## Attempt at automation created a bad mess

SANTA FE — There was much publicity last week concerning the audit that was released by a private firm on the New Mexico Motor Vehicle Division.

It's been learned that a letter was sent from State Auditor Alex Armijo to Motor Vehicle Commissioner Benny Sanchez stating that the Auditor's office would take over the audit for future years.

There's a unique situation involved, however, that should be said in all fairness to Sanchez.

Originally the first bad problems came in the attempt to inject the Motor Vehicle Division records into the Automated Data Processing Department of the Bureau of Revenue.

Not even Sanchez or Armijo or the original private auditor will deny that the attempt to do so has created a mess.

Auditor Backs Up Commissioner In Problems of Administration Armijo, however, says that the blame can't all be put on Sanchez.

When the louse-up first became obvious, Gov. Jael Campbell created his "Management Advisory Committee." This group is composed, however, of top state officials who hold full time positions of their own.

The committee did a study and thereafter there was put into action a "deputy commissioner" who was purportedly going to get everything in line.

In addition to the deputy commissioner, there was a special advisor, whose pay cropped up on the critical side of the private audit.

But back to the State Auditor, Armijo says that perhaps could "have worked itself out" after the attempt at automata data processing "if it had been left alone."

Armijo will grant that it's going to take some tall figuring to get the Motor Vehicle Division on an accurate and sound basis, but he also infers that there have been too many chiefs bumping into each other and thus the confusion.

There has been a special report from the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators prepared especially for New Mexico. This report some light in regard to current has not been public, but several officials think it might throw some light in regard to current thoughts about Sanchez.

Abolition Of Counties Became 'Touchy' Point The possible abolition of some New Mexico counties through a proposed bill became a touchy point among some legislators around the Capitol.

It's yet to be seen whether Gov. Campbell will attempt to do anything with it, but his committee came up with a draft of a measure that sat "minimums" on some of the counties that had been costly to the state.

The bill, if introduced at all, won't come until toward the end of the session when Campbell will have put in his requests for the more popular measures.

It's rumored, however, that the bill will put a minimum valuation, a minimum population, and a minimum square-mile clause for counties to continue in existence.

Such an issue would have little chance, but the fact that it's floating around has caused somewhat of a stir.

## Ralph Dunlap reports . . . Back on the job is welcome change

After a semester spent studying at New Mexico State University, it seems a welcome change to be back on the job as County Agent. I found it a problem to get back into the habit of studying especially as it has been 15 years since I attended college on a full time basis. With this semester of work I was able to complete the requirements for an M. A. in Extension Education. I am glad to have the schooling behind me and to be back in Lincoln County.

I attended the Agricultural Chemical, Fruit and Vegetable Conference held last week while I was on the NMSU campus.

The use of pour-on chemicals looks promising in the control of horn flies and grubs. Dr. Grant Kinzer explained how the chemicals were used and the results obtained on limited tests held last year.

The use of concentrate sprays was discussed at the Fruit Conference by John Durkin. To get insect control with concentrate sprays the sprayers must be equipped for concentrate sprays or the grower is likely to get poor results or even tree injury.

Other subjects covered at the Fruit meeting were Chemical Thinning of apple; marketing apples; and making cider.

Apple marketing was discussed at the Apple Council Meeting held last week. They plan to have more discussion on improving the apple market in the near future.

The New Mexico Woolgrowers Annual Meeting will be held in Albuquerque on January 30th and February 1st.

Registration for the three-day meetings will be at 3 p.m. on January 30 in the Hilton Hotel. The program will include a get-together dinner at 6:30 on the evening of January 30, business meetings on January 31, and a wool seminar on February 1.

Speakers at the wool seminar will be Phillip J. Leyendecker, dean and director of the college of agriculture and home economics at New Mexico State University; Jack Ruttle of the NMSU animal science staff; and P. E. Neale, emeritus professor of the NMSU. Continued on back page

### Court Record Writ of error is filed by Campos

Luis Campos has filed a petition for writ of error Coram Nobis. The court appointed Richard Parsons to represent him for hearing on writ. The substance of petition is that he was not represented by counsel at every stage of proceedings in his original trial.

Campos, together with Valeriano Alaniz, were tried and convicted of the murder of Pierre Nalda in March of 1950. At that time Alaniz was sentenced to death, his case was appealed to the Supreme Court, he was given a new trial at Las Cruces, found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. Alaniz later died of tuberculosis.

Campos is asking relief from criminal judgment, the case heard in Carrizozo in the court of Judge George Zimmerman Wednesday. Judge Zimmerman ordered case continued pending more information being presented to the court.

ALAMOGORDO, JANUARY 25 — Alamogordo City Commission last night authorized the mayor to assure the Office of Economic Opportunity that the city will provide an office for the local headquarters in city hall.

SANTA FE, JANUARY 25 — The State Police Board has reversed itself and agreed that Capt. Hoover Wimberly should remain as commander of the Albuquerque district.

UNIVERSITY PARK, N. M. — The first place individual award and second place team standing have been won by New Mexico State University's judging team in the National Western Intercollegiate Wool Judging Contest.

High individual honors went to NMSU student John W. Cooper, a sophomore from near Tumble, N. M. Fifth place individual honors were captured by Junior David H. Kiscald from Carlsbad, N. M.

Coached by Prof. William D. McFadden of the animal science faculty, the team earned 1,578 of a possible 1,800 points. It yielded first place to Texas A & M, while third was won by Kansas State among 12 teams competing.

Third member of the New Mexico State team is Russell E. Harris, a senior from McAlister, N. M. Alternates are Robert M. Diggers of Santa Rosa, N. M. Assistant coach is Lawrence E. Sanchez of Belton, N.



Carrizozo had an assessed valuation of \$554,283 in 1930, the valuation had grown to \$861,407 by 1960. Does a gain of \$307,124 in 30 years represent normal growth?

No. The figure is real short of normal in New Mexico.

### Not one juvenile offense committed since Muffler's Hall group organized

Did you know that in the rules (Number 27) of the book "Public Recreation and the Cigarette Tax", specially designated funds for Youth Recreation were shifted from School Activities to Municipally-owned Community recreation.

School recreation is separate from community recreation. Schools receive their recreation funds from the State Educational Board while Community recreation receives funds from the State Comptroller. This separation is stated again in Rule 20 from Public Recreation and the Cigarette Tax, that "Recreation expenditures were governed by the policies established by the educational budget. Expenditures must be in line with the budgetary items for the fiscal year as determined by the state comptroller."

After working nine hours or more at school duties, school people are too over-worked to supervise the daily school recreational programs. Youth recreation should be sponsored by specially designated civic leaders, and directed by professional recreational supervisors who can devote time to this work.

The cigarette tax fund was created to take recreation out of the hand of schools. Why is the Carrizozo Recreation Commission headed by our school superintendent.

To illustrate the reasons for this separation, observe Carrizozo's past failures and today's success. In our approach to recreation.

Though Carrizozo is a small community of 1,500 population, youth has never had a Muffler's Hall. In February 1965 after reading the rules from Public Recreation and the Cigarette Tax, Carrizozo's Mayor, the City Youth Chairman, appointed our high school superintendent as a Youth-Co-Chairman, and a new Youth Commission. The 1964 Teen Officers who were too busy in school activities to attend or promote entertainment, remained as directors for 1965. The club failed.

After receiving an abundance of literature on law observance from the N. M. Federated Woman's Club, the Carrizozo Woman's Club opened their Fall meeting 1965 by inviting law enforcement officers to discuss delinquency among teenagers. State Officer Andy Benevisez stated that in his work of patrolling the streets after school hours, it was the students who were not too involved in school activities who he caught loitering, breaking in stores, and drinking.

Due to the former failures the high school superintendent did not advise, or did not want, participation in any future canteens. Two Carrizozo Women's Club members, Mrs. Welcolm Armstrong and Mrs. A. N. Spencer, felt a different approach would succeed, so the youth chairman appointed them as committee members. They selected a different group of boys who were not too busy with school activities or home work.

When presented with the building, this group was enthusiastic in receiving it, elected new officers, Godfrey Chavez and Orlando Aguilar, set to work cleaning and improving the building and to run the club efficiently under the surveillance of town officers, Choncho Morales and Nat Chavez.

After three months of successful operation the Carrizozo Woman's Club Youth Chairman are pleased and the police officers have reported, "Not one juvenile offense has been committed." Street problems have been solved. These fine young teenagers deserve honorable mention.

### Ford Division has great sales year

December sales of Ford Division passenger cars and trucks in this area climaxed the greatest sales year in history of the division's Phoenix district, according to W. J. Stroud, district sales manager. Mr. Stroud reported December sales of 2,000 passenger cars and 830 trucks for a total of 2,830 units in the district. Total passenger car sales for 1965 were 27,145 as compared with 23,760 sold in 1964 — an increase of 14.2 per cent and an all-time high for the district. Total truck sales for 1965 were 10,115, compared with 9,412 in 1964 — an increase of 7.5 per cent also establishing a record year. The Phoenix district covers Arizona, New Mexico and a portion of West Texas.

O. F. Yando, Ford Division's Western regional sales manager, reported that nationally the division set all-time sales records for December and the year.

He said that preliminary figures for the final 10 days of 1965 increased Ford Division's passenger car sales for the year to 2,024,949 — highest ever achieved by the division and more than 15 per cent ahead of last year's previous record of 1,752,703.

Truck sales also climbed to new highs in 1965 with sales of 489,520 units — an increase of more than 18 per cent from the previous yearly high of 413,342 in 1964.

"In the course of establishing new car and truck sales records in 1965, ten new monthly records were set and each quarter this year proved to be the highest in history for that period," Mr. Yando said.

animal science staff.
An election of officers will follow the wool seminar. The program will conclude with a lamb barbecue dinner followed by a meeting of the board of directors.

If you are calving or lambing in corrals, use iodine on the navels to prevent stiff lamb disease or other infection from entering the navel.

Diseases entering in this manner can be reduced by dipping the stump navel in a solution of iodine.

The iodine can be applied from a small jar, such as a half pint jelly jar, and should be of veterinary strength, about 10 percent iodine. Using iodine normally advised for human use will be of very little benefit, as it does not contain a high enough percentage of iodine.
