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Campbell and Lusk counted close buddies

GENE AND JACK CLOSE BUDDIES

SANTA FE — Governor-running Gene Lusk of Carlsbad is probably closer to Gov. Jack Campbell than anyone outside the statehouse.

Lusk, a former state senator, has been called in repeatedly by Campbell for help on legislative matters. Campbell named him as the New Mexico member of the Pecos River Compact Commission, and they are personal friends.

Campbell won't choose the next Demo nominee for governor, that being the prerogative of Sens. Clint Anderson and Joe Montoya, but the relationship with the governor is a major assist for Lusk and could lead to Senator Anderson backing him even over the stout opposition of Senator Montoya.

HARD TO FORGET 1960 PRIMARY

Montoya won't admit it but there are convincing indications all around that he will oppose Lusk for governor.

There are several reasons but the big overshadowing one is the 1960 primary race for Montoya's seat in the House when followers of the late Sen. Dennis Chavez put together an elaborate gang-up against Montoya with Lusk, majority leader of the state senate, as the lead horse.

Lusk was the only angle in a field of five. Among three Spanish-Americans splitting the Montoya vote was an employee from Sen. Dennis Chavez' staff, Carlos Trujillo.

It was a desperate hour for Montoya and he surprised even himself by not only beating Lusk, 70, 577 to 41,309, but by running up more votes than all his opponents combined. The four of them got 52,501.

After that Montoya is obviously leery of encouraging Lusk for governor in 1966. He would be on an expiring second term in 1970 and looking for some place to go at the same time that Montoya comes up for re-election.

FORCE MONTOYO TO BURROUGHS

If Clint and Campbell insist on backing Lusk it is probable that Montoya would throw in behind John Burroughs and there would be a grand battle in the manner of the 1940s and 1950s when Senator Chavez commonly had his own candidate matched against the choice of the other party leaders.

There doesn't seem to be any possibility of Anderson and Campbell moving over to Burroughs so the outlook is for either a fight between the followers of the two senators or a compromise on a third candidate.

GONE TOO FAR TO PULL OUT

A compromise would be difficult because Burroughs and Lusk are so far into the race.

First up for consideration, it seems, would be Speaker Bruce

King of Santa Fe who has been working hard for support for the nomination but hasn't made much headway among the politicians who have such a big voice in conventions and primary elections.

Roy Walker of Clovis, a 4th prospect for the race, is a remote possibility.

A Montoya split with Anderson so soon after Anderson did so much to get him in the Senate is hard to imagine, but the presence of Lusk in the governor field makes an extraordinary situation.

BURROUGHS AN LBJ MAN

Meanwhile there is speculation among political observers on the possibility of Burroughs receiving encouragement from LBJ, no less.

Burroughs was chosen last year by the Johnson organization as New Mexico campaign coordinator for Johnson and the state came through with the 60 percent vote goal set by the Democrats.

Earlier, Burroughs who was governor at the time, headed the state delegation to the 1960 Los Angeles convention and stayed with Johnson against Kennedy even after it was known that he was a loser.

President Johnson has already said that he would take a hand in congressional elections next year and he might also be interested in having friendly governors.

THE KENNEDYS LIKED MURPHY

The Kennedys in 1962 rather timorously encouraged Leo Murphy for the Demo nomination for governor.

Murphy was given two federal appointments, one from the White House and one from Atty. Gen. Bobby, during the course of the primary campaign, and there were chummy, autographed pictures of Murphy with the Kennedys, but they never came through with the big push that the Santa Fe Irishman needed to get over the hump.

President Johnson seems to be less timid about such things. If he wanted to help Burroughs the logical route would be through Senator Anderson.

Gene Brown Dies

Gene Brown, who formerly operated a service station in Carrizozo and more recently was working at mining, died in an Albuquerque hospital last week after a long illness. Mr. Brown was 36.

Local hospital rates change

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo is announcing a change of rates effective October 1. Ward rooms will be \$14 per day, semi-private \$16 and isolation rooms \$20 per day.

The change in rates was felt necessary to maintain a quality nursing staff and to keep the hospital operating in the black.

TB Hospital Board studies occupancy

The Board of Directors of Fort Stanton TB Hospital went over a number of problems dealing with hospital operation at their regular meeting last Friday. The rate of occupancy is of considerable concern. In January there were 163 patients, in February 195, and in September 125. The number of admissions during this period was about the same — the difference is that during the 1964 period 164 patients were discharged, in 1965 during the period 210 patients were discharged.

One technical reason for the declining occupancy is less Indian patients, only five at the hospital now. Another good reason is that progress is being made in use of drugs for treatment of TB patients.

The drug Trecator became available in 1962 and started a program of retreatment for patients where one out of three used to be hopeless. Many chronic positive patients are no longer classified as positive due to treatment by Trecator and two other drugs.

The Board discussed the occupancy situation, in relation to the total hospital situation in the state, and this discussion will be continued at the next meeting in October.

Dr. Wilhelm Rosenblatt told the Board, "We don't keep patients so long now". One of the problems of TB Hospital occupancy concerns the group of patients who have been at the hospital for several years, they have lost contact with the outside world including their families. The time comes when they can be discharged and they have no place to go, in fact many of them do not want to leave the hospital.

The average stay per patient now is seven to 12 months. The "long stay" group is gradually disappearing at Fort Stanton. Dr. Rosenblatt predicted the occupancy would be 80 to 100 patients in about two years. The extended clinic program started by Fort Stanton is aiding the declining rate, and more frequent clinics will help. Getting to the prime TB contacts will help finish the job.

The character of Fort Stanton TB Hospital has changed from what might be termed a rest home to an "intensive treatment unit".

The Board agreed to a budget of \$925,000, which is \$25,000 less than a year ago and as low a figure as Supt. George Bryan and the Board believe the budget can be.

A total of 516 votes were cast in the county.

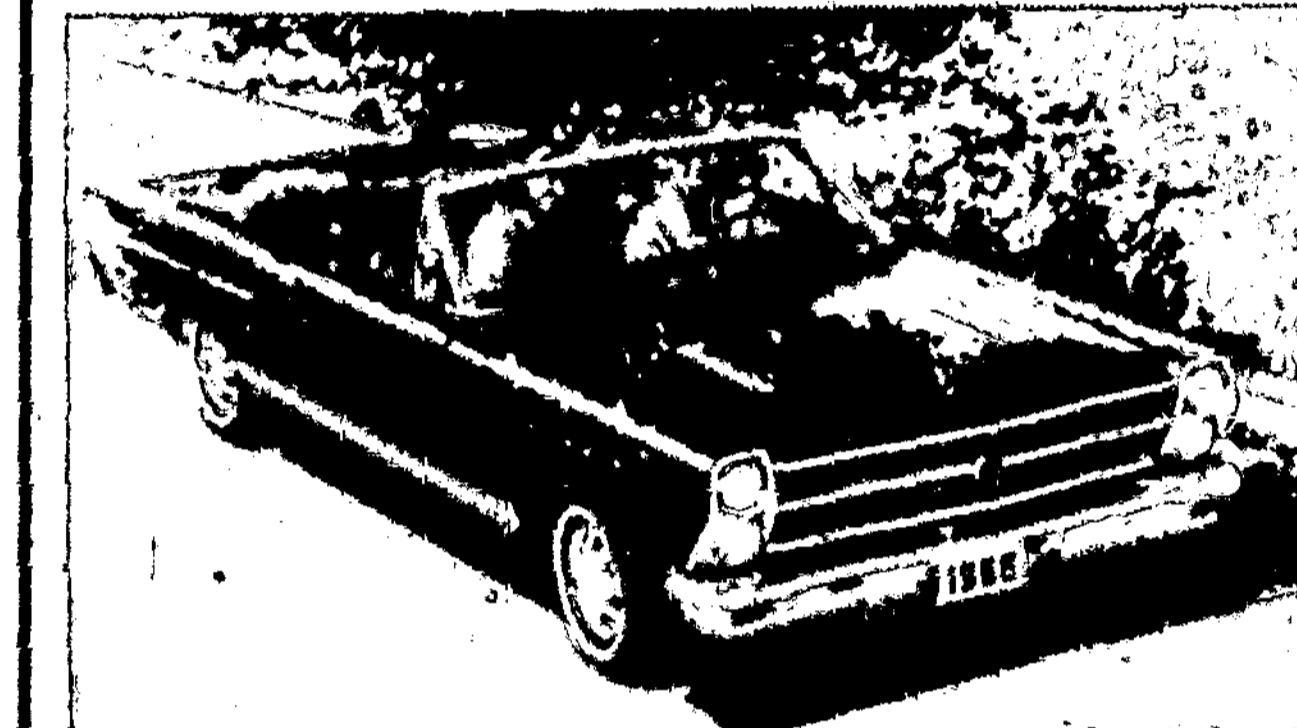
The indigent hospital levy was defeated 206 for, 291 against.

This heading "Ipso facto" is a cute wordage meaning "by the very nature of the case" which has application to an error of government that is slowly but surely bringing us to a centralized state.

For instance, right now there is a bill before Congress, introduced by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd that is commonly called an anti-gun bill. It will seriously restrict the sale of guns to individuals. The ipso facto thinking here is that by taking guns away from people, criminals would not have guns with which to commit their crimes. There are many other factors, but basically this is the cause, and Dodd is wrong. Firearms control laws will no more stop crime than the laws now recorded have done.

The words are being bandied about that our schools are inadequate and many can be placed in an adequate category. But to say that all the schools in New Mexico or any other state are inadequate and much Federal aid is needed is ipso facto thinking.

A generally accepted supposition today is that any person with income of less than \$3,000 a year is mighty poor, they need a lot of government help so they can live in a manner to which they would like to become accustomed. It does not matter if in certain sections of the north, south, east, or west, \$3,000 a year is real wealth.

The ipso facto department of our government decides that \$3,000 is not enough money so they figure up more share-the-wealth and work-only-the-eager plans.

This doctrine of throwing the entire nation into one class is our worst enemy today. State's rights suffer, individual rights suffer, fewer people work for a living, and more get by on a free-load basis.

The only real cure and stall to a more completely centralized government is for both states and individuals to activate, yell, scream, and vote for representation of the people, by the people and against further ipso facto thinking.

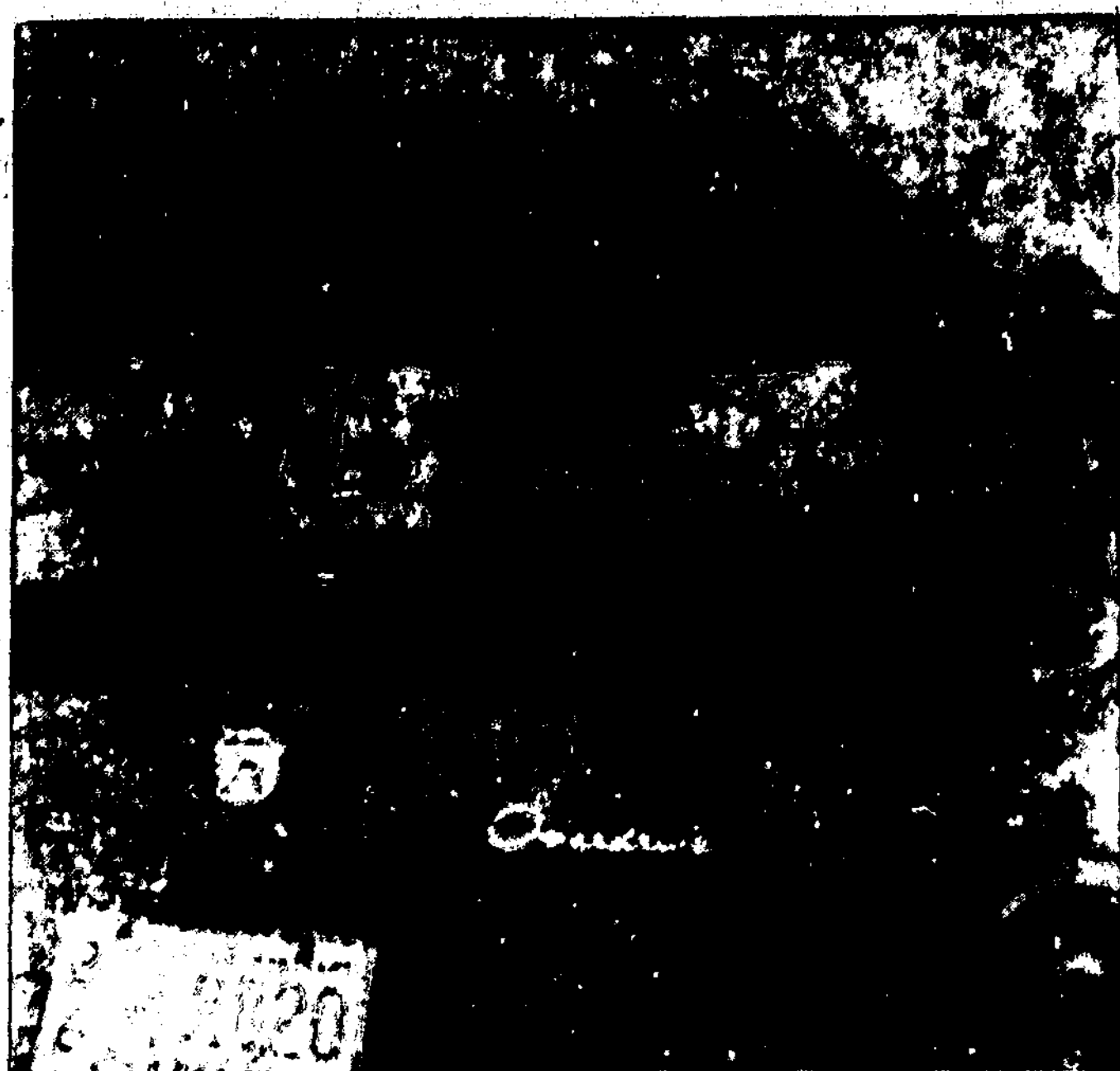
Lengthy discussions are helpful

Overnite delivery scheduled by PO

A new "Scheduled Service" system which provides over-night delivery of ZIP Coded parcel post five days a week for parcels between all of the 379 post offices within the state of New Mexico was announced today by Postmaster Hayman.

The program, which covers the entire state—121,510 square miles—will mean that a parcel deposited in any of the 379 offices will be available for delivery in any one of the other offices within the state the next day.

Deputy Assistant Postmaster General, August C. Hahn announced the dramatic new program at a press conference in Albuquerque followed by a meeting of the Albuquerque Mail User's Council, where further details were discussed.

Mr. Hahn emphasized that the success of the program depends to a large extent on precision timing in the transferring of bulk mails at major cities throughout the state. "The New Mexico system forms a western nucleus for an eventual nationwide tie-in of scheduled service areas which will result in dependable scheduled delivery for parcel post from coast-to-coast," he stated.

Extensive testing has assured the success of this dramatic new program, which in effect offers "first-rate service" for fourth-class mail. Mailing deadlines for this service will be 4:30 PM at Carrizozo.

"The Post Office Department found through extensive study," the Postmaster said, "that one of the major problems of the parcel post service has been lack of dependability of delivery. For many mailers, it is often more important to know when a parcel is going to be delivered than it is to just get it there in a hurry." For these reasons the Post Office Department developed the concept of Scheduled Service.

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Inside The Capitol

DISTRICT JUDGES FACING PRIMARY

SANTA FE — New Mexico's 21 district judges, with no conventions to protect them from opposition, are all subject to the direct primary for nomination next year.

When Democratic leaders were busy repealing part of the direct primary law in 1963 their only interest was in getting uncontested nomination for Joe Montoya for the U. S. Senate from a state party convention, and it did not occur to them to bring judges also into the convention system, the group with the strongest justification for being excluded from primary campaigning.

The convention system set up in 1963 applies only to the nomination of congressional and state officials, leaving district judges, district attorneys, state school board members and county officials subject to the primary.

ALL PLANNING TO RUN AGAIN

Reports from legal and political circles indicate that all 21 will be running for re-election—19 Democrats and two Republicans, Caswell Neal of Carlsbad and Paul Larrazolo of Albuquerque.

Only one, Clyde McCulloch of Farmington, has the age and seniority to qualify for retirement but there is no indication that he wants to quit.

There is speculation that there will be primary opposition for several of the judges and also general election opposition.

Only David Carmody of the supreme court is coming up for election and he can get his nomination from the convention.

E. T. Hensley, Jr., of Clovis has been on the bench longer than any other district judge, since 1947, and he is still short of the 60 retirement age.

William T. Scoggin of Las Cruces who has been having a bad time with the supreme court, the legislature and the governor's finance board has the next longest time on the bench, since 1948, and he is also short of 60.

ALBUQUERQUE STALLS DRIVE

A scheme being pushed by

several state senators for a revenge session to get even with Sen. Clint Anderson has hit an unexpected snag in Albuquerque where the 18 representatives are refusing to sign the petition for the extraordinary session of the legislature that requires endorsement of three-fifths of the members of each chamber.

Some legislators want to repeal the pre-primary convention law that was passed in '63 and retained in 1965 at the request of Sen. Anderson because Anderson has opposed their efforts to retain small county representation in the state senate.

The house had been considered a cinch for endorsement of the extraordinary session petition because all but three of the 77 members were for repeal of the convention law in the session last winter, but the Albuquerque resistance has changed the outlook.

The Albuquerque reluctants are citing the cost of the session and the revenge motive in opposing the session.

An item in this space a while back said an extraordinary session called by the legislators themselves had never been attempted which was incorrect.

Back in 1959 Sen. Jesse Richardson and Reps. Jim Patton and Jim Martin, all of Las Cruces, tried for such a meeting to authorize an investigation of the highway department because of mess of road trouble in the southwestern part of the state. The effort failed.

TEACHERS PAY IS SPOTTY

Teachers pay increases were spotty this year according to money available in the districts and the demonstration of improved programs.

Holdover teachers in all the districts got the regular annual increment increases that range from \$50 to \$250.

Here are average increases and average salaries for classroom teachers reported by State School Finance Officer Harry Wugalter for some of the medium size districts:

Clayton \$313 average increase and \$5,898 average salary; Belen \$68 increase and \$6,229 average pay; Taos \$45.50 increase and \$6,011 pay; Carrizozo \$133 and \$8,098; Santa Rosa \$240 and \$5,850; Clovis \$252 and \$6,176; Lordsburg \$365.50 and \$5,821; Springer \$199 and \$6,056; Socorro \$320.63 and \$6,408; Deming \$125 and \$6,733; Las Cruces

\$215 and \$6,570. There are five districts that are paying classroom teachers an average of more than \$7,000 this year—Los Alamos, rich with government money, Gallup, rich with Indian money, and Eunice, Jal and Tatum in the Lea county oil fields.

TWELVE COUNTIES FIVE LEGISLATORS

The election next year will leave seven small counties with no representation in the house and probably none in the senate after the reapportionment fight is settled.

In the new house plan there are five multi-county districts with one representative each:

Sierra (pop. 6,409) and Lincoln (pop. 7,744). DeBaca (pop. 2,992). Torrance (pop. 6,497). Guadalupe (pop. 5,610) and Harding (pop. 1,874). Mora (pop. 6,028) and Union (pop. 6,068). Socorro (pop. 10,158) and Catron (pop. 2,773). Luna (pop. 9,839) and Hidalgo (pop. 4,961). It amounts to five representatives for 12 counties.

THREE CANDIDATES SET THEIR DATES

SANTA FE — Former State Sen. Gene Lusk of Eddy county is scheduled to announce his candidacy for the Demo nomination for governor Saturday at a function in Carlsbad.

State Rep Bruce King of Santa Fe has told that he will make his announcement "before the end of the month", and associates of State FIA Director Roy Walker of Clovis expect Walker to formally enter the race about October 1, the date his resignation from the federal post becomes effective.

Former Gov. John Burroughs made his candidacy official Sept. 5

JOE AND CLINT NOT TOGETHER

That's four there may be another if Sens. Clint Anderson and Joe Montoya can't get together on one already in the race.

Anderson doesn't like Burroughs and Montoya doesn't like Lusk.

That would seem to give some encouragement to King who at this time is a more prominent candidate than Walker.

WALKER PUZZLES CAPITOL POLITICOS

Walker is not very well known among the statehouse political crowd and many of them don't understand his candidacy.

They don't think he has enough support to make a serious run.

A little probing, however, revealed that Walker after four years in the FIA post has important friends among bankers and others in home financing, in the organized building trades, and also in the old Sen. Dennis Chavez political organization of which he was a prominent member. The candidate should also have some regional support.

It looks like he has enough to justify offering his name to the February state Demo convention but with four running it is going to be difficult to get the 20 percent convention vote needed to qualify for the May primary.

CHAVEZ AHEAD FOR LOOT POST

Former State Sen. Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe who nearly defeated Johnny Walker for Congress in the 1964 primary has told that he is going to run for nomination for lieutenant governor next year.

At this date it looks like the plib and publicity-wise Chavez is a strong favorite for the place. The only others who have talked about the loot gov. place are House Majority Leader Austin Roberts of Farmington and State Planning Director John Flynn of Santa Fe, neither with much state-wide pull. Flynn ran for lieutenant governor in 1962 and placed fourth in a four-man race.

STATE LOOKS LIKE STAGNANT ISLAND

The state administration that is all the time bragging about industrial development has not commented on the recent Census Bureau figures that make New Mexico look like an island of stagnation in a sea of growth.

The census figures Arizona, right next door, as the second fastest growing state in the nation with a gain of 23.5 percent since 1960, while New Mexico was up 8.2 percent.

Colorado, just above, was up 12.2 percent, and Texas on the east had grown 10.1 percent. Nevada, also in this general area, was up 54 percent and Utah about 10 percent.

A Little At A Time

He will be dealing with the relationship of soils with other disciplines in integrated, rapid, natural resources inventories; and will assist in blending soils, men and agencies into such programs.

Mr. Gomez is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Felipe Gomez of San Patricio, Lincoln County, New Mexico. He holds a Bachelors and Masters Degree from New

Mexico State University. He is married to the former Dolores Ramos of Las Cruces and has a family of six children. His family will join him shortly.

He has been employed by the Soil Conservation Service since 1950. During this period, he has been headquartered in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Deming, Las Cruces, and Springer, New Mexico. Except for a 5 year period during which he was head of the Soil Survey Laboratory at New Mexico State University, Mr. Gomez has been making Soil Surveys in New Mexico. During 1960, he was in Venezuela for eight months on a resource study of the Lower Orinoco River Basin.

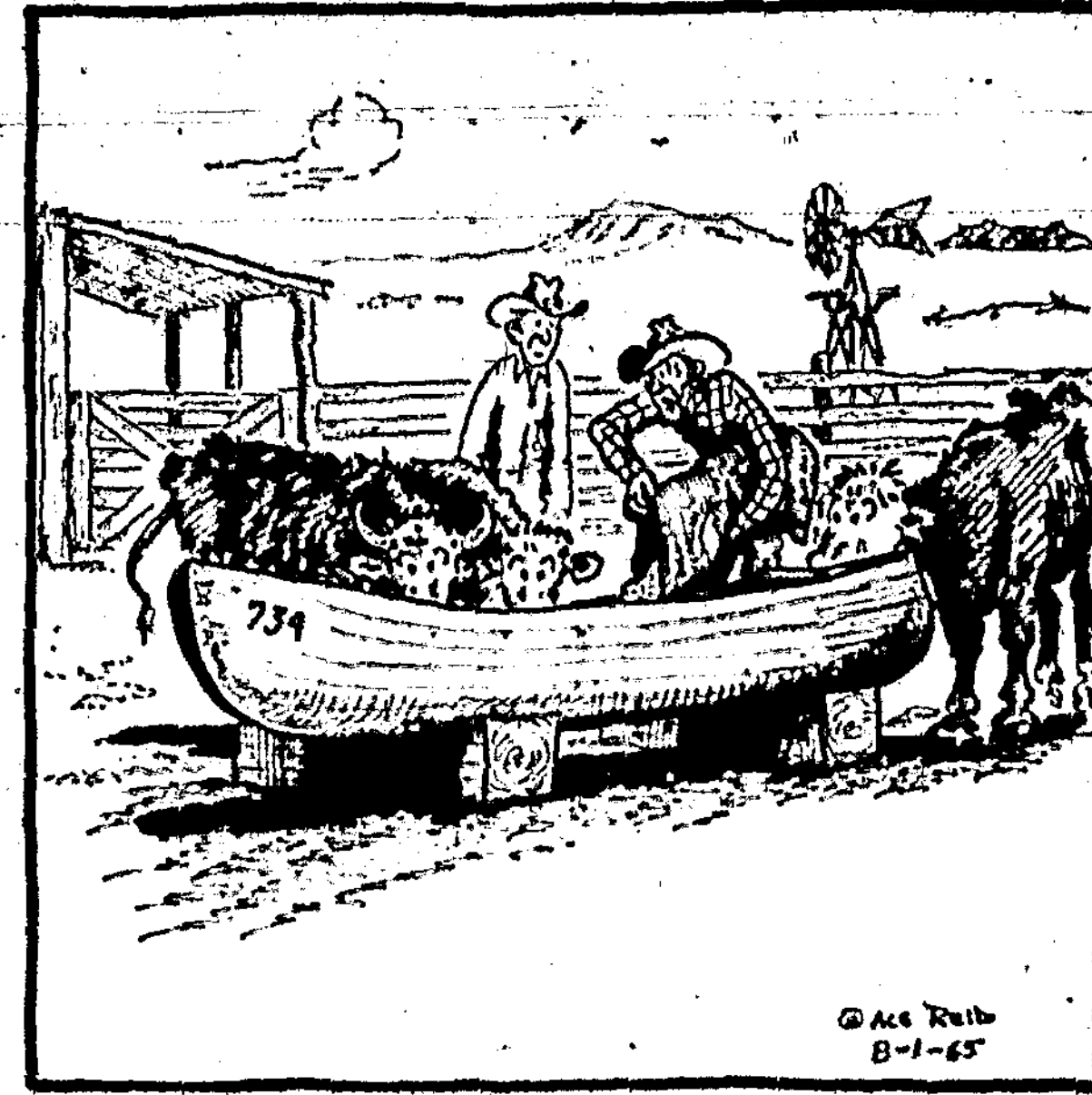

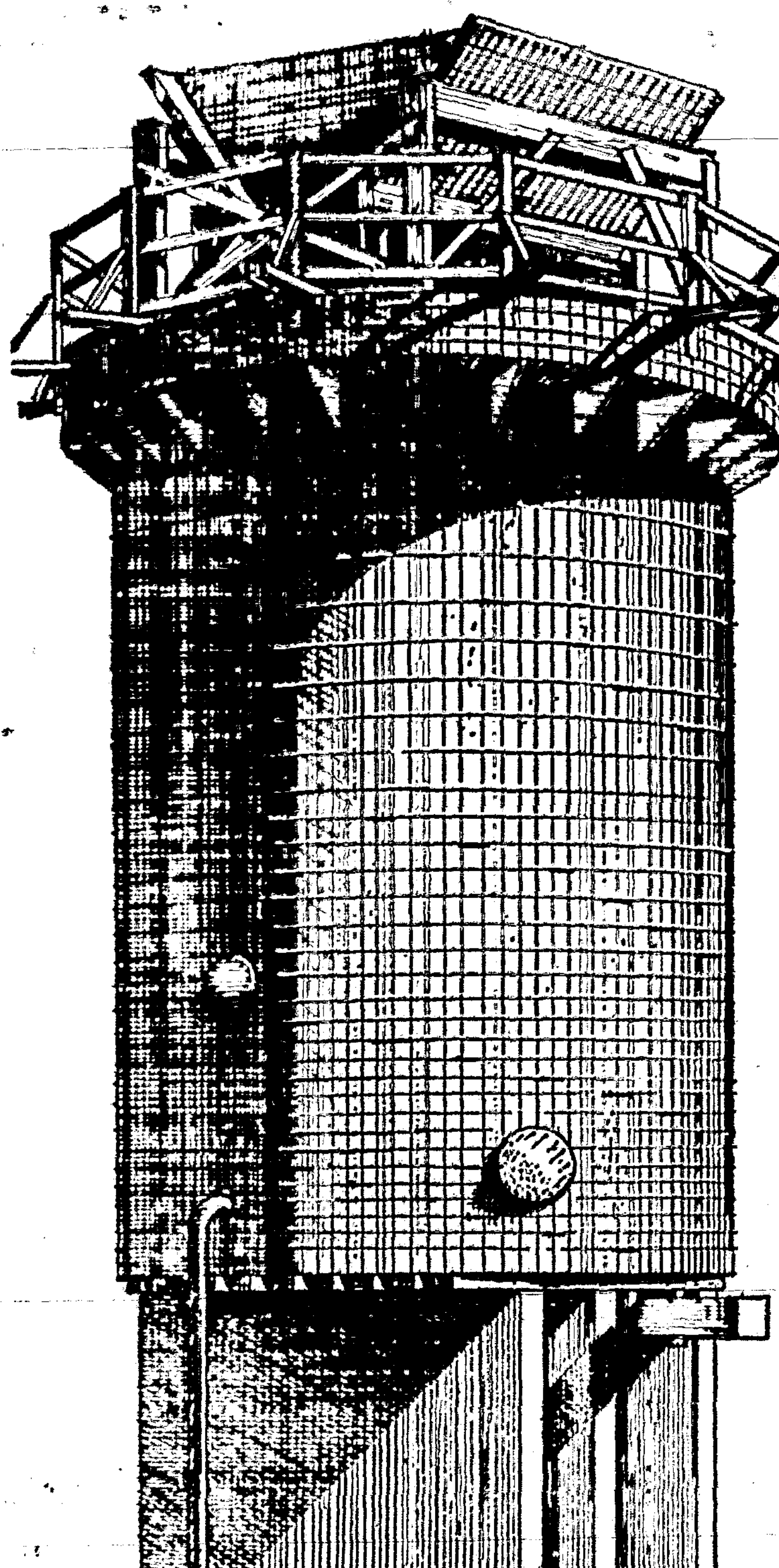
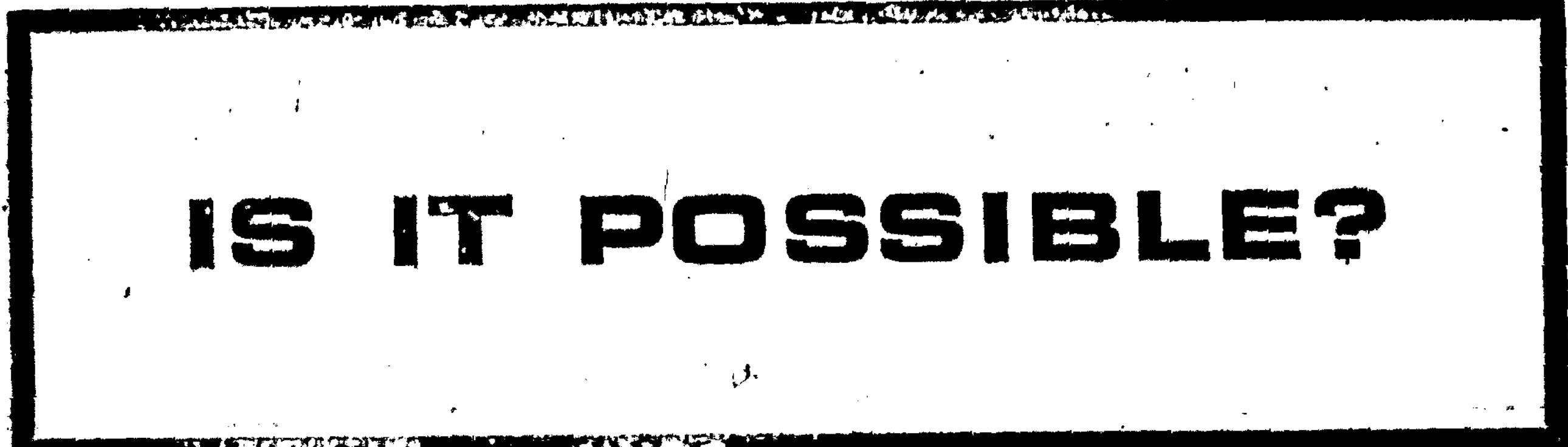

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Increased production through conservation?

It is possible. Kennecott is doing it by expanding its precipitating plant, where copper is recovered from water that seeps through mine waste dumps. That's conservation.

Although a ton of waste material contains less than six pounds of copper, some of the metal dissolves in the water. The solution is pumped over scrap iron in precipitation cones. Through a chemical reaction, the copper and iron change places. The iron goes into solution and the copper remains behind as a solid. Then the water is pumped back to the top of the dumps to be used again and again. That's conservation.

The precipitating cones now being completed are part of a six-million-dollar expansion project at Kennecott's New Mexico operations. Also nearing completion is a new furnace at the Chino smelter which will dry the precipitate copper. The project is expected to increase Kennecott's copper production in New Mexico by 25 per cent.

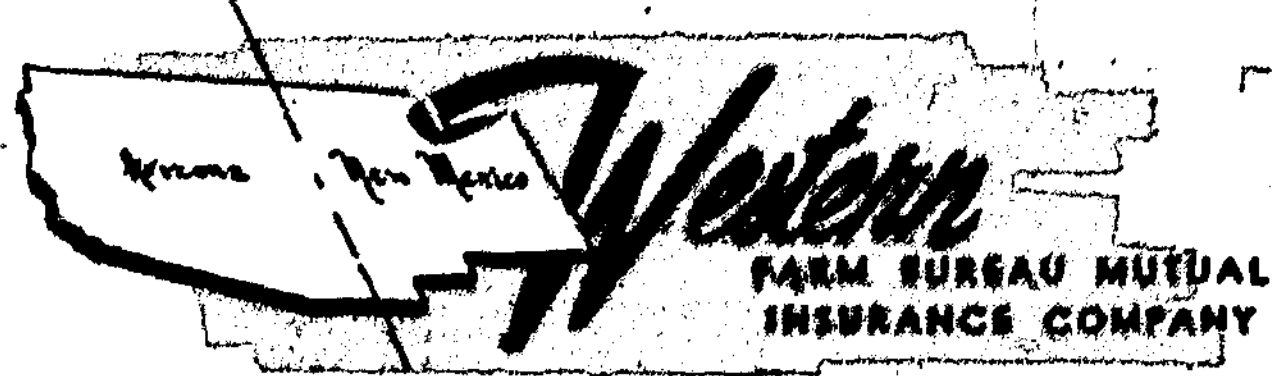
Kennecott actually is doing what seems impossible. It is increasing copper production and practicing conservation at the same time.

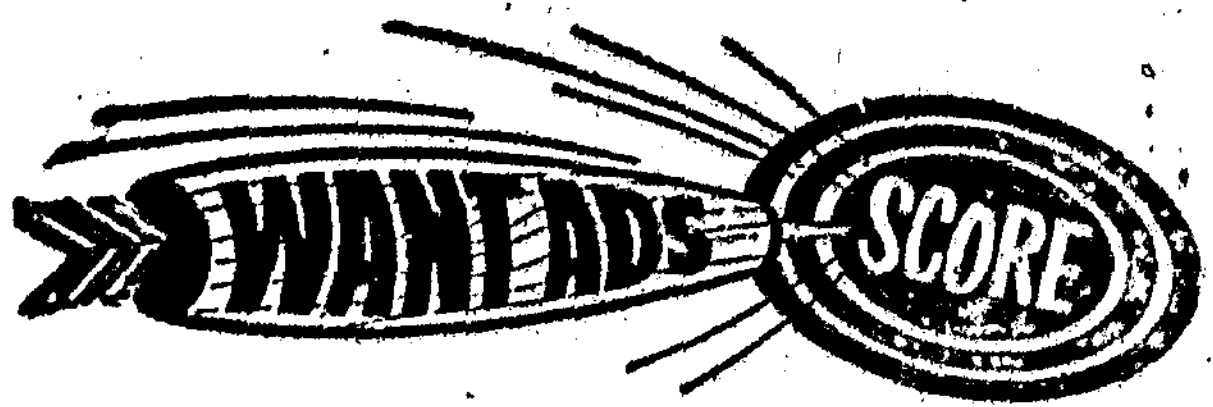
