Primary election loss sets Bruce King back

SANTA FE — Speaker Bruce King of Santa Fe came out of the legislative session as an established candidate for the Demo nomination for governor next year but he is far away from being a roaring favorite.

The defeat of the effort led by King and others to return to the direct primary damaged the prospects of King and other independent hopefuls for governor.

Sens. Clint Anderson and Joe Montoya who will probably designate the convention nominee for governor perhaps don't know at this time who it will be but it seems fairly certain they won't pick King.

JOHNNY WALKER STILL IN TROUBLE

U. S. Rep. Johnny Walker who got off the hook when the house reserved an early action and killed a congressional districting bill which would have placed him in an Albuquerque-northern New Mexico district that he lost in both the primary and general election last year, looks like he is on the hook again because of congressional action.

A measure is progressing through Congress that would force New Mexico to create congressional districts for the 1966 election.

If it goes through it would require Walker, because of his Santa Fe residence, to run in a northern district that would have to include Albuquerque unless there is some bodacious gerrymandering.

Albuquerque is where Walker had his most trouble last year. Both he and Rep. Tom Morris presently run at large in the state.

SENATE COMPILES WORST RECORD

Senators who compiled what many are saying was the worst record in the history of the chamber were working with the knowledge that most of them probably won't be around when the senate meets again.

The pitiful reapportionment plan the senators proposed for themselves is almost certain to be rejected by the federal courts.

It proposed keeping all the members just as they are and adding five more for Albuquerque and then would let them perform with voting weight according to the number of people they represent.

The voting weight would range from 59,000 for the senator from Dona Ana to 1800 for the senator from Harding.

If it should survive the courts it would be a marvel if the chamber could function under the system.

STRONG SENATORS ON THE WAY OUT

Reapportionment of the senate on a population basis would probably eliminate members from the smaller counties including the Smalley of Luna, an extremely valuable legislator the senate president pro tempore Bill Wheatley of Union, Republican leader Joe Skeen of (continued on back page)



John A. Carver Jr.

Carver to address Cattle Growers

John A. Carver, Jr., Undersecretary, U. S. Department of Interior, will address the program of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association Annual Convention March 28, 29 and 30. The announcement was made today by President Les Davis, of Cimarron.

Carver, a native of Idaho, took over the post of Undersecretary after serving as Assistant Secretary for Public Land Management since January 1961. In this capacity, Carver supervised the Bureau of Land Management and five other agencies. He became familiar with the problems of public land management in New Mexico and eleven western states.

Carver's present activities include the direction and supervision of twenty-four bureaus and agencies in the Department of Interior.

According to Davis, the Convention will open on Sunday, March 28, at the Cole and Hilton Hotels. Heading the Sunday program will be a General Membership Meeting and a Reception on Sunday evening.

The Convention's first General Session will be Monday morning, March 29, featuring Carver, Dr. William E. Murray, Agriculture Economist from Iowa State University, and the National Livestock and Meat Board Carving Demonstration team.

The second General Session will be held Tuesday morning, March 30, and will feature Bill McMillan, Executive Vice-Director of the American National Cattlemen's Association, and a panel of experts from New Mexico State University.

Administrator starts July 1 at hospital

The board of directors of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo is doing considerable work to get the hospital in shape, both physically and financially.

J. T. Clegg, now superintendent of schools in Carrizozo who retires from this position at the end of the present school year, will start in a new job on July 1, that of administrator for the local hospital.

The plans for remodeling, painting, and reworking the hospital will start immediately. These include opening up the front entrance, a new driveway, and painting throughout the hospital.

Carrizozo schools to host meeting of New Mexico Education Assoc.

On April 10 teachers of the south central district of the New Mexico Educational Association will meet in Carrizozo. The district comprises Carrizozo, Socorro, Lajoya, Magdalena and Quemada.

The meeting will open at 9 a.m. with a tour of the new school building and a coffee hour from nine to ten o'clock.

At ten o'clock the meeting will be called to order by President Vidal Lopez of Lajoya.

Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer will be special guests and will be honored for their contribu-

tions to the Carrizozo schools. Principal speaker will be Dr. Travis Stovall, superintendent of schools at Alamogordo.

There will also be speakers from the state NMEA and the State Department of Education.

Mr. Frank Wagner of Carrizozo is vice president of the district organization.

This is the first time Carrizozo has been host to this group which has over 100 members.

Via Dolorosa — The Way of the Cross

A meditative walk in the Holy Land

A cold freezing early morning February rain fell over Jerusalem as the cab driver delivered the guide and me to St. Stephen's Gate, where we commenced a meditative walk over Via Dolorosa, the Way of the Cross. We went by the St. Anne Church, one of the most serenely peaceful spots in all Jerusalem.

The church marks the birthplace of the Virgin Mary; and the spot certainly departs an atmosphere of motherly protection and love. The place seems to never be crowded, and is quiet. Only a few paces away is Bethesda Pool, where Christ healed the sick; and virtually on the course over which only a short time afterwards He lugged the crucifixion cross!

Even at the early morning hour, Christian Period modes and 20th Century methods of street travel congested the rainy, sloppy, narrow Jerusalem thoroughfare leading underneath a vine-covered street arch, seen in the photograph. Today this

arch denotes the site where Pontius Pilate interrogated Jesus and subsequently condemned Him to die by crucifixion. This spot, engulfed as it was with very dismal weather, created an eerie feeling, and commanded a desire for a closeness of the Divine Power.

Present-day street level is about six feet above that surface on which Christ walked. The elevated surface has been caused by constant strife, over the centuries, as ruler after ruler conquered Jerusalem, demolished it, leveled the townsite, and rebuilt the town to suit desires. History of Jerusalem!

This locality, in Christ's time, was known as the palace fortress, called Antonia, built by Herod the Great, and named for his friend, Mark Anthony. The rampway on the right and in front of the donkey-mounted man, leading upwards to the archway, locates a government school.

On the street level, to the left of this arch is a door which opens to an area that is more of the ancient palace of Antonia. Within may be seen excavated cobble stones, still in the initial setting, which formed the streets where the Lord's trial was held. Here chariot tracks are still visible, along with the grooves sketched into the stones to prevent the horses from slipping.

Break-in at hardware in Capitan Saturday



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

Judge George Zimmerman selected to attend College of State Trial Judges

Judge George L. Zimmerman has been selected from more than 260 applicants to attend the 1965 session of the National College of State Trial Judges which will be held at the University of Colorado School of Law during July.

Judge Zimmerman is one of seventy-five who will receive a fellowship from money provided by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to cover the essential expenses of his participation.

The first session of the National College was held at the University of Colorado in 1964 at which 92 judges from all but three of the United States attended. As in 1964, the session this year is designed to acquaint new judges with methods for effective judicial administration being developed throughout the country. The faculty, composed of leading jurists and law professors, will present courses in court administration, modern trends in evidence, sentencing and probation, criminal procedures, pre-trial procedures and other currently developing fields of trial court administration. The course comprises four weeks of intensive work in these various fields.

The National College is part of the continuing program of the American Bar Association. Its purpose is to bring about an exchange of ideas and information among the trial judges of the United States. Sponsor is the National Conference of State Trial Judges which is an activity of the ABA's Section of Judicial Administration. The College is operating under a three-year grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to the American Bar Association's Fund for Public Education. The sessions of the College are being held annually.

The National College effort grew out of the work of the Joint Committee for the Effective Administration of Justice which was chaired by the Honorable Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

Through seminars conducted on a state and regional basis, the Joint Committee gathered the information about judicial skills necessary to an educational effort. This information and experience is now being made the subject for instruction at the College.

Mr. Justice Clark who serves as chairman of the governing board of the College stated that after examining the applications he was impressed with the high quality of the judges who applied and is looking forward to having them in attendance. He expressed his regret that the College, because of limited financial considerations, was able to accommodate only a small percentage of the excellent applications.

Hotel Dieu recruits nurses

The tri-state area of southern New Mexico, Texas west of the Pecos, and eastern Arizona is on the threshold of receiving a larger supply of much-needed Registered Professional Nurses. A continuing student recruitment and building program at Hotel Dieu School of Nursing in El Paso is producing the rising nurse supply. The substantial increase in student nurses from New Mexico — 34 of HDSN's 145 total current enrollment — indicates the school's role as a regional source of nurses.

The 67-year old school is nationally accredited and operated by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul for qualified applicants of all creeds.

Applicants must be high school graduates between ages 18 and 36. Pre-entrance examinations given monthly through May are the first steps toward qualifying as freshmen in the three-year course leading to Registered Nurse certification. New classes begin each September.

FARM NEWS

I talked with James Goodrum last Friday and he said some wool would be offered for sale this week but he did not expect there would be many sales.

In the Amarillo area, 275, mostly choice, 450 pound feeders steers sold for \$22.00 and heifers for \$19.00. In Nevada choice 400 pound calves sold for May 15 delivery at \$24.00 for steers and \$21.00 for heifers.

I went to the Tucumcari bull sale last week and saw some bulls sell very reasonable. Of the 143 bulls sold, the top half sold well but the last few sold below packer price. The cold disagreeable weather discouraged the buyers from staying to the last of the sale. Some of the buyers from this area were Straley Ranch, Wilson Ranch, J. A. Hightower and John Erramuspe Ranches.

The 1965 District 5 Extension meeting will be held at the Chaparral, Ruidoso Downs on April 1st. Mrs. R. K. Knox of Ruidoso is in charge of arrangements.

Dr. George R. Dawson, Professor of agriculture economics at New Mexico State University and Corona High School graduate, was appointed head of NMSU's department of agricultural economics and agricultural business. Dr. Phillip J. Leyendecker, dean and director of agriculture and home economics made the announcement of Dr. Dawson's promotion.

Now is the time to re-pot your house plants, according to Douglas Bryant, horticulturist with the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service.

Any plant that isn't presently in bud or bloom can be transplanted now. This is an especially good time to re-pot bedding plants such as geraniums, begonias, and spengeri vines.


Clean your containers thoroughly before putting plants in them. To disinfect all except plastic pots, place them in boiling water for two minutes.

To insure adequate drainage, place a piece of plastic screen, broken plate, or several pieces of nylon stocking over the hole in the bottom of the container. This will keep dirt from plugging the holes.

If you need more containers, you can make them by punching a hole in the bottom of tin cans or milk cartons. If you use copper or galvanized containers, paint them with a durable paint to keep the soil from absorbing the metal.

Equal parts of good garden soil, peat and sand make an ideal soil mixture. Make sure the soil is firm, especially at the bottom of the container.

Always leave at least a half-inch between the soil line and the top of the container to allow for water.



HOSPITAL LAW IS IMPORTANT

Probably the most important thing that came out of the 1965 legislature was a law that will require the counties to pay the hospital bills of residents who can't pay for themselves.

The hospitals will be paid by a tax levy on property. A provision in the bill requiring election in all the counties to authorize a tax for payment of hospital bills doesn't mean anything because the hospitals can go to court and get their money anyway which would come from the same tax.

The law does not cover welfare clients except to pay the difference of what they actually cost the hospitals and what the hospitals received from the welfare department. The department does not pay the full hospital cost for welfare patients.

CAMPBELL WINS EVERY ROUND

Gov. Jack Campbell got everything he wanted from the recent legislature and got everything he didn't want killed. The house got rambunctious a few times in voting for repeal of the guaranteed profit liquor law and the pre-primary convention and for congressional districts and Albuquerque city commission districts but the governor's forces prevailed in the senate and squashed them all.

Even Highway Commissioner John Sudderth got the \$15,000 salary that the governor wanted for him, which was the most nose-holding vote the legislature made during the session. Several who supported the pay for the highway chairman apologized to senate colleagues saying they did it to help the administration. The \$15,000 limit was put through by Sen. Joe Steen, the Republican state chairman. There was no limit in the bill as it was proposed.
