Letter of commitment to cite repair work

After a rather rough start, the meeting called by Lincoln County commissioners to solve new courthouse problems, settled down and as much was accomplished as could be at this meeting.

Commissioners Max Oliver, Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer made it plain from the start that they were there for action. At one point in the meeting Architect Charley Nolan was telling that he had expected another party to do the job, the party had failed and the job wasn't done. Chairman Oliver told the group that such a situation had been their problem since early summer — someone else was supposed to do the job and never did it.

At the opening of the meeting DA Ernest H. Williams, Las Cruces, and Assistant DA Robert Sandifer were present and explained that the commission-

ers had not discussed any legal action with them, that they were present as representatives of the people of Lincoln County. Following some discussion with the architects, whether or not they (the architects) should have legal representation, the meeting went ahead.

Going back to the beginning — Lincoln County Commissioner Charles A. Jones, Roman Nunez, and Kenneth Nosker made their first contract with the architectural firm of Voll, Buffington & Nolan. Then plans were drawn up and bids called. Contracting firm of Ballard & Bates presented the low bid. This was their first contract as a partnership.

Ballard & Bates followed the route of subcontracting much of the construction work. For various reasons the construction time dragged along and dragged along, until the completion date

was long past. Maybe the job lacked supervision, parts, or a small piece of work done — in any case it sure lacked coordination.

The new commissioners took office in January of 1965 as the building was reaching the last stages of construction. The new Lincoln County courthouse was dedicated May 8, 1965, but final acceptance has never been completed.

Architect Jim Voll explained at the meeting that all concrete buildings will defect a certain amount, meaning that the concrete moves, and that adequate allowance has been made in the original plans, as much as one-half inch in certain instances. Apparently in construction this half inch allowance for movement was shortened, or was not enough to start with, so that pressure from concrete movement caused

glass to bulge, doors to stick, paint to crack off, floor to crack, mullion between window glass to bulge.

Lincoln County commissioners named other work that needed to be done, which made quite a list but none of this type resulted from structural or workmanship defects, mostly from buck-passing and someone not doing what should have been done.

Jim Dambold, structural engineer of Lawton, Okla., and John Fulgenzi, structural engineer of Albuquerque were present. Fulgenzi told of one concrete job where the material deflected as much as an inch and a half.

The situation is this with the new Lincoln County courthouse — by April the building will have gone through a complete cycle of seasons and the concrete material should be at the

end of any noticeable deflection (movement). And by March or April all repairs could be completed with the feeling that no more should be needed.

To this end a letter of commitment will be drawn up by the architects, with commitment from the contractor (or contractors) as to what will be done. The letter will be submitted to Lincoln County commissioners. Exact date of completion of repair work was not indicated at the meeting.

An area of plate glass, now under heavy pressure and bulging, will be barricaded so that no one will be injured should the glass shatter. Replacement of glass is expected to be the major cost of repair . . . no repair costs to be born by the county . . . because the glass is under pressure and probably cannot be removed short of breaking.

School financing to be discussed

Representatives from all five Lincoln County schools met Tuesday night in Capitan and made plans for a meeting to be held January 12, 7:30 p.m., in the Capitan gym, for all teachers and administrators, school board members and school patrons of the county.

The subject of discussion will be school finance. Rep W. G. Shreengost and possibly Sen. Joe Sikeen will be present.

Lincoln County school people would like a base of \$268 per youngster, and want to hold the line at that figure. They would like to see every school district receive \$400 for each master's degree teacher in the district, and \$50-per-year experience money for all teachers in the district.

County school people favor permissive legislation allowing a district to go above five mills if a district so chooses.

Strange petition goes to Governor

SANTA FE — There's a rather unique petition in circulation now that was submitted to Gov. Jack Campbell from Paul L. Hill, now a resident of Farmington.

The petition asks for a pardon from Gov. Campbell for a crime that Hill served time for in the penitentiary, but maintains an innocence to the charge.

In matters of this nature, Gov. Campbell refers the petition to the Probation and Parole Board. An official of this board said last week that the petition "would be considered" in the future but that many matters were presently before the board and no immediate decision was expected. The "immediate decision" involved will be whether or not to launch an investigation into the matter. If the board decides there is merit in the case, then the investigation could conceivably produce some extremely unusual information.

The petition states that on the 16th day of November, Paul Hill plead innocent to a charge of sodomy. It further states that a \$5,000 bond was set in the case and the bond was made.

Hill then states in his petition that he was "offered" a six-month jail sentence if he would change his plea to "guilty." He says he refused to do so.

Later, he states, he was offered a chance to be sent to

Dexter, lost to Zozo in triple overtime at Ruidoso, rated about a step ahead of Cloudcroft.

Hondo, has two real good boys in Harold Radcliff and Bobby Richardson, both seniors. They'll be looking for help next year.

Corona, real well balanced. Roman Tenorio and Alan Brunson both real good boys, they've had only one bad night, the week Floyd came through Lincoln County.

Capitan, has Wm. Herrera, a powerhouse in football and a hothead in basketball, hit 27 points against Zozo in game won by Zozo 73-71.

The team that can beat St. Peters ought to be a conference winner.

Coach Duane Evans of the Carrizozo Grizzlies started out with a basketball team that was very down last year and still playing football this year — no small handicap. Some of the starting twelve have come along fine, others need more seasoning to be of much help this year.

Lots of luck and odd happenings surround rescue of lost skiers

Three groups of lost skiers kept the Sierra Blanca Ski area in a state of excitement over the New Year's weekend. Before skiers were located an estimated 100 persons took part in the search with two helicopters and several private planes joining the search from the air.


Luckily temperatures were mild and the skiers were all rescued with no serious ill effects suffered, after two nights and one day spent in waist deep snow on the Sierra Blanca slopes.

Most of the search was carried on in areas not accessible to cars or jeeps. Searchers were on horseback or skis. The first three of the nine lost persons were brought out by horseback by Ed Wimberly and Harlan McGraw, both of Ruidoso. Later the rescue of the remaining ones was effected by bringing in a big snow Cat and sled.

The helicopters proved inadequate for the search being unable to make it over the mountains. The Air Force sent out a big rescue helicopter, equipped with ropes and basket but it arrived after the skiers had been rescued.

Two members of the search party, Pat Leonard of Las Cruces and Ray Hyde, Ruidoso, went over the top and down on the west side toward Three Rivers. Darkness came on and they got lost. Ranchers in the Three Rivers area were alerted and five men, including Billy Stephenson, Ray Walker, and Amador Martinez started out in search of the skiers. In the meantime they had been attracted by lights in a ranch house and were guided to safety by these lights.

The fact that all were rescued and none suffered serious injury makes a happy ending to a thrilling rescue story.







Monster in the Gallinas Mountains

A demonstration of the Letourneau tree crusher was set up on the William Bates Ranch south of Corona jointly by Mr. Bates and the Forest Service. On the grounds at Corona getting ready for the demonstration were William Bates, Dennis Grass, Forester; Jack Williams, Soil Scientist; Fred Kennedy, Regional Forester; Lowell

Woods, Assist. Regional Forester; Wally Gallacer, C. K. Coling, and Wes Lathrop, Foresters. Also Bill Gullledge, Letourneau District Representative; Owen Kelly, District Representative; Hank Knake, Manager Land Clearing; Garland Ellis, Service Engineer; Bob Cox, Bates Ranch superintendent.

The demonstration was on a combination of private and forest land. Bates is now in the process of buying one of these machines, not the model in use at Corona, but a new machine that will have hydraulic equipment on front push beam. The demonstration machine was designed to walk over trees up to 48 inches in width, the trees in the Gallinas Forest were no chore for the tree crusher.

The machine came about through necessity for clearing millions of acres of jungle land. For years the land-clearing job has been done with dozers which sustained abnormal wear due to shock load, the tree crusher more or less climbs trees until its weight forces them down, then the rollers cut up most tree branches into firewood size.

The tree crusher is operated by a GMC diesel plant which power electric motors at all

points where power is applied. The tail is steerable, all controls push-button operated.

There are 59 crushers in operation over the world.

The new machine to be delivered to Bates will have a seeder attached, probable delivery date in the Spring.

The News editor took a ride one round, to make the pictures you see in this issue. The tree crusher was fairly noiseless, but the pop and crack of timber going down, being cut up was loud. It did not matter what size the vegetation, the tree crusher went right along and leveled everything to a mat on the ground.

Where the tree crusher was cutting wood, the cloats on the rollers did not penetrate the ground much, if any, in the more open spaces, the rollers made neat herring bone cuts in the ground.



Call going out for ready reserves

Major General John P. Jolly

Major General John P. Jolly, State Director of Selective Service for New Mexico stated that amended regulations were issued 22 Dec. 65 by National Headquarters in which the President authorized the priority induction of certain members of the Ready Reserve who fall to serve satisfactorily. Under the amended regulations, previous restriction as to age, parenthood, and various other restrictions have been deleted, and Ready Reservists who previously could not be ordered for priority induction may now be so ordered. General Jolly explained that the ready reserve unit concerned certifies to the selective service local board of jurisdiction that the reservist is falling to serve satisfactorily. The local board issues an induction order forthwith without reopening of the current classification and therefore neither appeal nor personal appearance rights accrue. A registrant who has served for at least two years on extended active duty is excluded from priority induction the State Director pointed out. Details regarding the amended regulations are available to the public at any selective service local board office.





Billboard Junkyard Control

Draws Support From Sandoval Santa Fe State Sen. Jose Ortiz y Pino's bill for enabling legislation in the area of billboard and junkyard controls received another boost last week.

The Sandoval County Grass-roots were on record as supporting the measure.

Ortiz y Pino's bill was recently sent to Campbell and later received the sanction of the Highway Department. Campbell told Ortiz y Pino that it would be included in the Governor's special requests to the next session of the legislature.

The bill, which will allow the state to comply with federal regulations, will reportedly gain New Mexico some \$10 million each year in federal funds.

If you have not received your farmer's tax guide, 1966 edition, we have plenty on hand at the County Agents office in the court house.

How long must you keep farm records to meet Internal Revenue demands?

You should keep records of ordinary receipts and expenditures for at least six years.

An IRS assessment against a taxpayer for tax due may cover a period of up to 6 years after the filing date. Therefore, 6 years is usually long enough to keep records, other than depreciation records and those having to do with capital assets.

Records of land purchases, building costs, and other capital assets should be kept as long as you own the asset. Usually this information is also recorded in a depreciation schedule.

There are certain exceptions to the rule. In case of fraud, intent to evade tax, or failure to file, the statute of limitations does not apply, and the audit and assessment may be made at any time.

A fruit and vegetable short course sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Station at N. M. State will be January 20-21.

The two-day program, which is open to the public, will include sessions on tree fruits on Jan. 20, and sessions on vegetable crops on Jan. 21.

Topics in the tree fruits section will include a panel discussion on orchard economics, discussions on orchard mechanization, insect control with concentrate sprays, alternative fruit crops, farm crops that can be used in an orchard program, chemical thinning of apples, and orchard planning.

(Continued from page one) Las Vegas Hospital if he changed his plea to "guilty." He says that he refused to do so again.

In a final phase, he says he was sentenced a suspended sentence if he would plead "guilty."

After several months of duress and one examination by a psychologist, Hill entered a plea of "guilty." He later was sentenced to a term in the penitentiary instead of what he termed a "promised" probationary term.

Now, in the petition, Hill says he maintains he was "never guilty," but entered this plea in an effort "to end the entire matter."

The circumstances surrounding his treatment during the tenure of the charge merit study, according to the official of the Probation and Parole Board.

It was pointed out that "many" such requests are sent in annually. However, Hill is not now attempting to "avoid" a prison sentence as most of the requests imply. When he was sent to prison, he contends it was "contingent" on further "tests" to determine his character. These tests, he says, were never made.

Hill also cited in his petition several points where he differs with printed records, and says the errors can be proven.

The most rare element to the case is that a man convicted of sodomy would not likely bring his case back into the public eye if he felt he were guilty.

It will be interesting to note what the Probation and Parole Board decides to do with the case.

The main points cited throughout the petition to the Governor contended that Hill's "Constitutional rights were violated."

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
