After giving governor candidate Gene Lusk a big majority 630-349 Lincoln County Democrats rode more losers than they will most years.

Jones for lieutenant governor carried Lincoln 439-382 but lost statewide. Stanley and Triviz both lost in Lincoln County but won their races for district judge. Stanley with 2259 in Otero and 3363 in Dona Ana over Zimmerman with 2219 and 2270. Triviz had 1975 in Otero and 4789 in Dona Ana over Bivins with 1764 and 2915.

Lincoln County Republicans did about the same, governor candidate Cliff Hawley won every precinct in Lincoln except Ancho where he tied with Dave Cargo who will be the Republican candidate for governor. The only contest on the entire Republican ticket was for governor.

Inside The Capital Appointments to come are crucial

SANTA FE — For what it's worth, a column occasionally has its extreme disadvantage of time.

For instance, this column had to be written before the primary elections, and so when it's published the Democrats and Republican candidates will have been announced, discussed, cussed, etc.

It's a good time, however, to point out that some crucial appointments will be made during the next few weeks.

Neither the Demo nor the Republican hopeful would venture to state publicly who their top sides would be if they were elected.

By history, these top aides play a major role in future actions by the administration.

The sooner such names can be pried from the candidates, the sooner it will be possible to discover what direction in certain areas the administration will take.

Gov. Jack Campbell had top aide Jerry Brasher, Brasher is Bernalillo County Chairman and on several occasions some advice and help was geared for Albuquerque.

Despite the population of Albuquerque, there's a bulk of the remainder of the state that also needs attention.

It's certainly something to watch for.

Battle Of Tax Education Seen
Hopefuls for the top spots in state government have also been harangued on the "quality education" issue.

The fact that taxes may have to be raised to meet any semblance of improvement in "quality education" has been painfully ignored.

All persons seeking office have been explicit in the effort to be general about "what may happen" later.

Any "specifics" about the future should be welcomed and also carefully eyed.

Relative to the recent statement about top aides to the Governor, it's still being noted that Bernalillo County produced a large and impressive delegation in a bid for money to improve "quality education."

The money eventually was funneled into pay raises for Albuquerque teachers.

The teachers undoubtedly deserved a raise, but taxpayers all over the state may have to pay the bill for the single area.

Money Available Is Major Dispute
Recently even U.S. Sen. Joe Montoya pushed a sparkling plan to the classroom teachers' association.

Again in generalities, Little Joe said "Education is the fountainhead of understanding and communication."

He then railed forth with financial figures regarding federal legislation that has provided "unprecedented" opportunities for creative new educational programs.

Any good speech writer could produce the above flowery phrases. But the people with the pencils have figured that for New Mexico it's not that easy.

With the appropriations from the last session, the money will cover some salary raises. It's been stretched to include some extra teachers and added facilities.

But in hard facts, the income of the state will have to go up if the improvement in education is to be maintained.

Four bands, picnic in park, 'eruption' on dedication day

With only the order for some good May weather to be filled, plans for the dedication of the Valley of Fire State Park three miles west of Carrizozo on U.S. 390 highway are complete.

The program will start with band music and picnicking in the park at 12:00 noon. The Capitan high school band of 33 musicians, directed by Mr. Bartley McDonough, will play a 20 minute concert starting promptly at 12:00. The band will be set up in front of the large group shelter at the park.

People of Lincoln County and the area around are invited to take their picnic lunch to the park, enjoy an hour of band music, visit with your friends and neighbors and be there for the dedication program. Gamma Beta Phi sorority will have a booth at the park where sandwiches, snack food and drinks will be sold.

Following the concert by the Capitan band, the Corona high school band of 42 musicians, directed by Miss Sherrill Perkins will play a 20 minute concert then the Carrizozo Grizzly band, directed by Mr. Arnold Boyce will continue the "concert in the park" up until 1:00 p.m.

Somewhere around 1:00 p.m. a long-anticipated event should happen. People around Carrizozo have talked about a second eruption of the Mal Pais volcano about as long as there

have been people around these parts. The volcano is expected to erupt for the second time in history on May 6, 1966 — your vantage point to view this spectacle should be in the new Valley of Fire State Park. Be there at 12:00 noon and you won't miss it.

The U. S. Army Band from Ft. Bliss, directed by M/Sgt Byers, will take the band stand at 1:00 p.m. and will play for about twenty minutes, then march to the high point in the park and perform the flag ceremony at 1:30 which will start the dedication program.

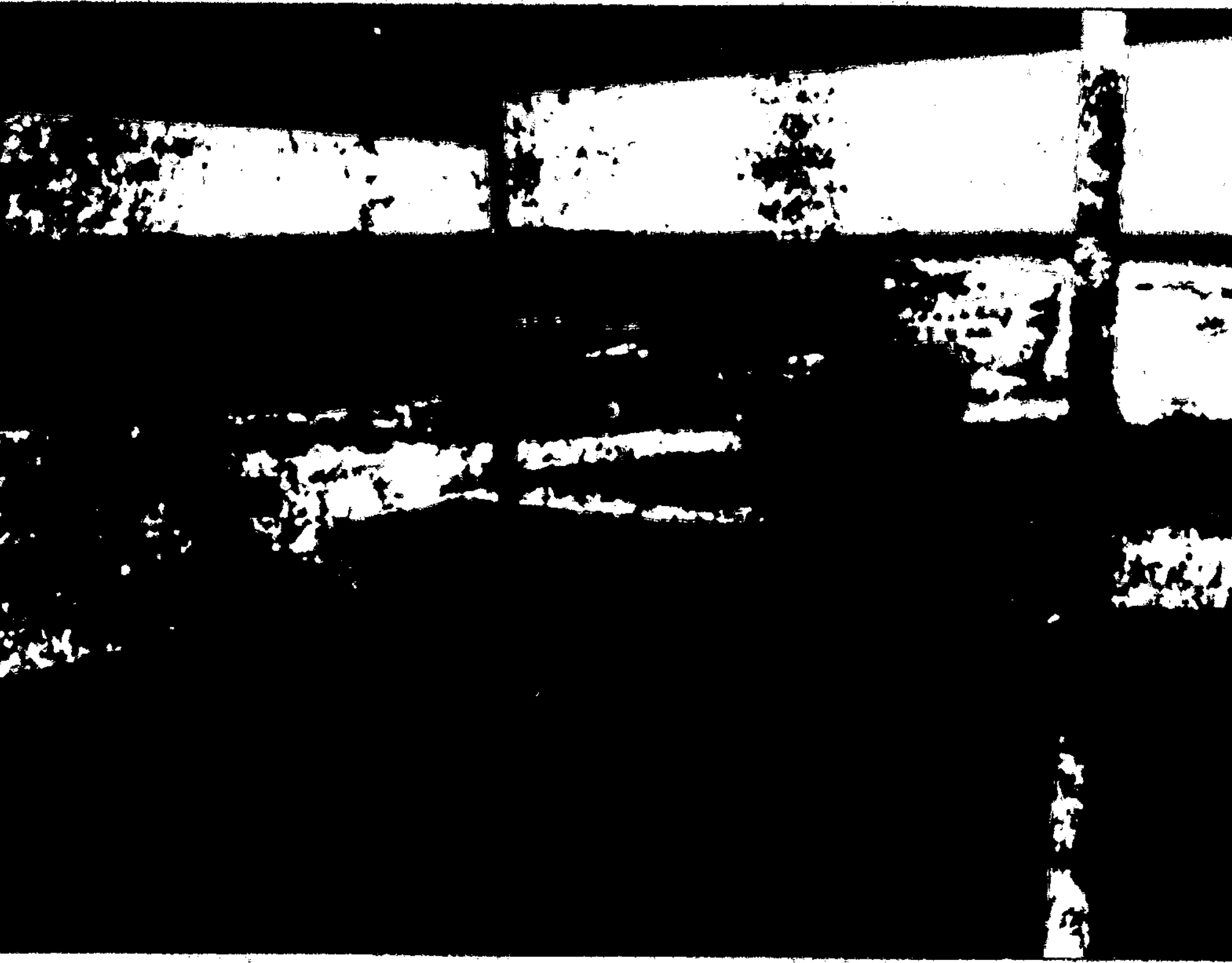
Special guest speaker at the dedication will be Lt. Gov. Mack Easley of Hobbs, expected to arrive in Carrizozo at noon. Lt. Gov. Easley will be introduced by Milt Andrus of the Department of Development who will act as master of ceremonies. Mrs. C. A. Snow of Carrizozo will be recognized as one of the early boosters for the park.

The New Mexico State Park Commission will hold its regular meeting in Carrizozo at the Woman's Club building starting at 9:00 a.m., and will view their new park and attend the dedication service.

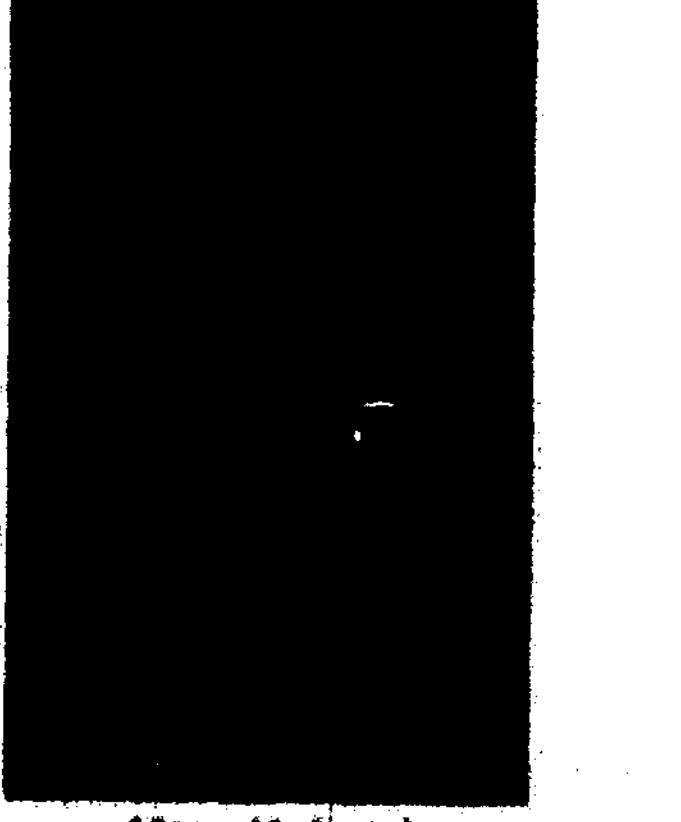

George Abbott, Democratic candidate for state senator to represent Lincoln and Otero counties, won a close one in Lincoln over Irvin Huntzinger 423-310 where neither candidate was well known. Abbott snowed his opponent in Otero, winning 3171 to 1006. Abbott will oppose Joe Skeen, Republican Senator from Lincoln County, in the general election.

Louise Runnels, assessor candidate, beat Austin Wooten, probate judge candidate, by one vote to take high honors at the polls among county candidates. Runnels 660, Wooten 659. U. S. Senator Clinton Anderson was high man on the ballot with 714 votes.

Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr., uncontested in both primary and general, was high among Republican county candidates with 314 votes. Cliff Hawley received 320.

Home Economics program specialists visit Home Ec Department in Zozo

Miss Johnnie Christian, Home Economics Program Specialist from Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Catherine D. Myers, State Supervisor of Home Education, New Mexico, recently visited the Home Economics Department of the Carrizozo High School.

Miss Christian is making a study throughout the nation of schools which are offering programs of work - study under the Vocational Education Act of 19-63. Carrizozo and Rio Grande High School in Albuquerque are the only two schools in the state which are offering such programs this school year.

Miss Christian spoke in glowing terms of the home economics department in Carrizozo. She also was highly impressed with the new course as it is being set up and administered. The title of the Carrizozo course is "Wage Earning with Home Economics Knowledge and Skills." Thirteen junior and senior girls are enrolled in the class which is being taught by Emma Catherine Lawson. During the second semester (the period of on-the-job training) five girls are receiving training as nurses aides at the hospital, three as cafeteria and food workers at the school cafeteria, and five as seamstresses with special emphasis on drapery making in the home economics classroom.

"A page for independent thought"

Carrizozo a town with a future

Carrizozo, one hundred and forty-four miles north of El Paso on the El Paso and Southwestern railroad, a railroad division point, the shipping station for the principal mining districts of Lincoln county, surrounded by rich agricultural district just now beginning its development, is one of the most promising towns not only in Lincoln County, but in all eastern New Mexico. The town was founded in August, 1906. At that time it boasted a railroad station and nothing else. Today Carrizozo has a population of more than 1,500 and is growing rapidly. Now the principal town in the county, it is likely to become one of the principal centers of population in the eastern section.

This paragraph above was copied from a booklet "Lincoln County" published by authority of the Bureau of Immigration of New Mexico 1909.

Nearly 50 years later as Carrizozo pauses to dedicate a state park near its city limits, the town remains one hundred and forty-four miles north of El Paso — a town with a future — other things have changed.

The division point is long gone, passenger service the next to go, then crews that overnight in Carrizozo, and a reasonable expectation is that Zo Zo SP station will become a whistle stop.

Open range around Carrizozo is good agricultural country, but it was never intended for dry farming. Farmers in the area following 1909 found out the hard way what this country is best suited for, mainly sheep and cattle. No ore of consequence has been shipped out of Carrizozo in several decades.

After 50 years of almost static 1500 population the trend has taken a down turn, probably no more than 1400 people here today. No particular reason to expect population in-

As long as enough people in Carrizozo put personal gain before progress there will be no progress.

Yes, we think Carrizozo has a future. A bunch of small people simply cannot beat a country such as Lincoln County with its natural beauty, wonderful climate, and untapped resources.

We think the way will come when Carrizozo people will haul off their junk and make their town as neat and attractive as the new park to be dedicated Friday. 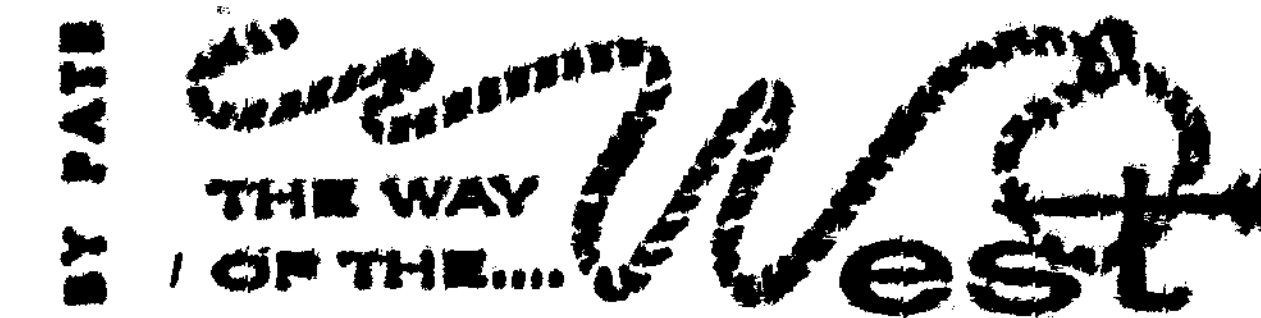

Book Review

'Day of Trinity' is interesting

The dramatic story of the atomic explosion in July 1945 near Carrizozo made good copy for author Lansing Lamont and he has produced a book full of small details, mention of men forgotten and a graphic description of the event that opened the nuclear age.

We recommend you read "Day of Trinity" first because it is interesting reading, second because the event centered near Carrizozo, third because you'll have a little better idea of problems confronting the world today.

We don't question the accuracy of the author too much even though he mentions taxis in Carrizozo. They were having trouble with short wave radio communication and a dozen or more cars in Carrizozo could possibly have picked up conversations at Trinity Site. The author must have talked to a lot of people, none in Carrizozo.

We were fascinated by the mechanics of fitting the bomb together, and do not understand too well even now, but we have a much better understanding of the working parts.

The author is in sympathy with Robert Oppenheimer, the scientist who more or less gath-

ered up and kept at work the crew of scientists who produced the bomb—then had misgivings about his work after the job was done. We fully understand that a man can change his thinking in a course of years, a part of maturity, and full understanding comes to only a few.

You will get some of the excitement of keeping the operation a secret. That there were no major news leaks is unusual. You will also recognize that security measures can be wasted too.

There is another message in the book — be patient with dreamers — some of them are changing the course of mankind.

wounds and maggots now and continue to check animals and treat wounds throughout the year. This year can be the year that screwworms are completely eradicated if everyone will work together.

How lucky can you get? That is what 4-H Club members are asking when they talk about a new 4-H medal designed with a four-leaf clover encircled by a horse shoe. It is the county medal to be awarded to the top boys and girls participating in the 4-H Horse program.

Two excellent manuals about horsemanship have been written and made available to 4-H Clubs. The publications were produced jointly by Extension specialists and the American Quarter Horse Association.

The illustrated 50-page books cover just about everything including a concise chart on the 13 light horse breeds and a glossary of "horse talk." Also presented are an explanation of anatomic terms; how to care for tack and equipment; health and safety and judging of horses in the show ring.

Of course, the best planned program and most complete text material will be of little value unless 4-H Horse Clubs are organized under the leadership of local horse fanciers, veterinarians or other qualified adults. Volunteer leaders are badly needed.

If you enjoy working with young people and like horses, you will find the time spent with the 4-H Horse program most rewarding.

Last week I visited with some fruit growers in the Honda area and looked at the orchards. The prospects for an apple crop look good. There is a light set of red delicious apples in some orchards. The Golden Delicious and Jonathon trees have too many apples, and will need to be thinned. Use Sevin in the calyx and fruit - covered spray will help to thin these trees.

Let's have quality apples this fall. To do this, you must follow a complete, thorough spray schedule. Once the worm gets into the apple it's too late. Fruit spray schedules are available in the County Agent's office. Let me know and I will send you one.

Boys 14 to 18 years of age who want to learn more about conservation may pick up application blanks for a week-long camp.

The application blanks and literature on the camp are available at the County Extension Office in Carrizozo. Two boys from Lincoln County will be selected to attend Scott - Able Camp in the Sacramento Mountains near Weed.

Organizations wishing to sponsor boys from Lincoln County may get information on the procedure and cost at the Extension Office. The cost of the camp is nominal.

The camp, which will be under the direction of the New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service, will be August 14 - 20. Directors of the camp will be Charles Gay, NMSU extension range management specialist; C. D. Leedy, extension resource development specialist; and G. Jennings Jarvis, extension conservationist.

Boys attending the camp will study forestry, range management, soil and water conservation and wildlife management.

The staff for the camp will include, besides the Extension Service representatives, members of the U. S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Soil Conservation Service and the New Mexico Game and Fish Department.

Deadline for applications is June 15.

FARM NEWS

The screwworm is still a potential threat to New Mexico livestock. The potential for an outbreak of screwworms may be greater this year than ever before if ranchers fail to check for screwworms or fail to send in maggots for identification.

Only four maggots, non-screwworm, have been submitted for identification since January. This may mean that all fly activity has been reduced by cool weather, so that no maggots are infesting wounds. It may also mean that no one is checking cattle, horses, sheep, or pets for wounds and maggots.

If the screwworm eradication program is going to succeed, everyone who raises an animal should be on the alert for maggots in wounds. If a maggot is found, it should be collected and taken to the county agent, brand inspector, or veterinarian who will get it identified.

The goal of screwworm eradication has not been achieved yet, but it is within reach if livestock producers remain alert. A complacent attitude now could set the program back a long way. Start looking for

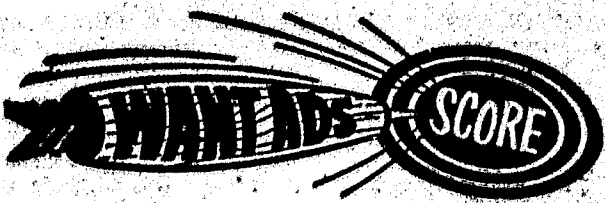

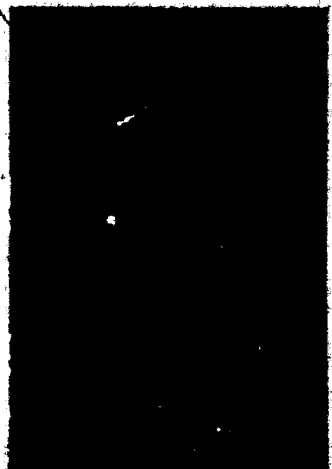
