## 941 names purged from registration books

## Gene Mann heads '65 seal campaign

Dr. A. Eugene Mann, Director of Public Relations and Professor of Journalism at Eastern New Mexico University, will head the 1965 Christmas Seal Campaign in New Mexico. His appointment has been announced by W. Ted Parnell of Hobbs, President of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Mann is a long time participant in the activities of TB Associations in New Mexico. He is a former Board member and a past vice-president of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association and also a past president of the Roosevelt County Tuberculosis Association. At present, Dr. Mann is Chairman of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Hospital Board, a position to which he was appointed by the Governor of New Mexico.

"We are looking forward to a record campaign in 1965," says Dr. Mann. "We have started organizing our volunteer workers and are, at the moment, planning our next few weeks' work. # Demo leaders far apart on governor candidate

SANTA FE — Sen. Clint Anderson has made it known that he will run for re-election next year but Democratic leaders are as far apart as ever on the one they will run for governor.

After all the hand-shaking and promising among Demo leaders that they would stand together on one candidate for governor the situation is like this —

Senator Anderson is against John Burroughs, Portales, and would like to support Gene Lusk, Carlsbad, or Bruce King, Santa Fe.

Sen. Joe Montoya is against Lusk and is supporting Burroughs.

Gov. Jack Campbell is against Burroughs and King and is supporting Lusk.

## CRUCES AFFAIR AIDS BURROUGHS

The Anderson birthday party at Las Cruces last week at which he revealed that he would run again was expected to produce a decision on the one he would back for governor but it brought out nothing in the way of a decision or a compromise and seemed to advance the candidacy of former governor (1953-60) Burroughs.

Burroughs is seriously opposed at the top of the party but seems to have more support among little politicians than any of the others.

Roy Walker of Clovis, a fourth candidate, continued on the outside looking in.

## LEADERS HOPING FOR A MIRACLE

The anti-Burroughs people seem to have despaired of getting Burroughs out of the race and are now talking about inducting King or Lusk out of the race and backing the remaining candidate against Burroughs.

They figure they can't beat Burroughs in a three-man race and might have their hands full in a two-way contest.

What they would like best of all would be the miraculous appearance of a new candidate that Anderson, Montoya and Campbell could all support.

They tried Congressman Tom Morris of Tucuman who wouldn't take it, and Calvin Horn of Albuquerque, former state party chairman and legislator, but couldn't sell him to the workers in the party.

## BRASHER WILLING TO BE GOVERNOR

The latest to offer himself to the \$2,500 a year sacrifice as governor is Jerry Brasher of Albuquerque, a professional economist, whatever that is.

He is also Bernalillo county Demo chairman, executive aide to Governor Campbell and a former legislator. Brasher did not announce as a candidate but said he was interested.

Brasher as a candidate could serve the interests of the governor's friend, Gene Lusk, in the party convention next February, or, being the Albuquerque chairman he could develop into a serious candidate.

(That \$2,500 for the governor is broken down like this: \$17,500 salary, \$30,000 contingent money that he can spend or keep as he prefers, and the same for \$15,000 for the governor's residence.)

## CHAVEZ POSS DISAPPEARING

Albuquerque City Judge Jim Maloney and Albuquerque lawyer Tim Kelsner who talked a few days ago about running against Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe for Demo nomination for lieutenant governor have ruled themselves out as candidates.

Currently Reginaldo Espinoza, Jr. of Rio Arriba, secretary of the state tax commission, son of a prominent Republican and state chairman of the Young Democrats, is talking about running against Chavez, and some people in the Burroughs-for-governor movement are spreading word that Calvin Horn of Albuquerque is a prospective candidate.

So far Fabian appears safe.

## TWO DEER KILLERS LEAVE STATE JOBS

Two employees of the Roswell highway district, Ira Ridgely, \$500 a month, and Jesse Dugger, Jr., an hourly employee, have resigned from the highway department as the result of an investigation of their conviction last summer for spotlighting and killing deer from a highway department pickup truck.

Assistant District Highway Engineer R. R. McCordle started an investigation of the June deer killing incident after it was revealed in the press in October.





The essence is . . . time!

Practically everything about a small town is governed by time, the amount of time people have to devote to things other than the operation of their business.

It takes time to do council work, Chamber of Commerce work, school board chores, club activities, church work — and the person in the small town who can leave his business at the ring of a phone is the exception.

The News publisher takes off on calls around town many times a year. This week we were in practically every business place in town — everyone was working. Unpacking Christmas things, sorting checks, doing book work, fixing cars, restocking shelves, tending to customers, or any of the other thousand jobs that go with running a family or three-four-person business.

Necessary paper work is fierce and not getting any bet-

ter. Percentage profit for the small town merchant declines gradually. Keeping up with retailing as practiced by competitors in larger towns does not get easier.

As a result of this situation not very many people are available for civic work. You can hear it said frequently, "It takes a busy man to get the job done". True enough, the busy man knows he does not have much time to spare and must get back at his work. If his personal word is worth anything he will try to meet his obligations — but fast.

There is no special news in caution . . . when we select and elect people for various jobs around town it becomes necessary to find people with time, people who consider civic work as something more than the prestige of holding office.

The essence is certainly "time" in operation of a small town.


