\$320,000 recreation center offered town

Jim Dillard says new park ready

James L. Dillard, assistant and Recreation Commission, told the News Wednesday that the new Valley of Fire State Park is all but complete.

A new flag pole on top of the hill is now in place. This means that a flag-raising ceremony will need be part of the dedication service. The group shelter is hooked up with electricity and with 10 tables under cover will be an ideal place for dignitaries and center of the dedication ceremony.

The Highway Department is expected to put up signs on the U.S.380 and at the entrance of the park. Dillard said he expects to keep a crew here until the dedication and they will have the area looking real nice. By dedication time a park attendant will be employed to take care of the park.

Dillard said he is well pleased with the layout, it came out just the way he wanted it to. In time to come there will be trails out in the Mal Pais, nice trails and benches at the far end. He said there would be more landscaping done, with natural type vegetation. He does not want to change the appearance of the area, just encourage what is already there.

LAWN AND PARKING LOT CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

Work has started on the parking area west of the court house. The ground has been leveled and plans include a parking area and lawn. This will be a fine addition to the appearance of the new court-house and Highway 54 through town.

Los Lunas people visit Ft. Stanton

An executive order from Gov. Jack M. Campbell is expected any day which will be the start of much activity at several hospital locations in the state. The Boards of both Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital (now the State Special Hospitals' Board) and Los Lunas Hospital and Training School have notified the Governor that they would be ready to move on or by April 1, 1966.

Tubercular patients at Fort Stanton will be moved to Fort Bayard which will serve as a tubercular and geriatrics hospital. Retarded children will be moved to Fort Stanton.

In preparation for this move the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School had prepared a feasibility report which outlines the remodeling to be done to bring Fort Stanton up to 265 bed capacity.

The old seaman's club, two story hospital building, the Hill-Burton hospital, former children's hospital and nurses living quarters will be remodeled in an estimated cost of \$250,000.00.

In further preparation of the pending move the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School Board and staff held an official meeting at Fort Stanton March 18. See picture captions for complete list of Los Lunas people attending the meeting. The Fort Stanton airport had received some work in preparation for this meeting. Due to the distances and time involved, most of the people traveled by airplane.

In addition to the Los Lunas officials, Dr. Gene Mann from Portales, chairman of the State Special Hospitals' Board; and L. W. Dennis, Albuquerque Ambulance Service attended the meeting. Phil Carter, superintendent of the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School said they were in the process of choosing the children who will come to Fort Stanton. They plan the function of each cottage (meaning generally a group of children)

and try to have a particular type of child in each group. The children coming to Fort Stanton will be a happy group, Carter said.

Any employee now at Fort Stanton and who wants to stay there will have that opportunity, Carter said. There will be some differences, going from tuberculosis to retarded but basically the situation is the same . . . there are people in need of care . . . providing the proper care will continue to be the basic function at Fort Stanton.

Recruitment of additional employees will start immediately. The work will be done through the state personnel office. Applications for jobs at Fort Stanton may be sent to:

The Carrizozo recreation committee composed of Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Mrs. Welcolm Armstrong, Fred Chavez, and Ray Wells, met with the town council in special session Tuesday night to present plans for a \$320,000.00 community center.

The center would be a complete gift to the community from Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer.

Ray Wells outlined the project to the council. It would include a building with 1400 square feet of floor space, seven billiard tables, eight bowling lanes, terrace and parking area. In the building would be a billiard room, bowling room, lobby, office and check room, lounge and dance area, locker rooms, kitchen, snack bar, lavatories, storage space and shop. The building would be of cinder block construction.

There are many parts of the planning process that will be interesting to both the recreation committee and the town.

It was suggested by one of the town officials that government money probably would be available, maybe as much as a third of the cost or more, for this size and type of project. This will be investigated immediately.

The Spencer family would not only pay the initial cost of construction, but will also pay the maintenance cost, and cost of management for a 10-year period after which the property would come under the management of the town.

The recreation committee suggested to the council that the town sell bonds to provide money which would allow construction to start possibly in early summer.

The entire business would be transacted by contract between the town and the Spencers. After initial approval of the council, which they gave Tuesday night, Mrs. Spencer said she would have her lawyer start drawing up a contract which will be presented to the council for study at a later date.

Mrs. Spencer told the council members that \$100,000 would be available this summer to pay on the project and that she would expect to complete payment in not over five years. She said she expected to pay bond interest and all costs.

The new recreation center would be tied in with the swimming pool park, located just to the rear of the Falls residence, on open ground. The drawings shown the council Tuesday indicated that the new building would be an attractive addition to the area, and landscaping would be completed to fit with the park area.

FIRE TAKES LIFE AT RUIDOSO DOWNS

A fire which completely destroyed his home, claimed the life of John B. Stallings of Ruidoso Downs last Sunday. The fire was discovered about 2 a. m. and when the firemen arrived the house was ablaze. Stallings' body was removed and an autopsy held later in the day gave cause of death as smoke inhalation.

Stallings, aged 83, has been a resident of Ruidoso Downs for several years. A nephew in Eddy County is the only known survivor.

A 1964 Volkswagen driven by Thomas L. Clinton, Jr., age 19 of Lubbock, Texas turned over

1/2 mile east of Carrizozo about 7 p.m. Friday, March 11. The other passenger in the car was Wm. Henry Mora, age 19, of League City, Texas. Clinton received lacerations and a neck injury and was released from the hospital after two days. Mora is suffering from concussion and lacerations and is still a patient in the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital. The accident was checked by State Policeman Frank Knoblock. The cause of the accident was excessive speed and inattention.

The second Volkswagen accident occurred on March 9 at the county line south of Carrizozo at 3 p.m. The driver was Terry L. Smith, 18 yrs old of Mesalero and the other passenger was her husband, Kenneth Smith, 21 there were no serious injuries. The car was a total loss. The accident was checked by State Policeman Andrew Benavidez.

Land transfer under negotiation

A large land transfer between the United States Department of Agriculture's Forest Service and Raymond E. Walker, of Carrizozo, is now under negotiation, it was disclosed this week.

According to W.D. Hurst, regional forester, the land exchange will be for unimproved wild lands, having multiple use as watershed, timber and hunting value, owned by Walker for about 123 acres of land "primarily valuable for residential development."

In a letter recently sent to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners Hurst said that the unimproved lands consist of about 220 acres located in both Lincoln and Otero Counties and known as the Turkey Group in sections 32, 33, township 9 south range 11 east, in Lincoln County and in section 23, N½NE¼, SW¼NE¼, township 15, south range 13 east.

The lands to be turned over to Walker are located in Lincoln County in the Ruidoso area. Hurst said the Ruidoso lands are "primarily valuable for residential development. Tract No. 1 is already developed, having several valuable residences in place. It is within the corporate limits of Ruidoso. Tract No. 2 lies adjacent to the Ruidoso residential area. This exchange will result in a better landownership pattern, and provide room for Ruidoso community expansion.

"This exchange will result in a desirable consolidation in landownership which will improve protection and management of multiple use resources found on the offered land. We believe this exchange to be in the public interest.

"As Lincoln and Otero Counties share in the National Forest receipts, they should expect an increase in such receipts due to increased National Forest acreage. In addition, Lincoln County should expect an increase in taxes receivable once the selected lands in and around Ruidoso area developed, Hurst said.

The land exchange is provided for in a 1922 law and the commissioners did not indicate that they had any objections to the proposed exchange.

Much of the land offered by Walker in Lincoln County, about 100 acres, consist of old mining claims.

FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

More than 32,000 products infested with harmful agricultural pests were collected by federal inspectors at points of entry to the United States last year.

The pests were discovered when inspectors found over 446,000 unauthorized plants and other products during routine inspections.

Many highly destructive pests which could attack every major crop in the United States were among the troublemakers spotted by 600 inspectors at major entry points.

These inspections are a first line of defense in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's program of quarantine, eradication, or containment of destructive pests.

A. L. Neumann, head of the animal science department, and A. B. Nelson, animal scientist, reported that steers fed an 80-percent concentration ration for about 365 pounds gain with cottonseed as the main protein gained about 17 percent faster than those fed rations of alfalfa hay or cottonseed hulls and meal as the sources of roughage and protein.

They also noted that stillbirth implants boosted steer gains by nearly 19 percent with only slight effect on carcass yield, grade and marbling.

W. H. Hale, University of Arizona animal scientist, reported on the new processing methods for preparing grains for cattle feeding. He said that the methods for preparing grains for the method which appears to hold the greatest promise for improving feed efficiency is a moist heat treatment.

Many reports are appearing on the value of steam treated grains but the specifications of the treatments are not given so evaluating them is difficult.

One way a rancher can cut estate taxes in transferring his ranch to his children is to give it to them a little bit at a time while the rancher is still alive, a tax attorney told stockmen at the recent Cattle Growers Short Course here.

Claude M. Moer Jr., of the firm of Holland and Hart of Denver, said that a person can give each of his children up to \$3,000 a year for an accumulative total of \$30,000 without paying a gift tax or an estate tax. This means, he said, that a man and wife could give each child, using the \$30,000 allowable per person, a total of \$60,000.

After the \$60,000 is reached there would be a gift tax, but this is still only about three-quarters of the amount charged as estate taxes.

Other means of transfer he suggested which could reduce estate taxes included setting up trust funds and setting up a corporation with transfer of the stock in the corporation to the heirs rather than transferring the ranch.

Maer spoke to about 150 persons attending the two-day event sponsored by the Beef Cattle Improvement Committee of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association in cooperation with the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The month of March has been proclaimed as Eye Bank Month by Governor Jack M. Campbell, Roy Shafer, President of the Carrizozo Lions Club, announced today.

The first eye bank in the country was organized in 1945 and now there are 80 such banks in the United States.

Human eye material is the core of such a program to supply preserved and fresh eyes for corneal transplants. There are over 400,000 blind persons in the United States. Fifteen thousand more who have only partial sight could be helped by corneal transplants.

Lions Clubs throughout New Mexico have been interested in an eye bank in the state for some time and in March of 1964 succeeded in its establishment.

After twenty-two months of active operation, the New Mexico Lions Eye Bank have a donor registration file of over 28,000. In this short period, thirty-three donors have expired, and their eyes used. We have received donor's eyes from other states when requested and also have supplied many eye banks across the country with some of our own material.

Time is important in the removal of eyes for reuse. They must be removed within three or four hours after death so communications and the cooperation of families, physicians and a Lion member is necessary. City Police Departments and State Highway Police have been very cooperative in transporting eyes from one location to another in these cases.



The voice of the people will be heard, so said the Supreme Court of the land when it established that each person's vote should be of equal value.

Of course, no such situation is possible. The Supreme Court had never heard of Carrizozo when it rendered its decision, and the Federal Court in New Mexico certainly gave little thought to Carrizozo people while rounding out senatorial districts in the state.

Under the state's original plan Lincoln County would have paired with Torrance County, which would have made any

political race fairly even from the start. Under the court-ordered plan Lincoln County is now paired with Otero County. How does a politician from a town of 1400 people or a residence in the boonocks successfully compete with a candidate who is a resident of a city of 30,000 people in a neighboring county?

It can be done but the odds are not even, such redistricting is unfair, the whole business is a political skingame from the Supreme Court right on down.

Our constitution was working rather well until some meddlers came along.

The News editor has talked to Lincoln County Commissioners, Max, Joe, Bob, about moving the large sign on the south-west corner of the courthouse property. This area is now being made ready for landscaping and parking. If the sign is to be moved, the job should be done now.

The obvious reason for moving the large sign which has a map of Lincoln County and some detailed information, is that no tourists stop on busy U.S. 54 at this point to view the sign. It does no good whatsoever, for the purpose intended, in its present location.

Other reasons are developing for moving the sign. Paint is beginning to peel, the sign is in bad need of retouching and is becoming a bit unsightly, certainly no addition to the courthouse property.

Why don't you tell the commissioners what you think about location of this sign.


Save, save, save — spend, spend, spend!

terest the Fort Stanton history in the feasibility report On April 1, 1899, President McKinley reserved and set apart the Fort Stanton Military Reservation for the use of the Marine Hospital Service and on November 18, 1899, with the admission of the first patient, Seaman Joseph Ryan, the United States Public Health Service formally opened Ft. Stanton Marine Hospital, the first government hospital exclusively for the treatment of tuberculosis.

At lunch that noon Dr. Gene Mann gave a short address of welcome to the visitors. Mann said he hoped the new board would cooperate with the community of Capitan and the people of Lincoln County. They are intensely interested in the future of Fort Stanton. The Forestry Camp has an important stake in Fort Stanton. There are few people in the state who realize the full potential of Fort Stanton. It would be an ideal place for such groups as the Governor's Institutional Council, College of Universities, etc. The climate, scenery are wonderful.

ALBUQUERQUE — A federal court panel issued a 430 member New Mexico Senate reapportionment plan with 39 districts after finding fault with a 42-member plan passed by the legislature. The decision was split 2-1, U. S. Dist. Court Judge Hatfield Chilson of Denver, in a dissenting opinion, said that the legislature's reapportionment bill was not in violation of the U. S. Constitution.

There are five multi-county districts with one senator each — Taos and Mora counties in Dist. 9; Union, Harding and Colfax in Dist. 10; Quay, DeBaca and Guadalupe in Dist. 11; Catron, Torrance and Socorro in Dist. 13; Hidalgo, Luna and Sierra in District 20.

Multi-county districts electing two senators each, at large, include Rio Arriba and Sandoval in Dist. 8; Otero and Lincoln in Dist. 21; and Curry and Roosevelt in Dist. 12.
