NOTE FROM EDITOR--Since no year review was printed a year ago the News is starting this last issue of 1966 with review of 1965 and expects to go on through 1966 before January is past.

January 7 -- Around 200 people met in Ruidoso to discuss legalized gambling. Said Rev. Wm. R. Brown, "If gambling is such a good thing, whose pocket does the money flow into?" Johnson Stearns was elected vice president of Citizens State Bank at directors meeting. The long holiday weekend was reported unusually quiet.

January 14 -- Carrizozo Quarterback Club is sponsoring showing of Championship football game with Roy hour show, small charge, L. Z. Manire reported .25 moisture on Jan. 9.

January 21 -- Seven candidates file for school board at Corona, only one in Carrizozo, two in race at Capitan, five at Hondo and eight at Ruidoso. A crew of wreckers moved in on the old Carrizozo school. Corona Cardinals beat Menaull and Morlarty last week, Morgan Maxwell spent Saturday at Sierra Blanca ski run.

January 28 -- Phoebe May Taylor and Pearl Soderback clashed fenders. Carrizozo town council paid \$16,514 for airport land. Margaret Rench reports lots of work being done on Capitan sub-division, Aileen Lindamood says they had "Spring winds" in January at Alto.

February 4 -- Ten Southern Pacific cars were derailed north of White Oaks crossing Sunday night. Incumbents won in all school districts, Ranchers are having bad time with last year's rain fall 7 inches below average and only .45 has fallen this year.

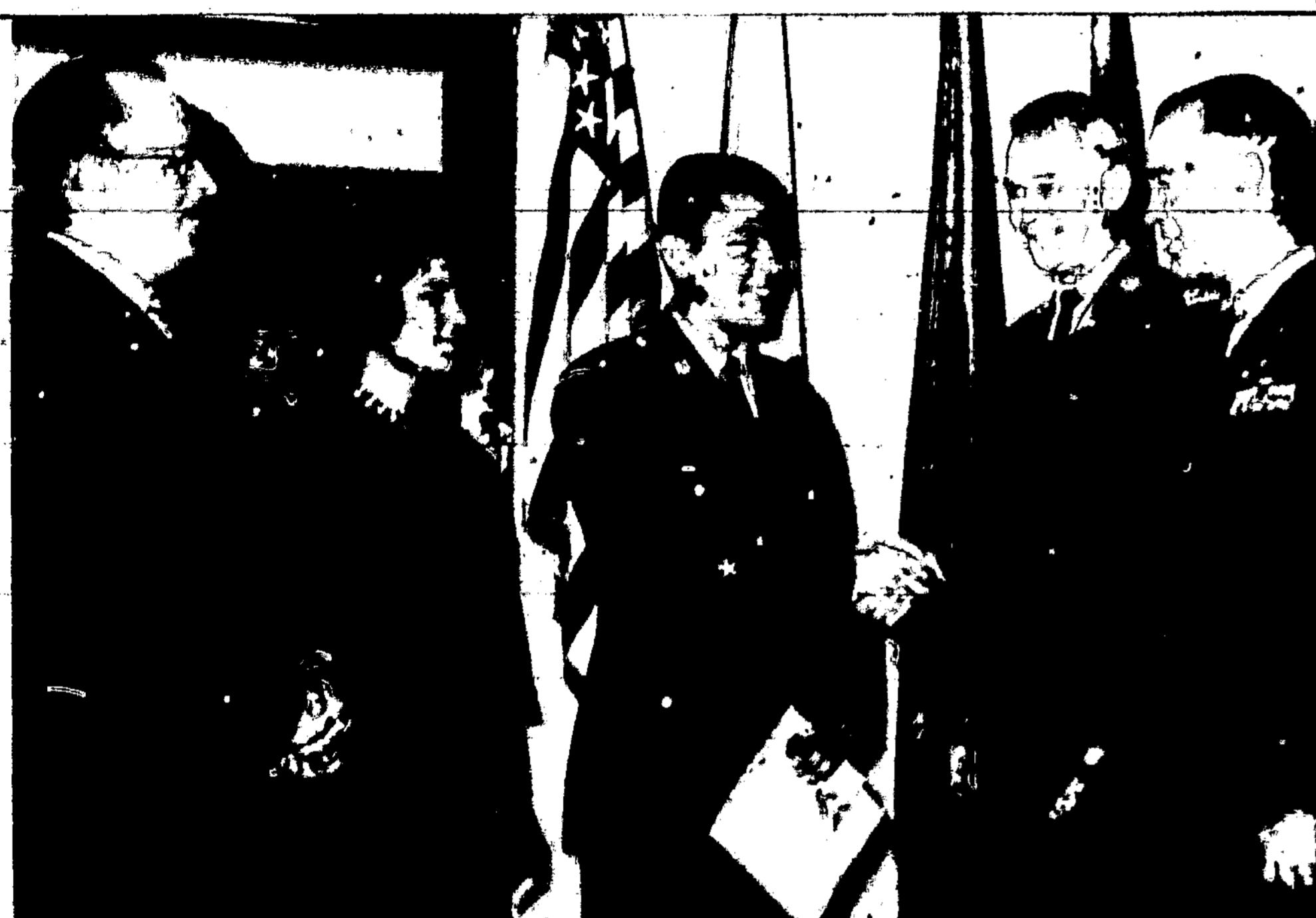

We're as proud of Bucklin people as is the entire state of Kansas.

One of the refreshing aspects of the American personality is our naive belief that any task can be done, any giant can be felled, if only we try hard enough.

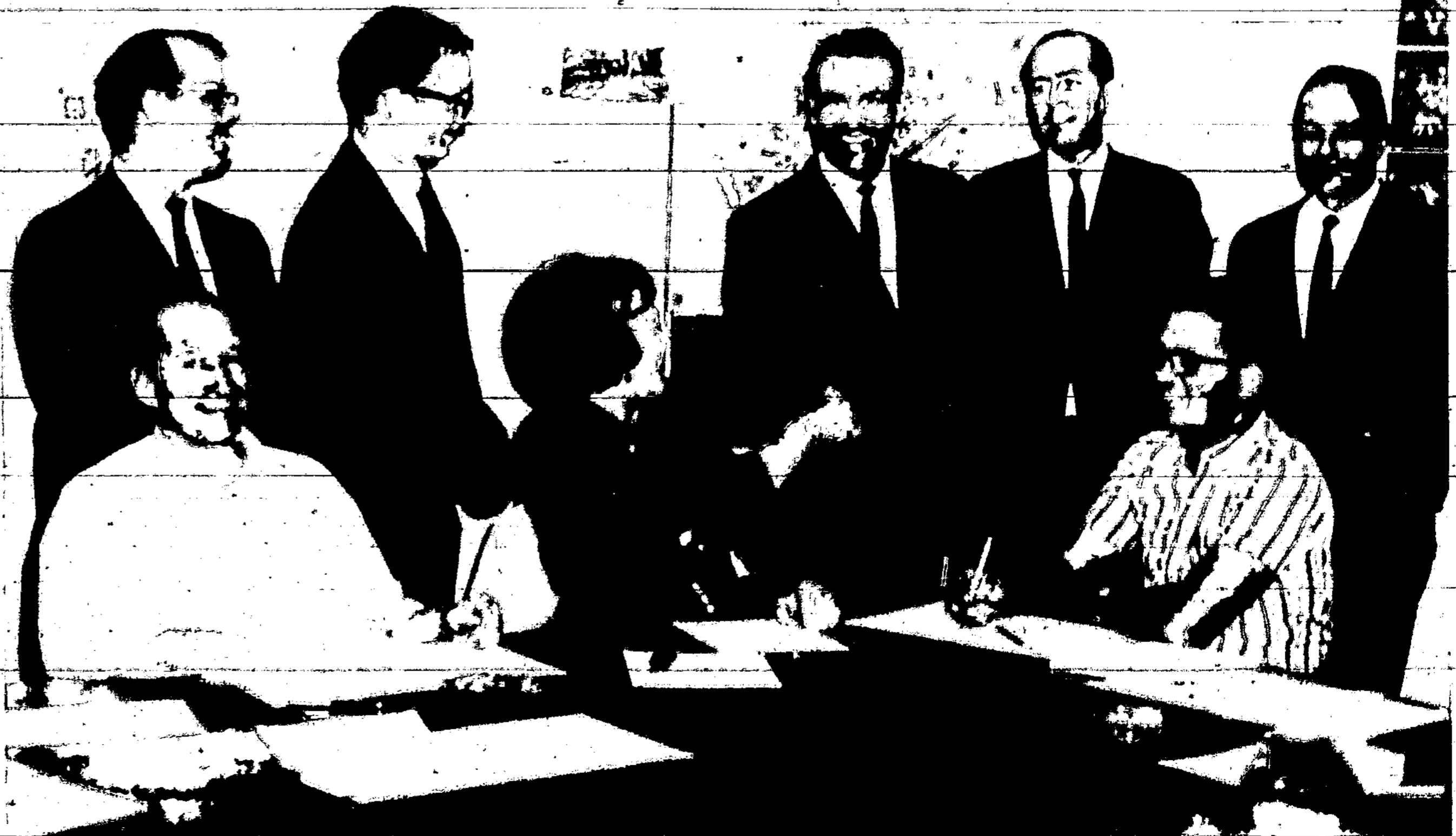
And just when we and the world begin to think this is an impossible bit of idealism, somebody comes along and proves there's something to it. Take Bucklin, a tiny community near Dodge City. Its 70-member high school band has been invited to participate in the Rose Bowl parade New Years Day. It is the smallest school ever invited to put its band thus on display before the whole observant nation. To look sloppy, play badly or march lackadaisically would be a reproach to Bucklin and to Kansas. Furthermore it would hurt the chances of any other small town band in the nation ever being invited to join in the lavish show.

Faced with such responsibilities, Bucklin has fallen to with all the vigor of a Horatio Alger hero. I has raised \$15,000 to take the band and sponsors to California. The band and its director have worked like Trojans, not only practicing their music, but also doing callisthenics that will make them strong enough to march sharply for every minute of the long parade.

They're the kind of people who keep alive in others a belief in the great capabilities of the ordinary human being. Thank goodness.

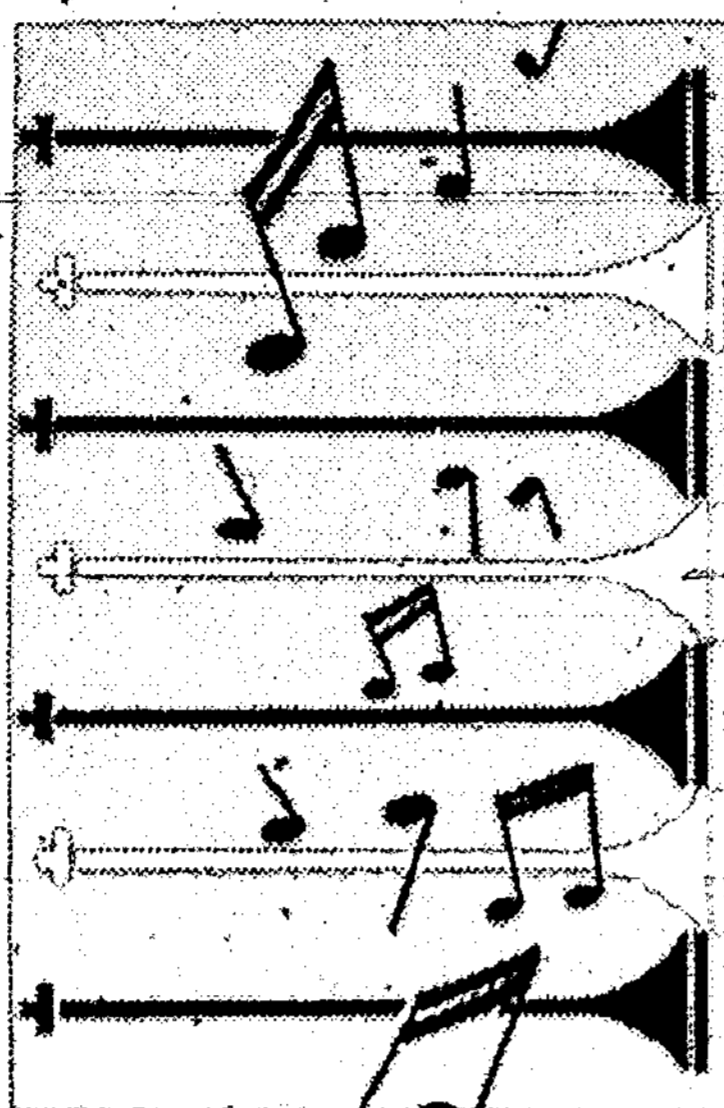

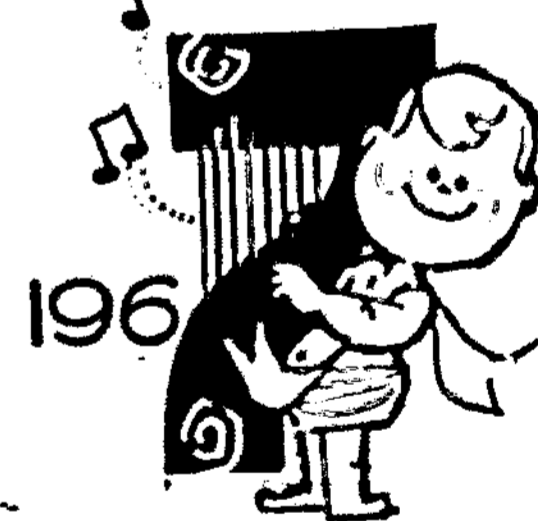

FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Three Lincoln County 4-H members will receive sheep under the Sears Sheep Program Lynn Lovelace, Carol Cooper and Cecelia Pacheco will each

receive five yearling ewes from the Fuller Ranch as the start of a breeding program.

"The Fruit Grower" has three articles on pruning fruit trees. Although the pruning systems have different names, they all point to ways of saving labor and increasing picking efficiency. Basically, the new method of pruning cuts all limbs above 12 to 14 feet. Any apple above 14 feet costs more than it is

worth to raise.

Apple marketing will be discussed at the Fruit School to be held in Hondo on February 9th. If you cannot sell an apple at a profit, there is no need to raise them. Let's look at the entire apple industry and see what we, as a group can do to improve the market.

There is a possibility of a range ram test if enough growers are interested. It is esti-

lated that around 50 to 100 rams would be involved in the test to be carried out on the Fort Stanton Range.

The Project would involve having ram lambs arrive in the late summer or early fall and run under range conditions for a year to test range adaptability of the rams. I think that this would serve as an excellent means for the rancher to test his sheep improvement pro-

gram; also, he would be able to compare it with other ranchers.

Eugene F. Parkers has been appointed to take Sid Cookloe's place at Fort Stanton. He is a 1963 graduate of New Mexico State University.

The Lincoln County 4-H Council will meet on January 10th at the Capitan School Library. Plans for 1967 will be discussed.

Lincoln County is growing up

by Walter Hubbard

Amid the cold cheerlessness of Saturday morning, electricians, carpenters, plumbers, technicians hurried with their work, with moving going on, part of the enlarged staff of the Lincoln County News tried to get material together for the paper while another part held down the office in the old location or helped in the moving and assemblies. It was a hectic, busy day as the change over to modern off-set printing was climaxing. Power and heat came on in the afternoon and everyone felt better. The testing of the new machines was then possible. A dream was coming true.

A far reaching significance of this big step forward will be better appreciated later. This modern type of off-set printing is first in some ways in New Mexico and it offers many advantages and improvements. Attention will be focused more and more upon Carrizozo, and Lincoln County, to make this big step forward took courage, foresight, know-how, and large expenditures. Larger quarters were needed to house the machines and provide room for the office staff.

Newspapers outside the large metropolitan areas as well as small businesses face problems of survival, yet they are the heart of America and free-enterprise. With the off-set printing, its speed and versatility, several newspapers working together may have this advantage and each give to its own community a service that would otherwise be impossible. This is happening here, and this week's Lincoln County News, as well as two other papers will be printed by this off-set system.

Historical records show that as a newspaper grows its community grows and with the disappearance of apathy through progressive steps more development may come forth to bring greater business activity and employment. The local newspaper has a vital mission; it must alert its readers, bring buyers and sellers together and promote civic and cultural growth. In the wake of these comes progress, the development of new ideas, and new wealth, not "made" business from tax money. The newspaper brings out the individuality of its community and citizens to promote free-enterprise and without a progressive

local newspaper this is lost, and apathy, discouragement and stagnation sets in with a decline. The far-reaching impacts of this move to advance to off-set printing will speak for itself. Lincoln County is on the move. Further, either in supplement or in accord as an independent accompaniment, view it as you please, other changes are rapidly coming to the fore. The serious status of national finances impell these long-awaited changes so necessary to a sound money and economy. A new wealth is needed to off-set the irresponsible spending and continual wars or preparations for them which cause bankruptcy finally it continued much longer. New ideas, inventions, and the development of natural resources constitute a new wealth always.

Lincoln County is a great undeveloped mineral province, just as is much of the unusual State of New Mexico. Mining will make its debut in 1987 in Lincoln County. The ores of Lincoln County are complex and the real lodes of the precious metals so rare they were either unknown or unrecognized, in the early days; and later avoided because of their problems or need for local plants before there could be successful marketing. The simple ores with their acceptance at the smelters designed for them, therefore achieved, while the complex, rich multi-value ores remained a virgin wealth that is now to be so important in our faltering economy. The Jicarilla Mining District that controversial, complex district with its large placer areas and its very rare lode, may take the lead. Three companies are now working in Jicarilla. HAPPY HUNTING AND FISHING HOLIDAYS

Excellent hunting and fishing await the southeastern New Mexico sportsman during the coming holiday season. Hunters will have the opportunity to enjoy quail, duck, goose and dove hunting. Fishermen will find all lakes and rivers in the Southeast Area which are managed as winter trout waters have been freshly stocked with rainbow trout.

Doves are in slim supply in most of the Southeast Area during this second half of the split dove season. There are a few birds reported near the Texas line south of Carlsbad and also scattered flocks along the Pecos River. The dove season closes December 30.

COMMISSION SETS JAVELINA AND BARBARY SHEEP HUNTS

There will be a special javelina hunt from February 25 to March 5, with 250 permits available. Anyone who had a permit for javelina last year is not eligible to apply for this hunt. The hunt will be held in the southwest corner of New Mexico as it was last year. Applications available at vendors and the Department of Game and Fish offices, must be in the Santa Fe office at 10 a.m. on February 1.

Chile or Chili, It's Still Good

Santa Fe -- Do you spell it "chile" or "chili"? Well, if you live in New Mexico, you'll find the chile spelling much more frequent. In the vegetable marketing world, the spelling chili or chilli seems to be more popular.

Here's what Mrs. Fabiola C. de Baca Gilber, Santa Fe County home agent emeritus and a recognized authority on New Mexico foods, has to say about the spelling of the word.

The Incans of Peru cultivated the Incans of Peru cultivated the pepper plant hundreds of years before Europeans dreamed that American existed. The

Incans called it aji (pronounced ah-hee). The Aztec (Nahua) name for the hot peppers was chilli. In the Incan language, chile means cool or cold, a name which they used for the less pungent peppers.

In New Mexico, the pepper, whether hot or mild, has always been chile.

In Mexico, the pepper is also called chile and sometimes aji, but never chili.

In writing recipes requiring the pepper, I have always called it and spelled it chile, according to New Mexican tradition.

The all-Spanish dictionaries spell it chile, giving aji as its definition.

Since chile is used in many New Mexican dishes, it should

retain its Spanish spelling - chile.

Mrs. Gilbert is the author of the famous recipe book, "Historic Cookery", published for years by the Cooperative Ex-

tension Service of New Mexico State University, though now out of print as an NMSU circular.

But no matter how you spell it, chile is still chile. There's just nothing like it.

Slow train to Torrance

First class, or any other kind of class, mail takes three days to Torrance County from Lincoln County. We communicate with people up there by bus at \$1.35 per communique, takes about three hours to make contact.

Anything the Post Office department can do to speed up mail delivery -- we are for, even to charging us more to deliver our second class mail (newspapers).

Though in the printing business we do not want the third

class (junk mail) people to lobby themselves out of an increase while both 1st and 2nd classes of mail take an increase.

We've got to pay for service, OK, just so the pay covers all classes, first class service is first class and second class service is second class. We won't scream too loud about our newspapers, which go in the mail Wednesday night, being stalled over the weekend in some central postoffice, so long as third class mail pays its way.

The long view

The News editor is real critical many Sundays of the content of his morning daily (actually three of them). The News will be a rebash of Vietnam war, notorious murders, and like materials direct from one of the wire services . . . which is the cheap way to publish a daily newspaper -- but not employing reporters to cover the local news scene.

We are equally critical of our

own product many weeks, as well as other weekly newspapers doing a good advertising job without adequate local news coverage.

The crux of the matter is know-how and money. Those publishers with money enough to pay reporters may want to keep the money in preference to hiring reporters.

A store owner told us recently that everything on his shelves

was going up in price. Newspapers have the same problem of increased costs all along the line and when a town is losing business places (Roswell, Carrizozo are examples) it makes a publisher look to his hole card.

The Congressional Record has announced it is replacing

376 typesetting machines with two electronic typesetters. The Lincoln County News has a new and modern plant . . . we think it will lower publishing costs for three or more newspapers -- which should in the long run, allow us to spend more money on news coverage -- making a better Lincoln County News.

INSIDE THE CAPITOL -- By Fred Buckles Gov.-elect has laid down purchasing ground rules

SANTA FE -- Gov.-Elect Dave Cargo laid down ground rules on state purchasing which, if followed, offer bright hope to taxpayers for the future.

The State Purchasing Office spends \$27 million of voters' money a year. Both Republicans and Democratic administrations have used the office to favor their supporters. Neither political party is without sin.

For example, Republicans in the 1961-62 Mechem administration systematically transferred the state's big insurance purchases from Democratic insurance companies to GOP agents.

In the present outgoing Democratic administration Democratic insurance agents, including several legislators, have fared handsomely.

good job, I'm just saying what we're going to do.

"Wherever possible there is going to be competitive bidding. There will be no splitting of bids and there's going to be no favoritism shown. The idea is that everything is going to be handled fairly and properly and that the state gets the benefit of a good deal.

"Purchases will be awarded to other than the low bidder only when there is good reason. Beyond this, it's not going to be done. Another thing we're going to be awfully careful of is this business of emergency purchases. There had better be a pretty good reason for it."

Emergency purchases without competitive bidding are sometimes made by state agencies, sometimes made by state agencies, municipalities or counties and approval is sought afterward from the State Board of Finance.

Purchase splitting is dividing an order into parts so that each costs less than \$1,000 and can be bought without sealed bids. Purchases below \$1,000 can be made on informal bidding by obtaining three prices from sellers. Purchase splitting is a method of circumventing the law.

Announcing his new state purchasing agent, Cargo said he is going to change all this. The young incoming governor said: "That provision of the law that provides that there shall be competitive bids whenever purchases exceed \$1,000 is going to be respected and I mean right down to the T."

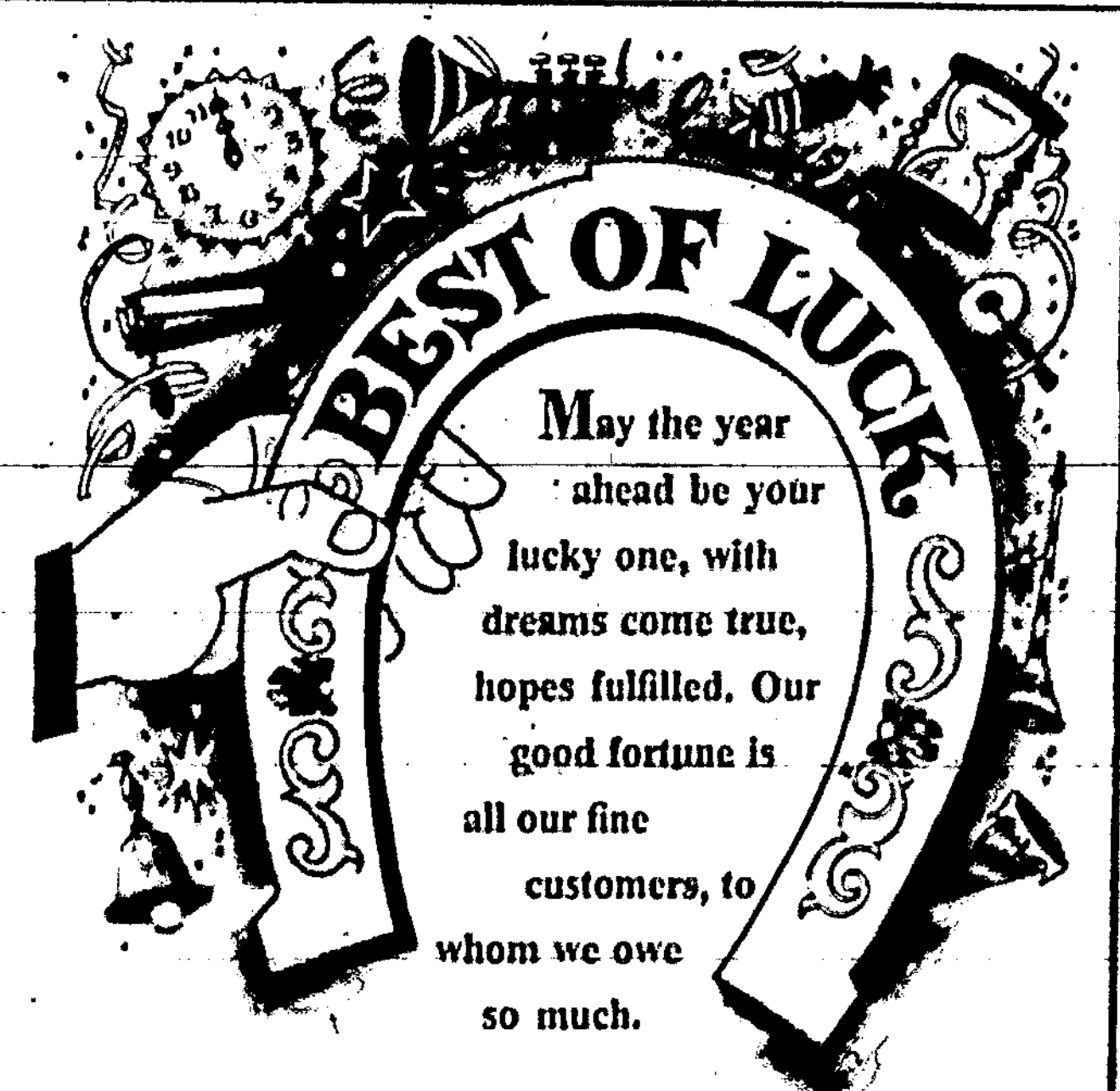



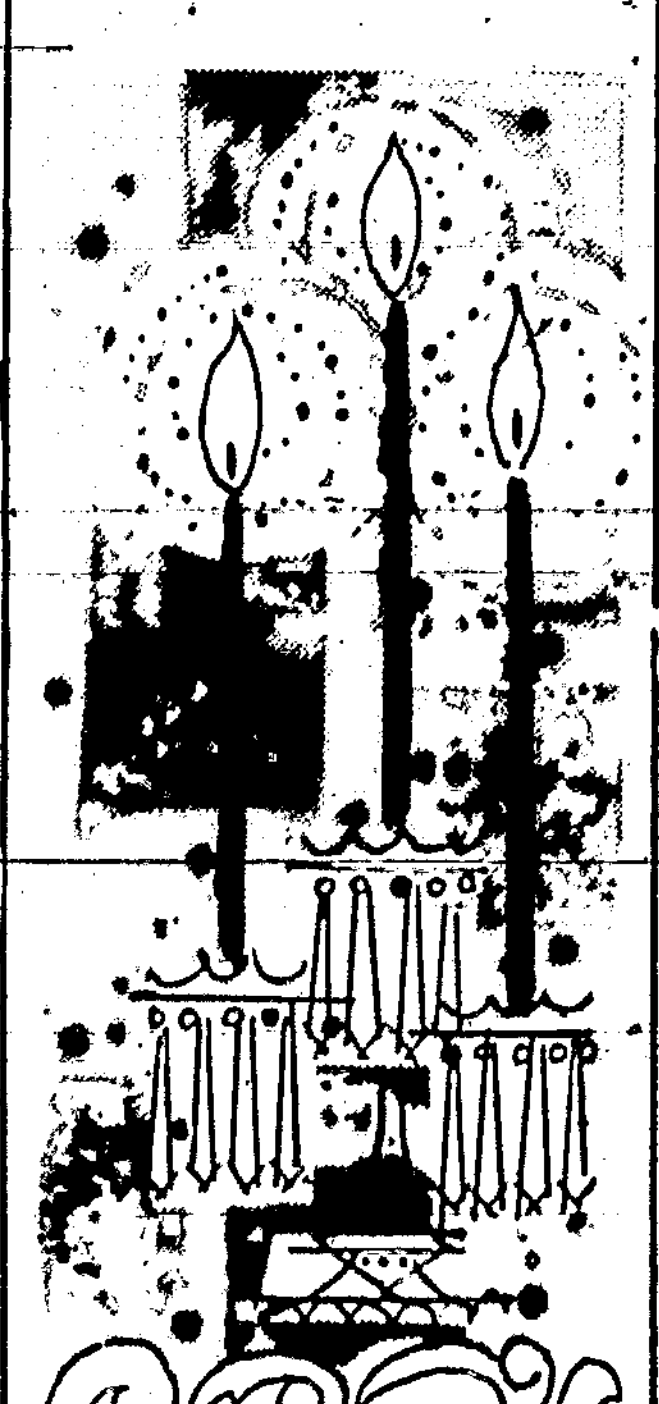
