

## LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY

### The Brown Store at White Oaks

The lone store building still standing in White Oaks and known as the Brown Store was built in the early 90's, by Judge John Y. Hewitt who also built the two story bank building which was demolished a few years ago. Both these buildings were built of native stone quarried in hills near town.  
The building in question was never owned by Mr. Brown (John A.) who occupied the east

half of ground floor for a number of years as store and post office from 1897 to about 1903. He died in 1910 and the store was operated by his widow Anna T. Brown until her death a number of years later. The west half of ground floor was occupied as dry goods store by Solomon Werner until he purchased the Ziegler Dry Goods Store adjoining the bank building.  
The upper entire floor was

used for school purposes, containing three rooms until the new school house was built in 1900.  
In later years east half of upstairs was used by ladies' organizations for meetings, social events, and dances until it was declared unsafe.  
This building remained the property of John Y. Hewitt until his death in 1932 then passing to the ownership of the late Judge A. H. Hudspeth.


## Gas Association presents its case

Bert Cheney and Valton Hall of Capitan, Jete Voss, Arnold Boyce and Sally Ortiz of Carrizozo went to Santa Fe June 2 to represent the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Association on its application to the Public Service Commission for permit to serve these two communities. The Capitan-Carrizozo association will buy its gas from El Paso Natural Gas Company's pipeline at a point 28 miles north of Capitan.  
Ruidoso Natural Gas plans to buy gas from the Capitan-Carrizozo Association. The Ruidoso hearing was held following the Capitan-Carrizozo hearing in Santa Fe.

At the hearing Willis Umholtz, a partner in the engineering firm of W. Carlos Powell and Associates, the firm that did the feasibility study on the joint project, testified the Capitan-Carrizozo Association would pay 34.35 cents per thousand cubic feet to its supplier for gas for residential use.  
He said the Capitan-Carrizozo Association would sell to the Ruidoso company for 39.35 cents per thousand cubic feet for residential use.  
Ruidoso Downs city attorney Robert Sanderford asked Umholtz if the Capitan-Carrizozo project would be feasible without the sales to the Ruidoso company.  
Umholtz testified it would, but changes in the specifications for the Capitan-Carrizozo project would be required.

Sanderford noted statistics showing the number of utility users in the two communities which indicate a decline in population. The statistics were contained in a report made by the engineers. These figures showed a decline in school enrollment and water users in Carrizozo in recent years and a decline in school enrollment in Capitan—the past year.

The application by Ruidoso Natural Gas Co. also seeks approval to purchase the assets of Lincoln County Utilities, Inc., a firm presently in the Ruidoso area handling bottled gas.  
No decision has been received at this date from the Public Service Commission.

## Indoor arena ready for grand opening June 26

Neither rain, sleet, snow, wind or dust will stop activities, normally carried on outdoors, at the Mal Pais Livestock Ranch owned by Gary Lovelace eleven miles north and nine miles west of Carrizozo.

Located right at the head of the Mal Pais lava flow, a new 100x200 foot steel barn was completed last week and will be used for all sorts of horse activities such as shows, cutting and roping. Their grand opening is Sunday, June 26.

Mal Pais Livestock has been in the quarter horse business for some time, and the entire Lovelace family is intensely interested in the development of good quarter horses in this area, riding them, roping from them, and using them for routine ranch work.

This new barn will permit horse activities to go on any time of the year, in any kind of weather. Gary plans to construct 25 box stalls, two rest rooms and concession stand inside the barn after he finishes will fill and grading. This will leave 72 feet width on east and 80 feet on west end. An older barn adjoining is 45x90 and will be used as stable.  
This new barn should benefit

the entire state particularly the southwest part.  
The only other location for shows and activities such as will be carried on at the Lovelace Ranch is in the coliseum (slightly larger) in Albuquerque. Horses are a multi-million dollar business in New Mexico and adjoining states.  
The top stallion at Mal Pais Livestock is Oiler, by Croton Oil out of Zantanon Babe. There are 13 brood mares on the ranch.

The grand opening of the new livestock barn will be June 26 starting at 8:00 a.m. when riders start competing in a N.C.H.A. cutting contest with \$100 added money. Jackpot calf roping and dally team roping will start at 1:00.

The public is invited, there is no admission charge.

### Signers needed for Capitan project

The Village of Capitan has gone about as far as it can go in the process of having sanitary sewerage for the village — now it is necessary for Capitan people to indicate their desires by going to the village hall and signing sewer service contracts. The tap-on fee is \$25, \$10 of which must be paid when contract is signed, \$15 due when service is in operation.  
The project will cost approximately \$120,000, fifty percent to be borrowed from the Farm and Home Administration, the other fifty percent expected to be outright grant. The Capitan sewer project will be the first loan of this type made by the FHA.

Residents of Capitan village who do not sign contracts now may tie on later but the cost will be \$50 or more, and cost expected to be prohibitive after sewer lines are covered.

There is some urgency in the matter of going to the village hall and signing sewer contracts not later than June 27 because the loaning agency needs to know if there is a demand in Capitan for sanitary sewer service.

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

## Jet planes, pawn shop, recreation, summer water rates occupies council

Carrizozo town council met in regular session Tuesday, minutes approved, bills allowed as first items. Front end loader overhaul cost town \$900 was largest bill.

Melvin Baker has notified the town that he wants to operate a pawn shop in the house next to Snow residence. Town council was undecided as to whether a business should move into a residential district but on looking up pawnshops in the ordinance books there was nothing to stop this business, or other, from locating anywhere they like. The council wants Mr. Baker to understand the regulations regarding operation of a pawnshop before granting occupation license, cost \$12.50.

Three requests for liquor licenses presented from Central, Yucca and 4 Winds, all three approved. Johnnie's and Rollands not yet received by town. Nike bar is out of city limits.

Dues to New Mexico Municipal League has increased from \$120 to \$200. Not due yet, no action taken.

Letter from Federal Aviation Agency stated that \$50 million was available under FAAP to assist towns with such projects as runways, taxiways, lighting. Carrizozo wants help in completing lighting at its new airport and will make applications for same.

Cannon Air Force Base sent town a man showing low altitude, high speed jet training routes, minimum altitude 2000 feet. Much of this activity will be right over Carrizozo.

It was decided that water rates would be lowered 5 cents a thousand for June, July, and August.

Street patching discussed. Town will borrow state equipment and fill cracks with hot oil and patch several holes.

## Santa Fe District Attorney Al Sanchez chastised for blowing up at judge

SANTA FE — There was a recent bitter dispute in a neighbor state regarding actions of a Judge. It took a long time but the situation was eventually handled.

End result was that people discovered that Judges, after all, are still just people.

I say this to pinpoint the fact that any critic of a judge should not be nailed to the barn door because he dared to offer up an opinion.

Santa Fe District Attorney Al Sanchez is pushing a battle to change some laws. Sanchez blew up at District Judge Frank Zinn of Gallup. Zinn dismissed a case without hearing two eye witnesses for Sanchez's prosecution of a manslaughter case that evolved from a traffic accident near Espanola.

Reaction from judicial chiefs was to chastise Sanchez for opening his mouth to the press about what he thought was a glaring error.

Sanchez may be right or wrong, but it should rankle any resident of the state to see him get bombed for simply disputing a decision he believed to be unjust.

In New Mexico, if you have a case that's being appealed to the State Supreme Court, you can count on two or three years waiting time.

The new Court of Appeals was created to attempt a cut in this necessary waiting time.

It gave the Supreme Court a second team and most taxpayers expected the new bunch to make a difference.

When the new court becomes functional, a change may be seen.

But Supreme Court Chief Justice David Carmody roared like a bull two weeks ago when reporters tried to determine how long it would take to render a decision on a particular case.

Carmody was incensed that anyone would presume to ask him anything about the slow process of justice in the state.

The Al Sanchez incident may be hurried. But a few added such cases might go further to prove that Judges are people and people pay the judges. The battered taxpayer supports his own courts, there's no reason to deny him the full benefit of what he pays for.

No Truce Seen Between Dave And The Old Guard

GOP Governor candidate Dave Carpio still can't get his truce with the old guard of the party.

If you noticed last week, the platform planks being drawn by the Republicans are cutting into the areas where Dave is trying to cut into the Democrats.

Republicans are going strong in opposition to repeal of 14-B of the Taft Hartley Act (right to work) and Dave has done all in his power to recruit support from labor forces in the state.

He's done an admirable job of pleasing the labor chiefs, but he can't argue with his own platform.

Regarding the liquor industry the Republicans plan to fight the idea of licenses being sold on a bid basis because it tends to discriminate against the "little people." Dave, naturally, will go along with this.

Strange thing is that so much is being made of the liquor industry when other areas may be grossly important to a larger number of people, but candidates have shied away from it.

This is a prediction I've made before, but the new Examining and Licensing Committee will meet again this month. Major contractors are pushing for some changes.

If the "little people" can be hurt, it might well occur through this group, which has to date remained remarkably out of the public eye.

### FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Insects are starting to cause problems in the area. Peach and plum trees have been found with the leaves curling up. This condition generally indicates aphids. Look under the curl of the leaf to find this small green insect. Malathion is one of the chemicals that will control this pest.

Flea beetles and grasshoppers have been found in the Capitan area. The flea beetle eats small holes in the leaves and can be controlled with Sevin, Malathion, or Diazanone.

Grasshoppers can be controlled with Aldrin or Dieldrin on lawn or weeds, but these chemicals require that you wait too long to harvest to be used in gardens. Use Malathion in the garden.

For information on other garden pests, get the bulletin, "Insects and Diseases of Vegetables in the Home Garden," from the County Agent's office in Carrizozo.

All types of ants will be active from now until cold weather.

or next fall. So between now and then there's a good chance for some of them to find their way into your home.

Ants are social insects that live in colonies. Nests are usually located in the soil near the foundation of the house, under sidewalks, concrete slabs and even in the lawn or garden.

To stop ants from invading homes, an outside treatment is best. Treat baseboards, window sills, and other areas where ants are seen. Use a household-type spray containing 2 percent chlordane, 1/2 percent lindane or 1/2 percent dieldrin. A 5 percent chlordane dust may also be used. Apply the insecticide at 2-week intervals until the ants disappear.

To eliminate ant colonies in your lawn, sift one teaspoon of 5 percent chlordane dust over each nesting area.

You can tell a littered mind without a spoken word.



When the excavation was complete, an arrow point was found lying in the rib cavity.



ORDINANCE NUMBER 91 AN ORDINANCE granting to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, a franchise and privilege to construct, erect and operate a gas system within the boundaries of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico; providing for the terms and conditions of such franchise; providing for the acceptance of such franchise by the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, providing for publication and providing an effective date:

WHEREAS, the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, has heretofore been organized by joint resolution of the governing authorities of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico and the Village of Capitan, New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, said association has been organized for the purpose of acquiring a natural gas transmission line and distribution system in order to provide gas service to the inhabitants of the town of Carrizozo and the Village of Capitan and in connection therewith proposes to issue and sell its revenue bonds for the purpose of paying part of the cost of acquiring said line system; and

WHEREAS, it is now the desire of the Mayor and Board of Trustees of said Town of Carrizozo New Mexico to grant a franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association to construct, erect and operate such system within the present or future boundaries of said Town of Carrizozo (hereinafter for convenience called the "Municipality") in accordance with the provisions of Section 14-43-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Municipality as follows:

ARTICLE ONE That the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Municipality do hereby grant the following franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, for the construction, erection and operation of a natural gas system within the Municipality;

SECTION 1. Grant of Authority. There is hereby granted to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, successors in interest or assigns (hereinafter for convenience collectively called the "Association") for twenty-five years from the date of the acceptance hereof by the Association, the right, privilege and franchise to acquire, erect, construct, operate and maintain a gas system, and to import, transport, sell and distribute gas, whether natural, manufactured or mixed, to the Municipality and the inhabitants, institutions and businesses thereof, for domestic, commercial, industrial and institutional uses and such other purposes for which it is or may hereafter be used, within the Municipality, and for these purposes to establish the necessary facilities and equipment and to lay, repair, replace, maintain

and operate gas mains, service pipes, regulator stations and other appurtenances necessary to supplying the sale and distribution of gas in, along and across the streets, avenues, alleys and other public ways and places of the Municipality; and to use the streets and other public ways in the Municipality for rights-of-way for its natural gas lines, mains, service pipes and other appurtenances needed for operation of the natural gas system.

The Association shall not be required to commence the installation of its gas distribution system prior to the receipt of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity from the Public Service Commission of New Mexico; thereafter the Company may install such portions of its distribution system as it may elect from time to time; provided, however, that said distribution system shall in any event be completed within a two year period from the date said Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity is received.

This franchise shall be non-exclusive.

SECTION 2. Conditions of Street Occupancy. (1) Use: All pipes, mains and other natural, artificial or mixed gas equipment and apparatus laid or placed by the Association shall be so located in the streets, alleys, public ways and placed in the Municipality as not to obstruct or interfere with any water pipes, sewers, drains or other structures. The Association shall, when practicable, avoid interfering with the use of such street, alley or other highway where the paving or surface of such street, alley or other highway would be disturbed.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 66-3 AN ORDINANCE granting to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, a franchise and privilege to construct, erect and operate a gas system within the boundaries of the Village of Capitan, New Mexico; providing for the terms and conditions of such franchise; providing for publication and providing an effective date:

WHEREAS, the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, has heretofore been organized by joint resolution of the governing authorities of the Village of Capitan, New Mexico and the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, said association has been organized for the purpose of acquiring a natural gas transmission line and distribution system in order to provide gas service to the inhabitants of the Village of Capitan and the Town of Carrizozo and in connection therewith proposes to issue and sell its revenue bonds for the purpose of paying part of the cost of acquiring said line system; and

WHEREAS, it is now the desire of the Mayor and Board of

Trustees of said Village of Capitan, New Mexico to grant a franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association to construct, erect and operate such system within the present or future boundaries of said Village of Capitan (hereinafter for convenience called the "Municipality") in accordance with the provisions of Section 14-43-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Municipality as follows:

ARTICLE ONE That the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Municipality do hereby grant the following franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, for the construction, erection and operation of a natural gas system within the Municipality;

SECTION 1. Grant of Authority. There is hereby granted to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico intercommunity gas association, successors in interest or assigns (hereinafter for convenience collectively called the "Association") for twenty-five years from the date of the acceptance hereof by the Association, the right, privilege and franchise to acquire, erect, construct, operate and maintain a gas system, and to import, transport, sell and distribute gas, whether natural, manufactured or mixed, to the Municipality and the inhabitants, institutions and businesses thereof, for domestic, commercial, industrial and institutional uses and such other purposes for which it is or may hereafter be used, within the Municipality, and for these purposes to establish the necessary facilities and equipment and to lay, repair, replace, maintain and operate gas mains, service pipes, regulator stations and other appurtenances necessary to supplying the sale and distribution of gas in, along and across the streets, avenues, alleys and other public ways and places of the Municipality, and to use the streets and other public ways in the Municipality for rights-of-way for its natural gas lines, mains, service pipes and other appurtenances needed for operation of the natural gas system.

The Association shall not be required to commence the installation of its gas distribution system prior to the receipt of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity from the Public Service Commission of New Mexico; thereafter the Company may install such portions of its distribution system as it may elect from time to time; provided, however, that said distribution system shall in any event be completed within a two year period from the date said Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity is received.

This franchise shall be non-exclusive.

SECTION 2. Conditions of Street Occupancy. (1) Use: All pipes, mains and other natural, artificial or mixed gas equipment and apparatus laid or placed by the Association shall be so located in the streets, alleys, public ways and placed in the Municipality as not to obstruct or interfere with any water pipes, sewers, drains or other structures.
