Mrs. Bundy will be campaigning in Ruidoso and down in the Valley earlier in the day.

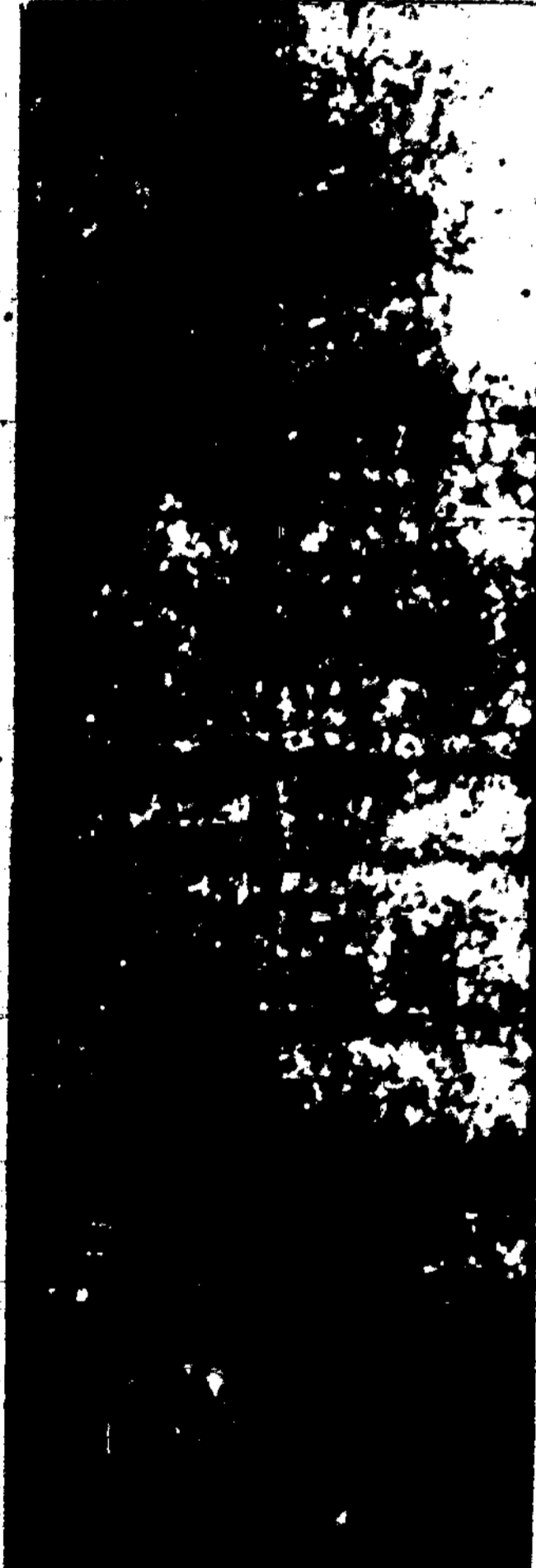

Reappraisal work ahead of schedule

Lincoln County Commissioners Max Oliver, Bob Shafer and Joe McKnight met in regular session in Carrizozo Tuesday to pay bills and handle routine business.

They will meet in special session on October 11 to select election officials.

Jim Wheelock of the state tax commission and Lon Nelson representing firm doing reappraisal met with the commissioners. The job is proceeding ahead of schedule. All three commissioners were emphatic in statements that the field crew now at work is only taking measurement and descriptions of property. The actual work of reappraisal will start — after all field work is complete — will be done by experience appraiser, — will not be done by computer or field crew.

Waiting until after all field work is complete will simplify the job, because the indexing and code system can be set up and all properties in county will be available for comparison.

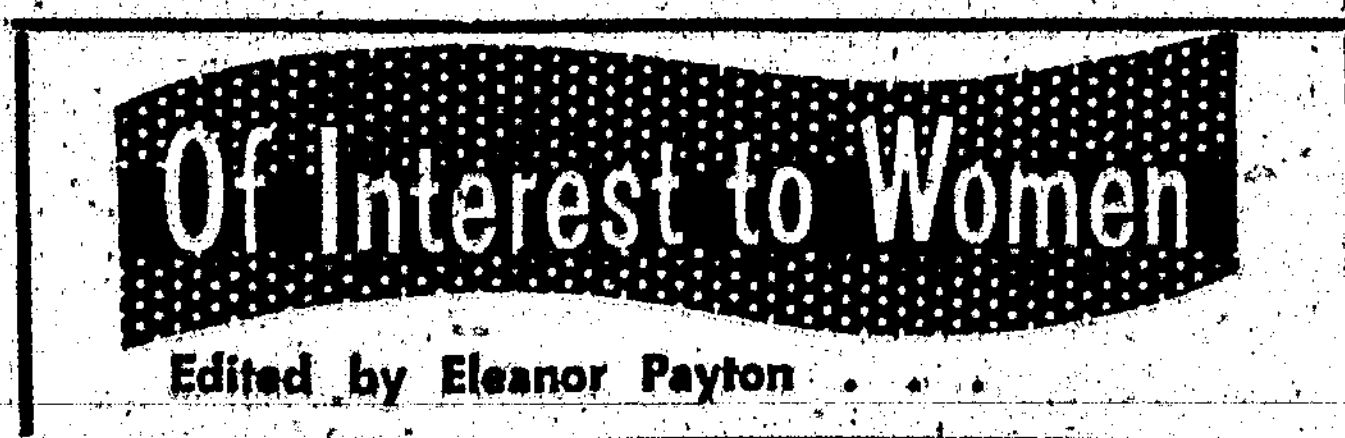
Make it with wool contest blanks ready

Women and girls who are interested in entering the 1966-67 Make It Yourself With Wool Contest are reminded that entry blanks are now available and may be obtained from local, state, or national directors as well as fabric stores.

The District's contest will be held November 20 at the Roosevelt Inn. Prizes range from sewing aids to college scholarships and finally, on the national level, a European holiday via TWA.

Sponsored by the New Mexico Wool Growers Association, the contest is open to girls 10 and up and adults. Girls 10-13 may enter a skirt or jumper, while girls in age groups 14-16, 17-21, and adults may make a suit, dress, or coat.

Each garment must be made entirely by the contestant of 100% American knit wool. Shoppers are reminded to copy from the bolt all information about the fabric and its manufacturer.

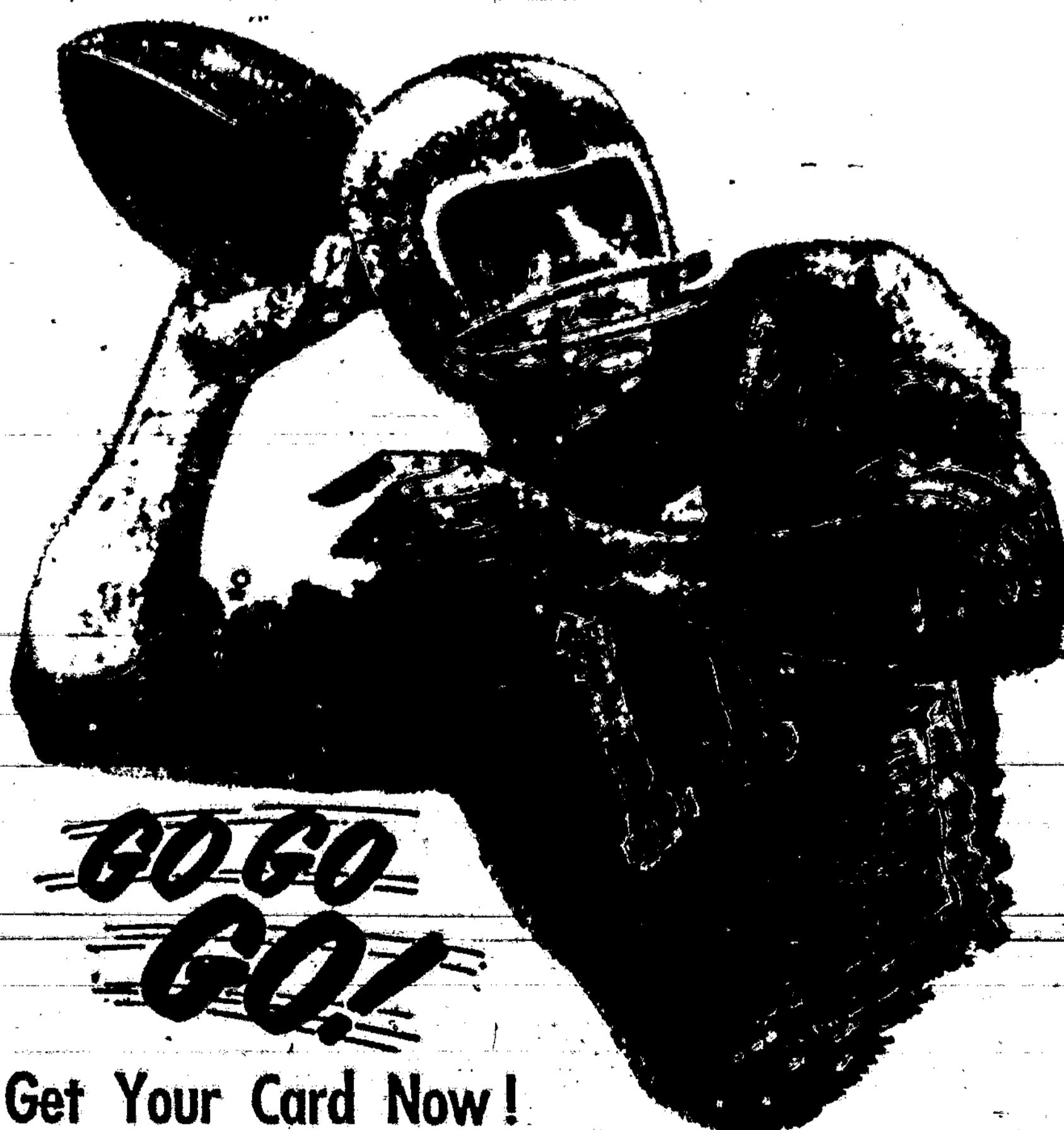

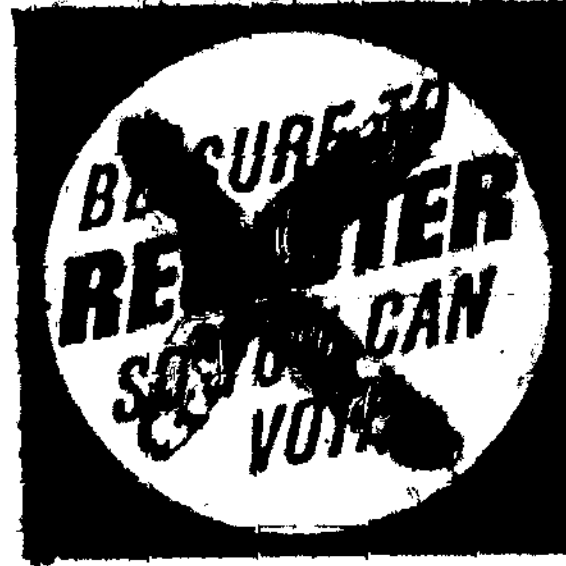
Us tax payers are taking a terrific beating in some approved ways, but in some other ways we're only asking for more... all because we're spoiled by a clover-leaf highway intersection.

FINAL COMMENT ON YOUR NEXT CHOICE

SANTA FE — There's been some final comment concerning your choice of the type of Justice of the Peace court changes that may be made.

You noted that the proposed Magistrate Court system which will be adopted only through vote approval of Amendment No. 10 — will use some 100 magistrates to replace the current JP fee system.

Main kick is that the new system may eventually cost more than the JP self-pay proposition.

Although legislation isn't written regarding the new Magistrate system, it's nearly as much as the JP fee system.

But you still have to consider the fact that you can't put a price tag on justice.

The "fee system" can never be a blanket accusation at Justices of the Peace.

But there's no way to effectively remove the injustices from any "fee system."

About all the taxpayers can do is vote in the Magistrate Court system and then depend on legislators to make it work — both in effectiveness and in areas of economy.

It's been proven that the established method doesn't work. It's yet to be proven whether the substitute will eventually be any better.

The new proposed method certainly should represent a marked step forward. But as in other sweeping changes it's still depend on the administration of the next setup.

Republicans On Big End Of Stick

New Mexico's Republicans remain on the big end of at least one stick.

It's the growing issue of conflict of interest among state legislators and employees.

The Republicans have the edge on broadcasting the fact because there are no Republicans that are now recipients.

There's no record of proof that the GOP's have done any better while in office. But they are not in office and they're causing a bundle of static.

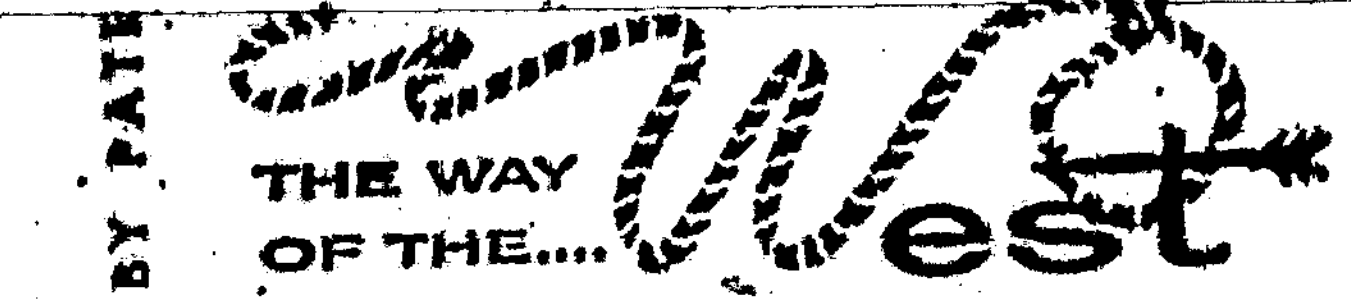
It doesn't matter what party affiliation you may claim, the surge for strict conflict of interest laws should be supported.

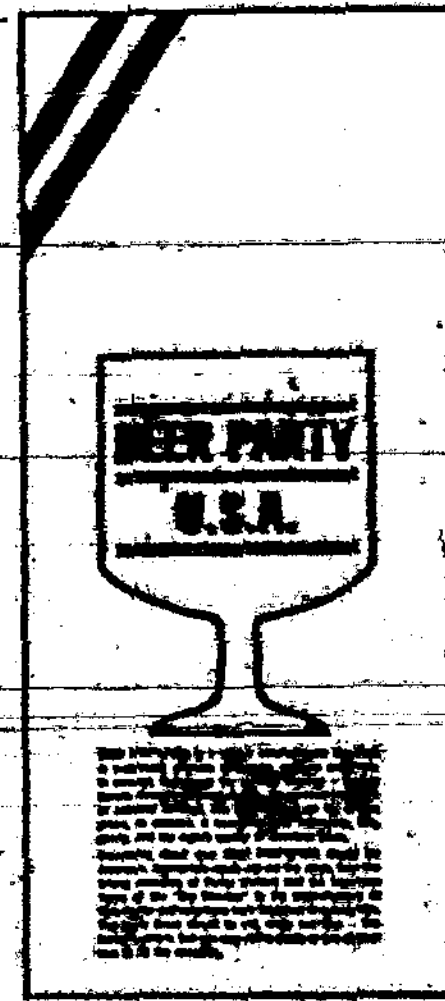
