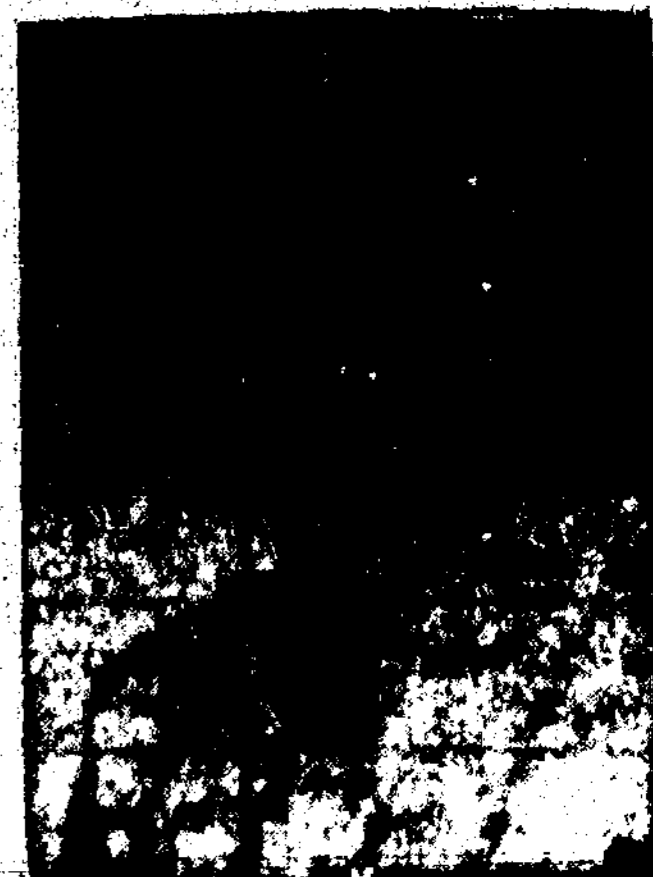

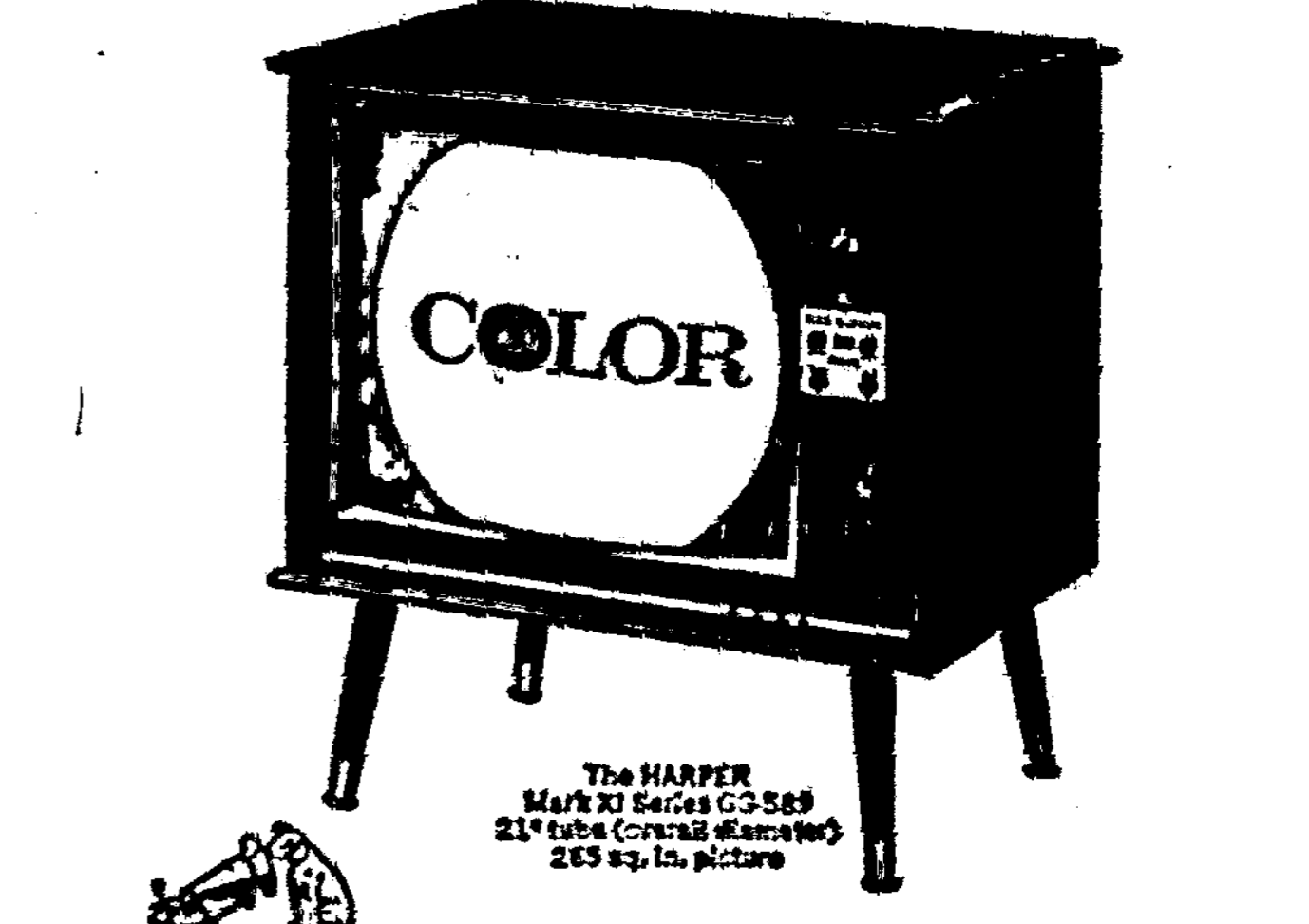
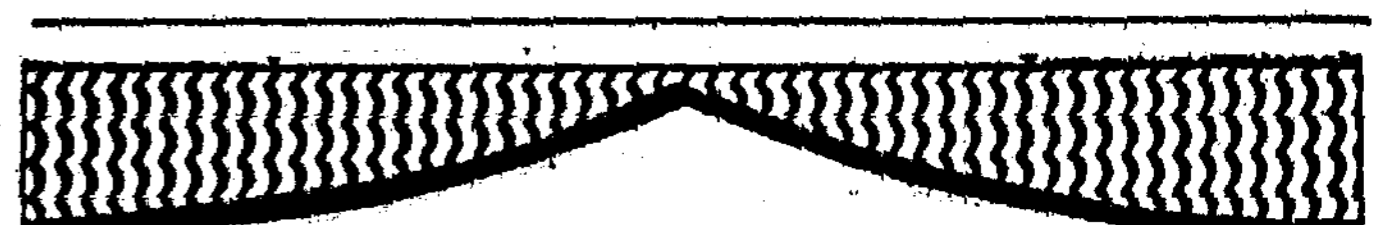
The couple will be married at 3:30 P. M. Dec. 30 at Trinity Methodist Church.

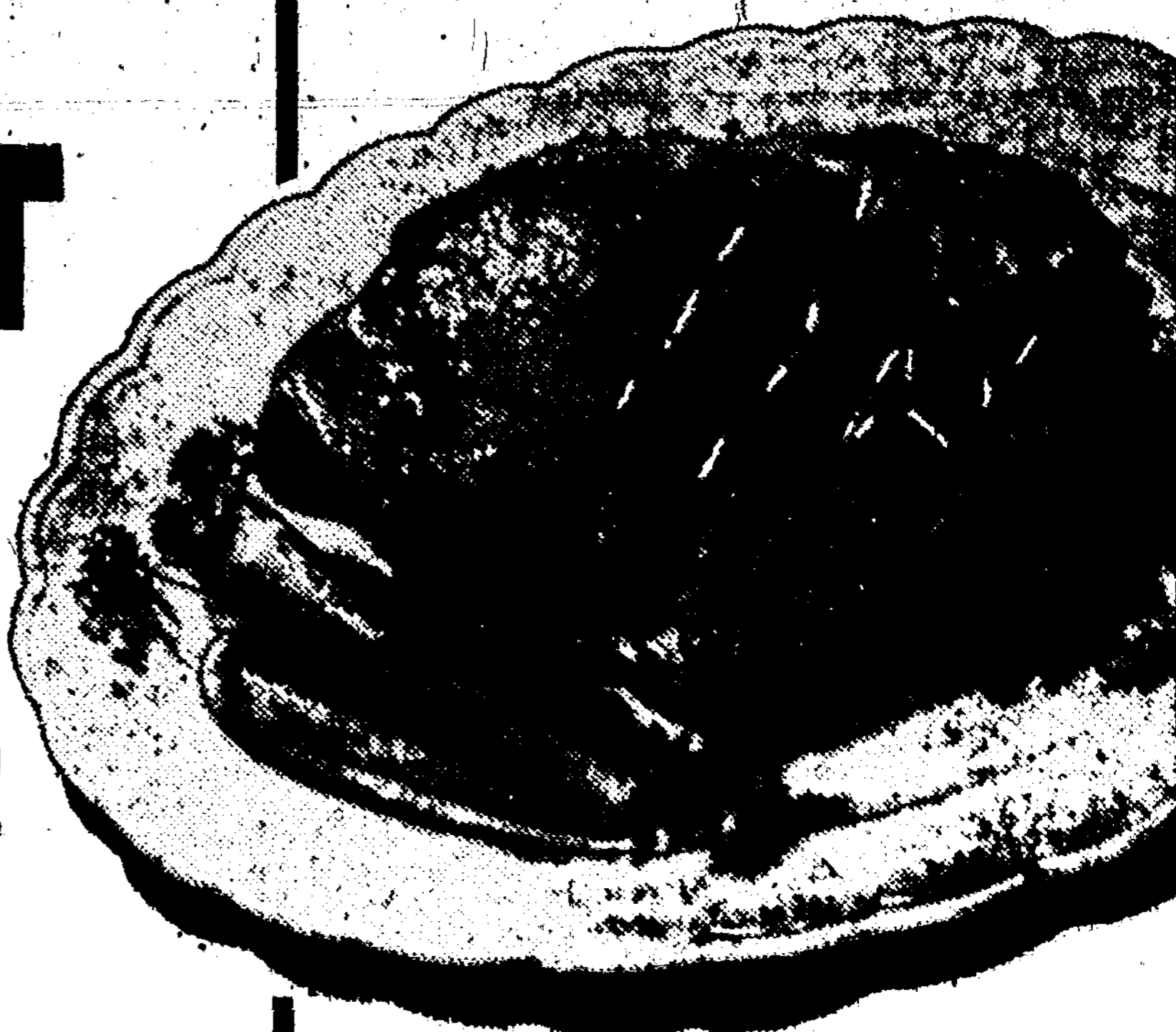

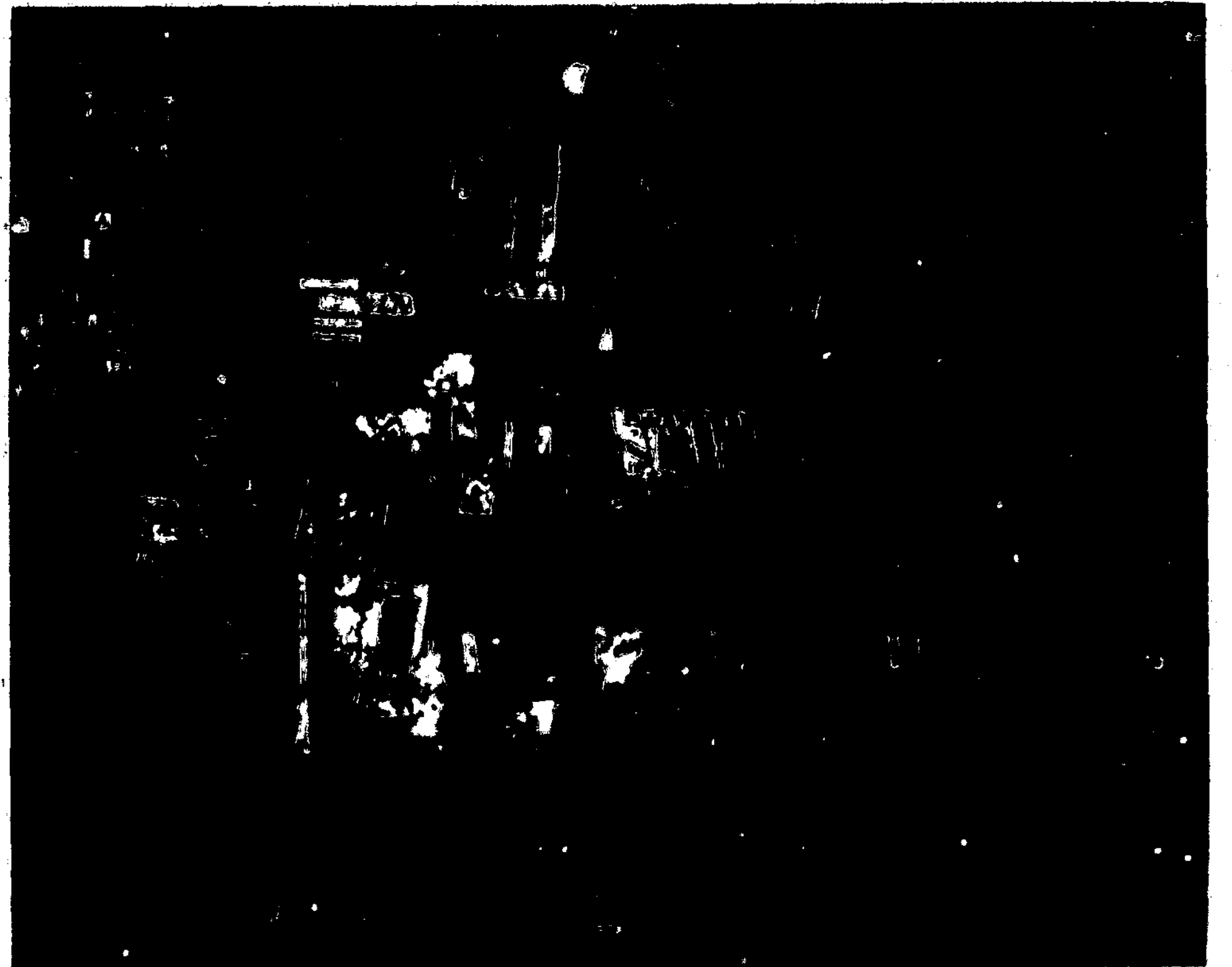

Sticky side of Christmas Seal

In another column we're having a bit of fun with Gene Mann and the Christmas Seal campaign. Really, it is dead serious business — taxwise, costwise, healthwise.

A part of the problem that is little understood goes like this. A patient at Fort Stanton TB Hospital recently had most of his family and relatives there for a visit. They argued long and loud that the patient should be allowed to go home. Fort Stanton staff members thought they had the family convinced the patient should stay — before night he was gone, across the hills where his family probably picked him up.

Tuberculosis is a communicable disease. This one TB patient can infect all members of his family, they in turn can infect others. That is the way TB is spread and a major reason why TB control is so difficult in this state.

The money you spend for TB Christmas Seals does not go to Fort Stanton by any means. This money is used by the TB Association, a non-profit organization made up mostly of doctors and nurses.

One of the immediate needs in this state is a law that would force TB patients to remain hospitalized until they are determined as negative. With recent medical successes at Fort Stanton the length of hospital stay has been cut way down.

Here is where TB Christmas Seals come into action. The TB Association is the group best qualified to see that proper and needed legislation is passed, that the public is informed of the need. Such business takes money — the TB Association will make good use of Seal money.

Be sure you make good use of your Christmas Seals.

Whatever helps New Mexico

Ward Ballmer, president of the Grants Chamber of Commerce spoke a piece of truth when the Albuquerque Roadrunners visited Grants. He said, "Naturally we are a little bit jealous of Albuquerque's size but this should be cast aside and a bigger and longer-range view taken."

There have been many times when Albuquerque (as a city) has seemed greedy and grabby, but there are an equal number of times when Albuquerque can help New Mexico in a manner that will benefit the entire state.

We'd like to point out here to our home area. No one feuds harder than small towns and that the same thought applies differences that may originate over something as trivial as a football game are carried over into major projects so that the entire county suffers Carrizozo and Capitan working together

to help bring natural gas into this area is one of the finest samples of cooperation.

We'd also like to point out here that this same thought applies to our home town. The only people who feud harder than small towns are neighbors who get crossed and carry their differences into any action the town takes. Sides were chosen during a paving program, with the continuing result that we have people-against-people, even more than we have people-against-projects that might benefit the entire town.

We can build a new civic monument each year as a sign of progress — but if we don't build some additional business each year there'll soon be no one left here to pay for the monuments.

It's easier to forget differences at Christmas time — hope some of that attitude will carry over into 1966.

Three factors have contributed to consolidation of military bases:

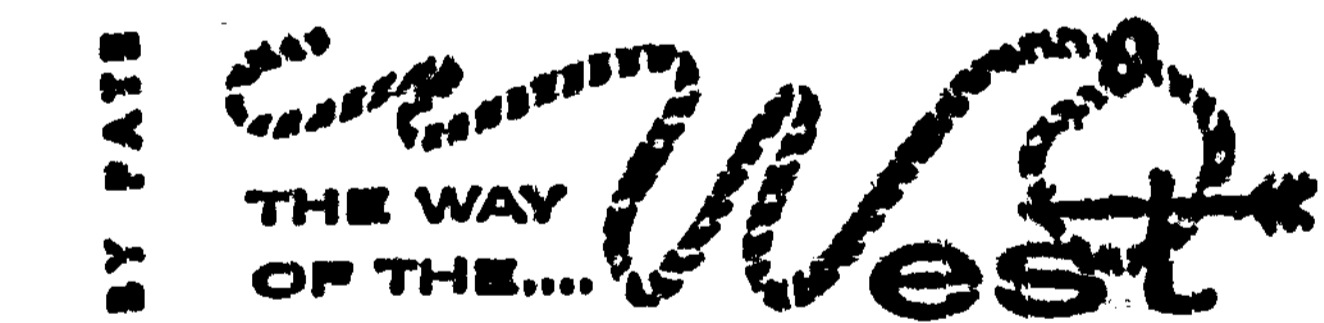
1. One is fully outlined by a December 10 press release from Sen. Joe Montoya. "The middle income college loan program established by the Higher Education Act of 1965 will make an estimated \$700 million available to worthy students next fall. Add this chunk to other costs of the Great Society and you get to billions in a hurry."

2. The Defense establishment has a current budget of \$57 billion (up \$15 billion in the past five years), 3 million men under arms, nearly 1 million reservists, 1 million civilian employ-

ees, and facilities worth a total of some \$175 billion — all of this plus a war in Viet Nam that continues to cost more money.

3. These two economic factors, together with the fact that one man in government is seemingly willing to reorganize our defense system without consulting any senators or representatives — Robert McNamara is the one cutting the fat out, undoubtedly with the encouragement and backing of President Lyndon Johnson.

Now if some person in government would only cut the fat out of the Great Society, we could count 1965 as a banner year.

Lincoln County has iron ore possibilities

Lincoln County has great possibility for a 500 ton daily iron ore smelter; I wish to quote briefly on the iron ore deposits, they are very extensive, they cover the areas of Capitan, White Oaks, Gallinas, Tecolote and Jicarilla mining districts, with millions of tons developed, and the undeveloped reserves unknown. It has several coal fields, per geological survey Capitan produced in the early 1900's around one million tons. The White Oaks field produced over few hundred thousand tons. The White Oaks coal does not "slack" or crumble on exposure and hence is above sub-bituminous in grade, it is excellent cooking coal. This together with our iron ore deposits would make a great industry for Lincoln County. Lincoln County has several fluor spar deposits. Fluorspar is used also in the hardening of steel. We have everything ready made for a steel mill, iron, coal and fluorspar. Such project would be a permanent industry for our town. With cooperation a feasibility report should be prepared.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Eying the pre-primary convention, the Demo hopefuls in the Governor's race have gone hard and strong for the county-level political leaders.

In this regard there is an interesting question facing the high-level chieftains.

Former Gov. John Burroughs has a widespread reputation for support on the county level, but his opposition has been more negative than positive.

Among the supporters for Carlsbad's Gene Lusk, Santa Fe's Bruce King, and Albuquerque's Roy Walker there remains the undercurrent of the "anti Burroughs."

This, despite the general nature of the opposition, could well be the key to success for Burroughs.

Top politicians opposed to Burroughs would delight in seeing him in a head-on-battle with either Lusk or King, but with all four going for the pre-primary sanction, Burroughs is far better off going against both King and Lusk rather than facing either of them separately.

SUPPORT OF TOP MEN MAY BE DETERMINING FACTOR

It's painfully evident that Sen. Montoya is silently backing Burroughs, but it's a question as to whether it is also a "negative" move. Montoya has battled Lusk since the two squared off for a U.S. House post and most consider the fact that Montoya is backing Burroughs principally to keep Lusk out.

But it's also more painfully evident that Sen. Clint Anderson, the big club in the entire affair, may be giving his nod to King.

When Anderson announced that he would seek another term in the Senate, it was generally considered that he did so with the satisfaction of knowing who his successor would be.

If Lusk, Burroughs, or Walker should get the Governor's seat, then it would certainly be open to argument as to who would be appointed to replace Anderson.

But Anderson apparently feels that if King goes in, then any Senate appointment would be under his control. King has said he won't appoint himself to the Senate, and it's likely that if he can gain Anderson's backing, he'll appoint anyone Anderson decides on.

PRE-PRIMARY BREAKDOWN WILL BE SHAKY AFFAIR

So, with Burroughs, Lusk, King, and Walker going into the pre-primary, it's stark reality that Burroughs may wind up the top man on the ticket.

If so, the Republicans will rejoice because they feel Burroughs is the only man they can beat — mainly due to the scope of the "antiBurroughs" feeling among Democrats.

Most politicians feel this is the reason that Albuquerque's Dr. Jack Redman is holding off so long before announcing his plans.

At present only State Reps. Dave Cargo and Cliff Hawley have announced for the Governor's race on the GOP ticket.

If Lusk, King, or Walker get the Demo nomination, then Redman is considered a cinch to go for Rep. Johnny Walker's seat in the U. S. House.

But take note that if Burroughs wins in the Demo pre-primary, that Redman will go for Governor.

LT. GOVERNOR RACE STILL BELONGS TO ONE MAN

In the race for Lieutenant Governor, Santa Fe's Fablan Chavez is still the only announced Demo.

Many of the top Demo politicians don't like Chavez because he's been too outspoken on too many issues. But to date, the Chavez opponents can't find anyone willing to risk a loss of this size to run against him.

New Mexico families, Drew Cloud, State Director, reported today. "The money is advanced in the form of loans to finance a variety of small cooperative enterprises — all designed to increase the net income of farmers and other rural people throughout the State." Director Drew Cloud explained. Farmers Home Administration loans to cooperatives, composed of several families, have been used in New Mexico to purchase equipment such as: tractors, plows, mowers, and self-propelled windrowers, thereby enabling participants to: (1) remain in the farming business and do custom farm work (2) to market and sell for its members hay and other farm products (3) to purchase seer and fertilizer jointly. Living quarters and equipment have been financed for development of mica mining claims. An apple processing shed loan has been made providing rooms for cold storage and equipment for fruit packing and marketing. One local loan has been made for handicraft manufacture and marketing (spin wool into yarn, then sell by the yard to larn weavers, members of the cooperative). The majority of such loans made throughout the United States have been to finance small machinery cooperatives that provide needed agricultural equipment member-farmers would not otherwise obtain. The New Mexico Farmers Home Administration director, Mr. Cloud, emphasized that he foresees a great potential in the Economic Opportunity loan programs in this area since the new loans are capable of putting new economic muscle into the rural economy. The Agency's other Economic Opportunity loan program has provided individual loans totaling \$413,790 to 247 New Mexico families for developing small farm and nonfarm enterprises. Economic Opportunity loans to cooperatives serving rural families carry 4 1/8 percent interest rate, the same interest rate as loans to individuals, and are scheduled for repayment over a period not exceeding 30 years. Application for this and other kinds of rural credit can be at the farmers Administration office in Roswell, 110 East 4th, First Building. Following are the New Mexico Cooperatives financed by

Economic Opportunity loan funds: (1) Valley Apple Shed Cooperative - Velarde, N. M., - \$16,300; (2) Petaca Mica Mining Cooperative - La Madre, N. M., - \$7,250; (3) Ben Ah Neshi Coop. - Taos, N. M., - \$8,000; (4) Torrance County Cooperative Association - Estancia, N. M., - \$70,000; (5) Cochiti Hay & Marketing Association - Cochiti Pueblo - \$5,700; and (6) Navajo Farmers Cooperative - Shiprock, N. M., - \$1,500. The Lincoln County Committee of the Farmers Home Administration met in Corona yesterday to review loans and the economic conditions of agriculture in the Corona area. The committee is composed of three Lincoln County farmers and ranchers. These persons are: Smith Peters, Corona, E. J. Fresquez, Picacho, Sid Goodloe, Capitan. The County Supervisor, Dick Floyd was there for the meeting and participated in the review. This meeting in the Corona area is the 1st meeting held in the area in one year. Meetings are usually held in Capitan or Carrizozo. Special emphasis is being placed on assisting persons to improve their living standards through either the Economic Opportunity Loans or Housing Loans.
