Zimmerman was commencement speaker, program held in the old gym Monday night. The salutatory address was given by Michael Dayton and valedictory by James Lackey.

Carrizozo high school graduated 31 in the Class of 1965 and on May 18, 1966, graduated 39-seniors. The Rev. John Rebold delivered the message at baccalaureate services for Carrizozo seniors May 15 at the school. Commencement was May 18 with Dr. Dewey Langston as speaker. Capitan high school graduated 19 seniors in 1965 and this year has gone way up, 33 seniors expected to walk up for diplomas May 20 at Capitan. Capitan library ready next year

Capitan school will have a new 40x50 foot library by start of school next year which will house eight to ten thousand volumes. The school now has 5,000 books which will be moved to the new quarters.

Supt. Duane Darling said they hope to have a full-time librarian. The project is part of their Title I program. Included in the new building, in addition to space for books, will be a conference room, library workroom and four individual booths for study. Supt. Darling said they expected to install language equipment and that space has been left for the addition of a projection room.



Elected auditor may cause storm

SANTA FE — There's been no official announcement, but next July there may be a technicality that will cause a major storm about the state.

Elected State Auditor Alex Armijo was recently named to be the first Legislative Auditor. He was appointed by the Legislative Audit Commission.

When the appointment occurred, there was some note of fact that a difference in salary might cause some dispute.

The real fiasco may be, however that he can no longer sign bonds for the state. The next elective auditor won't be available until after January 1.

Any discrepancy in the matter of the bonds could bring unlimited trouble to the state and under the present situation, it might well happen.

The point of dispute is that an employee of the "Legislative" branch cannot function legally under the "Executive" branch. If the matter is disputed, it'll be a three-ring circus.

Another point is exactly why the Audit Commission made the extremely early announcement. It could have waited and avoided the possible troubles.

It might've been done so Armijo could get up the job and proceed to lambast a few more areas of Gov. Campbell's Administration.

The Audit Commission is a lame-duck force now because of the recent primary elections. Later, Armijo might not have drawn the appointment. In the meantime he may sally forth with some real bombs for the current Administration.

Cargo says he's making amends with Mechem and other party wheels. To make amends is wonderful. To pull down big money for a legitimate race may be a different matter.

Some Republicans say the argument is whether to garner the party financial support for Cargo or simply to give the Demos a free ride and wait for the next time.

Outcome of this argument could be a big factor for the future of the GOP's in New Mexico.

Liquor Laws Due For Big Change

Looking back on the primary, the liquor laws of the state are in for a big blasting.

The fair trade repeal especially will loom after the nomination of former State Sen. Fabian Chavez as Lt. Governor.

Demo nominee Gene Lusk also has voiced his sentiment on the matter.

Chavez has vowed he'll work to repeal the liquor issue and it's a cinch Lusk, although not as vehement, will not stand in the way.

JP's Also Fear Next Session

It's safe to look for major changes in the Justice of the Peace system also. Chavez has battled the JP fee system for

several years, and again Lusk has indicated he won't oppose any changes in the area.

An added bleak note is that if "Little David" Cargo can kill the giant, he also has gone on record as opposing current liquor laws as well as the existing Justice of the Peace system.


Mrs. Alma Bradley, county health nurse, and Mr. Frank Chavez, of the county health department left Tuesday for Albuquerque for a three-day inter-personal communication seminar, sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

This year, 1966, the National Park Service has been in the people-serving business for 50 years. From the establishment of Yellowstone as the first National Park in 1872 the Service has grown to the extent of managing 231 areas consisting of National Parks, National Monuments, National Historic Sites, National Memorial Sites, National Seashores and Recreational Areas. In 1916 Congress enacted a law establishing the National Park Service to manage and protect the superlative scenic and historical sites set aside by Congressional action for the enjoyment of the people. Grand Quivira National Monument was established in 1909 by a Presidential Proclamation signed by President William Howard Taft.

In July 1965, a 4-year excavation project, funded by the National Park Service, was begun at Grand Quivira. A large Indian pueblo, covering approximately 22,000 square feet, is being excavated. Last year, a number of artifacts were located by the excavation team and a few select items will be on display this summer at the Grand Quivira Visitor Center.

The excavation project will be resumed, on a limited scale, May 2 and will get into full swing during July. Ranger-guided tours to the excavation will be offered to the visiting public during the summer months.

Section 1. There is hereby granted to Captain-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, hereinafter called the Association, a New Mexico Corporation, duly qualified to do business in the State of New Mexico, the right, license, privilege, right-of-way and franchise, for a period of twenty-five (25) years from the date hereof, to lay, re-lay, construct, maintain, operate and remove pipes, systems, works, appliances and other structures and facilities, whether heretofore or hereafter installed, for the purpose of transporting, carrying, treating, producing, manufacturing, distributing or delivering gas for light, heat, power, manufacturing and all other useful purposes along, across, over, under, in and about the public highways, roads, water bridges and other property belonging to or within the jurisdiction of the County, and the streets, roads, highways, alleys, water, bridges and other public places of any and all unincorporated towns and villages within the County and other public places thereof subject to the following conditions:

Section 2. All pipes, systems,

works and other facilities constructed or maintained hereunder shall be so constructed and maintained that public travel shall not be unnecessarily obstructed.

The right to maintain and operate the above mentioned facilities shall include the right to erect and maintain telephone, telegraph and other wire lines for use in connection with such maintenance and operation.

Section 3. All reasonable safety precautions shall be taken by the Association during the period of construction, laying, re-laying, repairing and removing of any of its facilities hereunder, and all excavations made in the course thereof shall be filled and all property on which such work is done shall be restored with reasonable dispatch and as nearly as may be to a condition at least as good as its previous condition.

Section 4. In the event of any change in said public roads, streets or highways, or in the grades or drains thereof, said pipes, systems, works, structures and other facilities of the Association shall be reset or changed by the Association so as to conform thereto, and in this event any bridge shall be rebuilt or repaired, the Association shall make and pay for any and all reasonable changes in its facilities as may be required by the County. The Association shall, as between it and the County, assume all liability to other persons which may be occasioned by the negligence or misconduct of the Association, its agents or employees in the construction, laying, re-laying, or removal of any of its facilities in Lincoln County, New Mexico, or any other activities conducted by the Association, its agents or employees, under and pursuant to this grant; and the Association agrees to hold and save the County harmless from all said liability.


