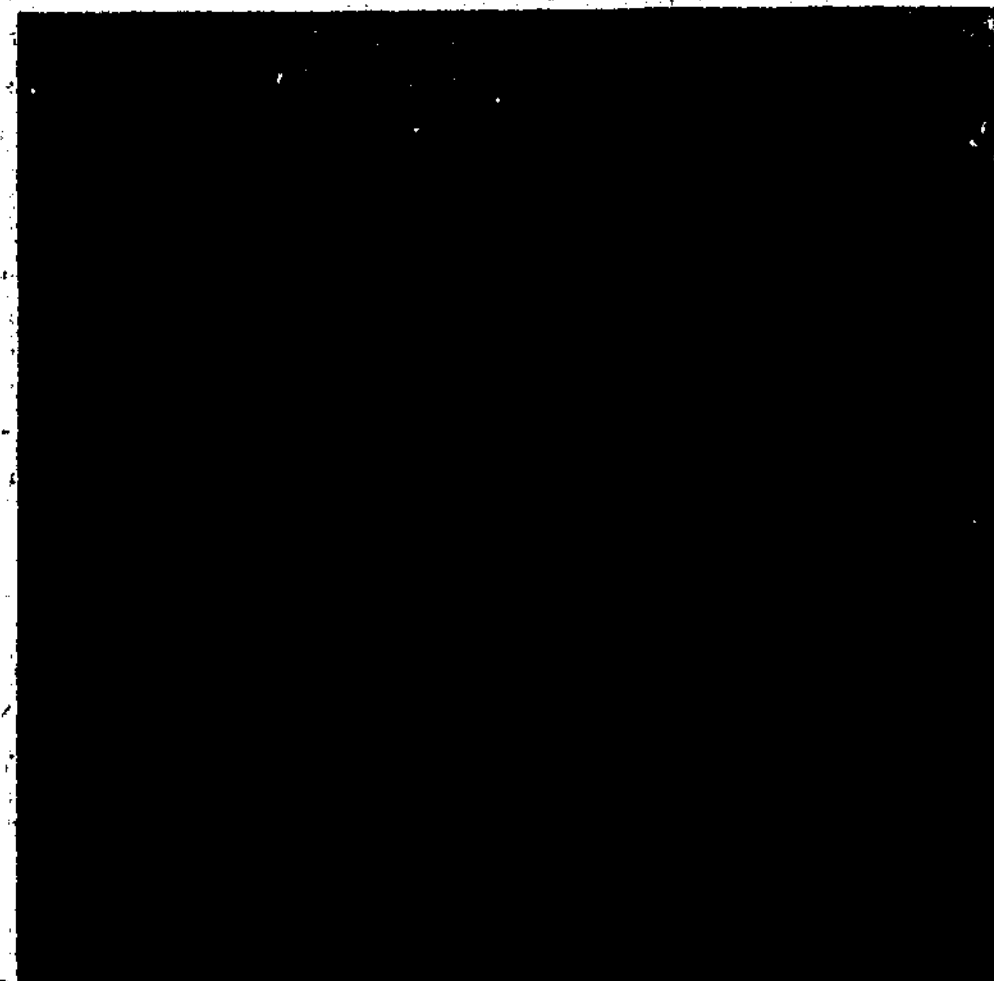

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## FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

No one can explain why animals seem to like to eat bits of wire, nails, scraps of hardware, screws, and bolts. The costly fact is that many valuable animals have been lost by irritation or puncture caused by swallowing such objects. To a large extent these losses can be prevented. Here's how:

Remove fences of woven and stranded wire that are weak from rust before small bits of wire drop into the grass and offer a hazard to grazing livestock. After a construction job in the barnyard it is worth the time and trouble to sweep the areas thoroughly or drag it with a sweep of permanent magnets.

More difficult is the detection and removal of trash metal from ground feed, hay and silage. Permanent or electromagnetic magnets in feed chutes from bins to feeders will remove a major portion of the trash. It is important that some type of magnet be installed in home grinding mills and mixer. By using these methods, it is possible to remove almost 100 percent of the trash metal that otherwise would be fed to livestock.

Plans are under way at New Mexico State University to begin a carcass evaluation program for beef cattle.

Progeny groups of helpers will be taken at the packing house when animals are slaughtered. This information will be used to evaluate the sires and in some cases to make comparisons between herds on their abilities to produce desirable carcasses.

Plans are to start the testing and evaluation program this fall.

Delivery of cattle will be on November 15 to a feedlot to be designated later.

Bobby J. Rankin, associate extension animal husbandman at NMSU, will superintend the program with Earl Ray of NMSU Meats laboratory assisting in carcass measurement and evaluation.

Complete details on the program are expected to be available at the county extension office by September 1.

Each day there are enough livestock bruised, crippled, or that die on the way to market to supply the daily meat requirements of half a million people. Handling livestock carelessly destroys about 100 tons of beef, lamb, and pork every day. Such losses are reflected in lower livestock prices to producers.

Unfortunately most bruising occurs in the region of the highest priced cuts. In hogs for instance, about 51 percent of the bruises on the entire carcass occur in the hams. In cattle, about 45 percent occur in the loins. Bruises cost money because bruised meat cannot be eaten and requires extra labor to trim out.

### BRUISED AREAS

Losses can be reduced by observing these rules:

Use canvas slippers instead of clubs and canes when moving livestock.

Eliminate protruding nails and broken boards from fences, doorways, and trucks.

Remove machinery and junk from feedlots and barnyards.

Remove horns from cattle when they are young.

Bed trucks properly, always using sand to prevent slippery floors.

Load carefully and don't hurry livestock up chutes or through narrow doors.

Use partition to separate sheep, calves, hogs, and different weights of cattle.

Don't feed animals heavily before loading; livestock travel best on a light fill.

Protect livestock from the weather while trucking; in the summer provide adequate ventilation and shade, and in winter protect them from too much cold wind and provide plenty of bedding.

Drive carefully and avoid sudden stops.

When power mowers are used regularly, sometimes there develops a series of wave-like ridges running at right angles to the direction of mowing.

This washboard effect may be prevented by regularly changing the direction of mowing — mow diagonally or at right angles. Alternate directions of cutting partially control runners of creeping grass and aids in the prevention of grain and thatch.

Avoid mowing wet grass as much as possible. Dry grass cuts more easily, does not ball up and clog the mower, and gives a much finer appearing lawn.

### Lambs Contracted

Lamb Contracts are being made at 23 cents and 25 cents per pound for wether and ewe lambs respectively. Around 600 yearling ewes in the Vaughn area contracted for \$30.00 per head recently.

Prices reported for calves are 26 cents and 28 cents per pound for helpers and steers although I have not heard of any local contracts. Some calves owners plan to get 30 cents per pound for their steer calves or they will hold them over to yearling steers. Range conditions look good in most parts of the country.

A new guide for identifying range plants has just been published by New Mexico State University. It is "New Mexico Range Plants", Circular 374.

The publication contains descriptions and pictures of 85 of the important range plants in New Mex. with maps showing areas of most common occurrence. There are also brief descriptions of the management conditions that effect each kind of plant and the forage value of each.

There are more than 3,000 species of plants, but the 85 discussed in the publication are the most important ones to the livestock industry.

Copies of the publication are available free at county extension service office.

Mites, which attack ornamental shrubs, fruit trees and bermuda lawns in New Mexico, can be controlled with Tedion or Kelthane, two specific miticides. Diazinon is also effective although it is not a specific miticide.

Mites vary in size from almost microscopic to as big as the head of a pin and are injurious to plants because they suck the juices. The European red mite, two-spotted mite and McDaniel mite are troublesome on deciduous shrubs and fruit trees.

Red mites are prevalent in early spring and summer with the population tapering off in early August. Two-spotted mites and McDaniel mites begin to build up at the end of July and are a problem until fall.

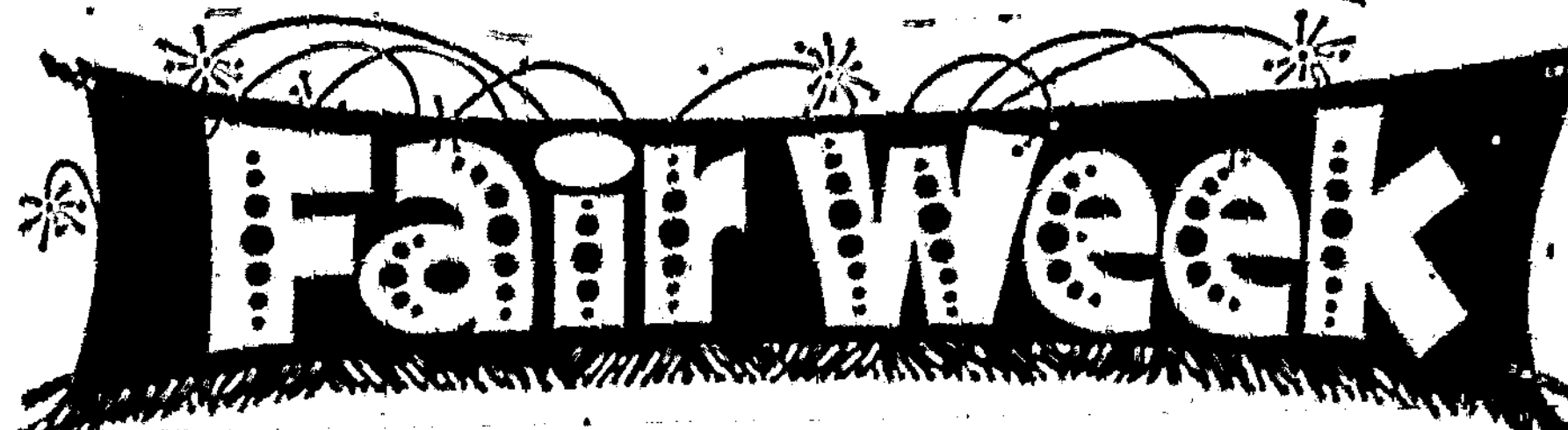
The bermuda mite is specific on bermudagrass. Symptoms are shortening of the plant stems and browning of the vegetation. Diazinon or Kelthane work best on the bermuda mites.

To determine if plants are infested with mites, examine the affected parts under a magnifying glass.

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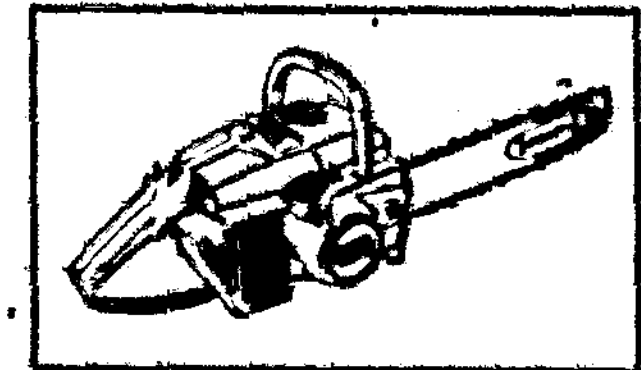

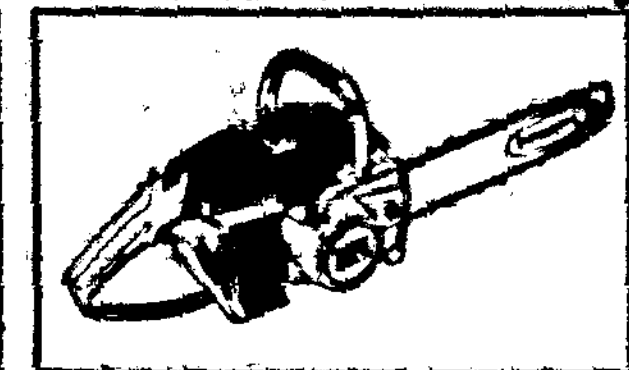

Little Patti Otero is feeling some better. She is near the end of treatments she has been taking at Ruidoso for the infection in her system caused by measles.

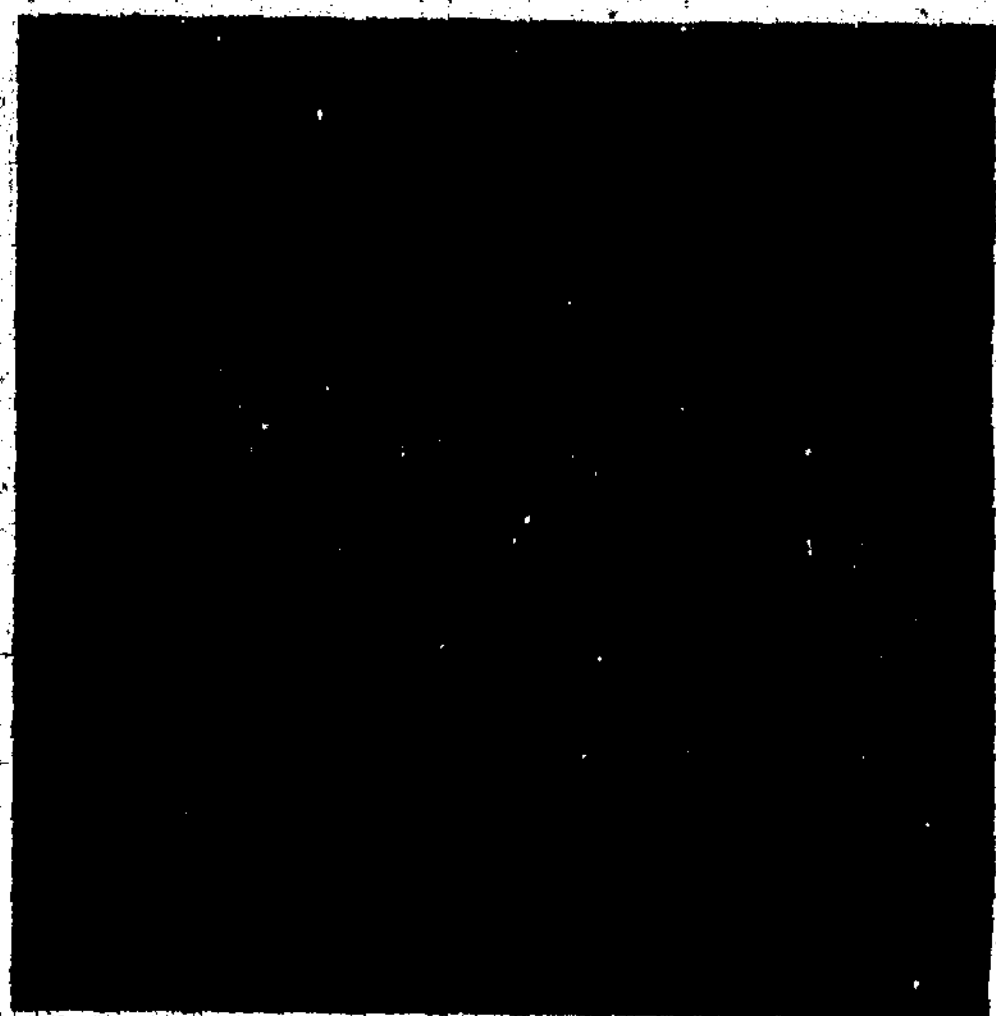
## New Mexico gets new trout lake

New Mexico will gain another new rainbow trout lake in the southeastern part of the state, according to terms of an agreement entered into by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, it was announced today by Regional Director John C. Gatlin of the Department of the Interior's wildlife agency.

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish will construct a dam on the upper Watershed of the Sacramento River in Otero County to create a 17-acre lake. The lake will be located on land leased by the state from the City of Alamogordo.

The lake will be stocked with 15,000 rainbow trout over eight inches in length.

Construction of the lake, approximately 15 miles south of Cloudcroft, will cost approximately \$50,000. Using funds derived from the Dingell-Johnson excise tax on sport fishing tackle, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife will reimburse the state 75 per cent of the total project cost.

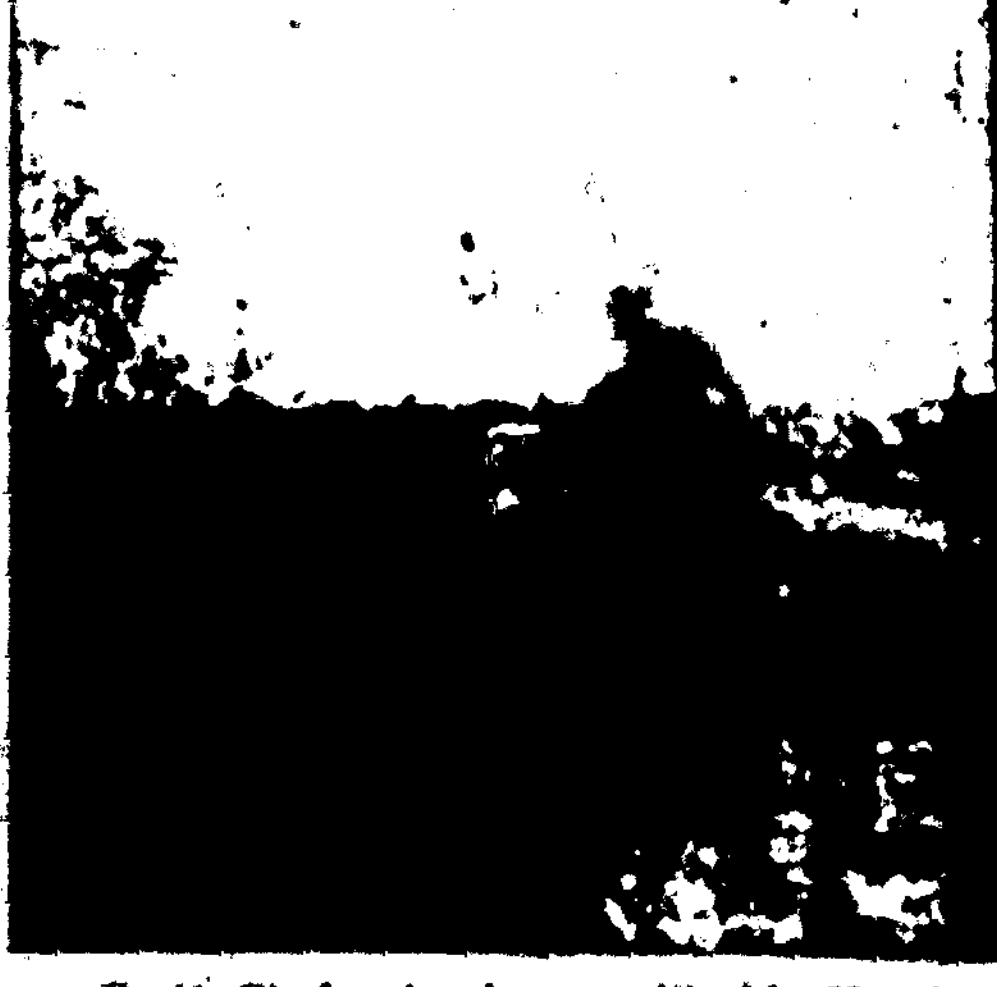

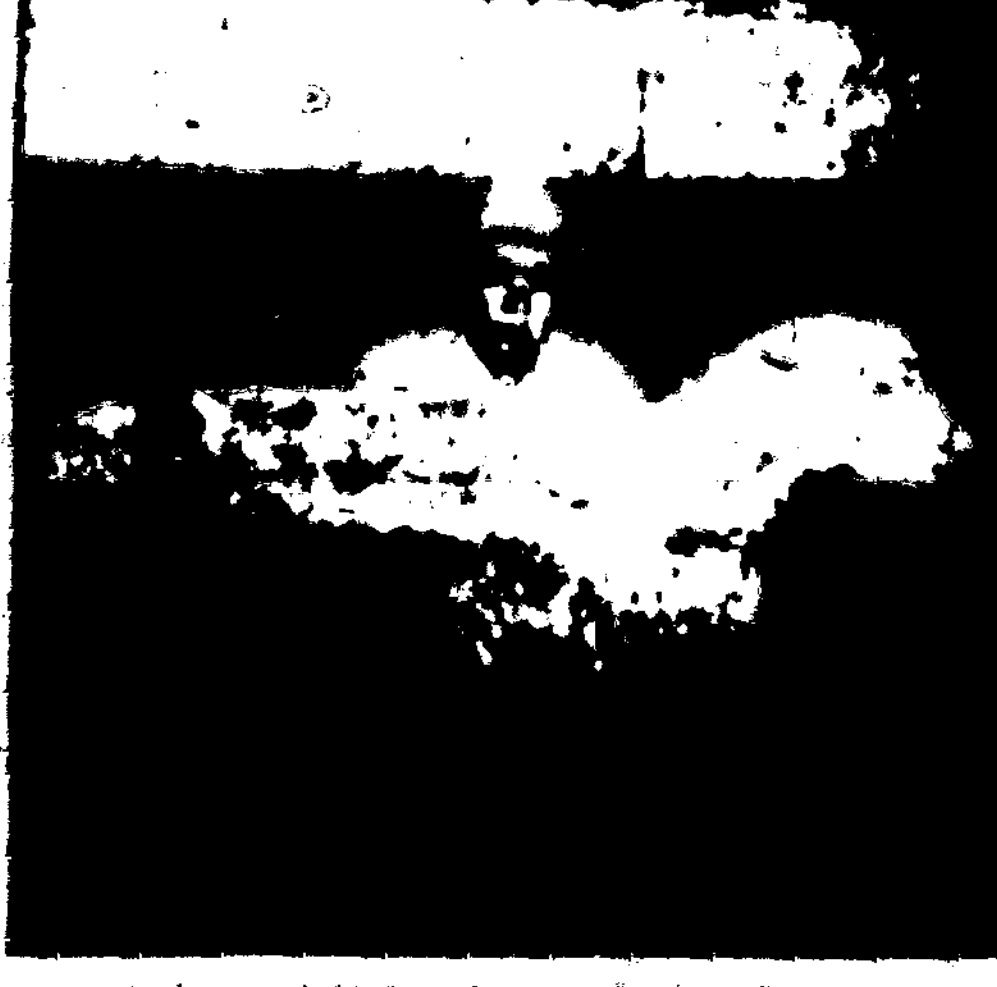

# Soil & water district makes report

Following is the annual report for the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District for the fiscal year 1965.

The Carrizozo SWCD was organized October 11, 1945. There have been six additions to the District since that time making a total of 1,004,217 acres in the District. There are 30 operating units in the District, all classified as ranches.

The District operation is managed by a Board of Supervisors elected by the landowners within the District.

The present Board consists of the following:

- Lee Straley, chairman
- Bill Stephenson, vice-chair.
- Walton Wilson, sec.-treas.
- Johnson Stearns, member
- W. W. Gallacher Jr., member

The general purpose of the District is to promote soil and water conservation through a long range program. Landowners are encouraged to cooperate with the District as a voluntary basis toward soil and water conservation through written conservation plans. At present about 80% of the eligible land is under cooperative agreement with about 20% covered with basic conservation plans.

Listed below are some of the major accomplishments of the District during fiscal year 1965.

The Carrizozo SWCD has earth-moving equipment available to District Cooperators for installation of conservation practices. It is managed by the Board of Supervisors who employ a full-time operator. During the year the Board traded in a D7 Cat and bought a new D6C Cat in order to continue this service to cooperators. The equipment now consists of a tractor, carry-all, ripper, plastic pipe layer and low-boy truck. A complete set of books are kept by the Sect-

Treas and are audited each year.

The long-range District program was up-dated and a revised Memorandum of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service signed to modernize the District operation.

The Lincoln County Agency initiated a Bankers Award Program in 1965. Bryan Hightower was awarded a plaque for outstanding conservation work on his ranch.

The Conservation Needs Inventory was completed with the Carrizozo and upper Hondo SWCD's sharing the cost of publication.

The District contributed \$5.00 per head premium on 4-H lambs at the Lincoln County Fair.

Additional territory was added to the District during the year in the Corona area consisting of 11 operating units.

The District cooperates with the Bureau of Land Management toward conservation planning and application on land administered by BLM. A working agreement for use of SWCD equipment on BLM land was completed during the year.

A Ladies Auxiliary to the SWCD was organized during the year to assist in promotion of soil and water conservation.

The Board of Supervisors meet the first Wednesday of each month in the SCS office in the Court House. Attendance during the past year has been 88% with 12 meetings held. Anyone interested in soil and water conservation is invited to attend.

The Carrizozo SWCD has Memorandums of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service, Bureau of Land Management and the State Department of Forestry and cooperate with ASCS and Extension Service. These Agencies assist the District obtain its objectives.

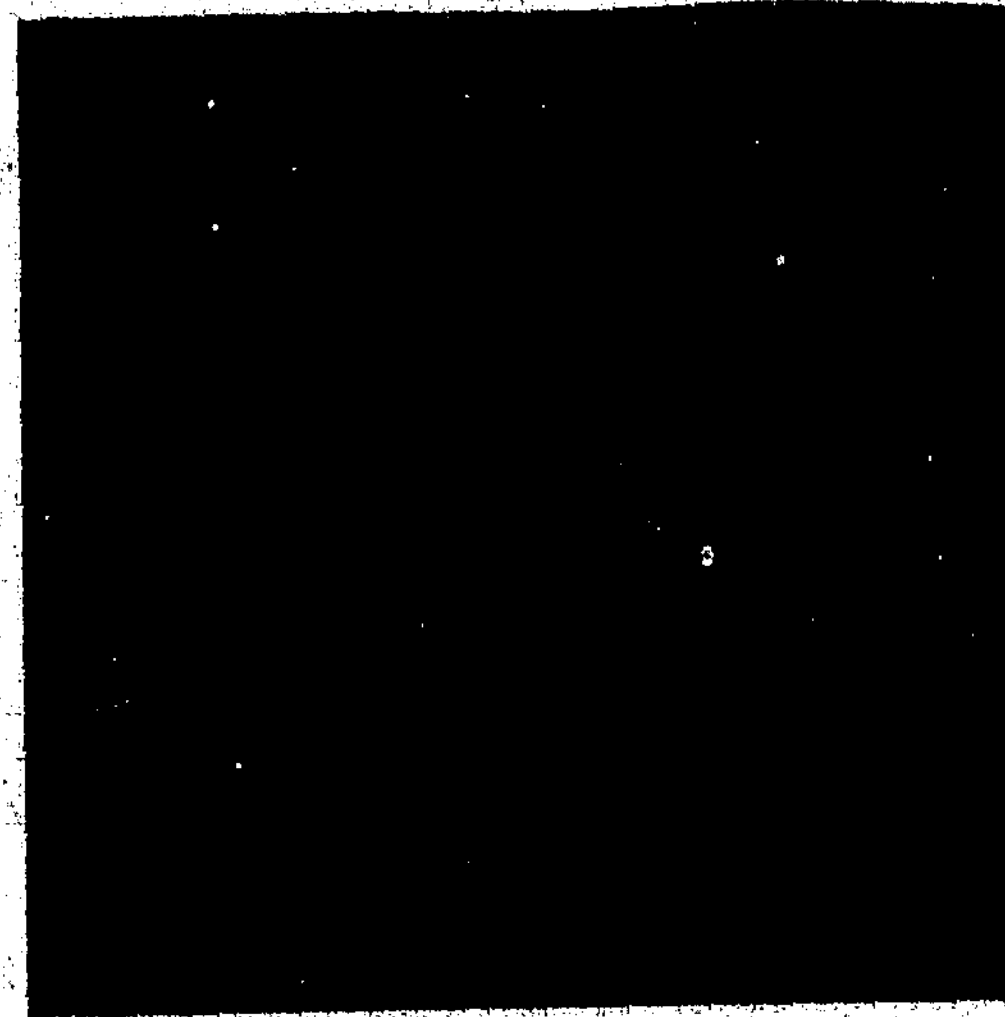

The range sheep show is designed to show the type of commercial sheep raised in Lincoln County. Sheep shown will have been grown under range conditions.

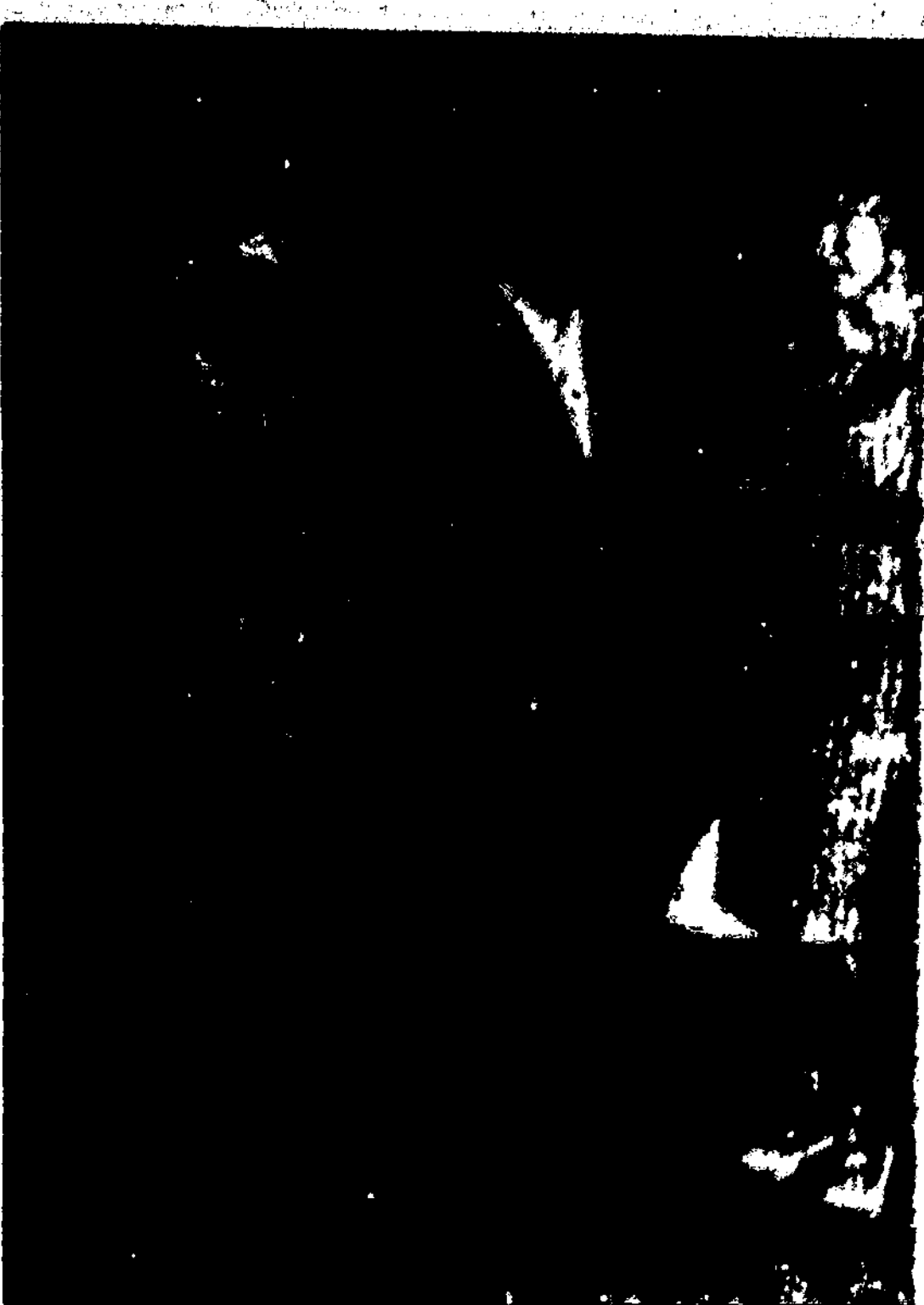
The junior division is a big

part of the Fair, restricted to members of A-H Clubs and FFA members. There are departments for all of the projects carried on by these youngsters.

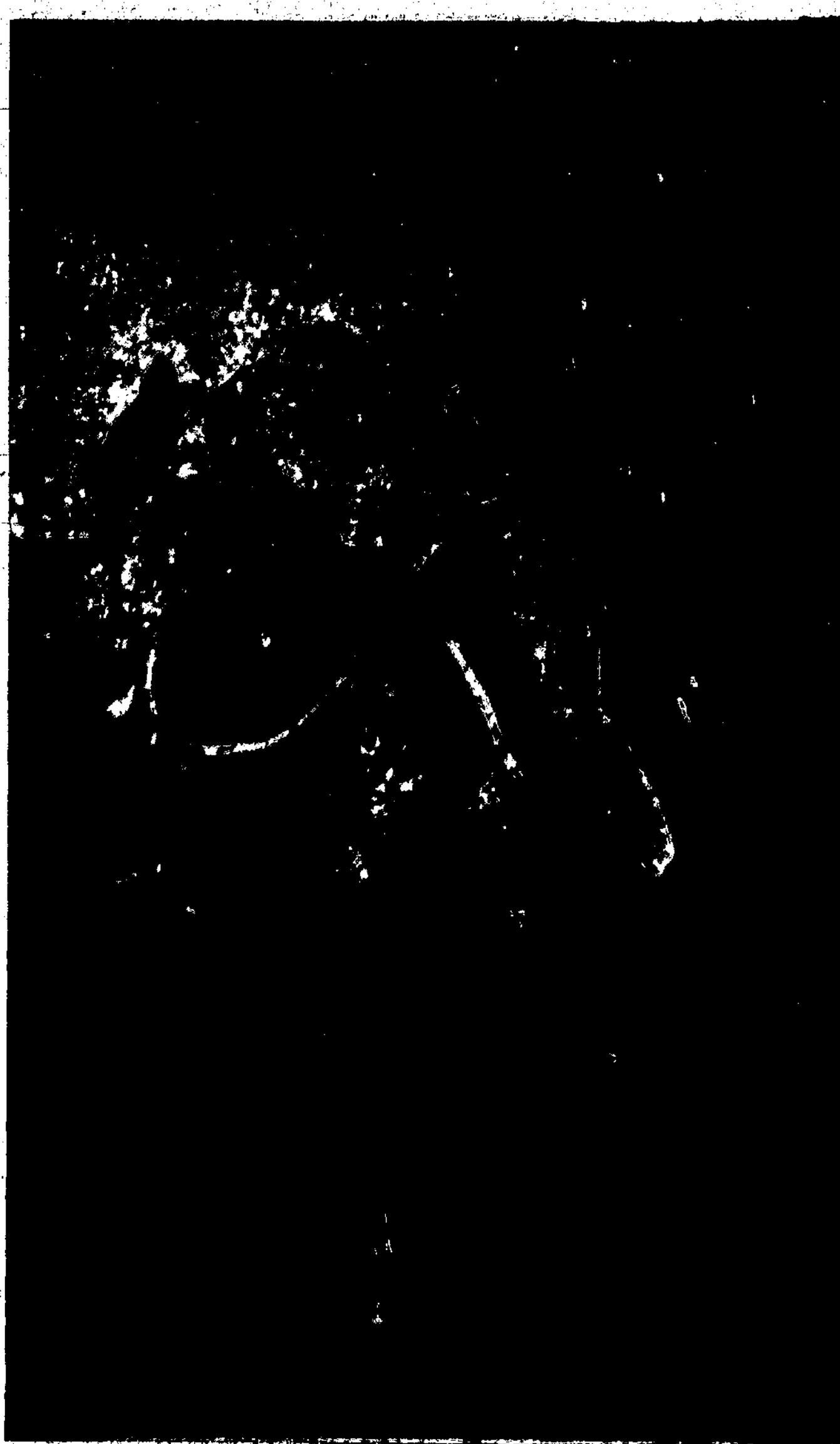

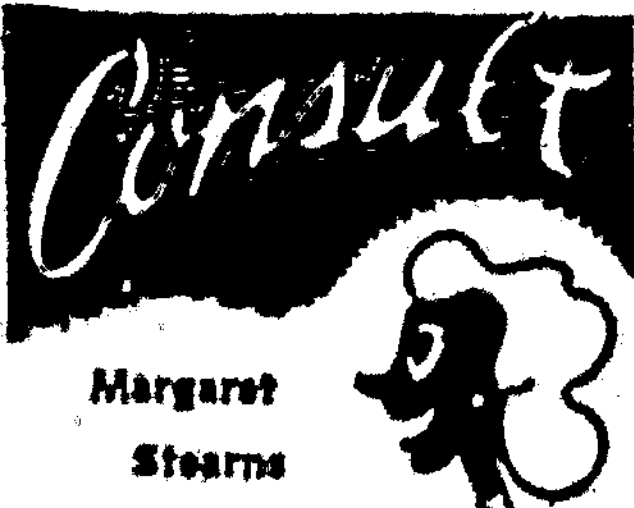

## Ec department has dual personality

With the introduction of the new course, "Wage-Earning With Home Economics Knowledge and Skills," there are now two separate homemaking programs underway at Carrizozo High-School.

The old program, called "Vocational Home Economics" since its inception in 1917, is broad in scope, serving any age group, and includes all the areas of homemaking involved in the management of a home and in providing for the welfare of the family. In our school it is a four-year course of study. Buying and caring for household equipment and furnishings, with emphasis on new developments is one phase of the study. Clothing work consists of how to buy and care for articles of wearing apparel for all members of the family as well as construction of garments and care and use of synthetic materials. Management problems of handling family resources and family financial planning are covered. Buying and preparation of food within the family income is another phase. With a constant flow of new products on today's market — electrical appliances and large equipment, textiles for home furnishings and garments, convenience foods with all the attending implications to family time and budget, new systems of credit being advanced so families can "purchase more" — it becomes obvious how very important this broad scope of the home economics program has become.

The new program is narrow in scope, taking only one segment of subject matter. The curriculum, length of training and methods of teaching are determined by job analysis. There should be reasonable expectation of employment upon completion of training. The course is expected to develop those attitudes and skills which have wage-earning value. There must be a valid work experience as a part of the community. The program must be adequately supervised during the training, placement and follow-up on the job.

Both of these programs are reimbursed with federal funds. The broad course leading to the development of the family-centered hememaker has been an integral part of high school curricula throughout the nation this year, still untried in many more. It is a result of the Manpower and development Act passed by Congress in 1963. The program as it is now incorporated in the "2oZo" curriculum contains one course, offered for junior and senior girls. The first semester is to be devoted to generalized training in attitudes essential to getting and holding a job. The second semester will include on-the-job training in possibly two specific subjects.

J. W. Young, Las Cruces District Manager of the U. S. Bureau of Land Management, today announced completion of the first BLM recreation site in Southwestern New Mexico. The site, on public land, is located 14 miles northeast of Tularosa. It will be known as the Three Rivers Petroglyph and Recreation Site.

"Directional signs have been placed on U. S. Highway 70 at the community of Three Rivers," said Young. "Access from U. S. 70 is well marked via graveled county roads five miles to the site."

"Our purpose is to provide both a needed recreation area and to preserve the ancient Indian petroglyphs," said Young.

Three Rivers Rancher, Thomas F. Ryan, III, on whose BLM grazing allotment the site is located, has cooperated with BLM in all phases of the work. He is currently helping to gather historical data about the site so that this information may be made available to visitors to the area.

On the site are hundreds of Indian petroglyphs (rock carvings). These are linked by a system of improved trails so that visitors may observe all of the different petroglyphs. Covered picnic units with grills, tables and benches are available as well as sanitary facilities and ample parking space. "Visitors should bring their own water and charcoal," added Young. "We anticipate development of a water system if increased visitation warrants."

Already 800 visitors, many from out of state, have signed the registration book at the site.

No admission fees are required for this site at this time.

## Life does have hazards

If a person wants to live to the age of 90 maybe he should move to African jungles where Dr. Albert Schweitzer was recently buried after reaching that age. Of course one has to consider that the average life-span in that area is real low down.

Wouldn't hardly pay to move to Idaho just for the sake of living a long life. A head-on collision September 5 east of Fallsgades Dam, Idaho, took the life of a 78-year-old Alamogordo woman.

Hurricane Betsy is about to strike the Florida coast, so that area does not seem likely for year-around peaceful living.

Torrential rains in Italy have left more than 100 dead and missing so that area is ruled out as being on the real safe side.

So it goes . . . world wide.

We get in some arguments that certain activities of our youngsters, like football, are not safe. The point with us, is that life has its hazards anywhere you go and avoidance of certain activities in this life just leave you open for a possible speedier death by other means. Football is rough and bruising, but not nearly so hazardous as driving on Labor Day.

## When is a weed a weed

Around the Payton house we have a floral expert, in fact a sweepstakes winner type, who loves the wild flowers of Lincoln County and Oh's and Ah's like mad at their beauty.

The other member of the family gives more thought to the feel of the hoe handle and how hard Ignacio has to work to cut them down.

Right now Lincoln County looks as good as most living persons can remember, weeds, flowers, grass, trees, brush, all growing good and making this area a veritable garden of greenery.

Still there's weeds . . . one of those pretty wild flowers is sometimes referred to as dumb tongue. Cattle eat enough of that stuff and their tongues become so paralyzed they can't even swallow water. Some of those other pretty wild flowers are so horny and spiny that only a fool or person with cast iron gloves would attempt to pick them.

Those darned goatheads have a pretty yellow flower which is admired while in bloom around our place. But a Mexican sand-bur (goathead) will ruin a bicycle tire, hobble a person in moccasins, cripple a dog and even deflate a thin car tire.

Out in our south lot is a wild four o'clock which has purple blooms as pretty as can be found in any greenhouse. There is enough chamiza out there to winter one head of cattle that wasn't too hungry.

Our cactus plants took their turn at blooming and no greenhouse had more beautiful blooms to offer at that time. The dogs cleaned up the cactus plants right down to a nubbin, probably one winding up with a sick stomach from this orgy.

When is a weed a weed . . . depends on who you ask for information. If they bloom they're a wild flower. Around our place there aren't many weeds, just a lot full of wild flowers.

## Between the rock and the hard place

A short commissioner's order is printed in this issue of the News as a legal, it cites the fact that a special election will be held September 28 and that the county commissioners find it necessary to levy a tax in excess of the constitutional limitation of 20 mills for the purpose of paying indigent hospital claims.

To say the commissioners find it necessary is putting the matter mild. They are actually in a position that is rough. The claims will have to be paid, regardless of what hospital a Lincoln County indigent may be in.

Talking to Commissioners Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer we learned that if the county does not vote the levy, then it will become necessary for either or both of our local hospitals (or other) to sue the county to get their money and the county will have to pay. There is no choice.

It's a bad situation either way, but the best way out seems to be for Lincoln County voters to approve this levy. They're going to have to pay regardless.

We feel that our commissioners are doing well with county business, they did not suggest that we advise people to vote for this levy, but only stated

that it sure puts the county in a bad position.

The Indigent Hospital levy will be on a separate ballot, eight constitutional amendments will fill the other ballot.

## All Carrizozo post office employees asked to take part in efficiency plan

Postmaster Harman announced today that all Carrizozo post office employees will be asked to take part in the new Postal Efficiency Plan announced by Postmaster General John A. Gronowski.

"The Postal Efficiency Plan includes comprehensive programs for improving postal service and reducing costs and is our way of helping President Johnson fulfill his pledge to provide more effective and economical government services."

In Washington, Postmaster General John A. Gronowski termed the plan's twin objectives of economy and service betterment "a matter of highest priority" and called for total involvement of all employees

through the Post Office suggestion program.

Semi-annual reports will be made to the President, Mr. Gronowski said, and realized savings reverted to the Treasury or applied to improving postal service.

A local committee will be organized to fulfill the two purposes of the plan:

1. Reduce Costs.

2. Improve Services.

Ideas generated by the individual employees will be taken up by the committee. Accepted ideas will be passed on to Washington for possible application on a National Level. Employees whose ideas are adopted will personally oversee the programs.

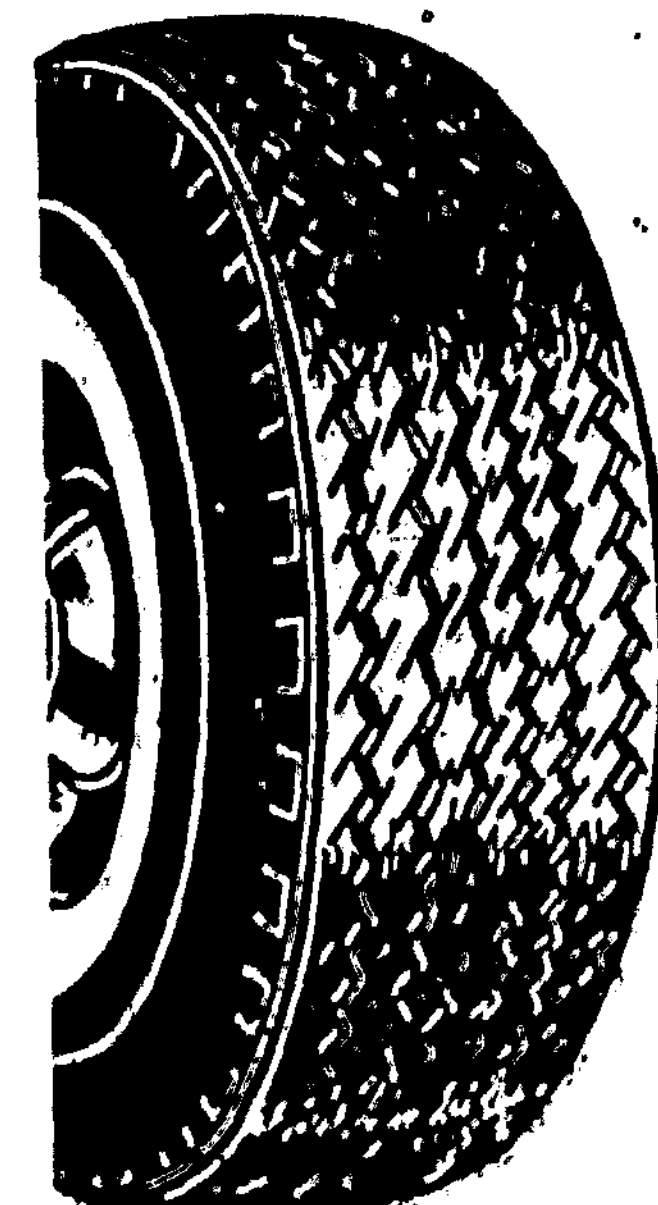

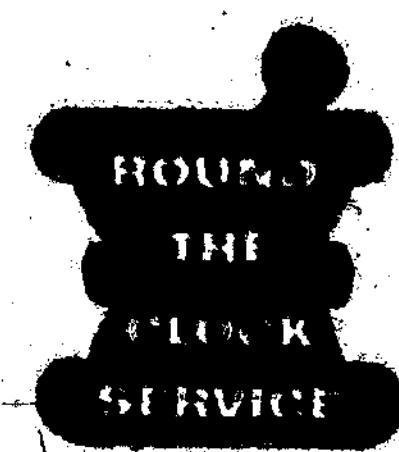
