By history, state auditor has played a major advisory role on state board

SANTA FE — The full import of the next elective auditor for New Mexico has been eyed recently by several top politicians.

Current elected state auditor Alex Armijo has drawn the assignment for the next "Legislative Auditor".

At one point, most persons felt that the next elected auditor would be a negligible position and that all authority would go to the new position. It's true that the salary of the new elected auditor will be dropped to \$7,200.

But the consternation involved derives from the fact that the elected auditor will remain as a member of the Board of Finance.

Item In HB 300 Are Pointed Out

Last week a legislator took time to look up the number of items in HB 300 (Appropriations) which will be contingent on approval of the Board of Finance.

Board of Finance members are appointed by the Governor and for the most part are involved only to the extent of attending monthly meetings.

By history, the auditor has played a major advisory role at these meetings as one of the few on the board who is not only constantly advised but also lives with the business of the state.

Despite prior gags as to the weakness of the next elective auditor, it'll be worth noting how much authority he can swing with the Board of Finance.

There's a lot of money that can be spent or saved by actions of the Finance Board. At \$7,200 per year, the auditor could well be vulnerable to the wishes of the powers. It's something to take note of in the future.

Added Department Is Up For Grabs

In regard to publicity, there's one position that is apparently up for grabs, and it'll be interesting to see who comes out on top.

The state's Planning Department has drawn little notice, but chief Jack Flynn has drawn some fire from official areas.

Flynn ran at one time for Lieutenant Governor but since has been content in his current post.

It's a dead clinch that Rep. Dave Cargo (R-Bernalillo) would have a new man for Flynn's post if he's elected, but

the major talk has been that Lusk has promised the post to one of his top lieutenants. And there are several who would like to have it.

Charges Forming For New Campaign

Future political charges are taking shape for the gubernatorial race in the general election.

Rep. Cargo will wave the banner of Lusk being committed to the Oil and Gas people. He's stating now that Campbell originally was an attorney for the group and Lusk will follow.

In return, Lusk is stating that Cargo is not a "true" representative of the Republicans, but an opportunist.

Cargo has had his problems with party stalwarts, and Lusk has had his associations with the Oil and Gas industry.

Filling Out Slots Draws Some Netice

After the withdrawal of two Republicans from the state, Cargo and other GOP's are pressing to have the spots filled with one Spanish American and one Indian.

Such ethnic recognition was by-passed at the Republican convention, and now there's no volunteer to explain why.

SANTA FE — Lilly white Alex Armijo, the controversial state auditor and now designated acting legislative auditor, will face another go around this year to see if he can retain his newly appointed post.

Armijo barely made the grade recently when the Interim State Auditor Commission split down the middle over hiring him. But Alex made the grade by the slim margin of one vote.

When the commission came back two weeks later for more business it was only through the intervention of Rep. John Mershon, D-Otero, that Alex kept the post.

Mershon, sitting in meeting as a representative for the Legislative Finance Committee, said he would stick by the vote handed down previously by his finance committee chairman, Sen. Harold Runnels, D-Lee. That vote was to keep Armijo.

If Mershon had switched, Armijo would have been out and lame-duck Sens. Earl Parker, D-Torrance, and Bill Wheatley, D-Union, would have led a snafu dance through the hall of the capitol.

As it turned out, Mershon was able to talk the commission chairman, Parker, into foregoing any more action against Armijo.

Behind the scenes, meanwhile, Gene Lusk of Carlsbad made a side room appearance at the meeting and called for a vote against Armijo. Backed by Gov. Jack M. Campbell, Lusk told members of the commission he hoped to have a legislative auditor he could work for when he sat in the governor's chair next year.

The incident updated last year's feud between Campbell and Armijo. Angry letters flashed back and forth between the two men concerning statements by Armijo about the Highway Department road building administration.

But Lusk failed to rally the commission votes and the situation never was raised publicly in the commission meeting.

In the governor's office on the same day sat Rep. Roy W. Davidson, D-Colfax, talking with

Commissioners award reappraisal contract

After considering two bids Wednesday morning, one for \$55,000 from Lon E. Nelson and Associates of Santa Fe, the second from McMorris & Co. of Amarillo for \$51,071 to reappraise property in Lincoln County, the commissioners awarded the contract to Nelson. They were not bound to accept the low bid.

James Wheelock, reappraisal supervisor with the State Tax Commission, sat in on the meeting. He told the commissioners that their contract with Nelson & Associates would have to be approved by the State Tax Commission, Attorney General, and State Board of Finance. The tax Commission meets June 16 and final approval is expected on that date.

Reappraisal in New Mexico is being brought about by House Bill-33 as a cooperative program between the state tax commission and the county commission of each county. The law appropriated \$1 million to help pay the costs of reappraisals and the state may share costs in each county not to exceed 50%.

Wheelock told the commissioners that he had participated in a check of property sales and values in Eddy County, where county officials said they were in good shape on assessment. Assessed values were found to range from 6 percent to 60 percent.

It will be interesting to see how well reappraisal works out in Lincoln County. Mr. Wheelock said his office and the contract reappraiser would do their best to keep people informed. They have a great many brackets, for instance a box type house with 900 square feet of floor space would be catalogued (tentative only) or taxed at \$2-10 per thousand, labeled E-minus. A modern brick home, known as class A-plus with 900 feet of floor space would be assessed at \$12.35 per thousand. Quite a wide difference here. One commissioner noted that quite a few taxes would decrease.

The county cost will be spread over five years. Based on 1965 valuation, the county expects to receive \$6,307 each year from three-tenths mill incentive for the reappraisal. This would add up to \$30,000 in five years, possibly leaving a balance of \$8,500. The commissioners can use the balance in the general fund, to help finance the followup of reappraisal, or as they see fit.

Based on the 1965 valuation, Lincoln County schools stand to receive \$35,744 whether or not they were for the reappraisal (Hondo school board opposed). This represents 1.7 mill incentive money. The three-tenths going to the county general fund is the other incentive.

Commissioner Joe McKnight asked how they would reappraise a piece of land across the road from Fred McTeigue in the Hondo Valley. The only description of this one-acre tract on the deed and tax rolls is "one acre of land above Hondo."

In answering this question, it was brought out by the two applicants for the appraisal work that identification tax maps, control system, highway department records, and all types of official documents will be used and will help.

Three schools, Capitán, Corona, and Carrizozo have indicated that they will help finance the project to the tune of \$5,000. George White, Ruidoso superintendent, has just returned from Germany and told Max Oliver that Ruidoso school would help, how much was not certain Wednesday.

The school contributions will be taken off the top before any division is made of county and state costs. Lincoln County's portion this date would be \$25,000, but any credit for local help, like office space or business machines, will be deducted from the county's part and this may amount to as much as \$1,000. County's share should end up close to \$20,000.

Lincoln County courthouse will be closed Monday, May 30 for Memorial Day.

Gas contracting complete

Starting with a meeting for preliminary planning on September 2, 1965, the Capitán-Carrizozo Gas Users Association was formed, based on a study made by the Powell Engineering Co. of Santa Fe that bringing natural gas into this area would be feasible.

There were many meetings following the September 2 start and much work done by the committees appointed by Capitán Mayor Gerald Dean and Carrizozo Mayor Vernon Petty.

The Association has the power to issue revenue bonds, which in effect permits the gas company to pay for itself. Bond total necessary for the job has been figured at \$750,000 money coming from a federal agency.

The business of the Association was far enough along by March, 1966, that public meetings could be called to acquaint people with the project. Meetings were scheduled in both towns in late March. The Association had made application to the Housing and Urban Development Agency for the money, and it was figured that 318 users in Carrizozo and 172 in Capitán would need to put up \$20 deposits and sign natural gas contracts.

Most of the time at the first meeting in Carrizozo was devoted to sniping at the gas association by those opposing its formation. Some explaining done but little accomplished. At another meeting of interested people

it was decided that two ladies, Mrs. Welcolin Armstrong, and Mrs. C. A. Snow, be given the job of contacting people to sign the contracts.

After just one day of work in Carrizozo, Snow and Armstrong reported their reception was good and results were the same in Capitán when workers got started up there. This week a total of 325 gas users have signed in Carrizozo, 221 in Capitán, well over the required minimum.

The Capitán-Carrizozo gas users Association will have charge of the Public Service Commission for hearing on June 2.

Dan and Joe Ortiz start racing season with Walk the Floor at the Downs

About a year ago Dan Ortiz, custodian at Carrizozo school, had what he considered a pretty good roping horse and no intention of going any trading until he met a fellow from Amarillo, Texas who owned a thoroughbred gelding, coming seven.

The upshot of this meeting was a straight-across trade and Dan became the owner of a race horse once the property of a movie star and famous trumpeter Harry James. The horse's name was Walk the Floor.

Welch told the horse owners that Walk the Floor was in good condition after wintering in Lincoln County and ought to be ready to race soon.

CARRIZOZO POOL OPENS SUNDAY FOR NEW SEASON

Rec com takes over swimming pool

At a special meeting of Carrizozo town council Monday night a resolution was passed outlining a recreation program and stating that a committee of eight to be appointed, terms to be staggered, to direct all recreation activities of the Town of Carrizozo. A committee has been appointed regularly in the past, but apparently without official sanction.

Recreation committee members serving two-year terms are: Ruth Armstrong, Henry Vega, Fred Chavez, and Gian Ellison. Appointed for four-year terms were Jackie Spencer, Ray Wells, Marcos Barcia, and Councilman Joe Ventura.

Recreation committee members and town council agreed that the pool would be ready for swimmers and divers on Sunday afternoon, May 29, and stay open for the season.

After the resolution had been passed the Town Council voted unanimously to turn management of Carrizozo swimming pool to the recreation committee. Margaret Lightfoot and Bobby Dan Crosshaw had both applied for jobs as pool managers. In going over plans after the meeting Ray Wells and Jackie Spencer, both rec com members, indicated that probably both Lightfoot and Crosshaw would be employed.

It was agreed that the Town would continue to pay cost of pool operation, which in the past, Utilities Manager Wayne Withers had thought that the pool had to be heated from scratch four times last summer because the water got out of condition and had to be replaced cost about \$650. Withers said he expected to eliminate that cost this summer

through the use of pills to eliminate algae (moss) conditions. Jackie Spencer had figures on swimming pool costs, which have been fairly stable, but income from cigarette tax money has gone way down. Question is where is the cigarette money going.

Wednesday utility manager Wayne Withers and town crew were busy filling the Eozo swim pool, installing new filters, starting the water heater, putting the pool plumbing in operating condition. Withers said everything would be ready by Sunday.

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Translators' whims, printer's errors created a host of Biblical curiosities

Washington — Translators' whims and printers' errors have created a host of Biblical curiosities such as the "Breeches Bible," the "Bug Bible," and the "Wicked Bible."

The Breeches Bible is the most famous unusual editions, the National Geographic Society says. In this 1560 English-language Bible, printed in Switzerland, the translator had Adam and Eve sewing fig leaves together to make "breeches," not the familiar "aprons" of the King James Version.

In a 1551 Bible, Psalm 91 speaks of "bugges by night" instead of "the terror by night." Bugges, or bogies, is an old English word meaning terror. The "Treacle Bible"

Another 16th-century translator, rendered Jeremiah's question, "Is there no balm in Gilead?" as "Is there not triacle at Gilead?" Thenceforth, this version came to be known as the "Treacle Bible."

The apostle Peter advised husbands to treat a wife as "the weaker vessel," but the translator of the 1549 English Bible appended this stern note, "And if she be not obedient and helpful unto him, endeavoreth to beat the fear of God into her head." So was born the "Wife-Beater Bible."

Typographical errors have plagued Biblical scholars even more than eccentric translation. Mistakes were so prevalent in early English Bibles that the Crown took control of Bible printing, and even today a limited number of British publishers are authorized to print the King James Version.

Andrew Anderson, remembered as one of the worst printers ever known in Scotland, issued a Bible in the 17th century with 2,000 misprints in the New Testament alone.

Anderson was rivaled by John Field of London, who in 1653 printed a New Testament sprinkled with typographical errors. The most serious made a line from I Corinthians read, "The unrighteous shall inherit the kingdom of God." Field's edition survives as the "Unrighteous Bible."

The "Wicked Bible" of 1631 resulted from the omission of "not" from the Seventh Commandment. Charles I ordered the printers fined and all thousand copies that had been printed to be destroyed. Only four copies are known to have escaped and survived.

The reign of Charles I also saw the "Fool Bible," in which the text of Psalm 14 read, "The fool hath said in his heart there is a God." The dropped "no" cost the printers 3,000 pounds.

"Basketful of Errors"

In 1717, John Baskett of Oxford printed a magnificent edition of the King James Bible with large type and many plates. But it proved to be so full of mistakes that the edition quickly acquired the nickname "A Basketful of Errors." It is also known as the "Vinegar Bible" from a heading on St. Luke 20, which read, "The Parable of the Vinegar" (for vineyard).

Three editions share the dubious distinction of being called the "Murderers Bible." One typographical error changed "murderers" to "murderers." Another made Numbers 35:18 read, "The murderers" in Jude to "murderers." Another made Numbers 35:18 read, "The murderer shall surely be put together," instead of "to death." In the third, the phrase from Mark 7:27, "Let the children first be filled," became shockingly, "Let them be killed."

The fearsome New England divine, Cotton Mather, excoriated "scandalous Errors of Press-work" in citing a Bible with a highly appropriate misprint for "Princes" in Psalm 119: "Printers have persecuted me without cause."

The fruit crop in Lincoln County looks the best in several years. Although early freezes killed over 85 percent of the blossom in some orchards, the remaining blossoms have set a commercial crop of apples. Many growers are using chemical thinners on the Golden Delicious and Jonathan trees. I would estimate that Lincoln County will have over 275,000 bushels of apples this year.

A thorough insect schedule should be followed if you expect to have a worm-free apple this fall. Apply a codling moth spray at 10 to 14 day intervals and use sprays recommended in the fruit spray schedules.

Range conditions are extremely varied in Lincoln County. The Southeast corner of the county had a good rain about two weeks ago and has enough green grass to help the livestock out. The North and Northeast part of the county has little winter moisture and no spring rains. They are having to feed heavily. The West portion of the county had some winter moisture and has some weeds and grass from this moisture.

During the first two weeks of June, enumerators from the New Mexico Crop and Livestock Reporting Service office will be visiting about 1400 farms throughout the State collecting on-the-spot information on acres planted, livestock numbers, farm wages and labor. Information collected becomes part of the crop and livestock reports issued during June and July.

About 100,000 farms will be visited in this nationwide enumerative survey. Farm areas throughout New Mexico and the United States are randomly chosen for this survey. Enumerators employed in each State locate the selected areas through the use of aerial photos and county road maps. Evident farm located in the selected areas will be interviewed. Information from these visits will be audited in the State office and results sent to the USDA's Crop Reporting Board in Washington, D. C., for processing on automatic, high-speed computers. If you are contacted you are urged to cooperate in providing the needed information.

At this time, about 4,500 white acreage cards and 5,000 tan livestock cards will be mailed to individual farms for information on their individual operations. Each person receiving a card is urged to return their card promptly to assure that the estimates made will be as reliable as possible.

Most of the results from these three surveys, along with additional information from agricultural businesses and other sources, will be released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture from Washington, D. C. in the National July 1 Crop Report.

Residents and business houses in Alamogordo were cleaning up last Friday in the aftermath of a vicious wind and sand storm which churned through Alamogordo from the west and north late Thursday, causing widespread damage and injuring four persons.

The storm, which hit at approximately 5:20 p.m., at first was thought to have caused damages running into many thousands of dollars.

The storm lasted about 30 minutes and brought with it a wall of sand and winds which buffeted the city with gusts reported at between 65 and 85 miles per hour during its peak.





No industry at Lincoln

Industrial development fever might be catching. Carrizozo folks have more than one project going right now with the ultimate aim of "more jobs for people." Capitan had a short fling with industry of a type demanding machinists and they were not available.

Lincoln Town people, maybe only one, maybe two dozen, would like some industry in their town.

We believe history should hold the top deck at Lincoln, much more restoration should be completed, and that this beautiful section of Lincoln County should be kept completely apart from any sort of industrial development.

Mostly done the hard way

The people at Lincoln County News have followed a rule for many years that the content of our newspaper be material of local origin, not printed in any other newspaper.

Our May 12 issue is as good a sample as any. The editor wrote news stories about the bank opening, county reappraisal, natural gas, industrial survey, going straight to the source for these stories and trying to give our readers information they would get no other way. In addition the News front page had three local pictures, Johnson and Bill, Jete and park officials, Bunny, Rosella and Barbara.

Page two of the News is generally "Of interest to women," with Eleanor Payton as editor. She was doing good on May 12 with sorority, homemaker, May Day, extension club, and engagement writeups, plus picture of Jackie and guests at dedication luncheon and Bennie and friends at sorority banquet.

In this issue was considerable news reported by Minnie Lee Neill, more by Mrs. Frank Titworth. We share the news of Gladys Alexander and Opal Greer but the News is first out in this instance.

Margaret Rench writes a very complete column about doing around Capitan, not printed anywhere but in the Lincoln County News. Effie Mulkey does the same at Corona and you

can tell how people are getting along in both these towns from reading their columns.

The editorial page of the Lincoln County News is all hand typed by the editor, both editorials and Way of the West column. We like to scan the state's weekly newspapers, for paragraphs of interest, usually devoting two or more hours a week to this chore.

On May 12 the News went all out to publicize the new school buildings at Corona. Four pages of newspaper (eight tabloid size) containing pictures of seniors, class rooms, programs and news of the dedication - graduation occasions. Also in this special supplement was a history of Corona schools by Geraldine Perkins, news of Ancho by Barbara Harkey, Claunch news by Betty Hobbs, and short biography of each Corona senior printed nowhere but in the Lincoln County News.

We went a little further May 12, something we're ready to do any time, and printed the complete list of natural gas signers as a service to the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Association.

Frankly, we don't always do this well, because we don't have new schools to dedicate, a bank openhouse, or senior graduation but there will always be something new and we'll try to bring our readers news and views in a manner they will get from no other source.

Economists at Utah State University have been working out answers to current questions about grazing fees, economics of ranching, and related social responsibility. They came up with one believable answer. There is no one kind of public land, no one kind of ranch, no one pattern of operation in the ranching area.

The Utah economists also came up with a set of figures that put the average rancher right in line with the average brick layer in net income.







1. Every dog shall at all times wear a durable collar to which shall be securely attached the required license.
2. It shall be unlawful for any owner to allow or permit any dog, whether licensed or not, to be or remain upon the streets or alleys of the Town or in any public place in the Town, or upon any other premises without the consent of the person in possession of such other premises.
3. All dogs three months old or older must be vaccinated for rabies annually.

able to retain the post, the legislative auditor will be a powerful man. In neighboring Utah, where a legislative auditor has been on the payroll for several years, he carries more weight than the governor in some matters.

The Legislative Finance Committee and not the audit commission ultimately will have the biggest say - so on who is auditor.

While Armijo may have gleaned confidence from the committee with his ruthless attacks on its traditional enemies, he still must face the fact that the committee may be packed next year with new men - more favorable to going along with the administration.
