

Burglars kick open door at Harkey's

The home of Weldon Harkey, brother of E. L. Harkey, was broken into last Thursday morning, between 9 and 11 a.m., while Weldon was away, Since the doors were all padlocked, entry was gained by kicking down the front door. Articles valued at close to \$500 was loaded into a duffel bag and carried off. Joe "Bert" Cheney of Capitan. president of the Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, told the News Wednesday that the State Corporation Commission had issued a corporation charter to the Association dated August 12, 1966. That the immediate work ahead includes completion of all easements and their certification to the Federal Government, the bids on construction can be called and on acceptance of bld the cons-

truction work can be started. There is a chance that natural gas could be in the area for winter use. Mr. Cheney said that if the contractor would work more than one crew the

work would move faster. The amount of money involved in the project is \$730,000.00 from the government plus \$80,-000.00 from El Paso Natural Gas Company. There will be 34 miles of pipe from Capitan to point of hookon to El Paso . lines north of Capitan. The \$80,-000 applies on cost of this section of line. Ther li be 17 miles of pipeline from takeoff point at head of Paters Canyon to

Carrizozo. There will be a 10-

mile stretch of line from Capitan to tieon point with Ruldoso Gas Company.

There will be a 3-mile stretch of pipe line running, to Fort Stanton and on to Sierra Blanca Boys' Camp, New construction is now going on at Fort Stanton and new equipment being installed is for natural gas, they will be ready for gas when it gets to them at Fort Stanton. The hospital and boys' camp master meter is expected to register more gas than the entire town of Capitan will use.

In addition to all of the pipe for transporting the gas, there will be two towns to pipe for natural gas . . . Capitan and Carrizozo, Ruldoso Gas Company is already laying

County-tax-reappraisal situation straightened

County Commissioners Max Oliver, Bob Shafer and Joe Mc-Knight met the reappraisal firm of Lon E. Nelson Associates August 18 in Carrizozo and another meeting was held in Santa Fe in the Bureau of Revenue offices which pretty well straightened out any matters of the reappraisal process that had been in question by the county commissioners.

The original agreement was for Nelson to open public office in Carrizozo, this will be done. The company has been offering \$1.50 per hour for help which will not buy the kind of labor needed in appraising land. Oliver said he expected them to raise this pay scale.

Lincoln County commissioners seriously questioned the ability of one supervisor to take care of two counties, have insisted that one supervisor devote full time to this county — It will be done.
