Some doubt that Gene Lusk would keep Ben Mason as state budget chief

SANTA FE — Recently State Budget Chief Ben Mason and Gov. Jack Campbell were blasted for a plan that would send Mason to college for one year under an "award program."

The extra education is marvelous, but Gov. Campbell said Mason would continue to draw his \$15,000 per year salary while attending college.

Mason was selected for the "award" because he is "top level" government material.

In defense of the plan, Administration officials pointed out that in several areas state employees attend school to better qualify them for their jobs.

Basic Difference Not Pointed Out

It hasn't been pointed out, but it should be.

The "other state employees" who attended school are under the personnel act and work in such departments as Health, Welfare, etc.

Their jobs are protected, but additionally they sign a contract to work with the state two years upon completing the prescribed schooling. And while they're at school they attend at "reduced" pay.

Now consider Mason's case. He is not under the personnel system but rather is appointed by the Governor. He plans to accept the \$15,000 salary but will not be under contract to the state because it's hard to tell now who will be Governor when Mason returns with his new degree in hand.

Gov. Campbell has endorsed former State Sen. Gene Lusk, but Lusk has never gushed forth about any fondness for Mason, and it's doubtful he would keep the chief.

If former Gov. John Burroughs becomes the new Chief it's a lead - pipe cinch Mason won't be back and Mason has hardly created such a sterling record that GOP Reps. Cliff Hawley or Dave Carzo would appoint him to anything despite the fact he's been a top boy in the Demo clan.

The whole idea is not to be little education, but few taxpayers will be happy about seeing Ben skip off to college at \$15,000 per year from the state.

New State Senate Causes Big Problem

Reapportionment of the State Senate has caused some problems in the Capital.

Secretary of State Alberta Miller was forced to be late in preparing the paper work for the elections in the new multi-county districts and because of the forced late overload says they'll whiz in too close to the deadline. The "only thing" that could be worse now will be a "recount."

Late Charges Hit On Schedule

The waning days of the campaign among Demos found Lusk banging away at Burroughs for previous "scandal" and Burroughs blasting back for "unpopularity."

Both Demos hit Albuquerque as the final stage of campaigning, but this was deemed unwise by some top political moguls. Albuquerque, with 27 percent of the state's vote, is expected to be split. But some major areas in the north and east are still open to question.

Cash Involved Becomes Joke

Amount of money being spent by Demos as opposed to GOPs has become somewhat of a gag around the Capital.

Burroughs and Lusk have pumped in large sums while Hawley and Carzo, have, of necessity, been forced to skimp.

The clincher came when Burroughs arrived at a candidates conference with his public relations men, pilot, etc. Carzo arrived with one man who was a wire service reporter covering the event.

Carzo backers unaware of the situation later became critical of the lone newsmen with Carzo. They said he wasn't shaking enough hands and Carzo should get a new man.

Contests center around governor and judge

The primary election of 1966 has not been as hot as some previous campaigns but there are several real contests to be decided May 3 and Lincoln County voters can easily be the deciding factor in more than one race.

The News' opinion is that the race for governor between Gene Lusk and John Burroughs is going right down to the wire and will be close, both in the county and in the state.

The Republican candidate for governor Clifford J. Hawley should easily carry Lincoln Co. and we believe has an edge over David F. Carzo state-wide.

Democrats can take their pick of lieutenant governors, either Fabian Chavez, Jr., or Jack Jones. Democrats also have a choice for corporation commissioner, Floyd Cross or Edward Murphy.

Lincoln County will not get too excited over the race for senator or representative, except that come in the general election the county's two legislators, Sen. Joe Skeen and Rep. W. G. Shreengost (unopposed in the primary) will be campaigning against the primary winners.

The News gives George Abbott the edge over Irvin James Huntzinger, both from Alamogordo, and both candidates for state senator in District 23. Aubrey L. Dunn, Democrat of Alamogordo is unopposed in the primary in District 24.

Skeen will oppose the Huntzinger - Abbott winner, Republican Lester Hayden will oppose Dunn in the general.

Lincoln County is paired with Sierra County in the state representative voting. Two Democrats from T or C are contesting to get in the finals against Republican Shreengost, W. E. Ryan and Leon Johnson are doing most of their primary campaigning at home.

The district judge race, as hot as any in the primary, will all be settled next Tuesday. There are no Republican candidates. William W. Bivins was first in the campaign, even before it became known that Judge W. T. Scoggin would not run again.

After Scoggin counted himself out, Edward Triviz filed in Division I. We give Bivins the edge in the north part of the district which includes Lincoln, Otero and Dona Ana Counties.

Richard A. Stanley is a candidate for judge in Division II opposing the incumbent George L. Zimmerman.

County Democrats have only one real race, that of Mary K. Lynch now chief deputy treasurer, and Lewis Cummins, former treasurer.

The only contest on the voting machines for Republicans is the Hawley-Carzo race.

Three precincts will be voting on paper ballots, Nogal, Bonito and Ancho.

Justice of Peace candidates are Santiago Herrera in Pet. 2 and James Wherry in Pet. 13. Republicans, Leo Joiner Pet. 2, K. A. Huey Pet. 9, Alton Gray Pet. 10, R. L. Sherrill Pet. 14, and Harold Graham Pet. 19, Democrats. Bert Judia is the only constable candidate in Pet. 10.

Above mentioned speakers explained fully the various phases and types of programs available to Lincoln County through the Economic Opportunity Act. They also stressed the need for a County Board made up of representatives of various groups and elements from each municipality or village in the county. Each community has the authority to decide which type of

project is best suited for them; however, the project has to be approved by the County Board before the Office of Economic Opportunity can give approval.

A question, answer and discussion period followed. It was the desire of everyone present to appoint a temporary County Action Group and attempt to stir up more interest in each community. This temporary committee was as follows:

Burroughs, Lusk will visit Zozo

Mr. Hollis Cummins, county coordinator for Ex - Governor Burroughs for Governor, has stated that Mr. Burroughs will be in Carrizozo, Thursday April 28th at the Four Winds Restaurant for a coffee from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

All persons wishing to meet Mr. Burroughs are urged to attend the coffee.

Mrs. Fern Dunn, Lincoln County Chairwoman has announced that Mr. Lusk, Democratic candidate for Governor on the Democratic ticket subject to the primary election will be in Carrizozo at a coffee at the Four Winds Restaurant Thursday afternoon from 2:00 to 3:30 to meet the voters in Carrizozo and vicinity.

Few doubt need of reappraisal, how many want it is question!

At a meeting in the commissioner's room in Carrizozo last week, county, school, and town officials heard Jesse Kornegay, chairman of the state tax commission, and James Wheelock, assistant, explain House Bill No. 33 which created a special reappraisal fund, and prescribed certain duties of the tax commission, county assessors and boards of equalization.

The Act is an effort to encourage New Mexico counties to have a reappraisal of all real estate for the purpose of bringing about equality and uniformity in property tax and assuring property owners that they are paying their fair share of the tax burden.

The fund created by the Act amounts to \$1,000,000.00 which will finance a county - by - county reappraisal. The state may pay up to 50% of costs and may loan balance to counties if necessary.

Lincoln County commissioners Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer have the option of contracting to have a reappraisal done, or taking no action on this issue.

If a reappraisal contract is signed prior to July 1, 1966, there will be a return to schools in the county of 1 mill of last year's assessed valuation. When the reappraisal is completed and new values entered on the tax rolls there will be a return to

the county of two mills, split two ways, 17 to school and 3 to county. This is called incentive money.

Major utilities in the county, such as railroad and gas company, are assessed by the state and would not be affected by the reappraisal.

The level of assessment in the county, now thought to vary from as low as 10% of value up to 33%, was not made clear except that assessments in Lincoln County should match reasonably close the assessments in other parts of the state. Kornegay said there was a possibility that taxes could be reduced for people now paying normal rates if the reappraisal were completed.

The next meeting of Lincoln County commissioners is set for May 10 and they are inviting tax payers in at 2:00 p.m. for the purpose of discussing reappraisal.

One of the big hazards in any growth area, such as the resort part of Lincoln County, is that improvements are made so fast the tax assessor has no chance to keep up.

When and if a reappraisal were completed, property owners would have the opportunity to discuss the appraisal of their property. None of the rights of the property owner or appeal procedures are to be affected by this work.

County reappraising would be done on contract with one of several firms in this business. It is expected that people doing the work would be experienced at their job. According to the explanation given at the meeting, the value of properties would be determined by using all the pertinent factors, such as type of land, number of buildings, location, present day cost, depreciation, past sales, type of road, distance from trading center, etc.

Richard graduated last year 1965 from Capitan High School, and was very active in all sports, was a player on football team and basketball.

The remains will arrive some time this week in Carrizozo from Oklahoma after all investigations are made regarding the crash. Arrangements will be announced later after arrival. Lucas - Wooten Chapel Of Rest Mortuary is in charge.

Second volcanic eruption possible at state park dedication

SANTA FE — Valley of Fires State Park, 460 acres of malpais stemming from an ancient lava flow, will be dedicated May 6 on US-380 three miles west of Carrizozo.

The park will be the 17th in the growing state system. The State Park and Recreation Commission has installed 20 individual camping-picnicking shelters with tables, benches and fireplaces, a group shelter with a capacity of 100 persons, six fiberglass toilets, a water system and playground equipment at a cost of \$26,000.

The park's first custodian Guadalupe Ortega, is on duty at the site.

The park is on an elevated "island" in the huge flow area that extends from north of Carrizozo southwest through a valley toward Tularosa.

Indian legend holds the area once was a "Valley of Fire." A great eruption turned the land into many fires. Red hot lava flowed like water, searing everything before it. The river of fire, steam and smoke surged down the valley.

A fire stimulating the ancient volcanic eruption will burn during the dedicatory program.

The main speaker will be Lt. Gov. Mack Easley of Hobbs. Also set to speak are John L. Gray, Deming, chairman of the State Park and Recreation Commission, and John Elliott, state parks superintendent.

Also taking part will be Carrizozo Mayor Leandro Vega and Capitan Mayor J. C. Germany. Carrizozo and Capitan high school bands will play before the program begins. Carrizozo Boy Scouts will raise the colors.

The park will be open to the public for picnicking prior to the start of the program. Concession stands will be operated by the Carrizozo Woman's Club and Beta Sigma Phi.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is in charge of arrangements. Paul Fayost is arrangements committee chairman, assisted by Mrs. Johnson Stearns and Glen Bradley, all of Carrizozo.

The State Park and Recreation Commission will meet at Carrizozo before the dedicatory program. Commission members and other dignitaries will be guests at a luncheon at the Carrizozo Woman's Club and the

program will start at 1:30 p. m. at the park.

The legislature created Valley of Fires State Park in 1953. Sponsors of the authorizing bill were Reps. William Shreengost, R - Lincoln, Jeff Good, D - De Baca, and David F. Carzo, R - Bernalillo and former Reps. Harry Allen, D - San Juan, and Fred Boone, D - Roosevelt.

The legislation appropriated \$1600 to purchase land for the park from the Bureau of Reclamation under terms of the Federal Recreation Act. The acreage was in the public domain.

FARM NEWS

UNIVERSITY PARK, N. M. — The number of youths enrolled in horsemanship programs has nearly tripled in the past five years and the trend is expected to continue, a national spokesman said Saturday.

Dale Burnett, youth activities director for the American Quarter Horse Association, speaking to more than 200 horse enthusiasts at the annual Horsemens' Clinic on the New Mexico State campus, said that 4-H continues to lead the field of youth organizations with 146,000 youngsters enrolled in horse projects. Boy Scouts of America has 35,000 enrolled, AQHA-sponsored youth activity shows have 10,000 young people in competition, and Future Farmers of America has included horse production in classroom instruction. Altogether there are some 215,000 youngsters taking part in organized horsemanship activities, he said.

But, he warned of trouble ahead "unless adults stop making compulsive winners out of our youngsters."

"Many youngsters try so hard to please their parents that all

the fun is lost, the pressure becomes too great for them and they either try too hard or make excuses for their failures," Burnett said.

His solution to the problem— "Let the youngsters win, or accept defeat, and be happy with wherever they place."

Attending the one-day clinic were officials of the New Mexico Quarter Horse Association, including President L. R. Hammond of Clovis. About one-half of the participants were youngsters enrolled in 4-H and FFA projects. The event was sponsored by NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service and the New Mexico Quarter Horse Association.

If you prefer soil as a medium for starting garden and flower seeds, you'll likely have better plants if you disinfect the soil first.

To get disease-free plants, you must start with soil free of disease-causing organisms. Small amounts of soil can be prepared at home, using your own soil mixture, screening it to remove large pieces of organic material and lumps. The mixture shouldn't be too wet or too dry. You can tell the proper moisture content by squeezing a handful into a ball; if it crumbles when touched with your finger, you know it is

about right.

Place the soil mixture in a wood flat or similar container not more than 4 or 5 inches deep. Then bury a small potato, about 1-1/2 inches in diameter, in the center. Heat the mixture in an oven at 200 degrees until the potato is well cooked. Remove from the oven and cool before using.

Use caution when handling disinfected soil to prevent recontamination with disease-causing organisms. They will build up rapidly because competing beneficial organisms are not present.

Tools and containers also should be disinfected by washing in hot water and household detergent to remove traces of old soil and disease-causing organisms.

A meeting for ladies interested in starting a Home Demonstration club will be held on May 3rd at 7:00 p.m. in the County Commissioners room in the Courthouse. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

They are using mowers to prune apple and peach trees in Colorado. They have mounted a mower on a tractor loader and are topping the trees at about 12 feet high. One grower is using it to also prune the sides of the tree.

The growers claim that "flat-top" mowing lets more light into the tree and improves the fruit. For more particulars get the May Farm Journal.

They are feeding oyster shells as a substitute for roughage in the fattening ration of cattle. They use one pound of oyster shell for four to ten pounds of hay and are getting cheaper gains. Although this is on a trial basis, results so far indicate it will not hurt the cattle and at the same time reduce cost of gain.

WASHINGTON — A letter written nearly 85 years ago to the sheriff who shot Billy the Kid was finally delivered this week, the Post Office said Friday.

It was sent to the son of Pat F. Garrett, the sheriff of Lincoln County in New Mexico Territory who is credited with gunning down the famous outlaw in 1881.

A Post Office spokesman said the letter was sent to Jarvis F. Garrett, a retired oil company official in Albuquerque, N. M.

There was no explanation of what happened to the letter from the time it was postmarked, June 25, 1881, at Carrizozo, New Mexico Territory, until it

showed up at the main Post Office in Los Angeles on July 14, 1964.

It was finally dispatched to Jarvis Garrett after Post Office lawyers decided his claim to the document was valid. A sister, Miss Pauline Garrett, joined her brother in seeking possession of the letter.

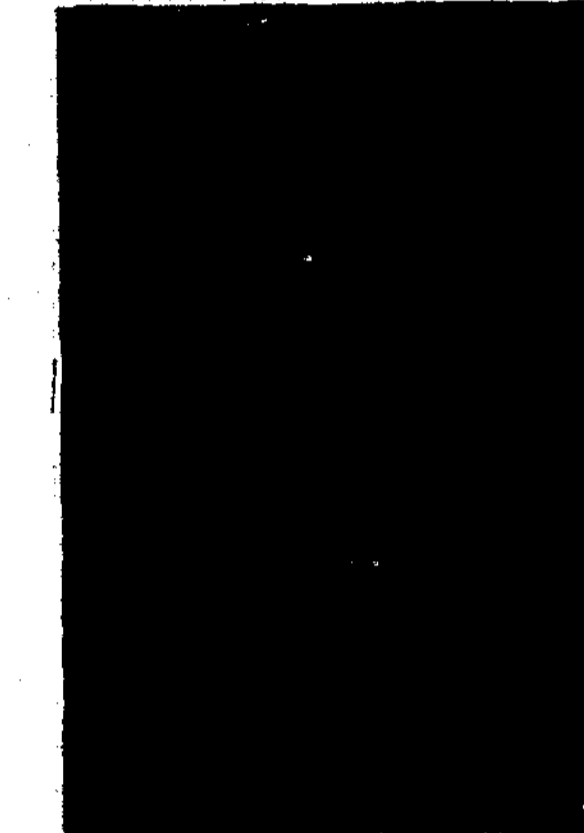
They learned of its existence through newspaper reports at the time it was found.

A Post Office spokesman said Jarvis opened the letter and learned it was sent by Zeferino Saenz of Aabala, New Mexico Territory. Jarvis reported Saenz wrote to Sheriff Garrett about Billy the Kid's visit to Aabala and his reported whereabouts.

It was about three weeks later — on July 14, 1881 — that Billy the Kid was shot by the sheriff at Fort Sumner in the New Mexico Territory. He had escaped from jail in Lincoln County a year earlier.

His real name was William F. Bonney and he was 22 when Garrett's bullets ended his career.

Selective Service tests clarified

In response to a number of inquiries as to the eligibility of non-college students to take the forthcoming Selective Service College Qualification Test was provided today by Maj. General John P. Jolly, State Director of Selective Service System for New Mexico.

Registrants who are high school seniors or graduates, and who are enrolled or plan to enroll in a technical or vocational school, institute, or business college, and who intend to request an occupational deferment on the basis of pursuit of educational goals at such an institution, are also eligible to take the forthcoming Selective Service College Qualification Test.

Postal savings

all over in March

Postmaster Tom Zumwalt of Nogal urges depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Office as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President B. Johnson. Postmaster Ted Zumwalt pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

The Postmaster said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

entered the regular army in the Coast Artillery Corps and spent two years of service in France as a Captain and was awarded the French Decoration of the Croix de Guerre with Palm.

On his return to civilian life, he spent several years at George Washington University where he received his B.A. and M.A. in history. Later he attended the Fine Arts Department of Harvard University studying museum directorship and was also awarded an M.A. degree. Additional art history courses were taken at the University of Paris.

In 1931 he was called to Kansas City, Missouri, to supervise the architectural completion of the William Rockhill Nelson Gallery and to initiate the collections there which now rank among the ten leading museums in the United States. He was appointed Director in 1933.

These duties were interrupted by World War II when in 1942, Gardner was given a leave of absence to join the Allied Military Government of the Army. He spent three years in Italy as a Lieutenant Colonel, supervising the Monuments and Fine Arts section and worked in Naples, Rome, Florence and Genova.

In 1941 he purchased the Las Milpas ranch at San Patricio as a summer home. The almost one hundred year old house - said to have been frequented often by Billy the Kid - was entirely restored and Gardner retired to it when he left the Nelson Gallery in 1953. Since that time, he has spent his winters in Europe and summers in San Patricio, and for several years, he directed the pageant of The Last Escape of Billy the Kid.

Gardner has extensive plans for creating greater interest and attendance at the Courthouse Museum. These include special guided visits for school children, changing small exhibitions that will illustrate earlier civilizations such as Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Chinese, etc., and temporary loan exhibitions of all branches of history and art.
