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Leandro Vega wins mayor contest 198-118

The vote turnout Tuesday in Carrizozo was good, 332 total with two challenged, but nothing like a record. In 1956 when Wayne Withers won the last contested race for mayor over Marvin Roberts, Withers received 289 votes and Leandro Vega Sr. received 330 votes, just two less than were cast this week.

What might have been the cause, or why people voted the way they voted in the 1966 election seems a little hard to define this date. Probably the Vega forces were working harder at getting out a vote. It seems rather positive that Arnold Boyce, candidate for

council, left his winning votes at school. Of eligible teachers and wives in Carrizozo school nine did not vote. Boyce, a three-year resident of Carrizozo, needed only eight votes to beat Vernon Petty, twice mayor and on the ballot for councilman.

It could be that such things as road work, fishing trips and garbage crews were the bone of contention in the 1966 election. The News editor does not give such talk much credit.

Paving was thought to be an issue in the 1964 election, and did rouse people up but several local politicians do not figure paving as the decisive factor.

Whether or not paving collections are pressed and processed in due fashion can well be political fodder for 1968.

In the last election, 1964, Petty received 322 votes unopposed as mayor while Chevo Baca got

290 and Buster Smoot 202 for councilmen.

In 1962 the election was quiet. W. F. Ball received 169 votes for mayor unopposed, Fred English 175 and Arrell Posey 128 for council.

There were 233 votes cast in the 1960 election when W. F. Ball for mayor received 197, Jete Voss 185 and Leandro Vega 157 for council.

Wayne Withers was unopposed for mayor in 1958 and received 197 votes. C. D. May got 178 and Austin Wooten 151 for councilmen.

There was a contest for mayor in 1956, Withers winning

over Marvin Roberts 289 to 177. In this election Leandro Vega polled 330 votes and L. Z. Manire 269 for council.

Convention left little doubt but that "Old Guard" was nixed but good

SANTA FE — There's naturally a dubious hope for any victory on the part of the Republican Party after last week's pre-primary convention, but there was one "undercurrent" that was extremely significant. The convention left little doubt that the "old guard" was nixed.

Too many delegates and GOP legislators with some power in the party became too disgusted with the "hard to get" routine and some wheels apparently were disgruntled because the crowds didn't flock to their doorsteps again.

Hawley, Cargo Earned 'Right' to Make Race

Former Gov. Ed Mechem was on hand early and there was a twitch of rumor to try and draft him. But most of the younger powers in the party figured Rep. Cliff Hawley and Rep. Dave Cargo had worked hard enough to deserve support.

It marks a major switch in the GOP party because Mechem, Tom Bolack, Dr. Jack Redman, etc., found they were not in as much demand as many had predicted.

The "do nothing" Republicans may wind up doing something after all.

'Next in Line' split was Cliff and David

Aside from the differences over drafting big names, the "next in line" hassle was between Cliff Hawley and Cargo. Cargo admittedly was bitter over the near perfect sweep Hawley made in delegate votes.

Cargo has followed a liberal line and has been out with party members, but he clearly expected more help in certain areas than he received.

Cargo claims he'll get support in the primary, but this particular difference between the two could be wicked before the primary vote is cast.

Gag On Auditor's Pay Still Voiced

Some Senators are still fumb-

ling and others are laughing over the "gag" in holding the pay for the State Auditor.

The salary was hiked in the Senate when it was considered that State Sen. Gordon Melody (D-San Miguel) would be the clinch for the job.

But when they ran up the \$7,200 flag, there were several who saluted.

House Chief Clerk Al Romero was the first to file and many figure he has a good chance at it.

The elective auditor's post was left open when the job of legislative auditor was created.

William Rush and Leon Johnson, both of Truth or Consequences, county seat of Sierra County.





By their actions over a period of years they do not fit our picture of corporation heads, rather they behave more like a two-bit peanut outfit, robbing customers, giving sloppy disgraceful service at best.

We have catalogued quite a book on the business of getting a ticket at the Carrizozo office of the Southern Pacific. From down-right rudeness on the part of local employees, to a complete don't-give-a-damn attitude on the part of main offices in Kansas City and the west coast. Jeff Berry, writing in the Feb. 27 El Paso Times, says:

Friday afternoon the historic Sunset Limited pulled the last of the Pullman cars out, they will not return. One crew member, with more than 25 years service, called the deletion of sleeping cars a "deliberate attempt to drive-off customers and eventually eliminate all passenger service."

This is the beginning of the end for the Sunset Limited. In January the company removed diners from the train and replaced them with vending machine cars. This caused a lot of unhappy passengers. Now it's Pullmans they are removing to further discourage business. Next they will cut down on the number of chair cars and at the same time go running to the government wanting to drop the whole train altogether because they are losing money.

We believe in making money at the Lincoln County News, but when we have a battle to fight we do not believe in including a lot of innocent people, making them suffer to help our cause — which is exactly what the SP is doing.


