## Christmas holiday was slow starting

As a holiday Christmas had a rough time implanting itself in the New World. To many of the people in authority it was a hangover from pagan days, and they objected strenuously to its celebration in the colonies. Popular pressure to make December 25 a day of merriment and good fellowship was strong, however, as is evidenced in this contemporary report of Christmas in Virginia in 1613:

"The extreame winde, rayne, froste and snow caused us to keepe Christmas among the savages where we were never more merry, nor fed on more plenty of good Oysters, Fish, Flesh, Wilde fowl and good bread, nor never had better fires in England."

Reaction to this kind of behavior brought about stringent blue laws. Governor Argall decreed that all who failed to attend services would be jailed, "lying neck and heels in the Corps of Gard ye night following, and be a slave ye week following." In addition, dancing, fiddling, card playing, hunting and fishing were forbidden on Sundays and other holidays.

In 1621 Governor Bradford

of Plymouth Colony was made unhappy by the sight of newcomers from England playing games on Christmas Day. He immediately put a halt to the proceedings by confiscating the players' equipment. They had been "pitching the ball" and competing at "stooleball," activities which horrified the austere governor.

Apparently, the tug of war concerning the celebration of Christmas went on for a long time. In 1659, thirty-eight years after Governor Bradford stopped the ball game on Christmas, the Colony of Massachusetts enacted its celebrated law about behavior on the holiday. "Whosoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas, or the like," it read, "either by fore bearing of labor, feasting, or in any other way, shall be fined five shillings."

It took about twenty years to make the law a dead letter. In the interim, many a colonist paid his fine or went to prison for violation of the statute. It was not until about 1925 before Christmas was established throughout the United States as a legal holiday, as a day of joy and good will for all men.

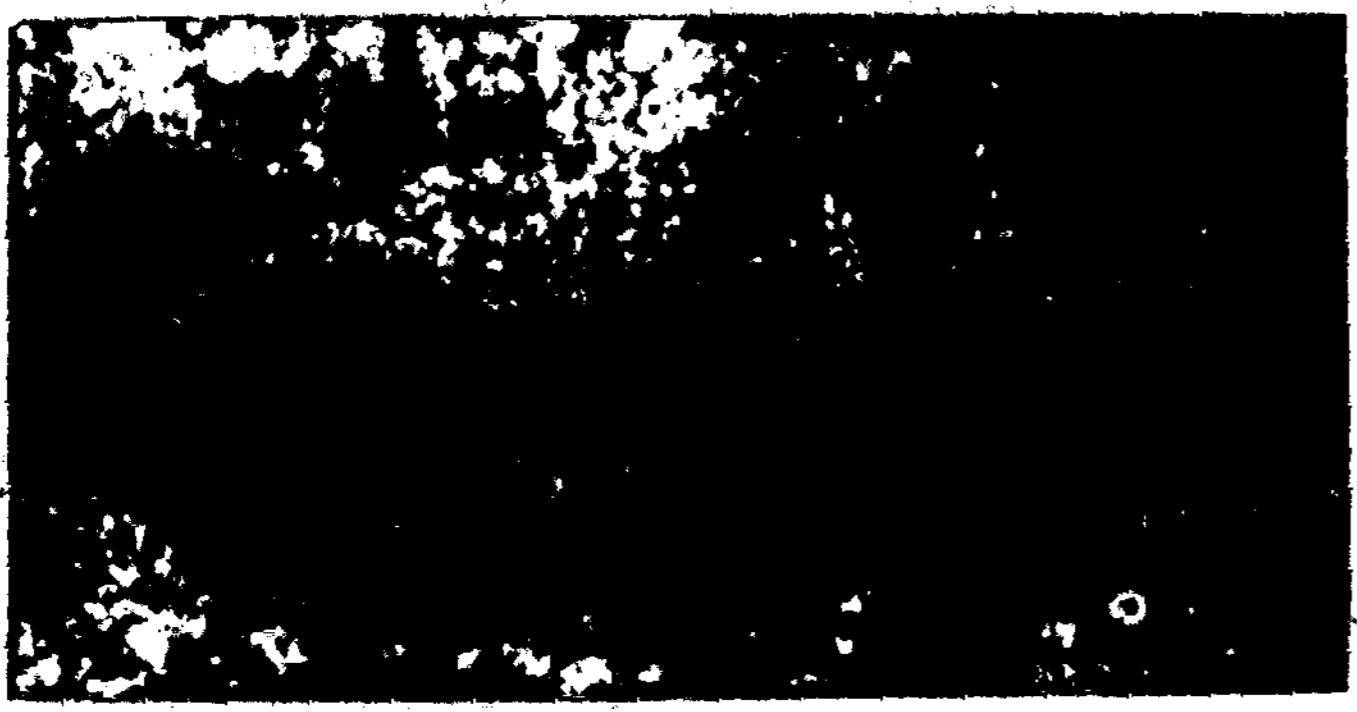

## Icy, snowy roads and going to sleep are causes of 2 highway accidents

On December 14 about 10 P. M. a 1964 Dodge pickup turned over 1 1/2 miles west on US 380. The driver lost control, possibly fell asleep. The pickup overturned once, and was about half reloaded (had load of suitcases and household goods) by drivers and they started back to Carrizozo in blinding snow. The truck skidded off the highway backwards into an arroyo. The driver Sylvester Doolittle, age 26, and passenger Steve Doolittle, age 25 of Artesia managed to walk into Carrizozo and secure a room at a motel. The accident was not reported until next morning. In the meantime Officer Frank Knoblock, wrecker driver Kenneth Means and City Marshall, Chonco Morales

searched for possible injured or lost people in the snow. Doolittle was cited for careless driving by Officer Knoblock.

The other accident occurred ten miles north of Carrizozo on US 380. A 1964 White tractor and trailer jack-knifed and overturned and injured the driver, Leonard Thomas, age 30, and relief driver, Harold Gillette, age 33, both of Haviland, Kansas. The drivers were taken to the hospital in Carrizozo. Both sustained minor injuries.

The truck was loaded with bulk milk and owned by Bill Meeker of Wichita, Kansas. Thomas was cited for failure to use due care. The accident was investigated by Officer Frank Knoblock and Officer Andy Benavidez.

**CAPTAN** — Carrizozo eased by Capitan in a nip-and-tuck battle Friday night at Capitan, 73-71, leaving each team with identical 2-5 slates.

Capitan forged in front in the first canto, 27-24 and led at the two quarter mark by 41-35. Carrizozo rallied in the third stanza to take a 53-52 lead and outscored the Tigers 20-10 in the last period to squeeze by the Tigers.

William Herrera tallied 27 points for the Tigers, with Carrizozo's Curtis Payne matching the 27-point output. Godfrey Herrera added 17 markers for the losers while Max Zamora aided Payne's effort with 10 points.

Payne came up with the deciding counters for the Grizzlies, hitting a brace of free tosses in the final seconds while Capitan could score only one point on three one-and-one situations in the final minute.

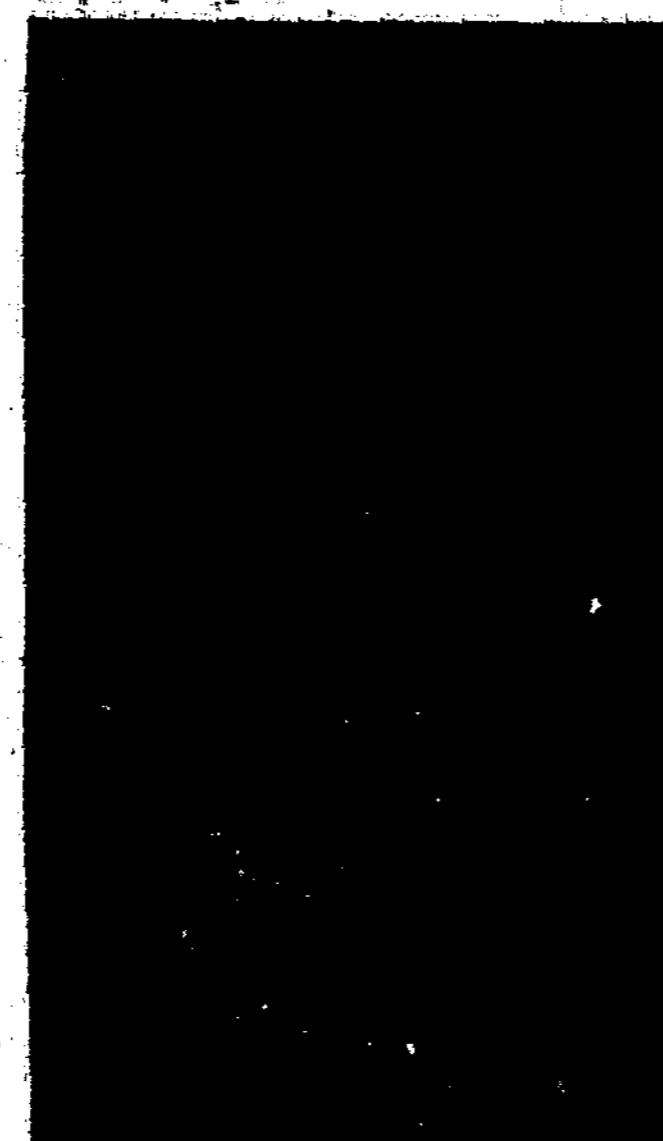

# Trouble develops with sagging roof at courthouse

A meeting scheduled for last Thursday to discuss defects in new courthouse was cancelled because of bad weather and rescheduled for early January.

The problem is mainly a 96-ton-plus roof sagging, causing glass to bulge, window molding to bend, plaster to crack, doors stick, terrazzo floor cracked, and other problems all of this on the new Lincoln County courthouse dedicated May 8 of this year.

The architects were Buffinton Voll-Nolan of Roswell. The contractor was Ballard & Bates of Carlsbad.

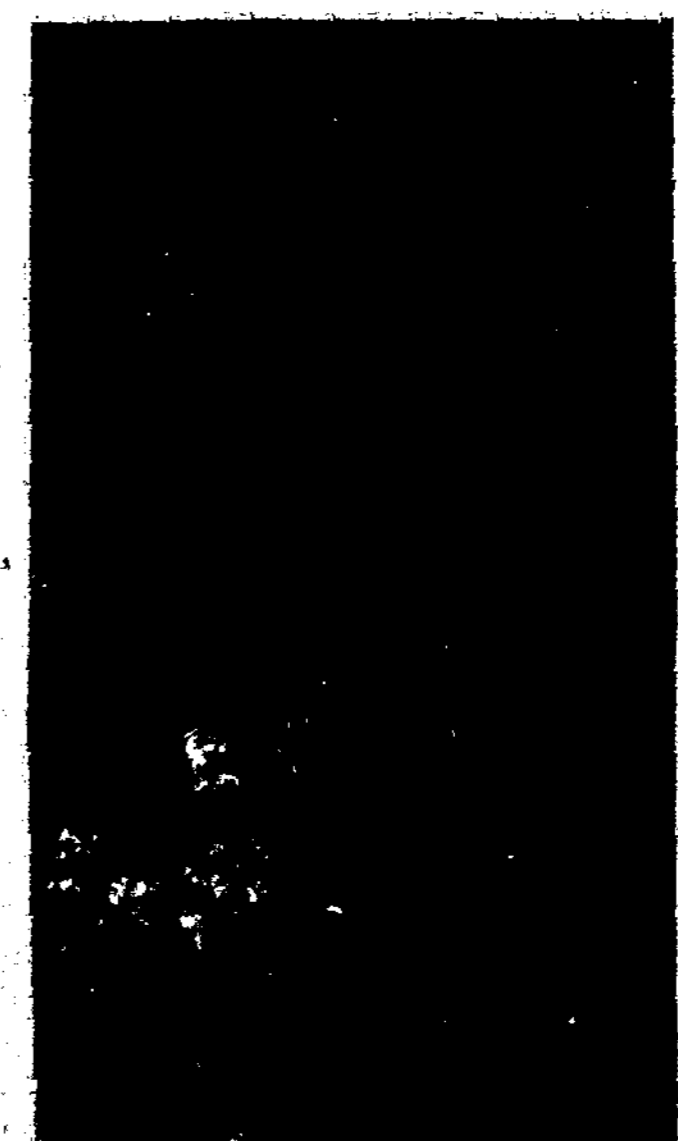
Jim Dainbold, a structural engineer of Lawton, Okla., was expected last week to investigate the situation but could not be here because of the bad weather. Plate glass people from Las Cruces were in Carrizozo to look over the situation.

With no expert opinion at hand, the following basic trou-

ble needs a solution — the experimental concrete roof is much too heavy for the number of columns installed to support it. So far, no sagging has appeared at the floor level, the roof over the jail is well supported by stout walls, but the roof over the main courthouse area started sagging almost from the day it was completed (small amount of sag expected) and apparently has not stopped sagging at the point anticipated by the architects.

Lincoln County commissioners Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer have contacted the bonding company on the construction job and have stated that if something is not done pronto to remedy the situation they would take the case to court.

The present board of county commissioners took office in January, after the courthouse work was nearing completion.

## Facilities added at Three Rivers

The Three Rivers Petroglyphs and Recreation Site, 14 miles northeast of Tularosa will have additional facilities added within the near future, announced J. W. Young, Las Cruces District Manager of the U. S. Bureau of Land Management.

Funds are available and plans have been made for construction of 3 additional picnic-camping units, more directional and historical signs, a rest area, overlook and improvements of 2 miles of trail through the petroglyph area. The work is scheduled to begin in April. Covered picnic units with grills, tables and benches are available, as well as sanitary facilities and ample parking space. "Visitors should bring their own water and charcoal," added Young.

Hundreds of Indian Petroglyphs (rock carvings) are on the site. These are linked by a system of improved trails so that visitors may observe many of the different petroglyphs. "Since May, 1965, we have had 1718 registered visitors from 38 different states and 6 foreign countries visit the site," said Young.

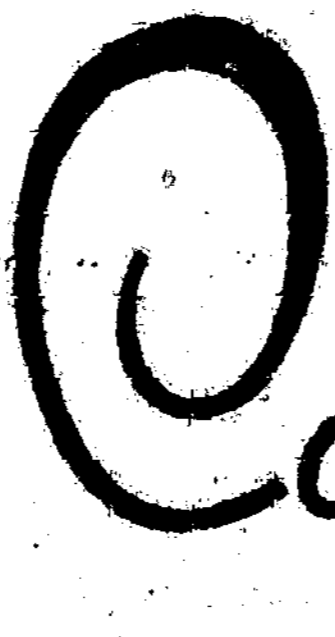

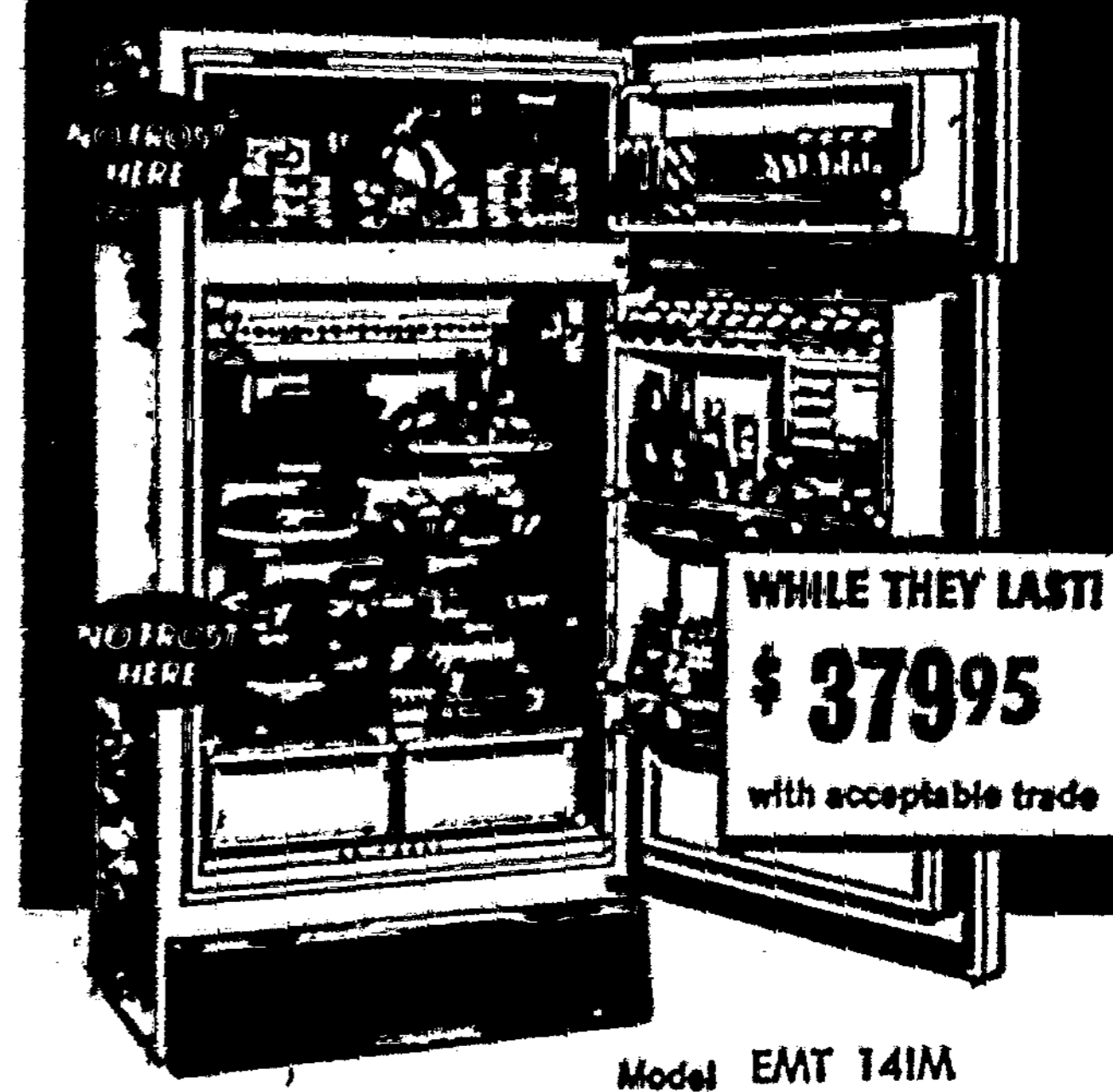

**N. M. State Highway Commission is deeply distressed by bridge trouble**

State Highway Commission Chairman John Sudderth, along with other members of the commission, last week jointly issued a statement voicing that they were "deeply distressed at the motives and implied criticisms" involved in the stories about the Rio Grande Bridge. Recently, reports were published that a "hump" existed in the bridge and the future drainage and maintenance was questioned because of this.

The Commission's statement is a rather unique affair. It contained a copy of a story by Fred Buckles of the Albuquerque Journal along with an "Inside The Capital" column to "prove" how nasty the press had been in remarks about the bridge.

Oddly enough, however, the report from the commission also had copies of Highway Department memos which actually substantiated what had been published. It is true that State Auditor Alex Armijo hired an ex-employee of the Highway Department to check the bridge. According to Highway Department officials, the ex-employee was "miffed" at the department and was ready to jump at the chance to exploit the bridge situation.

But aside from any conflicts between the State Auditor and the Highway Commission Chairman, the fact remains that the Auditor DID hire a man who DID report that there were "possible deficiencies" in the \$2.3 million bridge. The original news story quoted the auditor as saying "We are looking into possible defects due to engineering misplanning on the Rio Grande Bridge." This was a direct quote from the Auditor, not from any newsmen.

In a copy of the column that was attached to the statement was a sentence saying that "No safety factor has been questioned, but doubts center more on the possibility of future maintenance problems and rapid deterioration." This should have made it amply clear that it was not the "safety factor" but rather a mistake that might be costly and if so someone should be responsible. When you fork over \$2 million it should give you the right to be slightly critical about a miscue.

Then the clincher is that also attached to the statement from the commission was an inter-departmental correspondence from Charles E. Reed, bridge engineer, to John F. Sudderth, Chairman. In it is this unusual statement — "Ordinarily I would contact Ginger Evans or Bob De La Rue before talking to reporters, but at that late hour no one was available so rather than antagonize Mr. Buckles by refusing to talk about the bridge, I agreed to answer his questions." The memo from Reed to Sudderth goes on to state that "I said that either an error in our deflection calculations or a slight error in the fabrication of the truss members could have caused this condition." (The hump)

Highway Department statement, however, is that apparently Reed came "under the big gun" when he talked to a reporter without permission from the higher-ups. The bridge more than \$2 million worth was built entirely on New Mexico tax money and when any state employee has to apologize to his boss for talking to a reporter, then the news media could hardly be all to blame.

A hard fact is that the news media reported what the State Auditor's employee did and what he said. Then they reported what the bridge engineer said.

And it remains a fact that the Rio Grande Bridge is not going to run off and hide somewhere. If it has a defect the people will know about it as the years go by. If the bridge is not seriously defective, then people are not so stupid that they will not realize this also.

In the final tally, the bridge belongs to the people, and any effort to suppress news about it - good or bad - is an injustice to the people who own it.

# EDITORIAL

"A page for independent thought"

## Editorials never written

By the end of this week it will be time to discard a big wad of scribbled notes and make a fresh start for a new year. Some of the notes have been in our file for months and we hate to part with them, but a writer can get in a rut on editorials real easy and we'd better junk the lot.

For instance, there is the note that says "How about keeping some students home following graduation", this under the heading of "Better Schools". We don't really think that a better school would have much to do with providing work at home for our young people, if anything, our students would be better prepared to hold down a job where there are jobs. A baker's dozen editorials come out of the thought "Making work for our young people." Business people need more business to make more jobs, town dads would need to promote like mad to develop a little growth, basic resources of our immediate area need development, etc., etc.

Then there is an envelope containing pictures of some houses never completed, some rundown adobe not used for years, some alleys full of junk and trash, some vacant lots that look like hell. Our original idea was to compare these scenes with some of the many improvements made around town — a lot of people take pride in their surroundings and improved their properties this year. It will take a town leader who wants to serve just one term, does not mind crossing a few people, who has a great

deal of pride as well as a feeling for safety and elimination of health and fire hazards to do this job.

There is a note on file about the livestock business. In these Great Society days should ranchers clamor for a stable market, one where they know they can't lose, but most assuredly one where government has the reins? We think "most" of the ranchers would be "sick of their deal in short order. Free trade of livestock makes for some poor years, but it is free. Before an editorial on livestock marketing is written we would need to investigate the situation a lot more thoroughly.

"How about beauty" is another note in our file. We take a lot of trips out of town to Capitan, the Hondo Valley, Corona, to Alamo, out across the Mal Pals to run the dogs. Driving into Carrizozo from any direction you pass the most beautiful country in the world. No old cars, no piles of rotting lumber, no empty shacks, just a vast expanse of beauty and mountains on every side. If only more people would go on the outside and take a look, they might come inside and go to work. Still, in this Christmas week we can report that a lot of cleanup has been done.

A couple of pages were torn out of some magazine, containing an article on "The myth of a free society" by Edward C. Schleh. Maybe one reason no editorials on this subject is that it is both broad and tough. Here's a quote from the article, "Those who demand their own personal freedom often forget that they must also be ac-

countable for its sound use in light of the broad goals of society. Each of us must personally discipline himself when his actions start to affect others. This is the purpose of law — to force each man to discipline himself so that even with freedom he can live peaceably with his neighbors. For a strong society all of us must accept this obligation. Our society is having plenty of troubles with freedom right now, and the answer is in the quoted paragraph.

The column by Will Harrison, may the good Lord keep him for his own, on school drop-outs alerted us enough that we pasted the column on a sheet of paper. It contained this statistic, "The NEA table shows that only 57.2 percent of the ninth graders of 1961-62 were graduated in N. M. this year. The average in the country was 73.7 percent. New Mexico's illiteracy rate is among the worst in the nation, exceeded only by Hawaii and seven Deep South states. School men know about this situation. It's not new. Some of this trouble is "built in" to our way of life, some could be eliminated. New Mexico is topped only by Colorado and California in per capita spending for higher education.

There's a whole darn file of material on public lands. Here's a Christmas quote, "Although nominal fees will be charged, more than 100,000 families are expected to cut their own Christmas trees from the Western public domain this year. Counting gas and permit fees, the do-it-yourself tree will cost more than the store-bought variety but family treks to the woodlands increase with each yuletide season.

This was the first year in our life that we spent \$25 on the National Federation of Independent Business. Our biggest surprise was in learning the number of employees in small business — 30,000,000 as compared to 9,500,000 employed by the 500 largest firms. Maybe in another year we'll know if our twenty-five bucks was well spent. Those people are keeping us supplied with plenty of literature.

There is a mimeographed file on "Requirements and procedures for urban planning assistance program" which is going in the waste basket. To the best of our knowledge town dads want no part of this bus-

iness. Planning for a town is sort of like leaving a will — not needed until you die, and we let our heirs wrestle the problem.

One of our readers contributed thoughts on this subject: "We hear much these days about aggravated big city problems. Many are predicting that 80 percent of our population will be in 12 to 15 major metropolitan areas by 1975 or 1980. Industry and the nation could look to the rural areas as an alleviation to their problems. Manufacturers could do themselves a favor and the country a great service by allocating more of their new plants to what might be termed rural areas or small towns.

That isn't quite all but we'd better quit soon — no long editorial writing is good, and few short ones. There's a business card from executive of ICX truck line. Navajo top brass made a bad error and showed very little consideration for Carrizozo business, but their people in Alamogordo have served us well, look like Navajo will continue to be our truck line. We've still got a pamphlet on Right-to-work, probably be needed next year. A half-dozen letters clutter our editorial file.

This little gem should see print this week:

For Christmas she sent me Green coals and red ties; Her heart's in the right place, But where are her eyes?

We know the heart of Lincoln County people is in the right place at this Christmas season. Our sincere wish is that the spirit of love warms your heart and that you walk with God all the way.

"They only work on week ends?"

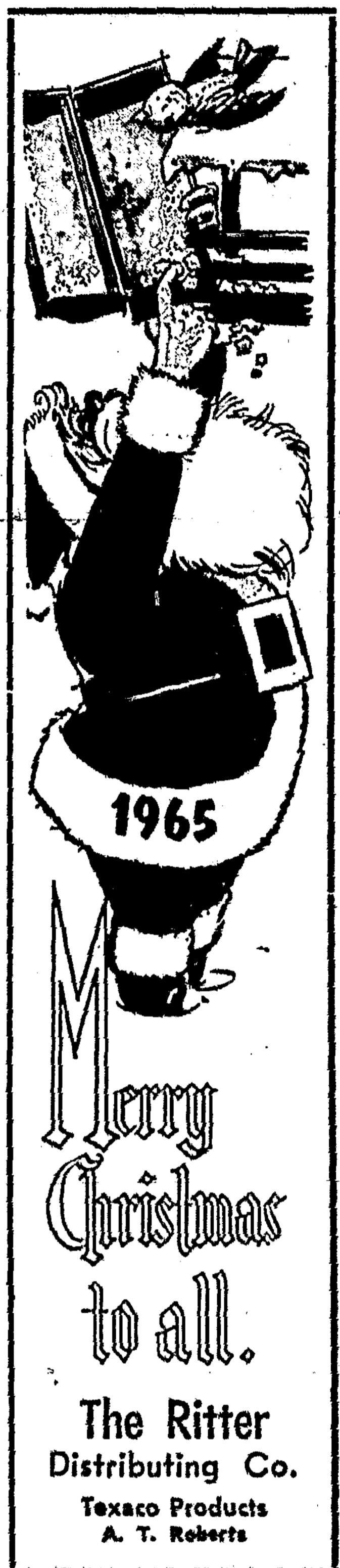

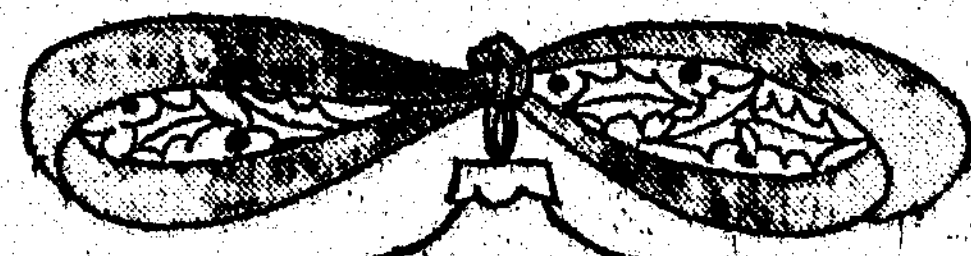
