State police have busy days

State Policemen were kept busy over the weekend with traffic accidents. On Oct. 12 a one vehicle accident involving a 59 semi owned by A. N. Sulley, occurred 14 miles south of Corona. The driver was H. C. Conley, Clovis, 40. A mechanical defect caused the truck to leave the road, land in a bar ditch and into a bank. The driver was brought to the Carrizozo hospital. The accident was checked by Albert Clouse of Corona and the driver was cited for not having a chauffeur's license. The truck was a total loss.

On October 13 at 12:03 a.m. 2 miles south of Corona an accident involving a 66 Ford Station Wagon, owned and driven by Robert D. Waldeck, Albuquerque. Driver was injured and taken to hospital. His car went off the road on the left side and turned over five times. Total wreck. Driver was cited for reckless driving by Albert Clouse. Speed, fatigue and liquor were contributing factors.

On October 14 at 7 p.m. 8.4 miles east of Hondo on U.S. 380 a 64 Cadillac driven by Berkeley Craig, Odessa, Texas, with his wife Sally hit an obstruction on the road that damaged the transmission with \$500 damage. State policeman Darrel Austin inspected the accident.

An accident one mile west of the junction of Bonito Lake and County road 176 at 12:30 a.m. involved a 1964 Ford driven by Ronald S. Jett, a serviceman just returned from Viet Nam. He was cited for failure to use due care.

On October 11 a Whitfield truck driven by Charles Wollrig went off the road 21 miles west of Carrizozo at 4:20 a.m. when the driver went to sleep at the wheel. He received severe lacerations about the face. Abel Bretha of Carrizozo who was on his way to work at Stallion stopped and gave the injured man first aid and brought him to the Carrizozo hospital. Accident was inspected by Officer Frank Knoblock.

Mr. and Mrs. Teddy Proffer and two sons, age 11 and 10, were in Carrizozo for five days as the result of their car colliding with a truck driven by Bruce Sickles of Corona about 1/4 mile south of Corona on U.S. 54. There were no injuries and no damage to truck, but about \$600 damage to the Ford Falcon driven by Mr. Proffer who is in the Navy and was on the way to Athens, Georgia. The Proffers had many nice things to say about the people in Carrizozo. They liked the town, were treated well, and enjoyed their stay here.

A car driven by Kenneth Taylor Lacey, 34 of Capitan ran into the rear end of a '58 Ford driven by Mr. Frank Vega when attempting to pass on 380 9 miles east of Carrizozo. Mrs. Vega suffered neck injuries. Mr. Lacey was jailed for reckless driving and his passenger, Tom Kemp, was jailed for disorderly conduct.

An abandoned truck was recovered by State Policeman Andy Benavidez. It was a 66 Chevy 1 1/2 Ton Truck bearing a California license tag. On investigation it was found to be stolen from San Diego. The FBI is investigating the case.

LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY

Old McMillan Log House

The thousands of tourists passing this old log (railroad tie) cabin, on U.S. 54 north of Carrizozo 16 miles at the point where Highway 10 turns off to Clovis, will not realize that this country was once the scene of much homestead activity and that building materials used in many instances were those close at hand.

When the McMillan family got ready to build on a piece of property they had homesteaded the handiest building material was railroad ties and that is what they used.

The house has stood the test of time and barring fire or destruction by present owner the house will be at the corner of 54 and 10 for years to come.

Mr. McMillan never farmed this property, he was employed by Fulmer and Wright at the power plant in White Oaks, which goes back quite a piece in the history of the area. White Oaks was the business center of the area for many years before Carrizozo came into being. There was coal up

there enough to power a light plant which in turn supplied power for the mining activity in the area.

Later lines were run to Carrizozo from the White Oaks power plant and the county seat town electrified. Our local historian says this was a pretty good house 26-40 years ago. The McMillans sold the property to W. L. Burnett, operator of the steak house in Carrizozo for many years, and the Burnetts sold the property to the Bond family who wanted

the land more than the house. More than the fact that the house was built to last a few generations it represents the ingenuity of early-day settlers of the great southwest. Times, as they knew them, were not thought to be hard. It was just their way of life to make but with conditions that some time got mighty dry. Sort of windy at Appella, kinda cold at times, and during all those times they went right ahead enjoying life as people now do in Lincoln County.

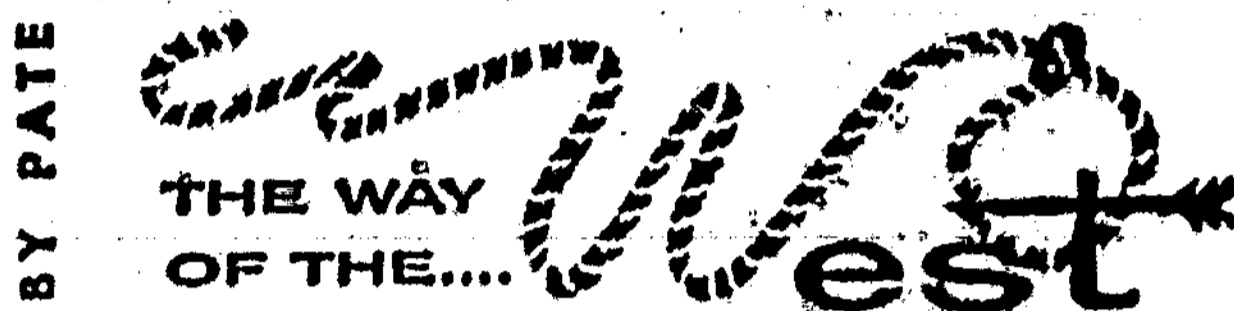

Carrizozo plans a hearty welcome for the 100 or so guests expected from Capitan, Ruidoso, Tularosa, and Alamogordo.

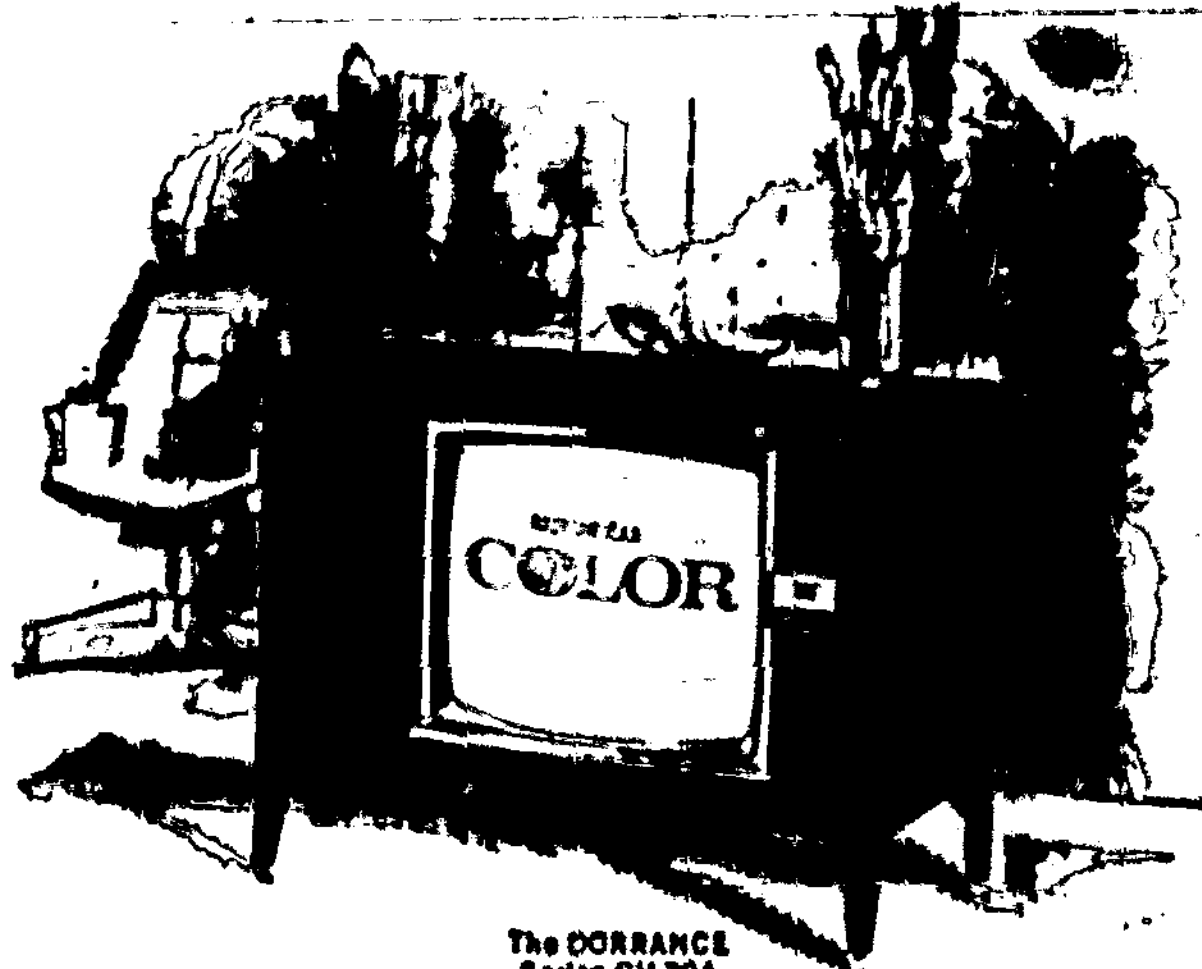
