

On May 25, 1935, in Delhart, N.M., he was married to Rosalind Burke who survives.



By scoring two TDs in the space of one minute in the second quarter the Roy Longhorns gained a 18-0 half time lead, and went on to down a stubborn Capitan team 30-7 in the class C state championship game at Roy Friday afternoon.

The hard fought contest was played in almost ideal football weather, under clear skies, with brisk temperatures, and a steady southerly wind which at times must have clocked 15-18 mph.

The game for the small schools championship drew a big crowd to the northeastern New Mexico school's gridiron, and the fans saw a game featured by hard blocking, long aerials, thrilling runs, and tough goal line stands.

Roy's running game didn't crack the vaunted defense of the Tigers to any great extent, but the ability of Longhorn receivers to get behind their pass defense, plus the pin-point passing of Longhorn quarterback Pat Romero, spelled the difference.

The underdog Roy defense turned in a bone-cracking job of stopping Capitan's Joe Escobedo and Billy LaMay, using its weight advantage to put the pressure on all the way.

Capitan concentrated on stopping the running of the Longhorns' top scorer, Kenny Shaw. But Shaw played decoy much of the time, helping to set up pass patterns in which Romero threw the long bomb to Anthony Ebell, and the jump passes to Frankie Surls, the 205 pound six-three end.

Although the Tigers kept trying all the game it was not until the final minutes that LaMay was able to get moving, scoring on a sparkling 35 yard scamper around right end to score with about 90 seconds left to play.

Penalties twice stopped definite Capitan scoring threats and although the Tigers lost the ball on fumbles twice, as did the Longhorns, the Lincoln County team was hurt more when the ball changed hands.

Escobedo, William Herrera, LaMay, Isidro Peralta and Ray Sanchez did the ball carrying for Capitan. Lynn McDonald,

who along with Peralta covered a fumble for Capitan, David Martinez, David Barber, LaMay and Escobedo all turned in good defensive efforts. It was, however, the leaky Tigers' pass defense which cost them the game.

It was much tighter than the score might indicate, and if LaMay's receivers could have held on to the ball better the final tally might have been one with a mere touch down being the difference.

The one play which salted the game away for the Longhorns came in the opening minutes of the final period.

Capitan was in possession as the quarter got underway with the ball on Roy's 32 yard line.

An incomplete jump pass and a line play by Sanchez, stopped for no gain, brought a fourth and four situation.

Chris Najjar Tiger quarterback punted and Romero taking the ball on the Longhorn's 30, made for the sideline, picked up some good downfield blocks and outran the Tigers' secondary into the end zone for 70 yards for a TD. There were about two minutes and some seconds left in the game after Peralta blocked a kick by Kenny Shaw in the conversion attempt.

Roy received the opening kickoff and held on to the ball to march from their own 37 to the Capitan 26 before losing the ball on failure to make a needed first down.

A penalty marred the first play of the game for Capitan and the Tigers were only able to get to their own 32 before having to punt out.

Neither team was able to sustain a drive during the remainder of the first quarter until in the final seconds Peralta fumbled a had off, and pursued by Shaw chased the ball backward to the 23. A punt by Najjar was taken by Roy's Romero and run from the Tigers' 40 to the 5 yard line before LaMay tackled him from behind.

The best defensive effort by Capitan in the game came as the second quarter opened for Roy, with a first down on the five yard line, used four downs to move to the one, where the Tigers took possession.

But after getting out to their 25, and picking up two first downs enroute, the Tigers, slowed by a fumble were forced to punt.

This time after a 15 yard punt return by Romero, on the first play from scrimmage the Roy quarterback hit halfback Ebell with a pass, good for 45 yards and the touchdown, with about two minutes gone in the quarter. Romero's kick was wide and Roy was on top 6-0.

Again Capitan picked up a

couple of first downs, but was hampered by a 15 yard penalty for illegal use of the hands, being forced to punt out.

With the ball downed on the Capitan 40 Roy moved to the 18 with Shaw and Danny Filkins carrying, plus a 25 yard pass from Romero to Surls.

Another pass from quarterback to Shaw put the ball on the Tigers' 13. Here Romero found Ebell on the left side of the field, and hit him with a pass as he ran into the end zone. The try for PAT failed as the wind drifted the ball wide.

There was about one minute and 30 seconds left to play as Roy kicked off, and Peralta ran the ball back to Capitan's 25 before being nailed by Surls.

Capitan's first play went away as a handoff by Ronnie Chambers was fumbled and recovered for Roy by Weldon Beard on the Tigers' 30.

Seconds remained in the half as Romero found the towering Surls in the Tigers' secondary with a jump pass, and the end rambled across the goal line to score. Again the kick for PAT went wide, and Capitan had time for one play after running back the kick off.

Capitan received to open play in the second half. Picking up two first downs on the running of Ray Sanchez and William Herrera the Tigers moved the ball to the Longhorn's 19 before the threat fizzled. First a five yard penalty, and then a 15 yarder for clipping took the steam out of what had been a scoring drive.

Another Roy touchdown came in the next series of plays when Ebell caught a Romero pass good for 70 yards to pay dirt. Roy seemed destined to score the six pointers, and not the ones, as the Capitan defense smacked down still another PAT kick.

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No further scoring came in the third quarter although first Roy, and then Capitan exchanged fumbles.

With but seconds gone in the final period Capitan found itself stalled on the 32 yard line in Tiger territory and Najjar lofted a long punt downfield.

Grabbing the ball on the Longhorn's 32 Romero found some blocking, and headed along the sidelines all the way for, it turned out, the final Roy score. Herrera blocked the PAT kick for Capitan.

Passes from LaMay to Peralta, including one beauty of 33 yards, moved the ball down to the Roy 36. Here Escobedo was in the clear near the 15 when he dropped a pass. Preston Stone took a LaMay pass to the 5 of Roy, but a 15 yard clipping penalty squelched the scoring threat.

With time running out it looked as though Capitan would not crack the scoring column, and this especially after an errant LaMay pass was grabbed by Shaw on the Roy 14.

But the Longhorns found themselves stalled with two five yard penalties in a row which moved the ball to the four yard line. After a jump pass moved the ball out a bit a Shaw punt moved only 20 yards and Capitan took over on Roy's 30.

After almost a full game of frustration it took but one run by LaMay to reach pay dirt. The gritty quarterback took the ball on the 35, skirted right end, got a couple of blocks to spring him loose, and sprinted to pay dirt. With one minute remaining Sanchez ran the PAT to make the score 30-7 for the Longhorns.

Time ran out with Roy in possession on the Longhorn's 30 yard line.

After the game trophies for the first and second place teams in New Mexico Class C football were given to the players by Roy's Superintendent of Schools.

An estimated 200 people came the long distance from Capitan to Roy for the game, including the band, drill team, cheer leaders and parents.

During the half time the Tigers' drill team and marching band gave a demonstration of precision marching and formations.

Contacted after the excitement died down, Coach Melvin Romero while expressing disappointment over the outcome, said he thought the game was a good one, and that his Tigers had done their best.


Legion announces "Color Program"

Pleasure driving is leisure favorite

Pleasure driving, according to the Outdoor Recreation Resources Review, is the favorite outdoor leisure activity of American families. Of course, Americans also use the outdoors for hunting, fishing, skiing, swimming, hiking, picnicking, and other recreational activities. But just enjoying the beauties of the countryside tops the list.

However, the natural beauty of rural America, now enjoyed so much, is being threatened and action is needed to nullify this threat, according to Einar L. Roget, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Albuquerque.

Eliminating roadside eyesores and blending farmsteads with the natural setting by use of appropriate plants, trees and shrubs is one contribution agriculturists can, and are, making to improve our countryside landscape. The SCS has always offered assistance with conservation practices which added to the natural beauty and landscaping values along primary and secondary roads, Roget said.

Now at the request of President Johnson and Secretary of Agriculture Freeman, the SCS has been asked to stress this activity. As in the past, the SCS will bring this program to the local people only after review and approval of locally governed soil and water conservation districts. Cooperators with soil and water conservation districts, who participate in the agriculture conservation aspects of the program, will be further encouraged to include roadside improvements in the conservation farm plans.

The State Conservationists noted that President Johnson, at the White House Conference on Natural Beauty last May, emphasized the importance of natural beauty as a national goal.

The President said: "Today, I worked and thought about problems in Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic. I had to consider decisions which might affect the security of this country, the lives of Americans, and the destiny of other nations. Yet actions I take to beautify America may be the most important thing that I am doing today - For this is part of what all the rest is for."

A salesman, driving on the highway near Capitan, averted to avoid on obstruction in the middle of the road. The obstruction proved to be two baby kittens huddled together for warmth and companionship.
The salesman assumed, correctly, I think, that someone lacking an adequate supply of the milk of human kindness had driven to a section of the road remote from human habitation, dumped them, onto the road, and proceeded on his or her way. (\$100.00 fine for such an act)
This is an assumption based purely upon circumstantial evidence. That the kindly salesman picked up the helpless orphans, placed them tenderly in his car, and proceeded to a grocery store is a fact.
He bought a quart of milk and a pound of hamburger for his tiny passengers, surely an adequate amount, and inquired as to where he could leave them, since his occupation prevented his giving them the ten-

fill, they patronized the sanitary facilities provided.
Both are beautiful silky furred yellow Angoras, apparently of good lineage. Their quick recognition of the purpose of a kitten sized box of sand showed them to be creatures of refinement, as did their evident appreciation of the care bestowed upon them.
The salesman is a big he-man who could not possibly be considered a sissy but there was a tear in his eye as he parted from his little friends and went joyfully on his way, trusting that someone with a permanent residence would adopt them and treat them well.
The following day, a gracious lady saw and fell in love with the two orphans at first sight. They are now members of her family. That makes everybody happy, including the Good Samaritan, whose kindly, compassionate act made it all possible.

Interested private investors will be permitted to provide the bulk of the funds on an insured basis through USDA's Farmers Home Administration.
The legislation signed into law by President Johnson on October 7:
1. Authorizes an increase from \$200 to \$450 million in the Farmers Home Administration's ability to insure loans in any one year for rural community facilities including water supply and waste disposal systems, and for the development and purchase of family farms.
2. Provides, for the first time, this type of credit for rural waste disposal systems.
3. Authorizes, for the first time, grants to supplement this type of credit for the rural water and waste disposal systems. Grant authority may not exceed 50 percent of the construction of a project nor a total of \$50 million a year.
4. Authorizes, for the first time, grants totaling \$5 million a year for comprehensive planning of water and sewage systems.
5. Increases from 2500 to 5500 the size of towns eligible for such assistance.
6. Increases from \$1 to \$4 million the maximum size of a loan, or a combination loan and grant for water supply or waste disposal systems.

County benefits from expansion

The local field office of the Farmers Home Administration has been notified to inform Chaves and Lincoln county residents of the program, and to accept applications under the expanded credit authorities. The much discussed grant assistance will not be available until funds are appropriated by Congress.
Applications for rural community facilities loans may be made by public bodies and non-profit private organizations. Inquiries will be welcomed.
The \$450 million in insured loans plus the \$55 million in grants authorized yearly by the Act can help an estimated 800 rural areas containing approximately one million people obtain needed water and waste disposal systems and other facilities, and provide 18,000 farm families with credit needed to secure their foothold on the land.

With this expanded authority we can be far more effective in helping rural communities and family farmers obtain needed resources, build their economic strength. We must cease looking to the cities for solutions to rural problems. We must work to make rural America strong.






