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New patio design for students at Tiger school

Supt. Duane Darling of Capitan Schools told the News this week that their new library building was coming along right on schedule, and will be ready for the start of school.

They are carrying out a busy schedule of remodeling and building at the Capitan school this summer. A new 12 x 14 tool shed has been erected by Lee Smith and Supt. Darling for use of custodian. The ceiling in the cafeteria is being refinished by Mahlon Kern who is also building bookcases for the library.

A major project is pouring sidewalks in the patio area between four school buildings. The ready-mix concrete people always bring more than they need for the library job and the surplus is being used for sidewalks. These walks will diagonal between the buildings, the paths now used by students, and eight evergreen trees from Lincoln Forest will be planted in

the corners of the patio. (Capitan school officials are hopeful their students will use the new walks). A new flag pole will be placed in the corner.

It's an annual event to plant fifty pounds of grass seed on the Tiger football field and that is now being done by Mitchell Seed, plus the addition of fertilizer.

Capitan school needs one teacher to replace Jerry Durham who has resigned. The opening is basketball coach, physical education, and junior high math and social studies. Prin. Jack Mayfield has not yet decided on the exact combination of teaching talent needed so the position remains unfilled.

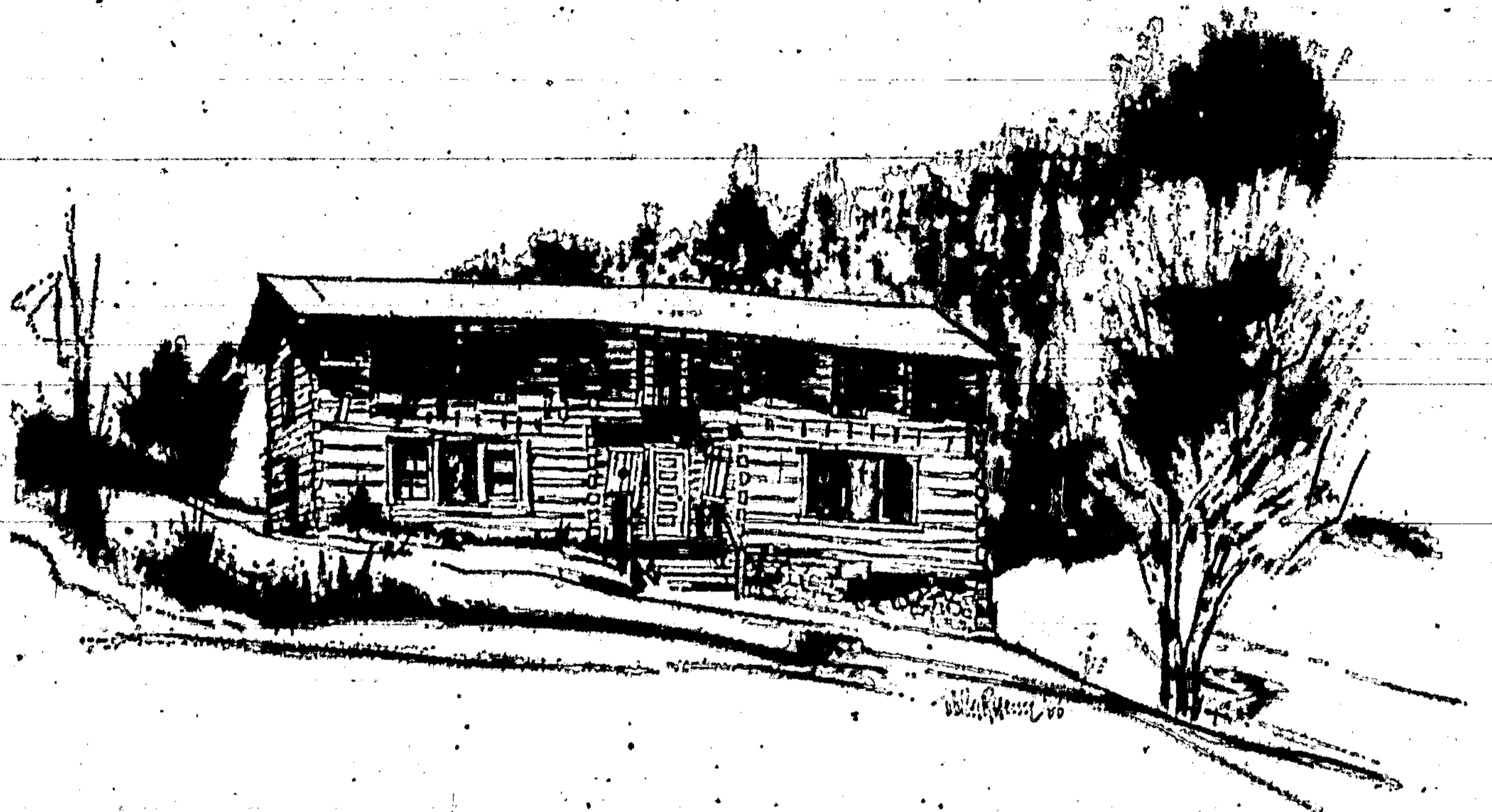
Work on Title I for the 1966-67 years is going ahead. Supt. Darling said he was positive on a special reading program with Myrtle Williams as teacher.

LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY ...

The Byrd House up Tanbark Canyon

This famous landmark, named for the family who built it, was serving Lincoln Countians when this area was territory country and many years before Carrizozo came into being. Effie Zumwalt, born at Angus in 1882, married at Bonito in 1898 and now a resident of Carrizozo, remembers the Byrd House real well. Tom Bragg, a resident of Lincoln County since 1884 when he came to this area from Texas as a 10-year-old boy, worked on the Byrd House when it was built.

The Byrd House was so named for the family of father and 2 sons who had patented 5 mining claims, Bragg recalls, known as the Crow group and had men working their mine or mines. Byrd house was a place for them to eat and sleep.

Mrs. Bowman (Effie) Zumwalt says it was another world she grew up in, the horse and buggy days, and she thinks she has known the best of all periods in our history, including the days of astronauts.

Tom Bragg remembers when a bunch of boys and a Negro were doing the work on Byrd House but it got out of line and they called in George Killen, an old man at that time but as good as any man. He went up and straightened the house out.

The communities of Angus and Bonito never actually became towns as we know them now. Lots of people living in the area, church, school, maybe few houses but no town. Mrs. Zumwalt was married in a log school house, also used as Methodist Church, 68 years ago. And before that when she was

Effie Skinner and going to school her best beau (Bowen Zumwalt) used to carry her books home for her. Bonito Lake water now covers the scene of this activity.

On up Tanbark Canyon is the old Parsons Hotel and mine. Lizzie Parsons, wife of mine owner, attended Mrs. Zumwalt's wedding.

In these days of reappraisal the memories of Tom Bragg are interesting. He filed a homestead acreage in the mouth of South Fork about 1910. He dodged around trees to stake out his property and it had 26 corners.

There was nothing at Carrizozo in 1898 but there was lots of activity in the Bonito area. Miners working all around, claims being staked, gold being taken out, and the Byrd House

was a headquarters for many of the clan.

There was the Realto Lode, Molly, Indian, Shano, Gold King, Hopeful Lode, Silver Kings, Helen Rea, American, Vera Cruz, just to name a few of the prominent claims and mines of the Bonito-Parsons-Nogal area.

The Byrd Brothers moved to Tucson, Arizona in their later years and had frequent correspondence with J. H. Fulmer, Jr., in Carrizozo about their mining properties.

You can see the Byrd House today by making a circle drive, up Bonito Canyon to Tanbark where you turn right up past the Byrd House and on to the top where you come down Nogal Canyon . . . one of the most beautiful drives in the southwest.

Cutting contest starts at 8:00 a.m.

Also on Sunday will be the Pinto-Paint horse show in the Joe Sargent Memorial Arena at Carrizozo. Both halter and performance classes will be featured, roping, cutting, reining and pleasure events.

There is no admission charge for either horse show. In the Joe Sargent Arena. The Quarter Horse show will start at 8:00 a.m., with halter classes, pleasure, reining, roping, barrel races and cutting in the performance events.

The Lincoln County Rodeo Association is sponsor of the Quarter Horse Show, its only show event of the year. Arrell Posey is president; Rosella Kirkpatrick, secretary; Johnson Stearns, treasurer. Emil Strohmeyer will do ring steward chores at the show, Bill Stephenson is gate steward, Irene Barham is secretary, and R. C. Barham manager of the show.

Bill now pending before Congress

could hold key to electrical service

CLOUDCROFT — Members of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. were told today that a bill now pending before Congress could hold the key to whether adequate electric service would be available in the future.

In a letter to the cooperative membership, Mr. Jay D. Lasater, Manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., said Congress is now considering legislation to create a Federal Bank for Rural Electric Systems which could provide cooperatives with an adequate source of loan funds needed to keep pace with the growing demand for electricity in Rural America.

He said the demands on rural electric are growing because member-consumers are using more and more electricity and additional money must be invested in the systems to meet these needs.

Mr. Lasater explained that presently the only source of loan funds open to rural electric systems are through the regular REA loan program. He added that with an estimated need of \$3.5 billion in the next 15 years for the nation's systems — more than twice the amount used in the past 30 years — it is unlikely that such large amounts can be obtained through REA loans.

He stressed that the regular REA program of two percent loans should be continued for

Abandoned property recalls past

What to do with personal property abandoned on Federal property can be a sticky question. This matter was discussed at Fort Stanton last week during the visit of Mr. Sam Winn, who directs Region 7 of Surplus Property Utilization Agency of the Federal Government. Mr. Winn headquarters in Dallas and was in New Mexico especially for the transfer of the Fort Bayard Hospital property from the Federal Government to the State of New Mexico. This \$5½ million transfer was made in Santa Fe last week.

Mr. Ben Mason, state budget

director, flew Mr. Winn to Fort Stanton for a look at this institution. Once the property of the United States, the Fort Stanton Institution was turned over to New Mexico in 1953 on a 20-year contract.

The first Federal tuberculosis sanatorium in the United States was established at Fort Stanton as a U.S. Marine Hospital in November, 1899. As a federal agency the sanatorium cared for U.S. merchant seamen from all over the world.

Some time during the Merchant Marine period a patient named John Evanoff Hilboff, born in Russia in 1884 and nat-

uralized in this country in 1935, took up residence at Fort Stanton. Mr. Hilboff died at Fort Stanton and even though the property has since been transferred to New Mexico, the Federal government has responsibility. In this instance the property in the trunk that belonged to Hilboff seemed of little value but should it have been valuable, the government would have had the property sold and the money put in escrow in a special account and held for possible heirs.

The likely means of disposal at Fort Stanton will be to sell the trunk and effects and put the money in the welfare fund in Fort Stanton.

There was a piece of rosin for fiddle bow in the trunk, the Russian-English text being held by Mr. Phil Carter, the picture of Hilboff held by Mrs. Carter, and several articles of clothing.

The possibility exists that Hilboff could have dormant bank accounts in this state. One employee's statement of earnings & deductions card indicated that Hilboff had salary of 37.50, taxes of 1.70 and 1.88, misc. withheld 1.00, amount of check 23.92. It would appear the 9.00 was going into some sort of account.

Mr. Winn was escorted on a tour of Fort Stanton by Mr. Phil Carter, superintendent of Los Lunas Hospital and Training School and Mr. Ben Mason, State Budget Director.

Tuesday evening, June twenty-first, Paul Gardner, curator of the Courthouse Museum in Lincoln was the guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the Tularosa Basin Historical Society. The newly organized group meets at the Alamogordo Public Library.

organization as active and as influential as that of the Courthouse Museum in Lincoln. No house has yet been made where the headquarters of the Society will be located, but there is a wide choice of fine old adobe structures in the Basin area.

Much of the Tularosa Basin lies in Otero County which was created from part of old Lincoln County at the end of the 19th century. It is one of the largest counties today in New Mexico and was named for Miguel A. Otero who was a territorial governor, appointed by President McKinley in 1897 and served until 1906. While Alamogordo, its largest city, was founded only in 1898, many other towns in the Basin have a long and interesting history. La Luz is perhaps the outstanding settlement. The first chapel was built here in 1719 by missionaries who baptized a number of local Indians and dedicated the chapel to "Our Lady of Light." There are many charming old adobe houses today in La Luz and it was once the site of a nationally known pottery works. Today, a lovely green oasis north of Alamogordo, it is well known for its culture of figs. Another important settlement is Tularosa, a lovely Spanish word that means "red-dish reeds or willows." Tularosa had a post office as early as 1868, is again a lovely oasis with a missionary type church famous today for its roses and is surrounded by cotton and alfalfa fields that are separated by long rows of graceful popular trees.

Mrs. Pat Murphy of White Oaks is in the local hospital again this week. We hope she will soon be able to return home.

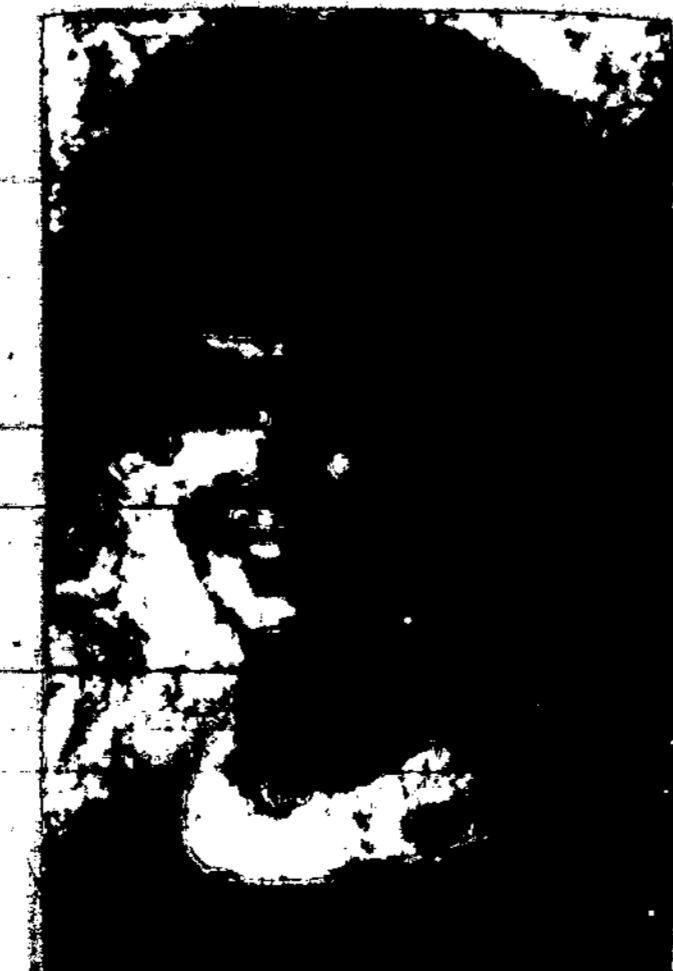

All too often a homeowner is convinced he can grow good apples, peaches, and cherries by setting out the trees and giving them no more attention than shade trees. It won't work. Home orchards have too many pests.

Controlling most pests requires several sprayings a year. You can get the materials for the spraying as a mixture of insecticides and fungicides in one package, or you can buy them separately.

A prepared mixture is easiest to use, but may be more expensive if you have several trees to spray.

Usually, malathion, Sevin, Diazinon or methoxychlor is used to control insects and karathane is used to control the common fruit diseases. All these materials are safe to use.

If you aren't sure about how or when to use these materials, your county agent can give you advice. He also has a publication, "Control Insects in Backyard Fruits." It is number 400-J-20, prepared by New Mexico State University, and tells the different spray materials that have been tested in New Mexico.

Zinc deficiency on apple and peach trees is beginning to show up.

Symptoms include shortening of the branches, narrowing of leaves and a yellow or mottled appearance of the leaves. In the final stage, shoots die back from the tips and what little fruit that is formed is small.

For control, spray three times with zinc sulfate using 3 lbs. per 100 gallons of water (3 tablespoons per gallon) 1, 2, and 3 months after the buds open. It is important to use a sticker-spreader in the spray mixture. The homeowner may use a household detergent. Leaf burn is something experienced in apples when sprayed with zinc compounds. Zinc chelate sprays used according to manufacturers' directions can also be used but are more expensive.

Additional information on the control of zinc deficiency is found in the publication "Control Zinc Deficiency in Pecan and Apple Trees and Ornamentals," and is available from the County Agent's office in Carrizozo.

Conservation district enters competition

Carrizozo Soil (and Water) Conservation District has entered the 20th annual competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts, according to Lee Straley, Ancho, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from January 1, 1966 through December 31, 1966 will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 districts selected nationally will be expense paid, work-study trip to Arizona in December 1967, for one member of the district governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district.

Carrizozo district has taken part in the competition several times in the past. District Supervisors are Lee Straley, Walt Wilson, Bill Stephenson, Bill Gallacher and Johnson Stearns.

Straley said the district's outstanding cooperator will be selected from over 68 operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally, over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

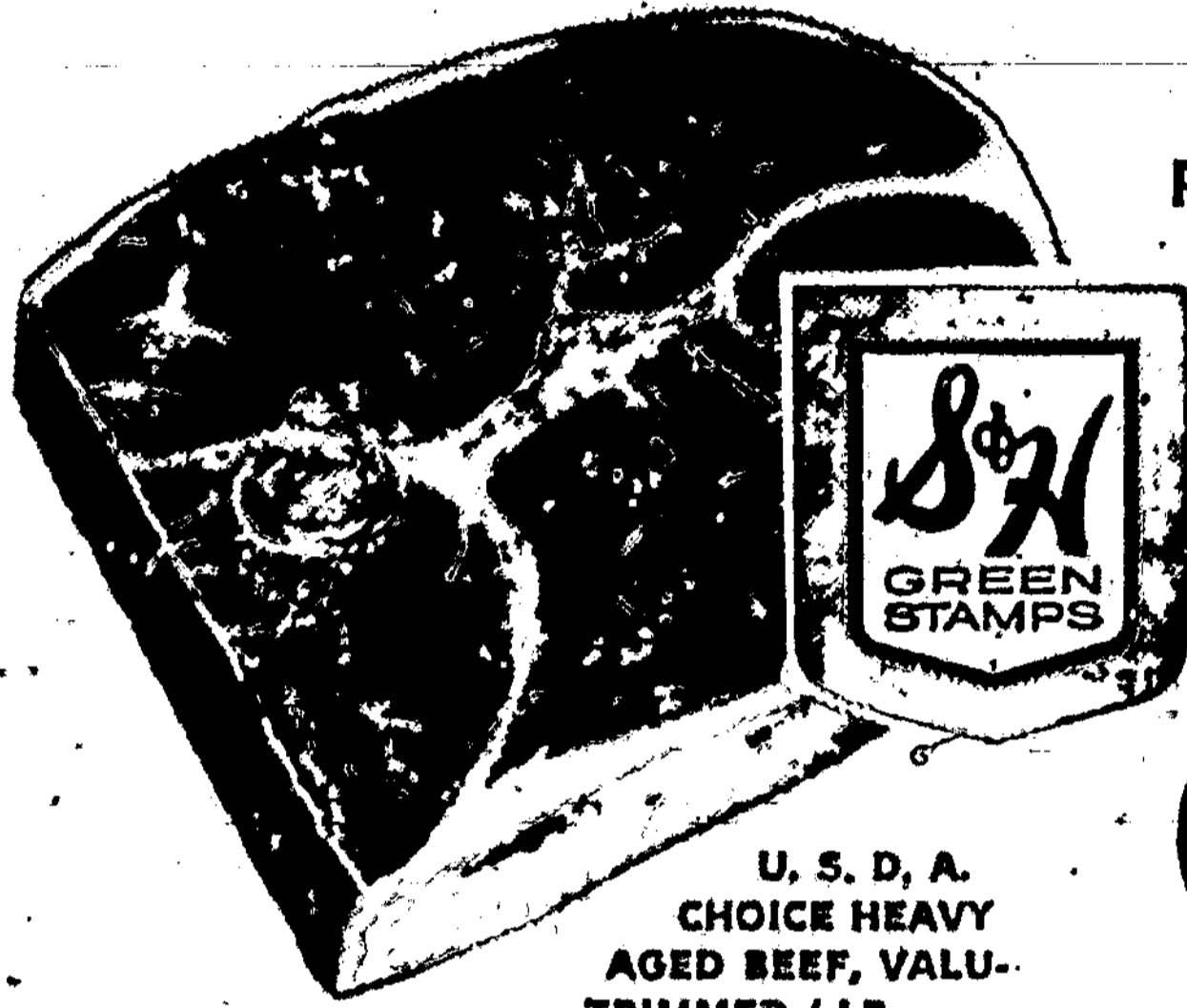

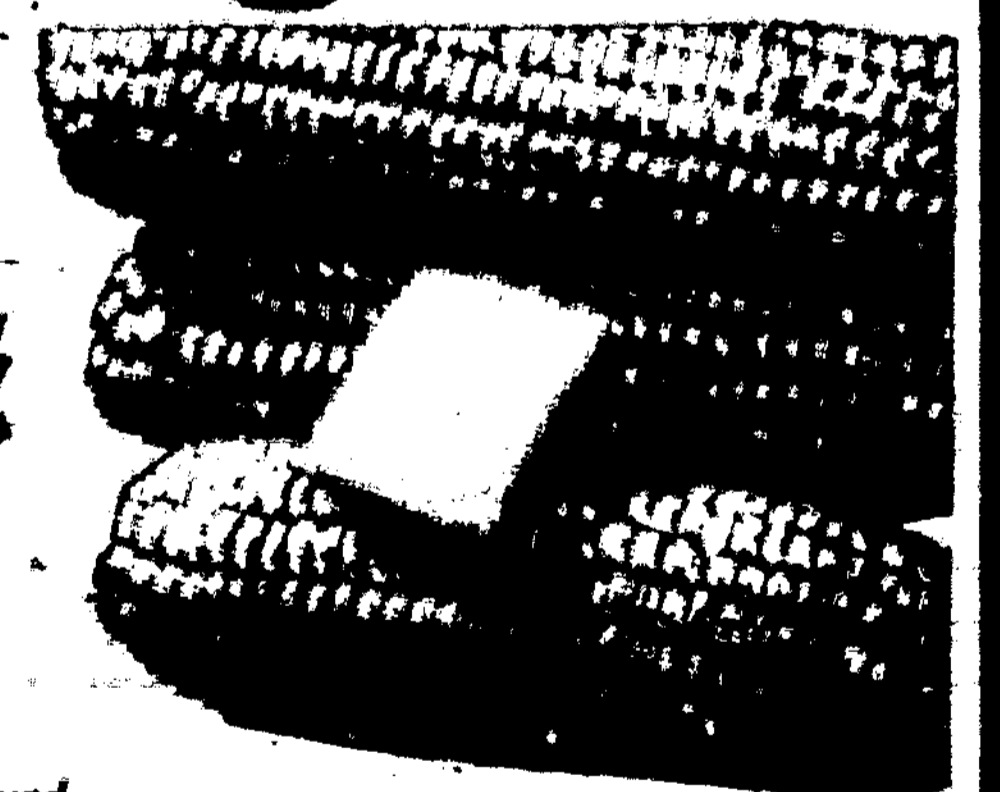

Application for permits for range improvements may be obtained from the District Manager, Bureau of Land Management in Las Cruces, New Mexico.



Inside the Capitol
 By Charles Cullin

SANTA FE — You can bet on the fact that two bits of proposed legislation will get battered from several top state politicians. And they are two legislative matters that could probably do more service to the state than any proposed by interim groups.

From the Legislative Council comes a proposal of a State Bonding Agency. This office would aid in the sale of any bonds by any school district, county, or municipality.

It's important because the proposed bonding office would be in a situation to help smaller districts and communities with money while sparing them the normal cost of attorney fees etc., to get their needed cash.

Any legislation from this angle will be fought by attorneys in the State Senate and House. It's not likely they'll be open about it because it should prove to be a popular thing among voters.

But it's a good item to peck away at lawmakers about. It would spare schools and communities a lot of grief not only in monetary terms but in hours of planning and working to accomplish their particular need. It could conceivably result in a request to the state agency, thus circumventing the past tedious process of issuing bonds. You might call it a rather dull item - until the next time your area needs cash for certain projects. Then it could be an extremely beneficial item.

More Opposition Seen To Second Proposal
 A second issue that emerged from the Legislature Finance Committee was the proposal to create a Motor Transportation Agency.

Again the name sounds dull, but implications could create one of the wilder battles of the next Legislature.

The Motor Transportation Agency would be a single office engaged in collecting all the fees and taxes due the state from motor carriers.

There are now five state agencies involved in policing the tariffs of the motor carriers. It's a hopelessly entangled situation that's costing the state a big chunk of money.

The opposition will be toward the abolishment of unnecessary jobs that the streamlined agency would create.

Presently, there are many lower-level positions involved with motor transportation and they're used solely as political hand-outs.

The new central agency would use a minor portion of the personnel now involved and would efficiently carry out the responsibilities of the law.

Taxpayers are footing the bill of the current cumbersome multi-agency plan.

Next time a candidate visits your area, it would be a good question to ask him if he favors the new proposal.

A lot of time and study went into determining that it's a good thing, and it would be a shame to see it junked for purely political reasons.

Rep's Report Not Given Due Notice
 State Rep. John Eaves of Bernalillo, who is a member of the new Audit Commission, gave a report at a recent meeting that went unnoticed to a large degree.

Eaves blasted Lowell Green, who is Chief Court Clerk, as not having seen to it that laws governing Justices of the Peace were being enforced.

New Mexico's JPs have been under fire for years, and Eaves said the complaints were mainly not of inadequate laws, but of inadequate law enforcement.

Voters in the state may approve an amendment 10 in November which will remove the JP fee system and install Magistrate Courts.

Eaves says there'll be no problem if the system is changed. If it isn't changed, he says, the problems will remain "until the existing laws are enforced."

He plans to continue the study for the Audit Commission, and his full written report may prove a further condemnation of the present JP fee system.

State Policeman Paul Gibson investigated the accident.

On June 18 at 5:45 a.m., 18 mi. east of Ruidoso, a 1957 Ford driven by Ronny Ray Horne, 19, Roswell left the road and landed in a 9 ft. deep arroyo. The car was a total wreck. Horne and the other passenger Clay Hendricks, 20 also of Roswell were injured and both were taken to the Ruidoso Hospital. Driver apparently fell asleep. Investigated by SP Con Brown.

Another June 18 accident involved a 1961 Chevrolet driven by Sybil Ray Mitchell of Amarillo, Texas, who was traveling on U.S.54 13 miles south of Corona when the car ran off the road then back across and turned over one time. There were no injuries. \$500.00 damage to car. Inattention was the cause of the accident.

The third June 18 accident occurred at 7 p.m. 7.8 mi. west of Carrizozo on U.S.380 and involved a 1966 Ford Mustang belonging to a Rent-a-Car Co. The driver, Clarence C. Andrews of El Paso was taken to the local hospital after his car ran off curve, went over a 20 ft. embankment, hit a tree and fence. Car was a total loss. Investigated by SP Frank Knoblock and Sheriff Leandro Vega.

systems in thinly settled areas that need these low interest rate loans to survive.

"There are some rural electric systems, however," Mr. Lasater pointed out, "which need funds so badly that they would be willing and able to pay a higher interest rate. Through the Federal Bank for Rural Electric Systems, as proposed in the bill before Congress, these systems could borrow the needed growth funds at a higher than two percent rate but still at interest rates they could afford."

He added that the Bank also would be a first step toward eventual financial independence from the Federal Government.

The Otero County Electric Cooperative official warned the members that the legislation was meeting with stiff opposition which "have opposed REA from the beginning and have been trying to scuttle rural electric service ever since."

Now they are trying to kill a bill which would assure your cooperative of loan funds that we will need to keep pace with the growing needs of our consumer members," he said. "In other words, if they can't get rid of us outright, they want to starve us to death."

Mr. Lasater urged the members to write to Congress to urge their representatives to vote for the Federal Bank bill to assure that the cooperative will have a source of funds that will guarantee adequate rural electric service.
