Carrizozo Municipal Schools have started transporting students from Santa Rita School to the public school for special programs that have been instituted under Title I of the Economic Opportunity Act.

The first part of the program to get underway is generally classed as remedial reading and writing. Students in both of the schools take part in program. The students coming over from Santa Rita are transported free of cost as a part of the Federal program.

The objective of the remedial reading writing course is to bring students up to somewhat the same level of ability so they

can compete on entrance into high school.

The next course to start, right after the holidays, will be music. Under the Title I program, music instruments will be provided for students in beginning band. Sister Maris at Santa Rita is now selecting students with music ability. Transportation will be provided as for the reading-writing students, and quite a number will start beginning band next year. Meals at the cafeteria will be extended to a number of students at Santa Rita, again transportation arranged under Title I.

These programs will be continued through this school year.

Highest volume day so far has been Monday. They estimated volume to date is running considerably above last year during the same period.

Christmas stamps are going good. Each of these attractive "special" stamps depicting the Angel Gabriel offer first-class mail privileges for Christmas cards. The use of the Gabriel stamp or any other five-cent stamp will provide forwarding

service if the recipient has moved. First-class service allows for returning of the cards if they are undeliverable provided a return address is on the envelope. It also means they receive priority in handling the delivery.

The postmasters of this area are asking that all outgoing mail include the local Zip Code in the return address. This is the best time of year to update mailing lists. Remember to check the Zip Code on all incoming mail and add them to your address book.

At this time of year, we especially need your help by mail-

ing early and using the five-number Codes. One of the best ways to avoid unworkable peaks in mail volume is for people to mail often, not wait and save all of their mail for one big mailing.

Sectional Center Postmaster Roy Harmon stated, "Last year Zip Codes were a great help in speeding mail delivery. In fact, they were largely responsible for the outstanding record on-time delivery chalked up across the nation during the Christmas rush, so mail early and wrap securely is encouraged by all Lincoln County postmasters."

The Forest Service charges a dollar for Christmas tree permits, yet enough Christmas trees to supply all of El Paso were being crushed.

Inside The Capitol

A long hearing that droned on for days before the State Corporation Commission finally concluded, but the final outcome may be far in the future. Mountain States Telephone Co. has applied for certification to do business in the Los Alamos area under "grandfather rights." This is the right to take over a territory through having previously done business in the area.

The application was opposed by Los Alamos Telephone Co., a subsidiary of a Milwaukee firm.

The long tedious hearing apparently is to get everything on record for future use in the courts.

Mountain States has furnished Los Alamos on a lease basis but owns a considerable amount of equipment in the area. The AEC decided to change the arrangement and get out of the lease business, leaving the area available for ownership by a telephone firm.

Testimony throughout the hearing produced one fact that went unquestioned — Los Alamos

is a plush piece of property in the phone business. Although the hearing was drawn out through hours of haggling over incidentals, one close observer commented "through the smoke of the testimony in all phases of the testimony it was hard to see how Mountain States didn't have ownership in the area. If certification isn't approved they will have to lug a lot of equipment so someone else can move in. If this happens, according to the observer, it might be termed "brother-in-law" rights.

HIGHWAY PROPOSAL GETS COOL RECEPTION AT MEET

A highway directly from Carlsbad to Las Cruces may be built, but after a meeting last week it looks like it's going to be a long time in the future. Representatives from several cities met with the Highway Commission to request the project and received an extremely cool reception from Highway Commissioner John Sudderth.

Sudderth said his reason for rejection was mainly money, in addition to the fact that he considered it would create a "parallel situation" of highways.

A member of the commission, Gen. Hugh Milton, disagreed to an extent and indicated that the road might be built in the future.

Delegates from southern communities argued that presently a massive amount of traffic is being "funneled" to El Paso from Carlsbad because of the lack of the highway and that New Mexico is a big loser on outside money because of this.

It was also pointed out that the request was the wish of some 110,000 people from Carlsbad, Hobbs, Las Cruces, Deming, and Lordsburg.

FIGURES SHOW CHANGE IN APPORTIONMENT STATUS

Figures released last week from the Legislative Council show some differences over a two-year period in representation at the State House.

The House was reapportioned on voting in the 1962 election and on the same formula the new tallies were based on the 1964 balloting.

The apportionment gives one representative for a certain number of the populace, allowing for 15 per cent deviation up or down.

Most counties figure out reasonably even, but Grant County has by far the most representation.

Grant has Rep. Fred Foster with 9,511 and Rep. Robert Martin with 9,189.

In Bernalillo, several districts have one representative for more than 17,000.

New power line energizes sawmill

This set of pictures taken at the C. J. Dugan Sawmill, now nearing completion on the Mes-calero Indian Reservation, provide the last chapter of a story about service from your Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

The story started when it was determined that the sawmill would be needing more power than existing lines could provide. This decision was made in the late fall and in the meantime the weather anticipated at that time, has hit in full force.

With the idea of getting a new set of lines run to the sawmill, it was decided to employ the services of a helicopter, which you read about in the last news letter. We can say now, that the job was completed before bad weather hit the high mountain country, that the helicopter operation was highly successful, as well as practical, and that power supply up to 500 KVA was turned on for sawmill use on December 7, 1965.

We are great believers in service as being our best commodity and are proud to have served an industry when they needed service.

C. J. Dugan has a 10-year contract with the Mes-calero Apache Indians for removing 15 million feet of lumber a year. The cost of setting up the sawmill will run over \$400,000.00 by the end of this year. It's really quite an industry for the Otero County Electric Cooperative area. We believe that this industry has good possibilities of leading to other development in the area.

Mr. Dugan said this week that he anticipated the installation of a kiln next year, which will make season lumber available in the immediate area. Installation of a log barker is anticipated for next year. If the chip market gets strong then the Dugan company could sell chips which would add considerable to the total operation.

The initial force at the mill will be seven men, three more men will handle logs, and there will be six men in the planing mill. At present the construction crew is quartered in trailer houses on the sawmill site.


There will probably be a trial run at the sawmill right at the end of this year, but actual operation should start early in 1966.




