## Revenue bonds and Federal grant will finance Capitan sewer project

The Village of Capitan has a sewer project in the making that will be of only minimum cost to local residents and will provide a much-needed service. If sufficient signers are on the line by June 27, the deadline date, Capitan Village will secure a Federal grant for half the cost and revenue bonds (paid for by revenue from project and definitely do not go to tax rolls) will finance the other half of the \$120,000 project.

The monthly cost for sewerage service in Capitan is estimated to be \$1.00 minimum, and \$3.00 per month maximum. Tap fee is \$25.00, \$10.00 down and \$15 when the sewer line goes in. Capitan Village officials are urging all local residents to go to the village hall and pay their fee and sign a contract for sewer use, which will help the project along as much as possible.

### LANDMARKS OF LINCOLN COUNTY ...

### The Adobe at Carrizozo

Many parts of history are well-known by local folks but little talked about and as the years rolls by much of history is forgotten. The series of sketches artist Walter Henn of Lincoln is doing for the News, and the accompanying write-ups, are an attempt to capture pieces of Lincoln County history and preserve for posterity.

The Adobe, as a generation of railroad men and Carrizozo residents know it, is more infamous than famous. This building between the tracks and Carrizozo's main road of the early 1900's was the "port of call" for railroad men and travelers alike.

A Carrizozo resident, call boy for the railroad as a young man, said that he would get half his crew from the Adobe.

People not familiar with Carrizozo 50 years ago have only to look to the left after leaving the 54-380 intersection heading east and there is the Adobe right up next to the overpass.

This land was originally part of the McDonald Estate and a parcel was sold by Truman

Spencer Sr. to Lorenzo Casados who put up the Adobe. Later Casados sold to Bessie Barr, also known as One-eyed Bess, who in turn sold the property to Vincent Reil.

Floor plan of the Adobe is common for the purpose, a large main room, somewhat smaller eating room, rest room and opening off a hall were eight small rooms.

As we get the story, Adobe residents kept to themselves pretty well, work at night and sleep in the daytime, was more their routine. Three "madams" are well-remembered because they did all the purchasing, being real good customers for groceries, cars, sundries.

The story is told about Billie Smith who was married to Doc. Billie was a good-sized woman and gave Doc a bad time, but apparently he did her wrong. One day word came to a local resident that he better go rescue Doc, Billie was about ready to "do him in". The Carrizozo man rushed over to The Adobe, sure enough, Billie had Doc tied hand to head and feet to foot

of bed, razor in her hand and was fixing to "do Doc no good". Doc was white as a sheet and was saying not a word because he knew that Billie was serious. Luckily for Doc the rescuer was able to talk her out of the misdeed on Doc's anatomy.

One of the early "madams" was Mrs. Riddell, and also well-remembered is Bessie Barr, or One-eyed Bessie as she was better known. Bessie made good home brew for her customers. The Adobe was a good time place for a frontier country. If anyone knew the whereabouts of the player piano used for entertainment they would have a genuine antique.

During the years before US54 became a major highway, the main road came right down the tracks to the Western Hotel. There were quite a few business places along this road, but the overpass put them out of business, and according to a quote from Billie Smith, the last of the Carrizozo madams, "Too much local free competition put us out of business" — the year was 1934.

### Hospital eligible but not certified

Forty-four New Mexico hospitals have complied with laws against racial discrimination to become eligible for participation in the medicare program July 1, Lincoln County Hospital in Carrizozo on this list.

The Carrizozo Hospital is eligible but following a recent survey has several items to clarify and must find two additional nurses to become certified under statutory requirements of the Department of Public Health.

The large hospital at Ft. Bayard has around a million dollars worth of new equipment but it also has elevator problems. They are one foot too long and too short another direction to meet building code requirements.

About the same situation is true in Carrizozo. The floor of the operating room plainly does not meet requirements because it is not conductive (meaning it does not conduct away static electricity). The hospital has gotten along by not using anesthetics of a type that would spark and cause fire from static electricity. Now a federal law is involved and the floor does not measure up.

According to J. T. Clegg, hospital administrator, it is the intent of the board of directors to qualify Carrizozo Hospital for medicare. Directors are Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Dimmit Bond, Johnson Stearns, A. P. Sitton, and Bill Edgar.

In addition to changing the operating room floor, estimated cost around \$2,500, it will be necessary to employ two more nurses. The law reads: Provide 24-hour nursing service rendered or supervised by a registered professional nurse, and has a licensed practical nurse or registered professional nurse on duty at all times.

This would be the same if Carrizozo had a 100-bed hospital, instead of 20 beds. Two RN's would be perfect, a LPN and RN would do the job, but who knows where two nurses can be found.

Much work has been done at the hospital in the past year, it's actually in fine condition. Landscaping has made a big change outdoors. The building has been stuccoed, new drapes throughout inside, new mattresses on all the beds. A blood testing machine has been added, new electro cardiograph installed, office equipment and a complete new kitchen soon will be in use.

The staff at Carrizozo Hospital now includes Margie Whitaker RN, Carolyn Harman LPN Beverly Cress LPN, Sibyl Hulbert, Eliza Cady, Rosa Chavez, Doris Davenport, Juanita Baca, Betty Jackson, Natalia Vega and Roberta Mackey as nurse aides.

All of the formal steps have been made to qualify for medicare. Some changes or revisions may be made in the law, and/or Carrizozo Hospital may find needed nurses, in any case the Board of Directors will do its best to get the hospital certified.

### Dead man corner claims another life

John B. Work, 47, of Jacksonville, Texas, was killed Saturday early when his truck failed to make the turn at "Deadman's Curve" four miles west of Capitan.

He had been transporting a load of lumber and last known stop was at Dutil. The clock on his truck stopped at 2:00 a. m. probably the time of the wreck but he was not found until around 5:00 when a passing motorist saw the wreckage. Cause of wreck thought by police to be speed and fatigue.

The body was brought to Chapel of Roses in Carrizozo and later flown to Jacksonville.

## Otero Electric hosts state meeting

Nearly 200 New Mexicans are expected to attend a meeting in Ruidoso June 23 and 24 to discuss the problems facing the 17 rural electric cooperatives in the state.

The event is the annual meeting of the New Mexico Rural Electrification Cooperative Association, the trade organization of the one generation and transmission cooperative and 16 electrical distribution cooperatives in New Mexico.

The meeting starts at 1:30 p. m., Thursday, June 23, at the Chaparral Motor Hotel and continues until Friday noon.

Eric Freelove, a member of the Board of Trustees of Jemez Mountains Electric Cooperative, Espanola, and vice president of the NMRECA board of directors, will preside over the opening session.

The opening program will include an address by W. V. Thomas, manager of the Wisconsin Electric Cooperative Association. There also will be a panel discussion on "Maximum Use of Electricity in Modern Buildings."

Paul Frost of Artesia, manager of the Central Valley Electric Cooperative, and president of NMRECA, will preside over the Friday morning session. It will be devoted to business of the association and the election of a director to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

Present director of the national organization is R. B. Moore, manager of the Lea County Electric Cooperative, Lovington.

Host cooperative is the Otero County Electric Cooperative with headquarters in Cloudcroft.

Those attending the meeting will be key employees of New Mexico rural electric cooperatives and members of the boards of trustees of the various cooperatives, and their wives.

Carl B. Turner of Santa Fe is executive manager of NMRECA. The association is publisher of New Mexico Electric News, a magazine sent members of Otero County Electric Cooperative as well as members of other cooperatives in the state.

More than one-third of New Mexico's population receives electricity from rural electric cooperatives. Lines of the various cooperatives carry electricity to rural and small town residents living throughout New Mexico and covering 90 per cent of the state's land area.

Rural electric cooperatives are local, non-profit corporations formed to provide electricity for rural areas which had been refused service by commercial companies. They were financed by the Rural Electrification Administration.

The 150-foot tower being erected east of Carrizozo by the Volquardsen Cable TV company will have six antennas, aimed three directions, to bring in stations located at Albuquerque, El Paso and Roswell. Also included will be the educational station in Albuquerque.

The company has easement to run lines all over town and will use approximately seven miles of wire. Television signals are received at the town, amplified and processed to take out line noise, and brought in to town by aluminum cable. Color reception is reported real good by cable television.

The company is owned by Fred Volquardsen of Ruidoso. He is a graduate of Missouri University and has been in electronics for 26 years, and is a long-time ham radio operator.

The tower is expected to withstand 120-mile winds and is being erected by Western Communications Service, San Angelo.





### A home away from home

A picture in the News this week can give you quite a message if you let your imagination wander just a wee bit. This picture shows a handsome man in dress clothes. He was born in 1884 somewhere in Russia, name Hillboff, naturalized 1935.

How did it happen that Mr. Hillboff lived out his days at Fort Stanton? Over a long period of years Fort Stanton has been a "home away from home" for many people. Hillboff was a merchant marine, apparently had tuberculosis, was sent to Fort Stanton by our government when Stanton was a federal institution, and there he lived until he died.

There's more to the story. Right now Fort Stanton is a home for people of all ages, call them students, and the Fort Stanton parade ground where Blackjack Perahing once marched is now a campus. Most of these students need to be there, they need consideration, special care, and special training. There are other reasons.

The News editor at one time had little awareness of institutions in New Mexico, and certainly no concern for the residents of these places. The need is real, we have learned in recent years and our obligation strong — if we consider our fellow men as human beings.

An institution at Las Vegas named Meadows, houses more than 200 people who need a home the worst way, most of them are there because of chronic illness. Maybe there is room for improvement of care at this home-away-from-home. If so the improvement will take place — but right now these people, a great many with no responsible family members, have a home, companionship, and care.

Another institution at Las Vegas we do not know so much about except that the superintendent said his institution was a sort of "catch-all," meaning that people with all sorts of disorders and no place to go went to his home. Of course, some sorting would be of great value, but New Mexico does not have enough rooms for all of its people who need another home.

There is a small institution above Espanola named El Mirador (the looking glass or one who looks), formerly a dude ranch and it's a beautiful spot. Not especially well suited in an economic way but the atmosphere there is wonderful. Residents of El Mirador have no other home but they hardly need another because they are receiving fine care and sympathetic treatment.

A large home at Los Lunas is better known as the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School, the parent setup for Fort Stanton. Lots of happy youngsters there, says the main father, Phil Carter who is superintendent of state operated home. Many of these

youngsters have a home but for reasons of their own good, the good of society in general, they need another home. We've seen enough of their handling to believe they are getting good care. Recently a piece of property valued at over \$5 million was transferred from federal to state, known as Fort Bayard Hospital. It is now a home for many elderly people as well as a haven for tuberculosis patients. It's as beautiful as any

spot in New Mexico, much wild game in the area, fine climate, and Bayard residents need a home real bad. Many of them have no other home, and the TB patients need the kind of care they will receive at Bayard. No drive for funds is involved in this writing, no request to pay more taxes for homes for

the homeless is made here, we're simply putting the thought in your mind that New Mexico has an obligation to "take care of its own," part of your tax dollar is going to provide homes-away-from-home, this money is going for a worthwhile cause and is well spent to the best of our knowledge.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 91  
AN ORDINANCE granting to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico inter-community gas association, a franchise and privilege to construct, erect and operate a gas system within the boundaries of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico; providing for the terms and conditions of such franchise; providing for the acceptance of such franchise by the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, providing for publication and providing an effective date;

WHEREAS, the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico inter-community gas association, has heretofore been organized by joint resolution of the governing authorities of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico and the Village of Capitan, New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, said association has been organized for the purpose of acquiring a natural gas transmission line and distribution system in order to provide gas service to the inhabitants of the town of Carrizozo and the Village of Capitan; and in connection therewith proposes to issue and sell its revenue bonds for the purpose of paying part of the cost of acquiring said line system; and

WHEREAS, it is now the desire of the Mayor and Board of Trustees of said Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico to grant a franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association to construct, erect and operate such system within the present or future boundaries of said Town of Carrizozo (hereinafter for convenience called the "Municipality") in accordance with the provisions of Section 14-43-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Municipality as follows:

ARTICLE ONE  
That the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Municipality do hereby grant the following franchise and privilege to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico inter-community gas association for the construction, erection and operation of a natural gas system within the Municipality;

FRANCHISE  
SECTION 1. Grant of Authority.

There is hereby granted to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association, a New Mexico inter-community gas association, successors in interest or assigns (hereinafter for convenience collectively called the "Association") for twenty-five years from the date of the acceptance hereof by the Association, the right, privilege and franchise to acquire, erect, construct, operate and maintain a gas system, and to import, transport, sell and distribute gas, whether natural, manufactured or mixed, to the Municipality and the inhabitants, institutions and businesses thereof, for domestic, commercial, industrial and institutional uses and such other purposes for which it is or may hereafter be used, within the Municipality, and for these purposes to establish the necessary facilities and equipment and to lay, repair, replace, maintain and operate gas mains, service pipes, regulator stations and other appurtenances necessary to supplying the sale and distribution of gas in, along and across the streets, avenues, alleys and other public ways and places of the Municipality, and to use the streets and other public ways in the Municipality for rights-of-way for its natural gas lines, mains, service pipes and other appurtenances needed for operation of the natural gas system.

SECTION 2. Conditions of Street Occupancy.  
(1) Use: All pipes, mains and other natural, artificial or mixed gas equipment and apparatus laid or placed by the Association shall be so located in the streets, alleys, public ways and placed in the Municipality as not to obstruct or interfere with any water pipes, sewers, drains or other structures. The Association shall, when practicable, avoid interfering with the use of such street, alley or other highway where the paving or surface of such street, alley or other highway would be disturbed.  
(2) Restoration: If the Association shall disturb any pavement, sidewalk, street, alley, driveway or other surfacing, then in such event, the Association shall, at its own cost and expense, and in a manner approved by the Municipality, replace and restore to a condition as good as that before such disturbance, any such disturbed pavement, sidewalk, street, alley, driveway or other surfacing.  
(3) Relocation: In the event that at any time during the period of this franchise the Municipality shall lawfully elect to alter or change the grade of any street, alley or other public place or way, the Association, upon written request at least 30 days prior to the proposed construction by the Municipality shall remove, relay and relocate, at its own expense, the Association's pipes, mains and other gas fixtures as may be necessary to conform to the proposed construction.


