Licensing and Exemption committee will attempt to clear up some 'ills'

SANTA FE — Owners and operators of smaller firms should be viewing closely the future appointees to the newly-created Licensing and Exemption Committee.

The committee will be appointed on March 24 by members of the Legislative Council.

This is a situation that could swing in extreme to one direction. The committee ostensibly will attempt to clear up some of the "ills" now existent in the state's system.

But paid representatives of major corporate firms have been hard at work, and members of this new committee will be charged with cleaning up the situation.

A "central" governing body is being eyed, and conceivably could solve some problems, but it will depend on the actions and suggested solutions of the new committee.

Larger firms haven't balked at taking advantage of some situations to put the real squeeze on smaller firms owned and operated by individuals rather than stockholders.

People who know say this new committee could be "death" on the small firms if the appointees all come from the same camp. It's a situation that should be watched.

No Help Seen From Present Functions

There's no help seen from the present Contractor's Licensing Board. This particular board hasn't done much harm yet because it hasn't done anything.

But big contractors are becoming disturbed lest new action may give smaller firms a running chance at success.

Any future plan that would put other occupations with the contractors will find some brutal pressure. Currently the big boys simply don't desire to "muddy the water."

But if it looks like the new committee is actually going to do something in the right direction, then there'll be some real arm-twisting.

Electricians, plumbers, etc., might do well to engage in some arm-twisting during the next several days before the new committee is named. Local legislators from the rural areas could help the situation by making sure there's a fair "balance" involved in the committee.

Educators Critical Of Talk On Raise In Pay

Recently it was brought out that many Albuquerque teachers and administrators lambasted the Legislature for more money in order to benefit the lagging teacher-pupil ratio.

Then when the money was appropriated, the talk from the Albuquerque chiefs switched to using the money as a basis for a teacher pay raise. When this attitude was attacked, the Albuquerque educators said the accusation was "unfair."

The value of the reappraisal program piloted in Albuquerque can't be overlooked.

But there's another facet to the situation that also should "not" be overlooked.

Albuquerque school chiefs said the money allocated would make up for most of the cash needed for the pay raise, and the remainder would "be squeezed out" somewhere.


Smaller communities, to date, don't have the advantage of the reappraisal income. Eventually it could happen but until then there's going to be the

old inevitable shortage.

The major point is this, it's certain that teachers in Albuquerque probably deserve a raise in base pay. But it's also just as certain that teachers over all the rest of the state are just as deserving of a raise as those in the big city.

Albuquerque had first crack at "reappraisal," thus making a big difference. Then the allocation for schools was enormous because of a large and concentrated pressure on the Legislature.

Until teachers over all of the state get the same chance, it only seems reasonable that the money sent to Albuquerque should be used for what it was intended - to benefit the system.

A committee to represent the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has been working on plans for the dedication and will meet with Bill Krouch, administrative officer for the commission, in the next week.

Carrizozo town officials busy

Town of Carrizozo officials were busy the first of the week, changing the reins and handling a number of pressing affairs. Leandro Vega Sr. was sworn in as Mayor of Carrizozo Monday night along with Joe Ventura and Vernon Petty as councilmen, and Friday Sherrill as magistrate.

T. B. Buster Smoot has been checking on activities at the new airport where hot-rodgers and beer drinkers have moved in. Two hazards exist, one is damage to the airstrip from hotrod driving; and another is possible damage to airplanes from bottles and cans left on the landing strip.

The airport is outside the town boundary and polling is a county matter. Elfred Jones, town attorney, is investigating the possibility of annexing this property.

Mayor Vega instructed town crews to increase garbage collection to once a week, and that the job be done in two days. No new employees will be added for this job.

Fred English tendered his resignation from the Captain-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, an appointment originally made by the Town.

The Town is negotiating with the City of Alamogordo for purchase of water well bought by Alamogordo from Bryce Dugger. The well is rated at 225 gallons per minute with potential up to 600. The original cost was over \$20,000 for this well and the Town is paying \$8,000 for pipe, pump, meter and line which is less than junk value of the material. The Town will pay Dugger five cents per gallon of water.

The well is 180 feet deep, located two miles southeast of Carrizozo.

In the deal is a quantity of pipe which will be used to tie the well into the Town system.

Hondo school to schedule football

The Hondo School board of education will meet tonight and is expected to act favorably on adding football to the school athletic program. Members of the board of education are: Frank Titsworth, John Cooper, Orlando Lucero, Robert Gutierrez, and Rosemary Slnseros.

According to Supt. Fermin Montes thirty-six boys have indicated they would be candidates for the football team. Two coaches now on the teaching staff, Frank Ready and Bill Ambrose, would handle football.

Hondo would play independent ball for one year and then could join the conference which now includes Melrose, Tatum, Dexter, Vaughn in one group, and Corona, Carrizozo, Capitan and Cloudcroft in another group.

It has been suggested that the winners of either of these groups might play one of the two northern teams (Dulce and Roy), then the two winners play for the state championship.

The Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico nonprofit association, is undertaking the financing and construction of a natural gas distribution system for these two towns and has made application with the Federal Department of Housing & Urban Development for aid in financing such project.

Representing the association for the Village of Capitan are: Joe B. Cheney, Valton Hall and James R. Proving; for the Town of Carrizozo are: Albert Roberts, and Jete Voss.

The benefits to be derived are as follows: 1) availability of natural gas to every consumer in the entire area 2) Lower fuel costs 3) After debt is paid profits will be allocated to the municipalities.

The project will be financed through the insurance of revenue bonds payable from the earning of the system. The project is estimated to cost \$727,300. All work will be on bid. The debt created will not obligate either village or town.

To move the project along it will be necessary that 318 users in Carrizozo and 172 in Capitan sign natural gas contracts and put up \$20 deposits.

To further explain the association and its benefits to the public a meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on March 24 in Carrizozo in the school cafeteria. A similar meeting will be held in Capitan at the school on March 29 at 7:30 p.m.

The glory of Easter begins at dawn. Few will find a more fitting and memorable setting for a Sunrise Service anywhere in the United States than those of us who venture together on April 10th (before the rising of the sun) to "Valley of Fire State Park" on the edge of Carrizozo. Here will be seen striking contrast between black valley (after fire of formation) and blazing brightness of Easter dawn, dissipating all darkness.

"Valley of Fire" is a vivid reminder of "Valley of the Shadow of Death" (23rd Psalm) through which Jesus suffered, just before the first Easter.

One of the oldest dawn services, attracting 3,000 or more, will be held again on the parapet alongside the Hudson River, near the Statue of Liberty, at Fort Hamilton, New York.

On the opposite end of our land, some 20,000 will gather in Hollywood Bowl. Several folks in Lincoln County have attended the one on the slopes of Clark Mountain, near Lawton, Oklahoma, where thousands sleep the night before Easter morning.

Combined choirs from Ancho, Capitan, and Carrizozo and Nogal plan to sing together at "Valley of Fire" as the first rays flash over the Southern tip of Carrizozo Mountain.

Catholic and Protestant families are participating. Father John Rebold, Rev. Milford Misener and Chaplain Alfred Kline serve churches in Capitan and Carrizozo. They have conferred on how to best include all clergymen of all churches in the area of these four towns.

Two preliminary planning meetings have agreed to the erection of a 16 foot cross on the high point of the park area, to hear trumpets play "The Holy City" at the moment of sunrise, to conclude the service in 1/2 hour, prepare new High School Auditorium as alternate meeting place in case of storm, and to request patrol control at entrance from highway.

Father Rebold will preach the Sunrise Sermon. Rev. Milford Misener will direct the combined choirs, Chaplain Kline will conduct the service. Rev. James L. Wells will offer prayer. Capitan pastors will take other parts.

To express our warmth of hospitality, the Odd Fellows will serve a hot drink to all present. Rotary will install the Sunrise road sign at the entrance, Lions and Explorer Scouts will assist police in parking cars. Woman's Club puts up posters in four towns, Eastern Star is to arrange flowers at foot of cross, High School public address system will be used.

Other kindly contributions are: Rainbow Girls corsages for trumpeters and clergymen, the cross erected by Masonic Lodge, Sorority paint sunrise road sign, American Legion to place American flag, Boy Scouts give out printed programs. Chamber of Commerce provide publicity, other duties and ideas to be used as suggested. Please offer suggestions to Jete Voss.

New special hospitals board plans move from Ft. Stanton to Ft. Bayard

FORT STANTON — The new special hospitals board held its first meeting at Fort Bayard Hospital March 9 and named its officers, hired an executive director, and began preliminary plans for a shuffling of patients which will involve five state institutions.

The new board, announced by Gov. Jack M. Campbell in Santa Fe, is the same one which formerly served as the Fort Stanton Hospital Board.

Dr. Eugene A. Mann of Portales was named chairman of the new board, the same post he held on the Fort Stanton board and Mrs. Lena Pfeiffer of Tatum was named secretary. Other board members are Mrs. Eleanor Jones of Capitan, Paul Payton of Carrizozo and Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque.

Named as executive director for the board was Fort Stanton superintendent George W. Bry-

an. Under his new duties Bryan will administer Fort Bayard State Hospital and El Mirador Home for the Aged in Rio Arriba County and Meadows Home for the Aged in Las Vegas.

The new hospital board will administer these three institutions and turn Fort Stanton over to the Los Lunas Hospital board for use as another hospital for mentally retarded children.

The tubercular patients at Fort Stanton will be moved to Fort Bayard which will serve as a tubercular and geriatrics hospital. Aged patients from Las Vegas Mental Hospital already have been moved to Fort Bayard, which was turned over to the state when the Veterans Administration closed its facility at Fort Stanton.

Mann said no date for the patient transfer from Fort Stanton had been set.


Corona Extension meets March 24

After a short honeymoon, the couple will be at home in Corona.

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

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

"A page for independent thought"

Similar crossing in Zozo

Driving to Kansas last Thursday we stopped in Logan, N. M., to view the pile-up of freight cars on the SP following a wreck Wednesday when a freight train plowed into a lowboy trailer.

No doubt train people consider the tractor-trailer driver at fault and he could have caused serious loss of life as well as property.

However, there are two sides to the blame picture. Few crossings on the Southern

Pacific line (or the Rock Island) have stop signals. The one in Logan did not. The main crossing in Carrizozo does not.

The several million dollar loss caused by this wreck will likely be passed on to insurance companies—before these companies pay they should look into the safety policies of the railroad.

The railroad is guilty of the worst kind of negligence in Carrizozo, and on passing view, the crossing situation was equally bad in Logan.

On the shady side

Jackie Gleason, one of our favorite clowns, was having a ball over his new age "50", on his television show last week. You just don't do quite all the things "after fifty" that you were doing before, and a lot of other things are done differently by comedians and us other people.

B. C. Forbes, a successful writer - publisher, said: "The most successful highestup executives carefully select under-studies. They don't strive to do everything themselves. They train and trust others. This leaves them foot-free, with time to think. "No matter how able, any employee or executive who insists on running a one-man enterprise courts unhappy circumstances when his powers dwindle."

The typical publisher-editor brings to our mind a guy whose powers have started to dwindle, he's over "50", a make-no-one-mad sort of disposition, general flunkiness and jack of all trades around his printing office, who probably was a minor fireball 20 years ago but now reaches

for his fishing tackle more often than he writes fiery editorials. Look around your business comrades, don't matter much what small town you are in.

If you see the same pictures we see you'll have figured out that the small town is a one-man enterprise from start to finish. Hardly a young man in sight, and the "over fifty" majority just as busy as the typical editor doing routine chores with little time to think, and less time to act in a manner that will improve his personal status or that of his town.

The News editor has a few ideas how we can inject a shot of young blood into our own operation, none of them easy, but we work at them each week. We have only one idea about giving a town a shot of "young blood" — and that is for a whole lot of "over fifty" guys to forget their age, make good use of their accumulated experience, and avoid the unhappy circumstances that hit a small town when powers of the prime movers dwindle.

Short piece of good writing

Jenkin Lloyd Jones writes syndicated editorials that are among the best found in the daily press, maybe a trifle long, but with a strong message, like the following excerpt:

Back in 1925 if Adolf Hitler had recommended the cold-blooded murder of 10 million people the overwhelming majority of Germans would have recoiled in horror. But he played upon their self-pity and their greed. He dangled the golden apples of revived German

greatness as he stole away each liberty. Effective opposition became first difficult, then dangerous, then impossible.

The lesson is for us all. To permit the steady increase of the power of the state, even where it promises the most delicious objectives, speeds the day when that power in unscrupulous hands could crush the spirit of humanity and turn a nation mad.

Total government will be kindly only for today. Tomorrow could be a nightmare.

Geo-thermal report made



As part of the Preliminary Report On New Mexico's Geothermal Resources, Circular 80, Circular 83 is now available at the New Mexico Institute of Mining & Technology, by W. K. Summer ground-water geologist. Cir. 83 treats specifically with the locations and analyses of hot spring waters in New Mexico.

If spring water is 90° Fahrenheit, or more, in temperature, it is classed as "hot spring." Although all ascending waters are greatly cooled by the time they reach the surface, if their elevated temperatures are below this arbitrary figure, they are to be classed as "warm springs," not "hot springs." In many thermal areas, there may be fumaroles (steam blowing out of vents in the earth) as well as hot springs. Drilling for steam in now a world-wide practice. California and now New Mexico have entered this field. Studies and tests are also being carried on in several other states in the northwest.

Although in specific cases more complex factors may be involved, the leaching of rock-minerals by hot, ascending waters, evolution of gases, and even the addition of escaping gases from deeper heat-sources, along with the ability of such ascending waters to retain their soluble constituents as they approach the surface with its different conditions of temperature and pressure, may greatly alter a water analysis. Work done by the Institute is helping to provide more scientific information in this direction. Many hot springs, however, in fumaroles regions have notable amounts of hydrogen sulfide (a gas smelling like rot-

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ten eggs). And deposits of sulfur as early as 1858, Italy (near Florence) began to utilize the sulfur deposited near her high-pressure steam vents; and in 1904, with the development of electric dynamo, began to produce electrical power from this steam. Today, her plants there have a 300,000 kil-

watt capacity from use of this natural steam.

Every large nation, and even some islands are now, either using, or making studies to utilize this free geothermal energy for cheaper electric power development. New Mexico appears to have great potentials in this field.

A New Mexico apple a day does more than keep doctor away from your door

A New Mexico apple a day does more than keep the doctor away. It also affects the health of the state economy.

New Mexico has eleven main apple producing counties: Bernalillo, Rio Arriba, Sandoval, San Juan, Santa Fe, Valencia, Grant, Lincoln, Chaves, and Otero. A survey taken in early 1963 showed the 950 commercial apple orchards in these counties contain an estimated 330,000 trees. Red Delicious and Rome Beauty are the most common varieties. In past years, growers have produced from 37,000 bushels in 1889 to a record 1,200,000 bushels in 1964. Crop yields since 1900 have averaged 684,000 bushels per year. Revenue from the crop frequently exceeds \$1,000,000 and a \$2,000,000 crop was produced in 1964. Last year, hail, frost, floods, and insects combined to drop the yield to 650,000 bushels.

The apples produced in New Mexico are eating apples. Out of state apples may sometimes look prettier, but color has almost nothing to do with the quality of an apple.

One of the problems faced by local producers is what to do with the small bruised or spotted apples. These are usually pressed into apple cider but facilities in New Mexico are not adequate to handle all such apples. The State Apple Council, as one of its projects to aid apple producers, is working

Wool prices are up
Wool prices are expected to
be from three to eight cents
per grease pound better than
last year. The Boston Wool
Market reports higher prices
with staple fine wool selling
for \$1.30 to \$1.35 on a clean
basis. Many wool clips have
been contracted in other areas.

Place your fertilizer deep in
vegetable gardens.
When fertilizer is applied as
deep as the soil is spaded, or
plowed, it encourages plant's

roots to develop well below the
surface where moisture remains
more constant. This method is
recommended particularly for
commercial fertilizers; and ni-
trogen side dressings at an
early stage of plant growth is
a good supplementary practice.

These are ways to increase
vegetable production on small
garden tracts. First there is the
matter of fertilization. Manure
is advised, if possible, with 30
pounds of garden fertilizer to
the thousand square feet. Side
dressing for three feet of row
crops is recommended, with one
level tablespoon of sulfate of
ammonia, or one-half table-
spoon of ammonium nitrate.

Typical minimum row spacing
suggested included these crops:
Onions, carrots, beets, radishes,
lettuce—18 inches. Bush beans,
spring cabbage, peppers, dwarf
English peas—24 inches. Toma-
to varieties, running on ground
—30 inches. On sticks, same
plants 24 inches apart in rows.
Corn, — 30-42 inches. Cucum-
bers and cantaloupes—5 feet.

tion of New Mexico State Uni-
versity located near Tucuman.

Ninety-seven bulls which
have just completed a 140-day
rate of gain test will be offered
in the auction sale. Numbers
representing each breed are 70
Herefords, 5 Polled Herefords,
20 Angus, and 2 Red Brangus.
All are New Mexico-bred bulls
and have been fed out on a
high-roughage growing ration.

The program will start at 8
a.m. with inspection of the
tested bulls. Complete test re-
cords will be available.

It takes a long time for a tree
to become an effective part of
your home grounds landscape
and each one should get proper
care.

Pruning is a profitable health
and beauty treatment for
trees that should be done at
least every three or four years.
The periodic pruning removes
dead, diseased, broken or cross-
ing branches. Branches that
become damaged or broken can
harbor insects and diseases and
become a hazard.

General maintenance pruning
is done during the late winter
or early spring before new
growth starts. Included in such
maintenance pruning is the re-
moval of large, wayward bran-
ches, lowering the crown of a
tree that may be growing into
power lines, and opening the
crown to permit the penetra-
tion of sunlight.

If trees are pruned regularly
it should not become necessary

to remove many limbs at any
one time. Over-pruning can ex-
pose the trunk and large bran-
ches to intense sunlight, caus-
ing sunclad. In cases of sunclad,
the bark cracks and dies, decay
and rot get started in the
wood, the tree is weakened and
its beauty destroyed.

Several rules to follow when
pruning trees are these:
In cases where severe pruning
is needed, extend the pruning
over several years.

When removing branches, ne-
ver leave stubs. Protect wounds
larger than one inch with a re-
commended tree paint.

Pruning large trees is a job
for an expert and requires
special equipment.

Call the county extension of-
fice or local nurseryman for ad-
ditional information and advice
on specific pruning problems.

Ewes that are gaining in
weight as lambing season ap-
proaches will raise more lambs
than ewes in poor condition.
A good many lambs can be
saved each year by a little ex-
tra feed prior to lambing time.
Ewes that are strong and gain-
ing in weight will drop vigor-
ous lambs and furnish plenty
of milk.

Farm flock owners doing sup-
plemental feeding in late win-
ter should pay particular at-
tention to the condition of the
ewes. Most ewes are carrying
a three-quarter fleece of wool
and may appear to be in good
condition, while actually losing
weight.

Poor quality roughage re-
quires some protein supple-
ment, but it would be more
important to add one-half to
three-fourth pound of concen-
trate per day to the ration dur-
ing the last six weeks of preg-
nancy. A good concentrate such
as corn will help to prevent ke-
tosis and save many ewes and
their unborn lambs. This would
be especially true of farm
flock ewes that are carrying
twin lambs.


