Too much haggling to reapportion

SANTA FE — Some top legislators think there'll be too much haggling for the Senate to reapportion itself during the next session.

Although State Senators followed a course taken in 1963 by Judge Caswell Neal of Carlsbad in regard to House reapportionment and gave the Senate a March 1, 1966 deadline to reapportion itself. If the Senate fails, then the Federal Court will proceed to do it for them.

Although there have been several proposals for the reapportionment, the most likely to succeed may be the bill drawn by Gov. Jack Campbell's committee to handle the situation.

Campbell appointed former Sen. Gene Lusk, Franklin Jones, and Attorney General Boston Witt.

The bill, drawn prior to the 1965 session, was presented to the Senate Committee on the matter but was never brought before the Senate for action.

It is pointed in this bill that counties and "combinations of counties" were used in creating the Senatorial districts.

The bill calls for 38 members to be elected at large from 18 Senatorial Districts.

There are five districts that include more than one county,

but have been a proportionate number of senators to average one per county. Nine districts will eliminate at least one existing Senate post, and four districts will add senators to a single county.

A big area of battle will be to determine if voting lines within the districts can be added to the measure.

The bill by the Governor's committee clarifies some unique situations in this respect, but one in particular has been questioned.

District 12 is composed of Dona Ana, (Sen. James Patton - D), Hidalgo, (Sen. R. H. Wamel - D), and Luna, (Sen. L. M. Smally - D).

The district is given three Senators, but the bill says "In District 12 at least one senator shall be a resident of either Luna County or Hidalgo County."

By population Dona Ana has 59,948. Hidalgo has 4,961 and Luna has 9,839. So if a senator must come from "either" Luna or Hidalgo, then the combined populace represented would be 14,800 as opposed to two senators from Dona Ana representing 59,948.

Other districts suggested in the bill include: District 1, Colfax, Harding, and Union - 1 Senator; District 2, Taos, Mora Counties - 1 Senator; District 3, Curry and Quay Counties - 2 Senators; District 4, Los Alamos and Sandoval Counties - 1 Senator; District 5, Guadalupe, Roosevelt and DeBaca Counties - 1 Senator; District 6, San Miguel County - 1 Senator; District 7, Santa Fe County - 2 Senators; District 8, Rio Arriba County - 1 Senator; District 9, San Juan County - 2 Senators; District 10, Grant and Catron Counties - 1 Senator; District 11, Otero and Lincoln Counties - 2 Senators; District 12, Dona Ana, Hidalgo, and Luna Counties - 3 Senators; District 13, Valencia and McKinley Counties - 3 Senators; District 14, Sierra, Socorro, and Torrance Counties - 1 Senator; District 15, Eddy County - 2 Senators; District 16, Lea County - 2 Senators; District 17, Chaves County - 2 Senators; and District 18, Bernalillo County - 18 Senators.

Studies made by the National Safety Council for previous New Year fatal accidents disclose that three out of four involved driving too fast for conditions, or in excess of the posted speed limits.

The studies further show that drinking drivers, but not necessarily drunk drivers, were involved in more than half of the fatal wrecks.

Too, the statistics reflect that previously, during year end holidays, one out of every four accidents reported involved pedestrians.

We are advised by the National Safety Council that as a result of traffic accidents during last year's three day New Year holidays there were 800 persons killed and 28,000 who suffered disabling injuries, with a resultant cost of approximately 115 million dollars.

The question arises . . . was there too much or not enough . . . law?

In researching the various incidents of old Lincoln County, the question that often arises in my mind is whether there was actually not enough, or too much, "law" that eventually led to the Lincoln County Cattle War.

Much of the early history of the county seems to be founded upon high-toned court procedures, many of which conflicted with the simple procedures of self government by which the pioneers were accustomed to tending their own business.

family, he had to execute a leadership of loyalty. To keep his home a castle, he often had to substitute religion and the family Bible for material magnificence. To maintain his kingdom, he had to be a good, honorable king, strong enough and tolerant enough to keep the subjects of his land both productive and satisfied.

These early citizens seem to have accepted their own responsibilities, along with a unique understanding of others. Men with good names joined together in assisting each other.

Among them, of course, were pioneers less prideful of their own responsibilities.

There were horse thieves and cattle rustlers, to be sure; but there were also six-shooters and hangin' rope.

There was justice and injustice, the same as is true in any form of law and punishment, but at the same time a rancher had to answer to his ranch hands, his ranch hands to both their boss and to each other. All of them had to answer to the law of courage and fair play, not always just exactly as set forth in a law book, but as to meet the approval of both friends and enemies alike.

So the ranchers and ranch hands of Old Lincoln County prospered on the idea of live and let live, or take the consequences, most of which were doled out in what was then considered fair gun play.

And many of them built their own chapel on their ranches, and to that, they added their own cemeteries; and families lived and died — sang and worked — and it was a dangerous, but happy, civilization that contributed a certain brand of adventure and romance — of courage and fair play — that still lives in true stories of the Old West that are now being told all over the world.

Even at that, there were two sides to the civilization of the Old West — the Cavalry and the civilians; but in the early forming of old Lincoln County, for the most part, there was peace and harmony between the

Everybody is busy with gifts, but the gift of God is buried under an avalanche of things that satisfy the flesh.



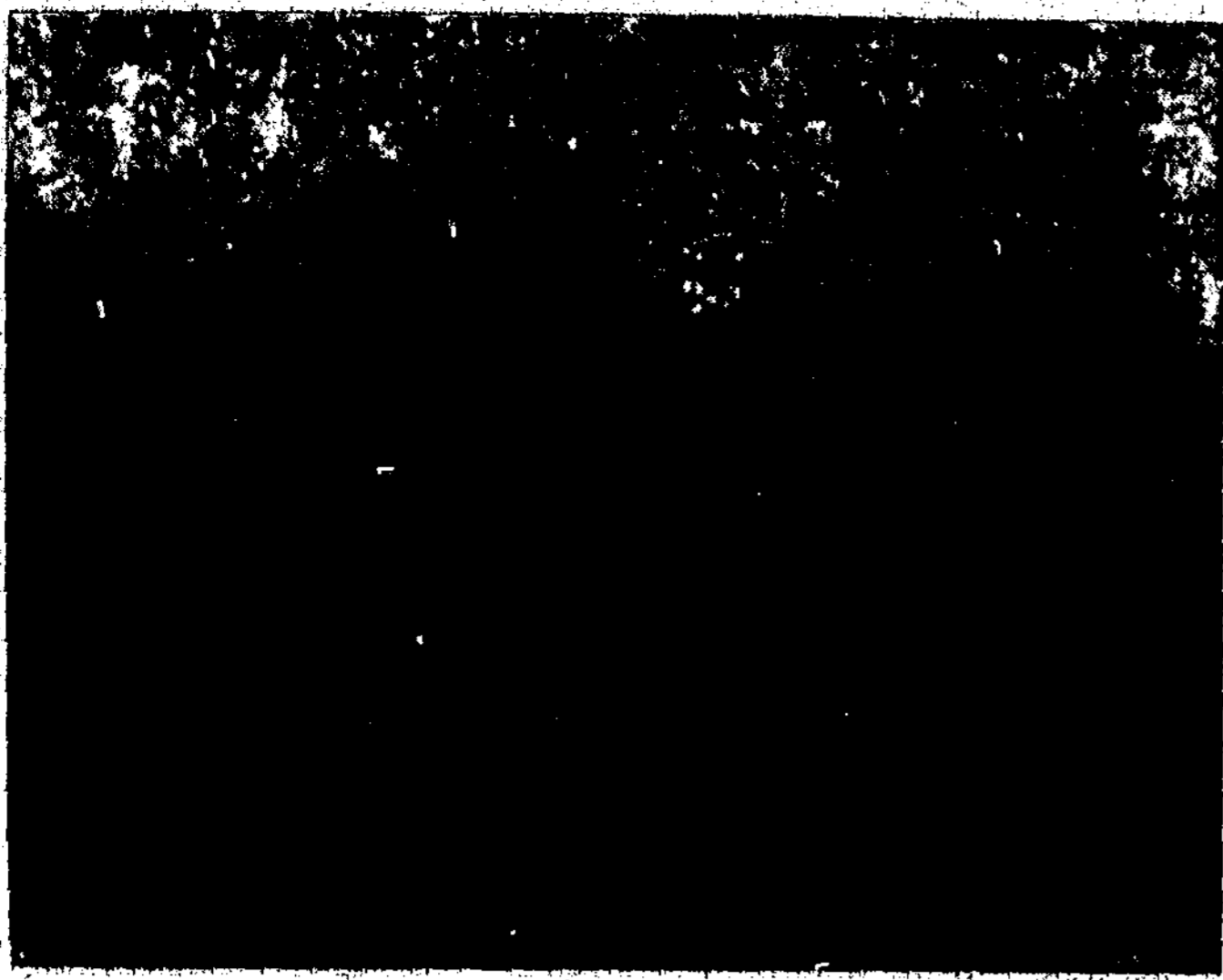

County committees named at convention

The ASCS County Convention was held at the Lincoln County ASCS office in the court house December 21. All three communities in the county were well represented. Those present from Community A were Jack Davidson, Jr., Ernest Sultemeier, and Dimmit Bond. Those from Community B were John Cooper, George Sisneros, and Edward Goodrum. Those from Community C were Bill Edgar, LaMoine Peters, and W. W. Gallacher, Jr. The above community committees elected the following county committee for the term of three years: R. Archie Perkins, Corona, chairman, two year term, Ernest McDaniel, Glenco, vice chairman, and for one year term, Fred Pfingsten, Capitan, member. Also elected to serve as alternates for one term were John Cooper, Tinnie, and Clint Sultemeier, Corona.

Cholla cactus control is part of the Gallacher Ranches' conservation plan



This is part of a 4000 acre brush control program, under the Great Plains Conservation Program. The cactus will be stacked 2 to 6 months later.

"Ya know somethin'," said one guy, with big tears rolling down his face, "I don't really know who I am. I was left on a doorstep." "My Gosh!" exclaimed his inebriated pal, "Maybe you're a milk bottle!"

Cholla cactus control is part of the conservation plan being carried out on the Gallacher Ranches Inc. near Carrizozo. These pictures show the grubbing operation and cactus on the ground. It was stacked about six months later. This is part of the work scheduled under a Great Plains Conservation Program contract which includes Brush Control, Stockwater Development, Range Reclamation, and Range Proper Use. Another part of the ranch is being cleared of cactus in cooperation with the Bureau of Land Management. Bill Gallacher Jr. is a member of the Carrizozo SWCD Board of Supervisors.

Proper planning is major principle

One of the major principles of conservation of soil, water and other natural resources is the proper planning of the conservation program on a farm or ranch unit. The policy of the Soil Conservation Service and of the Carrizozo Soil & Water Conservation District is to provide planning assistance to landowners and operators so that measures taken will be as practical and efficient as possible. Since many of the measures installed are directly related to others it follows that there is an advantage in considering the total conservation needs on a farm or ranch.

When a landowner has made his request known for assistance in planning, aerial photographs of the ranch are obtained. Aerial photos are a valuable aid in planning since the physical features are recognizable. Mapping a ranch on an aerial photo consists of outlining the boundaries, pasture fences, watering facilities, roads and other features. The different types of land, range sites, are also outlined and the range condition plotted. Land status or ownership can also be outlined if this is to be a consideration in the plan. The scale of the aerial photos vary from 2 to 8 inches to the mile depending on the size of the ranch. The acres in each pasture are determined and the pastures numbered.

With this information on what is on the land and its condition, the landowner is in a position to evaluate his problems, consider corrective measures, and come to a decision on how to treat them. The effect the conservation measures will have on his income and operations must be considered. The Soil Conservation Service offers technical assistance to present information on conservation problems and alternatives for their treatment. The landowners decisions on how to treat the problems constitutes the planning. These decisions should lead to a plan that is consistent with sound land use and that will provide complete, coordinated treatment of the farm or ranch unit. Proper land use and sustained yield should serve as the objective of conservation plan.

When the landowner makes

decisions on land use and treatment these are recorded by SCS technicians and these decisions become the plan. Planned structures and treatments are located on the map. Copies of the maps, the record of decisions, land conditions and soils information, engineering data and other material that can aid in applying the plan are assembled in a folder and given the landowner. Information on cost-return, cost of installation, expected benefits, cost-share programs, specifications, etc. is also presented. The decisions contained in the plan are entirely those of the landowner. The assistance provided in preparing the plan, maps etc. are furnished free of charge by the Federal Government to insure preservation of our natural resources.

When land administered by the Bureau of Land Management is in the operating unit, planning conservation measures is accompanied by cooperation between the landowner, BLM, and the SCS. State land is treated in the same manner as private land in regard to planning assistance.

These plans are of no value unless applied. Technical assistance is also provided for design, engineering, measurement etc. in applying these measures. Cost-sharing is provided to aid in applying conservation measures thru the Agricultural Conservation Program and the Great Plains Conservation Program. The Great Plains Program provides for a conservation plan of the landowners decisions with the cost-share funds assured by contract.

Landowners who are interested in conservation planning or application can obtain more information by contacting mem-

bers of the Carrizozo Soil & Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors or the Soil Conservation Service.

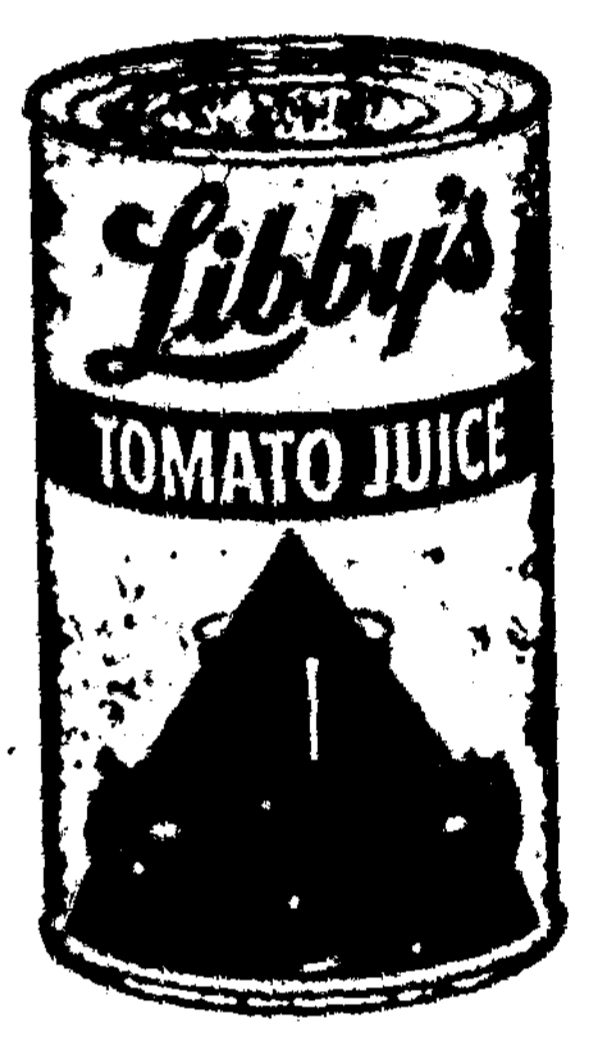

Revenues to exceed appropriations by approximately \$2.5 million in '66

SANTA FE — Among the entire field, there is no gubernatorial hopeful who will admit that a tax hike during the next administration will be necessary. All concede that added money in the future "may be needed" to keep the state above water, but beyond this there have been no definite statements.

The Taxpayers Association of New Mexico points out that at the present time estimates based on revenues for the first four months of the current fiscal year indicates that revenues will exceed appropriations by approximately \$2.25 million, which will mean a total general fund surplus of \$17.5 million which will be available on June 30, 1966. The Legislature will have this sum to operate on for appropriations.

The figure actually reflects an estimated increase of 3 per cent in revenues for the current fiscal year over last year. But, if this 3 per cent increase is projected into the 1966-67 fiscal year, which seems reasonable at this time, estimated revenues for the year would be \$168.9 million, or \$7.4 million more than was appropriated for the current fiscal year and would be the amount of the increase which the Legislature could appropriate and still be within current estimated revenues.

Against the \$7.4 million, however, the public schools have already indicated they want \$9 million. The universities will probably want another \$3.5 to \$4 million and all other state agencies, if they follow the same pattern as last year, will want an increase of \$3.9 million.

If these requests are met, the dip into the surplus will be \$9.5 million.

The feeling is, however, that the idea of a "surplus" is misleading in that it may prevent necessary paring of numerous requests to the Legislature.

If this occurs, along with the proportion of requests by sever-

al agencies, then the surplus could easily vanish and the state could quickly be in need of added funds.

Several moguls note that the key to the future in regard to tax hikes will be the next session of the Legislature and that House Speaker Bruce King will have a strong ax to wield in this respect.

King will be in a position to use the session for support for his campaign in addition to laying "groundwork" for a future administration.

But it's an ironic fact that anything King does money wise will be as much of an advantage to himself as to any other candidate.

NUMEROUS COMMENTS ON SCHOOL, CHURCH DEALS

Numerous comments were received on a recent column citing the fact that the Catholic Church had leased buildings to the state in Mora, Parkview, and Chama for considerable sums, and then purchased buildings in the Hondo and Cobre school districts for \$1 (one) dollar each.

The lease for Mora, made with the state and the Bishop of Santa Fe, calls for \$11,000 over a two-year period. At Parkview and Chama the sum is \$300 per month.

Many persons feel that the Catholic Church has spent much money in the areas involved and therefore is entitled to good return from the state.

Pointing out the situation in this column was not intended to malign church officials.

But Baptists, Methodists, and Presbyterians all operate functions in the state which bring in considerable revenue during summer months. And they operate in buildings which originally cost far more than \$1 each. The state should be questioned - not the Catholic Church.

He was an engineering analyst in the Deputy for Tech Subsystems, Foreign Technology Division.

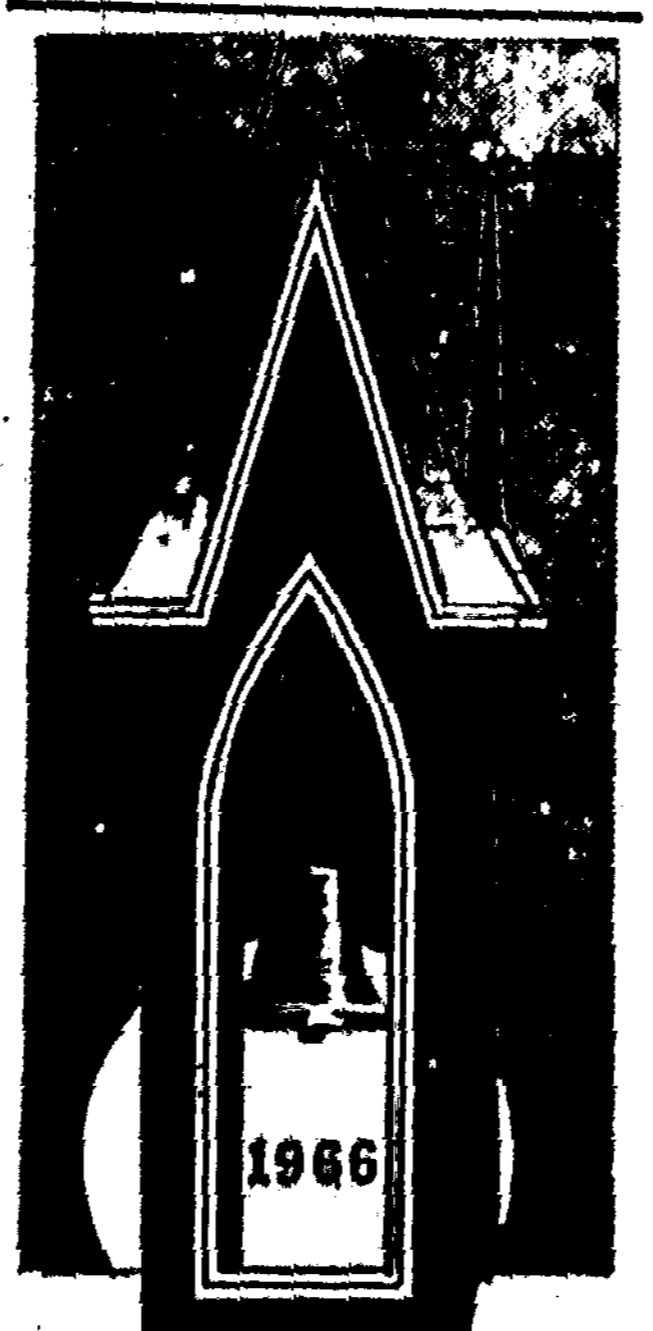
A native of Lafayette, Louisiana, Major Hoffman entered the service in January 1942 as an aviation cadet, and received his commission the following year.

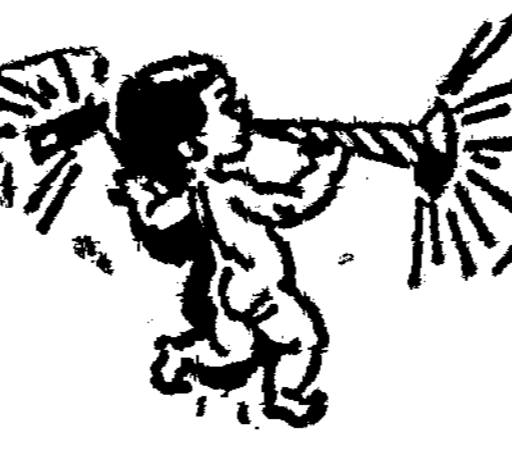

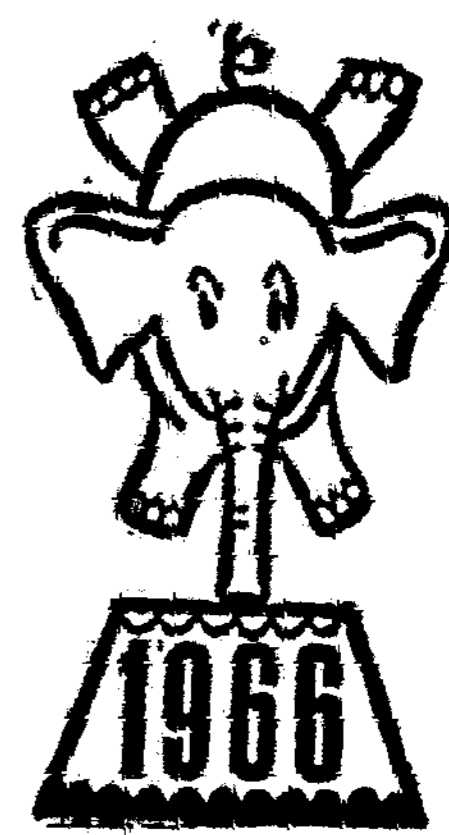

British give more, people get poorer

Despite the establishment of many free state services in Britain, poverty in the country is widespread and increasing, two British sociologists have found.

Between 1953 and 1960, the number of people living in homes with incomes below the poverty line established by government welfare agencies rose from 600,000 to 2 million, according to the sociologists' published report. "The Poor and the Poorest."

The report was prepared by Brian Abel-Smith, professor of social administration at the London School of Economics and Political Science, and Peter Townsend, professor of sociology at the University of Essex.

They estimate that Britain's poor in 1960 numbered 7,500,000, about one in every seven people. Of these, 3 million were elderly people and 2,250,000 were children. One of every six children was in the poor category.

The reasons the professors give for the growing numbers of poor: The increasing proportion of the aged in the population. The increase in chronic sickness among men aged 55 to 65. The increase in large families.



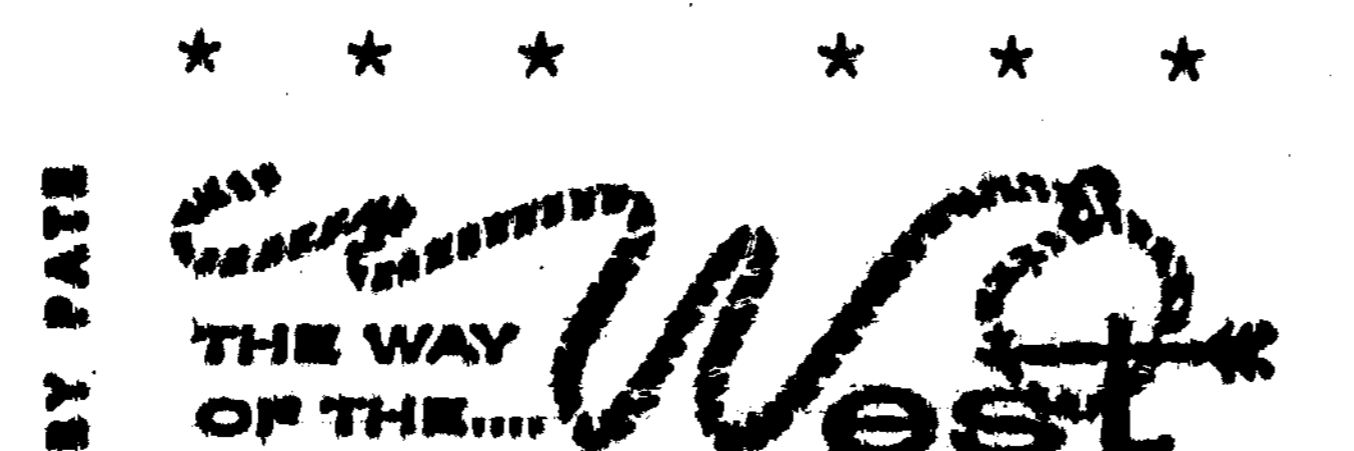

(Continued from page one) early settlers and the United States Army. There was, that is, until "law and order" of old Lincoln County started taking over the chores of governing the people, pretty much capable of governing themselves. With the forming of Lincoln County consisting of the South eastern portion of the New Mexico Territory, in 1869, an outlet was established for the services of smart, ambitious men, like Emil Fritz and Alexander McSwen, who separated themselves from the army to become paid political figures in the molding of the laws of the Old West to fit their own personal gains. As present-day hero-worshippers like to recall, it was the

death of a colorful, youthful outlaw, Billy the Kid, that ended the Lincoln County cattle war; but far too many have forgotten, it was the death of frugal, thrifty Emil Fritz in Germany, on June 26, 1874, that actually triggered the cattle war in old Lincoln County. The contrasts in personalities of these two men became the old Lincoln County that was soon to fight the violent cattle war of the late 1870's.
