## Valley of Fire Park to be complete Jan. 1

Jim Dillard assistant director of the State Park & Recreation Commission, and Carlos Tipps, area supervisor for the Commission, spent Tuesday in Carrizozo meeting with the county commissioners, going over a proposed road with Leroy McKnight, road foreman for the county, and getting everything set for reconstruction at the park site three and a half miles west of Carrizozo on Highway

380. Mr. Dillard outlined what help he thought would be needed from the county, mainly use of a grader in construction of approximately 1 1/2 miles of road plus a front loader and 20 or more loads of fill gravel. County Commissioners Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bobo Shafer indicated they would help in every way possible. The State Park and Recreation Commission has purchased 462.50 acres of land from the Federal government for the park. About 160 acres are on the north side of Highway 380 and were purchased for a buffer zone, to protect the park from possible undesirable installations of any kind setting up in the park area.

The balance of the land is an island in the Mal Pais with a high knoll which give excellent view of all the surrounding country.

There will be 20 picnic shelter, each with heaven-foot table and charcoal broiler. In addition there will be a group shelter which could house as many as 100 people. Mr. Dillard said they plan to install a water system, also to have electricity at the park in time. There will be six pit-type sanitary units, fully camouflaged.

Future plans include a botanical garden which the Park and Recreation Commission has found to be very popular with tourists.

A large playground will be installed immediately, the equipment is on order now. Purchase orders have been issued for much of the other equipment necessary to complete the park.

Dillard stated that construction would begin immediately, and that completion was expected around January 1, 1965.

The Valley of Fire State Park is the culmination of many years of effort on the part of the Carrizozo Womens Club, a continuing effort on the part of Rep. W. G. Shreevogost of Lincoln, a great deal of help from Director Jim Dillard, and the entire Park and Recreation Commission with John Elliott at Director, has been of assistance in getting the park under way.

### Supreme Court frees

### Harrison of contempt

The New Mexico Supreme Court reversed today the contempt conviction of political columnist Will Harrison of Santa Fe.

In a unanimous decision, the five justices said they could find no proof of "a clear and present danger" to the administration of justice arising from a number of columns written by Harrison. Harrison was found guilty of criminal contempt of court March 27, 1964, by Dist. Court Judge Paul Tackett, Albuquerque.

Harrison was sentenced to 10 days in jail, fined \$250 with the fine suspended, and assessed \$250 court costs.

The contempt conviction resulted from articles written by Harrison concerning the C. N. (Bill) Morris court case. Morris former assistant district attorney in Carlsbad, was involved in a traffic accident June 22, 1963, in which five members of a farm worker's family were killed in the Artesia area.

With the defeat of the indigent hospital levy by voters of Lincoln County, the commissioners have a real knotty problem which they will solve in due time, but right now it seems mighty confusing.

There are two county hospitals in Lincoln County. According to recent legislation they have to care for indigent patients — at the expense of the county, so the law says. The county has not budgeted any money for such purpose, and presumably the hospitals will have to sue the county to collect funds for indigent care.

The county has one district attorney who represents both the hospitals and the county commissioners rather than having Don Hancock sue himself, it has been suggested that the commissioners choose up sides, one side representing the hospitals, the other side representing the county — and sue each other.

J. T. Clegg, administrator at the Carrizozo hospital met with the commissioners Tuesday. Trust Ball of the Ruidoso hospital is expected to get with Clegg and see what can be worked out.



"A page for independent thought"

## Don't follow Will all the way

No doubt but that New Mexico voters kicked some legislation in the teeth Tuesday of last week. The News political columnist, Will Harrison, says the long abused sap citizen finally boiled over and swamped amendments for benefit of legislators.

The swamping did take place. We don't agree with Will's further thinking that individual voters were taking a swipe at any particular legislator or even that many voters remember that the senate defeated a bill that would have repealed the

pre-primary convention law just a few months after people had voted 3 to 1 for its repeal.

We're inclined to doubt that voters remember so much. The losing amendments were simply pieces of legislation that a majority of people did not want — they voted "No", and it's as simple as that in our way of thought.

The recent vote certainly does not compliment the thinking of the legislative bodies. They should strive for a higher batting average — which means strive to be more responsive to the people they represent.

## Of extreme political parties

Extremists have a place in the workings of this country. Where individual freedom is extended to all as our constitution intended, it is only normal that some people do nothing with their freedom while others want to carry their freedom to an extreme end — and do.

Someone has to alert the sluggards and extremists, such as the Birch Society, do just that. Their part in government is a necessary function.

At the same time we accept societies with extremist leanings we can see where they have no place in political parties.

The GOP is now trying to rid the party of Birch influence — well and good, they should.

A basic aim of a political party is to elect candidates. Saying our world for posterity is not the primary aim of a political party.

Democrats have too much union influence (LBJ's fight to eliminate 14-B is sample). Republicans went through one campaign with a degree of Birch acceptance.

Let the extremists extreme all they like, and unions organize all they like, but neither one does much for a political party.



The editorial column of Wally Olds' Red Lodge, Montana, newspaper has a w/f letter "a" along with this comment on C of C activities in Red Lodge — "The lack-of-funds situation can only be improved with a broader base, that is, with more members, or higher dues. ## T. A. Spencer wins bankers award

Truman A. Spencer Jr. received the N. M. State Bankers Association award given by the Lincoln County Branch of the Citizens State Bank at the annual banquet in the Four Winds last Wednesday.

Spencer was born and raised on the ranch he now operates and has seen a lot of good years, and a few tough ones. The ranch includes 42,000 acres. In 1949 there were 1,000 mother cows on this ranch, which figures out 42 acres per cow unit. Spencer decided that if he cut the herd down to 60 acres per cow unit he wouldn't have to supplement feeding so much, and he did just that when he took over operation of the spread.

The 1964 year was a dry one but the Bar W range had enough reserve of grass to carry through. Many ranchers were selling down their herds last year, Spencer said he didn't sell a head, and fed about 15 tons of supplement feed all last year.

One of the blessings of the Bar W ranch is being overflow country along the Mal Pals. Both the White Oaks and Nogal draws overflow Bar W meadows to make some hay every year. This year Spencer expects to cut some 25,000 bales and keep most of this hay for his own livestock.

He has been carrying out conservation projects each year he has managed the ranch. One of his biggest projects was completed last year. This included laying a pipeline from way up on Carrizo Mountain where a spring produces 10 gallons of water a minute. The pipeline runs seven miles down on the flat country and feeds three storage tanks and five water troughs. A pipe line from the spring was installed in 1920 but did not extend the distance it does now.

Plastic pipe was installed using home-made pipe layer developed by Randall Greer, Howard Harkey and Spencer. The pipe went 42 inches under ground and never freezes. In one stretch of pipe laying they pre-ripped 5,000 feet, came back and laid the pipe in two hours flat.

This extensive water job was done as a range management project — intended to keep livestock scattered so they won't feed in one place too long. In addition to the pipe line, nine big 4M to 5M cubic yard pit tanks have been constructed to store runoff and the Bar W has had water most every year. Lots of diversion dams and gully controls have been installed starting under the old Triple A, helping to control water from the two draws that overflow the ranch. Water from Harkey Canyon was diverted into an old lake bed and it stays full year around.

In 1949 there were no windmills on the Bar W, just tanks to catch runoff. Spencer started drilling for water & now has five pumping mills (plus numerous dry holes) which help with range management.

Right now he is looking for a rotary mower that will handle the vine mesquite commonly called wire grass, on his ranch. Cattle look for this grass in the bales. By not over grazing he figures to get natural reseeding and has lots of blue gramma, black gramma, alkali sacaton (salt grass), and quite a bit of coarse sacaton which, grows tall, up to five feet and real rank.

Bar W cattle make good use of the Mal Pals country. Spencer has one island in the Mal Pals. He says the black rock country is gradually covering up with good vegetation and his cattle range out in the Mal Pals a quarter mile or more.

According to Spencer the temperature break in this area is at Ancho. It will be considerably warmer this side of Ancho than on the north side.

You've got to keep production costs below your income, and it's most important for a rancher to keep his credit good, says Spencer. Right now two men, Truman and Preacher Dobbs are taking care of the 600 cows and 42,000 acres. Dobbs has been with the ranch since 1933.

The average ranch size in New Mexico is 15,000 acres. If such an acreage is operated as a family unit, no one drawing any salary, they ought to make 1.5% on their investment. If any salaries were paid the ranch owner would end up in the hole.

Ranching is a way of life and a challenge for Truman Spencer. The challenge comes in making the ranch pay off, and provides a living for the family and education for the children. Ranchers are in competition with sheep, chickens, hogs, and they better have a first class product — to meet this competition they need to keep their outfit in shape, ready for dry years when they come and ready to market cattle in the good years.

The normal thing is to sell calves off the Bar W, Spencer held over his calves last year and will sell as yearlings this year — he's been offered 24c three different times and is going to sell to the first man that comes down the road offering 25c a pound. Got to get that price or go in the hole. Market is looking up a little and he figures to get his price.

In his comments after receiving the Banker's Award from Johnson Stearns of the Citizens State Bank, Spencer said, "I haven't done a lot more than anyone else, just what any ranch manager would do. I've

enjoyed working with soil conservation people — I believe in it."

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

Carrizozo's Grizzlies trounced Corona in a District 2-C contest Friday night at Carrizozo, 46-7, as quarterback Dusty Voss scored one touchdown and passed for two others.

The Grizzlies began to romp with only 2:40 gone in the first quarter when Tommy Ortiz smashed five yards off tackle and Voss' fan the extra point for a 7-0 lead.


