Senate filings are laughable

SANTA FE—Three was a 13-ring circus from Bernalillo County in regard to filings for State Senate posts, and although the situation was somewhat laughable, apparently it was legal.

Calls came in from over the state regarding the situation, especially wondering if similar flascos might not have occurred at other points.

It all had to do with "rigging" the top spot on the ballot, and admittedly there were top political moguls who were furious over the affair.

News papers carried a portion of the story, but it had to do with District 33 in Albuquerque, Rep. Eddie Barboa was one in a field of 13 who filed for the spot.

In drawing for places on the ballot, Barboa drew No. 10, but later swapped with a Mary S. Teeter, who drew the No. 1 position.

Odds Were Against Other Two Candidates

There were only two legitimate candidates - aside from Barboa - in the 13-person field. So the chiefs assumed Barboa had sacked up good odds with a swap for any one of the 10 stand-ins.

And there was one item that didn't make the newspapers. Among stand-ins were Ike Davis and a Charlio Chavez.

The two candidates concerned in an honest effort against Barboa are Oswald Davis and Charlio Chavez.

For \$10 each, it's easy to get people to file. But rigging places on the ballot has some of the legislators steaming. And some other points are also being scanned.

Added Kick In Welfare Group

Apparently the state has ironed out the bulk of the salary problems in the Welfare Department. The "late" pay checks were delivered and some semblance of peace between Director Leo Murphy and other state agencies has been evident.

Now, charges of politics have been lodged in regard to the type of personnel who receive the pay hikes.

Clerical workers in the Welfare Department are hot under the collar because they haven't received a raise since 1963.

The supervisors and case workers were the recipients of the recent hike, the third raise in four years.

Supervisors and case workers are directly associated with many voting residents. Clerical workers are associated only with bosses. And they draw a salary something less than sterling. Beginning clerical employees pull down a whopping \$210.00 per month.

"Part Time" Work Was Real Kicker

By now it's news that the Attorney General said the pay raise to State Budget Director Men Mason was legal. Mason had received a retroactive pay hike to \$15,900, while Legislators during the past session were considering raising his salary from \$14,400 to \$15,000. It was an Administration secret that Mason was already at \$15,900, but it was explained through the fact that Mason had taken on very much extra work and several extra duties so he was "re-classified" and given the retroactive raise.

A favorite Capitol wit commented that if Mason were able to assume the massive "extra" work over last year, then he has been in the past one of the highest paid "part time" workers in the state at \$14,400.

Strangers When They All Prefer

Few missed the tangled affair through the news of Demo gubernatorial hopefuls John Burroughs and Gene Lusk and the dubious associates.

The four were Fats Leonard, Tom Montoya, Frank Padilla, and Paul Case. They all were associated with Burroughs' last administration, and now their support is apparently sought but neither wants to claim it. The four are in the same boat as several other moguls around the Capitol.

The same wit also commented that Lusk and Burroughs are both singing - "I love you but we're strangers when we meet."

George Abbott is senate candidate

George Abbott, chairman of the board of the First National Bank in Alamogordo, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Senatorial District No. 23, comprising Lincoln and Otero counties.

Abbott is a native of Alamogordo and has lived there practically all his life, except for time away serving in the Navy during World War II, and for time to attend college at New Mexico State University and the University of New Mexico. He is a lifelong Democrat and served as county treasurer for two terms during 1935-39.

For more than 30 years he was associated with the Pioneer Abstract and Title Company, but sold his interest in the firm approximately two years ago.

His special community interest has been in connection with the public schools. He is presently a member of the board of regents of New Mexico State University, and served for 10 years as president of the Alamogordo Board of Education.

Abbott is a member of the Alamogordo Rotary Club, is a past president of the club, and is a member of Grace Methodist Church.

In making this announcement, he said, "I would consider it an honor to serve the people of Lincoln and Otero Counties in the new senatorial position, and therefore respectfully seek the support of all Democrats in the primary election on May 3rd."

The Carrizozo Grizzly Relays were held Saturday and were quite a success despite the high winds and gusts. Several boys turned in good times. Mike Petty was over-all high point man with 21 points. Petty won the 100, 220 and 440 yard dashes.

Tommy Ortiz also of Carrizozo tossed the shot 49 ft 5 1/2 in. It was the best distance in his career. He should be hitting well over 50 ft. before the end of the season.

Other Lincoln County winners included James Lackey of Corona in the 880 yard run, with a time of 2:07.5. Ramon Tenorio also of Corona won the pole vault with a vault of 11 ft.

Carrizozo's track schedule for the remainder of the year includes meet at Menaul on the 10th of April, Tularosa the 23rd of April, T or C the 30th of April and the District Track Meet at Jal the 6th of May.

A five-team track meet was held at Tularosa Tuesday with Alamo, Clouderoff, Ruidoso Zoza and Tulle competing. Mike Petty won the 100, 220, and 440. Tommy Ortiz was first in the shot. 

Minnie Lee Peters







Judge Norman Hodges of Silver City will be in Carrizozo Thursday and Friday to preside at the jury trial of the state vs. Phibert Richardson.

Zimmerman rules Indigent Act is violation

The future of the state's 1965 Hospital Indigent Claims Act remained uncertain today after a ruling by Dist. Court Judge George Zimmerman.

There was no indication whether Saturday's ruling in Las Cruces by Judge Zimmerman will be appealed. It was the first such test case of the act.

The suit had been brought by the board of directors of Memorial General Hospital at Las Cruces against the Dona Ana County Commission acting as the Indigent Claims Board.

The 1965 act provided for a voters' referendum on a special tax levy to finance the act if a county's tax levy was already at the 20-mill limit.

It also provided that if the levy was rejected by voters, affected hospitals could resort to the State Torts Act and bring suit against the county for collection of payments for treatment of indigent patients.

Judge Zimmerman ruled that the act violates Article 8, Section 2 of the New Mexico Constitution in authorizing judgment levies in excess of the 20-mill limit.

He held it violates Article 4 Section 31 of the Constitution in allowing public monies to be appropriated for institutions not under the absolute control of the state.

He ruled it violates Article 9, Section 14 in requiring counties to make donation of county funds to aid private corporations.

Judge Zimmerman held the act's definition of an indigent patient is vague and indefinite and unreasonably extends care to persons not contemplated by the framers of the New Mexico Constitution.

Morrison willing to carry on feud

Dear Mr. Payton:

I am curious to know if citations to legal records referred to in publication of a letter from Mr. Alan Rhodes in your February 24th issue are available to me, or if Mr. Rhodes just wants to carry on the feud.

He alleged that Pat Garrett said the Kid's birthday was November 23, 1859. My recollection indicates Garrett made no pretense of knowing the Kid in tender years.

If Garrett made this birth record like they attempted to make a legal death record of the Kid, I would not be interested in Rhodes record.

It may be that Mr. Rhodes is confused by Garrett's Authentic Life of Billy, the Kid, Horn Publishers, Inc., Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1964, with foreword by Mr. Jarvis Garrett, son of Pat.

I expected something new to dispose of disparaging statements made with reference to Pat's sojourn in Sweetwater, Texas; and pertaining to his threat of John W. Poe's life while Poe was armed with only a hoe in his field as contended by Mrs. Sophie Poe, the widow.

She had submitted to interviews and tape recordings as late as the 1950's to express herself on issues against Garrett. Also, members of the Newman family were still living as respected citizens in the community.

I never contended that Garrett conspired with the Kid to leave there. However, I did contend that members of Santa Fe Ring conspired in an attempt to establish a legal record of Kid's death as the Ring was still at work in their unscrupulous business again in criminal cause No. 914, The Territory of New Mexico vs. Oliver M. Lee, et al, defendants, Murder, Sierra County, New Mexico, to get rid of defendants.

Mr. Catron was special prosecutor and the Ring never stopped at anything to attain their ends. Mr. William T. Thornton, Catron's law partner, was a member of the legislature that pushed the private act through for Garrett shortly after they failed to obtain a legal Coroner's Verdict on Kid's purported death. Mr. Charles W. Green, Garrett's attorney and member of the Ring, filed the application for reward money which was not allowed.

Now this same Mr. Thornton offered flimsy testimony against Lee, et al, and had previously enticed Mr. Garrett to return to New Mexico for the purpose of charging these defendants for murder and subsequent arrests. The defense accused the prosecutors and the Court of conspiracy in an attempt to convict defendants. The Court threatened to jail Mr. Full for contempt. The jury from the flimsy evidence and the defense accusing the prosecution and his Honor of a conspiracy returned a not guilty verdict. Conspiracies had

He ruled the act violates Article 4, Section 24 in providing special legislation where general legislation is applicable. The hospital board sought a judgment of \$31,666 under the act.

Atty. General Boston Witt said in Santa Fe he believes the legislature will have to deal with the problem next year. He said if an appeal is made a decision probably would not be made before the legislature goes into session in January.

He said his office was asked for an opinion on the act but declined to issue one after the Dona Ana County lawsuit was filed.

bean, and still were being perpetrated up there. After the verdict was returned the Court did not pursue the charge of a contempt action against Mr. Fall, Mr. Garrett, and honest man, was merely a tool of the Ring. He was a victim of circumstances once he had joined with them and Mr. Garrett later fell a victim of a conspiracy at his death.

This conclusion was reached during my research into legal records and case files in behalf of Brushy Bill. It is the duty of a legal researcher to prepare both sides of the issues for the client before making an allegation in Court.

The difference in the case of Kid and that of Mr. Lee is that Roberts couldn't find a legal cause of action in absence of a Coroner's Verdict filed among the legal records in San Miguel County; whereas Mr. Lee, et al, had an opportunity for adjudication of their innocence in a Court of law and to get claim of perpetration of conspiracy before a jury.

Apparently, unknowingly Mr. Jarvis Garrett made a false statement in a contention that Roberts had sponsors in the free for attack before Governor Mabry. There was an offer of sponsors and one of them made a trip to confer with Governor Mabry without the knowledge and consent of Roberts. This offer was not accepted and no one donated a cent to Roberts cause. The incident by the proffered sponsor conferring with Mabry hindered Roberts' case. Mr. Ted Andrews was a very respected and capable attorney and was not a sponsor.

In order to set the record straight so that your readers will not be misinformed and disillusioned while Mr. Garrett and the undersigned are still around to testify to facts and records available to Brushy Bill Roberts in 1950, I would like to state the following:

During private hearing that was to be open to all that Gov. Mabry granted to Roberts on November 30, 1950, in Governor's Mansion, instead of his office, to preserve privacy, the Governor refused counsel to Roberts; permitted anyone present—and there many—to grill the old man in the presence of armed guards, sheriffs, etc., and pointed out the Sheriff from Carlsbad inquiring if Roberts had seen this man on his visit there a few months before. Roberts answered he had not, got nervous and flunked their memory test.

The late Patrick J. Hurley, who wrote the letter to Oscar Garrett mentioned by Jarvis, was prompting the Governor with questions to be put to Roberts. Since Mr. Hurley's uncle John had pled the Governor's Amnesty by his attorneys, Catron & Thornton and S. B. Newcomb, to his indictment No. 282 Criminal, Lincoln County, he may have been competent to inquire of incidents happening after Kid's purported death and to uphold his family's honor; Mr. Cliff McKinney a few days before had told the press he would go anyplace to interview Roberts to determine if he really was the Kid, and he was a proper party since his father, Klip, held a different view of the killing than did Garrett and Poe, who admitted he had never been Kid before; others took their turn until Mr. Will Robinson, not an attorney, terminated the show. He did well until Roberts asked him a question, to which he answered in presence of all that his "memory was a bit hazy too after so many years," even though he was among friends while Roberts knew he was in enemy territory surrounded by pistols in holsters in full view; after Roberts' hearing—such as it was—without counsel and after the Honorable Governor had agreed in the presence of a reporter he would not determine anything today and give Roberts an opportunity to present his law and evidence, Mr. Patrick J. Hurley put in an appearance for the Garrett faction and requested a private hearing, which was granted; immediately after recess or adjournment of this Garrett hearing the Governor came out and announced he would not take any action in this case today or ever.

I reminded the Governor after he reversed himself that he had given us a statement after our hearing and then a scramble ensued to stop the first reporter before he issued that report. Like the private hearing granted the Garretts, this report was never made public.

Probably Patrick J. Hurley offered their copy of a verdict translated from a Spanish version recorded in the office of New Mexico State Land Commission in the attempt to change the Governor's mind in this case.

However, the Governor will

an attorney the same as Patrick J. Hurley, and they should have known this verdict had no legal force and effect since it was not made a matter of legal record in San Miguel County. According to an opinion I received from Mr. Joe L. Martinez, Mabry's Attorney General all court findings should be recorded in the County seat of the county having jurisdiction in the matter for legal force and effect. This certainly would not include the State Land Office.

After the County Clerks in various counties were unable to furnish certified copy of any coroner verdicts in kid's death, I made personal search, including State Records in office of Secretary of State with the thought it might show up there, but without avail.

Garrett stated the original verdict was in the office of prosecuting attorney. The opinion from this office was: "Such Verdict, if it existed, should have been filed in the office of the County Clerk; . . . such a record is not now, and never has been among the records of this office." I heard that members of this Ring always accomplished their end regardless of the methods used. I checked all leads to be safe.

We attempted to establish a lost instrument under the law in order to have an action to set it aside in court. Failing in this, Roberts did not have a chance litigate the issues in his matter. Publication of books will not serve to settle issues that should go before the conference table or in the courts for adjudication.

After Greene, Garrett's attorney, failed to collect the reward in his application to the Governor, he was successful in obtaining the legislative act granting the relief to Garrett for killing Kid in the month of August 1881. I have a photograph. The Ring controlled the legislature and the courts of New Mexico. Apparently they had lost their advantage as admitted by Garrett in his testimony against Oliver M. Lee, et al, and according to the jury's acquittal.

Although the late Mr. Oscar Garrett came to El Paso threatening legal action against Roberts nothing happened. Probably legal counsel had advised it would be impossible at that late date to establish the fact that his father had killed anyone that time.

I believe if Jarvis Garrett would do slight research he would admit he erred in the contention the Brushy Bill episode must have created confusion in the minds of some people not familiar with historical facts. There were not many facts until I dug up the old records that others failed to locate. They had been following legend and mis-stated facts. For the benefit of your and Mr. Garrett's readers I will point out there was plenty of confusion existing in the minds of many people from the very beginning of the purported death of Kid. Only slight research will uphold my contention.

I hold no animosity against any of the Garretts and to prove this I will state when the late Mr. Oscar Garrett approached Dr. C. L. Sonnichsen on the publication of Alias Billy the Kid, Sonnichsen requested Oscar to invite me in that conference, which he refused.

Even after that I gave my permission for Mr. Garrett to read ours before publication and if he could furnish a certified copy from any legally recorded coroner's verdict they would not be published.

Unfortunately, Mr. Garrett's death intervened and I did not have an opportunity to give the Garretts access to information, and records obtained in my research in order that they may have had an opportunity to disprove some of the suspicious claims made to me.

The above dissertation appears lengthy and superfluous, but I know Mr. Alan Rhodes feels that your readers must know the truth. I can furnish citations to support my contentions and challenge anyone in an attempt to refute my legal records made in Roberts' case.

Now to help Mr. Rhodes and his readers on some of the other issues he raises I will state that his Miss McCarty, an Irish immigrant, had met Mr. Antrim before Silver City was established and married him in Santa Fe instead of Silver City. I have citations to furnish.

I take exception to the statement Billy — the Kid — that is — signed his name to all letters to Governor Wallace. Certified photo copies of all Wallace Letters deposited in the William Henry Smith Memorial examination of documents in St. Louis, Missouri. It was decided that not all of said letters had been written by the same hand, including the signatures thereon.

Since no authentic writings were available to us it could not be determined which, if any, could have been written by the Kid.

Mr. Rhodes like Mr. Will Keleher failed to find criminal case file in the United States District Court wherein Kid pled to indictment returned by grand jury murder, thusly: Now comes the Plaintiffs herein by their District Attorney, S. M. Barnes, Esq., and the defendant Henry Antrim, Alias "Kid" in his proper person . . . and the grand jurors knew the Kid as Henry Antrim in the 1880's.

To get the meat of the allegations made by Miss Teller in her Petition filed in De Baca County District Court, wherein she filed copies of her Bonney family tree, one of which was furnished the undersigned by the District Attorney prior to trial of said cause, and I am checking this now, I fall to find where her relative, William Bonney, married Miss McCarty; there is no mention Kid's brother, Joseph Antrim or his stepfather, in this family tree, and no connection of Henry Antrim, alias Kid, to her Bonney family. She offered no testimony or evidence that William Bonney died in Coffeyville, Kansas, which did not exist then. The Census Bureau records failed to disclose in March 1872 and it was incorporated in 1873.

At the time she alleges Kid died he left surviving his brother, Joseph Antrim, as his nearest of kin. This fact was ignored by Miss Teller.

Furthermore, Miss Lois Teller, Plaintiff, failed to show for trial of the case to present testimony or evidence of her relationship to Kid.

I heard the Court deliver his opinion in a very broad and sincere manner. He left no room for doubt. Judge Henley dismissed her action and it stands dismissed.

Probably Mr. Rhodes is relying upon Miss Teller's family history in hopes of proving Billy's grandfather and uncle owned property in New York State in the 1820's.

It is hoped that Miss Teller informs Mr. Rhodes is relying to appear in her own behalf and that her case was dismissed when he visits her this summer.

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Before Mr. Rhodes can cite Jarvis Garrett's copy of a coroner's verdict illegally filed in the office of State Land Commission, I will dispose of it by citing opinions of Attorney General and District Attorney in New Mexico to the undersigned that the proper office in which the verdict should have been filed was the office of County Clerk of San Miguel County, New Mexico. And further I will contend that neither coroner verdict, or affidavit from Peter Maxwell as witness to any killing, was placed before the legislative assembly that changed to time of said purported killing in the month of August 1881. This is well settled.

FARM NEWS

The first series of wool sales were held last week in the Roswell area. Prices are reported better than last year. Some light-shrinking Lincoln County wools brought 65½¢ per pound and topped the market for the day. I expect some wool to bring as high as seventy cents per grease pound before the season is out.

The wool incentive payment for the 1965 marketing year was recently announced at 31.6 % of the net wool sales and sixty cents per hundred weight of unshorn lambs sold.

Mohair producers will also receive an incentive payment of 9.9% of net sales.

The average price for wool during the past year was 47.1 cents per grease pound.

Peaches are in full bloom in the Hondo Valley now. Some of the early blooms were killed by the freeze, but there are e-

nough blooms on most trees to make a crop.

The apples are in the green tip stage and are expected to start blooming within the next ten days in the Tinnie-Hondo area.

Fruit frost forecasts are being made for the area with this information available to local news services, KSWV-TV is one of the news sources that is carrying these forecasts.

planted there. The city officials distributed 35 to Socorro High School and 50 to New Mexico Tech. Individuals snapped up most of the remainder of the 333 Navajo willows that the city officials trucked from Tom Bolack's B Square Ranch at Farmington. The trees are being distributed free by Bolack as part of his plan to keep New Mexico green.

A willow is a graceful tree and grows fairly rapidly. We feel quite certain it will not outlast its welcome.

Out with the Chinese elms this year and the years to come, and plant willows or other suitable varieties of trees that will be a credit to the art of horticulture.—El Defensor Chieftain

Major General John P. Jolly, New Mexico Selective Service Director announced last week that the Selective Service Qualification Test for the 1966-67 school year will be held on May 14, May 21, and June 3, 1966.

Applicants must submit applications with a postmark deadline of not later than April 23, 1966. It is to the student's advantage to complete and mail the application at the earliest possible date in the preaddressed envelope. They must intend to ask for deferment as a student, and it is not necessarily limited to academic subjects and can include non-academic technical or vocational courses of instruction.

The next qualification test after June 3, 1966 has not been announced and may not be given before late fall. "It is therefore very important," the State Director explained, "that students who plan to request such deferment for the next school year have a test score in their selective service file before the beginning of the next academic year." Soon after the beginning of each student's academic year his local board reviews his file and determines if he is to be deferred.
