## Republican Gov.-elect Dave Cargo says no new taxes will be needed

SANTA FE — Republican Gov.-elect Dave Cargo of Albuquerque said last weekend he will not propose new taxes to the legislature in January "but we will have to watch our budgeting."

Cargo said no new tax measures will be needed in the coming session but added, "It will take some doing" to see that expected income is enough to pay state obligations.

The new governor plans to revamp the state purchasing agent's office. "We need to change the operation," Cargo said. "There are a number of things that need to be done there." He sharply hit purchasing agent procedures in the election campaign.

Spanish-American candidates on the state tickets did not fare well in the general election, continuing a trend that has prevailed for several years.

Democrat Albert Romero of Santa Fe and Roswell lost to Republican Harold Thompson of Albuquerque for state auditor

by some 4,600 votes. Republican Ed Thomas of Los Alamos defeated Democrat Chris Sanchez of Santa Fe by about 4,200 votes for state treasurer.

Both results were startling upsets. Republicans will hold the two minor state offices for the first time in many years. Thompson and Thomas are certified public accountants. They will be the first CPAs ever to serve in the offices.

Two Spanish-American Democrats won state offices but neither has a Spanish-American name. Columbus Ferguson of Taos was elected to the State Corporation Commission. Ferguson is on the SCC now by appointment of Gov. Jack M. Campbell.

Mrs. Ernestine Evans of Santa Fe edged Mrs. Louise Bundy of Albuquerque by about 2,400 votes in a tight race for secretary of state.

In Big Bend County, Spanish-Americans won only one of 11 county offices, 5 of 18 House seats and 3 of 10 Senate races.

The major factor in heavy Democratic losses in New Mexico was the nationwide protest vote against inflation, high interest rates and prices and concern over Viet Nam, plus the normal midterm voter rebellion against the party in power in Washington.

As expected, Republicans scored heat in races for governor, netting an increase of 8 statehouses. The GOP gained 47 House seats and 3 Senate posts in Congress. The increase was slightly less than normal in an off-year in the Senate and 7 seats above the average gain for the minority party in the last 34 years in the House.

Fincher Neal of Carlsbad, strong supporter of Democrat Gene Lusk, will run for Senate majority leader since Majority Leader William Gallagher of Eagle Nest, Colfax County, was defeated in the general election by Republican Sen. Raymond Pendleton of Harding County. Neal had previously intended to seek the majority whip's job being vacated by outgoing Sen. Gordon Melody of Las Vegas.

Legislative leaders for the coming session will probably be picked at party caucuses Dec. 9 or 10 during the pre-session legislators conference in Santa Fe.

Harold Rannels of Lovington is a likely choice for chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee to succeed Melody. Rannels, a future gubernatorial prospect, has been on the committee six years. He is also chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee which split noisily and publicly last week over the State Highway Department investigation.

Three Senate Finance Committee members outrank Rannels in seniority, but all seem slated for other key Senate posts. R. C. (Ike) Morgan of Portales is expected to be president pro tem, although Morgan may try again for majority leader. Morgan lost the majority leader's job to Gallagher two years ago by just two votes.

Sen. I. M. (Ike) Smalley of Deming may choose to retain his key job as chairman of the potent Judiciary Committee. Sen. Tigo Chavez of Belen may want to remain as chairman of the strong Rules Committee.

Rep. John Mershon of Cloudcroft seems a likely choice for another term as chairman of the powerful House Appropriations and Finance Committee in the new legislature. Mershon has been on the committee since 1956 and has been chairman since 1963. He is also on the Legislative Finance Committee and was chairman in 1963-64.

Several Santa Fe County voting machines provided no space for written candidates for justices of the peace, constable or county school superintendent in the general election. No Democratic or Republican candidates ran for the offices in some precincts. Voters who wanted to write in candidates could not do so.

An early study of the newly elected legislature indicates voting in the coming session may be conservative versus liberal instead of partisan Democratic-Republican lines.

The GOP gained substantially in both houses, but Gov.-elect Cargo must attract some Democratic support to win approval of his program. The House will have 48 Democrats and 25 Republicans. There will be 25 Democrats and 17 Republicans in the Senate. The GOP gained 7 seats in the House and 13 in the Senate.

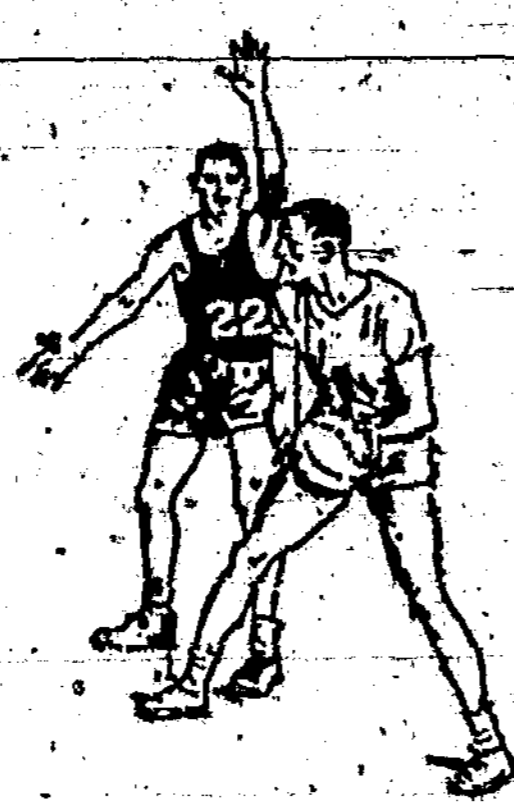

## SHREVEPORT ATTENDS TINGLEY HOSPITAL MEET

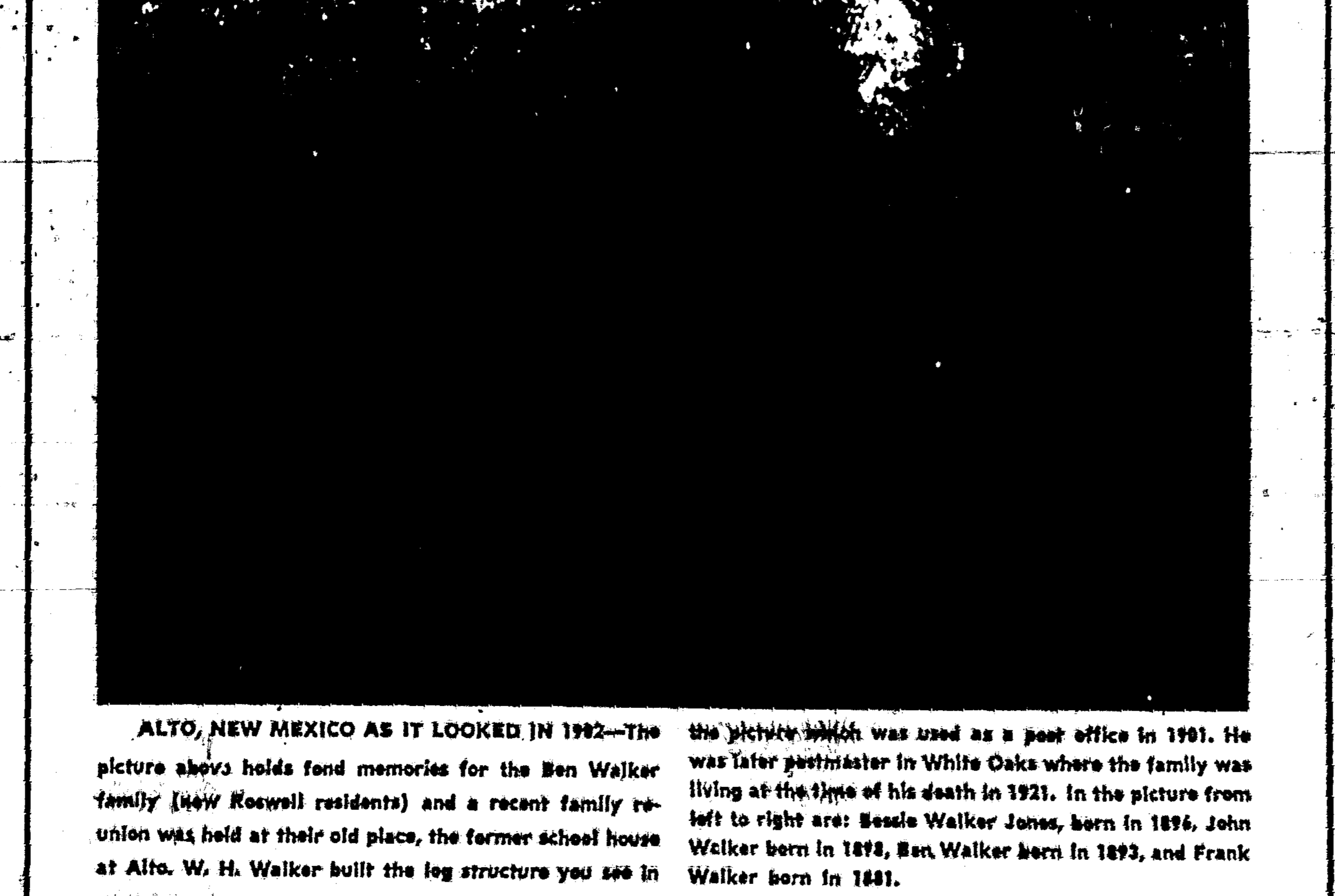

## Good Hunting reported in area

Hunting success last weekend was exceptionally good in the Guadalupe and Sacramento areas, and good in the Capitan area, according to W. Snyder of the Department of Game and Fish.

Snyder, wildlife management officer, gave the following overall details by phone from Roswell: The check station operated at Lincoln Saturday and Sunday checked 1183 hunters with 158 deer; hunter success 13.1 percent. Three bears and eight turkeys were also checked out. On Saturday a one-day check in the Guadalupe tallied 880 hunters with 147 deer, for a 25.3 percent hunter success. A road block on Monday at Highway 33 east of Duncan checked 1857 hunters with 445 deer. Hunter success was 30.5

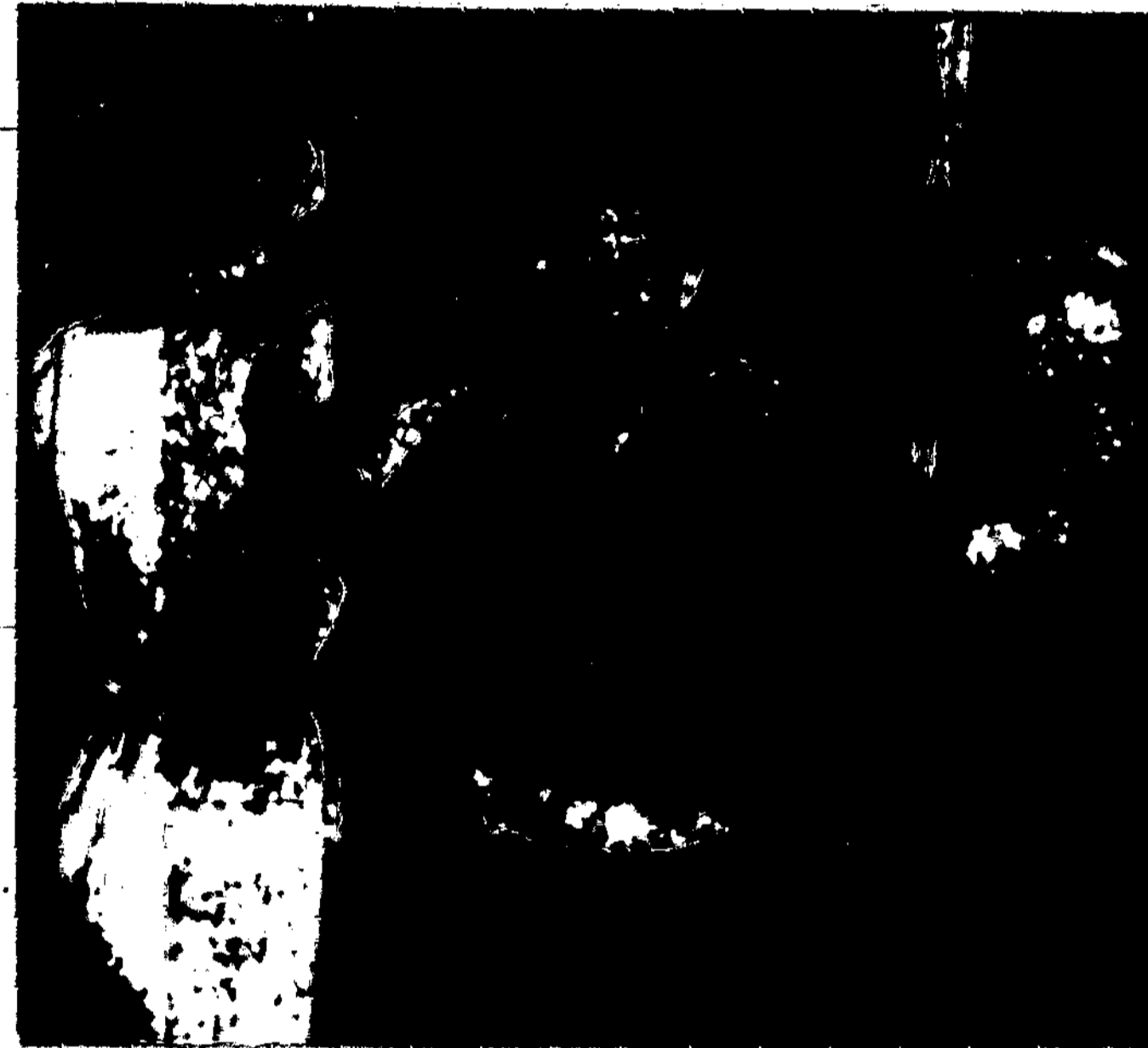

Mrs. Rebecca Silva was born on February 8, 1881 on a farm now known as the Phil Richardson Ranch near Nogal, New Mexico. Her father was killed in the Battle of Valverde and she was raised by her step-father, Mr. Henry Stutz, a German-Dutchman from Switzerland.

They made out a poor existence by dry-land farming beans, corn and pumpkins. Food also was provided by a small garden where they grew their cabbage, chili, tomatoes and smoking tobacco, this patch irrigated by a small spring nearby.

Mr. Stutz, being from Switzerland, was an expert in making longhorn cheese, sauerkraut and chow chow. Milk for the cheese was furnished by a herd of goats which Mrs. Silva (as a child) herded up Nogal Canyon and over the Tucson Mountains, leaving early and coming in late. She saw mountain lions, bobcats, and coyotes many times circling the goats and she learned to scare them away with rocks.

In 1898 she met and married Henry Silva. As a young couple they homesteaded in the Tucson Mountains, Parts of the homestead shack are still visible situated about three-quarters of a mile from the present Silva Ranch headquarters.

While Mrs. Silva did the farming, took care of the children, milked the cows and did the chores, Mr. Silva worked in the Vera Cruz mines, a walking distance of approximately eight miles, one way each day. Later he started his own business by purchasing a wagon and delivered wood to the nearby towns and as far as Roswell.

One trip that Mrs. Silva recalled was when they delivered four wagonloads of cord wood to Roswell. She remembers camping over night at what is now the Thirteen-mile Draw, thirteen miles from Roswell. They carried one and a half cords of wood in each wagon, making a total of six cords, which brought them \$30.00. With this money they bought food for the winter months.

Mrs. Silva has talked many times about the wagon trips to a salt bed located a few miles south of Willard, N. M., on the right of the present highway.

As the Silva family lived they accumulated more land and went into the cattle business together with the oldest daughter (Mrs. Frances Peralta), Mrs. Silva took charge of the cattle ranch, doing the riding, roping and branding. She became a good roper and could flank the average-size calf with ease. Mr. Silva continued working away from the ranch.

Mrs. Silva was known as a champion of the underdog, always taking sides with the unfortunate, regardless of the circumstances.

Besides all her activities on the ranch she took time out to rear fourteen children, losing the first one which burned to death at three years of age.

She many times expressed her desire that after her death she wanted her family to keep the ranch as a family unit and to love and cherish each other as brothers and sisters. She was an active worker in the Catholic Church during her long life.

In her passing Lincoln County lost a great pioneer and a great humanitarian.

Mrs. Rebecca Silva, age 85, passed away in the Alamogordo Hospital on November 3, 1966. She is survived by six sons, Fred, Alfred, Willie, Tranquilino, Livorio, and Margarito;

three daughters, Mrs. Frances Peralta, Mrs. Susie Archuleta, and Mrs. Addie Najari; two sisters, Mrs. Frank Vigil and Mrs. Anita Torres; forty-four grand children, and ninety great grandchildren.

Funeral mass was said in the Capitan Catholic Church with Fr. Anthony Bolman officiating. Honorary pall bearers were Roman Nunez, Frank Vega, Rene Griego, Jess Garrison, Johnson Stearns, Zane Leslie, S. M. Cozzens, Bud Crenshaw, Hollis Cummins, and Melvin Romero. Lucas-Wooten Chapel was in charge.

### Barbed wire is collectors item

Washington — The modern collecting mania has spread to, of all things, barbed wire.

Collecting the old-time fencing wire with sharp points is a fast growing hobby, the National Geographic Society says. Enthusiasts willingly pay as much as \$12.50 for an 18-inch segment of rusty, but rare wire.

"Barbarians," as the collectors call themselves, swap specimens of Sunderland Kink, Ross's Four-Point, Scott's Clip, Lozy Plate, The Winner, Ellwood Ribbon, and other choice samples of "the fence that tamed the West."

"Bull-Strong" Fence The late historian Walter Prescott Webb called barbed wire the Industrial Revolution's "greatest contributor to the economic conquest of the Great Plains."

Supplies of wood and stone were meager on the prairies where crops needed protection against herds of half-wild cattle. Barbed wire was the answer to a farmer's prayer for fencing that was "big light, horse high, and bull strong."

The origins of barbed wire became entangled in bitter patent fights, but historians agree that Joseph Glidden, a farmer of De Kalb, Illinois, was the first successful manufacturer of barbed wire.

Glidden, who was born in New Hampshire, patented his wire in 1874. With typical Yankee ingenuity, he adapted an old coffee mill to make the barbs and a grindstone to twist the strands.

"Glidden Wire" met with a pathy until John W. (Bet-a-Million) Gates took it to Texas.

In Texas, Gates laid the foundation for his flamboyant career as a plunger and speculator. Though Texans doubted that a little wire fence could contain an ornery longhorn, Gates proved otherwise.

"We'll give 'em a show," he told a friend. "Get the wildest damn cattle in Texas — corral 'em here with barbed wire and then let 'em try to get out. That'll show 'em. Ain't a cowhandlin' won't go for that."

Gates built a demonstration corral in the heart of San Antonio. He told the curious crowd: "This is the finest fence in the world. Light as air. Stronger than whisky. Cheaper than dirt. All steel and miles long. The cattle ain't born that can get through it."

Wire Sales Soared He was right. Twenty-five of the meanest Longhorns available exhausted themselves trying to break out of the barbed-wire corral. Before nightfall, Gates had sold hundreds of miles of "bob wire."

In 1874, 10,000 pounds of barbed wire were made and sold. Within six years, the output had soared to 85,500,000 pounds a year. Farmers accepted barbed wire more quickly than cattlemen, who complained that the "devil's rope" was strangling their traditional open range.

Fence-cutting wars broke out in Texas, Wyoming, and New Mexico as stockmen sniped fences to allow their cattle to pass. In at least one case: "While a man was putting up his fence one day in a hollow, a crowd of wire-cutters was cutting it back behind in another hollow."

The strife ended when cattlemen realized it was advantageous to fence animals in isolation and introduce superior blooded stock.

The turning point came in 1885 when the XIT Ranch started to build a barbed-wire fence around its operations spread. The fence stretched for 1,300 miles, the longest barbed-wire barrier ever erected.

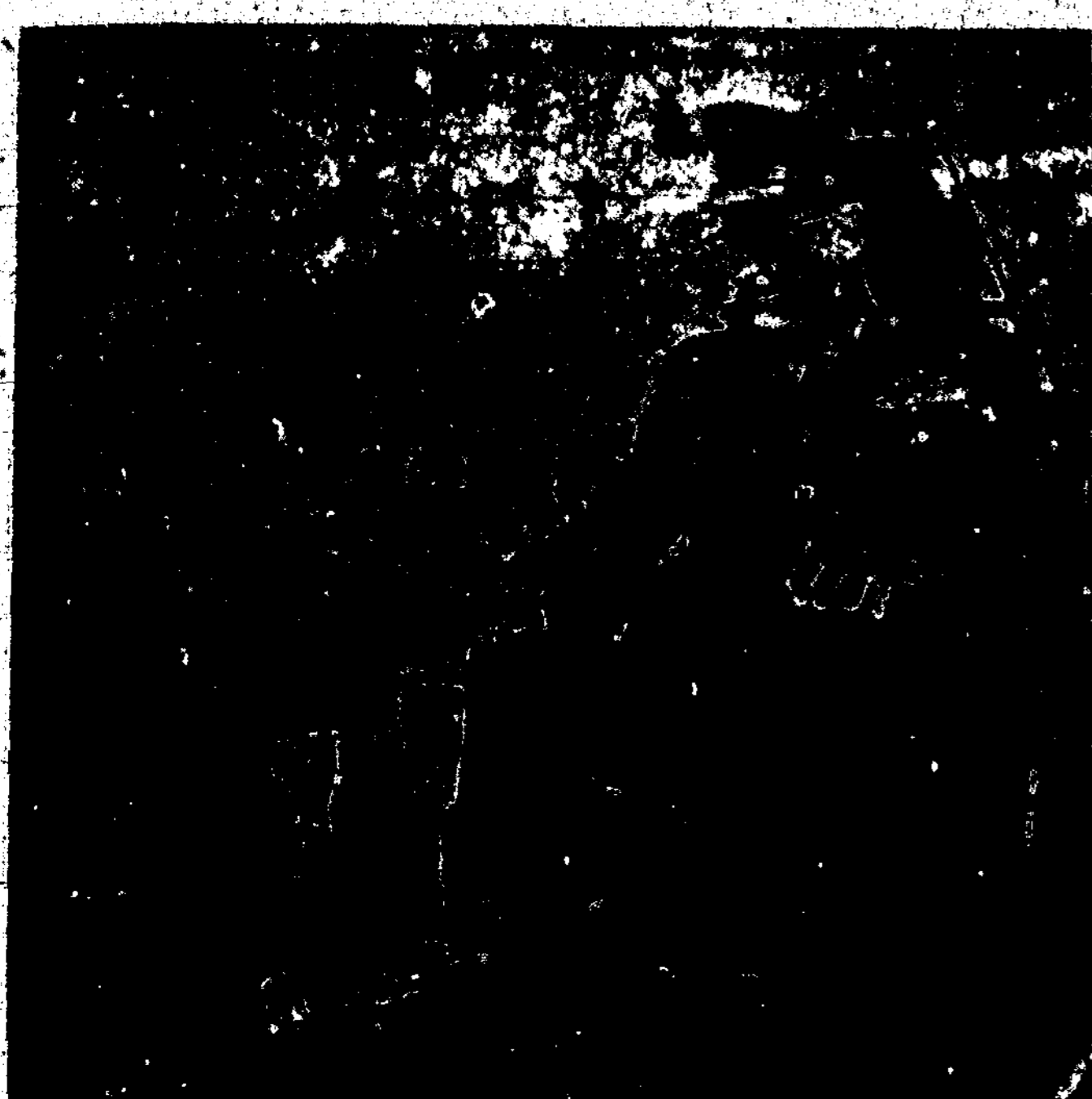

## Hunting and Fishing Report

### Bonito Lake to Close

Bonito Lake, located in the mountains west of Roswell, will close on November 30. With the exception of Bitter Lakes which closed October 15 and Bonito Lake, all other waters in Southeast New Mexico are open year round.

### Plenty of Sandhill Crane

Sandhill cranes are presently very numerous in the lower Pecos Valley. However, very few hunters are in the field pursuing this delicious-eating bird. Hunters holding a valid

bird license are entitled to kill two cranes a day and may have four in possession. The Department urges hunters to ask permission from farmers prior to going after cranes feeding in grain fields.

All of the species are considered game fish. The Sacramento perch is similar to blue gill and will grow to over 16 inches. The sargo is similar to crappie and attains weights up to five pounds in the Salton Sea. The bairdiella are similar to black bass and will grow to about four pounds in the Salton Sea. The most prized fish of the newcomers is the corvina. They have attained weights of over 30 pounds in the Salton Sea and their eating qualities are excellent. The corvina are similar in looks to the walleye.

## Constructive program of training for big happy family at Flying BR

The Flying BR, the home of New Mexico Boys Ranch, is situated on the east bank of the Rio Grande River in Northern Socorro County, nineteen miles south of Belen, New Mexico and fifty miles south of Albuquerque. ## No summer in year of 1816

Washington — Summer never came at all in the dismal year of "eighteen-hundred-and-froze-to-death."

The chilly spring of 1866 was nothing compared to that of 1816. The weather 150 years ago turned New England into a frigid disaster area, the National Geographic says.

Heavy frosts were recorded every month, a blizzard struck in June, ice storms coated trees in July, birds froze, hundreds of cattle and sheep died, crops failed, farmers perished in snowdrifts.

Scholars variously blamed a volcanic eruption and sunspots for the cold, bleakly speculating what would happen if "the sun should become tired of illuminating this gloomy planet."

Curiously, the cold year started with unseasonably warm January, according to the Old Farmer's Almanac. Three days in May were also were abnormally warm. In Salem, Massachusetts the temperature rose to 101 degrees on May 23.

In June, things changed drastically. Salem's temperature dropped from 82° to 42° overnight. It snowed in many parts of the state. On June 7 a foot of snow blanketed Williams-town.

During the next few days, there were severe frosts every night as far south as Virginia. Snow fell all across New England, in New York, and Ohio.

On June 18, the Danville, Va., North Star reported that "on the night of the 9th water froze an inch thick, and on the 10th, the vital corn crop failed."
