



Salutatory Address
By Danny Armstrong

Let us suppose it were perfectly certain that the life and fortune of every one of us would depend upon our winning or losing a game of chess. Don't you think that we should consider it a prime duty to learn at least the names and moves of the pieces, to have developed some sort of playing technique and to have a keen eye for all the means of giving and getting out of check? Do you not think that we should look with scorn upon the father who allows his son or upon the state which allows its citizens to grow up without knowing a pawn from a rook?

Yet, it is very plain that the life, the fortune, and the happiness of every one of us do depend upon our knowing something of the rules of a game infinitely more difficult and complex than chess. It is a game which has been played for untold ages, every one of us being one of the two players in a game of his own. The chessboard is the world, the pieces define the problems which face us in life, and the rules of the game are what we call the laws of nature and society. The player on the other side is hidden from us. We know that His play is always fair, just and patient. But we also know that He never overlooks a mistake or never makes the smallest allowance for ignorance and that He would rather lose than win. To the man who plays well, the highest stakes are paid, and the man who does not play well is checkmated — without haste but also without remorse.

Education is the learning of the rules of the game of life not only the laws of nature — things and their forces — but also the laws of Society — men and their ways. Education alone can make no man a success; for experience, the greatest teacher of all, teaches the application of the rules to the moves which contribute to the winning of the game. However, attempting to play the game before the basic rules are learned may be compared to a pawn challenging a queen — very little chance of winning.

Like the ever-changing battle of the chess game life's problems are also ever-changing and no formal education could possibly cover every situation which might arise. Thus formal education should merely prepare one to begin the greatest of all educational experiences — entrance into nature's university. This is when the big game begins and the player must learn with each move, he must also apply the rules and learning techniques acquired in formal schooling to the present situation in order to win.

It is this great university of life which we, the graduating class, are about to enter. Some of us will end our formal education here, others will want to learn some more of the rules and techniques before beginning to play the game. However, only those who learn from each move and thus continue their education will win. For us, true education now begins.

Those of us who have prepared ourselves for entrance in this great university through the formal education which has been offered us will win the game.

Dear seniors: If you haven't already done so, start now to learn to make use of your hands as well as your mind. We don't exactly mean that you should

learn to be a specialist in the field of electronics, medicine, business — but you should learn to do things with your hands (you might understand our thinking better if we said, learn a skill or trade) for two good reasons, 1.) you will enjoy being skillful, 2.) so often in a lifetime it becomes necessary to employ such ability while seeking your main goal.

Learn to lay stone and brick, mechanic a car, paint a picture, do carpenter work, run a business machine, electrical wiring, how to cook, the printing trade, make ceramics, repair appliances — there is much skill involved in all those, and the many other things one can do with his hands.

You will have idle times at periods all during your life, and if you have learned to enjoy working with your hands you'll not be bothered by idleness — nor will you have the problem of providing for yourself and family, if your hands are skillful.

Have no fear of making mistakes, do not live on your accomplishments of yesterday, remember to laugh, and keep moving ahead — the world will surely move right along with you.

"That's not the road to Utopia"

Every once in a while an editorial writer puts the right words together which convey an unmistakable message. Jenkin Lloyd Jones, editor of Tulsa (Okla.) Tribune accomplished that act recently and in the following paragraphs we give you a condensed version of Mr Jones' writing.

Yes, Virginia, there are such things as bums.

Not deprived persons. Not socially wounded. Not members of a sub-culture. Not underprivileged or disadvantaged. Just bums. You can pick them up, but they'll fall flat again the moment you let them go. They work only the compulsion of hunger. Opportunities don't interest them. Self-improvement is for the birds.

We are beginning to get into deep water because both politicians and our academic sociologists stubbornly refuse to recognize the bum factor. Under the New-Think it is heresy to suggest that bums might exist.

The dogma, at least until recently, has gone like this: poverty is the result of society's coldness to individuals or groups of individuals. If society will only loosen-up with more relief money, more low cost housing, more special schools, more medical services, more job opportunities, etc., the poor will cease to be poor. They will, in fact, become self-supporting taxpayers, to the profit of everyone. You can see that if you hold to this dogma the admission that bums exist becomes a distressing qualification of the dogma itself. And no dogma can tolerate "ifs" or "buts."

But in spite of record employment, and the highest gross national product in history relief-costs keep soaring. In the past ten years, with U. S. population up 18 per cent, the number of persons on relief has risen 42 per cent. Many of these are illegitimate children fathered by men who wander from woman to woman, unworried about who will care for their offspring because they know that Aid to Dependent Children payments will.

The new theory holds that no one should worry if some people never work at all, for the idea that all should labor is old fashioned. James G. Patton, president of the National Farmers Union recently stated, "I say that what the individual can offer no longer can or should determine the measure of his reward. His reward should and must be measured by his need."

Mr. Patton must surely remember that it was Lenin who promised "From each according to his ability, to each according to his need." The Communists quickly found this theory so crazy that they inaugurated the cruelest of piecework systems and sent the drones to Siberia.

If there were no such thing as bums, if everyone were fired by ambition to do his level best, such schemes might be manageable.

But, alas, Virginia, there are bums, indeed. Just plain loafing child-deserting, rent-money-drinking bums. And until we learn to distinguish between them and the upliftable unfortunate, we'll simply decrease the motivation of the weakly-motivated. That's not the road to Utopia.

Postmasters meet at sectional center



Indigent care may be county responsibility

An enabling piece of legislation was passed in the session just past which allows a county to decide for itself whether cost of indigent care will be assumed by a county in such areas where hospitals are county-operated — both Carrizozo and Ruidoso are included under this legislation.

Further word of the legislation seems to put indigent care in the hand of county commissioners whether the county votes for or against the cost of such care. Commission Chairman Max Oliver is of the opinion such is the case. The legislation reads: "Persons going to a county-type hospital who cannot pay for the care that is needed, may apply directly to county commissioners for classification. If it is determined an

applicant is unable to afford hospitalization, then the county classifies him indigent and bears expense of his hospital care."

To provide funds for indigent care, a special tax would have to be levied. An election has been set for September where citizens may vote on the special tax — repeat, it seems the county will have to pay regardless of the vote in this election.

POSTMASTERS GIVE OATH TO JOB CORPS ENROLLEES

Postmasters and assistant postmasters are being authorized, when requested, to administer the oath of office to Job Corps enrollees without charge. Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced today.

Job Corps, a major youth program in the President's War on Poverty, assists young men and women 16 through 21 who are out of school and out of the necessary education and work skills which will make them more employable.

Mr. Gronouski said that requests had been received from the Office of Economic Opportunity, which operates the Job Corps program, asking the Department to take this action, enabling enrollees, to travel as federal employees entitled to free transportation to assigned duty stations.

If enrollees are not sworn in before traveling to a center, they must pay their own transportation, which would mean a hardship for most of the Job Corps enrollees.

Under the new procedure, Mr. Gronouski has ordered provisions inserted in the Postal Manual, enabling all of the approximately 34,000 postmasters to administer the oath of office to the Job Corpsmen in or near their home towns.

political affiliation to Democrat on March 30 has been selected for assistant district attorney amid protests from some who think that a lawyer with longer time in the party should have gotten the appointment.

PABLO MARSHALL WAS BY-PASSED

There is talk about several Democratic lawyers being bypassed in the Sierra-Socorro-Catron-Torrance Seventh District but it boils down to the bypassing of Pablo Marshall of Socorro, a prominent figure in Democratic politics in the area.

Marshall was a losing candidate for the legislature last November and was accused of working against Dist. Atty. Raymond E. Keithly of (ugh) Truth or Consequences, a Democrat, for his Republican opponent, James C. Enloe, in anticipation of appointment as Enloe's assistant.

Marshall emphatically denied the rumor but Keithly apparently did not believe him and gave the job to the political turncoat, Kase.

EMILIO NARANJO STILL WAITING

As this was written Emilio Naranjo, sheriff and Demo county leader of Rio Arriba, was more than two weeks overdue on his scheduled appointment as U. S. marshal for New Mexico.

The meager information available on the expected appointment indicated Naranjo would get the job after some critical reports on his eligibility are cleared.

He was supposed to go in May 1.

LITTLE COUNTIES FROM 12 TO 5

Many of the people involved are not yet aware that the 1965 legislature gave 12 small counties five state representatives in place of the 12 they had in the past.

The new apportionment will go into effect in the 1966 elections with five multi-county districts each electing one representative.

The change went through quietly in the last hours of the

legislative session and seemed to meet the demands of the U. S. Supreme Court with a couple of minor exceptions.

TWELVE COUNTIES IN FIVE DISTRICTS

Next year Union, 6,068 population, Mora, 6,028 and Harding, 1,870, will elect one member of the house, obviously not a resident of Harding.

Torrance, 6,947 population, Guadalupe, 5,610, and Belaca, 2,991, will elect a single representative, not likely from DeBaca.

Lincoln, 7,744 and Sierra, 6,409, will elect one member. Both the counties now have Republican members and one must go — Bill Shrocongat of Lincoln or Ken Black of Sierra, the minority floor leader.

Catron with 2,773 census count and Socorro with 10,186 will elect one legislator, no doubt from Socorro.

Hidalgo with 4,961 is in a district with Luna, 9,833 population for the election of one representative.

MEMBERS REDUCED FROM 77 TO 76

The new house membership is 70, reduced from the 77 figure that was established in 1963.

The only change from the 1963 membership pattern was cutting the 12 little counties from 12 members to five.

Albuquerque was left with 18 members giving the city 25.7 percent of the house which compares with Albuquerque's 27.5 percent of the state population.

The only serious deviations from the population formula are in two members given Grant county and three for Curry, each with one member too many to meet the formula.

MOUNTING OPINION FOR GENE LUSK

There is mounting opinion here that the Democratic leaders, all two or three of them, are nearing agreement on former State Sen. Gene Lusk of Carlsbad for governor in 1966.

Sens. Clint Anderson and Joe Montoya are denying, as usual, having any preference for the 1966 nomination but the capitol has heard detailed accounts of what the senators were supposed to have said about Lusk.

Lusk, during his years as a legislator, had serious trouble with Anderson and organized labor, and he cut off his legislative career with a run against Montoya for Congress, but he seems to be overcoming these obstacles.


