
discusses first aid

SHEARING EQUIPMENT TO BE DEMONSTRATED FEB. 23 County Agent's Report

Care of Shearing Equipment will be demonstrated on Wednesday afternoon February 23rd starting at 2:00 p.m. This is part of the Sheep Shearing School being held February 22 thru 24 at the J. P. White Feed pens east of Roswell,

Ranchers who have s h e e pshearing equipment should plan to attend this session and learn. about care, repair, and adjustment of the shearing equipment.

Materials described as "soil conditioners" are offered periodically for sale to farmers in New Mexico. These materials include inorganic, volcanic or marine derived materials. They are often called "soil conditioners" because by law they cannot be called fertilizers.

Claims made for certain of the soil conditioners offered for sale today are difficult to verify. No impartial research substantiates the claim for these inorganic, volcanic or marine derived materials. There is no scientifically acceptable evidence nor scientific basis for supposing that these materials act as a systematic insecticide or that plants are healthier, more disease resistant, or more drought resistant as a result of their use.

Although these materials are not claimed to be fertilizers, claims are made that their use increase crop yields.

The micronutrient element content of these materials is also cited as a factor contributing to their yield increasing effect. However, for commonly grown crops, most soils are adequately supplied with essential micronutrients. Where micronutrients deficiencies occur, the amounts of micronutrients needed to correct the deficiency are much higher than would be supplied to plants by the so called conditioners at the rates suggested for use. Fertilizers with guaranteed amounts of major nutrients and micronutriants are the best for correcting nutrient deficiencies if they occur.





SANTA FE — Everyone's had their ears bent for weeks about the reapportionment of the Senate, but there are a few comments that should be made.

Despite the fact that State Sen. Ike Morgan's 53-member plan got the big push, the alternates (40 or less) would have been an injustice to several minority groups - even the Republicans which could be called minority at this stage.

Absolute reapportionment, when figured basically, would be on legislator per resident of New Mexico. But when the idea works up from this fact, then it's inevitable that "somewhere" the numerical representation is going to go astray.

The big kick against the 53member Senate is that next... session there'll be essentially "two Houses."

The blg thing against anything smaller than 53 members is that somebody is going to be gerrymandered out of proper representation.

The big speculation now is that the Federal Court may not go for the 53-member plan because of the accepted ratio between Senate and House membera.

If the Federal Court discards the idea being presented, then the trend will be toward something like 30 to 40 members.

Republican Opposition Over Districting Noted

Republicans in the House argued over the districting that will go into the reapportionment bill. But the opposition has been eyed by several sour-

The big item is Bernalillo County. The new plan would provide 14 Senators. Out of these, by district voting, the Republicans would have five districts reasonably cinched and two more "possibilities,"
