New kiva-shaped legislative building is handsome with full share of defects

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Employment down 19% in Lincoln County

A news release prepared by United States Department of Commerce census bureau electronic computer states that employment in Lincoln County fell 19 percent between March 1964 and March 1965, this according to one of the nation's economic indicators "County Business Patterns, 1965, New Mexico" issued recently by the Bureau of the Census.

payroll information gathered for the first quarter of each calendar year by the Social Security Administration covering employment in most kinds of business and industry but excluding notably agriculture and government workers and the self-employment. Number of employees in the county, in business covered by the report, for March 1965 totaled 749 as against 928 for the same month a year earlier.

First quarter payrolls for the two years were \$600,000 and \$749,000 respectively. Retail trade, the largest group of employers in the county reported a March 1965 total of 269 employees and 3-month payrolls of \$173,000. Service firms, the county's second largest group of employers, had a total of 187 employees and \$134,000 in quarterly payrolls. Lincoln county ranked 22nd

among the 32 counties in the state in March 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report. The leading counties in the state in this respect were—

Comparable figures for New

Mexico as a whole show the state's employment rose some four percent from 163,697 to 169,890 between March 1964 and March 1965. Total January-through-March 1965 payrolls amounted to \$196.0 million as against \$191.8 million for the previous year's first quarter. For the state, retail trade led with 42,122 employees and a quarterly payroll of \$33.8 million.

SANTA FE — The new kiva shaped state executive-legislative building to be dedicated Dec. 8 is handsome and likely will serve the people well but is afflicted with a full quota of defects. Electrical outlets, which appear to be of a temporary type, are only now being hurriedly installed along walls in offices which are already in use by staffs of legislative committees and state departments. Telephone connections were also lacking and are being put in place in a rush job. In many cases, circular pieces are being cut out of installed carpeting so workmen can perform necessary operations on electrical wiring in floors. Then the round pieces of carpeting are fastened back into place inside metal rings. Some office floors boast many rings, including one located in a doorway.

al veteran senators who had looked forward to serving in the attractive new legislative chamber were eliminated or defeated as a result or reapportionment this year. The new executive-legislative building, a central heating plant and a state library cost more than \$8 million. The impressive \$1 million library, dedicated November 20, could have included more facilities had not the outlay of some \$4.75 million on the executive-legislative building been so heavy. Land acquisitions, purchase of old existing buildings and demolition for the new buildings site alone cost about \$1 million. The Fort Marcy area site in northeastern Santa Fe, pushed by Rep. John J. Mershon of Cloudercroft, could have been acquired for far less. This area is incongruous, in sharp contrast to the busy location actually used, and could have been developed at much less expense.

Part of the ceiling is hanging down in one office. This office has no telephone connection and no electrical outlets although a top legislative fiscal analyst works there.

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Colors of carpeting clash in halls and offices. Legislative Service Director Clay Buchanan says there was an error in placement of the carpeting. Green and blue are conspicuously evident in some offices. Perhaps legislators were benevolent to their employees, but tops of lawmakers' desks in the Senate and House chambers are a dull black linoleum while staff desks sport attractive walnut Formica. Someone changed plans for walnut Formica for the legislators' desks. The new state building lacked the type of sprinkler system required by the state, touching off a lively hassle, that apparently is sparking remedial steps.

But the new buildings are near a complex of older state buildings, which is a convenience to visitors on business and state officials and employees alike, and they are near the downtown Santa Fe commercial area, a fact not overlooked by local merchants. If Democratic and Republican freshmen in the Senate decide to stage an uprising in their respective party caucuses December 9-10, they could overture plans of their more experienced colleagues-to-be in the election of party leaders for the next legislature. Among Democrats there are only nine returning incumbents but 10 freshmen. The difference between veterans and new-comers is even greater among Republicans with 15 freshmen and only two incumbents. In all, there will be 31 freshmen in the Senate and 11 incumbents returning. Twelve of the freshmen have prior legislative service, mostly in the House.

The luxurious governor's area is big enough for a small army. Maybe this shows prudent planning for future growth, but the vast section includes a huge reception area, a private dining room, the governor's spacious office, a roomy conference room and a well-equipped serving kitchen.

Reapportionment in only three years has radically changed the composition of both branches of the legislature and likely will fundamentally affect the course of legislation for many years.

The governor's area is impressive but future occupants of the plush sector will have difficulty campaigning with a "poor boy" approach to voters. Legislators, legislative employees and a handful of state executive agencies will occupy the new building, but the need for space for many other state agencies that are severely crowded is far greater. Legislators handsomely accommodated themselves and key executive agencies in the new building. Ironically, sever-

Letterpress, offset and lipstick

The editors of the News thought you'd enjoy reading about an article taken from "Editor & Publisher" magazine relating to the difference between letterpress and offset.

Explaining the difference between the two basic printing processes — letterpress and offset — a professor whose sense of humor paralleled his knowledge of printing arts reduced the comparison to basics for a college journalism class. First he called a comely coed to the front of the class.

"Apply a fresh coat of lip-

stick," he told her. "Then kiss me."

"That," he told the class pointing to his red-embellished cheek, "is letter press."

The teacher then removed a white linen handkerchief from his breast pocket. Tenderly he blotted the impression of the coed's lips on his cheek. Holding the folded handkerchief up so the class could see the clean impression of the kiss, he quietly said, "And this, my friends, is offset. The final result is similar to that obtained from letterpress but the process isn't nearly as interesting."

Couple of obvious facts

This is one of those weeks when the News is real thankful for its regular sponsors (advertisers) who buy enough to make this newspaper possible.

The editor - publisher - floor sweep - ad man has too many horns in the fire — like getting ready to move, being a printer, and helping get a new building ready. If it were not for the like of Riley Boren, Fred English, Steve Ritor, Austin Wooten, Elfred Jones Joe Light, Johnson Stearns and their good business we'd be in sad shape this week.

The message is that advertising does not walk in the door — the ad man has to go out after business and all the News ad man has been doing is process the advertising that walks in the front door or is on a regular schedule.

Without advertising a newspaper starves out of business without a newspaper a town lacks a voice without a voice few people know there is a town. There is a partial cure for this situation, which is greater sales effort — maybe next year.

These are weeks when urban renewal, industrial development, progress of all kinds are very

much in the news. Carrizozo has been doing some industrial development work for the past year and it has been the opinion of the News editor that the town is not ready, is not making the right moves to get ready to start asking any industry to come here.

We'll quote an expert in the field, Stanley Draper who has been the key to development in Oklahoma City. Draper is a great believer in a city — and a Chamber of Commerce — doing many things at one time. If a town sets as its only task the job of going after industry alone, it won't get it. Says Draper, "It is like a great forest. The trees that hesitate become underbrush while other trees are seeking the light."

Without business places to provide jobs, churches, schools, organizations of a town soon wither away. There is a partial cure for this situation which is greater effort on the part of many town leaders, leaders in Lions, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce, Masons, IOOF, Womans Club, churches, schools, town council.

In fact help is needed from all people in town — maybe next year.

We can do that

A first response from many people on reading the series of articles in the Albuquerque Journal about downtown development of Tulsa, Okla. — "We can't do that. We're too small."

We can do that, or anything else we want to do. We simply tailor the plan to our means and ability.

Carrizozo needs urban development (actually a walk-about

shopping center) as bad as any small town in the country. Has the same problem as Albuquerque where landowners do not want to improve or turn loose.

When you hear the phrase, "We can't do that," remind the speaker that's his opinion, not necessarily your opinion. Enough people thinking "We can do that" will make a much better town.

SENTENCING IS DELAYED FOR EUGENE V. HENSLEY

Albuquerque—Sentencing will be held later for a Ruidoso Downs race track official found guilty in U. S. District Court on eight counts of income tax evasion and filing false returns.

Eugene V. Hensley, 53, on leave of absence as the track's general manager, could be sentenced up to five years on each of four evasion counts and up to three years on each of the false return counts.

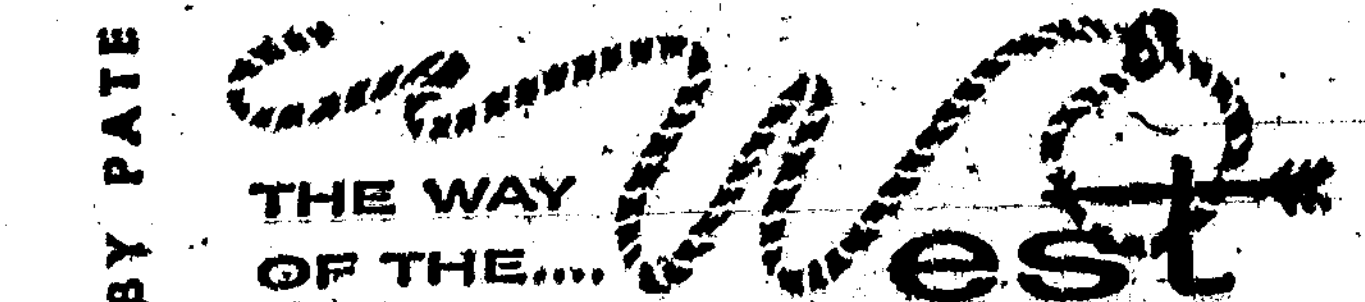
The indictments charged evasion of \$25,945 in personal income taxes and \$38,573 in corporation income taxes for 1959 and 1960.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — New Mexico Education Association is driving for a pay boost of \$763 for each professional school employee but the average salary for the 10,710 public school teachers in New Mexico last fiscal year was \$6,413.

The average annual salary for the 39 school superintendents was \$11,548 and the average for the 62 administrative assistants was \$10,983. The average was \$9,369 for non-teaching principals and \$7,278 for teaching principals.

For the present fiscal year, 36 school districts boosted pay by \$200 for beginning teachers with a B.A. Seventeen other districts hiked the B.A. beginning pay by \$300 and 10 raised the salary by \$400. Three systems jumped the starting offer by \$500.

Only 4 districts among 91 in New Mexico did not raise starting pay for beginning teachers with a B.A. for 1966-67.

In all, the NMEA will ask the next legislature for \$10 million for school personnel salary increases alone.

Other multi-million dollar requests are being made by the NMEA, one of the strongest lobby groups in the state. Many observers feel the NMEA recommendations are excessive and their enactment would unduly strain the state's fiscal capacity.

The NMEA did not endorse a candidate for governor, but many local and state NMEA leaders actively backed Gene Lusk, the losing Democratic nominee. Another large group of teachers supported winner Dave Cargo, a Republican.

School legislation will again be a prime topic in the coming session but many persons associated with state government, including some legislators, are weary of the big annual demands from school people.

The scrap over school funds will again be hectic and a bolstered move to transfer more of the state's 5-mil property tax authority to local officials will be made.

Property reappraisals, now under way in 19 counties, will aid school districts, but the state can scarcely expect local school boards to exercise initiative while heavy control over spending remains at the state level.

The latest monthly Revenue Bureau distribution of municipal sales tax collections: Clayton \$5,371; Carrizozo, \$1,406; Socorro, \$7,636; Marlarly, \$1,327; Belen \$7,356; Estancia, \$1,034; Tucumanari, \$14,579; Ruidoso, \$1,533; and Springer, \$1,681.

The new governor's family will be one of the youngest to occupy the official residence in years. Dave Cargo is 37. His wife, Ida Jo is 25, pretty and personable. Their children are Veronica, 4, David Joseph, 2, and Patrick Michael, 8 weeks. Mrs. Cargo was born in Belen.

Rep. Brad Prince, Albuquerque Republican, will introduce a bill in the legislature calling for creation of private corporations of shareholders who could invest risk capital at lower than ordinary interest rates.

Stimulation of industrial development is the intent of the bill. Arizona and Oklahoma have similar laws.

Rep. William Shreeengost, Lincoln Republican, is concerned about distances in the new multi-county House districts. Shreeengost represents Lincoln and Sierra Counties. The county seats, Carrizozo and Truth or Consequences, are 128 miles apart.

Rep. J. Milnor Rudolph, Mora Republican, represents Union, Mora and Harding counties, another big area. Shreeengost would like to find a way to assist legislators who must travel extensively to represent their whopping districts.

Sen.-elect Ed Delgado Santa Fe Democrat, will introduce a

bill in the legislature to exempt medicines and drugs sold on a doctor's prescription from the state sales tax. Delgado estimates the bill would cut state revenue less than \$2 million.

He said he would not try to exempt food and groceries from the state sales tax in 1967 because of administrative problems and because "at this time we have no quick method to replace the lost revenue which I think would be astronomical."

California, Connecticut, Florida, Maine, Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania and the city of Denver exempt food and groceries from sales taxes. The revenue loss ranges from 14.5 per cent in California to 30 per cent in Maine.

Delgado himself predicted the state income loss from exemption of medicines and drugs. No accurate estimate has yet been made of New Mexico's decrease should the legislature exempt medicines, drugs, food and groceries from the sales tax. The amount would be millions of dollars and would be difficult to replace.

Fire guts Pearl's Bar at Capitan

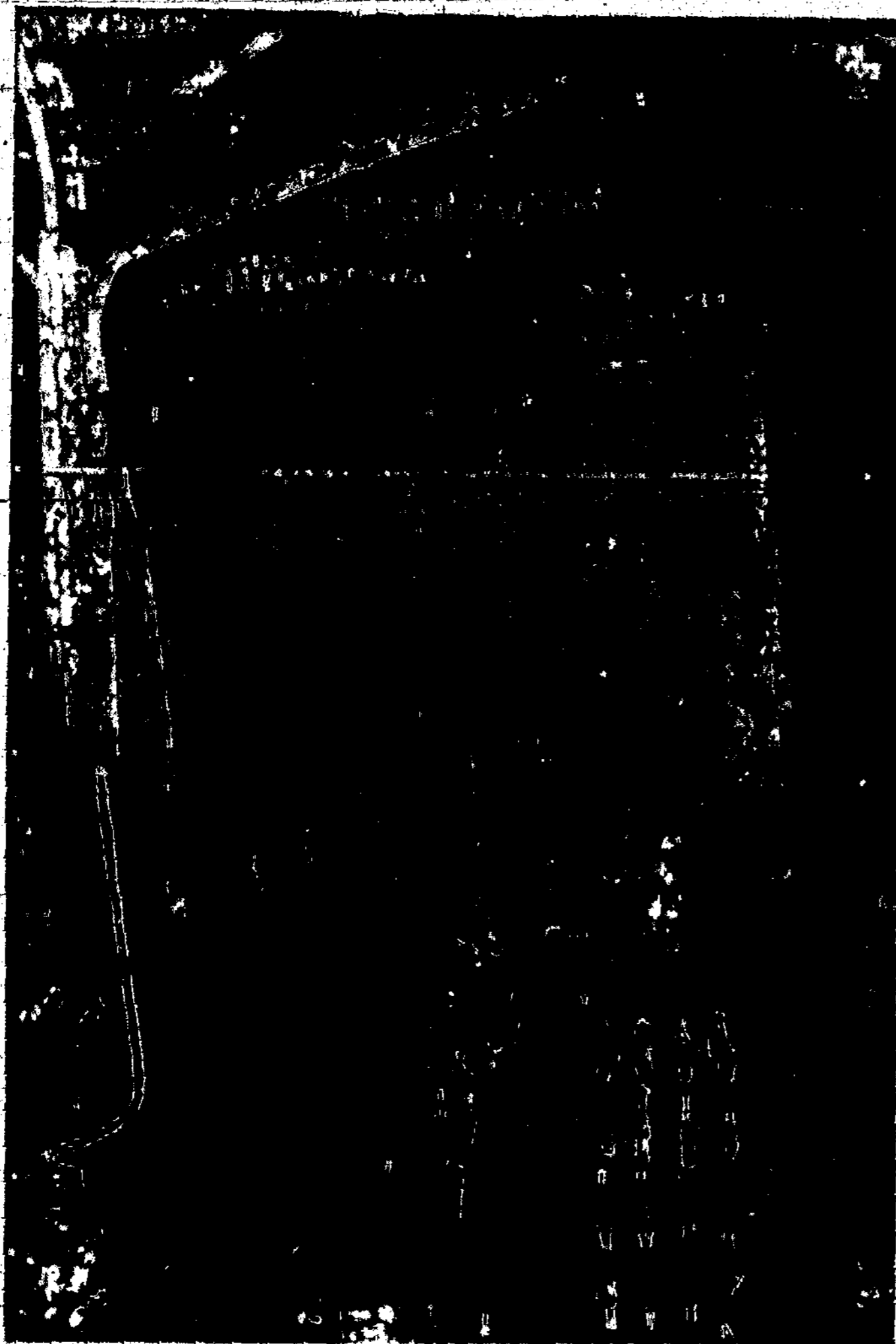
