LOTS OF CANDIDATES EVERYWHERE BUT IN ZOZOLAND

Seven on school ballot in Corona district

With the filing deadline of January 26, for most schools in Lincoln County, fast approaching the several districts have plenty of candidates except for Carrizozo where only one has announced.

Corona School District has a real race going in the school board election with seven candidates already in the race. To date Nolan Vickrey, Leroy Owen, Roger Gordon, Holt Lovelace and Dan Preston have filed together with incumbent members Willis Brunson and Ernest Yandell.

Corona District has three positions open, two for six-year terms and one for a four-year term. Dimmit Bond, president of the board, has announced election officials as follows: Judges, Junita Carnell, Dorothy Bagley, Juanita Sultemeler; Clerks, Marie Hanson, Zelpha Kuykendall, Robin Pfeiffer. Deadline for filing at Corona was January 19.

Holdover board members at Corona are John D. Holleyman and Frank Sultemeler. Bond's term has expired and he is not a candidate.

Two file at Capitan

Supt. Duane Darling told the News that two candidates had filed for election in the Capitan School District, John R. Schuster, a graduate of the University of Illinois, with a B. A. degree in social science and recreation, a Master's Degree from the University of New Mexico, where he has started work on his Doctorate in Education and Administration, is Director of Sierra Blanca Boys Camp. Mr. and Mrs. Schuster and their four children are currently living at Fort Stanton but expect to move to the Camp when quarters are available. Mr. Schuster is a member of the Capitan Lions Club.

Robert L. Gates has filed at Capitan. Mr. Gates is a graduate of Tucson (Arizona) high school and is a college graduate with B. S. Degree in Animal Science. Mr. and Mrs. Gates and three children of pre-school age have lived in Capitan for two years. Mr. Gates has two years of military service (is now employed as manager of the G Bar F Ranch where a registered Hereford herd is be-

ing developed.

The two outgoing board members at Capitan are Hollis Cummins, now president of the board, who has served 10 years and is not a candidate, Herman Otero has served one six-year term and is not a candidate. Holdover members on the Capitan board of education are Paul Jones, Sid Goodloe and Zane Leslie.

Five candidates at Hondo

Besides two incumbent school board members who are running again, three others have filed for the two vacancies on the Hondo School Board of Education.

Frank Titsworth, who has served about 25 years on the school board, and operates the Hondo Valley Garage, is again a candidate for re-election.

Martha Fresquez, housewife, who has served a six-year term, has announced for re-election.

The three new candidates at Hondo are Mrs. R. C. Nunez, housewife; Orlando Lucero, farmer; and Willie Gomez, who works at Holloman AFB and commutes back and forth.

Eight in race at Ruidoso

Candidates at Ruidoso are William J. Leftwich, an artist and author; James F. Lackey, in construction business; Al Pearson, motel operator, Rufino Sanchez, gas company employee; these four running as a ticket. Four incumbent members who are candidates are: Dave Parke, Jack Jennings, Ralph Petty and C. H. Tate.

Only one filed at Zozo

The terms of Mrs. A. N. Spencer and Fred Chavez in Carrizozo School District No. 7 have expired. Mrs. Spencer has announced that she will be a candidate for re-election. No other candidate has filed as of Wednesday noon.

Max Gonzales repents for straight & narrow

SANTA FE — Max Gonzales the new state revenue commissioner has repented and gone to the straight and narrow.

Gonzales said he would not waive delinquent taxes for years prior to 1963 as he indicated he would do during his first week in office. (No one can forgive delinquent taxes.)

And he said he would close his private accounting business which he was operating in direct conflict with a bureau of revenue rule against private accounting by employees.

COULD PROFIT FROM MISTAKE

The 32-year old, \$15,000-a-year commissioner got off to an unfortunate start by talking too much before he knew anything about his job.

His attitude in correcting his mistakes without a lot of alibis and blustering suggests that he may be a better commissioner as a result of the early mistakes.

Gov. Jack Campbell gambled seriously in putting the young man with no state or administrative experience at the head of the 300 employees, \$120 million-a-year agency, but Gonzales is personable, intelligent and a CPA and should get along right if he moves cautiously and corrects his mistakes.

COURT PROGRAM IS TOP ISSUE

There will be reapportionment, liquor reform, right to work, abolishment of the elective auditor bugging the new legislature but the most important legislation it will consider is that looking toward reform of the state court system.

The program would abolish elective JPs and probate judges within five years, would create a new multi-judge court to operate between the district courts and the supreme court, would make all judges appointive by the governor and would create a commission for the discipline and removal of erring judges and another for nominating candidates for appointment to the bench by the governor.

LAWYERS FEAR PROUD JUDGES

The proposal answers almost every criticism but there remains a considerable area of opposition to appointive judges.

Lawyers are among the major critics of the appointive system. They contend it would give judges what amounts to life tenure and would make them arrogant and tyrannical.

The reform program calls for the names of judges to appear on the ballot periodically for consideration of being retained or turned out. If a majority voted against a judge he would be out and another appointed.

An amendment for the appointment of judges was offered the voters in 1948 and failed by a small margin.

MONEY GONE, BORROW MORE

The Highway Commission's request for authority to borrow another \$20 million may have rough going in the legislature. Borrowing and paying it back with interest from future gas tax collections is a vicious practice that hampers future road operations even when there is

a genuine need for borrowed money.

The Highway Commission in 1963 and '64 borrowed \$15 million to build highways and a bridge that were not justified by engineering or traffic data and paid for them with 100 percent state funds.

Now the department doesn't have enough for the sacred Interstate System and wants to borrow for that purpose. The state puts up only eight percent of the cost of interstate construction.

The department will probably get what it must have to continue the road program but it is a good bet there will be strings attached, such as not using the money for any more 100 percent state construction of bridges.

Meanwhile the highway department is operating with a payroll of 2,494 people, 328 more than January last year and some 400 more than January 1963.

SMALLER JOBS UNATTRACTIVE

Half a dozen Democrats have been acting interested in the governor's office next year but there hasn't been a murmur about the several other state offices that will be open for new occupants.

They are secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and lieutenant governor and there is an effort going forward to raise the pay of the three full-time officials to \$15,000 or better. The lieutenant governor would also get a boost in pay for his occasional duties.

LEGISLATORS CHANGE MINDS

A good many legislators who told the asps during the campaign that they favored repeal of the pre-primary convention law and a return to the direct primary have changed their minds since coming to Santa Fe.

Rep. Mel Eaves, son of the prominent trucker J. W. Eaves and a promising figure in the legislature, is one who had a change of heart after hearing from the politicians. Eaves is an Albuquerque Democrat.

Farm Bureau membership drive is described as one of best state-wide

Las Cruces — A concentrated drive for new members during the recently-ended Farm Bureau Week brought enrollment in the state's largest agricultural organization very close to its 1965 membership goal, president A. W. (Bill) Langenegger said today.

"We are about seven-eighths of the way to our goal of about 9,000 members," Langenegger said. "This has been one of the best membership campaigns we have conducted and we have found interest in Farm Bureau high in all parts of the state and all branches of agriculture."

Langenegger pointed out that for three successive years the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau has topped its membership goal. There is little doubt but that this will be the fourth year in a row for us," he said. "This I believe, is a testimonial to the programs and philosophy of Farm Bureau, because our member gains are coming in the face of a continually declining farm and ranch population."

Langenegger had high praise for the county Farm Bureau organization directors and campaign committee members.

Ft. Bayard closing now official
Ft. Bayard, N. M. — Dr. C. L. Womack, director of the Ft. Bayard Veterans Administration Hospital said late Wednesday he had received official confirmation of a plan announced Tuesday to deactivate the New Mexico hospital.

"The only thing we heard was that the hospital's closing is a sure thing. An official in the VA director's office in Washington said instructions for carrying out the deactivation would be relayed Thursday," Dr. Womack said.

The Ft. Bayard official said, that in addition to the official confirmation, he received a wire from the VA personnel department in Washington ordering a "freeze" of all positions at the hospital.

First news of the Ft. Bayard closing came Tuesday when congressional sources announced deactivation plans for 11 hospitals, 17 regional offices and four veteran's homes.

Administrator William J. Driver said the reorganization will result in annual savings estimated in excess of \$23 million. Target date for the closings is June 30, with all patients scheduled to be transferred to other VA hospitals and homes.

The Ft. Bayard director said Wednesday the hospital now is caring for 193 patients in the 215-bed complex. He said 25 to 30 per cent of the patients came from El Paso area.


At this time I would publicly like to thank the organizations which sponsored me for the Sun Carnival. I hope I was able to tell others of our wonderful and friendly community.



"A page for independent thought"

Churches go against the Bible

Why do churches as a group and pastors individually oppose civil rights. In the eyes of God all men were created equal, and yet they are not equal in the eyes of the New Mexico Council of Churches, and in the eyes of many individual pastors of all denominations.

Why? It certainly must be lack of understanding of the basic issues, or lack of knowledge of God's will.

We do not even consider the many aspects of integration, such as Negroes not being ready for citizenship, and civil rights workers being over eager, as even entering into the discussion.

It disturbs us to know that the N. M. Council of Churches has condemned proposed right-to-work legislation on the basis that such legislation would impede worker's right to bargain collectively and deter workers from joining unions.

Unions are generally, though not openly, opposed to integration. Such opposition is accom-

plished in union locals so that publicity on the national union level is unnecessary.

The social action commission of the Council of Churches, says Rev. Bruce Rolstadt of Santa Fe, chairman of the commission, will lobby on the right-to-work issue only on behalf of member communions who share the point of view expressed in the commission statement. It follows, that if such lobbying is successful all churches will have opposed right-to-work whether it was their intent or not. The representation of the council is in serious jeopardy on this point.

Whether one favors or opposes unions or integration is not a part of the question. It's simply that if one works for compulsory unionism, then a person is opposing integration. That is exactly the position of the New Mexico Council of Churches.

The God this collective looks to must be a different God than the one we have working relationship with.

Law of supply-and-demand hard to beat

A Farm Bureau delegation from Ohio recently put a proposal before the American Farm Bureau Federation that sounds like an adolescent's nightmare—they propose to get in the grocery retail business as a means of forcing food processors to negotiate with farm marketing cooperatives on prices of farm products.

It won't work! No means of leverage can for any durable period force prices far from their supply-and-demand level. For short periods, even a number of years, yes—but not on the long haul.

Grocery business as practiced by large chain operations is about as sharp and tricky as any retailing business today. Also changeable from day to day, and unpredictable almost from store to store.

Throughout the midwest farmers had a fling at retail merchandising with particular had results in groceries, meat, focker, hardware and lumber. From this distance we can't see the Ohio delegation equipped to cope with a much tougher situation, that won't accomplish the end purpose even with profitable sales.

Republican party ripe for remodeling top to bottom . . . or die on the vine

SANTA FE — Ed Mechem's Albuquerque declaration that he would run no more signalled a new era in New Mexico Republican affairs.

The four-time governor and two-year senator declared himself out at the same time that Albert Mitchell, Republican national Committeeman since 1940, said that he would give up the party post and State Chairman Joe Skeen said that he was also stepping aside.

The developments leave the party ripe for remodeling from bottom to top, and also ripe to die on the vine and leave New Mexico a one-party state unless there is reorganization.

ALBERT MITCHELL THE TOP FIGURE

Mitchell who ran for governor in 1938 and for the Senate in 1940 did more than any other individual to save the party from expiring during the Roosevelt-Truman period. He has been the state's Mr. Republican for nearly thirty years, and a hard one to replace.

Mechem has been the dominant figure in the party since his first election as governor in 1950, but he did not exercise absolute control and didn't do much to build the party.

OPPOSED HURLEY FOR THE SENATE

In 1952 Mechem tried to block Pat Hurley from Republican nomination for the Senate with Wea Quinn of Clovis but failed.

In 1954 he backed Holm Bureau of Socorro for nomination for governor and lost to Alvin Stockton of Colfax.

In 1960 he suffered his first primary opponent in Paul Robinson of Albuquerque.

Mechem's most noted show of strength in party affairs came in 1952 when he crushed an effort by the Hurley forces to put Alvin Stockton in over State Chairman Harry Robins to run the party campaign.

ROBERT ANDERSON IS DISENCHANTED Robert O. Anderson of Roswell, head of the Citizens for Mechem in the 1964 campaign and a much discussed prospect for U. S. senator, is another who appears to be stepping out of Republican affairs.

Anderson was reportedly disenchanted with Republican politics by the Goldwater campaign and plans to have no more of it.

He was not only a promising prospect as a candidate but had also been viewed as an angel for the party ever since Look Magazine put his wealth at \$50 million.

REMAINING ONES ARE FAR APART With Mechem, Mitchell, Anderson and Skeen bowing out

the big ones left are Tom Bolack of Farmington, Dr. Jack Redman of Albuquerque and Andy Carter of Lovington and they are about as far apart as it is possible to be and to wear the same party label.

It is doubtful if they could be brought together in working harness which means that it is doubtful if the Republican party can be effectively reorganized in time for next year's elections without the leadership of the old ones.

If serious reorganization is attempted it would probably be more effective if started in the precincts and the counties rather than at the top.

STATEHOUSE IN A HURRY

James T. Pierce, Jr. who was a teacher in the Albuquerque John Adams Junior High School at \$6,959 a year until the first of the month has been cleared by the state personnel office \$12,300 a year as an administrative assistant for Land Commissioner Shepherd Hays.

Bob Castner who had four terms as state auditor has been employed by a field auditor for the ports of entry at \$500 a month. Santa Fe politicians figure the traveling job will give Castner an opportunity to build up for another run for auditor in 1966. He tried last year but the Democratic convention turned him down.

Auditor Alex Armijo has called on the five members of the state Cattle Sanitary Board to dig up \$529.88 to replace that much state money that they spent illegally at a 1963 convention. Members W. O. Culbertson, Noel Rankin, Ellis Whitney and Jack Huling had the whistle blown on them for spending \$111.28 entertaining ladies, \$62.50 for roadrunner pins, \$124.50 for entertaining officials, \$206.50 for a Los Alamos tour and \$25 for a tour guide.

Rio Arriba Sen. Mat Chacon will put in a bill on the first day of the legislature to repeal the pre-primary convention law of 1963. There will also be a bill or two for the same purpose in the house on the first day. The house will probably go for re-

peal but it will be hard going in the senate.

The new \$15,000 revenue commissioner, Max Gonzales, is continuing his private accounting-business in Albuquerque while working for the state. The practice is perilously near a conflict of interest unless Gonzales' clients are immune to New Mexico taxes.

Republican Rep. Bill Shreeengost of Lincoln who has had a two-year term on the important Legislative Finance Committee is scheduled to be replaced in the majority Democratic practice of not allowing a Republican more than a single term on the committee. Demos stay on as long as they are in the legislature.

II roads led to Santa Fe Monday. The 27th New Mexico Legislature did not open until Tuesday noon but Lincoln County legislators were on the road early and we'd say, plenty to do when they get there.

See where Will Harrison predicts Rep. Bill Shreeengost will be replaced on the Legislative Finance Committee, following a practice of the Democrats of not allowing a Republican more than a single term on the committee. Bill could fool Will—and stick. Time will tell and in the meantime you Lincoln County people have a pow-wow with any influential Democrats you know. "Shree" has worked hard at his task of representing Lincoln County, probably knows as much about state government as any man in the House, he can help the LFC at the same time be of service to the state on that committee.

Sen. Joe Skeen was to serve on the committee which appoints committees, the only Republican in that spot. Joe said he could get a word in when he needed to. This Lincoln Countyman rubbed the new off his job as senator a long time ago. He says the crux of a lot of situations is going to be the way the state is reapportioned. What kind of representation Lincoln County has in the future will depend on reapportionment.

Our thought is that school consolidation will go nowhere in this session—but that with reapportionment giving more voting strength to metropolitan

areas, school consolidation will be back again in force along some lines.

Lincoln County citizens should be interested in the hospital facilities Act which would install a 5-man professional board over the state's hospitals including Fort Stanton. Such legislation would wipe out the tax-payer boards now supervising hospital operations. Both Shreeengost and Skeen are familiar with this situation (also familiar with failures and misuses on the part of same institutional boards of directors) even so they wouldn't mind hearing from people in Lincoln County on any subject.

Problems of a peculiar nature exist in Miami, Florida, and other places. President of the Florida Council for Senior Cit-

izens says thousands of old people are living together out of wedlock in the Miami area because marriage would mean loss of Social Security payments. The law could be changed to permit widows over 65 to continue to receive benefits through their former husbands, but then it might become too profitable for elderly wives to do away with their husbands. Guess the only answer is for the social security people to realize that they are involved in a sinful racket.

The federal Redevelopment Administration has designated Glenwood Springs, Colo., as its first choice for the location of a proposed \$28.5 million metal refining plant. Somebody should tell these people that Lincoln County would be a fine second choice. The more we think about industrial development for Carrizozo, the more we become convinced it's not for us in this or the next decade . . . unless it comes from mineral development.

At the Fruit Short Course to be held January 21st on the N. M. S. U. campus in Las Cruces, fruit diseases will be discussed by L. E. Dickens, Extension Plant Pathologist at Colorado State University.

Now is the time to prune out old dead limbs and twigs from fruit trees.

Perhaps some of these have died because they were diseased, or perhaps they have broken, weak, or ill-shaped branches. Removal of the diseased limbs will not only help the tree, but also will reduce the chances of spreading the disease.

When making selections from seed and nursery catalogs, price is not the most important feature.

Watch out for so-called "bargains." Poor quality merchandise is sometimes unloaded on the unsuspecting home owner at cut-rate prices.

To keep steps and sidewalks as safe for young and old take time to fix up a box of sand, ashes, sawdust or fertilizer.

Place the box near the walk where you can get at it and sprinkle icy spots when needed.

Every box of apples that is packed and sold are that many less apples to compete on the local market.

No matter if it is packed in a large grader, by hand or on a small grader the apple will bring more than when sold to the truck. This was some of the thinking of the growers at the fruit meeting held last week at Hondo.

Steps toward producing a quality apple are: Frost. Whether you use smudge pots or not you have this as one of the problems.

With smudge pots properly used you can protect your orchard to somewhere around 20-22° F. Pollination. Many old orchards are straight Red Delicious which are self-unfruitful. You need a pollinator. Most of the newer orchards

have one row in four as pollinators generally Golden Delicious or Jonathan. I am going to recommend that any new planting have one row in three for better pollination.

In ten years you will get more Red Delicious. Insect Control, recommendations are on an acre basis and if you do not use the proper amount per acre you cannot expect control 450 gallons per acre. This will be covered thoroughly at the February 11 meeting with Dr. Nour, Bryant and Coppock.
