## New Examining and Licensing Board tosses out newsmen at launching

SANTA FE — The first meeting of the newly-created Examining and Licensing Committee was launched in a dubious manner last week when officials tossed out a newsmen during early proceedings of the group. Explanation for ousting a wire service reporter was that the first period of the gathering was an "executive" meeting to elect officers, etc., and that the portion was nobody's business but the committee's.

pointed out several areas of dispute in the annual audit, and it brought out that a secretary in Purchasing Agent Dante Valo's office was the wife of the top salesman for a Santa Fe firm that had done considerable business with the state.

Auditor Armijo also sent a report to the Governor in regard to the Purchasing Agent's office. Two things happened. First, the secretary in question was transferred to the Secretary of State's office, where nothing of any consequence ever happens.

Next, Valo wrote Armijo saying, "I have your audit presented to me and studied the same. I have noted each of your recommendations and will attempt where it is possible to institute the recommendations as suggested."

This sounds noble enough, but Armijo last week was obviously unhappy about the lack of corrective action from the Governor's office and will likely get meaner about the affair in the future.

Main areas of question have been contracts on the new Capitol building complex and several "change order" affairs that have been extremely profitable to some individuals doing business with the state.

State Employees Campaigning Draws Blast From Burroughs  
Some state employees who have been campaigning for former Demo Gov. John Burroughs drew a sharp blast from their chief last week for overstepping boundaries.

Campaigning within the ranks had reached the stage of "threats" on jobs if certain candidates didn't win. Accusations were hurled at both Burroughs and former State Sen. Gene Lusk.

Apparently, however, the chief Demo candidates hadn't cautioned the high-powered politics and both, rearing repercussions, told their supporters to "lay off." At least while they're on state time.

### Bonding People On Hand At Beginning

Representatives of bonding firms were on hand from the start. They're worried about what the new committee may do in regard to making it easier for smaller firms to do business.

It's not definite but it's still top speculation that the Examining and Licensing people may suggest a central authority to oversee the numerous state boards.

This would range all the way from plumbers, electricians, and contractors, to barbers and morticians.

It's true that many of the minor boards have little cast and operate in a haphazard manner.

But if the new committee does not come forth with a "central" power, then it will be one strong arm of the state government for large concerns to concentrate on in making it tough for small firms.

Small businesses in the state would do well to keep an eye on the future actions of the Examining and Licensing Committee.

Chief Means told the News that there was an engine in the yard, the burning car needed to be moved so the fire truck could get to it, that local railroad officials would not move the car. After an hour of argument a call was made to El Paso SP headquarters and orders given to break the engine loose and move the car. The moving was done, the fire put out in about twenty minutes, said Means.

## Answering service installed at chapel

Austin Wooten, owner of Chapel of Roses Mortuary in Carrizozo, finds it necessary to be out of his office on many occasions and to help people get in contact with him, Mr. Wooten has had a phone answering service installed, the first to be used in Carrizozo.

A normal thing is for people to hesitate to use a machine. If you call Chapel of Roses and hear a voice (Mr. Wooten's) say, "This is a recording" you will know you are talking to a machine.

Don't hang up, but wait for tone which indicates end of message, then you can give your message to the machine which will record it. On his return to his office Mr. Wooten can press a button and play back the messages that have been recorded, and answer your call if that is what you want.

Located along the eastern side of the reservation, the fires were finally brought under control by 165 men, mostly from the Reservation.

# Snow and Armstrong doing good work

Clara Snow and Ruth Armstrong reported to the News Wednesday noon that they had over 100 signers for natural gas in Carrizozo, that only two had refused and they felt it would only be a matter of time until the required 318 signers were secured.

Bert Cheney of Capitan, president of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, stated that the Capitan Lions Club met Tuesday night and organized a drive to secure gas signers in Capitan and that they started to work Wednesday morning, that some 40 con-

tracts had been signed but serious work was just now starting.

The question of areas to be served by the Association and Ruidoso has not been settled. Recently a move was started for Ruidoso to annex in the Sun Valley area which could settle negotiations, annexation requires approval of 51 percent of the property owners.

Mr. Cheney said the price Ruidoso would pay for gas has been settled, 50 above the Association cost with two stipulations, Ruidoso would guarantee 83% of the Association debt

service, and the Association is not to take over 20% above debt cost. Neither side should get hurt under such an arrangement, Cheney said.

The hearing before the Public Service Commission for Fort Sumner Gas Association has been set for May 24, according to Bert Cheney, and he expects the Capitan-Carrizozo, hearing to be held in June which gives plenty of time for work to be completed in both Capitan and Carrizozo.

The Association is negotiating with Los Lunas Hospital and Training School which recently

took over management of Fort Stanton. Cheney said they were putting in new heating equipment, were very interested in gas if the Association could get it to them, at a price they can afford. The Association is also negotiating with Nazarene Camp where there are around 100 cabins and possibility of signing up some 20 percent of them.

One question in Carrizozo has been the size of the line to serve this town. Local people think it not large enough for any growth in the area. The News expects to have additional information next week.

## Noted naturalist to speak in Zozo

### Grizzlies score 19 at Menaul

The Carrizozo Track squad traveled to Menaul High School in Albuquerque last Saturday the 18th. Carrizozo scored 19 points and captured seventh place out of 21 schools entered. Lourdes of Albuquerque won 1st with 47 points, McCurdy Mission won 2nd with 38 points and Vaughn was 3rd with 29 points.

Tommy Ortiz broke the shot put record with a toss of 52 feet and 4 inches, bettering the old record nearly 4 feet. Tom also won third in the discus with a throw of 121 feet. Ortiz has the third best throw in the state up to date.

Speedster Mike Petty won fifth in the hundred yard dash and second in the 220 yard dash. Mike ran second to Frank Sanchoval of Cuba, the state champion last season. Mike was hindered in his running by a stomach virus and did not compete in his special race, the 440 yard dash.

Gilbert Lucero cleared the best height of his career and captured 2nd place in the pole vault. He vaulted 11 ft. 3/4 inch. Gilbert should be up to 12 feet before the end of the season.

The other track athletes turned in fine performances in other events but failed to qualify for the finals.

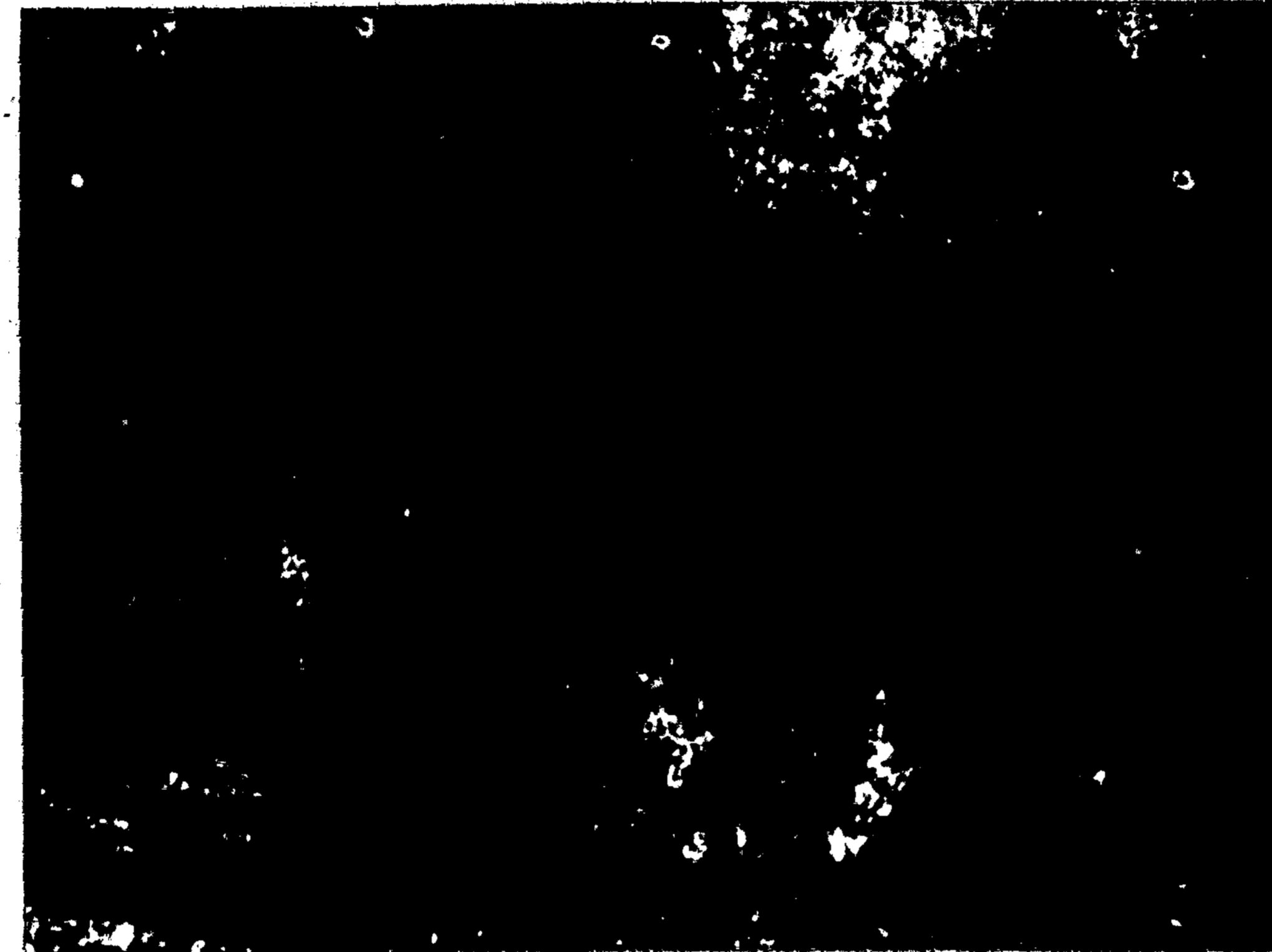
## Palmer and Johnson elected to fill state and district veteran offices

## Mayor says police department is expensive

Following an evening of routine business Tuesday night the Carrizozo town council got into a warm discussion of the police department following a request made by town marshal Chonocho Morales that he be paid for four days he was sick and off the job on advice of doctor.

Morales has been town marshal for seven years, is on 24-hour call, works 14-15 hours a day and has never been off the job sick prior to the current instance.

Mayor Leandro Vega, Sr., said the police department is costing the town a lot of money. He produced an itemized statement which showed police fines and fees for Jan - Feb - Mar as totaling \$664.00. Disbursements and salaries for the same period totaled \$2,343.23.

Atty. Edred Jones reminded the town officials that there was a time when town and county law officers did not get along and that the town got real hungry for revenge. Cooperation is good now but State Police are not bringing cases to the town magistrate court.

Justice of Peace Court and Magistrate Court are held in the same location in Carrizozo, and R. L. Friday Sherrill serves as judge for both courts. As judge of the magistrate court Sherrill receives \$100 a month from the town whether he has any business or not. Sitting as judge of the JP Court Sherrill is paid only by fees from cases that come before this court.

Traffic violations within the town are handled by both the marshal and State police. The council suggested that the state police be contacted to find out why violations within the town were not written up for magistrate court instead of the JP court.

Former mayor Vernon Petty said the town should study the matter of sick leave and come up with a definite policy. Councilman Chero Baca asked Morales how much he was making

per hour, answer was about 35c.

Morales told the council that both Ruidoso and Tularosa have their police department on 8-hour shifts.

Councilman Smoot said that a man on call 24 hours a day should get some appreciation. He had called Marshal Morales a number of times and he always responded promptly.

Utility Manager (and former mayor) Wayne Withers asked that the council consider granting paid legal holidays for employees on hourly basis. He also approved the comment of Councilman Petty.

Smoot asked Withers if he drew overtime. Answer was "No", but my mca draw straight time when they are called out at night. Councilman Smoot then moved the matter be tabled and given further consideration at the next meeting.

Atty. Jones reminded the council that the police department should not be expected to

produce revenue to match its cost. The town does not want speed trap or anything like that, when things are quiet around town the department is doing its best work.

Marshal Morales reminded the council of several instances when he could have been shot to death while taking robbers into custody. Also that recent break-ins in Carrizozo had been solved almost immediately.

Other business of the evening included going over delinquent water bills. Withers was asked to get some action on these, either collect or turn water off. Jim Miller's lease on town building has expired and will not be renewed. Low bid on moving airport beacon tower approved.

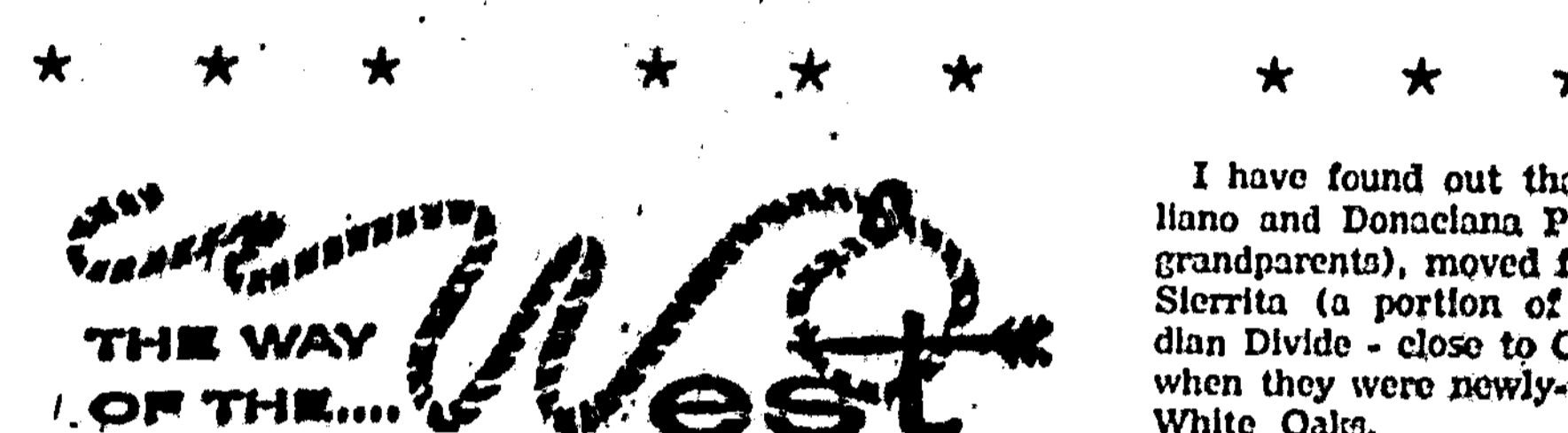

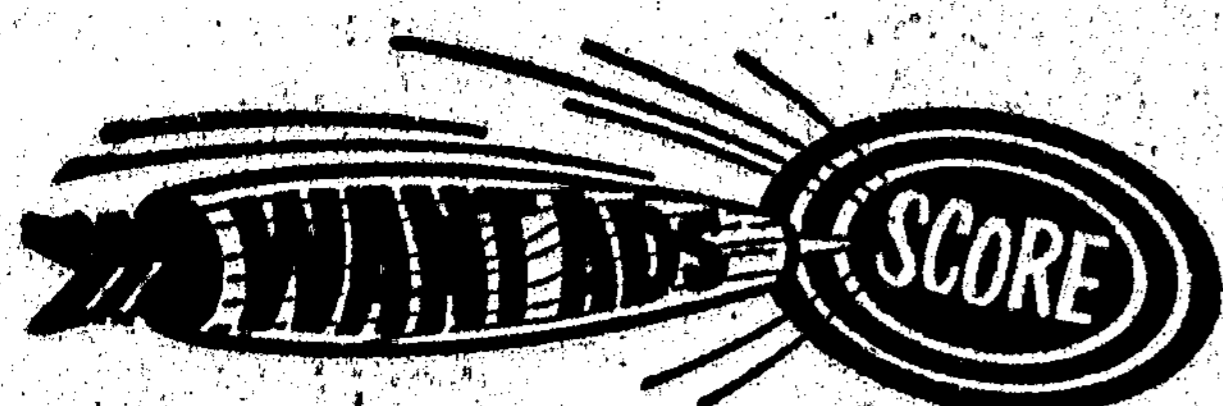

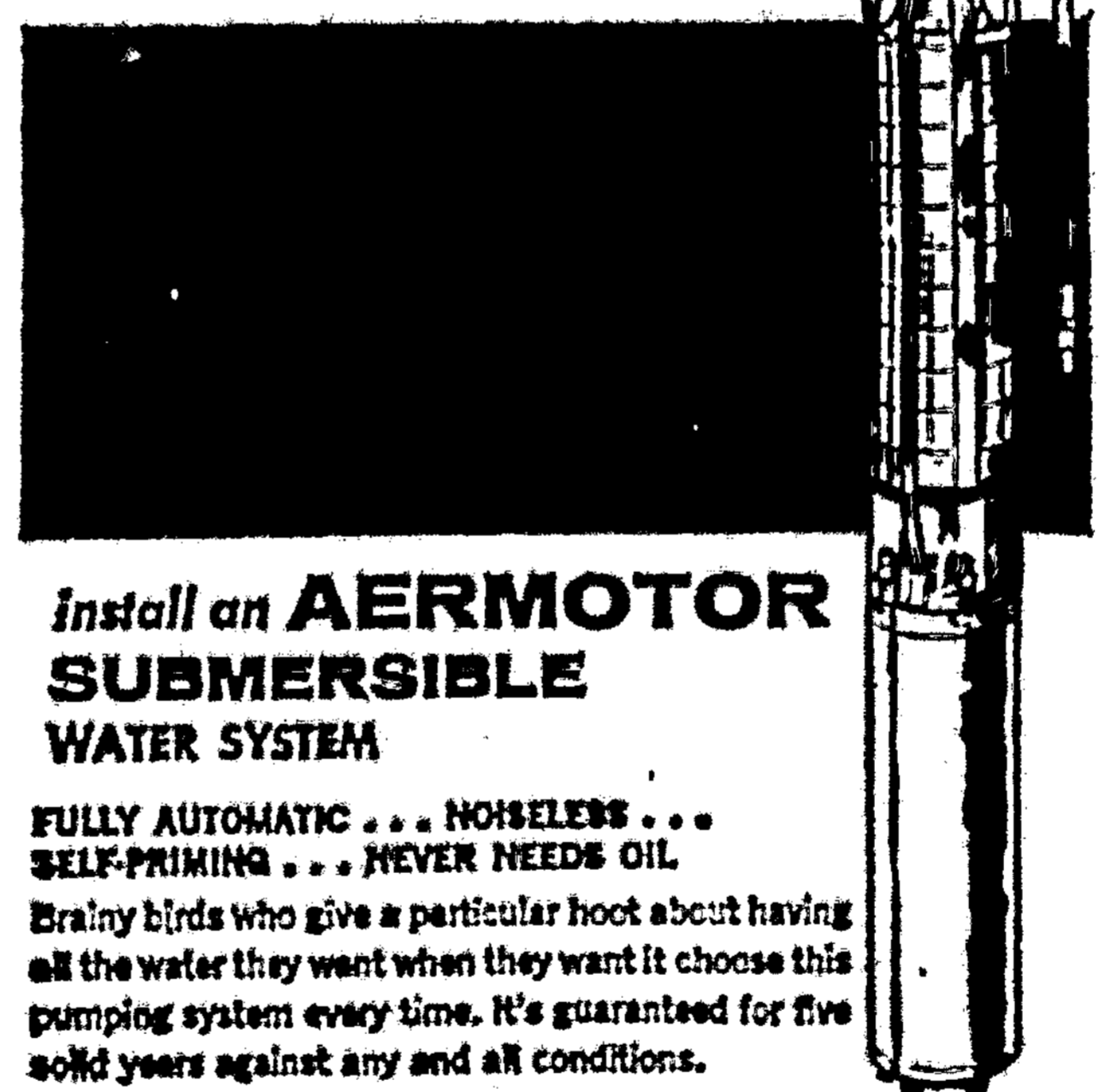
