Tiny Lloyd Burson stole the thunder from bigger and faster performers here Friday night during the opening session of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics track meet.

Burson, 5-10½, 145-pounder from Western New Mexico who was making his fourth Sioux Falls appearance in the NAIA meet, thrilled an estimated 4,000 Howard Wood Stadium spectators with the only record of the night.

He outlasted freshman Van Nelson of St. Cloud (Minn.) to win the three-mile run in 13:58 well under the NAIA record of 14:01.3 established by Jim Keefe of Central Connecticut State in 1963.

Burson, whose best previous finish in Sioux Falls had been a third place in last year's 5000-meter run is a senior from Corona, N. M.

The determined battler from Silver City school next plans to see action in the National AAU meet in San Francisco.

The Kirkpatrick horses have been doing well in competition this year. At the Big Spring Paint Horse Show on May 6 Chief Chock won 5th in the 1962 stallion class, with Randy Kirkpatrick as the rider. Chief scored 2nd in pole bending, and 2nd in color class.

## Clint says it's "likely" he will retire - maybe

**SANTA FE** — Our Clint says that it is "likely" that he will retire at the end of his term next year and has promised a decision on his 70th birthday, Oct. 23.

The senator expressed the wisdom of a 69-year-old when he qualified his "likely" retirement with the comment that he had learned "that you can't be positive in this world."

That last comment should explain some things for Senator Anderson's younger colleagues in Washington.

## HE'S NOT SURE WHAT HE WANTS

Last year Clint said publicly that he favored the federal system in state legislature, house membership on population, and senate membership on geography or other consideration than population.

When New Mexico Reps. Tom Morris and Joe Montoya voted for the Tuck amendment to keep the U. S. Supreme Court out of the state legislature, he said he didn't understand their votes, and joined the senate group that defeated a measure to let the states organize their senates as they desired.

## FOR AND AGAINST INDIAN SCHOOL

It was the same way recently when the government proposed to build a \$13 million segregated Indian high school in Albuquerque.

Clint said he was against it. The young guys in the house, Morris and Johnny Walker were against it, and then Clint switched to the other side.

## QUICK DECISIONS TRAIT OF YOUTH

From this and other similar instances you might say that Clint ought to retire if he can't make up his mind and stick to it.

Impetuosity and a limber tongue in sounding off before one is ready, however, are symptoms of youth and should not be blamed to Clint's 69 years.

"Impulsiveness", which is about the same thing, is what President Johnson is being charged with on all sides in his handling of foreign affairs, and that would seem to put Clint in the main stream with the Johnson Democratic administration.

## ASK OTHERS TO DECIDE

Clint's Oct. 23 decision is likely to be one in which he asks the saps to make the decision on whether he stays in or steps out of the Senate, and naturally they'll tell him to stay in.

At the middle of June, I, a registered Republican, think that he should stay in.

Anderson is one of the most aggravating politicians that any state ever had to put up with, but he is about the only force that is keeping this state moving, and more often than not he is on the side of the people when he is obliged to make decisions from the statesmanship level.

## CALVIN HORN DARK HORSE

All the talk about the Demo nominee for governor next year has failed to mention a very prominent guy who might move in when he thinks the time is right.

Calvin Horn of Albuquerque. Just take a look at his background:

He was a member of the house 1947 through 1952 and speaker in his final term.

He was in the senate 1953-56 and was a major candidate for appointment to a congressional place on the Demo ticket in 1958 when John J. Dempsey died during the primary period.

## HAD A HAND IN ALL ELECTIONS

In 1960 ran against Tom Morris who had won the 1958 appointment to the Dempsey place on the ticket, and lost.

In 1962, the following election, Horn came up to Santa Fe to serve as state Democratic chairman.

In 1964 Horn stood as a candidate for Congress in the Demo state convention and won a place on the primary ballot but decided against making the run after it appeared that the odds were stacked against him.

After 19 years of prominence in state politics it doesn't seem likely that he would suddenly pull out at a time when the governor's office is open.

## THIS TIME IS LOGICAL

Horn is a successful and wealthy Albuquerque business man who came up from an orphan's home. He is a prominent Baptist layman and has received much credit for republishing rare historical books concerning this area and for his promotion of the New Mexico Hall of Fame.

I'm not nominating Calvin for governor but it seems logical that he would be interested. He's 46.

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
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

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

Pete Gnatkowski, Jud Cooper, Gary Hightower and Wayne Dunlap were chosen as the senior 4-H Livestock Judging Team at the contest held last Thursday. They will represent Lincoln County at the State Contest held at NMSU in August.

Barbara Knight, Johnny Davis, Bobby Booky and Dan Harker were chosen as the Junior Livestock Judging Team to represent Lincoln County at the District Contest to be held July 9 in Roswell.

There were twenty boys and girls in the contest. Clover mites which may appear by the thousands as tiny red dots on walls of homes are not dangerous — they neither eat anything commonly found in the house nor bite humans or animals — but they can be very annoying when they invade the home.

Those tiny pests, some fifty-thousandths of an inch in length, usually stay outside the house — lush green lawns are among their favorite feeding places. But lawns that come right up to the wall of a house give them a natural path indoors. On cool nights, they swarm in through the smallest openings seeking warmth.

Clover mites have increased in numbers in recent years, probably because of improved lawns throughout the country, giving the mites more and better food. The mites now have become a year-around household problem where they once appeared in homes only in spring.

Using pyrethrin aerosol spray is the best way to get rid of these pests indoors. Pyrethrin, which leaves no residue, stuns the mites and they drop to the floor where you can sweep them up with a vacuum cleaner. Don't try to brush the mites off the wall or to sweep them off with a broom, this crushes their tiny soft bodies, leaving reddish brown stains on the wall.

You may need to use an insecticide outdoors to keep the house free of clover mites. For this purpose, spray the house foundation and a few feet out in the lawn with chlordane, d-ozonon malathion, or kelthane.

If you want good home fruit, you'll have to spray the trees. All too often a homeowner is convinced he can grow good apples, peaches and cherries by cutting out the trees and giving them no more attention than shade trees. It won't work. Home orchards have too many pests.

Controlling most pests requires several sprayings a year. You can get the materials for the spraying as a mixture of insecticides or fungicides in one package, or you can buy them separately.

A prepared mixture is easier to use, but may be more expensive if you have several trees to spray. Usually, malathion or methoxychlor is used to control insects and karathane is used to control the common fruit diseases. All these materials are safe to use.

If you aren't sure about how or when to use these materials, consult the County Agent at the Courthouse or get the publication, "Control Insects in Backyard Fruits." It is number 400 J 20, prepared by New Mexico State University, and tells the different spray materials that have been tested in New Mexico.

Fed cattle prices have shown considerable improvement since the beginning of 1963. Prospects for further gains appear favorable.

Colleges and Foundations, such as National Science are encouraging the participation of students from smaller schools, as they realize that the students do not have the curriculum of the larger school. In fact they favor the students from the smaller schools.

As little as people give thought to the fact, a student's future advancements in this, however chaotic, world are greatly dependant upon the environment of their home, then teachers follow through during school years. But, did you ever stop to think that where you as parents, leave off the teachers continue molding the future leaders of these United States? Truer words were never spoken than these, "Kind words (praise or encouragement) will go a lot further than words of harshness and complaint."

Capitan schools have always been rated a very high B in New Mexico. Their teachers have their BA degrees thereby helping to keep the rating of the school to a high B. However, teacher's cannot do it all, Parents must do their part of encouraging the students to participate. To quote Mr. Duane Darling, superintendent of the Capitan Public Schools, "Every student who enters a contest, test, or any event testing his or her skills, is a winner to start with." Just as we, the people, make the county, district, state and national government what it is, YOUR school is what YOU as a student or parent make it.





## Propaganda at work!

We're living in the age of "noble experiment" which includes a lot of air-brained schemes that are experiments, but hardly noble.

Teenagers get in trouble, we get a new program. People don't want to work, a new program set up to teach a trade other than being a bum. Too much wheat, cotton, another program. People get sick, another program called for. Cost of living index rises at the same time the big boss is telling some industry to hold prices down.

Hardly any of the programs being tried, get at the basic cause of the trouble. They're main accomplishment — they spend money.

The promotion of these, and other, programs makes an interesting study in the fine art of propaganda. Such a situation centers on control of sale of guns right now. A few popularized shootings, by teenagers and adults, and right away the unrestricted sale of guns should be stopped. Little consideration is given to the delinquency and irresponsibility of people.

We argue the line with some harder nosed conservatives than we claim to be — that the more our country grows, the larger our cities grow, the more regulation is necessary, so that people may live peacefully together. This is true, though it may be objectionable to a lot of us. But, with more and more regulation comes more and more nonsense about how the regulations are applied.

Parents are the only ones who can control actions of youngsters — not the government, the police, church or school. Other irresponsible persons, those with convictions for crimes of violence, incompetents, drug addicts and drunkards should be controlled by society, but they are not to any great degree.

A lot of nonsense is being talked about gun control. It is a serious subject and should be dealt with in a serious manner — not by the means of propaganda intended to sway people away from their basic duties, that of regulating their own lives and the lives of their families.

## Plans are easier than action

It isn't especially big news, that a city planning group is soliciting Carrizozo for business — such as reappraisal of town needs, update former plan by expanding, detailing, and implementing some of the proposals of the former town plan of development. Under the planning assistance program of the Federal Housing Act, Carrizozo is entitled to "follow-on assistance" from the government. Total cost of consultant would be \$11,900, town's cost \$3,967.

We are not against planning and consider it even more important for a town than for a business — we are opposed only to spending money for something that past experience tells us will not be used.

The scope of service for updating of a comprehensive development for Carrizozo includes eleven sections, all or most all of them vital to town development. Section 2, for instance, "Based on information obtained an analysis shall be made of housing conditions and summarized in three categories: sound, deteriorating and dilapidated structures. General recommendations shall be made for improving housing and neighborhood conditions." Will such information be news to

the community — answer is, "No!" Will the community act on this information after it is tabulated — answer is, "No!" Until the town gets what might be called "Go ahead" leadership, planning money better be saved.

If the planners wanted to do a real service for the community they could best run an analysis of the number of people who want their town to thrive and are willing to spend money toward that end, and at the same time determine the number of people who think there is no hope for the town and don't want to spend any money, period.

Maybe the Woman's Club is fighting a losing battle, maybe historical precedent (several decades of no development) has made people pessimistic to the point of no return. Maybe our town does not have even the small handful of potential leaders willing to go ahead without fear of business loss, or criticism.

Right now conditions look bleak for any planning being carried out. The planners could settle the argument by running an analysis, which does not happen to be their main interest.



### 3,645 fathers leave it up to saps to pay for their women and kids

SANTA FE — Here is the main reason that Sen. Harold Runnels of Lovington, chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee, is determined to investigate the state welfare program: There are 7,300 families receiving monthly checks in the welfare department's aid to dependent children program; in the 7,300 families there are 4,500 known, living fathers; of the 4,500 known fathers only 855 are contributing anything to their families, all the 3,645 others leaving it up to the saps to pay for their women and kids.

### A NEW STATUTE FOR COURT ACTION

Runnels prepared for the investigation by successfully sponsoring a law in the 1965 legislature giving the welfare department the right to sue delinquent fathers for the support of their children.

Heretofore only the mothers could bring such suits and they were not inclined to do it as long as the welfare checks were coming in regularly.

The Runnels law will enable the welfare department to act through the district attorneys in bringing delinquent fathers to court.

### THE SENATOR IS OPTIMISTIC

Runnels prepared for the investigation by successfully but that is assuming a great deal.

It never has been the nature of the welfare department to bring new laws into court and this new law isn't likely to change that attitude.

And district attorneys don't like to prosecute voters. In New Mexico they have nearly a perfect record of not bothering child deserting fathers.

### NEAR CONFLICT WITH GOVERNOR

The Runnels committee has \$34,000 for the investigation of the welfare department and the highway program and to handle some minor business, but the committee isn't unified in what it wants to do.

The program to investigate administration agencies was adopted with misgivings and reservations in April and the May meeting scheduled for the 20th and 21st had to be canceled for lack of quorum when several of the governor's adherents on the committee found that they couldn't make it to Santa Fe on those dates.

They were Reps. Bobby Mayfield of Dona Ana, Larry Goodell of Roswell, Sens. Jim Patton of Las Cruces, Gordon Melody of Vegas.

### SENSITIVE SPOT FOR CAMPBELL

The Runnels plan to investigate the highway program probably touches a more sensitive spot on the governor than the welfare probe.

The highway program is under heavy fire from Albuquerque, and Gov. Jack Campbell is real touchy about the John Sudderth situation in which the chairman was put in as the \$15,000-a-year director of the department after the voters only last November had rejected an amendment that would have put Sudderth in as the salaried director of the department.

The governor probably has influence enough in the seven-member committee to avoid any serious embarrassment.

### PROPERTY TAXES IN SERIOUS LAG

The sorry state of the ad

valorem property tax in New Mexico was cited by Governor Campbell in an address to the Taxpayers Association last week. He listed the state income tax as up 25.4 percent, the permanent fund earnings up 18.3 percent, land office revenue up 14 percent, the sales tax up 12.2 percent, cigaret tax up 6.1, severance tax on oil, gas, mineral production up 5.7, mineral leasing revenue up 4.6 and the money from the property tax up only 1.5 percent.

### CONSTRUCTION BOOM NOT REFLECTED

It doesn't make sense that the revenue from the property tax would drag so seriously at a time when thousands of new homes are being built and extensive business construction is going up all over the state and should be added to the county tax rolls.

Unequal tax assessment in the counties has plagued New Mexico for decades and it wouldn't matter if the state did not participate in the tax money.

The state gets about \$6 million a year from property taxes that are supposed to be levied equally on all property but are not when Albuquerque assesses property at only 16 percent of its real value and some other places are as high as 35 %.

There is also an inequity when the state borrows money with general obligation bonds that are paid with a tax on property that is supposed to be even all over the state, but is not.

If the state gave up its cut of the property tax pie and got out of the general obligation bond borrowing practice the people of the counties could be left to tax themselves as they please without interfering with their neighbors.

### Deane Evans will manage pool

The Carrizozo Town Council has hired Mr. Duane Evans of Roswell, the new basketball coach for the Carrizozo Schools, to operate the Carrizozo swimming pool this summer, beginning June 5. The Recreation Commission hopes to offer swimming lessons this season and when Mr. Evans arrives, volunteers will be requested to help set up a swimming instruction program.

# PUBLIC NOTICE

Required by Law to Inform Citizens of matters affecting them or their property.

**ORDINANCE NO. 88**  
AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO A. E. HUGHGINS, HIS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE RIGHT AND PRIVILEGE TO USE THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, STATE OF NEW MEXICO, FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING, ORIGINATING, RELAYING, AMPLIFYING, AND DISTRIBUTING TELEVISION AND OTHER ELECTRONIC SIGNALS AND IMPULSES, AND PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION THEREOF AND PROVIDING FOR PAYMENT TO SAID TOWN. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

**SECTION 1:** There is hereby granted to A. E. Hughgins, his successors and assigns, the right, power, easement, authority and privilege to build, construct, equip, own, lease, rent, maintain and operate in the Town of Carrizozo, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, a system for the sale, lease, or rental and distribution of television and other electronic signals and impulses, including, but not limited to audio and video, reception, and/or origination, transmission, amplification and distribution, to build, construct, equip, own, maintain and operate coaxial cable, wires, lines, poles, towers, poles for amplifiers, cables, underground conduits, amplifiers, and all appurtenances necessary or desirable to accomplish such purposes; to use all streets, alleys, highways, bridges, other structures, and public grounds of said Town, now owned or hereafter acquired, for the purpose of this franchise ordinance, express or implied; to furnish the said services and any services related thereto or compatible therewith, to the people, firms and corporations situated either within or without the limits of the Town.

**SECTION 2:** Provided, however, that such poles, anchors, wire, brackets, lines, towers, conduits, amplifiers, and appurtenances shall, whenever practical, be placed, erected and constructed in the alleys, and shall be so placed and constructed as not to interfere with the use of the streets or alleys, water hydrants, or water mains. Any and all excavations shall be repaired and obstructions removed as quickly as it is reasonably possible under the circumstances. In the event the Grantee does not promptly repair any streets or sidewalks damaged by Grantee, the Town may make such repairs and charge the cost thereof to Grantee, which, upon written demand by the Town, shall be paid within ten days from the date of any such notice or demand. Further, the replacing, construction, and manner of erecting the poles and lines of Grantee, as well as fixtures and attachments thereto, shall be at all times, subject to the police power of the Board of Trustees of the Town.

Grantee guarantees the Town of Carrizozo and its citizens that the construction and maintenance of their proposed installations will in no way interfere with the audio - video reception of those people who now have and/or will hereinafter own and operate a television set within the Town limits which is not connected to Grantee's installations.

**SECTION 3:** Grantee shall save the Town harmless from all losses sustained by the Town on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever, resulting from the negligence of the Grantee or its agents or employees in the construction or maintenance of its system in the Town, or from a violation of any of the terms of this Agreement. The Town shall notify the Grantee within five days after the presentation of any claim or demand either by suit or otherwise made against the Town on account of any such negligence as aforesaid on part of the Grantee.

**SECTION 4:** Grantee, for and in consideration of the privileges herein granted, during the life of this franchise, shall pay to the Town two percent of the gross local base service revenue, not including taxes, derived by Grantee from all subscribers located within the Town limits, such payments payable quarterly, on or before sixty days after the first day of January, April, July, and October, covering said revenue for three months next preceding the above dates of each year. For the purpose of determining said revenue, the

books of said Grantee shall at all times be subject to inspection by duly authorized Town officials. Said payments shall be in lieu of any and all other franchise, license, privilege, pole, wire instrument, excise or revenue taxes and all other exactions upon the business, revenue, property, poles, wires, instruments, conduits, amplifiers, towers, fixtures or other appurtenances of Grantee and all other property or equipment of Grantee, or any part thereof, by said Town during the term of this franchise; provided, that anything to the contrary herein notwithstanding, said payment shall continue only so long as said company or Grantee is not prohibited from making the same by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises, and so long as the Town does not charge, levy, or collect, or attempt to charge, levy or collect other franchise, license, privilege, excise or revenue taxes or other exactions hereinafter mentioned, and if any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises hereafter prohibits said payment or the Town does levy, charge or collect, or attempt to levy, charge or collect such other franchise, license, privilege, excise or revenue taxes or other exactions or other exactions or charges, the obligation to make such payments hereinafter provided for shall forthwith cease.

**SECTION 5:** In further consideration of the franchise herein granted, Grantee shall furnish, install, maintain and keep in repair, without charge to the Town during the whole time of this franchise, so long as it is not prohibited from doing so by some other lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises, for the use of the Town officials and for monitoring the quality of service provided by Grantee, one service connection to be located at the Town Hall.

**SECTION 6:** Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of the streets, alleys and public ways of the Town which shall interfere with the poles, wires, or fixtures of Grantee, shall first give notice to Grantee, and shall pay to Grantee a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering and moving of the wires or other fixtures of Grantee, and before a permit is given by the Town therefor, the applicant shall present a receipt from Grantee showing said payments; thereupon, Grantee, upon presentation of said permit shall, within forty-eight hours thereafter, provide for and do such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys and public ways of the Town.

**SECTION 7:** This franchise shall be in force and effect for a period of twenty-five years from acceptance as provided herein, and shall thereupon terminate and all licenses and privileges shall thereupon cease, unless more than six months before expiration date and not more than one year prior to said expiration date, the Grantee shall tender to said Town, notice of its intention to renew this franchise, in which event the same shall be renewed for a term of five years, and in a like manner this franchise may be renewed for successive terms of five years, with a maximum of five such renewals.

**SECTION 8:** This franchise may be transferred only with the written consent of the Town; however, consent will not be unreasonably withheld.

**SECTION 9:** Failure on part of Grantee to comply with any of the provisions hereof shall automatically cancel and terminate this franchise, provided, however, that the Town shall give to Grantee written notice of any such default by registered mail at Grantee's last known address, and after the mailing of such notice to Grantee, Grantee shall have 30 days to correct any defaults pointed out by the Town and continue this privilege in full force and effect; otherwise, it shall be automatically terminated and be null and void.

**SECTION 10:** If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, the same shall not effect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 11:** Grantee shall, within ten days from the date of the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the Clerk of the Town of Carrizozo a written acceptance of this ordinance, and, at the same time, pay to the said Clerk a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of the publication of this ordinance, at which time this ordinance will be published as required by law.

**SECTION 12:** It is necessary for the preservation of the pub-

lic peace, health and safety that this Ordinance take effect immediately.

plants, such as forsythia, will bloom year after year unattended, but they will eventually become a tangled mass of canes. Forsythia are best pruned by cutting out the old branches at the base of the plant. Then, new, strong, healthy stems loaded with flower buds will replace them.  
Lilacs need a somewhat different treatment. Depending on the height you want to maintain it, all you have to do is to cut off the faded blooms before the seed pods develop. One way of pruning lilacs is to cut off branches in bloom for indoor arrangements. You can enjoy the blooms indoors and prune the plants at the same time. When lilacs become tall and lanky, the plants can be reshaped by cutting off the old, thick stems at the base of the plants. Remove only a few old canes each year. Plants may fail to bloom following severe pruning.  
Other plants that will benefit from pruning right after flowering are flowering quinces, dogwoods, mockoranges, spreas and flowering crabapples.

## FARM NEWS

**UNIVERSITY PARK** — Ann Landers, whose column appears in nearly 600 newspapers, will speak at the Homemakers College on the New Mexico State University Campus here June 11 at 7 p.m.

Her talk, "The Wettest Shoulder in the USA," is a special feature for women attending Homemakers College, but will be open to the public at a nominal charge, according to Miss Elsie Cunningham, supervisor with the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service and chairman of the Homemakers College committee.

Grounding barbed wire fences makes them safer from electrical storms and the wire lasts longer.  
Gay said ungrounded fence loses its galvanized coating much quicker than grounded fence.

Recommended grounding is twisted wire stays each 16 to 20 feet or midway between posts in most fence.  
If you are thinking of sending the family out to dig the dandelions in your yard, don't. Unless you dig out practically all the root, your work isn't worth the energy it takes. The dandelions will come right back.

One of the best weapons to fight dandelions and other broad-leaved weeds is a sprayer filled with 2-4-D recommended for lawn use.  
Apply the 2-4-D spray on a still day when the temperature is between 60° and 70° F. and when the weeds are actively growing. If the temperature goes as high as 80°, 2-4-D becomes extremely volatile and is likely to damage ornamentals.

"Use the spray according to the manufacturer's directions. Hold the sprayer close to the ground so there is little chance of the chemical drifting to flowers and nearby shrubs. A low-pressure sprayer will restrict the spray to the plants you wish to kill. Often more than one application is necessary for the more persistent broad-leaved weeds."

Chemical bars are effective in killing dandelions and other broad-leaved weeds, as are various weed-and-feed and granular 2-4-D products on the market. Avoid using a bar close to shrubs that are blooming, and don't use it when the temperature is 80° or higher.

Spring-flowering shrubs and trees will produce more blooms next season if you prune them immediately after the flowers fade. This allows the plants to send out more shoots that will produce more bloom.  
By waiting until later in the season to prune, you will be cutting off some of the flowering wood or branches.

Before doing any pruning, you should know exactly what you want to accomplish. Some of the main reasons for pruning are: to force side branches and flower buds to develop, to control the shape of the plants, to remove dead or diseased wood, and to repair damage caused by storms.

Horticulturists at New Mexico State University say that

Golden Delicious apples were sprayed with Sevin and N. A. A. in the Pflugstein Orchard to see which chemical did the best job of thinning apples.  
The freeze of May 9 got down to 25° to 27° in the Hondo area and caused freeze damage in some orchards. I still expect a good crop in 80% of the apple orchards in this area.  
Lucho Zamora used pollen inserts in the bee hives at bloom time. He also had hand-pollinated some trees on blossoms on every 1/4th set of blooms was pollinated. Fruit set on these trees looked good whereas the trees beside them had less than 25% as much fruit.

Caves, mine tunnels and wood culverts are among the best fallout shelters available in this area. The ordinary frame house provides very little protection and the adobe house provides fair protection. These facts were brought out at the workshop on rural fallout shelters that I attended last week in Roswell.

This nationwide observance places emphasis on man's obligation to God as stewards of soil, water, and other related resources.




