Recreation hall bid goes to Compton firm

Nine constructing firms were present for the bid opening on the recreation hall to be built in Carrizozo, a gift from Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer.

Compton Construction Co. of Roswell had the low bid at \$190,681.00 with alternate A bid of 8,600. Alternate A is for better than, alternate air conditioning system which will be part of the contract.

C. H. Taylor construction was next low at \$197,848.00 and the bidding ranged on up to \$229,416.00. The architects had estimated the costs to be around \$215,000.00. Bids were some lower than expected, possible because contractors have some slack months ahead.

Compton estimated 210 days needed to complete the entire project. Sub-contractors will be Clark, masonry; Temple, roofing; Gilliland, electrical; Redding, mechanical.

The Paper Mill of Las Cruces had the low bid on furnishings at \$9,060.00, 90 days required to fulfill their contract.

Dr. and Mrs. Spencer were present for the bid opening and expressed approval of the contractor and the bid price. Recreation committee members Fred Chavez and Ray Wells concurred in awarding the contract to Compton, Craig Protz and A. R. Parker, representing Rowland Associates of Roswell, opened and read the bids.

Commissioners open truck bids

Bids were taken on propane gas, fire truck and employee bonds by Lincoln County Commissioners Max Oliver, Bob Shafer and Joe McKnight last week.

Cotton, Arrow and Kelth were the propane bidders, Cotton Butane low at .0984 cents.

There was only one bidder on courthouse employee bonds, treasurer \$50M, clerk \$10M, three commissioners \$5Meach, assessor \$5M, sheriff \$3M, probate judge \$500, two deputy clerks \$4M each, deputy treasurer \$10M. Annual premium \$454.89, bid of J.G. Moore Agency accepted.

Frank Tiltsworth, chief of the Hondo Valley Volunteer Fire Department, was present for the opening of bids on a new truck for his department. There were two bids, Charles Russo, representing John Bean Fire Apparatus of Cimarron, N.M. was low at \$25,132.70.

Stowaways picked up in Carrizozo

Two young hitchhikers identified as Gary L. Wisdom, 18, and James W. Hanson, 19, of Florissant, Mo. were picked up in Carrizozo Monday. On questioning they were found to be AWOL from the U.S. Navy. They had been assigned to the U.S.S. Kittyhawk, an aircraft carrier based in Yokuska, Japan. They went AWOL on Nov. 21, stowed away on another aircraft carrier which docked in San Diego on Dec. 3. They then hitchhiked from San Diego and were enroute to Missouri when they were picked up here. They had traveled over 10,000 miles -- a record distance according to shore patrol who picked up the boys here and took them to El Paso.

According to the boys they left Japan with \$30.00 between them. When they got to Carrizozo they had only one penny left and were very hungry.

They had stowed away on the U.S. bound carrier by donning their fatigue uniforms, picking up a garbage can and walking on board.

There are situations considered bad by large companies who honestly want their employees to have a day of rest, and maybe time to go to church. There is a minority group of sincere people who believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's day -- plus those who have selected the second day as their Sabbath.

There are those travelers who insist that their needs be cared for on Sunday -- and a great many service stations will sell the traveler anything he wants from ice to pajamas. There are those sympathetic souls who think the world needs medicine

on Sunday . . . and in the modern drug store you can buy anything from hoes to pretzels.

More tax revenues

SANTA FE -- The New Mexico Association of County Officials endorsed a legislative program that includes a series of bills to increase county revenues.

The county officials association recommended a statewide increase of one cent in the state sales tax for local government operations to replace the present penny municipal sales tax. Municipalities and counties would share the tax, based on collections within their boundaries.

The increase would not boost the municipal sales tax in cities where a four per cent sales tax is now paid. About 60 per cent of the New Mexico population is paying a four per cent sales tax now.

The municipal sales tax would be dropped and the state sales tax would be hiked from three to four per cent. Municipalities and counties would share receipts from the one-cent raise. The penny boost would yield about \$20 million annually. Municipal sales taxes now raise some \$8 million a year.

The county officials association also wants legislation to allow counties to levy a real-estate transfer tax of 55 cents for each \$500, or fraction thereof, of transactions. The federal government will abandon its real estate transfer tax Jan. 1, 1968.

If counties had this authority, Otero would receive \$3,556, based on experience in fiscal 1965-66, and Hidalgo would get \$997. Other potential yields from a county real estate transfer tax: De Baca, \$945; Quay, \$4,505; Catron, \$757; Chaves, \$31,600; Lea, \$18,659; Lincoln, \$5,116; Harding, \$958; Luna, \$8,738; Eddy, \$12,246; and Los Alamos, \$23,312.

Another county officials association bill would allow counties to keep 100 per cent of revenue from county occupation taxes, with liquor occupation taxes excluded. Spokesmen said a spot check showed school districts receive little income now from their share of occupation taxes.

County officials also want to raise county clerk recording fees to \$2 a page. Fees are now \$1.75 for the first page and \$1 for each additional page. Based on fees for fiscal 1965-66, Otero would gain \$3,600 a year from the increase. Other potential revenue boosts from a fee raise: Lincoln, \$2,500; Hidalgo, \$1,100; Quay, \$1,600; Lea, \$28,000; Luna, \$3,100; Eddy, \$11,500; and Los Alamos, \$5,600.

County officials also seek legislation eliminating the two-term restriction for county officials and raising terms from two to four years. They would limit service to two four-year terms.

The Constitutional Revision Commission will recommend a ceiling of two four-year terms for governors.

Both proposals may fall on deaf ears if they reach voters. New Mexico voters are traditionally reluctant to yield their authority to keep public officials close to the electorate. Unsatisfactory officials may be voted out of office after a two-year term.

Four years is a long time to suffer with a "bad apple." On the other hand, an official elected for four years has a better opportunity to move a program forward and two-year terms force officeholders to spend much time campaigning.

The county officials association also supports a study by an interim legislative committee of local government jurisdictions and the role of county government in New Mexico. Legislation calls for a committee of four representatives and three senators.

Subjects to be studied include: Reduction of county funds to the smallest practical number, consolidation of fiscal matters in a finance office, mention of county officials and first deputies only in statutes, a revolving fund to loan money to counties to pay expenses until property taxes for the budget year are received, general stream-

lining of procedures, and less budgetary control by the state.

Mrs. Ginger Yearley of Alamo is president of the county officials association whose executive committee shaped the legislative program in Santa Fe last week. Other officers: Grady Tucker, Clovis, first vice president; Bert G. Barnes, Farmington, second vice president; Jane Springer, Albuquerque, secretary, and Johnnie Parish, Tucuman, Treasurer. Rep. John J. Mershon of Cloudercroft told the pre-session

conference of legislators that earmarking of state revenue is bad policy. When revenue is earmarked, all income from the designated source must be spent for the specific purpose. Earmarking also removes revenue from legislative control, he said.

Earmarking was common in the early 1950's and the state's general fund appropriation, which is not earmarked as to source of revenue, was only about \$25 million. In the current state budget earmarking is rare and the general fund appropriation is a whopping \$178.5 million.

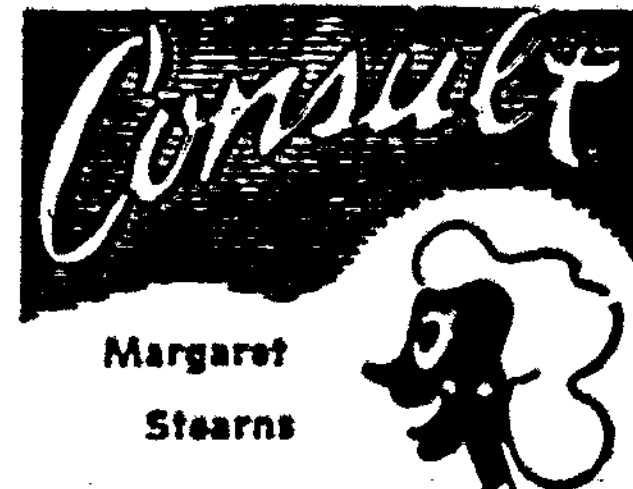

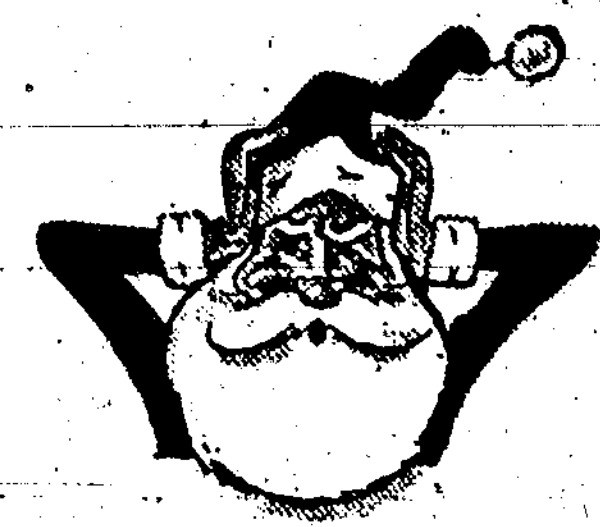

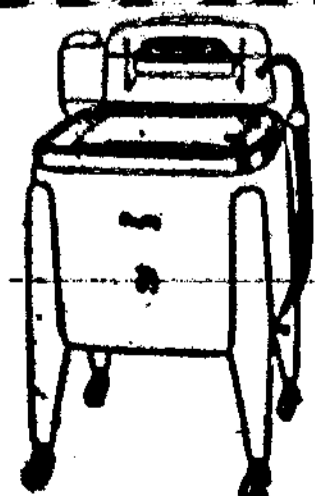
