School building underway at Corona & Zozo

The low bid on the high school and elementary school construction job at Corona was made by Ballard and Sons of Carlsbad, the figure was \$284,500.00. This bid was accepted by the Corona school board according to Supt. Bill Hall.

Second low bid was made by Smith & Lowe of Albuquerque, \$287,740; third low by John Cornell of Clovis, \$299,700. The highest bid was \$387,721.

Construction time allowed is 210 days, with completion expected around the middle of March next year. Construction will be of brick and cinder block. The bid opening was Monday in Corona.

Suspect held in attack at La Luz

ALAMOGORDO.—The Otero county sheriff's office was holding one man Tuesday and said investigation still is underway after a La Luz woman reported she was attacked in her home early this morning.

Chief Deputy Terrel Herndon said no charges had been filed this morning but disclosed he had a conference slated this afternoon with Asst. Dist. Atty. Don Hancock to determine what charges or further arrests might follow.

The veteran lawman said about 12:15 a.m. he had been in bed only minutes when he heard a shot. As he lay there trying to determine the direction of the gunfire, a woman's

screams and three more shots could be distinguished, he explained.

Herndon said he had gotten up and was backing from the driveway of his La Luz home when his wife called to him and said Barbara Branum had telephoned and said the noise was at her house.

Arriving at the Branum house less than a minute later, the deputy said he found the door knocked completely down and the house empty, he continued.

Miss Branum allegedly was at home alone when two men broke her door down. She reportedly fired into the air in an attempt to frighten the intruders away; they fled, but re-

turned minutes later to attack her and attempt to take away her pistol.

Friends with whom she spent the balance of the morning said she received a split lip, a bloody nose, and multiple bruises and abrasions in the scuffle.

After the gun was discharged several times during the affray the attackers allegedly fled, allowing their victim to run next door and call the law.

Herndon said he arrested one man whom bystanders had indicated was involved. The suspect was crouched behind a car at the rear of a neighbor's house, he disclosed.

Identity of the suspect was not disclosed.

Frank M. Standhart, architect, of Roswell met with the Carrizozo school board last week to complete plans for an addition that will be built on the west end of the gymnasium. This school improvement has been made possible by a gift from the A. N. Spencer family.

The improvement will mainly be the addition of a stage with a 34 foot proscenium (stage opening) 16 ft. high. On the north side of the stage will be a 10x28 foot training room. On the south side will be a storage room of the same size.

The stage will also be designed for use by physical education classes. The space under the proscenium will be used for chair storage and the remaining space under the stage will be used as maintenance shop.

The construction of the new addition will match the existing buildings.

Bids are being taken and will be opened September 9 at 2:00 p. m. at the school. Bids are also being taken on a curtain track for the stage and the stage lighting. An alternate plan may allow some remodeling of the gymnasium.

Airport zoning board designated

The Town Board of Trustees has completed arrangements for airport construction and the final zoning ordinance is being drafted. The Board of Trustees is to be designated as the Administrative Agency or Officer and a Zoning Board of Appeals consisting of five members will be appointed and will exercise the following powers:

1) To hear and decide appeals from any order, requirements, decision, or determination made by the Administrative Agency or Officer in enforcement of this Ordinance.

Three die in crash as plane shoots for landing on Ruidoso city airport

Last Friday morning at 9:50 a.m. an airplane coming in for landing at the Ruidoso municipal airport was notified by the tower when about 40 feet in the air that their landing gear was still up. The landing gear came down but immediately went back up and the plane tried to take off again. It backed off to the right and crashed head on into a large cedar tree about one-half mile northwest of the runway.

The pilot, Harvey Thurmond

Furry of Victoria, Texas, Robert Lee Fridell and his wife, Frances Fridell, also of Victoria, were killed in the crash. The pilot's wife, Carolyn Sue Furry, was taken to the Ruidoso hospital in a critical condition and was later transferred to Roswell where she is said to be improving.

The three bodies were taken to Victoria. The FAA requested an autopsy on the pilot but this report has not yet been released.

RICKERSON AND LOVATO REPORT FOR NAVY DUTY

SAN DIEGO, CALIF. — reported July 19 to the Recruit Training Command, U. S. Naval Training Center San Diego, Cal., for nine weeks of basic training.

Anderson taps Lusk and Kelly

SANTA FE — Sen. Clint Anderson of Albuquerque has suggested that if he runs for reelection that it would be appropriate for the Democrats to pick a candidate for governor from eastern New Mexico, such as Gene Lusk of Carlsbad or John Kelly of Roswell.

He did not mention former Gov. John Burroughs of Portales, an eastsider who has been probing his prospects for the nomination.

Since it appears highly likely that Anderson will go for a fourth term his remarks were extremely encouraging to Lusk and Kelly. It is conceded all around that Anderson will have a major voice in picking the party candidate for governor.

HEALTH CHECK-UP IN SEPTEMBER

Anderson, who was first elected to the Senate in 1948, is fairly certain to go for another six-year term if his health permits. He will enter Lovelace Clinic in Albuquerque Sept. 9 for an examination that is expected to answer his health questions.

He said some time ago that he would reveal his election plans on his 70th birthday, Oct. 23, but may have trouble holding back the news that long. Democrats will be pressing him for information from the moment he gets out of the clinic.

NAMES CAMPBELL FOR HOUSE SEAT

The senior senator said in a Washington interview that if he did not run he assumed that Rep. Tom Morris of Tucuman would try for his place and that Gov. Jack Campbell of Roswell would run for the Morris place in this House.

In that event, Anderson said, it would be appropriate for the party to pick a northsider for governor such as Speaker Bruce King of Santa Fe or City Coun-

The Anderson interview produced more information on the senator's opinions than anything that has come out this year, and it didn't set well with many Democrats.

While many in the party are resigned to letting the senior senator pick the next governor they have not surrendered to him the right to say who takes his place in the Senate and who gets the Tom Morris place in the House.

The statement was an affront to friends of Lt. Gov. Mack Easley, a popular prospect for either the U. S. House or Senate if an opening develops. The statement didn't mention Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe, or State Rep. Bobby Mayfield of Las Cruces, both outspokenly interested in getting on the ticket.

It was a blow to Bruce King who was mentioned as a desirable candidate only in the event of Anderson's retirement.


The district comprises 44 churches, including those in this area and community, with a combined membership of nearly 3,000 persons and a total Sunday school enrollment of over 5,000 persons.





Capt. Emilio B. Zamora (right), son of Mr. and Mrs. Christobal Zamora, Lincoln, N. M., receives the Distinguished Flying Cross from Maj. Gen. John J. Tolson, commanding general of the Army Aviation Center, during ceremonies at Fort Rucker, Ala., July 30. Captain Zamora received the award for extraordinary achievement in an aerial rescue in the Republic of Vietnam, March 9, 1964.

Captain Zamora was piloting a helicopter when another helicopter crashed and exploded in a river. Skillfully utilizing the rotor downwash from his aircraft, he directed the thirty-foot flames away from the crash site. He spotted a survivor in the water, lowered his helicop-

ter even with the water line to rescue the man. After completing the rescue, he repeated his courageous act when he spotted a second man. Captain Zamora then evacuated the injured men and administered first aid enroute to home base.

The 33-year-old officer, who entered the Army in January 1956, is currently stationed at Fort Rucker with Headquarters and Service Company of the U. S. Army Aviation Center's Troop Brigade. A member of Alpha Gamma Rho, fraternity, he was graduated from Captain Union High School in 1951 and received a B. S. degree in 1955 from New Mexico State University in College Park. His wife, Lupe, is with him at the fort.

GENE LUSK PUSHES FOR NOMINATION

SANTA FE — Former State Sen. Gene Lusk of Carlsbad has been meeting here regularly with Gov. Jack Campbell in a quiet effort to line up support for the Demo nomination for governor.

The Carlsbad lawyer, son of former state School Superintendent and Congresswoman Georgia Lusk, has been in Washington at least twice to talk with Sen. Clint Anderson about the 1966 nomination and has met with several local leaders without any publicity or comment.

Lusk has declined invitations by political groups to join other prospective candidates at Albuquerque meetings and did not appear at large state conventions this year which attracted other candidates.

He's apparently trying to line up sufficient support for the nomination without revealing his candidacy, a course that would permit him to withdraw if he falls without having it appear that he was a loser.

TROUBLE SHOOTER FOR THE GOVERNOR

Lusk has been a legislative trouble shooter for Gov. Jack Campbell since he took office in 1961 and apparently has the governor's backing for the nomination.

He is also supported by Atty. Gen. Boston Witt, his cousin. He is not supported by U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya and that alone might be enough to wash him out.

Lusk tried to defeat Montoya for renomination for the U. S. House in 1960, running with the backing of Sen. Dennis Chavez, but failed 41,309 to 70,577.

If he should get in for two terms as governor he would be going out of office and looking for a job in 1970, the date when Montoya comes up for re-election.

MONTOYA REJECTS PLEAS FOR LUSK

Montoya has had a lot of urging to accept Lusk, even from his brother Tom O. Montoya and his recent campaign manager, former Atty. Gen. Fred Standley, but he hasn't moved.

The junior senator has been suggesting former legislator and former Demo State Chairman Calvin Horn of Albuquerque for the nomination. Horn would like to have it but so far it appears that Montoya is the only major Democrat pushing him for governor.

As much as Lusk might believe at this time that he would not run against Montoya in 1970 there is no way to make an absolute, binding agreement to that effect.

CLINT AND GENE HAD SOME TROUBLE

Senator Anderson had trouble with Lusk when he was state senate majority leader over insurance legislation but would probably accept him for the nomination if other party leaders wanted him.

It seems fairly certain that Anderson would not back Lusk over Montoya's opposition.

Meanwhile the Democrats are in the peculiar position of having many candidates for the nomination for governor but none with a large enthusiastic following.

TOM BOLACK STAYING OUT

Without a popular choice for governor the Democrats would seem to be in trouble but that isn't true this time.

The Republicans are so beat

up and scattered from last year's elections that it appears that the Democrats could elect anybody they nominate, popular or not.


Republicans have two possibilities of offering a strong challenge but both are remote. One, of course, is former lieutenant governor and governor, Tom Bolack of Farmington. He's very popular, a good campaigner and a spender but he appears to be dead set against any more political campaigns.

DR. JACK REDMAN STRONG CAMPAIGNER

The other possibility is Dr. Jack Redman of Albuquerque who ran ahead of the old champ Ed Mechem, in the 1962 and '64 races and has demonstrated great pulling power in Albuquerque.

He, however, is not popular with the Republican leadership and would have trouble getting the nomination for governor or the financial support he would need from the party for a proper campaign.

Wilkinson and Durrett Attorneys at Law Post Office Drawer Y Alamogordo, New Mexico. Garland, Martin and Martin Attorneys at Law Post Office Box 296 Las Cruces, New Mexico. Re: Spencer v. Crenshaw - Lincoln County. Gentlemen:

I have considered everything presented in the above matter. My impression of the evidence and in light of the authorities presented, is that the use of the road in question by Defendants was generally permissive; the evidence pertaining to the location of the road between White Oaks and Capitan, either before or after 1912 was not clear and convincing.

I do not believe the present rules of pleading require specific allegation of "irreparable loss or damage".

Although, it is argued that the equities should be weighed, and the hardship to the Defendants considered, I do not feel justified in denying relief to the Plaintiff which would grant the relief requested by Defendants. It may be Plaintiff's co-owners will apply some equities later on.

I am not inclined to award any damages or relief under the Plaintiff's First Cause of Action. Relief, as requested in the prayer of Plaintiff's Second Cause of Action is granted. Relief on Defendants' Counter-claims is denied.

If Requested Findings and Conclusions are desired, please submit the same by August 20th. If not, Mr. Durrett would prepare a proper decree, submit it to the other counsel and then myself.




