Stockholders approve Shoprite acquisition

The stockholders of Shoprite Foods Inc. and Food Mart Inc. in ceparate meetings Wednesday approved a proposal concerned with the acquisition of Food Mart assets by Shoprite Foods Inc. The acquisition would be made about October 1st, cubject to various conditions including a fovorable tax ruling on the acquisition by the In-

ternal Revenue Service. Wednesday's vote by Food Mart stockholders in El Paso was 769, 985 shares in favor of the acquisition and 23,624 shares against. The proposal needed a two-thirds majority or 677, 455.

If the acquisition is consumated, the present chairman of Food Mart. J. Spencer Weed. will become honorary board chairman of Shoprite. Food Mart President Gordon W. Foster will become chairman of the new board. The present Shoprite board chairman. Herbert Wilcox, is to be the president and chief executive officer. Shoprite's present general manager and president, J. S. Reinhart, is to become executive vice president and general ma-

At a meeting of State Department officials and school official Tuesday Sept. 7. Mrs. Ellen Digneo announced the awarding of a Ford Foundation Grant to the Language Arts program of the Grade School. Work had started on this project las February. Mrs. Cora Hawkins Special Teacher, and Jake Hawkins Councelor have been doing extensive research in testing and observing since in mid-August. There has been field trips to Santa Fe and also to Las Cruces, It was felt by the Ford Foundation authority that Carrizozo offered the best opportunity to do a study as a result of existing personnel, library and other resources. Representing the State Department of Education was Dr. Bob Swanson Director of Guideance and counceling, his assistant Dr. Mike Hammer, Dr. Mildred Fitzpatrick director of elementary education Dr. Paul Simpson director of English, and Mrs. Digneo from the State Department staff but also representing the Small School Project and the Ford Foundation. tificates, corporation filing fee. The \$10.00 received for each share will be put in escow to be used in purchase of building sites, land or other items of substance that might help an industry to locate here.


Following the sale of stock there will be a stockholders meeting at which time permanent directors for the development corporation will be elec-


One of the aims of the corporation is to make good use of the money received from stock sales, and any investment made will be in something of lasting value, such as land or buildings.



Important decisions face voters September 28

The News editor has the views of both Rep. W. G. Shrecengost and Sen, Joe Skeen of Lincoln County, as well as reading the proposed constitutional amendments a number of times. We have formed some conclusions, one being that voters will have to make up their own minds about a number of these amendments.

Following is the briefest of accounts and some conclusions about the eight amendments and the hospital levy:

#1 - Proposes that members of the legislature receive compensation of \$200 per month in addition to per diem (\$20 perday). Argument for: Outside of regular sessions for which they are paid, the legislators spend much time and money on state business. New Mexico is third from bottom of list of states in pay to legislators. This salary would be expected to attract more qualified persons to run for the legislature.

Arguments against: Increased cost to state will be about \$250,000. Legislators are performing a public service, should not expect reimbursement beyoud expenses.

Our vote: No decision. #2 Proposes to liberalize investment of state permanent fund money. Arguments for: fund may be invested, amendment would increase amount to

Arguments for: There are plenty of cafeguards and would ease tax payers burden if fund could be invested at profit.

Our vote: "Yes" on amendment #2.

#3 proposes to allow school districts to borrow money for remodeling and making additions to existing school buildings or grounds. Arguments for: The bond indebtedness limit is not changed. Would allow districts to save money in many instances by making use of existing structures and lands by doing remodeling instead of building complete new structure. Countles now have this privilege (Lincoln County courthouse annex remodeled), schools should have same.

Arguments against: Might be a rash of bond elections for minor repairs.

Our vote: "Yes" on amend-

ment #3. #4 Proposes to provide weighting of votes of members in state senate. Arguments for: Only plan offered yet that will assure Lincoln County any voice in the legislature. The last House reapportionment bill put Lincoln and Sierra Counties together, without this weighted vote in the Senate, Lincoln Law now to restrictive that County could end up with no losing stocks cannot be sold, representation at all in either and only 25% of permanent House or Senate.

Arguments against: Weighted vote might not meet constitutional requirements, Without weighted voting in committee, the whole purpose of weighter voting is defeated.

Our vote: "Yes" on amendment #4.

#5 To establish an intermediate appellate court between the district courts and the supreme court Arguments for: The court of appeals would speed up justice and reduce cost of litigation. Supreme Court is about three years behind now.

Arguments against: The new court would cost \$100,000 for salaries alone. Our vote: "Yes" on amend-

ment #5. #6 To authorize appointment of legislature auditor to

find out how money is spent. Arguments against: Auditor should be elected by people and responsible to them instead of to the legislature.

Our vote: "Yes" on amend-

ment #6. #7 To repeal the section requiring a constitutional convention to change the requirements for amending certain sections of the constitution. Arguments for: There has never been a convention in this state since the adoption of the constitution in 1910. This would remove an unnecessarily res-

trictive provision. Arguments against: The present system of amending the constitution, whereby every voter has a vote, is good. Our vote: "No" on amend-

ment 47. #8 To provide for district court trials de novo upon appeal from any state executive in matter relating to water rights. Argumenta for: Water rights very important, the state engineer has too much power. This will put a check on his discretion and allow the court to get at the truth by receiving new evidence or evidence not

allowed by the state engineer, Arguments against: Litigants should present all of their evidence at the state engineer's hearing to enable him to make a proper decision.

Our vote: "Yes" On amendment #8.

Indigent hospital levy: A levy in excess of the constitutional limitation of 20 mills for the purpose of the Indigent Hospital Claims Act. Such levy to be made annually against the taxable value of the property in the county.

This situation is confused. If the money is not made available the only recourse for county hospitals (two in Lincoin) will be to me the county. Generally we are opposed to such action, this piece of legislation puts the county commiseloners in the tight spot, but

not one they can't handle. Our yote: No decision.

Air Force Missile Development Center becoming increasingly important

The role of Air Force Missile Development Center is becoming increasingly important in the field of national defense, Col. Ralph S. Garman, commander, told a group of visiting newsmen during a welcoming speech on the base yesterday.

Col. Garman said that a recent directive affirms that the General Inertial Guidance Facility (CIGTF) is the Department of defense focal point for aircraft inertial navigation test and evaluation. CIGTF is already involved in testing the Mark II Avionics system for possible use in Air Force and Navy aircraft, he said.

Initial contacts have been made with the Army and Navy preparatory to detailed planning for test of other aircraft inertial navigation systems.

The facility has previously been designated as the Air Force test center for guidance systems and has done test and evaluation work for various NASA components as well as for other military agencies and private industry. The order will tend to reaffirm the importance of the test and evaluation work done at Holloman in the guidance system field. It will add permanence to the facility, but will add little to the economic status of the facility.

Col. Garman's remarks preceded a briefing on the entire base conducted in the Center's conference room, which explained the mission of the Center and included a brief rundown of the various work that is done there.

The newsmen also saw the 2.500th sled run conducted on the famous Holloman test track. The dual rail sied, known as the Mongoose, reached a maximum speed of 800 feet per second as it made its two-thirds of a mile run down the track in about five seconds. The sled run was to test a component of a LASER velocity measuring system in a track environment.

The sled pulled 13 Gs as it pulled to an abrupt half by uso of water brakes.

The group was given an inspection tour of the famed Chimp colony, the Aeromedical research Laboratory, training labs of the famous Ham and Enoz, and site of many a test preparatory to putting man in orbit.

Chimpanzees are used in the experiments because of their biological similarities to man. Their facilities are likely the best in the world, their care is constant and while they are used to under go tests, they are treated in the most humane manners one could imagine.

One of the laboratories has been built for the sole purpose of "teaching our missles where they should go," or in other words, to find their way to a given destination. The destination could be the moon, a point in space, or an X on the earth. but all the flying hardware in the world would never reach destination without possessing a sense of direction. Precise instruments to give that sense of direction to guidance or navigational systems are in use at Holloman. They work to the "nth" degrees.

at the aircraft and Missile Test facility, where the famed RF-4C is getting a workout in some of its operational tests. One of the world's fastest reconnaissance planes, the twin-jet all-

weather aircraft is in Catagory II flight tests in preparation for its eventual use by the Tactical Air Command as a reconnaissance plane. Already it is being used as a fighter, and the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing is fully equipped with the F-4C version of the McDonnell plane.

Catagory II tests include tests which will determine equipment performance and determine operational balance between the aircraft's various sub-systems.

The F-101 and F-106 are still undergoing tests in this branch of Holloman's activity.

An explanation, as well as static display of equipment, was given on the uses of RAD-SCAT radar, a project which also has a heavy work load going at the big test center.




