

Communities give "go ahead" to natural gas association

At a meeting in Capitan September 13 the first official steps were taken for the organization of the Capitan - Carrizozo Gas Users Association. Members appointed by trustees of the two towns, Bert Cheney, president; Jete Voss, vice president; Ray Province, secretary-treasurer; Albert Roberts, Valon Hall, and Fred English, members, came to easy agreement on the several matters pertaining to formation of the association.

The technicalities of organization are being expedited in every way possible. Willis E. Umholtz, engineer with Carlos Powell & Associates in Santa Fe, and John D. Donnell, attorney, said that the necessary

papers would be hand delivered in Fort Worth, Texas, main office for this area of the Housing & Home Finance Agency, on or about September 21.

According to schedule the next major part of the program will be signing up gas users in the two towns and surrounding areas where gas will be available. Ruidoso and area will be supplied with gas by the association according to the plan.

Of major importance now is the knowledge that gas users will pay a cost of only \$20.00 for a tie on. While this \$20 payment does not guarantee service (location of all connects will be determined on final planning) it is the only way to

assure that homes and business places will be able to get natural gas at such a low initial cost. After the lines are pressurized, even after the initial plan is OK'd by the Federal agency, it will be impossible for any changes to be made, and gas users will pay a much higher cost, estimated at \$100.00 up to \$300 for a tie on the main lines.

The initial line planning will bring gas to within 100 feet of the user's property, this for the \$20 fee. Any further distance will be paid at the contractor's price. It is probable that \$10 of the initial payment will be refunded to good credit risks after the association is in business.

Something like 65 per cent of the utility users in each town will be needed on the initial sign-up of gas users to prove the feasibility of the plan. Officials at the meeting did not look at this as a major problem.

With favorable weather, gas could become available in Capitan some time this winter, all lines in the area expected to be in business by early summer.

The decision as to handling of profits, which go for payment of the project for a good many years, was made as follows: Each municipality shall receive a portion of the total system net profits after payment into reserves, if any, in the portion of the total system

net profits after payment into reserves, if any, in the proportion that the gross receipts from sales within its corporate limits appertain to the aggregate gross receipts of the association. All other profits based on sales without the corporate limits of the municipalities shall be divided equally between the two municipalities.

There are no funds available for right-of-way payments. The law firm of Zinn & Donnell was authorized to represent the association. A motion was made and passed to confirm all previous proceedings. The principal place of business will be Capitan. Chapman & Cutler of Chicago have been engaged to affirm the tax free status of

revenue bonds to be issued. The annual meeting date was set as the 2nd Monday in September. A quorum must be present majority vote will rule. Vacancies are to be filled by trustees of the two towns. Officers are to be elected annually, no salaries paid.

The Citizens State Bank in Carrizozo was selected as the depository agent. The advance monies (\$20 tieon fees) will be held in escrow until the association is in business. Clint Brannum, field engineer for the Housing and Home Finance Agency in Albuquerque, will be the man to give the green light when everything is ready to go.

Planning of the lines, a rather

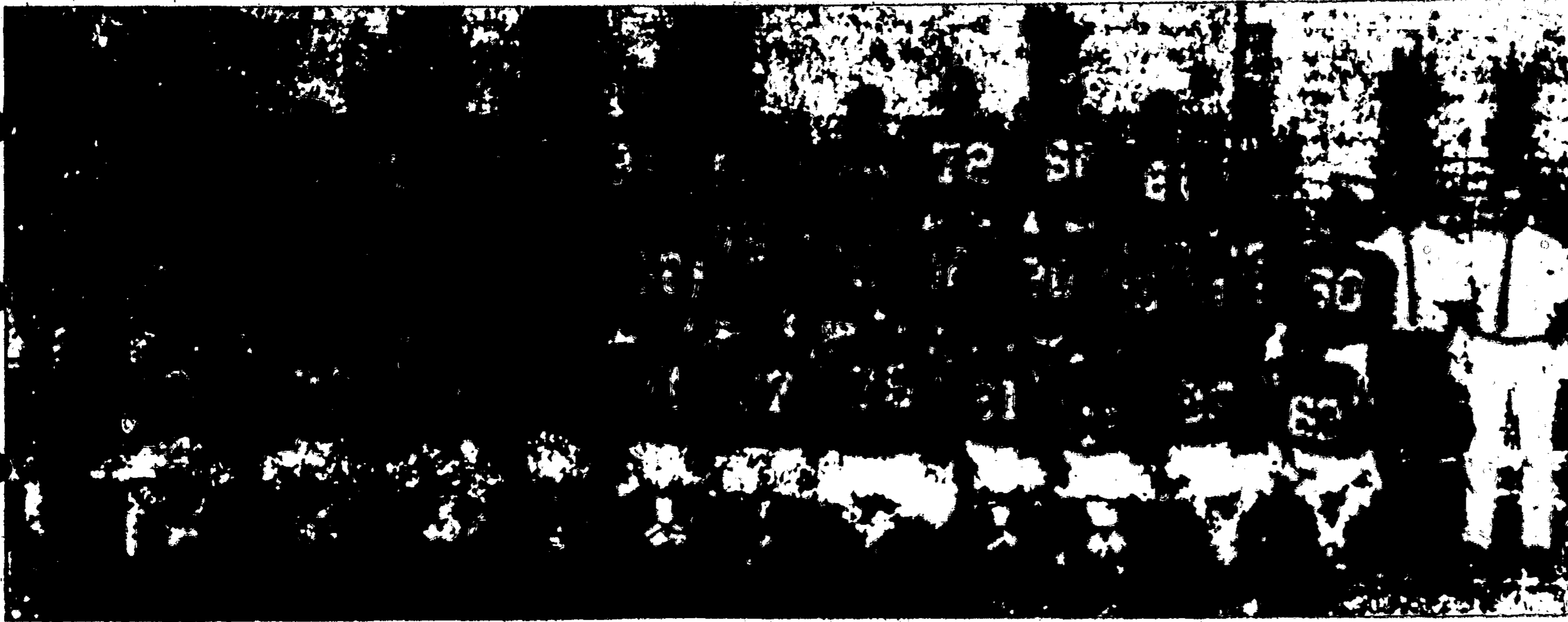
large job, will proceed during all of the detail work of setting up the association. The engineering firm will make an initial plan which it will submit to the association officers for final approval. This plan will include a number of alternates which will be used as far as money will permit.

Many questions will be asked about the cost of installing natural gas in homes and business places. These will have to be determined on an individual basis. Corona, recently on natural gas, had a situation where out-of-town plumbers were over charging for gas installations, this was cured by local people becoming qualified to do the

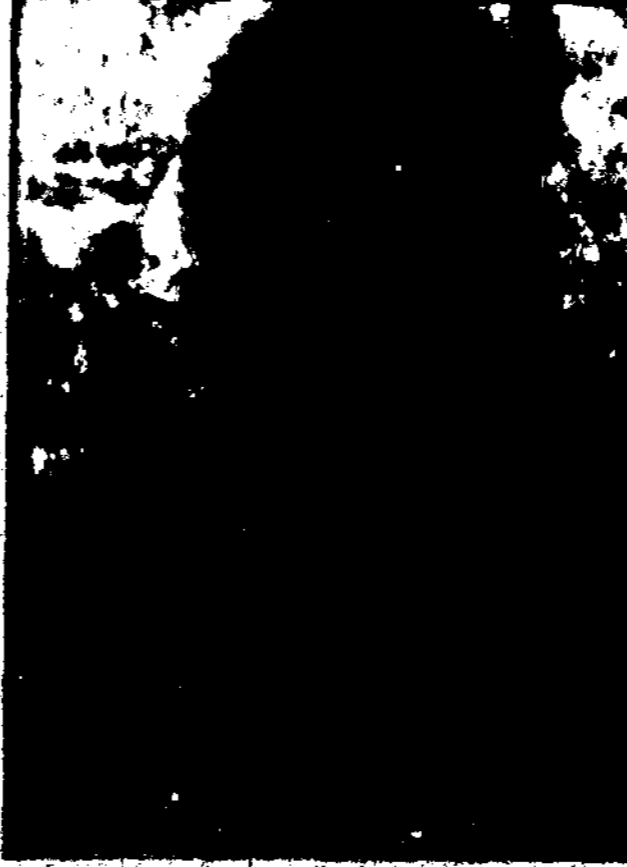
The Cardinals meet the Melrose Buffaloes on the Corona field Friday at 7:30.

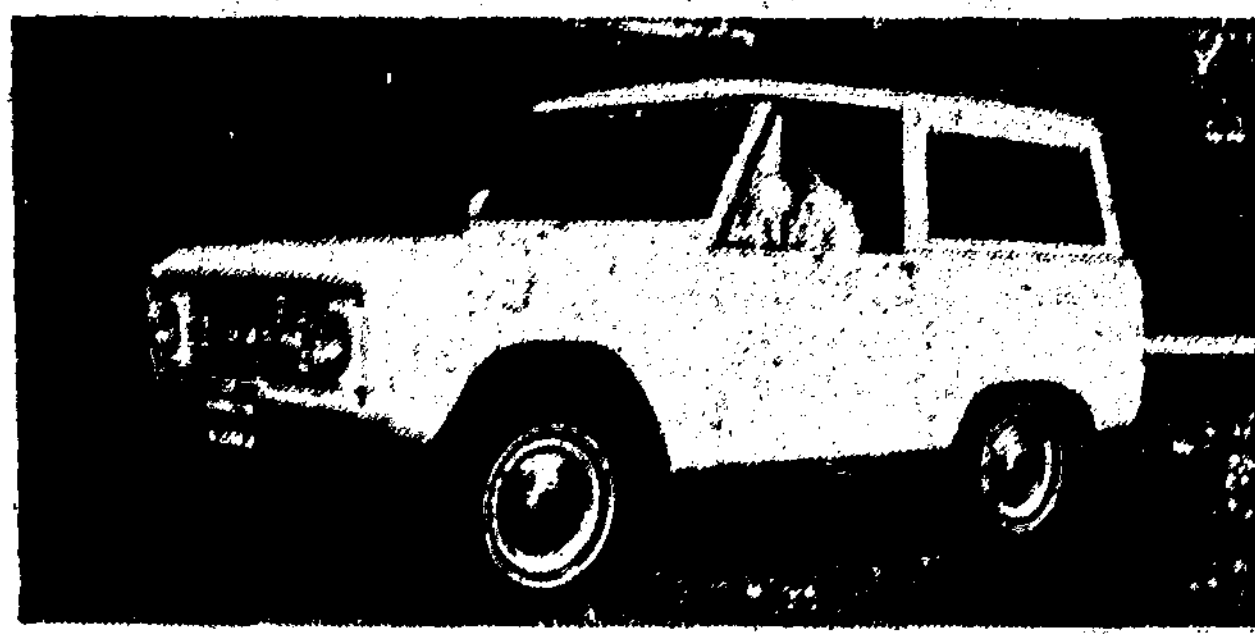
Lincoln County Farm Bureau to have Ben McAllister as featured speaker

We hope to see all Lincoln County Farm Bureau members and their families present — Bob Gates, vice president.



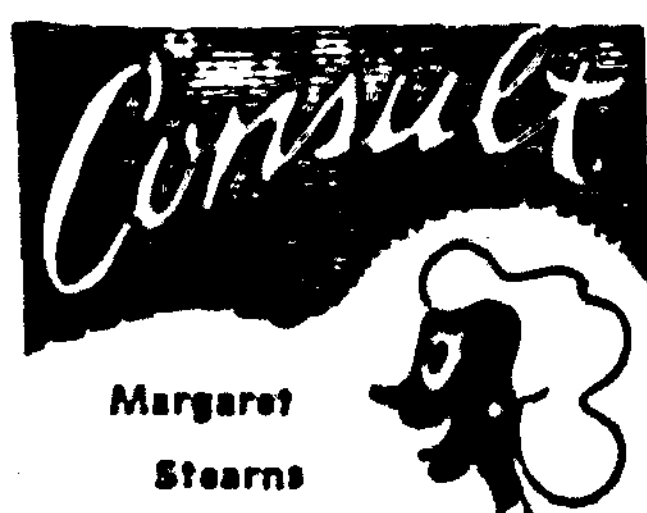

"A page for independent thought"

One of the nicest things

You cannot buy people . . .

The following is a rewrite and shortened version of an article about Saul D. Alinsky who has spent a quarter-century mobilizing the city poor to fight for their own destinies. We have long held to the opinions expressed here, and believe the experience of Mr. Alinsky worth consideration, and strong proof of the correctness of his opinions.

Speaking of the clause in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 requiring the "maximum feasible participation" of the poor in running local anti-poverty projects, Alinsky says: "The new Federal charter will not foster an authentic social revolution." Should people with no more credentials than a skinny wallet make decisions normally trusted to government and welfare agencies? They should, says the charter. But they won't be allowed to, says Alinsky.

The war on poverty is far more likely to become a "green wave of dollars, killing these militant, independent leaders of the poor, buying them off and killing them." For a community, the risk in having firebrand leaders is discomfort; the risk

in not having them is Watts. People don't get opportunity, freedom or equality or dignity as a gift or an act of charity. You need organization — first, to compel concessions, and second, to make the other side deliver. People who feel trapped in no-way-out poverty, don't organize effectively unless someone with the requisite skill moves in, listens to their gripes, finds their real leaders and sets them moving in showy protest campaigns.

It is Alinsky's view that there is no real progress without conflict. Poverty means not only lacking money but also lacking power. Where there is no money, the only source of power is in sheer, organized numbers, a power bloc big and tough and rude enough to force the "status quo" to make concessions for comfort's sake. He goes on, any meaningful U. S. war on poverty ought to act on that premise.

The poverty war becomes, according to Alinsky, a giant "porik barrel," and there is little for the militant poor to do but go on organizing, complaining, and demanding a piece of the U. S. anti-poverty action.

Building a town!

Cities in which a newspaper strike occurs at once realize the much heralded "power of the press."

In May of this year when the Baltimore Md. newspaper workers were on strike the results were dramatic. During the first four weeks without newspaper service downtown retail stores reported sales were off at least 30 per cent, according to the Baltimore Retail Merchants Assn.

The great drop in sales resulted despite the prevalence of many other types of media in the area.

Shoppers were content to venture only near their homes rather than take a chance on what was being sold down-

town. The merchants located in the heart of the city could not advertise their lower prices and higher quality goods through other media as effectively as the regular newspaper.

The same thing will happen in a city of any size when there is no local newspaper service. Consumers may be attracted to other shopping areas through a d v e r t i s e m e n t s from other printed media, or through eloquence of market.

Even if there is presently a newspaper operating, increased advertising will help the market area as a whole. By attracting more customers, the area will grow economically.

When a merchant places an advertisement in his local newspaper he is in a manner of speaking performing a civic function—aiding in his town's expansion—S.S. Talbert, Chairman, Dept. of Journalism, University of Mississippi.

We returned a small favor in a small way last Thursday. When it was dry in Lincoln County and ranchers wanted to pow-wow on the subject of jet flying and rain we called Lloyd Cornett, director of information at Holloman AF Missile Development Center. Lloyd came through good and five people came up from Holloman to the meeting. Thursday was "news day" and day of the 2,500th track run at Holloman so the News editor went, this instead of going to Capitan to take football pictures.

The most important general impression we gained at Holloman was that the missile center will continue to grow. More projects are being routed to Holloman, more new equipment being brought in, more construction going on, more people more of everything. New shopping center scheduled for Alamo and Publisher Billy Holder said he was getting ready for expansion, new building, new press etc.

One of the jobs performed by the development center, testing inertial guidance systems (which tell missiles where they should go) is a very complex deal and we frankly were somewhat lost during the tour of this laboratory. From previous experience, 23 months in Boeing plant, we know the price of accuracy and they have instruments at Holloman, some as large as a house, that are accurate to much less than a cat's whisker. It isn't cheap work but

then the destination is the moon, or other targets requiring precise guidance, and a second-rate quality of work would never make the trip.

The chimps at Holloman are a real circus, and much smarter than people think. The ones you see on television are youngsters, they have full-grown 150-pound chimps at Holloman. We watched a chimp named Shirley in a space capsule operating levers at her instrument panel so rapidly that we couldn't follow her motions. The doctor conducting this tour said they thought their chimps probably were neurotic, from being caged up and a large new pen is being built where the chimps will have more freedom. Chimps are figured to have five times the strength of a human.

ORDINANCE NO. 89

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE HEIGHT OF STRUCTURES AND OBJECTS OF NATURAL GROWTH, AND OTHERWISE REGULATING THE USE OF PROPERTY, IN THE VICINITY OF THE CONTROL ZONES, HORIZONTAL ZONE AND CONICAL ZONE, AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR CHANGES IN THE RESTRICTIONS AND BOUNDARIES OF SUCH ZONES; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS USED HEREIN; REFERRING TO THE CARRIZOZO MUNICIPAL AIRPORT ZONING MAP WHICH IS INCORPORATED IN AND MADE A PART OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; ESTABLISHING A BOARD OF APPEALS; AND IMPOSING PENALTIES, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority conferred by 14-40-1 through 14-40-13, and 14-40-14 through 14-40-24, 1965 Session Laws of New Mexico. It is hereby found that an airport hazard endangers the lives and property of users of the Carrizozo Municipal Airport and of occupants of land in its vicinity, and also, if of the obstruction type, in effect reduces the size of the area available for the landing, taking-off and maneuvering of aircraft, thus tending to destroy or impair the utility of the Carrizozo Municipal Airport and the public investment therein. Accordingly, it is declared: (1) that the creation or establishment of an airport hazard is a public nuisance and an injury to the region served by the Carrizozo Municipal Airport; (2) that it is necessary in the interest of the public health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of the State of New Mexico that the creation or establishment of airport hazards be prevented to obviate the destruction or impairment of the utility of the airport and the public investment therein; and (3) that the prevention of these hazards should be accomplished, to the extent legally possible, by the exercise of the police power without compensation. It is further declared that both the prevention of the creation or establishment of airport hazards and the elimination, removal, alteration, mitigation, or abatement and lighting of existing airport hazards are public purposes for which a public subdivision may raise and expend public funds and acquire land or interest in land.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE AIRPORT ZONING BOARD OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. SHORT TITLE - This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "Carrizozo Municipal Airport Zoning Ordinance."

SECTION II. DEFINITIONS - As used in this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (1) AIRPORT - Means Carrizozo Municipal Airport, Carrizozo, New Mexico.
(2) AIRPORT ELEVATION - Means the established elevation of the highest point on the usable landing area, which is 5370 feet, MSL.
(3) AIRPORT HAZARD - Means any structure, tree or use of land which obstructs the airspace required for or is otherwise hazardous to the flight of aircraft in landing or taking-off at the airport.
(4) AIRPORT REFERENCE POINT - Means the point established as the approximate geographic center of the airport landing area and is established at a location described as follows: Longitude 105° 58' 15", latitude 33° 38' 55".
(5) BOARD OF APPEALS - Means a board consisting of five (5) members appointed by the Airport Zoning Board as provided in Chapter 44, Article 2, Paragraph b, of New Mexico State Statutes.
(6) HEIGHT - For the purpose of determining the height limits in all zones set forth in this ordinance and shown on the zoning map, the datum shall be mean sea level unless otherwise specified.
(7) LANDING AREA - Means the Area of the airport used for landing, taking-off or taxiing of aircraft.
(8) NON-CONFORMING USE - Means any structure, tree, or use of land which is lawfully in existence at the time the regulation is prescribed in the ordinance or an amendment thereto becomes effective and is not then meet the requirements of said regulation.
(9) RUNWAY - Means a way other than instrument runway.
(10) PERSON - Means as individual, firm, partnership, corporation, company, association, or stock association, or body politic, and includes a trustee, executor, assignee, administrator, guardian, or other

(11) RUNWAY - Means the landing strip or the part of the airport used for take-off and landing of aircraft.
(12) STRUCTURE - Means an object constructed or installed by man, including, but without limitation, buildings, towers, smoke stacks, and overhead transmission lines.
(13) TREE - Means any object of natural growth.

SECTION III. ZONES - In order to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance, there are hereby created and established certain zones which include all of the land lying within the Non-Instrument Approach Zones, Transition Zones, Horizontal Zone & Conical Zone. Such areas and Zones are shown on the Carrizozo Municipal Airport Zoning Map consisting of one (1) sheet, prepared by Mann Engineering Co., and dated June 28, 1965, which is attached to this ordinance and made a part hereof. The various zones are hereby established and defined as follows:

(1) NON-INSTRUMENT APPROACH ZONES - A non-instrument approach zone is established at each end of all non-instrument runways on the Carrizozo Municipal Airport for take-offs. The non-instrument approach zone shall have a width of 250 feet at a distance of 100 feet beyond each end of the runway, widening thereafter uniformly to a width of 2250 feet at a distance of 10,100 feet beyond each end of the runway. Its centerline being the continuation of the centerline of the runway.

(2) TRANSITION ZONES - Transition zones are hereby established adjacent to each non-instrument runway and approach zone as indicated on the zoning map. Transition zones symmetrically located on either side of runways, have variable width as shown on the zoning map. Transition zones extend outward from a line 125 feet on either side of the centerline of the non-instrument runway, for the length of such runway 100 feet on each end and are parallel and level with such runway centerline. The transition zones along such runways slope upward and outward one (1) foot vertically for each seven (7) feet horizontally to the point where they intersect the surface of the horizontal and conical zones.

(3) HORIZONTAL ZONE - A horizontal zone is hereby established as the area within a circle with its center at the Airport Reference Point and having a radius of 5000 feet. The horizontal zone does not include the non-instrument approach zones and the transition zones.
(4) CONICAL ZONE - A conical zone is hereby established as the area that commences at the periphery of the horizontal zone and extends outward therefrom a distance of 3000 feet. The conical zone does not include the non-instrument approach zones and transition zones.

SECTION IV. HEIGHT LIMITATIONS - Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, no structures or trees shall be erected, altered, or maintained to a height in excess of the height limit herein established for each zone. Such height limitations are hereby established for each of the zones in question as follows:

- (1) NON-INSTRUMENT APPROACH ZONES - One (1) foot in height for each twenty (20) feet in horizontal distance beginning at a point 100 feet from and at the elevation of the end of the runway and extended to a point 10,100 feet from the end of the runway.
(2) TRANSITION ZONES - One (1) foot in height for each seven (7) feet in horizontal distance beginning at any point 125 feet at each side of centerline normal to and at the elevation of the centerline of runways extending 1175 feet beyond each and thereof, extending to a height of 150 feet above the airport elevation which is 5320 feet above the mean sea level. In addition to the foregoing, there are established height limits of one (1) foot vertical height for each seven (7) feet horizontal distance measured from the edges of all approach zones for the entire length of the approach zones and extending upward and outward to the points where they intersect the horizontal or conical surfaces.
(3) HORIZONTAL ZONE - One hundred fifty (150) feet above the airport elevation or height of 5520 feet above mean sea level.

(4) CONICAL ZONE - One (1) foot in height for each twenty (20) feet of horizontal distance beginning at the periphery of the horizontal zone, extending to a height of 300 feet above the airport elevation, or 5670 MSL.
Where an area is covered by more than one (1) height limitation, the more restrictive limitations shall prevail.
Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as prohibiting the growth, construction or maintenance of any tree or structure to a height up to 30 feet above the surface of the land.

SECTION V. USE RESTRICTIONS - Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Ordinance, no use may be made of land within any zone established by this Ordinance in such a manner as to create electrical interference with radio communication between the airport and the aircraft, make it difficult for the flyers to distinguish between airport lights and others, result in glare in the eyes of flyers using the airport, impair visibility in the vicinity of the airport or otherwise endanger the landing, taking-off, or maneuvering of aircraft.

SECTION VI. NON-CONFORMING USES - (a) Regulations not retroactive. The regulations prescribed by this Ordinance shall not be construed to require the removal, lowering, or other changes or alteration of any structure or tree not conforming to the regulations as of the effective date of this Ordinance, or otherwise interfere with the continuance of any non-conforming use. Nothing herein contained shall require any change in the construction, alteration, or intended use of any structure, the construction or alteration of which was begun prior to the effective date of this Ordinance, and is currently completed.

(b) Marking and lighting. Notwithstanding the preceding provision of this Section, the owner of any non-conforming structure or tree is hereby required to permit the installation, operation, and maintenance thereof of such markers and lights as shall be deemed necessary by the Administrative Agency to indicate to the operators of aircraft in the vicinity of the airport, the presence of such airport hazards. Such markers and lights shall be installed, operated, and maintained at the expense of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico.

SECTION VII. PERMITS - (a) Future Uses - Except as specifically provided in paragraphs 1, 2, and 3 hereunder, no material change shall be made in the use of the land and no structure or tree shall be erected, altered, planted or otherwise established in any zone hereby created, unless a permit therefor shall have been applied for and granted. Each application for a permit shall set forth the purpose for which the permit is desired, with sufficient particulars to permit it to be determined whether the proposed structure or tree would conform to the regulations herein prescribed. If such determination is in the affirmative, the permit shall be granted.

(1) Foot in height for each twenty (20) feet of horizontal distance beginning at the periphery of the horizontal zone, extending to a height of 300 feet above the airport elevation, or 5670 MSL.
Where an area is covered by more than one (1) height limitation, the more restrictive limitations shall prevail.
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(4) CONICAL ZONE - A conical zone is hereby established as the area that commences at the periphery of the horizontal zone and extends outward therefrom a distance of 3000 feet. The conical zone does not include the non-instrument approach zones and transition zones.

SECTION VIII. ENFORCEMENT - The Carrizozo Board of Trustees is hereby designated the Administrative Agency or Administrative Officer. It shall be the duty of the Administrative Agency or Officer to administer and enforce the regulations prescribed herein. Applications for permits and variances shall be made to the Administrative Agency upon a form furnished by him. Applications required by this ordinance to be submitted to the Administrative Agency shall be promptly considered and granted or denied by the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall be forthwith transmitted by the Administrative Agency.

SECTION IX. BOARD OF APPEALS - (a) The Board is hereby created a Board of Appeals to have and exercise the following powers: (1) to hear and decide appeals from the order, requirements, decisions or determinations made by the Administrative Agency or Officer in enforcement of this Ordinance; (2) to hear and decide appeals from the order, requirements, decisions or determinations made by the Board of Trustees upon application for a permit or variance; (3) to hear and decide appeals from the order, requirements, decisions or determinations made by the Board of Trustees upon application for a permit or variance; (4) to hear and decide appeals from the order, requirements, decisions or determinations made by the Board of Trustees upon application for a permit or variance.

(b) The Board of Appeals shall consist of five (5) members appointed by the Carrizozo Municipal Board of Trustees. The Board of Appeals shall be organized for a term of one (1) year and until its successors are duly appointed and installed. One shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year and two for a term of two (2) years. Members shall be appointed by the appointing authority for cause, and a written charge, after a public hearing.
The Board shall adopt rules for its procedure and procedure in harmony with the provisions of this Ordinance. The minutes of the Board shall be kept at the call of the Chairman and of such other times as the Board of Appeals may determine. The Chairman, or in his absence the acting chairman, may administer oaths and control the attendance of witnesses. All hearings of the Board shall be public. The Board shall keep minutes of its proceedings showing the vote of each member upon each question, or, if absent or failing to vote, indicating such fact, and shall keep records of its examinations and other official actions, all of which shall immediately be filed in the office of the Administrative Agency and shall be a public record.

(c) The Board shall make written findings of fact and conclusions of law giving the facts upon which it acted and its legal conclusions from such facts in reversing, affirming, or modifying any order, requirement, decision, or determination which comes before it under the provisions of this Ordinance.
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Election Proclamation

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each day's attendance during each session, and ten cents (\$0.10) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article IV of this Constitution, and in addition, two hundred dollars (\$200) a month for each month he is a member of the legislature."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE SALE OF INTEREST BEARING NOTES OR SECURITIES FOR LESS THAN THEIR ACQUISITION COST, AND TO REINVEST THE PROCEEDS IN HIGHER-YIELDING SECURITIES IN ORDER TO REALIZE INCREASED INCOME TO THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING THE STATE INVESTMENT COUNCIL TO INVEST NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PERCENT OF THE PERMANENT FUNDS IN CORPORATE SECURITIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourth vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state."

"The state investment officer, in order to realize increased income, may, with the approval of the state investment council, sell interest bearing notes or securities at less than their original acquisition cost, providing the proceeds are immediately reinvested in sufficiently higher yielding interest bearing notes or securities, to provide for a portion of the increased interest income to be amortized over the life of the

new investment which will restore to the corpus of the fund the amount of the capital loss realized on the sale of the original investment.

"In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall exercise the judgement and care under the circumstances then prevailing which businessmen of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, not more than fifty per cent of the permanent school fund or other permanent fund, shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds nor shall more than ten per cent of the voting stock of a corporation be held; and provided further, stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of business incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten consecutive years or longer immediately upon a national stock exchange."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO BORROW MONEY FOR REMODELING AND MAKING ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS OR IMPROVING SCHOOL GROUNDS, OR ANY COMBINATION OF THESE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No school district shall borrow money except for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, and in such cases only when the proposition to create the debt has been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors of the district as are owners of real estate within the school district and a majority of those voting on the question have voted in favor of creating such debt. No school district shall ever become indebted in an amount exceeding six percent on the assessed valuation of the taxable property within the school district as shown by the preceding general assessment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION TO ARTICLE 4 TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE BY LAW FOR THE WEIGHTING OF LEGISLATIVE VOTES FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECURING TO THE PEOPLE OF NEW MEXICO EQUAL PROTECTION OF THE LAWS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4 of the constitution of New Mexico by the addition of a new section to read:

"Notwithstanding any provisions of this constitution to the contrary, the legislature may provide by law for the weighting of the votes of the members of the state senate on matters coming before that body, in such manner that equal protection of the laws is secured to the people of this state."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

AMENDMENT NO. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6, SECTIONS 1 AND 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO AND ADDING NEW SECTIONS THERETO; CREATING A COURT OF APPEALS AND DEFINING JURISDICTION OF APPELLATE COURTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in the senate when sitting as a court of impeachment, a supreme court, a court of appeals, district courts, probate courts, justices of the peace and such courts inferior to the district courts as may be established by law from time to time in any county or municipality of the state, including juvenile courts."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Appeals from a judgement of the district court imposing a sentence of death or life imprisonment shall be taken directly to the supreme court. In all other cases criminal and civil, the supreme court shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law; provided that an aggrieved party shall have an absolute right to one appeal."

Section 3. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall consist of not less than three judges whose qualifications shall be the same as those of justices of the supreme court and whose compensation and election for terms of eight years shall be as provided by law, except that an initial term may be prescribed by law for less than eight years to provide maximum continuity."

A vacancy in the office of judge of the court of appeals shall be filled by appointment of the governor for a period provided by law.

Three judges of the court of appeals shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and a majority of those participating must concur in any judgment of the court.

When necessary, the chief justice of the supreme court may designate any justice of the supreme court, or any district judge of the state, to act as a judge of the court of appeals, and he may designate any judge of the court of appeals to hold court in any district, or to act as a justice of the supreme court."

Section 4. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall have no original jurisdiction. It may be authorized by law to review directly decisions of administrative agencies of the state, and it may be authorized by rules of the supreme court to issue all writs necessary or appropriate in aid of its appellate jurisdiction. In all other cases, it shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law."

Section 5. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4 OF THE CONSTITUTION BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION 42 PROVIDING FOR AN AUDITOR TO BE APPOINTED AS PRESCRIBED BY LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 42 to read:

Section 42. A legislative auditor shall be appointed as prescribed by law. The legislative auditor's duties shall be prescribed by law."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7

FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Lincoln County cattlemen are urged to treat cattle for grubs. Cattle in the area should be treated by October 15 in the Lincoln County area. Later treatments, after the grubs have formed lumps in the backs of cattle, are not as effective as treatments now.

Treating livestock with systemic insecticides after October 15 in Lincoln County could cause complications. Larvae are usually full grown after those dates and a heavy infestation would mean dumping considerable amounts of killed grubs into the animal's system. The animal's body must then absorb and overcome this foreign substance.

Recommended controls include sprays, dips, pour-on treatments, and feed additives. Co-Ral may be used as a dip, spray or pour-on according to manufacturers directions. It is used at a rate of one-half ounce per hundred pounds of animal weight.

Ruelene comes in formulations for pour-on or spray. Ronnel (Trolene) is a feed additive. It can be used as a seven-day treatment or a fourteen-day treatment.

Co-Ral, Ruelene and Ronnel give hornfly and lice control as well as controlling grubs.

Use these precautions when treating cattle:

Do not treat sick animals or those less than three months of age. Spray ANIMALS THREE TO SIX MONTHS OF AGE LIGHTLY. Do not treat animals for ten days before or after shipping or after exposure to disease.

Ruelene and Ronnel should not be used within 28 days of slaughter.

Co-Ral may be used up to the day of slaughter.

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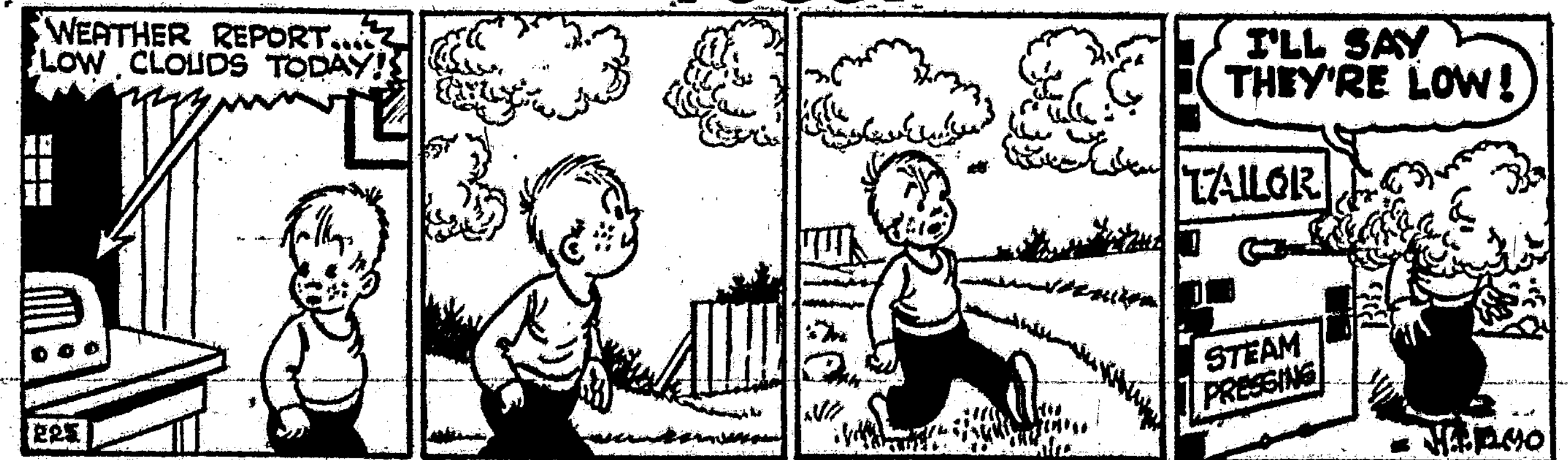

HAVEN FOR HOMELESS ANIMALS — The only animal shelter in Lincoln County is located at Ruidoso, operated solely on donations from individuals, with Mrs. Pat Patterson as caretaker, this shelter has a wide selection of animals for people who may be looking for a pet.

Mrs. Sista B. Lujan, born in 1869, is oldest social security beneficiary

In order to better acquaint the people of Lincoln County with the benefits provided by the Social Security Act, Mrs. Vicenta Z. Garcia and her mother, Sista S. Lujan gave their written consent for publication of the following concerning Mrs. Lujan's benefit payments and other facts concerning her life.

Mrs. Lujan is one of the few social security beneficiaries who are past age 95. She was born in Manzano, New Mexico on April 15, 1869. She never had the chance to go to school. Her parents seemed to think it was not important for girls to get an education, in those days, she said. They sent their boys to school but the girls stayed home, in most cases, for fear they might find a boy friend too

early in life, get married and leave home, she said. Mrs. Lujan did get married at the age of 15 years, anyway. She was married to Francisco Zamora. Fifteen children were born to them. Mr. Zamora was later killed in a car wreck in Winslow, Arizona. Mrs. Lujan's second marriage was to Leopoldo Lujan. They had no children. Mr. Lujan died on January 25, 1961. He had worked long enough under social security coverage for Mrs. Lujan to draw benefits as a widow, on his record. She has been drawing the minimum monthly amount payable since his death. The minimum is now \$40.00 per month. The reason she isn't drawing any more on her deceased husband is because he worked very little under the program before

his death. Everyone's benefit payment is based on the average yearly earnings of the wage earner on whose record the payments are made. Mrs. Lujan's benefit payments will continue as long as she lives unless she should remarry. In addition to the monthly benefits payable, she drew a small lump sum when her husband died. This too, was based on her husband's wage record. Mrs. Lujan has lived with her daughter, Vicenta Z. Garcia, in Lincoln since her husband died. Mrs. Lujan remembers the day Billy the Kid escaped from jail in Old Lincoln town. She lived about four or five blocks from the jail where Billy the Kid escaped, at that time. She remembers the dark red horse she saw Billy riding when he escaped. She was playing in the yard when Billy came by their place, twirling his gun. He stopped at their place a while and told them he had just been "released" from the jail and was leaving Lincoln never to return. He gave the family some rings, jewelry and other trinkets in exchange for a meal. He told them he had killed 21 men in his life time. The family didn't realize he had escaped from jail. He left quietly and they never saw him again but soon heard about the history making escape. They realized too late that they had befriended a jail escapee.

Mrs. Lujan still gets around in her house by using a cane. She is hoping to live at least 100 years of age, she said.

Her claim was completed through the Roswell Social Security Office. Any one wanting information about benefits payable in case of death, disability or old-age should contact the Roswell office, or see a representative from Roswell when he comes to Carrizozo on the third Monday of each month. He may be contacted in the Commissioner's room of the new Courthouse Building in Carrizozo.

Local PO does war on waste

The Lincoln County post offices have joined the President's "War on Waste".

"The reduction of waste in manpower and materials is one of the aims of this administration," President Lyndon B. Johnson said recently in outlining the Safety Policy for the Federal Service. "There is a great opportunity to make a significant reduction in that most senseless kind of waste - the loss of human lives through accidents, and at the same time save many millions of dollars."

We pledged ourselves to meet the goal set for the Post Office Department by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski; a 30% reduction in the number of injuries and their cost by 1970. The Mission Safety - 70% program as it is called, is designed to reduce Federal work injuries and costs. The goals are: the saving of approximately 200 lives, the prevention of approximately 45,000 disabling work injuries, and a saving to the Federal Government of nearly \$250 million in costs. Disabling injuries cost the Post Office Department nearly \$22 million last fiscal year.

We are starting the new year with a complete reappraisal of our past efforts. We plan a continuous program of expanded accident prevention measures to accomplish our goal. Each and every one of our county employees is being called upon to do his or her part; first, by working safely, secondly, by submitting suggestions to correct such dangerous conditions or practices. With the continuous and combined efforts of all employees we will do our part in reducing this unnecessary waste of lives, time and money.

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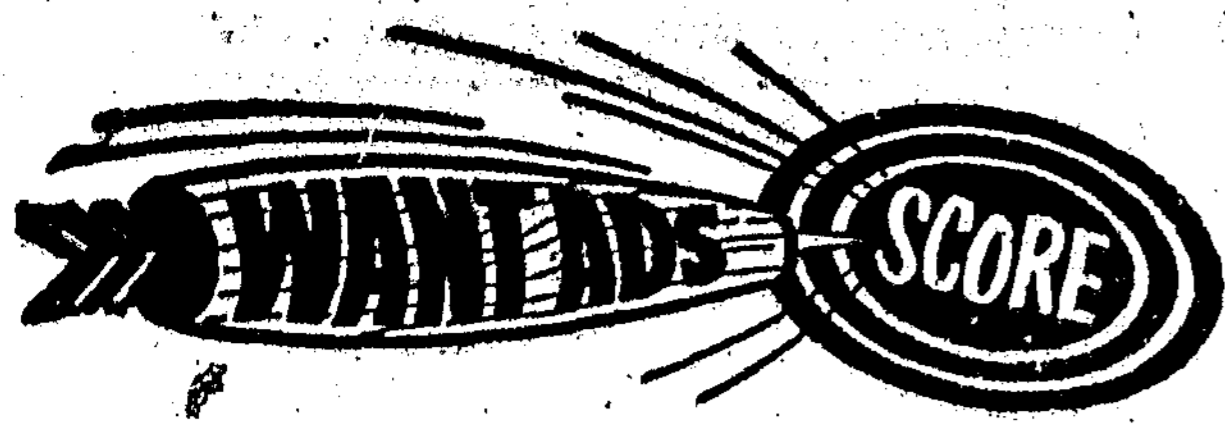
