L. Z. Manire has recorded 12 inches of moisture during June up to Wednesday noon and it was continuing to rain at that time in Carrizozo.

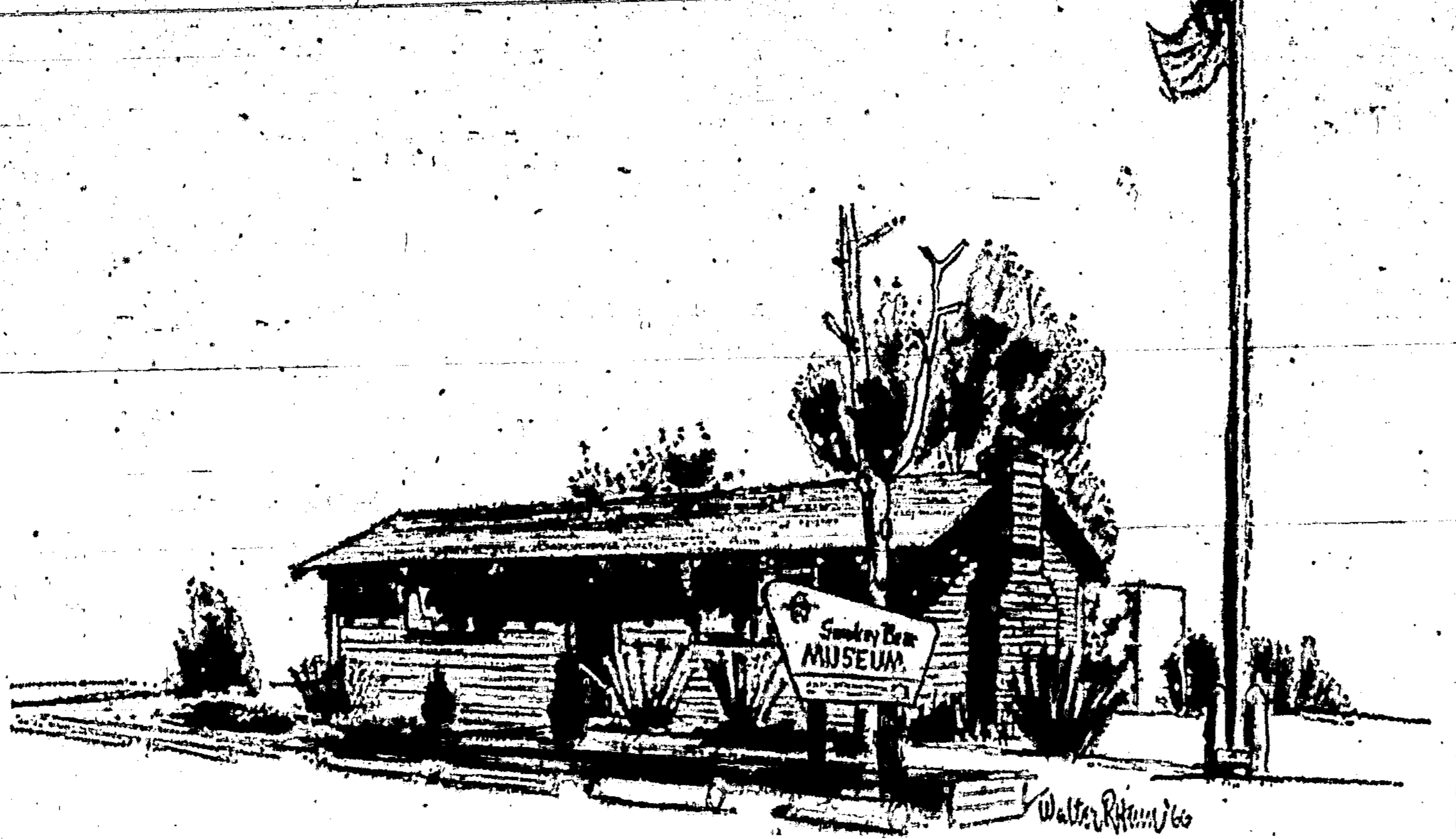

LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY. . . By Walter Henn



Smokey Bear Museum at Capitan

This nationally famous landmark isn't nearly as old as some around the county because Smokey the Bear was not born until about 1950 and the chain of events started which made Capitan, New Mexico, known nation-wide as the birth place of Smokey the Bear.

To get back to the beginning - when you read the club write-ups in the News there will appear the name of Pat Flatley, seeming to be the only man at a woman's gathering. However, this person known as Pat around Capitan, is actually Patricia or Mrs. Ross Flatley, the original and first nurse for Smokey the Bear when he was a little four-pound cub with burned paws and no mother.

A fire caused by a careless thrown cigarette was started in Capitan Gap in 1950. Pat Flatley recalls. Her husband, Ross ranches north of Capitan and

does a lot of construction work, but he was home at that time of year and answered the fire call. Ross went with a gang that included several soldiers and civilians.

In the course of their fire fighting they came upon a cub bear clinging to a tree. A Flat and Game man said leave the bear there, his mother will come back for him after we go on. The party did go on about its work but two of the soldiers decided they wanted the tiny bear for a mascot and left their fire-fighting crew and went back to "rescue" the cub. They did get the cub but their commanding officer would not let them keep it and it finally resolved down to Ross Flatley taking the bear home with him - this is the way Ross told the story to Pat.

When Ross showed up at home with a cub bear it did not especially make his wife happy,

in fact, she did not want the bear at all, but Smokey needed a home and he got a pretty good one. Patrummaged around and found a bottle and nipple (used for calf) and she fed Smokey all the milk he would drink. When he first got home he was sick from all the candy fed to him by the fire gang. A big box was installed back of the wood-burning range and there Smokey spent his first night in captivity, whimpering most of the time.

The next day Game Warden Ray Ball called at the Flatley ranch and offered to take the cub off their hands, and the Flatleys gave up their child. Smokey went to Santa Fe and later to Washington, D. C., where he was heralded as the living example of Smokey the fire-fighting poster bear of the U. S. Forest Service.

Pat told of visiting Smokey in Washington about five years ago. He had grown into a handsome big bear with rather common disposition. She thought he was restless and wanted to be back in the forest around Capitan Gap. Smokey didn't remember his first forest mother.

In 1955 Captain dedicated the museum sketched here by Walter Henn, and named it as the birthplace of Smokey the Bear. On May 8, 1958 President Dwight Eisenhower presented a Smokey Oscar to Judy Ball inscribed, "To Capitan, New Mexico, birthplace of Smokey the Bear for outstanding support in Forest Fire Prevention by Association of State Foresters and U. S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service.

The log museum is open each day during the summer months so travelers can find out more about the birthplace of the cub. Ross Flatley took home to Pat, over 16 years ago now.

Smokey Stampede is big event of the year

The Eighth annual Smokey Bear Stampede starts Saturday, July 2, in Capitan with a rodeo at 7:00 p.m. The contest for Queen of Lincoln County will be decided this evening and a dance completes the program.

Miss June Kirkpatrick of Carrizozo will be a contestant in the queen contest with Miss Barbara Creel of Ruidoso and Miss Connie Preston of Capitan. The queen reigns during the Stampede, the Lincoln County

Fair and will represent Lincoln County at the state fair.

The second day of the Stampede features an old fiddlers contest at 12:30 noon at the rodeo grounds and rodeo starting at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, July 3. Ruten Bros., of Happy, Texas, are the rodeo producers and bring a top run of stock to the Stampede. Their bulls are raunchy and hard to ride, and the broncs no better.

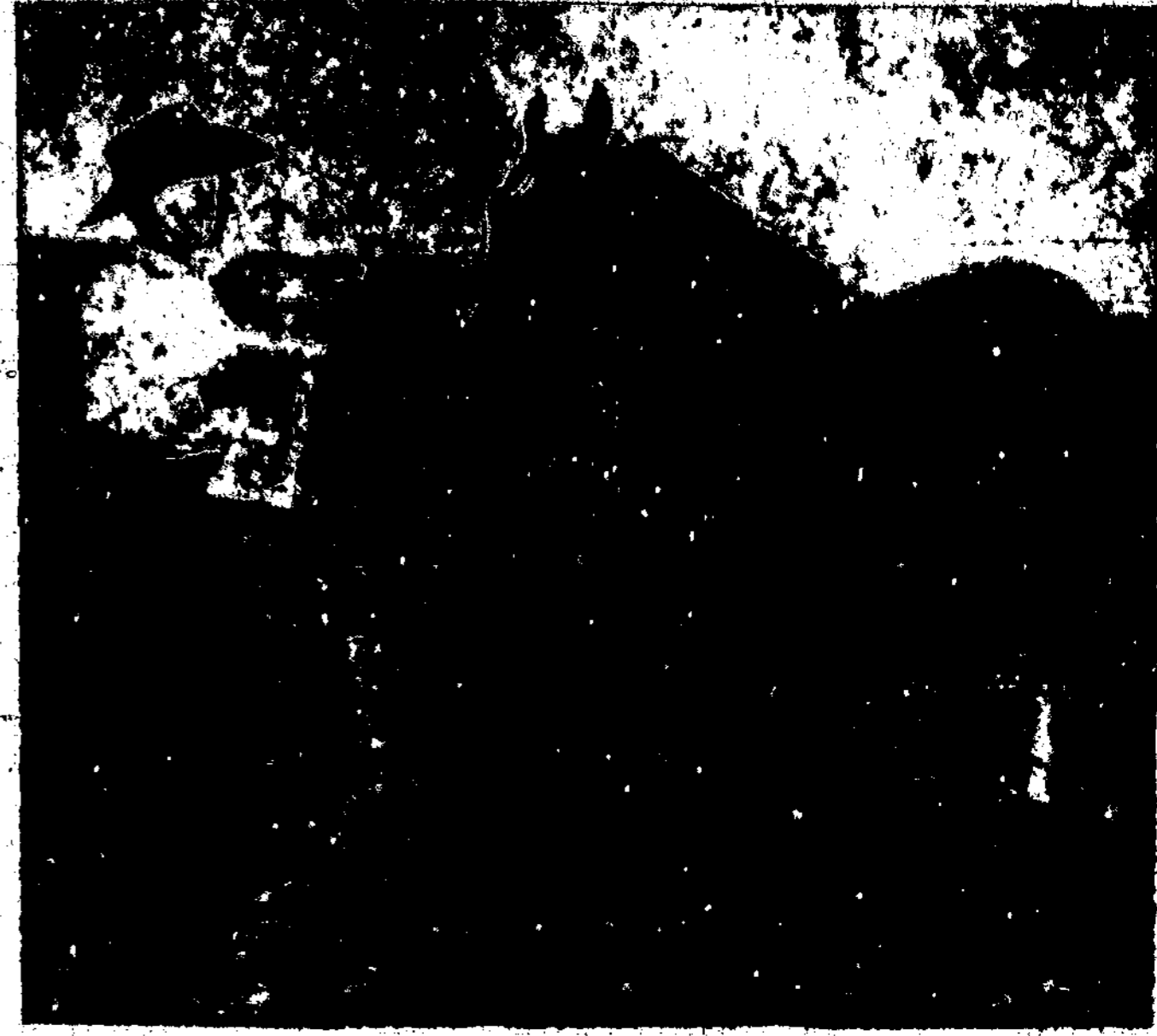
On Monday, July 4, Lincoln

County turns out in full force, joining with a lot of visitors to make the biggest crowd of the year at Capitan. The parade will start events on July 4 coming down Capitan main street at 11:00 a.m. A free barbecue for all Stampede guests is served immediately after the parade at the rodeo grounds. The third round of rodeo events will start at 2:04 p.m. A night rodeo at 7:00 and dance completes the schedule of events.

A special feature will be a calf scramble for all the youngsters, boys and girls 12 years of age and under.

This event when all people of the Capitan community join forces to entertain around 5,000 visitors. Ranchers come in from miles around to help barbecue the beef, coolup several sacks of beans and make big pots of coffee. The Capitan Lions Club has a regular schedule of work hours and will help with the handling all three days. The Lincoln County Fair Association is the sponsor and members of the Association have done a lot of planning and will be helping during the three days.

The barbecue is served in the old school building, high and dry should it be damp on July 4, and bleacher seats all around the rodeo arena are covered.

Hospital can provide needed service for military, welfare on emergency

A news story in the June 16 Lincoln County News went over that status of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo as concerns Medicare. The hospital is not eligible to accept Medicare patients, mainly because only one registered nurse is on duty.

However, the Carrizozo hospital is in business and can service the public each day, in addition to this routine service - Carrizozo hospital provides any service needed by military personnel of patients entered by Department of Public Welfare on an emergency basis. This service goes back to the days of Red Canyon when Carrizozo was the only hospital close to this military installation.

It's an "open-end" situation, at Carrizozo Hospital, which means that if the hospital could secure the service of two additional nurses tomorrow the hospital would qualify under Medicare. Some work needs to be done in the operating room but this will be taken care of in due time.

The situation today - Carrizozo hospital has one RN and two LPN nurses and is performing a fine service for people of Lincoln County.

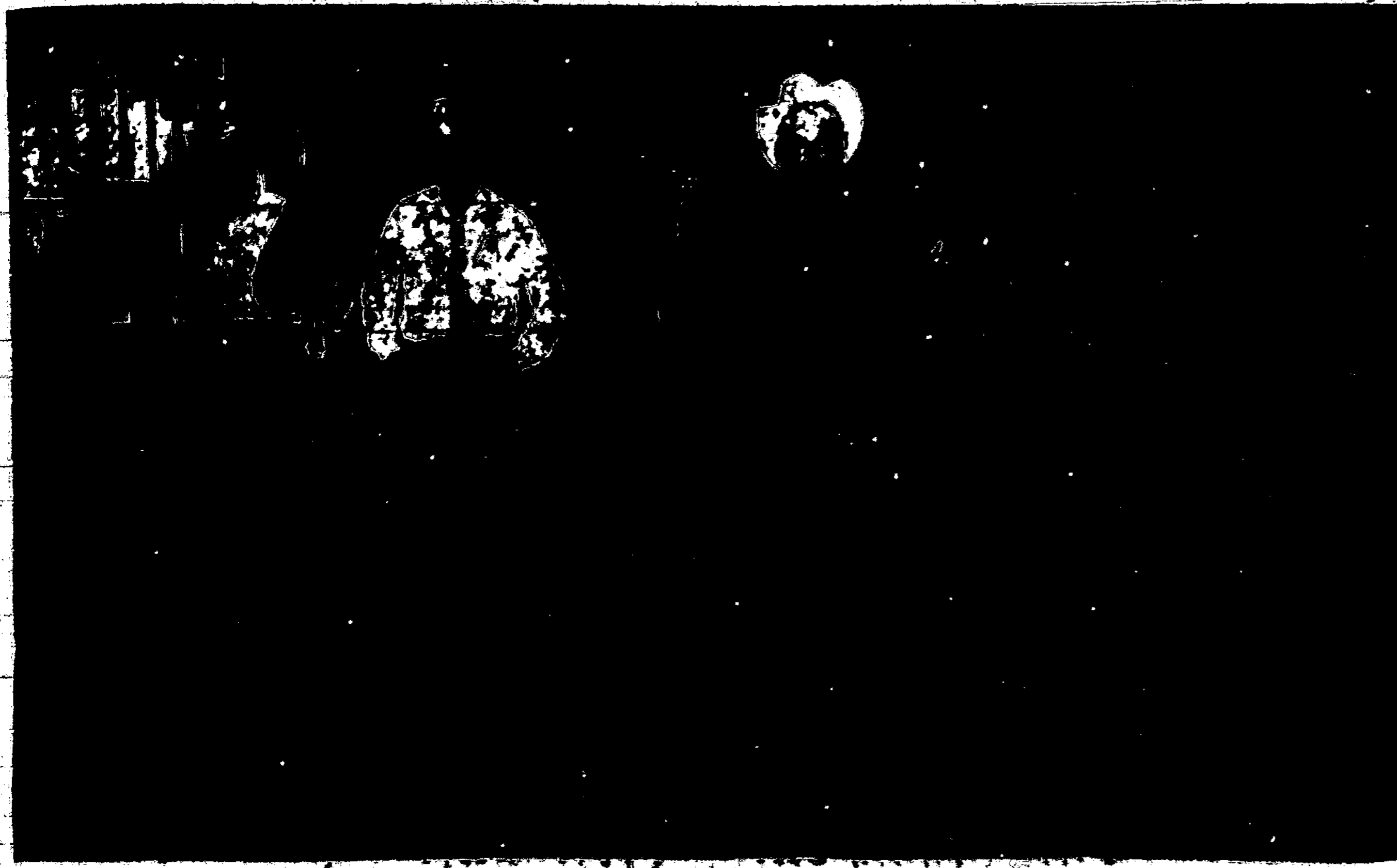
Work on erection of the 150-foot tower will start this week. This tower will have six antennas and will bring in TV stations at El Paso, Albuquerque and Roswell.

SAIGON — Life is harsh for an American woman in this war-torn city.

Both a freak and a desired object, she is shadowed by stares wherever she wanders.

A U. S. Embassy official said there are 758 U. S. females in Viet Nam.

In Saigon where the importance of a building is gauged by the amount of barbed wire surrounding it, the only thing offered a woman seems to be perspiration in the blazing heat.

Mists of tear gas linger in the atmosphere. It rips the eyes, stings the nose and makes the stomach feel dry and tight.

One comes home from the center of the city dripping and sticking from the 95 per cent humidity, only to find that a shower is impossible. The water has gone off for an indefinite period.

This happens when there is simply not enough water in the pipes or because the electricity also has gone off and shut down the pumps.

Saigon streets, a whirlpool of every two, three and four-wheel vehicle imaginable, seem to reflect the chaos.

A trip through them usually involves a 14-minute wait for a cab. Between 5 and 7 p.m., the wait may lengthen to 45 minutes. Often this is in the damp of rains that pelt the city from May to September.

To sit down for a drink is usually to be surrounded by four or five American men at a table. They tell you how glad they are to see you, or how much they miss their wives or girl friends.

Then comes the strange darkness that descends when the city's overburned generators groan and give out. Walters scurry for candles or kerosene lamps. Ten or 15 minutes later the lights blink back on.

Evening hours must be watched because after the midnight curfew there are no cabs available. Drivers raise their prices 50 per cent after 6 p.m.

Streets clear and life is sealed behind doors. But still there is no calm.

Rumbles from cannon fired afar in the country penetrate the air. Or it might be the twang of flutes and clashing of gongs coming from a Buddhist funeral down the road.

At 4 a.m., the curfew lifts, streets start to buzz and awakening people come and go about their business.

Kit Carson writes letter from Saigon

SAIGON — The world's war capital was booming last night, at the 2100 hours, 18 June, as the behemoth jet liner set down in this troubled land, delivering 168 additional Americans to this teeming China sea port of the Far East. The rate of this progressive influx into Saigon and Viet Nam is not yet for me to disclose.

Jet flight from San Francisco to Saigon, 30 degrees north of the Equator, 23 hours. Ambitious as I had been before arrival to know something about this troubled country, I soon learned, within 15 hours, that these accounts certainly had not been over written.

By justification of action, Saigon rates the world's war capital classification, also more exacts here than the Western Hemisphere knows. Guns roared all night long, in the hills nearby. I thought of the American soldier, from Albuquerque, SP4 Milford C. Smith, Jr., whose wife works at the Kopy Corner, on Central, and was concerned about his safety. Saigon was a seething mass of militia; war in Viet Nam was on.

In the Philippines, as the huge jet liner took on loads of fuel, I picked up a copy of "The Pacific Stars and Stripes," 16 June, Vol. 22, No. 166 edition, and opened up to a column that the News would like: It is the verbatim account by Denby Fawcett, a brand new news reporter in Saigon. The account seems to be her honest opinion; not over-rated. She refers to

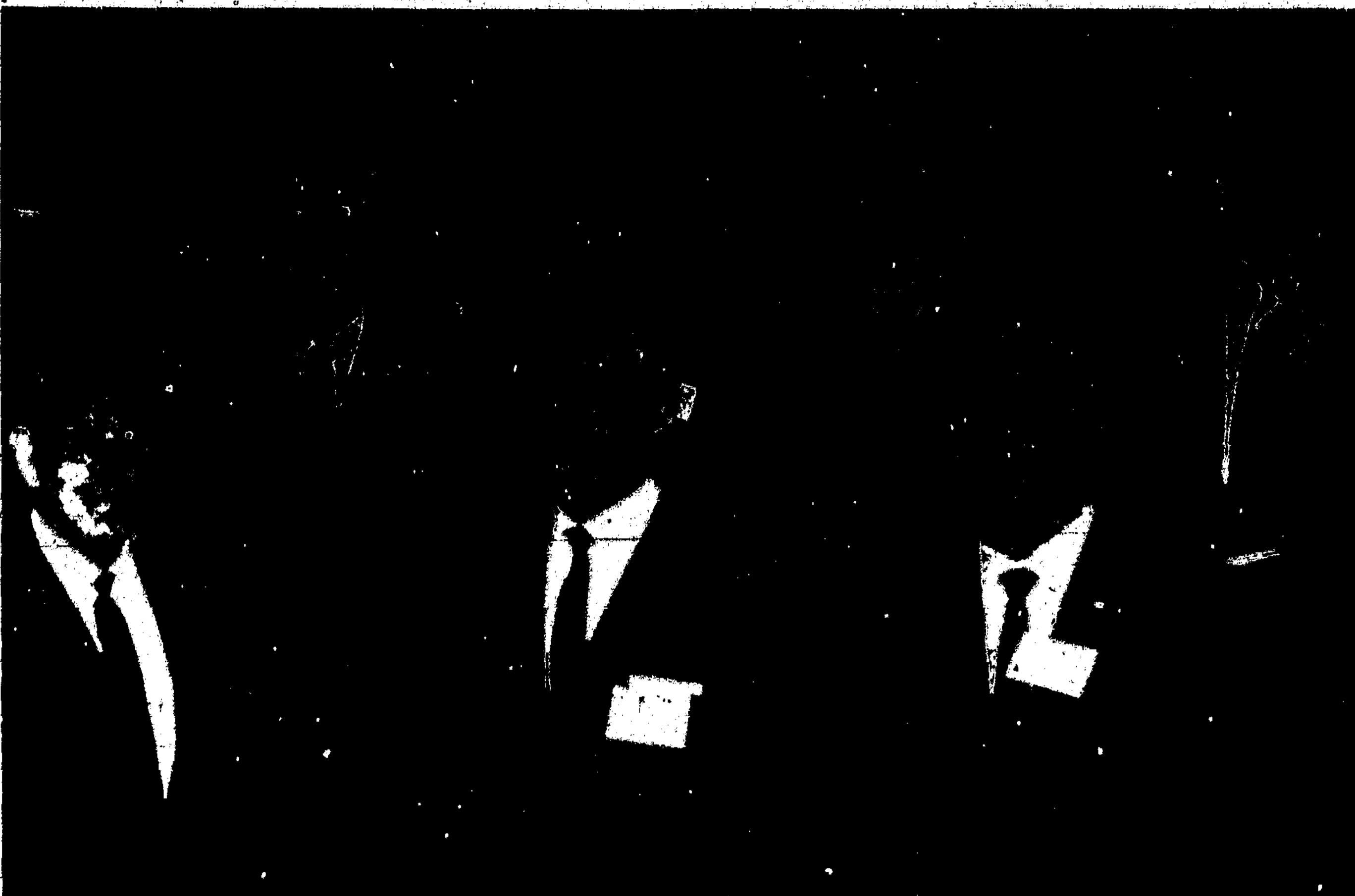

His address was centered on being realistic in our outlook, that cooperatives must put member service above all other considerations.

The association went on record as paying they would like to be included under the jurisdiction of the New Mexico Public Service Commission under the utility act.

The New Mexico Supreme Court has ruled that portions of the act are unconstitutional. Thus, to be included under state jurisdiction, rural cooperatives must be placed under the act by legislative action.

If included in the PSC's jurisdiction, rural cooperatives would have less dispute with private firms, the resolution said. The PSC would decide which would serve the disputed territory.

New Mexico cooperatives also passed a resolution asking the U. S. Senate and House to pass a supplemental financing bill for rural electric cooperatives.
