Trip to graveyard close to being fatal

Wednesday night of last week Percy Blakley, Eloy Candelaria and Floyd Gonzales were having drinks in a bar in Carrizozo. Blakley decided he wanted to view his son's grave in the Carrizozo Cemetery and persuaded the two boys to drive him out there.

At the cemetery Gonzales and Blakley got out of the car to walk through the cemetery while Candelaria drove the car to the far side where the two were expected to come out.

On the walk through the cemetery Gonzales got the urge to beat up Blakley and did so, later telling Lincoln County Sheriff Leonardo Vega, Jr., he did not know why he did it.

Blakley was beaten bad enough that if he had been left in the graveyard he surely would have frozen to death. The two boys took him to the hospital around 10:30 p.m.

As a result of the incident Eloy S. Candelaria, age 20 of Ruidoso Downs is in jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond charged with robbery of a person. Juan Floyd Gonzales, age 19 of Ruidoso Downs, is in county jail in lieu of \$2,500 bond, charged with aggravated battery on the person of Percy Blakley. At the time of arrest Gonzales was out on bond for theft of a motor vehicle.

Area teams split on the weekend

Last year St. Peter's had an 8-2 season and won the Mountain sub-district of 5B Conference. They're at it again.

Last Saturday the St. Peter Crusaders and the Honda Eagles had a ding-dong battle won by St. Peter 51-50, game played at Honda.

It was a typical St. Peter-Honda finish as the Crusaders twice defeated Honda last season by a single point.

The game was nip-and-tuck all the way, with the lead changing hands many times. A deciding factor in the outcome was Bobby Richardson, the Eagles leading scorer, fouling out with four minutes left in the game.

The first period ended in a 12-12 stand off, but the Crusaders came back in the second stanza to pile up a 10 point lead which helped provide the victory.

St. Peter countered 16 markers in the second canto, while limiting the home team to a 10 point output for the period. Bob Brewington chalked up six of his sixteen points in the quarter while Tom Wilcox and Terry Griffin each added four and the Crusaders led at the intermission, 28-22.

The Eagles, with a well-balanced scoring attack which saw four players netting eight or more points, came clawing back at the lead in the second half. Honda countered 10 points in the third quarter to eight for St. Peter, cutting the Crusader

Seventeen page letter comments on State Highway Department audit

SANTA FE - Last week when State Auditor Alex Armijo released the audit on the State Highway Department, it became much in demand by those who had predicted that there would be much amiss from the auditor's point of view.

State Auditor Armijo and Highway Commission Chairman John Sudderth have been at outs for a long time, and either Sudderth's department pulled off some rather colossal goofs or Armijo has gone out of his way to harrangue the department.

Most audits come out with a cover letter and perhaps two or three pages of comments. The Highway Department document has a rather kind cover letter, but is followed by 17 full pages of comments that range from criticism on Sudderth's per diem pay to the dubious use of state cars.

Rio Grande Gorge Bridge Draws Several Comments

There was much publicity recently over the Rio Grande Gorge Bridge, which was a major campaign promise of Gov. Jack Campbell. Armijo hired a former Highway Department employee to check the situation and the report indicated that a "hump" had been evident in the structure through "errors" in construction.

Armijo's man didn't question the "safety" of the bridge, but the ensuing hassle over the persecution of the bridge through publicity became an obviously sore point with Sudderth and Gov. Campbell.

Concerning the bridge, however, the audit poked at more than the hump.

Concerning "Contract No. 3717 - Design for Bridge over Rio Grande. Project S-1539 (200)" the audit states that "Contract No. 3717, dated July 12, 1960, was awarded to L. Boduroff for a fee of \$26,250.00. While the final payment was made to the Consultant in a prior fiscal year, the negotiated final settlement came to our attention in connection with our verification of costs incurred to date for the design and construction of the Taos Gorge Bridge. The contract was cancelled prior to completion of a final bridge design, when it was decided to have the work performed by the department's own Bridge Design Section. The consultant was paid a total of \$22,334.99 under contract No. 3717, although the department's records indicate little use, if any, was made of the preliminary plans or sketches and the estimates submitted by L. Boduroff to the State Highway Department."

The audit goes on to say that "In view of the evidence suggesting that the consultant's work was only partially completed under the original con-

tract terms, and that even some of the work performed was not entirely satisfactory, the records supporting the final payment do not show any justification for the amount of the negotiated settlement made with the consultant."

The "million-dollar" bridge has cost - including the approach roads - some \$2.7 million to date and it's one project that didn't include any federal funds.

Other Specific Projects Pointed Out in Audit

The audit also brought under fire several projects over the state for various reasons. In some cases, contractors were unable to complete a job, but were paid a high percentage of the bill despite the fact that bonding companies had to take over and complete the job.

"Pit changes" on several projects were also cited, saying that after a contract was let as to specified material, the contractor would then use material from a much closer point, thus cutting the cost of the construction. This is stressed in that the use of a "closer pit" for material brought in lower quality ingredients.

Projects brought under question were in San Miguel, Hidalgo, Santa Fe, Socorro, Dona Ana, Bernalillo, and Grant Counties.

'Mistakes' Not Necessarily 'Bad Uses' Of Money Available

Although some top people are still eyeing the Highway Department audit and will do so for many weeks in the future, it should be noted that "mistakes" are not necessarily a purposeful misuse of funds.

The personal involvement could have brought out many critical remarks that could have been passed over in other departments. But if accusations in the audit are completely founded, then there's been a lot of money spent for dubious results. If this is the case, there may be some major chuffing again in the Highway Department.

Move for efficient use of state hospital facilities

The Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital board of directors will start its regular January meeting in the office of Governor Jack M. Campbell at Santa Fe at 9:00 a. m. Friday. The purpose of this meeting with the Governor will be to continue consideration of the most efficient utilization of state hospital facilities, with attention to the best possible care of patients and most return on state tax dollars.

Gov. Campbell's newly created Inter-Institutional Council has been asked to study the possibility of a third state hospital and training school unit for the mentally retarded. Los Lunas Hospital and Training school trustees are asking that a branch for the mentally retarded be established at Fort Stanton, necessitating a move of TB patients.

Dr. Eugene Mann reported to the board of trustees in their November meeting that at the request of Gov. Campbell he and George Bryan, hospital superintendent, had gone to Fort Bayard to inspect the hospital and grounds. Fort Bayard is presently licensed for 215 beds, but has a capacity for 350 to 400 beds.

In their meeting with Governor Campbell Friday morning Fort Stanton trustees will discuss moving tuberculosis patients to Fort Bayard, together with state-wide geriatrics program, the combination of the two expected to make full utilization of Fort Bayard facilities.

Fort Bayard Hospital has a long history of tuberculosis patient care, and facilities there are ideally suited for a TB hospital.

Members of the Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital board of trustees are: Dr. A. Eugene Mann, chairman; Mrs. Lena M. Pfeiffer, secretary; Mrs. Eleanor James, Dr. Louis Levin and Mr. Paul Fayton, members.

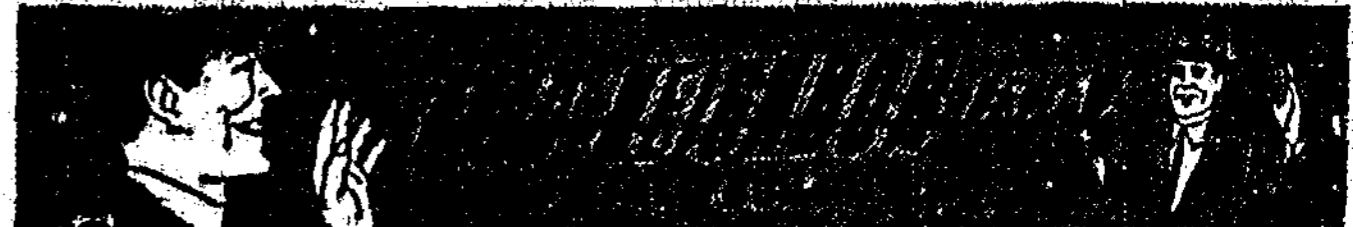

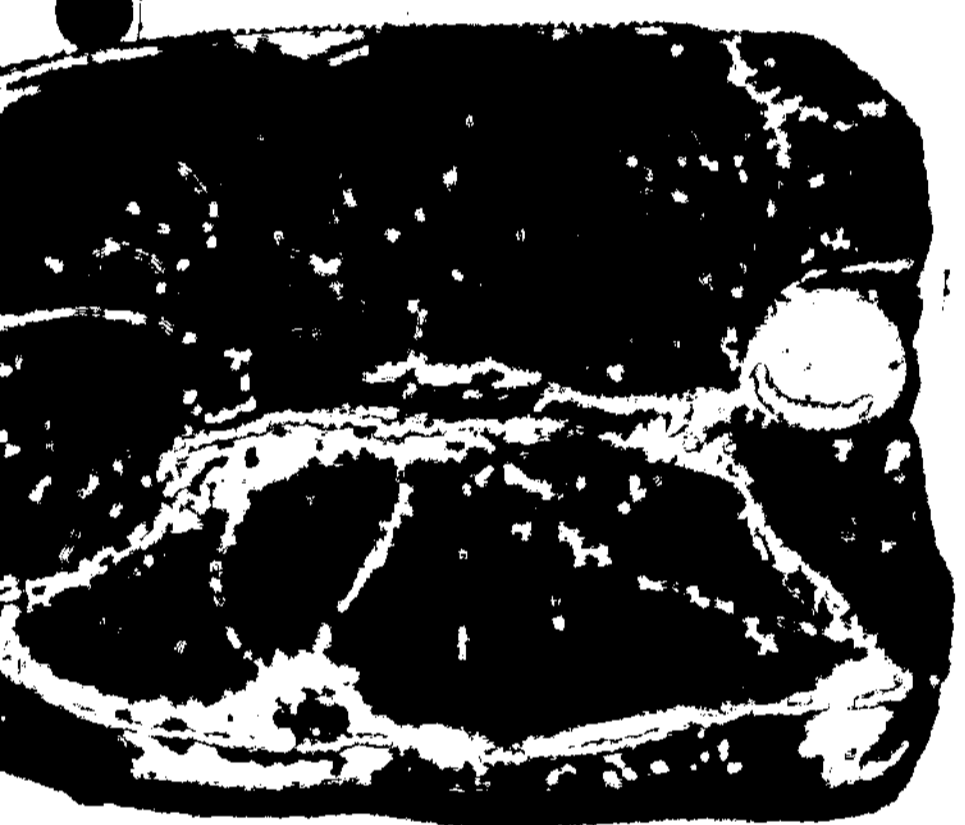

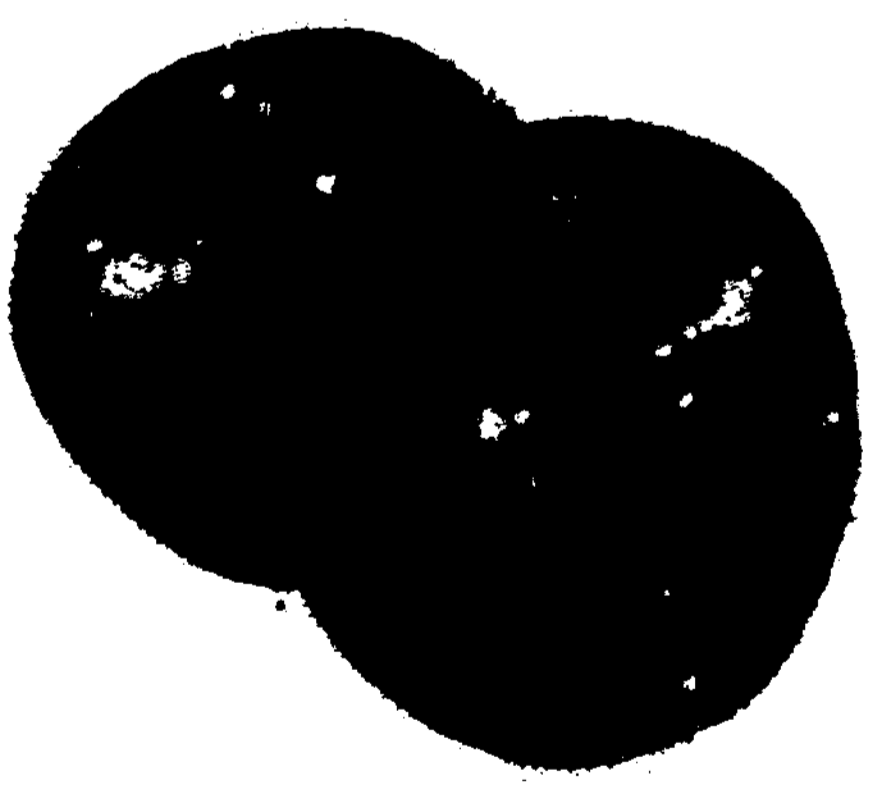

Labor trouble on border is coming

The Washington administration is pro-labor in a big way. The 14B (Right to work) provision of the Taft-Hartley law held its own last year, and will have to endure another attack from labor forces, backed by the administration in the 89th Congress which convened Monday.

A furtherance of labor control of affairs in this country will be in evidence along the border area. El Paso being our closest point. Relations between El Paso and Juarez have seemed good during past years, some give and take on each side. Much Mexican money is spent in El Paso, much United States money is spent in Juarez.

The movement of commuters who live in Mexico but work in U. S. border areas is coming under heavy fire from labor unions, according to report recently published by the University of California.

Going to work and going home times of day are quite a sight in El Paso. People

streaming each way across the border. Apparently it won't be for long.

In the meantime you will enjoy reading a first or second time—the middle-aged man's comment on how the transit strike in New York was affecting him:

"We moved here a year ago from Columbus, and we couldn't get a nice apartment we could afford because of the housing shortage.
