

Citizens State Bank invites everyone to their openhouse

One of the most interesting and colorful places in and around Carrizozo, since it has been completely remodeled, is the bank building. With Kiel Bonnell as general ramrod and Ted and Mert Zumwalt doing much of the construction work, Bill Randall as head electrician and plumber Paul Wilson, what was known as the old bank building became a new bank building and looks exactly like several miracles happened in the same place.

The exterior is white, outlined with volcanic cinder panels. There are many colors to make up the interior view, red rug on the floor, cork wallboard, unusual wall paper, some white some mahaiis, some bronze, some shiny steel, all blended into one attractive scene and most unusual business office.

Johnson Stearns, vice president, has an office in front, next back is a coffee bar, then desk area for Clyde Haisten,

teller counters on the left and drive-in window on the right with new vault for safety deposit boxes and bookkeeping area in rear.

The master planner did not stop there. Down in what used to be a dark basement is now a bright and colorful work area. Outside is a paved area for drive-in customers and night deposit business.

It all adds up to a new bank, the bankers want you to come see it Saturday and are planning for a big openhouse from 10:00 to 1:00 at the Citizens State Bank in Carrizozo.

There will be three fancy door prizes. There will be corsages for the ladies, balloons for the youngsters and coffee and donuts all day.

The bank in Carrizozo traces its history back to September 9, 1935 when it was first opened as a branch of the bank in Vaughn. A E Huntsinger had first landed in this area in 1919

and bought stock in the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn. There were more cow paths than roads in this section of country at that time.

In telling of his early days in New Mexico Mr. Huntsinger remembered the high livestock prices following World War I and drop in prices in 1920-22 which put a bind on both ranch-

ers and banks. Many banks did not stand up through the 1920's, the number in the state dropping from 123 to about 40 in the early 1930's. Huntsinger and associates lost what money they had invested but borrowed and kept their credit in good shape. He said that he and his wife would not have made out during those times except for the insurance business he worked at.

The bank at Vaughn survived several robberies as well as bad times. In 1921 three men came into the bank pretending to cash a small check. Huntsinger told them the check was no good, the men left. That evening they shot and killed a store owner at Duran and were later hanged in Estancia.

In 1927 three men came in at 9:15 a.m. with pistols, made Huntsinger and Pete Sanchez a customer, he on the floor while they made off with \$1,200. Two were soon caught, the third

finally shot in a prison escape. In October 1933 a lone man held up Mr. and Mrs. Huntsinger in the bank. He was later nabbed and sent to prison for 40 years.

The Vaughn bank survived the bank holiday under President Franklin Roosevelt. Right after that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was formed. Not long after this period the bank gained permission to open a branch bank in Carrizozo, they did and continued to operate until the parent bank was sold to Jack Hobson, Dan W. King, Ted A. Bonnell, Gerald Dorsey Bonnell and Kenneth C. Bonnell. Hobson was later killed in a plane crash.

The Citizens State Bank under the management of Johnson Stearns, has made nice growth and progress. They offer all the services a bank should offer and pride themselves on being a vital part of one of the best towns in the southwest.

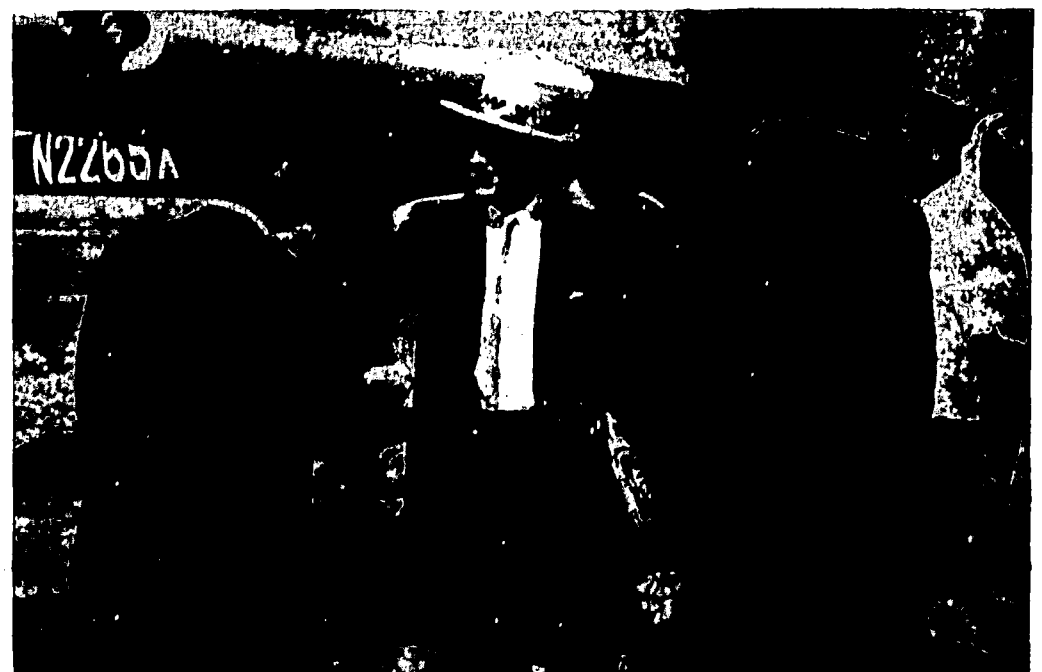
Zozo track team third at district

Permanent committee to be formed May 16

The purpose of the organization is to make possible the functioning of the Economic Opportunity Act in Lincoln County. Officers from the State Planning Office, and the EOA Office are expected.

The meeting should begin at 7:30 p.m. and last to 9:00 p.m.

Meeting in Carrizozo Tuesday the Capitán Carrizozo Natural Gas Association board of directors voted to set May 16 as the final day for sign up with the Association for the \$20 fee. After May 16, and clear up until the gas pipeline goes by your residence individuals may get natural gas service — but the cost of tie-on is going to be much higher.

Valton Hall member of the Association speaking for Capitán, said, "We're going to get ours," meaning that Capitán would get its full quota of signers.

The Carrizozo town council met Tuesday and voted a franchise and full support to the Association. Capitán Village council had previously taken this action.

Commissioners vote 2 to 1 for reappraisal

After a long meeting Tuesday afternoon at the courthouse when the only organized opposition to reappraisal of Lincoln County came from the Ruidoso Board of Realtors who said in a letter "No appreciable advantage can be seen to entering the program on a pell-mell do-it-yourself basis," Lincoln County commissioners voted 2-1 Oliver and Shafer for McKnight opposed, for reappraisal of the county.

House Bill 33 passed by the last legislature provides for the reappraisal of property throughout New Mexico to provide for an equalized property tax base. The law appropriated \$1 million to the tax commission to help pay the costs of the reappraisal and provides that the state may share in the cost in each county not to exceed 50%.

House Bill 33 also provides that "the county treasurer shall distribute to the school districts in the county the equivalent of 17 mills and to the county general fund the equivalent of 03 of one mill and shall deduct these amounts from the total due the state for general state purposes. This is incentive money to get counties to act voluntarily.

The Act provides that when any county enters into a contract with the state tax commission before July first, 1966, as Lincoln County will do, then there will be distributed from the state general fund to the school districts within that county an amount equivalent to what they could raise by a one mill levy.

The law provides that when the reappraisal has been completed by any county the reappraisal value shall be used for purpose of assessment. However, county commissioners have the right to set the percentage necessary to produce required operating funds for the county. Chairman Max Oliver stated that the county has just made

a preliminary budget of \$250,000 for Lincoln County and that is all the county will need, regardless of reappraisal.

Lon E. Nelson and Paul E. Smith, representing real estate appraisal firms were present and discussed process of reappraising the county. Such as fences tanks wells will be tough but they will be appraised, said the two men.

The Hondo Valley poses a special problem because so many tracts have a stump-to-rock, creek-to-tree, and river bank-to-little black dog sort of description. Much of this land will have to be surveyed, cost born by property owner, to get the property on the tax rolls properly.

Four proposals with bids, have been made to Lincoln County Commissioners. In this instance the bid price does not mean much because the services vary considerably and the commissioners are not required to take the low bid. The amounts ranged from a low of \$51,000 up to \$84,000.

The appraisers stressed the fact that income cost sales is one of the best approaches to value, and that farm and ranch land will be figured on productivity.

The reappraisal is expected to take from 14 to 16 months. No new tax figures expected to go on the tax rolls until 1968. There will be 10-12 local people employed to assist one trained field man, all under the guidance of an appraiser.

ASC Office is Busy Place

The ASC office in the court house was a busy place last week when an additional \$6,196.34 was issued on the Flood ACP program and a total of \$147,970.63 was paid in connection with the ACP Wool Payments.

The wool program is set up as an incentive to promote more wool in this country. This program is financed not with the taxpayers money but through tariff imposed on foreign wool.

An additional payment of \$1,273.24 in mohair payments was issued.

Our choir will bring a song of spring this Sunday, "Beauty of Earth." Choir rehearses every Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock at church.

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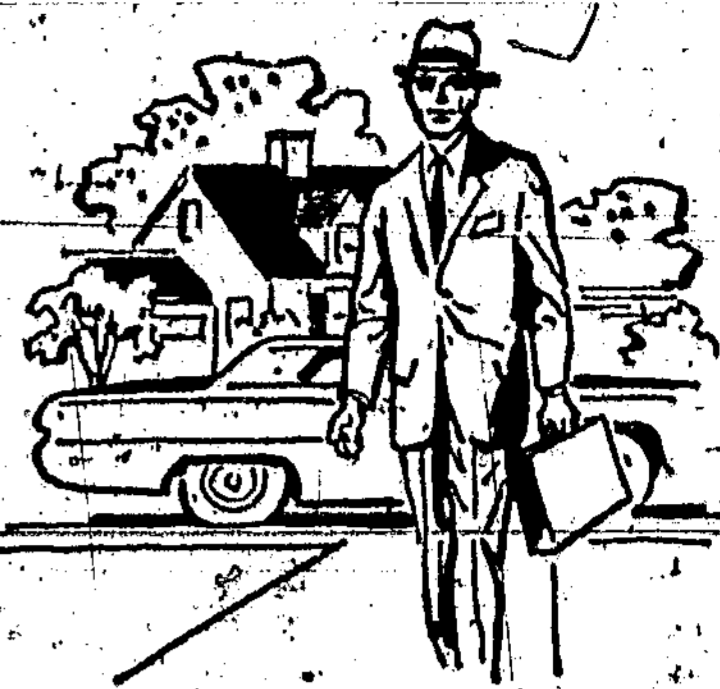

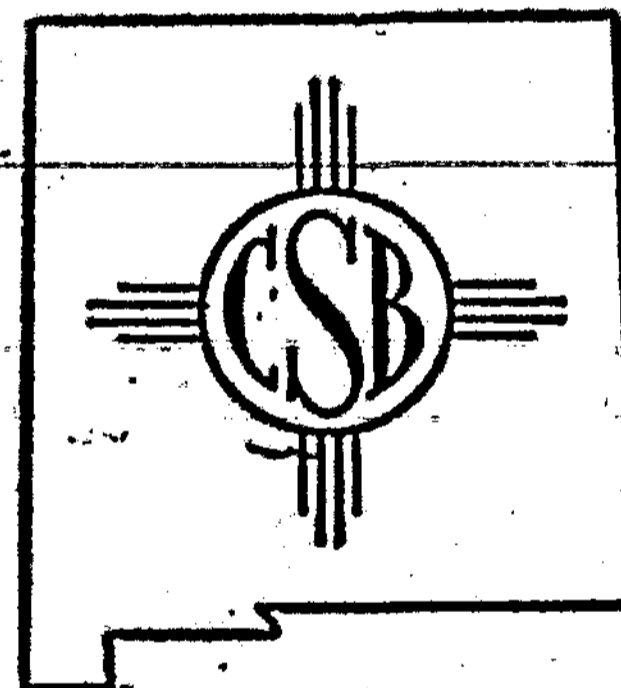

History of Corona school

The people of Corona have always recognized the importance of education and have been justly proud of their schools. Sunday, May 15, 1966, at 3 p.m. they are dedicating two new school buildings, adequately equipped to keep one step ahead of the modern trend while never neglecting the fundamentals.

The history of the area dates from about 1875, but the real development of the village dates from 1902 when the railroad was completed and a station established. Col. Frank A. DuBois came to Corona ahead of the railroad and filed an 160-acre tract of land, to which he was granted a patent signed by President Theodore R. Roosevelt on November 11, 1903.

Education was a family affair until Mr. J. A. Simpson hired a Miss Lee as governess for his children. Private teachers continued to be the most practical along the frontier, and other families adopted the practice.

The gymnasium was started in 1921, and before the roof was on the walls collapsed in a spring wind. Construction was finished, and the building burned in 1925. The present auditorium, long used for a gymnasium, was finished in 1926.

The high school building was built in 1931, and this building is to be razed this summer. The modern gymnasium and shop were constructed in 1951, the new lunch room in 1961.

Schools that were gradually absorbed into the system included: The Aspers, Brown, Red Cloud, Gallinas, Verney, Lon, Claunch, and Cedarvale.

The Corona School plant now covers two blocks in the main campus, five teaching, football field with grass, fence, and lights.

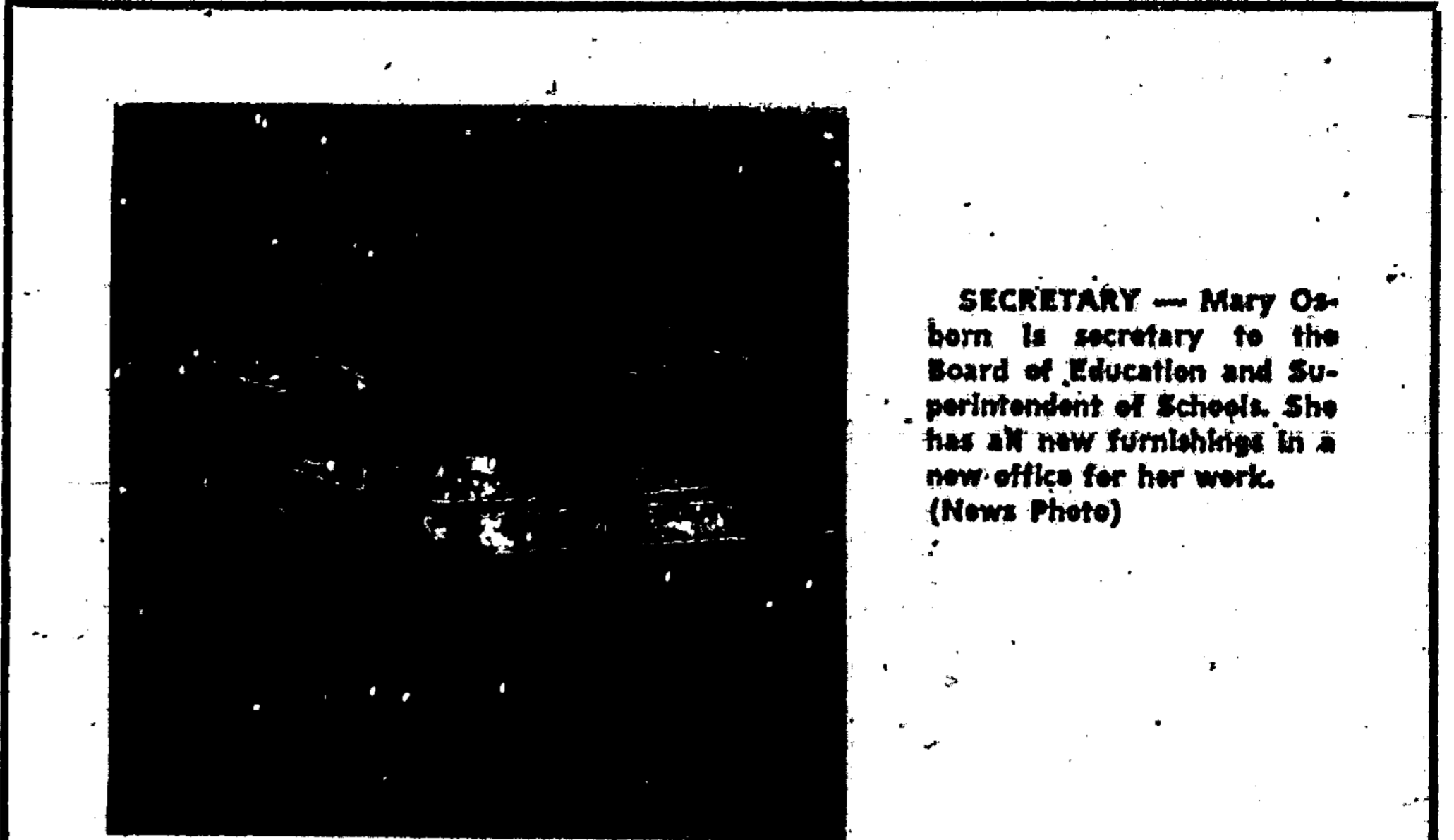

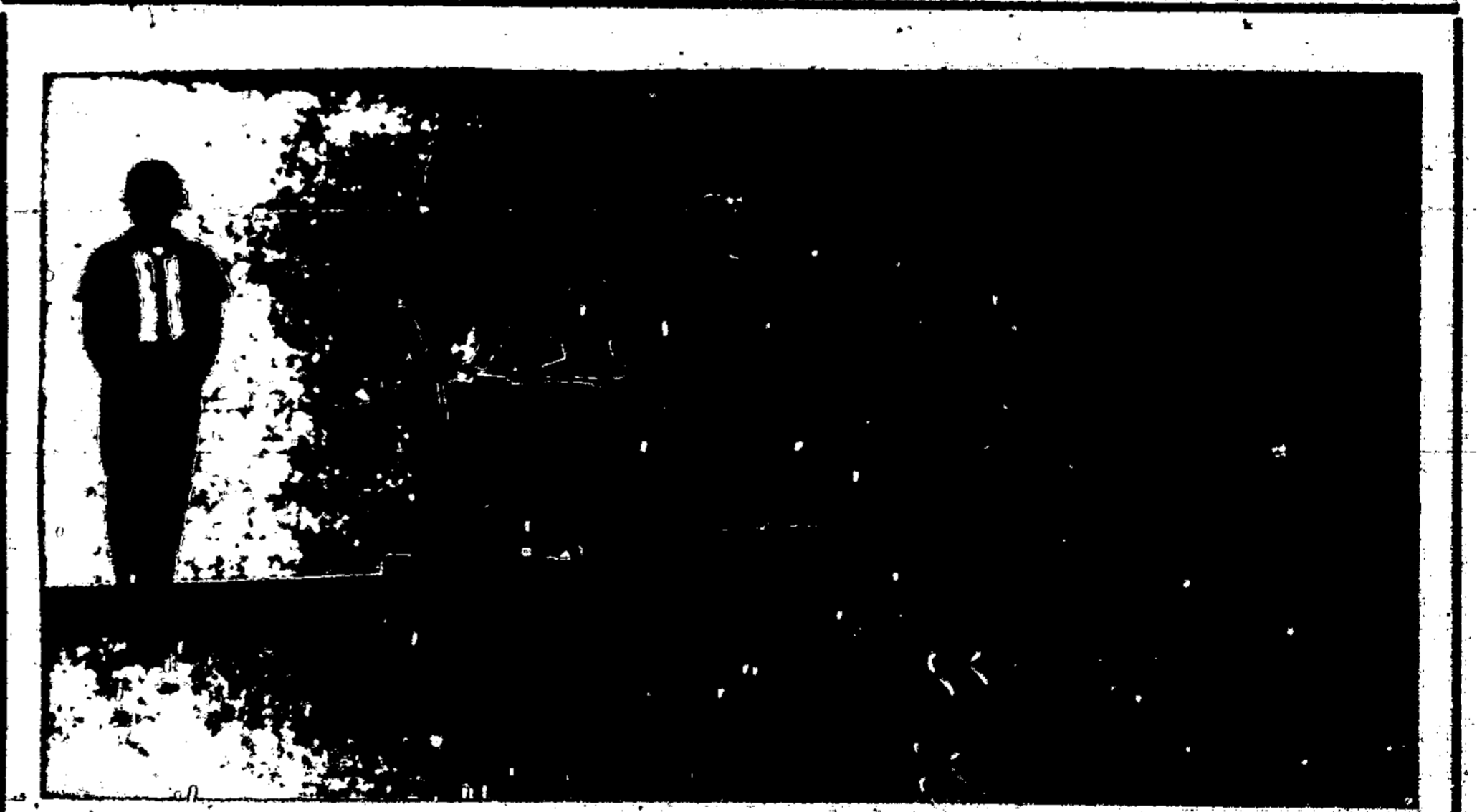

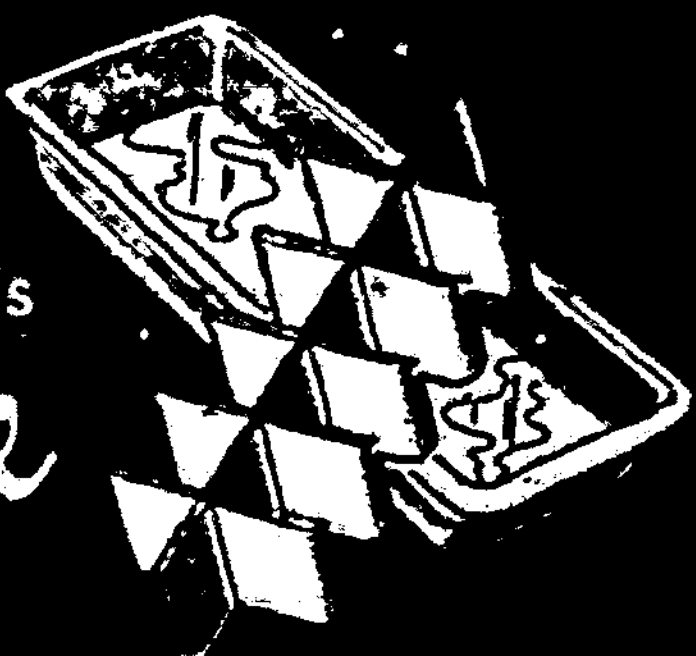

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FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

The Lincoln County 4-H wool judging team composed of Pete Gnatkowski, Joe Cooper, Jud Cooper, and Arturo Pacheco placed second and in the blue ribbon group at the State Wool Judging Contest held last Saturday in Artesia. Pete Gnatkowski tied for second place with his individual score of 286 points. The Lincoln County team will compete in the National Wool Judging Contest to be held June 14-16 in Sonora, Texas.

The junior wool judging team won a blue ribbon in its division. They scored 754 points, which was three points under the top score of 757 made by Chaves County in the junior division. The Lincoln County team was composed of Garv Chipman, Paul McKnight and Carol Cooper.

I attended the State Apple Council meeting last week and the prospects look favorable for a good apple crop. All areas of the state except Espanola had representatives at the meeting.

The early frozes in the Honda Valley reduced the blooms in the lower Valley by 90 per cent. The remaining blooms have all set fruit and indications are for an excellent crop.

Range conditions are varied in Lincoln County. The Southeast part of the County had from one to two inches of rain about two weeks ago, but the North part of the County has not received any winter or spring moisture and are having to feed their livestock heavily.

The invocation was given by Willie Branson, secretary of the board of education. Supt. Bill Hall made a short talk, with thanks to five student body, school board, teachers, contractors, architects for helping during the past winter when the new buildings were under construction. He said Corona School district No. 13 was ready for quality education, every room in the new schools was built for student participation and were unequalled in the state of New Mexico.

George Ruffington, architect, made the presentation of new buildings to Frank Sultemeier, president of the board of education.

Mayor J. C. Germany of Capitan told the News Wednesday that his town council has not officially discussed the matter and that no official action has been taken. Mayor Leandro Vega, Jr., of Carrizozo town council has not officially discussed the matter, no official action taken, and could not possibly have endorsed any reappraisal action by the county.

Councils have not endorsed praisals
