Former Zoza resident in jail for smuggling

Wednesday morning Paul Albright of the Associated Press in Albuquerque called the News office asking for identification of Joseph Vaughn Grantham, age 23, who that morning had been sentenced in Hong Kong to six months in prison for smuggling. Grantham had given his address as Carrizoso, N. M.

On or about April 3 Grantham had boarded an airplane at Bangkok, Thailand, the plane

landed at Hong Kong where Grantham was arrested by customs people, searched and found to be carrying 38 gold bars in a canvas vest under his clothes, and six more gold bars in a brief case. He pled guilty to smuggling.

The bars were valued at \$54,000, something like 100 pounds of weight.

Joseph V. Grantham is the son of Ruth Grantham, sister of Vernon Petty of Carrizoso. Mr. Grantham is a geologist. They

were here in 1950-51, and operated a motel about six months.

There has been so much publicity about gold fortune presumably found by Dr. E. M. Noss at Victoria Peak in Dona Ana County near Sierra County line and the old Henderson ranch, that a number of people were trying to connect the gold carried by Grantham with the gold bars supposedly stolen from Victoria Peak. There may be a connection, but possibilities seem remote.

The News editor talked by phone with Mrs. E. M. Noss and her son-in-law E. M. Guthrie at Truth or Consequences Wednesday morning. The question put to Mrs. Noss was, did she recall the name Grantham during the years her husband was alive. She did recall a Grantham, an overgrown boy who worked around their ranch — three or four months and took off one night never to be seen again. Again, probably no connection with Joseph Vaughn Grantham.

The N. M. State Park Commission will meet in Carrizoso on Friday, May 6, at 9:00 a.m., and will take part in the dedication of the new Valley of Fires State Park ceremonies starting at 1:30 p.m. at the park.

Commission members are: John Gray, chairman, Deming; William H. Carr, vice chairman, Fort Sumner; T. B. White (also chief engineer of Highway Department) Santa Fe; Grady Coan, Aztec; Clarence L. Forsling, Albuquerque; Lawrence B. Ingram, Tucuman; and Jacob Martinez, Pecos; members of the commission.

In addition to the commission members expected, John Elliott, director; Bill Rouch, administrative assistant; Juanita Pino, secretary; Paul McClendon, construction engineer; Jim Dillard, assistant director; and Carlos Tipps, area supervisor, will attend the meeting.

Lt. Gov. Mack Easley will be the featured speaker at the dedication and is expected to arrive in Carrizoso at 12:00 noon.

The local committee composed of Mrs. Johnson Stearns, Glen Bradley and Paul Payton has plans firmed up for the occasion. Carrizoso Women's Club and Beta Sigma Phi Sorority will have booths at the park to feed people who have not brought a picnic lunch. The Carrizoso Grizzly band directed by Arnold Boyce will provide picnic music. There will be a flag raising ceremony at the new flag pole.

Guadalupe Ortega, born and raised in Lincoln County, will be the custodian at Valley of Fires State Park. He starts his duties April 16.

The new park is located three miles west of Carrizoso on U.S. 380, on a high island in the center of the lava flow known as the Mal Pais.

Moving day for 88 TB patients

A long chain of history dating back to November 18, 1899 when the first patient was admitted to Fort Stanton Marine Hospital, the first government hospital exclusively for the treatment of tuberculosis, was being altered Wednesday when 88 patients at Fort Stanton TB Hospital were transported to Fort Bayard.

The shift has been in the making for nearly a year. Fort Bayard institution was formerly used as a veterans hospital. When the program was curtailed the hospital facilities were transferred to the State of New Mexico. The last session of legislature approved the use of Fort Bayard for tuberculosis patients and a geriatrics program. A Special Hospitals' Board was appointed to direct the operation of Fort Bayard near Silver City, El Mirador at Alcalde, and Meadows Home at Las Vegas.

The transfer of patients from Fort Stanton to Fort Bayard was completed by use of bus, ambulance, and plane. Patients on leave or extended leave will report directly to Fort Bayard at conclusion of their leave.

Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt will accompany the patients and establish his office at Fort Bayard as director of hospitals. Dr. H. C. Jernigan is preparing to move to Albuquerque, and will serve as director of tuberculosis clinics.

Mr. George Bryan is executive director for the Special Hospitals' Board and is directing the movement of both patients and properties from Fort Stanton to Fort Bayard.

The Los Lunas Hospital and Training School will take over operation of Fort Stanton Hospital, with a personnel training program as an immediate objective, extensive rebuilding scheduled and use of the facilities for retarded children.

Whereas 88 tuberculosis patients have been housed at Fort Stanton, close to 300 children are expected to take up residence there under the new program.

Court Record

Jury took twenty to free Richardson

A jury composed of Leon H. Blackwelder, Tom W. Jones, Jr., Thomas Almon Knight, Leon Lock, Mrs. William G. McCarty, Charles Freeman McCorkle, Alton Lynn McKibben, Mrs. Louise Coe Russels, Jessie Lee Smith (Foreman), Mrs. John Thomas, Candelario Padilla Trujillo, Mrs. Erineo S. Vallejos, with Ramon S. Luna and Gladys Alexander as bailiffs, retired at 5:50 p.m. April 7, and returned 20 minutes later at 6:10 with their verdict: of "not guilty" which freed Philbert Richardson, 39, of a voluntary manslaughter charge.

Richardson was accused of the 1965 shooting death of his wife's alleged lover, Frank Gonzalez. Defense attorneys Richard Parsons and Edward Trivis argued that Richardson was justified in shooting Gonzalez. During the trial testimony was given that Gonzalez pursued Richardson to accompany him to the race track and after the first race Gonzalez left and returned to the Richardson home. 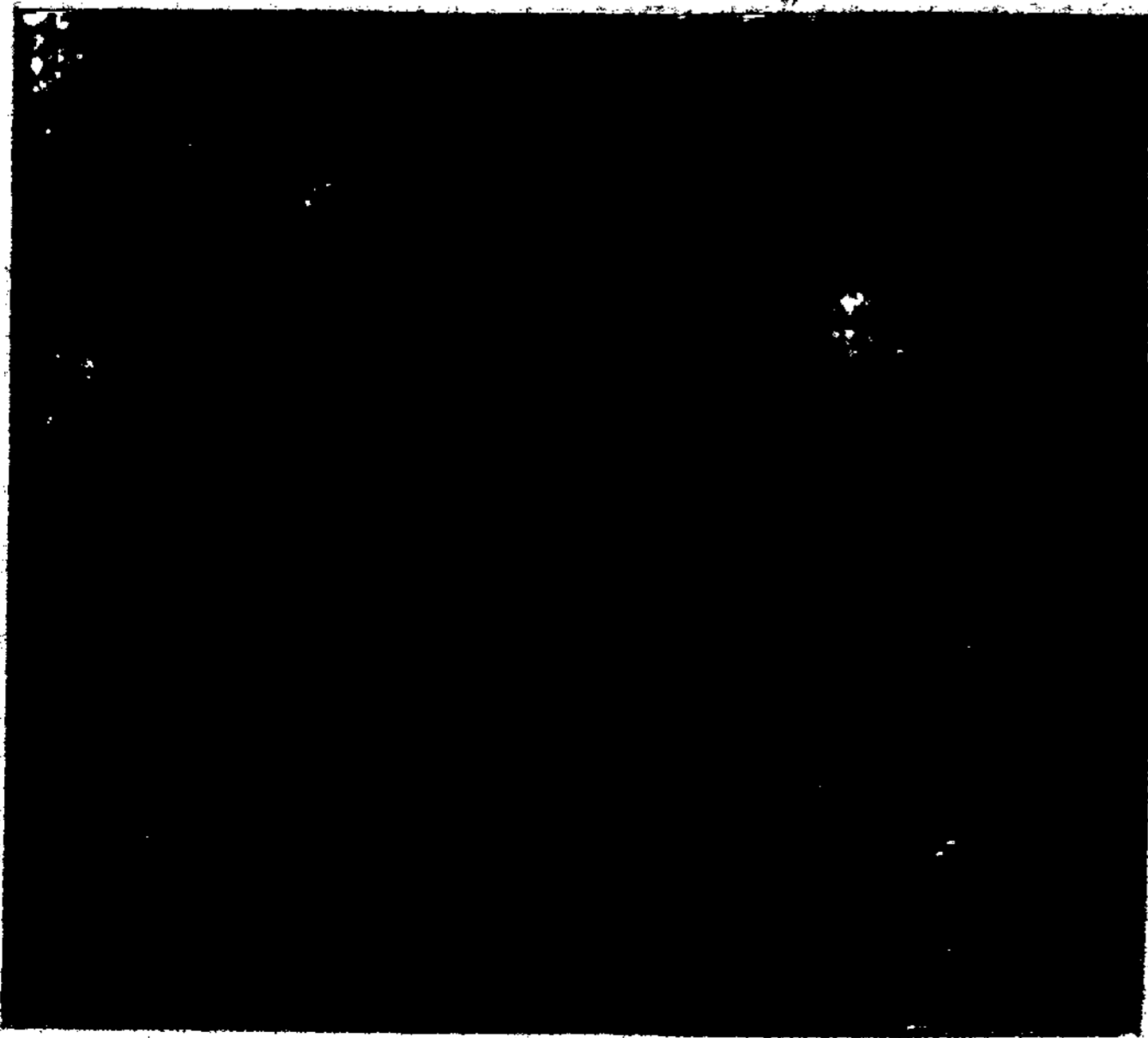

State-wide implications in Albuquerque election

Inside Capitol by Charles Cullin SANTA FE — It was news mainly in Albuquerque when the old guard Citizens Committee was ousted after some 12 years of absolute rule in the city.

Most state residents could care less about the city elections in Albuquerque, but there is one significant factor that should not go unnoticed.

An Albuquerque attorney, Mr. Franklin Jones, has been a strong advisor of Gov. Campbell and also a strong supporter of Gene Lusk in the Demo race for the next Governor.

The quick is that Jones is also (or was also) a wheel behind the faction that controlled Albuquerque for many years.

It was a stunning setback for several politicians who are campaigning on a state-wide basis.

There's no denying that Albuquerque represents about 27 percent of the voting strength in New Mexico. And when a

Lusk-associated group gets the ouster in Albuquerque, then some top chiefs will be turning a more critical eye toward the full import of the situation.

First Meet Set For New State Committee

The initial meeting of the newly formed Licensing and Examining Committee will be held April 15, and the trend of early actions should be noted, especially by the small business men over the state.

As has been said before, the new committee could go several directions in its attempt to "solve problems" in the areas involved.

But major contractors in the state have been rather active in regard to future possibilities. If a "centralized" authority is established, it's possible the small contractors, plumbers, electricians, etc., could draw the bad end of the stick.

Unique Competition In Senate Races

Senators who opposed the 53-member group have come up with very active opposition.

From District 5, Sen. Sterling Black is opposed by Republican William E. Keller.

In District 8, the Rio Arriba-Sandoval area, Sen. Matt Chacon has a Demo opponent in the person of Horace DeVargas.

District 23 - Otero and Lincoln Counties - has Demos Irvin Huntzinger and George Abbott opposing incumbent State Sen. Joe Skeen.

A studied glance at several areas would indicate that "no candidates for Governor" have inserted opposition to keep some rather powerful politicians active in their own race and absent from activity in the Governor's race.

Long Memories Evident Again

Long memories in politics became obvious again during the past week.

Mrs. Joe Bursey, wife of Public Service Commissioner Bursey, has been ringing doorbells and campaigning over the state for Gene Lusk.

Bursey lost to Burroughs in the 1960 Demo primary.

Some Party leaders had advanced notice that the State Central Committee might bring in either Ed Mechem or Tom Bolack at the last moment after the Demo nominee had been named.

At least the rumor smoked out the older chiefs and brought forth statements from the GOP hopefuls.

Rep. Cliff Hawley and Dave Cargo are in "for good."

And by their own admission, the days of "Big Ed" Mechem and Bolack in a political office apparently are "definitely" finished.

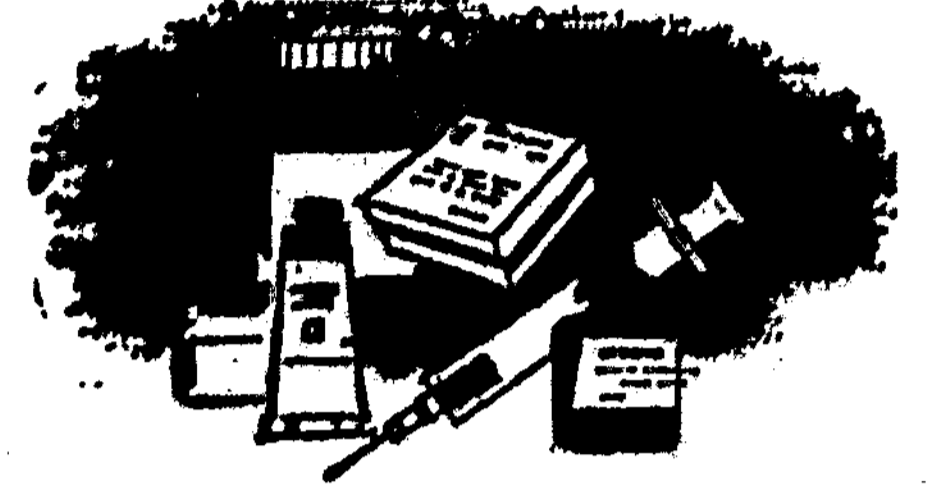

Licenses and fishing rules are ready at Bonito City Cafe. Season is open now in all creeks in this area and is open May 1st to November 31st in Bonito Dam.

Marvin Lee will be employed by the Game Dept. to keep the area clean and would appreciate folks putting trash and cans in the barrels that are placed all around the dam. Lets help him keep this beautiful fishing lake clean.

The Game Dept. has generously stocked all the creeks on our part of the county, last week and the week before. This includes Eagle Creek, South Fork Bonito and the Bonito Creek above and below the Bonito Dam to the bridge at Angus where Highway 37 and 48 fork. Also Nogal Lake and Alto Reservoir have been planted and Art Graham who drives the Santa Rosa Fish mobile told parties at the Eckland store he would be here with more fish soon.

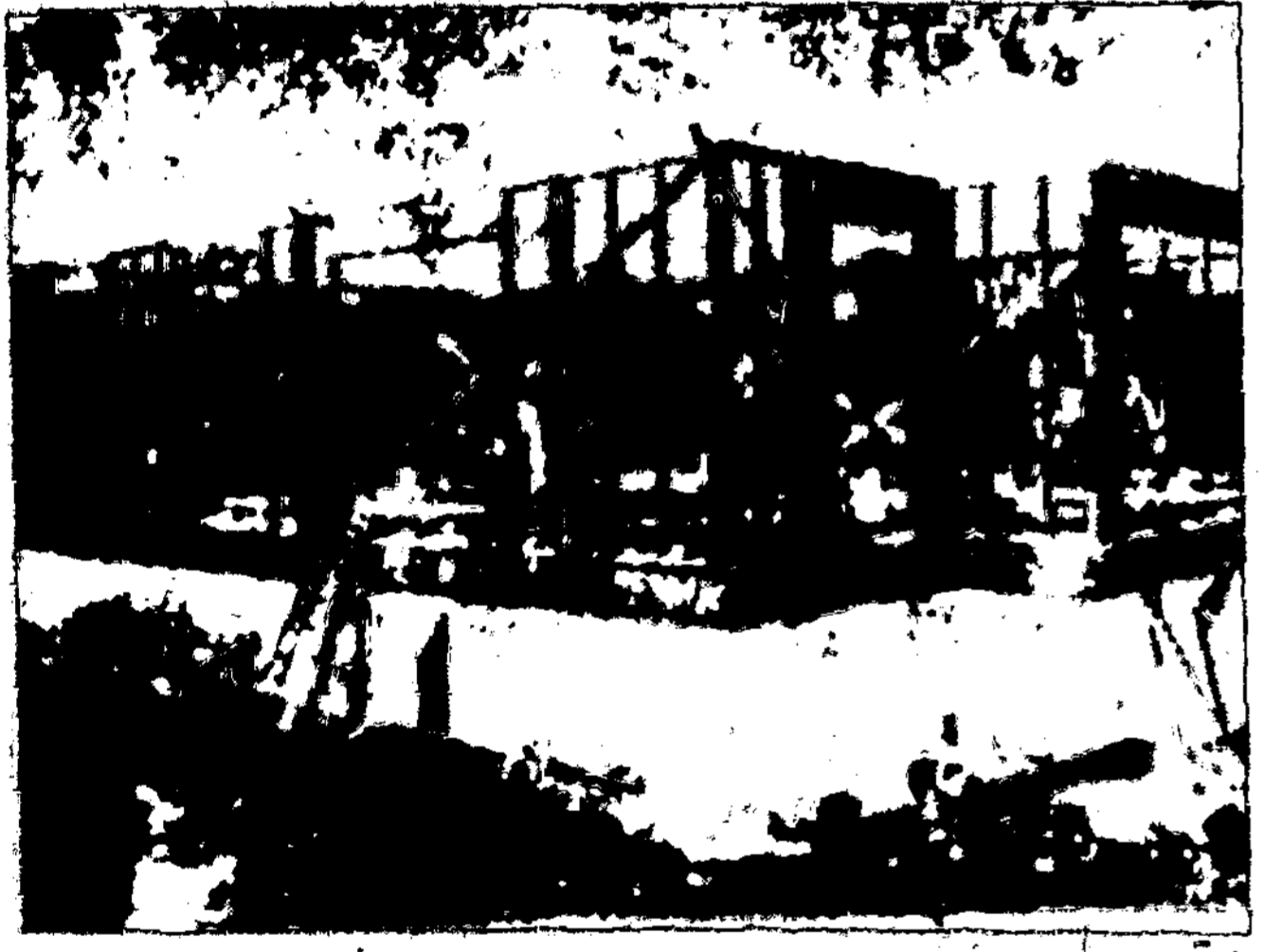

All-electric homes are popular in Co-op area

Just as the electric refrigerator replaced the icebox and the automobile replaced the horse and buggy, so, too, is electric heating becoming the number one way to heat new homes and to replace tired, outmoded flame fuel systems in existing homes.

Today according to the Electric Heating Association, there are more than 2,500,000 electrically heated homes in the United States. The Federal Power Commission predicts there will be 19 million by 1980. Other predictions run as high as 29 million. This means, within the next 15 years, at least 100 million Americans will be enjoying the benefits of electric environmental control for their home.

Why is the trend toward electric heating? The best answer to this question is that Americans demand modernity. The many advantages of electric heating, like individual room control, easy adaptability to air conditioning, cleanliness, safety and trouble-free reliability did not just happen. After much research and study, including many comprehensive consumer surveys, manufacturers were able to determine what the public wanted and realized that only through electricity could these wants be satisfied.

Think for a moment the trouble you'd have in selling your home if it were heated by a coal furnace. Yet, not too long ago, coal was the leading home heating fuel. Next came oil and gas offering many new advantages to the home owner, advantages that became a regular part of practically all heating systems. Now, we are in a new era—the Space Age era, where the trend is toward everything electric, from carving knives to toothbrushes to intercoms to electric heating and air conditioning.

Before electric heating, builders, in many cases, had to fit the home design to the heating system rather than the heating systems to the home design. For example, provisions had to be made in the home design for a space consuming fuel storage tank, something the home owner didn't want but had to have because of the demands of the heating system. The chimney is another piece of extraneous equipment not essential for home design but an absolute requirement for flame fuel heating systems. Excessive piping or duct work also forced builders to conform to the demands of the heating system and left little room for freedom of design.

The flexibility offered through electric heating, particularly in the number and types of systems is noteworthy. If, for example, the home owner's preference is for a system utilizing a furnace or a boiler, he can have it. Both electric furnaces and boilers are available. However, there are electric heating systems on the market today which make no demands on the basic design of any home, allowing complete flexibility of construction. Some of these systems are completely invisible to the naked eye. There are no pipes, no ducts, no radiators, no furnaces, no boilers, no visible equipment of any kind, simply a continuous flow

of heat automatically controlled and hidden in the floor or ceiling. Also, with electric heating, there is no wasted heat. It's 100 per cent efficient. There are no moving parts, no expensive maintenance (including year-around service policies which have become almost essential with flame fuel systems.) Just set the thermostats and forget it.

An interesting fact to note about electric heating is that, in most cases, electric heating equipment costs the same as fuel equipment or may even be less expensive.

No REA in New Mexico

Does our headline surprise you? Many rural New Mexicans would say, "But our ranch is served by REA—we didn't have electricity until REA brought it to our ranch."

Others would say, "Of course there's no REA in New Mexico. REA is a lending agency of the federal government in Washington, D. C."

Who is right? The answer is that both are right to a certain extent. The first speaker is right because the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) made electricity possible on most New Mexico ranches. But REA did not build the lines. It only loaned money to local groups of citizens who established their own local electric distribution systems, hired employees, built lines and contracted to buy wholesale electric power.

The second speaker also is right because REA's primary function is to lend money to local electric systems. REA's office is in a Department of Agriculture building in Washington; the only REA personnel outside the national capital are regional representatives who provide technical assistance to rural electric systems.

Rural electrification has been successful because of a high degree of cooperation between rural electric systems and REA. In the early days of rural electrification, REA engineers pioneered new techniques to reduce the cost of rural lines. They worked with high-strength conductors, elimination of cross-arms and other simplifications of line building.

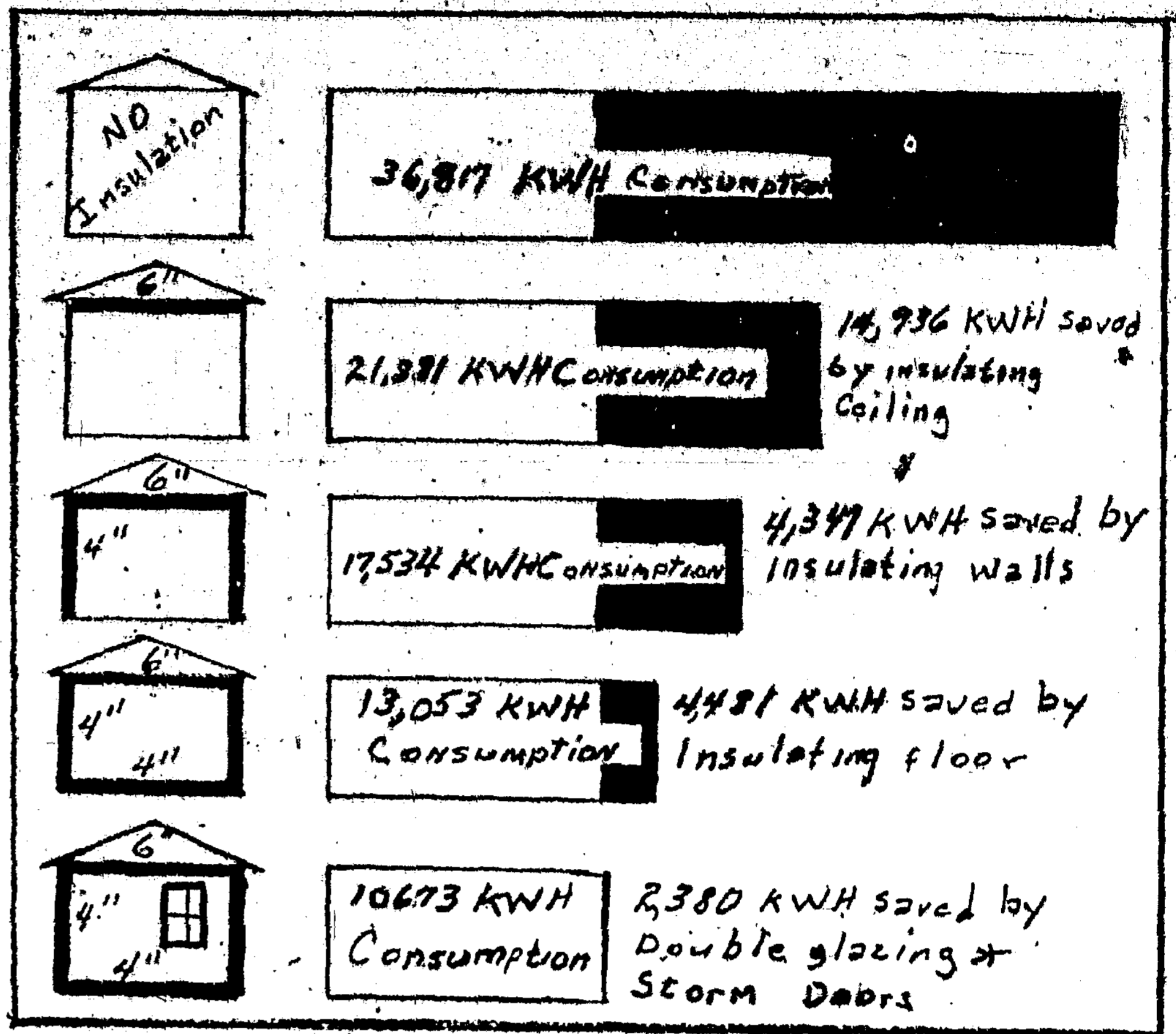
While REA supplied technical assistance from Washington, the local system provided leadership at home. Directors spent many hours and drove many miles to talk with neighbors to get enough customers to make their rural electric systems possible. Some ranchers wondered if they could afford even the monthly minimum charge for electricity. Others believed they would be mortgaging their ranches to the government if they allowed poles to be placed on their land. Hours of patient explanation finally overcame their questions so local leaders could proceed with the construction of the lines.

The fine working relationship between local electric systems and REA still is contributing to the progress of rural electrification. REA is providing most of the financing for rural electric systems and local leadership is solving the day-to-day problems of maintaining lines and serving customers with good electric service.

Rural electric systems realize the important role REA plays in rural electrification, but they also like to receive their share of credit for a job which is primarily local.

For this reason, we ask your cooperation in referring to your local rural electric system by its real name (Otero County Electric Cooperative) not REA. We hope you will ask your friends to do the same.

Insulation cuts electric consumption

A good job of insulating cuts consumption of electricity for heating to less than a third of what it would be without insulation. The graph above applies to a typical house with 1,000 square feet of floor area.

To read the graph, start at its top. Without insulation at all, consumption was figured at 36,817 kilowatt-hours per year. The addition of the proper amount of ceiling insulation cuts Kwh consumption by 14,936. Adequate wall insula-

tion takes off 4,347 Kwh more. Sufficient floor insulation above a vented crawl space reduces consumption another 4,481, and double glazing and storm doors bring the load down to 10,673 Kwh.

The graph has been drawn for a 5,000 degree-day zone. It was assumed that the house is one story high and is located where the winter design temperature is 0 deg. F. Windows and doors were calculated to fill 20 per cent of total wall area.

Carrizozo has the finest opportunity between this moment and May 6 to demonstrate its pride in beautiful surroundings. "This moment" is now the time to start demonstrating. "May 6" is the day of dedication for the new Valley of Fires State Park.

Many letters have been sent out, formal invitations go out this week inviting people from all over the state and a few in Washington, D. C., to come view the new park.

Much work is to be done getting ready for these visitors we've got to clean house.

Drive out west on U.S.380, see for yourself. Start the moment you get on U.S.380 noting the bottles, cans, and litter in the bar ditches, pay attention

to the roadside all the way out to the park (the exact route most of our visitors will travel). Then when you turn into the park make a check of the bits of paper caught in the vegetation, broken glass, empties on every hand.

A park custodian starts to work April 16, the construction crew is going to do some "pick-up" this week, but they will not finish the job.

It may seem backwards to ask Carrizozo people to do outside of town what they won't do inside of town, but it certainly seems necessary.

Once the roadway and park area is cleaned — then is a good time to remind yourself and your friends to not litter in containers . . . not along the highway or in the Valley of Fires park.

Worst possible voting mess

We speak only of our immediate area when we say that voters going to the polls in the year 1960 will be less informed about candidates on the ballots, and candidates will be less informed about people they are supposed to represent than in any previous election in the history of the United States.

We have reapportionment to thank for this mess.

We would bet a considerable sum of money that fewer than a dozen people in Lincoln County are personally acquainted with Lester B. Hayden of Oro Grande, or bet a like sum of money that Aubrey L. Dunn does not know as many as a dozen people in the lower Hondo Valley, both of these men are on the ballot to represent our county as senators from District #24.

Without being unkind the same is true of Bill Schreengost's knowledge of what goes on in the woods back of T or C. All three men are candidates for representative of our area.

Here's a short for-instance. Schreengost wins, he represents Lincoln and Sierra. Dunn wins, he represents Otero and Lincoln. John Doe of Truth or Consequences has a special piece of legislation primarily for the benefit of his local area do you think the Otero legislator is going to go hog-wild in helping him. The Otero legislator is not obligated except that he also represents Lincoln County, and the Lincoln politician also represents Sierra.

Reapportionment has completed the sacking of the small town. The rural community no longer has a voice in federal government.

Maybe it's just as well because the damn government is being run strictly by and for brain-washed bigots.

From coal oil to incandescent

There's a minor bit of editorial copy in the manner two towns are handling a large project — natural gas for the area. Capitan is going all out, both mayor, former mayor, utility manager, association members and interested citizens are working hard to get the project done. 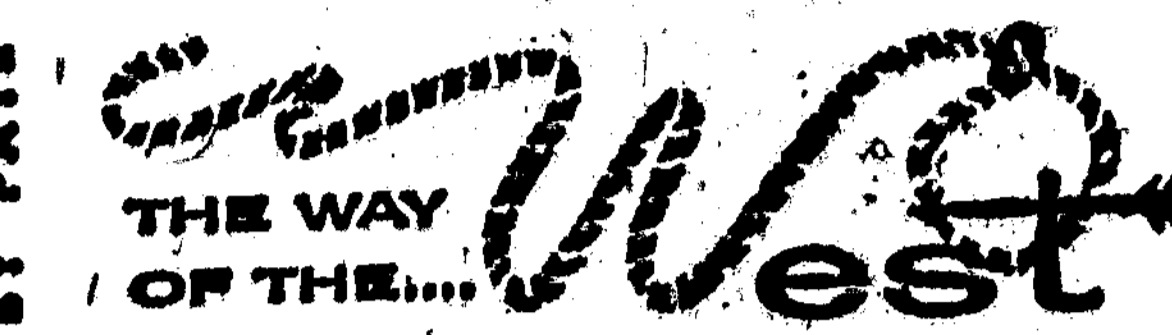

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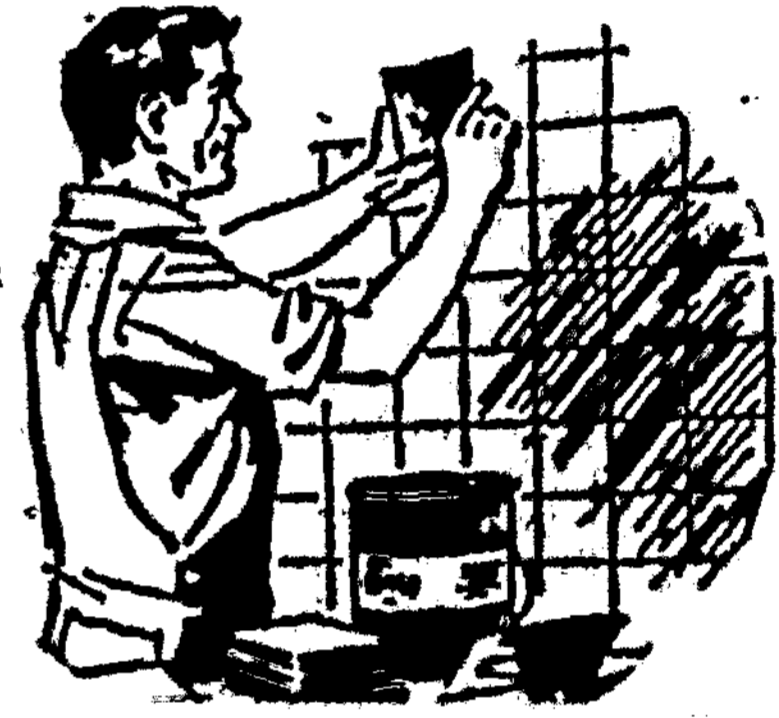

Removes 416 Cases From Docket

THE EL PASO TIMES — April 7, 1966

Las Cruces, N. M. — District Judge Geo. L. Zimmerman, of Alamogordo, presiding judge of Division 2 of the 3rd Judicial District, comprising Lincoln, Otero and Dona Ana counties, removed 416 cases from the docket of the court during January and February, a survey of the civil and juvenile court dockets showed.

A breakdown of the report shows that Judge Zimmerman handled 209 civil, 129 criminal and 78 juvenile cases.

Of the civil cases, 60 were non-jury, 50 were removed by default and 99 came under other categories. Criminal cases included six with juries, 46 non-jury, none by default and 77 in other categories.

January was the busiest month with 120 of the 209 civil cases being removed from the docket and 86 of the 129 criminal cases removed.

Judge Zimmerman also tried a jury case in Roswell by designation of the Chief Justice of the New Mexico Supreme Court, and conducted court in Silver City, Albuquerque and Las Cruces on Saturdays and holidays during this period. He also presided over a five day jury trial in Alamogordo, and wrote an article for a national publication on the administration of the courts.

Senior Judge W. T. Scoggin of Las Cruces has returned from his January and February hospitalization in Houston, and is now handling all civil, criminal and juvenile matters in Dona Ana county and juvenile cases in Carrizozo.
