Lincoln County News moving to new quarters

Right now getting heat into a new building looks like the only possible holdup to the Lincoln County News moving from its present location to a location across south from the courthouse. The News is taking over the building formerly occupied by 54 Cafe and Central Package which was gutted by fire early this year, and only recently put back in shape with new steel roof by Leandro Vega, owner.

Much work has been done and a lot more to be done to get this building ready for a newspaper plant. Offices will be on the east side, machinery area on the west side of the existing

partition.

The program of setting up a central printing plant for three newspapers has been going on since June when the Lincoln County News in partnership with Jeff Hardin, bought the Torrance County newspaper. Last month, in partnership with Jim Haney, the News bought the Tularosa newspaper.

A part of the central plant setup is the switch from letterpress method of newspaper printing to offset. The Lincoln County News will move all pieces of equipment from its present location except a No. 2 Miehle flatbed press and Menges folder which items will go

to Hagerman and continue printing a New Mexico newspaper. This press and folder were bought by the Paytons in Phoenix and installed in Carrizozo four years ago.

To put the Lincoln County News in offset printing has meant the purchase of new press, a 24-inch camera which occupies more than 24 feet of floor space, plate maker, large slinks for processing offset negatives and plates, Justowriter equipment, Headliner equipment, a truck load of chemicals and numerous other photomechanical pieces of equipment.

The offset process means pasting up a newspaper page,

taking a picture of the page, using the negative to make offset plate which goes on the press. In this process it is possible for the actual ad work and new editing to be done (pasted up) in other plants, brought to Carrizozo where the printing will be done.

The Lincoln County News first started offset printing in February of 1965 with the purchase of a small offset press that handles an 11x17 inch sheet. This press has been very satisfactory and has speeded up production as well as improving quality of our commercial printing.

Going offset is different in many ways. The first impact of an offset newspaper should be the improved looks of pictures. When the types will look different, and should be more easily read. The News has gone outside its plant for many services in the past, most all of which can be performed in Carrizozo now. Our commercial printing field will be broadened as well as the newspaper field.

We plan to print our December 1 newspaper on the Miehle press, then start moving. Our intent is to not miss a week of production in Carrizozo, and with a bit of luck this can be carried out.

Ruidoso woman wins vote contest

Communications to go on display

A mobile unit "Communications Unlimited," containing highly interesting and educational displays in the field of communications, will be in Carrizozo Monday, November 28th, Boyd Harper, Manager here for Mountain States Telephone announced today.

The \$50,000 unit contains an animated display of the Telstar satellite, farm interphone - the complete communication system for farms and ranches, Touch Tone Dialing - which uses buttons similar to an adding machine instead of a dial, Phonovision - which permits telephone user to see as well as talk with another person, a display of the most modern business telephones.

Harper said that the trailer will be parked at the local school during its stay here and will be open to the public during the hours of 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. The public is cordially invited to walk through the interesting trailer exhibit. There is no admission charge.

Basketball in Lincoln County started November 18 and the results so far don't tend to prove a whole lot. Captain opens its season December 2 with Dexter at Capitan. Ruidoso opens against Tularosa November 29 so these two schools have yet to test their goal eye-balls.

They lost to Zoza, lost to Moriarty 59-53, then lost their third game Tuesday night to Jemez Valley 61-45 on the Corona court. The Cards played a good second half against Moriarty but could never catch up. Jemez was not especially good, maybe playing a little over their heads, but the Cards were not playing well at all.

Final arrangements are being made in Ruidoso for the fifth annual Ski-O-Doso, to be held Saturday, Nov. 26, at the Chaparral Convention Center in Ruidoso. By all indications it will exceed the others in all respects.

The theme is Fasching, a fall festival in the Rhine Valley, and particularly appropriate for merry making to celebrate the official opening of Sierra Blanca Ski Area. The backdrop will be a Bavarian village. Models and entrants for the title of Miss Ski-O-Doso will enter from the door of a bell tower, circle the floor on a 70 foot ramp and exit by the floor of a clock tower. Mary Winkels and TIL Watts, members of the Lincoln County Art Association, have designed and been in charge of painting this setting.

Lloyd Call, director at ENMU will emcee the festival. The Four Profs, of Roswell, will play for dancing. An interpretive dance of an Austrian Puppet Show will be given by Judy Pertea's dance students. Susan Miller will sing her latest arrangements of ski songs.

Highlight of the evening will be the crowning of Miss Ski-O-Doso. There are, to date five entrants in the contest; Cathy Maloney, who will represent the Desert Ski Club of Alamogordo; Dee Ann Jackson, who will represent Carrizozo's Schuseboomers Ski Club; Trishka Adkins, of the El Paso Ski Club; Billie Rose Salet, of Portales, who will represent the ENMU Ski Club; and Mary Evelyn Estes, of Ruidoso, the entrant of Sierra Blanca Ski Club.

San Ysidro Church between Biscuit Hill and Glenco in Lincoln County has a special significance at Thanksgiving time. Supt. Fermin Montes of Hondo has supplied interesting information on this old church and tells us that the church took its name from a Saint who lived in Spain, San Ysidro, Patron Saint of farm workers.

A figure of the Saint plowing with a team of oxen was moved from the home of Matilde Garcia and donated to the church but was later replaced by a picture.

About 1904 the Coalora Mines near Capitan sold several buildings. One of them was bought for \$50.00, dismantled and hauled, board by board with team and wagon to the church site. The rebuilding was accomplished with volunteer labor under the supervision of two carpenters, Abel Mirabal and Iginio Chaves.

Walls and floor are of the original lumber from the mine, only the roof shingles and pews being of newer material, the latter donated by Telesora Gonzales.

Except for an occasional replaced post, the fence protecting the property is the one built when the church was erected. The enclosed plot had been used for burials before the turn of the century, one of the first being that of Savinita Polaco and the latest that of Sam Sanchez, who had requested that he be laid to rest there. Santiago Garcia officially do-

nated the property to the church about 1904.

At this Thanksgiving time, in the year 1966, travelers on Highway 70 can view San Ysidro, or drive to it by crossing a new bridge over the Rio Ruidoso, and be reminded that the valleys of Lincoln County were attractive when first seen by settlers coming from foreign lands and the fertile lands of these valleys have produced the finest of crops over a span of many years — like as though San Ysidro was working right along with the farmers.

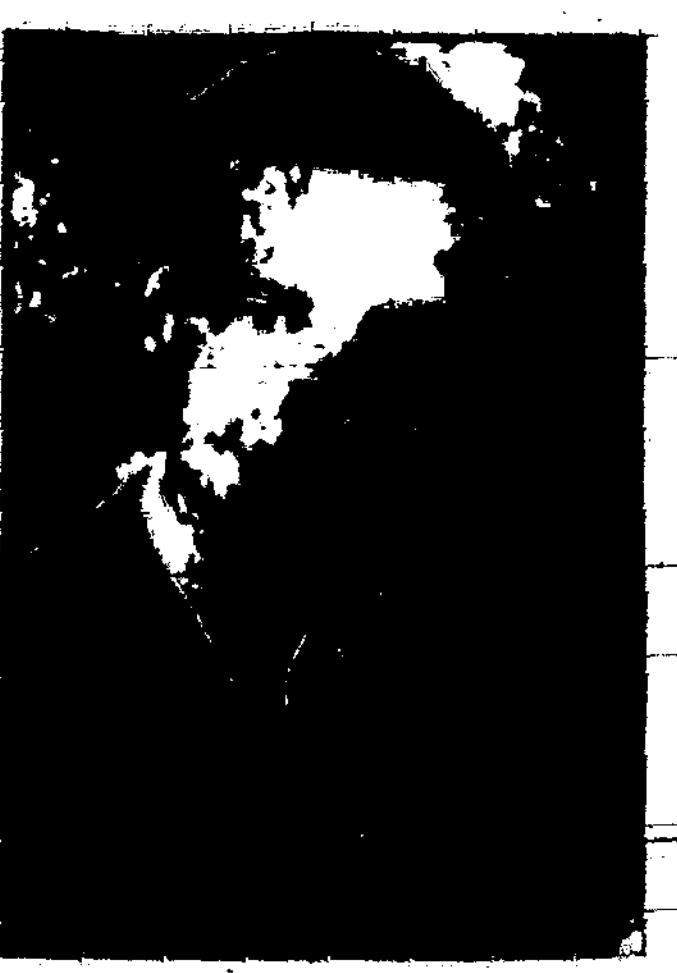

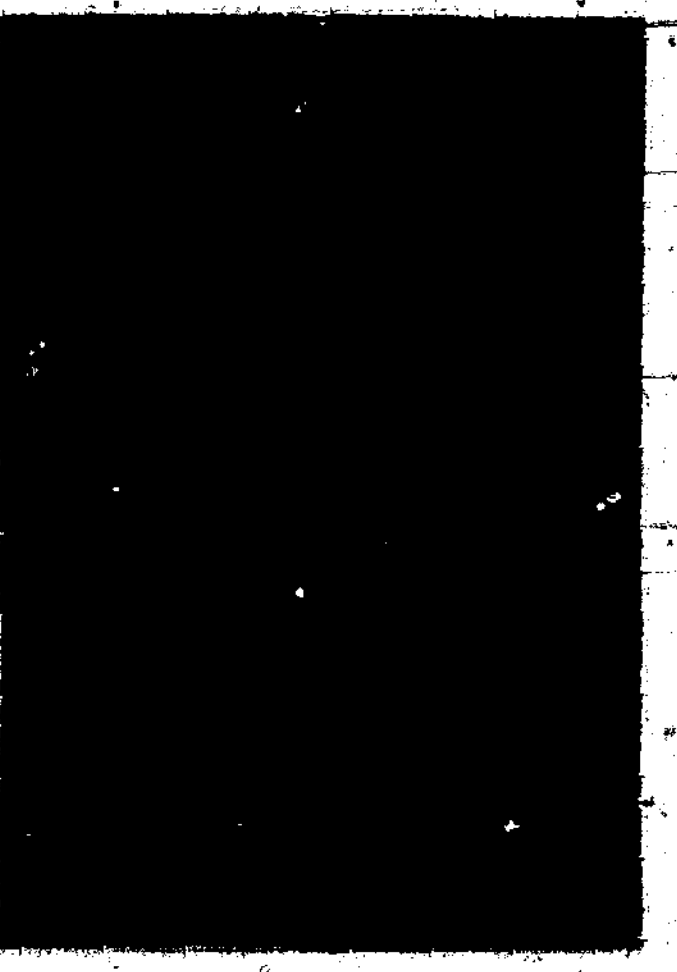

Joe Cooper is Nat'l 4-H winner

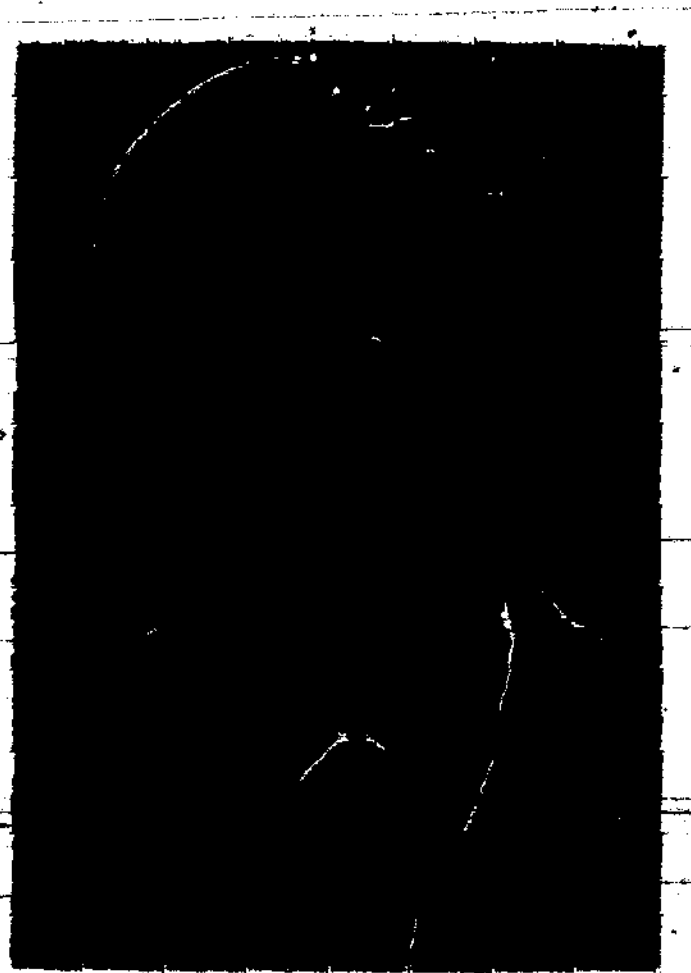

As state winners, these three 4-H members will receive expense-paid trips to the 45th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago November 27 - December 1.

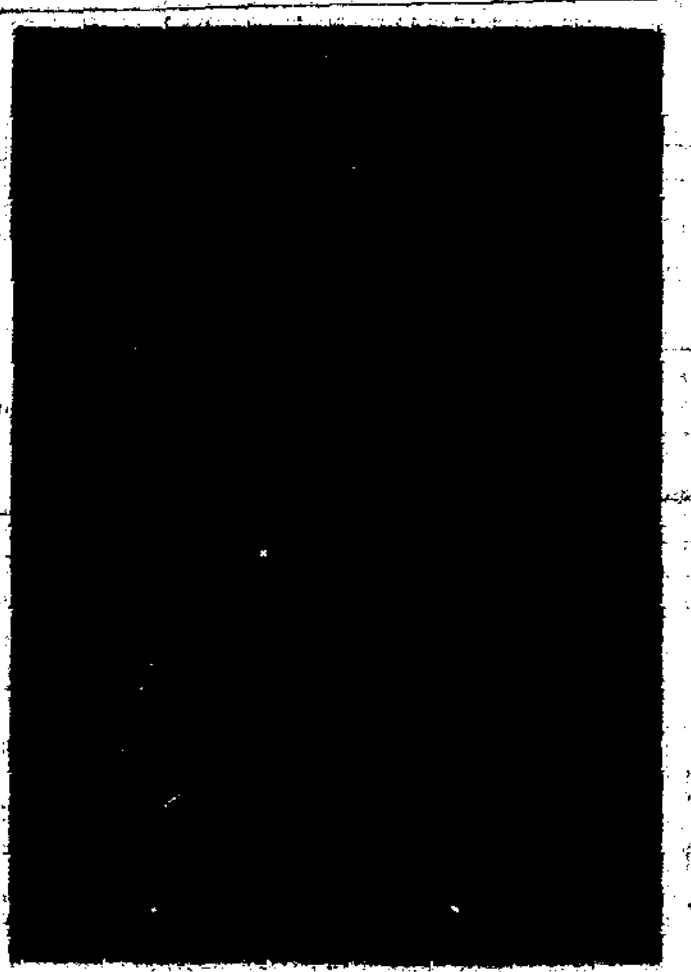
Joe Cooper, Tinnie, has been named a state and national winner in the Sheep Contest in the National 4-H Awards Program.

The ceremony was performed by Father Barranger at three o'clock in the afternoon. A reception followed at the Woman's Club.

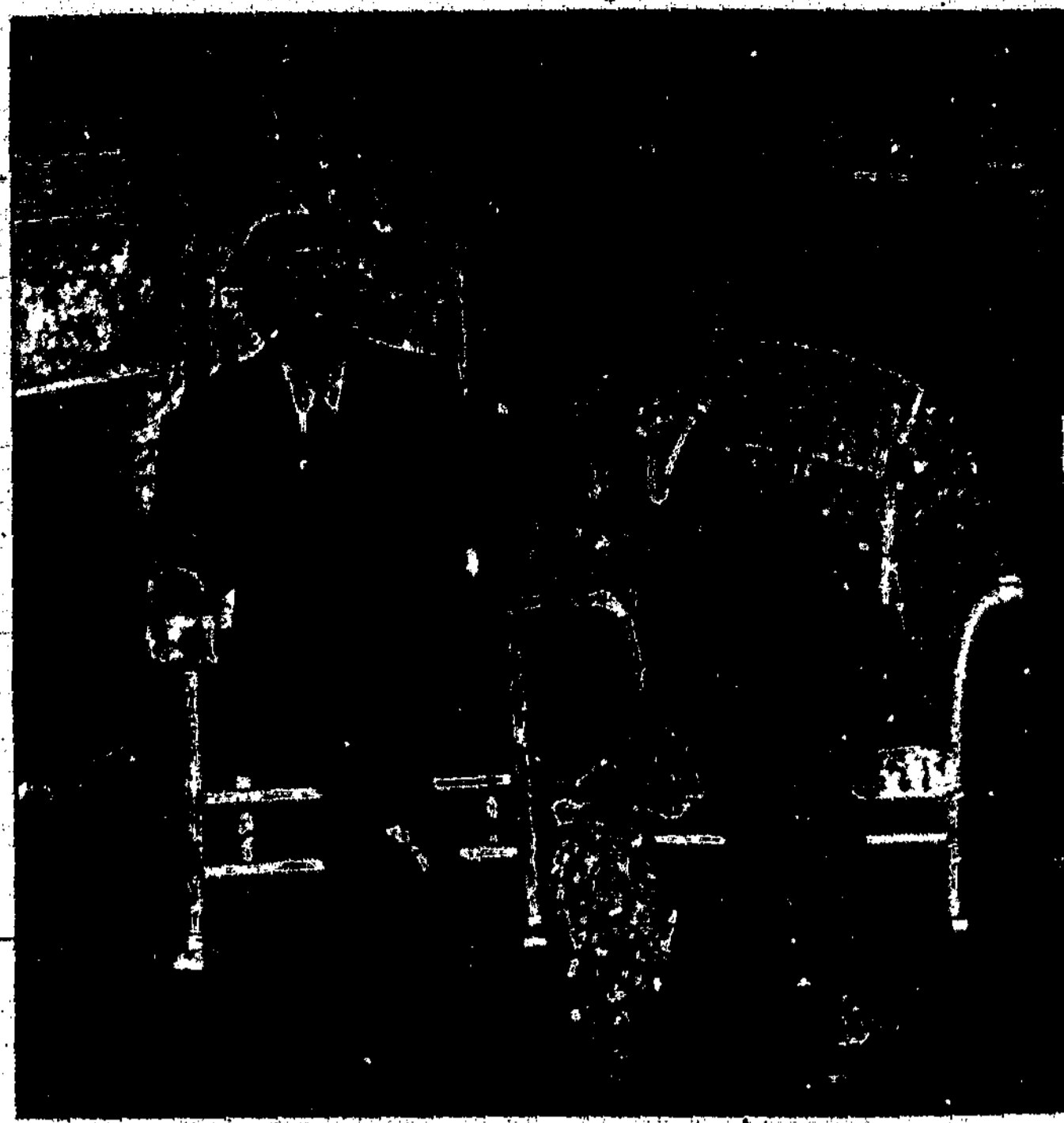
The couple are making their home in La Luz. Mr. Walter works for the Forest Service.

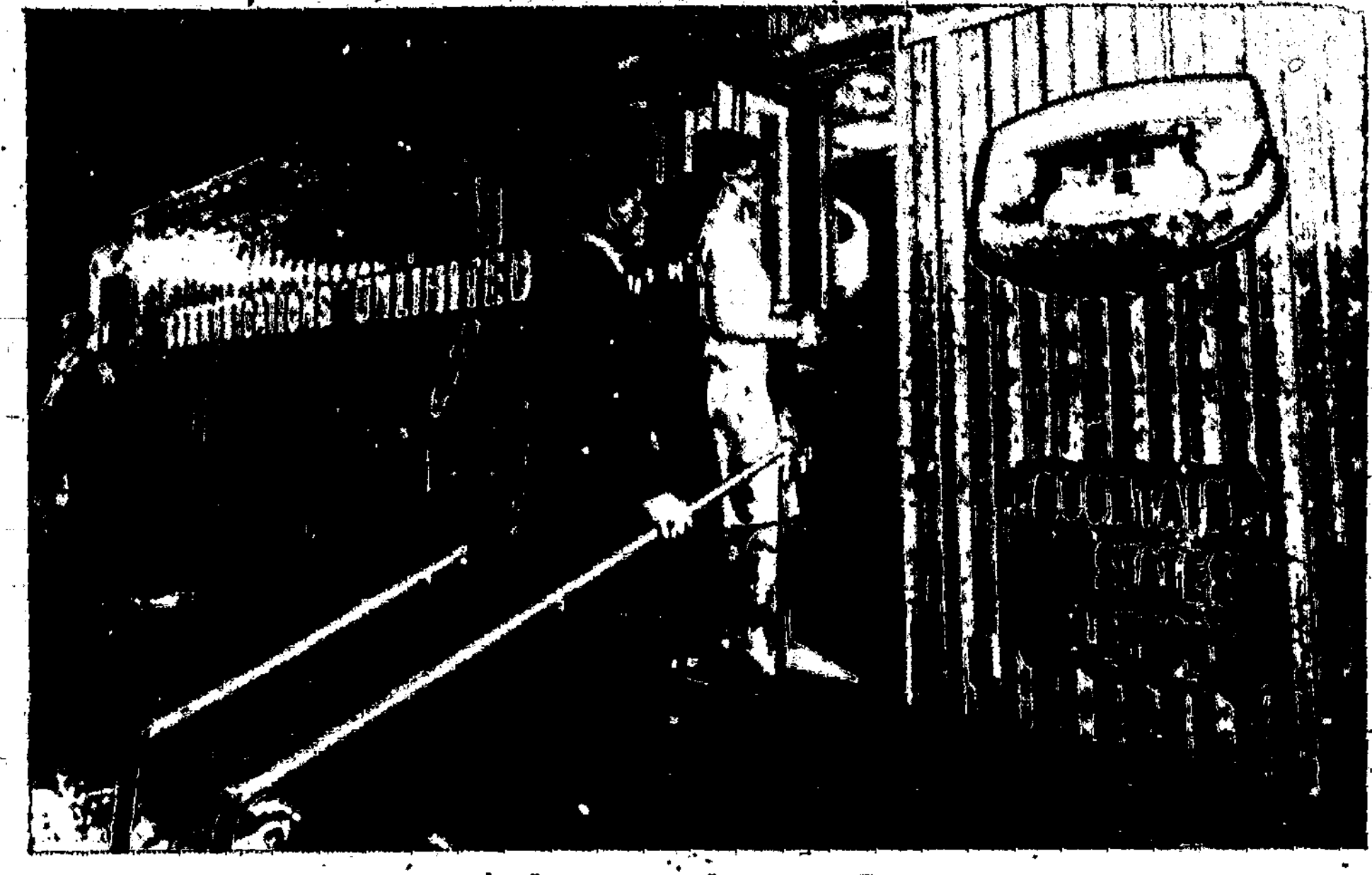

We've hardly taken time to count our many blessings around the Lincoln County News office. Since starting printing two newspapers in our office back in July and more recently publishing a third things have moved too fast.

We expect to slow our business down to a screeching halt Wednesday afternoon when this paper goes in the mail and take time to enjoy one of our favorite holidays on Thursday.

Thanksgiving time has always been a good time in our memory, as it is today. The trout are biting in Nogal Lake, days warm and nights cool, mountains beautiful with their greens and browns and some frosting on top. The Christmas season right at hand only adds emphasis to the good cheer of holiday.

Times in Lincoln County are only slightly different than in eastern Kansas years ago. There were plenty of prairie chicken and duck to hunt then, and fish caught in Deer Creek to be eaten. Our family always made several holiday expeditions to the wooded creek area for walnuts, hickory nuts, pecans, pawpaws, and persimmons which grew wild in abundance.

We can thank God on Thanksgiving for the simple and natural things of life. They are most important any time, but doubly so on this day when the harvest of the land is laid by. Such things as friends, the food on the table, the earth under our feet, the vegetation that grows all around, the good air we breathe, our faith in God are to be remembered at Thanksgiving time.

Message from the publisher

People at the Lincoln County News can offer a special thanks this Thanksgiving time for good business of the area. We will print the News dated December 1 in our present location then move to new building across from the courthouse with new equipment to print our newspaper.

A trend of the times has been central printing plants, meaning a location where several newspapers are printed and the reason for this trend has been the increasing cost of paper, equipment and labor. It used to be that we would operate our newspaper press at the most four hours a week, leaving a fairly expensive piece of equipment sitting like the rest of the week. Under the new setup our equipment will be used to print three newspapers, which will cut down on idle equipment time a lot.

Another trend of the times has been a revolution in the printing industry — the shift from letterpress to offset method of printing. In simple language, we'll no longer use movable type locked up in a form and put on the press to print, instead we'll compose our newspaper by typing (much more complicated machines than the typewriters) on paper, then photograph the entire page, use the negative to make offset plates which go on the press.

We figured for a couple of months on how to fit the new equipment in our present location. We've tried to rent building next door, none of which would work and about the same time Leandro Vega was putting a new steel roof on the building that burned out earlier in the year. We have made arrangements with Mr. Vega to occupy all of this new building. It is

being reworked inside right now to take care of newspaper requirements.

Another part of our operations that we want to change is the amount of time the publisher has available for news and advertising. Days have been stretched to the limit but still not enough time. Some way or other the Lincoln County News publisher intends to arrange for more time to get out and around.

A factor of the new operation (printing three newspapers) that is good will be the addition of three employees. We hope in time possibly to have more jobs than we will have at the start.

The newspaper printed offset looks different than what you are used to. The news type will be highly readable, with different appearance. Pictures should be the biggest improvement, and we think you will appreciate that factor and in general the results.

It should be easily understood that we think the future of this section of the country is good. Local advertising and commercial printing has been the backbone of our business and much less than half the money spent on these items comes into our office — which means that there is more business here for a person that will go after it.

Advertising Lincoln County is a necessary and worthwhile business. We want to help our town and our area progress, for the protection of the investment you have in your home or business, for the good life we enjoy here this Thanksgiving day.

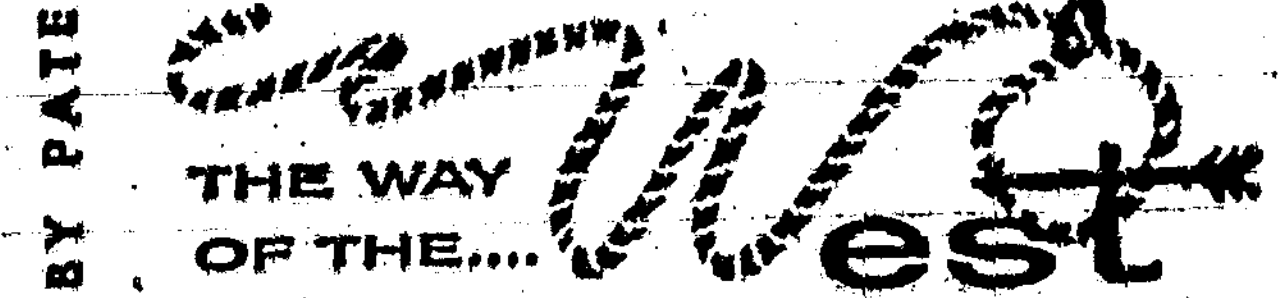

A news release from U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya hails Federal approval of medical assistance programs to low income families in New Mexico as authorized under Title 19. No doubt but that the people who benefit will like the benefits. On the other side of the Title 19 coin is another grab of Federal power which encroaches in this manner — El Mirador Home for the Aged at Alcalde, N. M. does not qualify under federal regulations to the people now housed there (48 as of October 31) cannot qualify for assistance under Title 19. An extra jolt of federal regulations will be felt shortly after the first of the coming year when nursing homes all over the state find out their facilities will not measure up to government standards and no federal money will be available to them.

There is bound to be a rash of new building for care of the aged — Carrizozo has need for such a facility for two reasons: 1) Would solve hospital nurse care. 2) Would add small payroll and provide needed facility.

Such a schedule cannot be continued . . . so we get the equipment to handle the extra newspapers, and the equipment won't fit where we are so we find building big enough.

Newspapers to be airlifted

The Post Office Department has announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

News papers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

The Postmaster General has directed that all of the parcels falling in this category be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters


SAM (Surface Airlift Mail). This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on space available, should be mailed no later than Dec. 1. Airmail should be sent no later than Dec. 10.

Chaplain Kline Observes 30th Anniversary of Ordination

"Over thirty years in His service. What a fine record. Heartiest congratulations. Memories of ordination: (Rev.) Frank Grippin, (Rev.) J. Graydon Brown, the Royce boys, Harry Noyes, and that I ushered (the night of your ordination)

The above telegram was one of the series received by Chaplain Alfred S. Kline, Pastor of Captain Methodist Church last Sunday at the church reception in observance of his Thirtieth Anniversary of ordination into the Christian Ministry.

This telegram was sent by Douglas Parker of Rutland, Vermont, who had been a boy in high school in 1936 when Chaplain Kline last saw him. Douglas made a pair of black bucking bronco goggles as a Christmas present for the chaplain, 30 years ago. One of these may be seen near the west window in the Kline home on "Outpost Hill" on the edge of Capitlan.

This 30th anniversary celebration was held in the afternoon of the Sunday in which the morning service was celebrating the 200th Anniversary of the Founding of the Methodist Church in the U. S. A. On the preceding Saturday night, Captain Methodist had celebrated the 150th anniversary of the American Bible Society. During this latter service, a most impressive blind boy from the "New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped" had read his Braille Bible. He read much about how light comes into our lives. Gary Bassett was his name.

The names of 83 persons are recorded in the Ordination Re-

ception book. They came from: Carrizozo, Pecos, Lincoln, Loyal, Alamogordo, Ruidoso, El Paso. Letters from: Cathedral of the Pines in Rindge, New Hampshire; Dept. Commander of the American Legion of New Mexico; a classmate of Troy Conference Academy who still lives in Foultney, Vermont; his brother in California, and numerous dear friends, Telephone calls from: daughter in Silver City; son in the Marines in Honolulu, and others.
